Board Studies Proposal For New High School

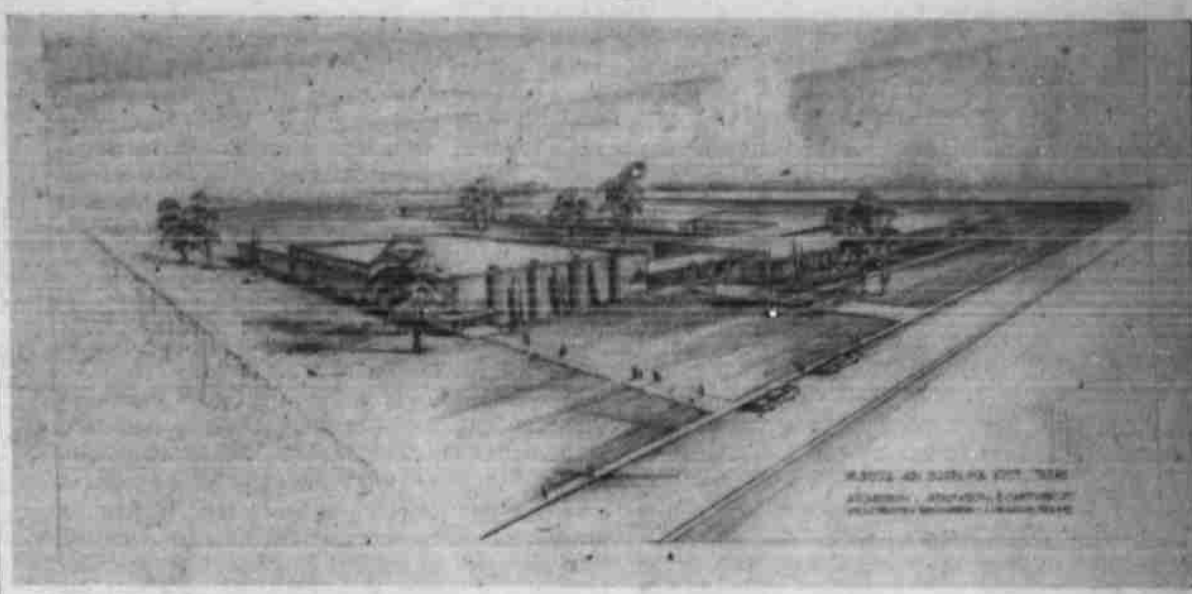

Would Cost \$479,500 With Gym

Public reaction was awaited today on an architect's proposal to construct a new high school building and gymnasium for the Post Consolidated Independent School District at an estimated cost of \$479,500.

This would cost an estimated \$65,000 more than the \$414,500 required to renovate and expand the present high school building and add the same new gymnasium. Architects James Atcheson and Atmar Atkinson of the Lubbock

firm of Atkinson, Atcheson and Cartwright appeared before the board of trustees of the school district at its regular June session Monday night to offer the board a choice of plans between a new building and the expansion of the present building built in 1928.

Plans for the renovation and expansion of the present building were drawn two years ago by the same firm.

The proposed new high school building would be a one-story L-shaped building of brick construction, similar in outside appearance to the Post Junior High building. It would be located on the far corner of the junior high 20-acre campus.

The new high school and gymnasium would contain approximately 39,300 square feet of floor space, broken down into 10,500 for the gym and 28,800 in the high school.

Architect Atkinson told board members that the new building would contain approximately 3,000 more square feet of space than the proposed remodeled and expanded present building. He said each building would have the same number of classrooms but that the classrooms in the new building would be larger.

The 1955 plans for remodeling and expanding the present high school building call for extensive renovation of the present building and the addition of new wings on both the east and west ends of the building.

June 20 Vote On Wheat Quotas

Wheat farmers will decide by referendum next Thursday whether or not they want marketing quotas on the 1958 wheat crop.

Voting in Garza County will be at the ASC office here, with voting time from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

Those eligible to vote are all persons who will have an interest in wheat acreage in excess of 15 acres for 1958.

The recent proclamation of marketing quotas for the 1958 crop conforms with legislative directives, according to R. G. Shrauner, chairman of the Texas ASC Committee. Under the governing legislation, the Secretary of Agriculture must proclaim marketing quotas for the next wheat crop when the available supply is 20 per cent above the normal supply.

All eligible growers are urged to vote in the referendum.

Replanting Continues Following Wash-Out Downpours

Rains Hit Area Crops Hard

Rain, a lack of which has caused many crop failures in past years, was proving a plague this week to farmers trying to keep cotton seed in the ground.

The percentage of replanting rose sharply following Saturday night's rain, and the sudden cloudburst of late Tuesday night made crop conditions worse for many Post area farmers who have as yet failed to get their cotton up.

The rainfall through Saturday night totaled 16.37 inches for the year—more than double normal—and the downpour of Tuesday night and Wednesday morning added .58 of an inch to the total measured here. It was heavier in other parts of the county, up to an inch having been registered in areas northwest of town. Water swirled curb deep through the streets here following the sudden downpour, but quickly drained off.

Severe thunder and lightning and a brief flurry of hail accompanied Tuesday night's rain, but

no reports of hail damage to crops had been received late Wednesday. County Agent Lewis C. Herron estimated that a little more than 50 per cent of the county's cotton crop is up to a stand, but that considerable planting and replanting still is under way.

Agricultural observers say that heavy rains and flooded fields during recent weeks have cost South Plains farmers \$4,000,000 and left them with a "major gamble" on their hands.

With June 20 considered by many as the latest planting date, about one-fourth of the crop was yet to be planted before this week's rains came. Others predict there will be planting and replanting up until July 1.

Sunshine the last four days of last week improved the situation, but the rains Saturday and this week have caused additional delays in planting.

This week's rain of .58 of an inch brought the June total here to 2.42 inches and the total since Jan. 1 to 16.95 inches.

Judge Pat N. Walker said Wednesday.

The commissioners and a group of adult 4-H leaders were meeting at 1 o'clock this afternoon to work out additional details on the project.

The 4-H group has had plans under way for the last two years for construction of a building on a site at the park donated for that purpose by the City of Post. The approximate cost would be \$9,000.

Judge Walker said the county has tentatively agreed to pay a maximum of \$5,000 as its part toward construction of the building, which would be used as a 4-H meeting place and fair exhibits building and for other club purposes.

The 4-H organization has about \$3,500 in its present building fund.

County To Pay Half Of Cost On 4-H Building

The Garza County commissioners' court has tentatively agreed to go 50-50 with the county's 4-H Club organization in construction of a 4-H building at the City Park.

Teacher Pay On Agenda At Special Meeting Friday

Board To Consider Salaries

A special meeting of the board of trustees of the Post consolidated independent school district has been called for 7:30 tomorrow night to consider the teachers' salary schedule for the next school year.

The board also will consider the site problem for the Post colored school and possibly approve a contractor's bid for moving in the Garnolia building to serve as the new colored school. It contains three classrooms and a combination auditorium-gymnasium.

Supt. R. K. Green told the board at its regular June meeting Monday night that the members needed to set a special meeting date in the near future to work on the 1957-58 salary schedule as the information is needed before new teachers can be contracted.

He pointed out too that the Texas legislature has boosted the minimum salary requirements \$399 per teacher.

The board at its Monday night session discussed locating the colored school right east of the present building where the board

holds a land option. A board committee reported, however, that this proposed site is "very low—lower in some places than the site we now have."

The board decided to price other acreage on "the flats" as a possible school site before the Friday night session.

Supt. Green reported to the board that he had contacted four movers for bids on moving the Garnolia building into Post but received only one bid—that of \$3,000 from A. E. Oliphant of Lubbock.

He reported Oliphant had carefully checked the routing necessary for the move and had told the superintendent that the U-shaped school building would have to be cut in three places and hauled in by sections. He said the largest cost item would be the cost of repairmen to help clear phone and REA lines. The \$3,000 cost would not include the cost of the foundation, or of putting the three sections back together.

Supt. Green estimated it would cost \$5,000 in addition to the moving costs to build foundation, put building back together, stucco it, and provide necessary sewage.

E. R. Moreland said total cost of the "move-in" to have the building ready for use should not exceed \$9,000.

The board members agreed to go out to inspect the building Tuesday afternoon.

The superintendent said the school district probably would have to borrow the necessary funds and then pay off the loan out of next year's budget.

Green's recommendations that the resignations of Burl McCoy as basketball and assistant football coach and Miss Julia Galbraith as seventh grade language arts teacher be accepted and that Frank Banta be granted a leave of absence to accept a \$3,000 scholarship at the University of Texas were approved by the board.

Big Steps Coming On Water Problem

Since an adequate water supply is the No. 1 problem in this area, decisions of the utmost importance to the community are expected to be made at the June 20 meeting of the board of directors of the White River Municipal Water District. At that time, the board probably will call elections for a bond issue with which to carry through on the White River dam project and for water contracts in each of the four member cities—Post, Spur, Crosbyton and Ralls.

In view of the pressing need for an adequate surface water supply, we believe it important to start "beating the drums" even this far ahead of time for favorable public response to these upcoming elections. The citizens of the four member cities haven't waited too long to take steps to solve their water problems, but, considering the rapid depletion of underground supplies, neither have they started too soon.

You could write the story of man's growth in terms of his epic concerns with water. All life depends on water. For us today water is as necessary for life and health as it was for our prehistoric ancestors. Like air, water is bound up with man's evolution—and doubtless his destiny—in more ways than one. One of the basic conditions for life on earth is that water be available in liquid form.

Since water was "here first," so to speak, it is easy to understand why it became one of the supreme rulers of nature. Other and later substances, including all living things, had to be able to "get along" with water or they could not exist.

Merely to sustain life takes relatively little water, but its use does not end there. The steady rise in the consumption of water in industrially

advanced areas explains why we now regard our water supplies with deep concern.

From an industrial standpoint, for example, there is a limit to how much industry an area can accommodate. That limit is the available water supply. Only by promising an assured visible supply of good water can the towns of Post, Spur, Crosbyton and Ralls attract more industry and at the same time enable development of that which they have. Cities can grow for the next half century, at least, if their water supplies keep pace.

The proposed White River lake not only would supply municipal and industrial needs of the four towns, but would also afford water recreation—still a novelty in the Southwest, but a major tourist attraction when it can be developed. The proposed lake would provide advantages to fishermen, boat enthusiasts, lakeside cottagers and youth organizations such as the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, who would be allowed building sites on the lake property. What is now barren land would become valuable shorefront sites and would enter the tax rolls to share the tax burden with all of us.

The final decision will be up to the voters, in the bond and water contract elections expected to be called for next August. In the meantime, we urge them to weigh the value of an assured visible water supply against the frustrating search for more underground water, such as that engaged in the last two years by the City of Post—a search in which more than half the holes drilled have been rank failures and in which those brought in wouldn't be worth tying in to the system were we not in such dire straits for water.—CD

The town isn't stifled with "organizationitis" as so many are, but there are enough clubs and organizations busily at work on a wide variety of projects to assure the town of plenty of energetic accomplishments. The Chamber of Commerce is a working Chamber with the membership pitching in together.

It's clear to all that Post believes in solving its problems. Now busy with a big street paving program, the community appears eager to join its neighbors to solve the area water problem. More school construction is moving into the final planning stage—always an item on any community's list to indicate pride and progress.

Post simply can't miss with the attitude of its citizens.

Not only are they helpful and friendly to newcomers in their midst, but every one is a staunch town booster. "You'll like Post," they chorus. "You'll find it's a good place to live."

That's the final selling point—the attitude of the people for their town.

This brief community appraisal through the eyes of a newcomer is made to emphasize that Post truly has something to sell—and something many people today are eager to buy at the bargain price offered here.—JC

Paving Is Feather In Cap Of Progress

An indication of the scope of the street improvement work under way here for the last few months is seen in the remark by a Post housewife that "you have to be extra careful when you're out in an automobile because there is no telling when and where you might run smack-dab against a street barrier or a paving crew."

Street barriers were a rather common sight during the rainy weather when streets had to be blocked to traffic because of paving improvements under way and no workmen around. With crews back at work, the barriers are unnecessary since the workmen and their equipment serve the same purpose.

Completion is nearing on the 40½ blocks of new paving, with all sub-surfacing down, curbing and gutters in, and only the asphalt "shooting" remaining to be done on a few of the blocks. The size of the new paving project exceeded even the fondest expectations of city officials, who at first thought that not more than 15 or 20 blocks would be signed up. The project worked out so well that now the city has the paving contractors re-surfacing 30 blocks of old paving.

Either of the projects would have been a

feather in the city's cap of progress, and property owners, too, are to be commended for their cooperation on the new-paving project, including footing most of the bill. Also assisting on the project was the County of Garza, which furnished trucks and men for hauling of caliche and gravel. City officials said this week that no additional blocks will be signed up for new paving at this time. More new paving is to come later, however, and it is hoped that at that time many of the unpaved blocks scattered here and there among newly-paved streets will be signed up for improvement.

The 40½ newly-paved blocks, added to the old paving, gives Post one of the best street networks of any city in the area. The system will be even more imposing after re-surfacing, including patching, of the 30 blocks of old paving is completed.

The City of Post and County of Garza have done, and are doing, an excellent job on grading unpaved streets following the recent heavy rains. Work of this type has resulted in fewer impassable streets than we've had in other years when rainfall was scantier.—CD

A FEW FACTS and figures are all that are needed to show that 1957 will be one of the rainiest years on record here if it keeps up the pace. There isn't much chance, of course, of it cracking the all-time record of 43.20 inches set in 1941, but who wants it to?

Already this year—through the 4th of June—we've received 16.17 inches and that's ahead of the 12-month total for 20 of the 41 years since 1915, which is where our rainfall chart leads off.

JUST TO BRING the statistical-minded reader up to date on how much rain we HAVE been getting, precipitation for the month of May was the third highest on record for the month. Its 5.43 inches yields only to a whopping 10.81 in May of that rain-drenched year of 1941, and to 6.51 in May of 1947.

Nor was our April rainfall anything to sneeze at. The 5.35 inches measured that month also ranks third on the 41-year rainfall chart. Ahead of it is April of 1915, with an 8.07-inch total, and April of 1922, with 6.59 inches. June is off to a good start, with more than two inches, but doesn't stand much chance of beating the month's all-time high of 8.07 inches in June of 1935, and doesn't need to, if we're to hold what we have and get more in the ground.

WHILE WE'RE on the subject of records, we might mention that those for April show that the cost of living rose again, due mainly to advances in the price of foods. That we have to eat to live is becoming an increasingly heavy handicap.

Setting of dates for the Garza County Fair reminds us that Jim Hundley, from two doors west, was in the other day to show us a stock certificate for the Garza County Fair of 1917. The \$10 share in the Garza County Fair Association was owned by Jim's father, R. J. "Pokey" Hundley.

OCCUPANTS of one of Pokey's rent houses found the 40-year-old stock certificate in the cellar. We don't recall Jim having said it was a storm cellar, but chances are it was, since they've been the most heavily populated type of cellars the last few weeks.

The certificate was issued under the laws of the State of Texas, and listed the Garza County Fair Association's capital stock at \$12,500. It was signed by W. F. Lange, secretary, and J. F. Hartford, president, who at the time was manager of the Double U Company here.

INCIDENTALLY, THIS year's fair is to end on the first day of the Golden Jubilee celebration, which should add to its success. The Post Lions Club, which sponsors the midway the first four days of the week, with display and judging of exhibits set for Friday and Saturday.

LONE STAR AGRICULTURE

One Fifth Of Crop Land Harvested In The State Is Irrigated Land

By JOHN C. WHITE

Irrigation plays a much bigger part in Lone Star agriculture than most Texans realize.

Nearly a half billion acres of Texas land are now irrigated. About one-fifth of the crop land harvested in the state is irrigated land.

Although many centuries old, the practice of irrigation is relatively new in the state. There were no definite reports on the amount of irrigated Texas acreage until 1940, when less than 855,000 acres were irrigated.

But with the advent of larger, more mechanized farms in recent years, irrigation systems have spread to all corners of the state.

Irrigation has fit well into the ever-changing agricultural picture. It has been the answer to problems of drought, low yields and cost-price squeeze. And there probably isn't a farmer in Texas today who hasn't given some thought to irrigation.

This is no wishful thinking on the farmer's part—to want "rain" at the right time in the right amount. Many farmers in the heavier rainfall sections of Texas are setting up irrigation systems for small tracts and increasing yields up to 200 per cent.

Although 95 per cent of the irrigated farms are located in just 78 counties, the scientific principles of irrigation are rapidly being applied in all areas of the state.

During the past year, numerous irrigation "clinics" and demonstrations have been held under auspices of county agents, Soil Conservation Districts and irrigation engineers and manufacturers.

Economical, low-cost sprinkler systems have been devised for use on small tracts. Many of these operated last summer in East and Central Texas.

All indications point to an even bigger role for irrigation in Texas agriculture's future.

ROGER BABSON'S AUTHENTIC STATEMENT

Demand Slows For Routine Workers, June Crop Of Graduates Is Warned

BABSON PARK, Mass. — Sky-rocketing labor costs have forced employers to resort to unprecedented technological research. This research is teaching employers that they can get on without many routine workers. Even with the present high employment level, this should sound a warning note to high school and college graduates.

Out of electronics has come the basis for vast new developments in automation. A simple example of what I mean is the "electric eye," which opens doors at the proper moment without being actually touched by anybody. Another illustration is the record-changer and turntable on our phonographs, including the automatic stopping device. Of a more complicated nature are guided missiles that can chase and overtake an airplane without any human guidance.

Many Changes Ahead

This same principle of electronics is being applied today to operation of a manufacturing plant by a dozen employees, in contrast to the several hundred formerly needed. And remember that these can be women as well as men since their chief duty will be merely to press push buttons. Labor in general is not aware of the vast extent of the changes ahead. Employers, it is true, will always

need human help, but not for a great many present-day jobs. Their requirements will turn more and more toward the intelligence and judgment of graduates with a high I. Q.

Russia has always thought in terms of massed armies to overrun Europe when the time seemed ripe for an attack. However, with the Free Nations of Europe learning to use nuclear weapons, wars are swiftly moved onto a push-button basis. The great masses of Russia, China, and the Moslem nations will be only a nuisance to clutter up a battlefield under such conditions. Premier Nehru recognizes this, and that is why he is so eager to remain neutral. Electronics and the atom will cause tremendous changes not only in warfare, but in education!

Envis Graduate

I envy our young people who are to graduate this month. They will have far more opportunities than we oldsters had. I wish the schools and colleges would wake up to these changes. Better pension off the professors who can teach only the orthodox old-fashioned courses, instead of forcing these courses on our young people so that they can get a degree.

I predict that the above changes will mean that young graduates will need good character more than ever before. Better training in homes, churches, and schools will be absolutely essential in this new electronic push-button age. Wise are the young people who take evening courses now to prepare for the better jobs ahead.

Salesgirl Going Out

The typical salesgirl is in the process of becoming obsolete. Before long she will be replaced 60 per cent by self-service counters, 15 per cent by push-button vending machines, and 25 per cent by highly paid, intelligent salesmen whose job will be to secure new customers. New qualifications are a must for the June graduates who hope to get good jobs. The field of advertising and selling is still in its infancy, and marvelous opportunities exist for those willing to train properly for it.

What do the changes mean?

- (1) Manual and routine labor will gradually become obsolete.
- (2) Those who cannot readily learn new skills will be kept on at reduced hours, but with the same take-home pay. This will boost the do-it-yourself industries!
- (3) Only the serious and intelligent employees will get raises. There will be no limit on salaries for those with the necessary character, brains, initiative, and loyalty.
- (4) Our great problem will not be to raise crops, build homes, or manufacture goods, but to get people to buy. Hence, instead of subsidizing farmers, we may eventually subsidize merchants and salesmen.
- (5) I advise young men to become expert machinists instead of lawyers, trained outside salesmen instead of inside pencil-pushers, and after graduation to attend night school to prepare for the NEW AGE.

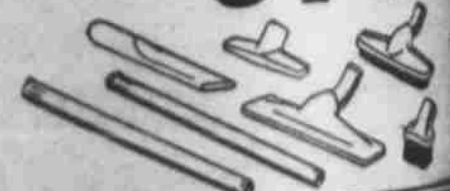

Slow Down And Live Campaign Gets Under Way By Safety Association
"For just a moment, try to imagine the results if you were behind the wheel of your own car, then drove it off the top of a ten-story building. It leaves you with a rather awesome picture, doesn't it?"
This thought provoking question was asked today by J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, as he set the theme for the beginning of the association's annual Slow Down and Live campaign.
"Of course no sane driver would attempt such a foolish thing," Musick continued. "And yet, if the same motorist crashes into another car while traveling 60 mph, he will meet with equally disastrous results."
Musick said he did not believe that speed, in itself, is necessarily bad, but highly desirable for efficiency's sake. With our modern transportation system, speed is essential. Whether it is for police cars, taxicabs, ambulances, or in simply getting us from one place to another.
"No, speed is not bad," Musick said. "But, we must be able to determine at what speed we can travel with a maximum of efficiency and a minimum of danger."
Here in Texas, the traffic expert pointed out, all speed limits are clearly marked. And yet, these speed limits cannot be considered safe at all times. In other words, they are greatly affected by weather and traffic conditions.
"A safe speed, then, is one that is not too fast for conditions," Musick said. "Thus, it is up to the individual driver to determine what is a safe speed, within the given limits."
To help the average motorist determine what a safe speed would be under specific conditions, Musick offered the following seven-point check list:
First, drive at a speed that will enable you to stop in the assured clear distance ahead. Second, slow down before you get to curves and intersections. Third, at night, drive at the speed which will let you stop within your headlight range. Fourth, drive with traffic. You are probably going too fast if you are passing many cars and too slow if a number of cars are passing you. Fifth, where children are playing, be able to stop in a car length or less. Sixth, when you're tired or inattentive, stop and rest. Seventh,

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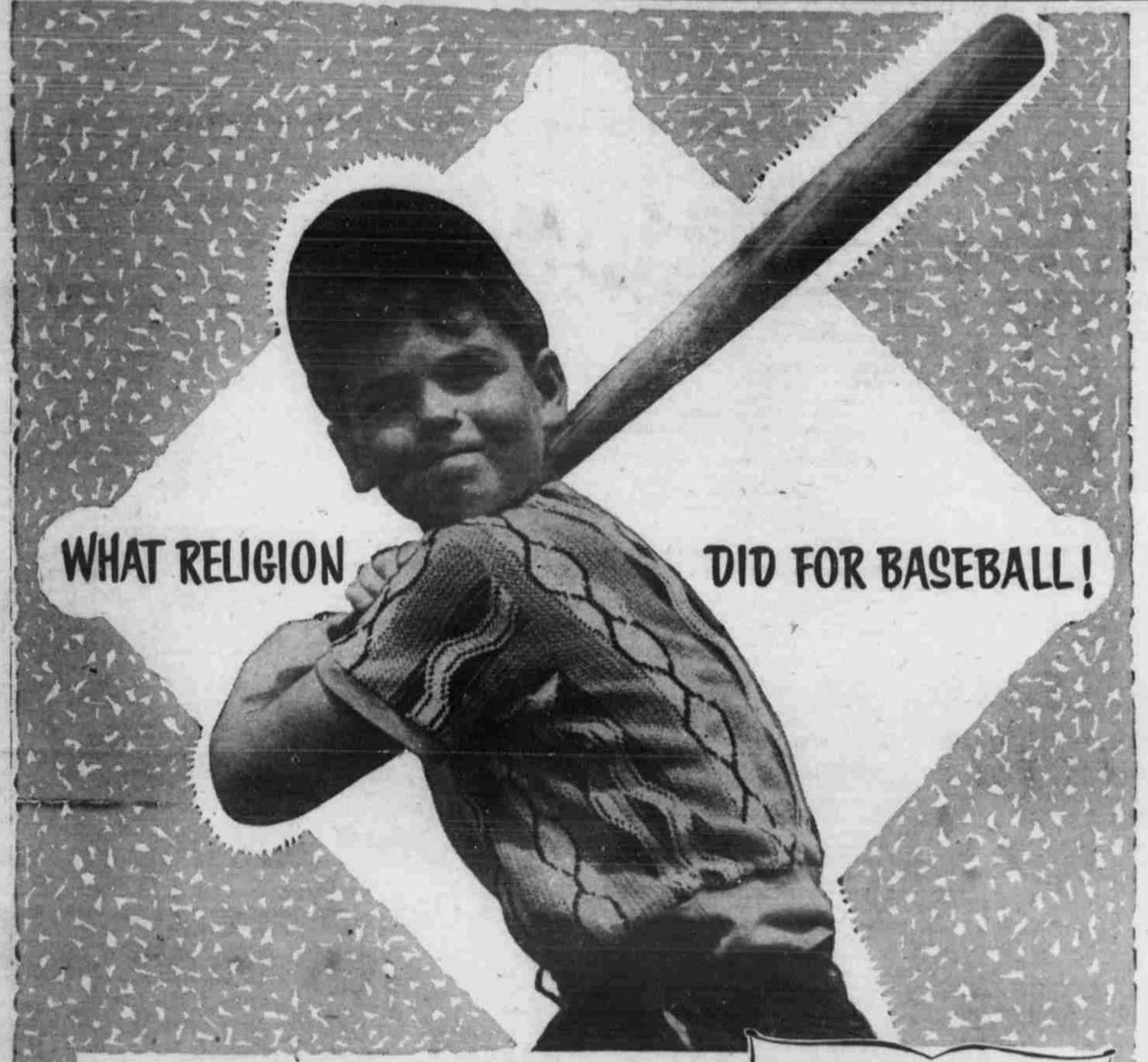

The board officially declared J. E. Birdwell the winner over Bill Edwards by a 116 to 112 margin.

Then came the official lottery. The seven board members each reached into the hat to draw slips designating whether they serve one, two, or three year terms on the board, as required by law.

Clint Herring and Bobby Pierce drew the three-year terms, Quannah Maxey and Birdwell the two-year terms, and Burney Francis, Moreland and Robert Cato, one-year terms.

The only close vote of the night came on a decision to pay \$75 of the \$118 bill submitted by Dr. C. J. Lewis, Jr., Post chiropractor, for treatment of an injury to Jim Brewer, high school athlete.

Supt. Green explained that the National Educators Life Insurance Co. has declined to pay Dr. Lewis' claim because the 90-day limitation for incurring such expenses had expired. Green said the insurance firm, with which Post athletes are insured, already had paid about \$300 in claims in the Brewer injury case. He recommended the board pay half the bill.

The board voted 4 to 3 to pay the bill after Chairman Herring voiced opposition to such a move for two reasons: (1) because of the precedent it would set for future injury cases, and (2) because of the question of legality of making such a payment. Francis, Maxey, Moreland, and Pierce voted yes on the motion after Moreland expressed the thought that the lapse of the 90-day limitation period had just been an "oversight."

The board also voted to pay school tax refunds of \$185.48 to L. E. Gossett and \$79.21 to Elmer Cowdrey after receiving letters from the assessor-collector of taxes in Garza County that both Gossett and Cowdrey had paid their school taxes twice and incorrectly to the Post district. Gossett had paid in the Graham school district and Cowdrey in the Graham and Close City districts.

The board voted to send a letter of thanks to Tom Power for the free use of a driver-trainer car during the last school year.

The board authorized payment of \$1,942.33 in bills, but not before Pierce had proposed concreting the school yards to "cut down on high yard maintenance expense" and the members decided to hold up payment of \$647 in insurance premiums until more information could be obtained.

Mrs. Fritz Greenfield, Post Chamber of Commerce secretary, was admitted to Lubbock Methodist Hospital Tuesday afternoon for treatment of a virus infection after being ill at her home here most of last week. She is expected to be released from the hospital soon.

Floor Plans Shown On HS Proposal

Either the expanded present building or the new building would accommodate approximately 400 students. A 1957 fall enrollment of 250 students is anticipated with the enrollment expected to increase to 350 students if the town does not grow any larger than its present size. Enough students now in the grade school will boost the enrollment to about 350 once they reach the high school level.

The proposed new gymnasium would be 85 by 95 feet and would provide space for a regulation basketball court, dressing rooms, and space for bleacher seating of approximately 500 spectators.

Atkinson told the board that the new high school building would cost an estimated \$303,000. The new gym would add \$120,000 more for a total construction cost of \$423,000. Additional costs would be \$35,000 for necessary equipment and \$21,500 for architectural fees (figured at 5 per cent of construction costs).

In comparison the cost of renovating and remodeling the 29-year-old high school building would include \$149,000 for new classroom space in the two wings, \$103,000 for remodeling the existing building for a total of \$252,000. The same sized new gymnasium would cost \$120,000 with \$20,000 additional needed for new equipment and architectural fees of \$22,500. The fees are higher for the renovation, Atkinson explained, because the customary architectural fee is 6 per cent for remodeling old construction as compared to only 5 per cent for the fresh start, which requires somewhat easier planning.

This brings the total estimated cost of the new building, with gym, completely equipped to \$479,500 as compared to \$414,500 for the remodeling and expansion of the present building.

Supt. R. K. Green told the board that "the future is going to catch up with you."

He explained that the school district is certain to be faced with the necessity of expanding its present grade school facilities within a few years.

Green said that with a minimum of expense—"say \$20,000"—the present high school building could be converted into grade school use if the new high school were built.

He pointed out the board would thus actually get two needed buildings instead of one if the present building is remodeled and expanded for high school use.

The superintendent emphasized that the corridors of the present high school building—only eight feet wide—are the bottleneck which could not be eliminated in the remodeling and expansion.

Architect Atkinson earlier had told the board the corridors could not be widened to the 12 feet planned for the new building as the corridor walls are of solid brick masonry which support concrete second floor corridors.

Atkinson told the seven board members that the two new wings for the proposed expansion of the present high school building would add 12,000 square feet.

The architect said that the \$103,000 estimated cost of the renovation of the present building would include rearranging the partitions to provide for larger, but fewer classrooms. The second floor would be reorganized into an expanded science department. This area now includes both science and home economics and is much too small for the requirements of both departments.

Atkinson said the present high school building was found to be "structurally sound" but that the "heating plant had pretty well served its life expectancy." He termed the boilers "in good shape" but said it is impossible to tell how long they will last. He said the present heating plant, unless replaced, will probably require heavy maintenance.

The architect termed the building's present wiring as "simply inadequate according to present standards." He explained that the classrooms need more lights and the building will require considerable more wiring.

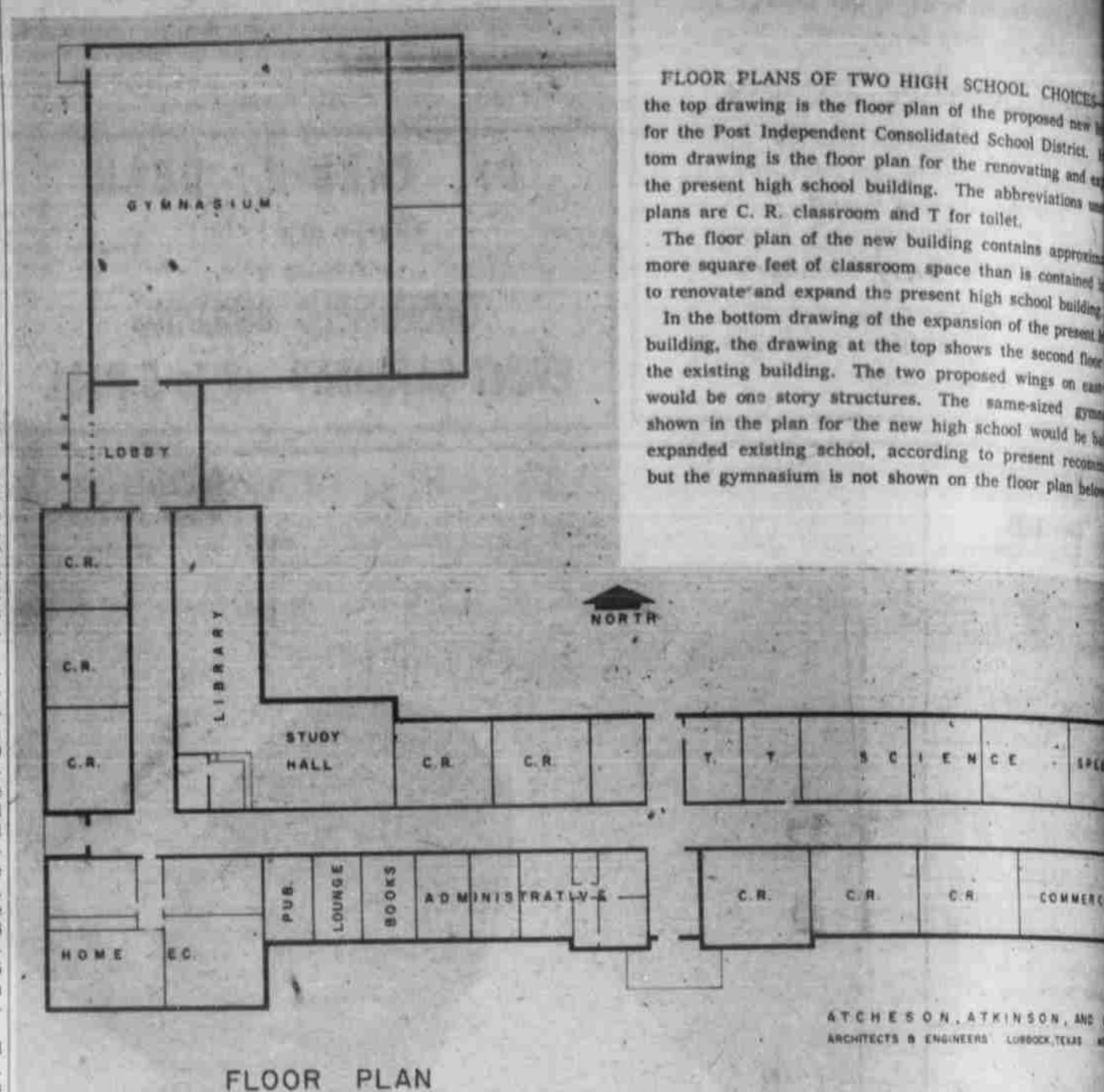
He also said the building needs a new roof.

The architect described the building's floors as "in poor shape" due to the bad maintenance practices of 20 years ago when oil was used on the floors.

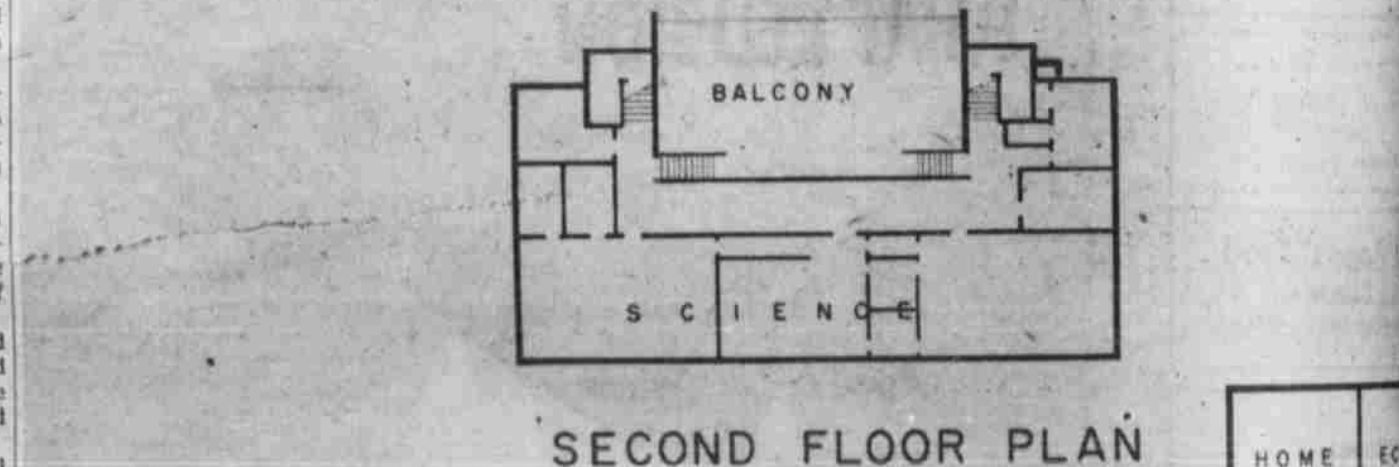
He told board members renovation plans also include several major changes in the high school auditorium, such as changing the slope of the floor, changing floor slope in balcony, installation of new forced air heating and ventilation system (not air-conditioning), and closing up the orchestra pit in front of the stage.

The board members discussed the possibility of needing a new auditorium if the new high school were built. The architects said a 1,000-seat auditorium would cost an additional \$140,000 to \$150,000 to both build and equip.

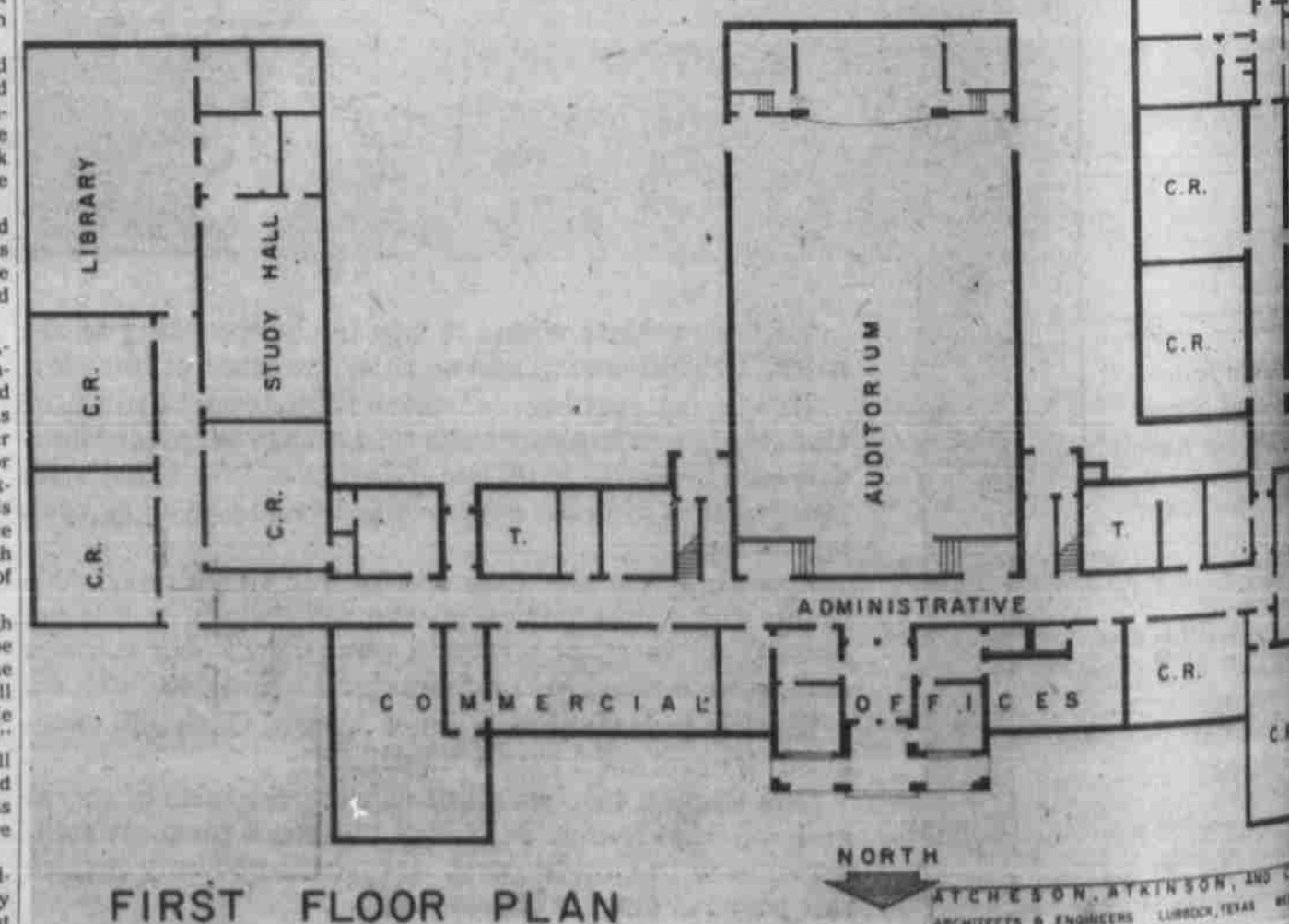
Supt. Green pointed out if a new auditorium is needed it could be

added later.

Bobby Pierce said he thought the present grade school auditorium was "big enough for most community needs" and that the auditorium problem certainly was not a major one now. The grade school auditorium seats about 800. Supt. Green said the only use now being made of the high school auditorium is for school assembly functions.

The proposed new \$120,000 gymnasium—and the present gym—also came in for considerable discussion.

Supt. Green referred to the present gym as a "hay barn" and Board Member Quannah Maxey, a sport fan, declared that "with the exception of Spar" Post "has the sorriest gym in the district regardless of school sizes."

In answer to a question by one board member Architect Atkinson explained that remodeling of the present gym had been originally considered but it was found that two walls would have to be torn out and replaced to make the court standard size—it is now below standard measurements. Furthermore, he said, unless a new MORE — MORE — MORE — roof was also put on a row of column supports for the roof would have to be built between the playing floor and the spectators.

This disclosure had all board members shaking their heads.

Board Chairman Clint Herring declared that "I'm more interested in these classrooms than in a gymnasium. Pierce quickly added that he was more interested in a gymnasium than in a new auditorium."

It was estimated that it would cost half as much to remodel the present gym as to build a much more satisfactory new one.

The board was told that if a new gym were constructed the present one might profitably be retained as "play space" for youngsters in the lower grades.

Supt. Green said the school district's present bonded indebted-

ness is \$540,000 or 3 per cent of an estimated \$15,000,000 valuation for the school district.

Construction of a new high school and gymnasium would boost the district's bonded indebtedness to approximately \$1,000,000 or about 6 1/2 per cent. The state allows a maximum of 10 per cent of bonded indebtedness on district property valuations.

Pierce termed the renovation and expansion of the present building "like putting a new motor in an old car." "I don't know," Maxey told other board members that "based on what I've seen and heard here tonight, I'm in favor of building the new high school building" instead of renovating and expanding the old one. Pierce added: "I feel the same way."

Robert Cato and E. R. (Buster) Moreland nodded in the affirmative.

J. E. Birdwell, the new board member sitting at his first session, said that "I want to know

more about it before I head with the new building" "is no question something better than now."

Chairman Herring asked the public's reaction to a new high gymnasium before any action in the matter. Other board members said they also wanted to hear from the people thought plans.

"I don't want to do it if people don't want it," he emphasized and the plan. No action on the matter was taken.

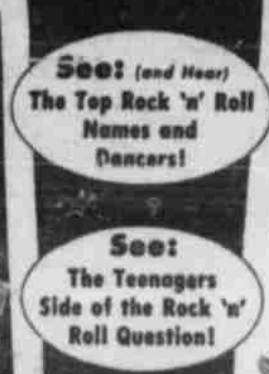

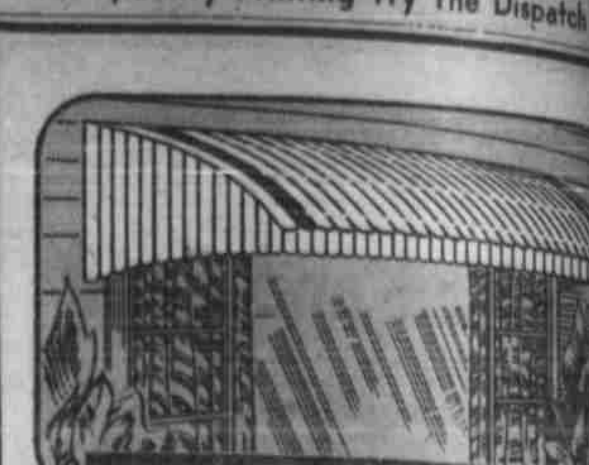

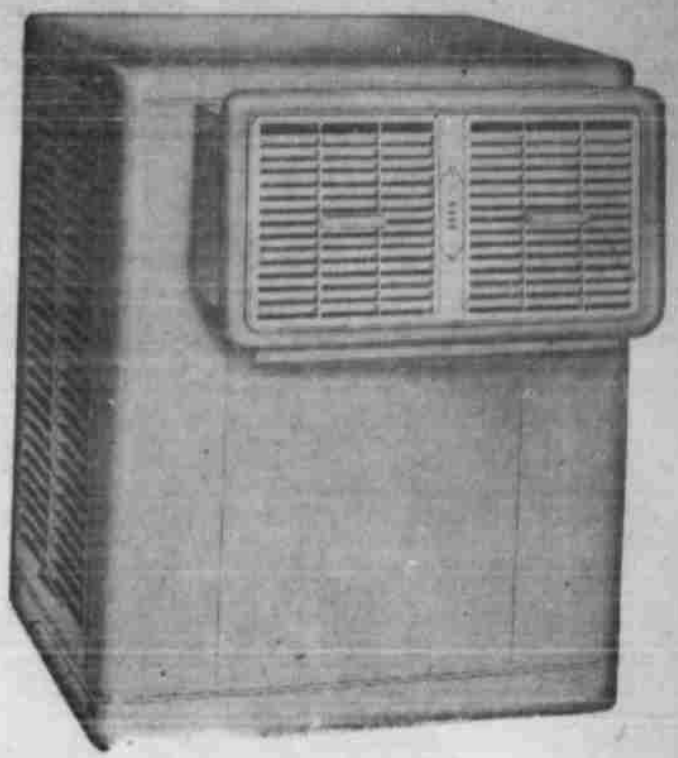

FHA Loans Total \$371,160 During 10-Month Period

More than \$371,160 has been loaned to farmers in Scurry and Garza counties during the 10 months ended April 30, 1957, by Farmers Home Administration, the agency's supervisor, Joseph E. Box, announced this week.

The heaviest demand has been for credit to finance farm operating expenses for carrying on cotton, grain and beef enterprises.

During the same ten months period, Farmers Home Administration extended credit in operating, emergency and real estate loans to some 18,500 Texas farmers and ranchers for a total of \$54,773,000, the agency's state director, Walter T. McKay, reported. "This is an increase over the same period last year of about \$6,500,000. This increase is due primarily to the demand from family-type farmers for credit needed to place their farming operations on an efficient basis," McKay explained. "In fact," he added, "agency records reveal that there has been a slight decline in the demand for emergency credit so far this year. Long-term credit, to develop balanced systems and make full use of resources available, has been extended to a number of operators of family-type farms who previously obtained emergency loan assistance."

Texas Business Is On The Upgrade

Texas business activity continues to beat strongly, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

Almost all the selected indicators of economic activity within the state showed improvement in April over March, as well as noteworthy advances over April, 1956.

"This is a continuation of the generally upward movement of the past," Dr. Francis B. May, assistant professor of business statistics, notes.

Consumer spending in April rose one per cent above March and 12 per cent above the April, 1956, level. Industrial production (measured by industrial electric power consumption) made a "striking advance" to a level 26 per cent above April, 1956 and 25 per cent above March of this year.

Texas residential construction authorized rose from a level of 153 per cent in March to 180 per cent of the 1947-49 average for April. Non-residential building authorized in April increased to 190 per cent from 178 per cent of the 1947-49 average in March.

Encouraging information conveyed by general indicators of business activity is supported by reports from individual concerns in oil production and refining, utilities, oil field equipment manufacturing, food, beverage and other fields of economic endeavor, Dr. May reports. Almost all concerns report earnings for 1957 are superior to those of 1956, and most are optimistic about the balance of the year.

VA Questions And Answers

Q. I was totally and permanently disabled in an accident recently and I now plan to apply to VA for a pension. In figuring my annual income, do I include the money I earned before my accident? If so, I know my yearly income will go above the maximum the law allows.

A. No, you need not include the income earned before your accident. Your income will be computed on a proportionate basis, dating from the time you became totally and permanently disabled.

Q. If a veteran dies without naming a beneficiary for his GI insurance policy, and the money is paid to his estate, how will it be paid—in one lump sum or in monthly installments?

A. The insurance proceeds will be paid in one lump sum to his estate.

Q. I'm planning to sell my house and let the buyer assume my GI loan. In applying to VA for a release of liability, will there be any charges involved?

A. Yes. Either you or the proposed purchaser will have to pay for a credit report on the purchaser, as well as recording the Assumption Agreement and Release, if recording is necessary.

Q. Is on-the-farm training allowable for an education under the War Orphans school program?

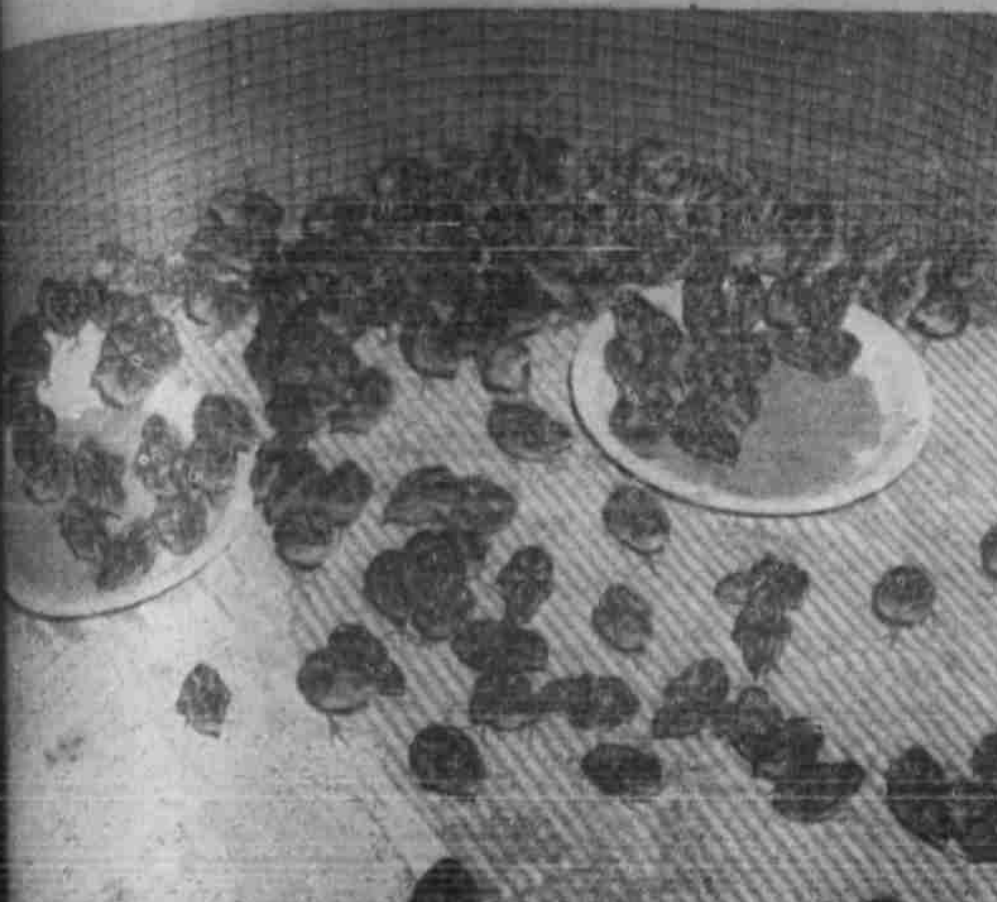
A. No. The law limits War Orphans education to classroom studies only. Farm training would be prohibited.

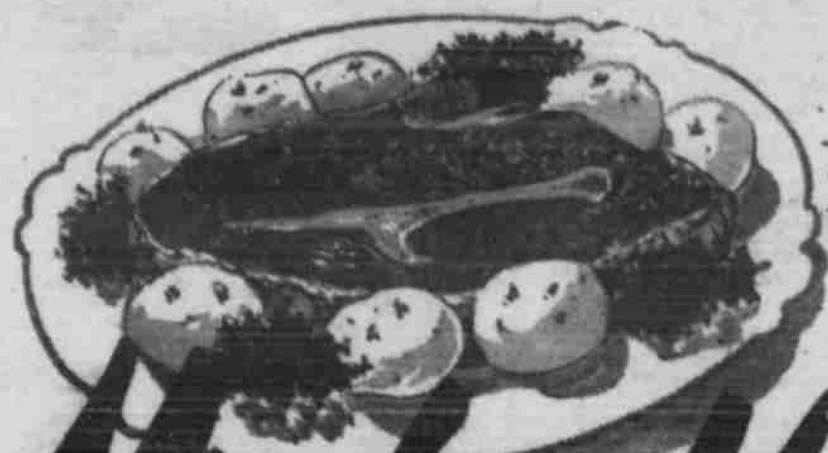
