Technical Sgt. and Mrs. M. P. Barnes are Cisco visitors, guests of Sergeant Barnes' father and mother, W. M. Barnes and Mrs. W. M. Barnes. They came here from Camp Dix, N. J., where the sergeant has been stationed since his arrival from overseas on the Queen Mary, August 2. He will report at Camp Dix upon completion of a 30-day furlough.

The former Ciscoan served 17 months in Europe and has the European theater ribbon, five battle stars with oak leaf clusters, the good conduct medal and a presidential citation. He served with the 313th fighter squadron and the 50th fighter group of the 12th air force.

Sergeant Barnes, 27, was born in Cisco, is a graduate of Cisco high school and John Tarleton college and played football here for several years. His wife was Ann Ritz of Alpha, N. J., whom he was married three years ago at Orlando, Fla. This was his first visit home in three years.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—Two men who between them have made more baseball history than any dozen other men, lined up side by side last night and presented a pretty solid argument, both physically and morally, for big league sponsorship of youth's diamond training.

Babe Ruth and Ty Cobb admitted first off that in their playing days their relations were slightly less than cordial — they despised each other's vices because both were loaded with the killer instinct and they played the game for keeps.

But now the Bambino's big battles on the rack forevermore; the Georgia Peach's flying spikes are rusting in the trophy room and in their mellowing years these two greatest stars the game has ever known are looking back to their own beginning — when they were kids.

Because they themselves know the longing that takes hold of a boy's heart when he wants to become a ballplayer, they will be the rival managers in an all-star game between two teams of kids under 18 to be played at the Polo Grounds Aug. 28. Ruth will direct the boys from east of the Mississippi and Cobb, the Rocky Mountain rancher, the Westerners.

The magazine Esquire is backing the game and through the offices of its sports editor, Joe Hendrickson, Ruth and Cobb were brought together to state their views on boys' baseball.

"I have always enjoyed the best relations with baseball — players, officials and owners," said Cobb, who at 58 has taken on the appearance of a well preserved, dignified businessman. "But it was one of the most stunning disappointments of my life to find, after careful investigation, that organized baseball today is doing almost nothing to promote the development of youth in the game."

The massive Ruth, who has been on record for several weeks with his blast at baseball moguls for neglecting youth, restated his case and vowed determination to do everything in his power to correct the situation.

"When you have autographed as many balls as I have you get to appreciate that pop-eyed look in a kid's eye when he sees and shakes hands with a star," said the battling behemoth. "Heck, I'm just a southpaw pitcher who went wrong and switched to the outfield, but to boys all over the country I am a hero, and don't think I won't appreciate it to the end of my days."

WAR DEPARTMENT, Bureau of Public Relations.—Entirely by accident, Sgt. Jimmie Whitehead of Cisco, Texas, took part in one of the most dramatic incidents of the entire war in Europe, the seizure of the Ludendorff bridge at Remagen which sealed the doom of the Nazis.

The 19-year-old platoon guide revealed the story upon his recent return to the United States with the famous 28th Infantry Division, with which he served in three campaigns during his seven months overseas.

Sergeant Whitehead's wife, Mrs. Shirley Glynn Whitehead, lives on route one, Gladewater, Texas. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Belton Whitehead of 1609 F avenue, Cisco.

The young Texas Doughboy arrived in Europe as one of a number of reinforcement troops, all of them dispatched to join the 9th Infantry Division. Assuming that the Texas was to go to the same outfit, a friendly jeep driver took him to that outfit's area just in time to get on the thrilling early days of the bridgehead seizure.

In fact, he related, he crossed the bridge while it was being shelled furiously by the enemy.

It was nearly three days later that he found out he didn't belong with the 9th division and was dispatched to join the "Keystone" division.

Sergeant Whitehead is one of three infantryman brothers. The others are Corp. F. B. Whitehead, recently from Europe with the 88th "Blackhawk" division, and Corporal Joe Whitehead, now at Camp Fannin, Texas.

In addition to his three campaign stars, Whitehead wears the combat infantryman badge, awarded for exemplary conduct in action against the enemy.

QUOTAS END IN OCTOBER. WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The Petroleum Administration for War, recommending a 2,144,000 barrel September daily production rate of all petroleum liquids for Texas, said it would recommend production rates to states through October.

Thereafter, said the agency, state regulatory bodies will have had time to reestablish their normal peace-time channels of demand forecast.

NAME UNDEFEATED WAR LORD FOR WAR MINISTER AND CALL EXTRAORDINARY DIET SESSION

Peyton Says Rotary Encourages and Inspires Men

Charles S. Peyton, Rotary district governor from Cleburne, talked to the Cisco club today, saying Hitler complimented Rotary when he drove it out of Germany, because it showed that its principles were contrary to the kind of ideals the little fuhrer wanted to enforce upon his people.

The governor was introduced by President W. W. Fewell, after calling for the attendance record from J. E. Hays. It was brought out that after 13 perfect attendance meetings, the club has had two members absent during August.

Governor Peyton said most of his talks had been made on the subject of "How to Win the War," and now that the strife had ceased, he found himself without a speech. He said when he looked about for his friends who had

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.—Japan prepared for Allied occupation today by naming an undefeated warlord as war minister, calling an extraordinary session of parliament to meet two days after formal surrender, and displaying a sudden outpouring of mercy.

The Diet was called into emergency two-day session for Sept. 2 to drive "home to the nation the stark reality that Japan has been completely defeated" and begin "the Herculean task of rebuilding Japan."

Tokyo's supreme war council was enlarged and reconstituted as a "conference on termination of the war."

Prince Naruhiko Higashi-Kuni gave up the war portfolio to Gen. Sadamu Shimomura, Nipponese supreme commander in North China, currently the most troubled spot in the Pacific. Shimomura's forces presumably were among the 1,000,000 Japanese whose surrender is called for in preliminary negotiations with the Chinese field commander.

Tokyo's sympathy went out to 10,000,000 purported victims of American incendiary, explosive and atom bombs. The government asked permission to send relief expeditions to sick and dying prisoners on by-passed islands. In return it promised aid to 32,000 Allied prisoners in Nippon and said they would be started toward embarkation ports Friday.

Tokyo told 1,200,000 Nipponese in Korea and Formosa to stay where they are and "earnestly work for peace." Japanese also expressed concern about possible civil war in turbulent China, scene of the greatest confusion in surrender plans.

All of this was incident to hurried preparations for Allied occupation of Japan and the signing of surrender documents Aug. 31 on the 45,000 ton battleship Missouri in Tokyo bay, which the Domei news agency said would naturally be accompanied by "feelings of hate and uneasiness."

The Japanese will have another display of American air power Sunday (by Japanese account) or Tuesday (by General MacArthur's report) when the greatest armada of air transports ever assembled begins unloading thousands of U. S. troops in full combat array on Atsugi airfield, 20 miles from Tokyo.

MacArthur confirmed previously Tokyo reports that he would arrive at the airfield Tuesday with airborne forces, simultaneous with the landing of Marines and sailors at the Yokosuka naval base guarding the entrance to Tokyo bay.

The sea approaches to Tokyo will swarm with the massed naval might of the combined American Third and Fifth fleets and British Pacific fleets. These forces put on a 1,000 plane aerial acrobatic show off the Honshu coast to pass time yesterday.

MacArthur indicated that mine-sweeping Allied forces also may promptly be clearing both Japanese and Allied mines out of such major oriental harbors as Osaka, Sasebo, Nagasaki, Shanghai, Canton, Hong Kong and Singapore. Japanese shipping and air forces were ordered immobilized, anti-aircraft guns decommissioned, ammunition stored.

Japanese troops were already evacuating the initial occupation area near Tokyo, into which Domei said 50,000 to 60,000 Allied soldiers will move.

TO FREE 100-OCTANE.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The Petroleum Administration for War has recommended the termination of all military contracts for 100-octane gasoline with a provision for a tapering-off period of not more than 30 days.

Tricky Yellow Men Got Everything U. S. Air Force Had

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.—Nearly 10,000,000 persons, a sixth of the population of Japan's home islands, were killed, wounded or made homeless "as a result of enemy air raids during the course of the war in greater East Asia," the Tokyo radio said today.

The broadcast, quoting figures thus far available at air defense headquarters, said the two atom bombs dropped on the homeland killed 90,000 and injured 180,000. The total killed was set at 260,000; injured 412,000; rendered homeless, 9,200,000.

The broadcast said 2,200,000 houses were completely demolished or burned to the ground, and 90,000 were partially damaged.

"These figures are still incomplete and are likely to mount as further investigation is made," the broadcast said. "Almost the entire Japanese mainland received heavy damage as the result of enemy air attacks."

Britain, which was under Nazi air attack for more than five years suffered but 116,760 casualties from bombings and V-weapons.

Federal Farm Officials Fearful of a Land Boom

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Peace has revived concern among federal farm officials and agricultural leaders over the possibility of another postwar land boom. The one that followed World War I brought ruin to thousands of farmers who went deeply into debt.

World War II, with its unprecedented demand for food, already has caused a sharp advance in land values. The Agriculture department reports that land prices average 57 percent higher than in the 1935-39 period and only 29 percent below the peak reached in 1920 after World War I.

And officials expect a sharply increase demand for farms from returning war veterans and workers laid off war jobs.

Since early in the war, proposals have been advanced to prevent an undue rise in farm prices, but as yet no action has been taken. Former Secretary of Agriculture Wickard urged enactment of a capital gain tax designed to prevent speculative buying and selling of land.

Last War Loan Drive Will Be For 11 Billion

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Starting date of the eighth and last war loan drive is Oct. 29.

This will be a "victory loan" of \$11,000,000,000, of which the government wants \$4,000,000,000 to come from individuals, half in "E" bonds.

Secretary of the Treasury Vinson, in announcing the loan last night, said: "The cost of contract settlements, bringing our forces home, their mustering out pay, hospitalization, care and rehabilitation will be great and will require large sums for which we must plan now."

POLIO CASES INCREASE.

FT. WORTH, Aug. 23.—Positive polio cases have risen to 72, with the admittance of four new verified victims. Four possible cases are under observation. The third polio death was recorded yesterday.

Army Offers 252 War Plants to U. S. Industrialists

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The Army offered 252 war plants to industry today. Those plants could make a lot of civilian goods and plenty of civilian jobs.

By declaring the government-owned plants surplus — no longer needed for tanks, radar, airplane engines and shells — the Army thus provided a \$1,500,000,000 contribution toward the government's goal of full employment.

Under white house pressure for speedy disposal, the Reconstruction finance corporation prepared to go all out in pushing their sale or lease to private manufacturers. The \$1,500,000,000 figure is what the plants cost to build — they'll undoubtedly go much cheaper.

It was the biggest offering to date of potential capacity to fill the country's pent-up demands for goods.

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BULWINKLE BILL IS OK.

Before the Interstate Commerce commission was created by congress in 1887, railroads were under no control except such as some of the states exercised in prescribing rates for passenger fares, and other regulations, which applied wholly within the state making such laws. In transportation from one state to another the matter of freight charges was wholly within the determination of the railroads, and as a result there was great inequality, big shippers getting rate concessions, rebates and other favors that kept the little fellow at a disadvantage.

The ICC was established to remedy this condition, and it was followed by many states which created their own commissions for government of the roads within the state. These commissions, both federal and state, prescribe rates for passenger and merchandise transportation and railroads.

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members; prescribing their qualification; and providing for their election, tenure of office and compensation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Article 5, Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; provided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court to hear argument of causes and to consider applications for writs of error or other preliminary matters. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty-five years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer, or a lawyer and judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by the qualified voters of the state at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified; and shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of any Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for state officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the state. The Justices of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified."

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1945, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members," and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

and motor and water carriers are required by law to abide by them. The carriers do nothing without the approval of the commission under which they are operating.

Then, three years later, congress enacted what is known as the Sherman Act, declaring unlawful, and providing penalties for combinations in restraint of trade and commerce, both domestic and foreign - what is commonly known as the anti-trust law, and one that was necessary because of the agreements between great corporations relating to production, distribution and prices of their products. These combinations were squeezing the little fellow, just as some of the railroads had done before the ICC was created to protect him and put him on the same footing as the big fellow.

In complying with orders of the ICC the railroads found it necessary to create rating bureaus, which after consultation by representatives of each road concerned agreed on rates applicable to various classes of shipments - and these rates had to be approved by the ICC before they would be effective. The railroads, and motor carriers, have found it advisable to consult with each other on matters of mutual interest, and whatever they agree on has to be approved by the ICC.

In effect, the Department of Justice is attempting to take over the functions of the ICC, though the congress has declared a policy on National transportation which clearly contemplates that the ICC shall permit or refuse any and all proposed practices of the transportation companies.

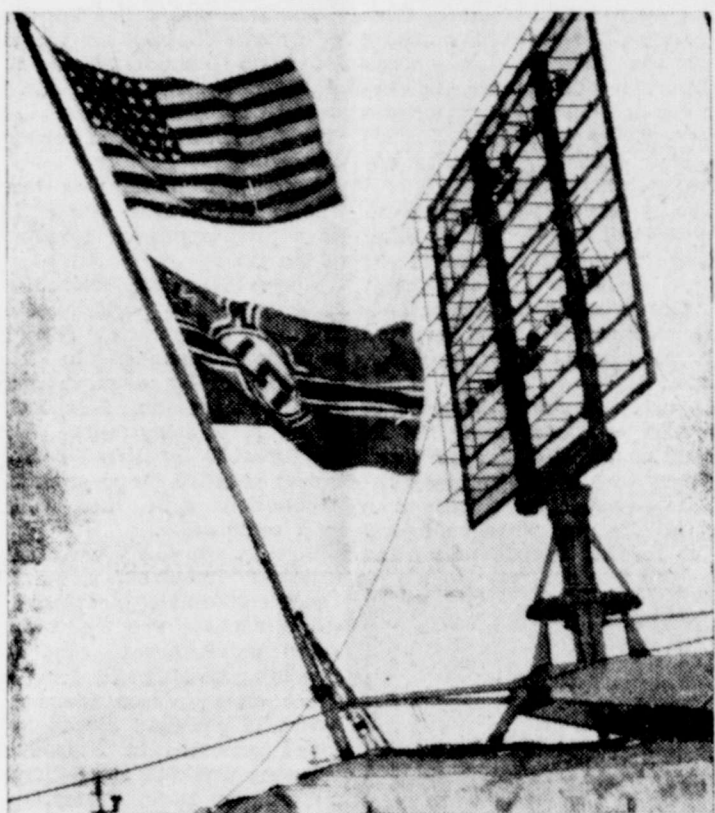
So troublesome has this situation become that Representative Bulwinkle of North Carolina, has introduced a bill to clarify the confusion, and to put the transportation service clear of charges of violating the Sherman Act, if and when the transportation practices are approved by the ICC. That bill should be enacted.

HOW?

Q. How can I drive a nail into plaster, without marring the wall?

Q. How can I bleach a scorched spot?

A. Rub the spot immediately with a cloth dipped in diluted peroxide. Then run the iron over it and it will be as white as original.
