

Hospital district calls board election

The Mitchell County Hospital Board of directors Tuesday ordered an election for April 6 to fill four expiring terms on the board and board president Bobby Lemons and board member Herbert Mearse said they will not seek re-election.

The two other expiring terms are currently held by Preston Morris who said he is undecided about seeking re-election and by Glenn Hemphill who was absent.

Colorado City resident Lee Woods was at the meeting and said he will definitely be seeking election to the board. Gus Armstrong and Rhonda Slater each requested petitions but said they are undecided about running for office.

Persons wishing to seek election to the board have until March 12 to present their petition to have their name placed on the ballot. The drawing for placing of names on the ballot will be held March 13 at 10 a.m.

Absentee voting will begin March 15 and end April 2. A called meeting of the board will be held on April 8 to canvass votes, administer oaths of office and elect officers for the new year.

In other business Tuesday, assistant hospital administrator Richard Murphy presented the financial and statistical reports for Root Memorial Hospital and for Root Valley Fair Lodge.

Murphy said that for the four months ending Jan. 31, inpatient services revenues remain under

budget by \$216,496 and that January's revenues were \$22,876 under budget. The first three months averaged \$64,540 each under budget with January's revenues reflecting an increase of \$41,664 over prior months' revenues.

Murphy further stated that total operating revenues are \$202,249 under budget, a 25 percent reduction. Admissions are 302 patients below the projection of 580 admissions, which is 52 percent under target. He

projected that February is reflecting an increase similar to January's gain but that March may reflect no gain or loss, but rather stay in line with January and February.

Operating expenses remain under budget by \$153,760 and January's expenses fell below budget by \$27,933 overall, said Murphy. The four months of expense reflect labor 6.3 percent under, supplies, 25.1 percent under and other expenses 24.8 percent under for an overall 14.6

under budget.

Murphy noted that operating expenses per patient per day continues to exceed budget due to the reduction of patient load and that the average cost per patient per day is \$514.49. He projected February's cost of operations will continue to fall below budget by about \$30,000 and that March, April and May will begin to reflect the savings generated by labor reductions

City hires architect to design fire station

The city council of Colorado City voted to hire Don Hampton of Sweetwater to design the new fire station to be built on 11th Street, east of the old junior high school.

Hampton was not present for the Tuesday night called council meeting but is expected to begin work on preliminary plans at once.

Hampton was recommended by City Manager Brenda Tarter, and was also approved by Fire Chief Brian Bassham.

The council voted to build a sewer lift station at the intersection of 15th and Monticello streets to help solve the city's sewer problem in that area. The city will pay half, \$4,000, and developers of Monticello Addition are expected to pay a like amount. Mrs. Tarter said that the city has the money in its budget for capital improvement to pay the \$4,000.

In a matter involving sewers, the council approved an ordinance stating that the city will no longer be responsible for damages caused by sewer backups. Mrs. Tarter said that insurance companies will begin refusing to reimburse the city or the sewer customer for such damages. City Attorney Marcia Denny said that the city is immune to damages from such accidents.

The council voted to hire Freese and Nichols of Austin, consulting engineers, to do the engineering on the opening of 30 acres of new landfill space, and

the closing of 80 acres of used landfill area. The fee for Freese and Nichols will be "not to exceed \$51,000." There will be an additional fee of \$8,500 for geotechnical studies and \$3,000 for surveying.

Bud Hill of Loraine, owner of the mini-warehouses at Austin and 20th streets, asked the city to close part of Austin Street directly contingent to the warehouses. He suggested that Austin be turned into Hickory in a right angle turn just short of 20th Street. This might eliminate part of the plantings in an area alongside Austin, but would create another triangle in front of the mini-warehouses giving additional space for a new operation. Hill says he plans to build office space, where the first row of warehouses are located and the additional space will give him more parking area.

The council accepted the bid of Gene Moses of Abilene and Jerry Reid of Big Spring, representing Advanced Telephone Systems, to replace the present telephone system at city hall and the police department. The cost will be \$6,871, which may be paid in cash or by a lease purchase agreement. The system has a one year warranty and a service contract after that will cost \$343.55 annually.

Lt. Don Pennington of the Colorado City police department turned in a bill to the council for 1,898 hours of compensatory time. His statement says that this amount was accrued from

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Candidates are slow in filing

As of Tuesday, no one had filed to become a candidate for the Colorado City Council and only one candidate had filed for school board in the April 6 elections.

Colorado City voters will be deciding on four spots on the city council. Mayor Elmer Martin and council members Dee Hearn and Don Bennett have terms expiring, and the spot formerly occupied by Ray Mason is also up for election. All are two-year terms. Bennett has said he will not seek re-election.

Colorado Independent School District will have three board spots up for election this year. Dr. Billy Bridgford has already filed for re-election for a three-year term. The other three-year spot is presently occupied by Joe Kirschbaum. CISD voters will also fill the one-year term left vacant by the resignation of Dr. Pat Thomas.

In Loraine, three candidates have filed for four spots on the city council. Mayor Tommy Green has filed for re-election and

and purchasing agreements. Murphy said that the hospital's operating loss is \$48,489 over budget, which is an \$11,796 reduction in budget deficit which he attributed as a direct result of increase in revenues and additional reduction in expenses. The average loss per patient per day is \$170.16 and the calendar day loss averages \$2,423 per day. "Revenues are picking back up," said Murphy. "We can see a definite trend."

Murphy presented a chart which shows both expenses and revenues under budget. January's revenues were \$183,840 and the expenses were \$233,298.

Revenues had been budgeted at \$200,000 and expenses at about \$260,000. Total patient services revenues at Root Valley Fair Lodge remain just over budget by less than one percent, said Murphy. Total operating revenues are just under budget by less than one percent. Patient days are 58 over the project. Private pay patients average \$36.48 per day and welfare patients average \$29.87 per day. Calendar day revenues average \$1,508 compared to the budgeted amount of \$1,511.

In other business, the board accepted the recommendation of the medical staff to extend courtesy staff privileges twice a month to Dr. William D. Davis,

a urologist. Hospital administrator Ray Mason said a Medicare inspection team will be at the hospital March 13-14 and that he foresees no problems. He said he and the department heads will go over past inspection reports and make sure that all deficiencies have been corrected.

He said he is in the process of trying to hire a dietary consultant as well as someone for medical records and for physical therapy.

Mason further reported that Blue Cross has approved an increase in room rates and that other rate increases are pending. The new rates for rooms will be \$120, \$130 and \$140.

Mason said that Dr. Dee Roa-

ch has decided to finish his residency in Amarillo and won't be ready to start his practice here until after May of 1986. Mason said he will continue to try to recruit physicians for Colorado City.

Mason praised Ben Bell in the lab and purchasing agent Raymond Webb and X-ray department head J. W. Hicklin for their efforts in saving the hospital money on various expenses.

Mason reported that there were no complaints filed at the annual hearing at Root Valley Fair Lodge conducted by the state health department.

Board member Jane McCauley complimented the hospital staff for the cleanliness and orderly condition of the hospital.

For the Record

There are no headlines and the front page is mostly filled with advertisements from merchants, lawyers and one saloon keeper. The Saturday, Oct. 28, 1882 issue of "The West Texas Live-Stock and Commercial Clipper," which was the predecessor to the RECORD, consists of two pages and was the 18th issue to be printed in the newspaper's first year of existence.

Wilson Smith of Roscoe brought the two-page paper by the RECORD office Monday, explaining that the well-preserved item was found among the effects of his son-in-law's father who recently died in Las Cruces, N.M. Smith said it's not known why or how Ralph O'Neil came to have the paper, but O'Neil's son, Pete O'Neil of Dallas, gave the paper to Smith who in turn gave the paper to us at the RECORD.

The name "Mrs. J. Riorden" is written in ink above the masthead.

In 1882, Colorado City still without the "City" in its name, but the "Queen City of the West" as it was called in one news item was a bustling community. Most of the news of the day was concerned with what new stock had been received by various merchants in town.

One news item copied from the TOM GREEN TIMES said that the COLORADO CLIPPER "is an excellent sheet devoted to the interest of Western Texas, and is well edited by Mr. A.H.H. Tolar. The circulation of the paper is on the increase."

One advertisement boasted of a new hotel in town. The Renderbrook Hotel located at the corner of Walnut and Second streets was owned by Mrs. Wm. M. Dunn and managed by W. D. Stratton. "Building and furniture entirely new. Rooms large and well ventilated. Servants polite and attentive. The table unexcelled in Western Texas. For commercial men a large sample room on first floor is provided," the ad stated.

The Colorado Jockey Club was also in existence with races scheduled for Nov. 25-28 including a 500-yard race the first day with a \$400 purse and a pony race with a \$25 purse. The second day featured a half mile dash with a \$300 purse and the third day had three half-mile heats with a \$500 purse.

Quinn and Birdwell's Lone Wolf Saloon advertised old Scotch and Irish whiskies along with brandies, wines and cigars as well as a "first class billiard hall."

Geo. Major was advertising pure lake ice and the Looney and Solomon Land Agency had 150,000 acres of land for sale in Mitchell and adjoining counties.

The Mt. Blanco, Clarendon and Panhandle Weekly Stage Line was making connections at Mobila with stages for Fort Dodge, Kan. and the northwest; and Robert Mingus had 10,000 head of "good Merino Sheep" for sale or trade for cattle.

One advertisement touted Black Draught as the "best liver medicine in the world" while another ad claimed a fast cure for opium and morphine addiction.

Reading the 1882 issue of the CLIPPER reminds me of all the exciting things the Mitchell County Historical Commission has planned.

Commission members have set a number of goals, all of which are worthwhile and are aimed at helping preserve the rich and exciting history of Mitchell County.

However, the top priority of the Commission in the coming months will be to honor former Cong. and Mrs. George Mahon with some type of bronze plaque or sculpture to be located somewhere on the courthouse grounds. The Mahons spent many years in Washington, D.C. representing the citizens of this area and it is fitting that Mitchell County through the Historical Commission honors the Mahons who are making Colorado City their home.

Incumbents Frank Garcia and Danny Butler have filed for election to the Loraine Independent School District board of trustees. Persons wishing to seek election to the Mitchell County Hospital District board of directors have until March 12 to do so. The hospital board ordered the April 6 election at its Tuesday meeting. The terms of Glenn Hemphill, Bobby Lemons, Herbert Mearse and Preston Morris are expiring this year.

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Concerned about the growing deficit and its effect on the future of America, Congressman Charles Stenholm is co-sponsoring a resolution calling for the urgent reduction of the national debt.

The resolution, introduced by Congressman Jim Moody (D-Wisconsin), urges Congress to take appropriate action to curb the deficit. The concurrent resolution states that, according to reports by the Congressional Budget Office and the U.S.

Bureau of the Census, today's children and grandchildren will have to pay approximately \$3,000 per family each year in extra taxes to meet the interest of the national debt.

Other figures in the reports show that a young person about to enter the labor force will have to pay, over his or her lifetime, \$10,000 in extra taxes to cover the interest on this year's budget deficit alone.

"Economic projections like these bear the fact that we can no longer simply ignore the national deficit," said the Stamford Democrat. "As I've said time and time again, our children and grandchildren will pay dearly tomorrow, if we don't do something to correct this today."

This resolution is concurrent, which is not legally binding, but expresses the sentiment of both houses. It points out that unless the deficit is arrested, the next generation of Americans may never match or exceed the standard of living achieved by their parents and grandparents; and this debt may cause high interest rates, which discourage private investment, restrict job opportunities for young people and result in housing prices higher than many young people

can afford.

Also introduced in the Senate, the resolution dictates that the government should do four things. First, the federal government should manage the affairs of the nation in a more beneficial manner. Second, the deficit should be reduced in order to ease the long-term economic burden placed on future taxpayers. Third, the manner in which the budget is reduced should be fair to Americans of all ages. Finally, the president should report to Congress, no later than 180 days after the resolution's passage, a report concerning the effects of today's taxation and spending policies on the different age groups.

Congressman Stenholm said the report, which substantiates the need to reduce the deficit, also brought out some other startling statistics. The study revealed that during the past 15 years, the dream of owning a home has been facing for millions of young people. Since 1975, the cost of home ownership, adjusted for inflation, has more than doubled. Even five years before that, in 1970, families with incomes of 26 percent below the national median could afford to buy an average home. By 1983, only families with incomes of 29 percent above the median could afford one. Also during this time frame, the poverty rate among children and young people rose at an incredible rate.

Saturn campaign started

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The Texas Congressional delegation made its initial move Monday, in a campaign organized by Senator Lloyd Bentsen, to persuade General Motors to build its new Saturn automobile plant in Texas.

All 29 members of the delegation joined in signing identical letters to Roger Smith, Chairman of the General Motors board, and William Hoglund, President of Saturn, a GM subsidiary.

"We want to take this opportunity to inform you of our strong support for the candidacies of several Texas cities to be the site of the new Saturn manufacturing plant and to impress on you the significant

opportunities that await GM and Saturn in our state," Bentsen and the other Texans said in the letters.

"The letters noted that Texans are 'by nature innovative' and are 'willing to take on difficult challenges.' They pointed to a favorable business climate in the state, saying 'Texas is and will remain one of the lowest tax states in the U.S.'"

"With our 11 engineering schools in Texas producing 4,700 bachelors of science, 900 masters level and 150 doctoral engineers each year, we offer an incomparable wealth of engineering talent and an ample supply. In addition, over the past several years skilled workers have relocated to Texas

from other areas from across the nation, increasing the pool of skilled workers available to Saturn."

Ninety-seven Texas cities are competing for selection as the new plant site. Members of the delegation assured the automobile executives that each of the cities "meets and exceeds the criteria established by the management of Saturn" in describing the type of area in which it wishes to locate.

"We heartily endorse and support the candidacies of the potential Texas sites and hope that in your deliberations you will agree that Texas presents the greatest opportunities for success and profit from the new Saturn venture," Bentsen said.

B. N. Gross explained that the three elements are the foot, the meter and the rhyme scheme.

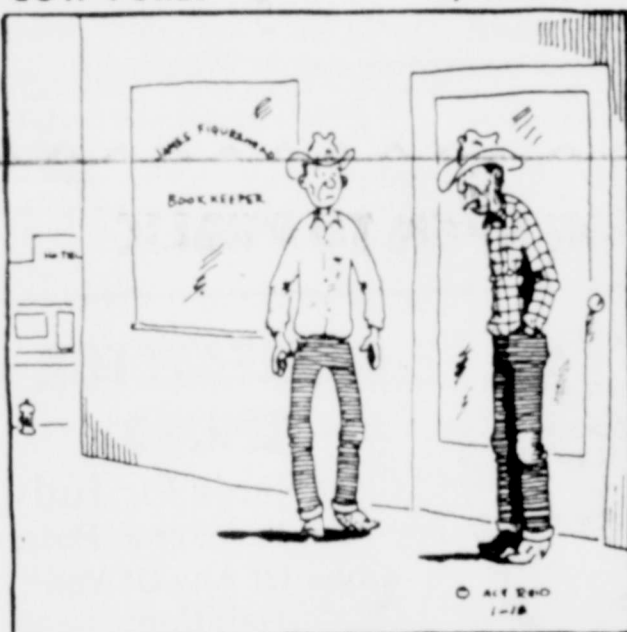
Mattie (Fuller) Trantham reviewed the iambic, trochee, anapest, and dactyl (feet).
