City Manager Bob Sokoll has announced that arrangements have been made to have Dr. Byrd, a veterinarian from Lubbock, to be at the Abernathy City Hall Tuesday May 10th between 4:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. to vaccinate dogs for rabies.

City Officials will be on hand to issue 1966 dog tags. Ordinance No. 85 provides that every dog owner or keeper residing within the City Limits shall pay an annual tax of \$2.00 for each male dog and \$3.00 for each female dog. No dog tags can be issued until dogs have been vaccinated for rabies.

All dog owners are urged to bring their dogs in the City Hall to have them vaccinated and to purchase the required tags.

Polls in Hale County and Lamb County open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Polls in Lubbock County open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Vote early in the day. It will be helpful to those conducting the elec-

tions.

One of this area's most popular after dinner speakers will address the group. He is the Rev. Kenneth Wyatt, pastor of the First Methodist Church at Paducah.

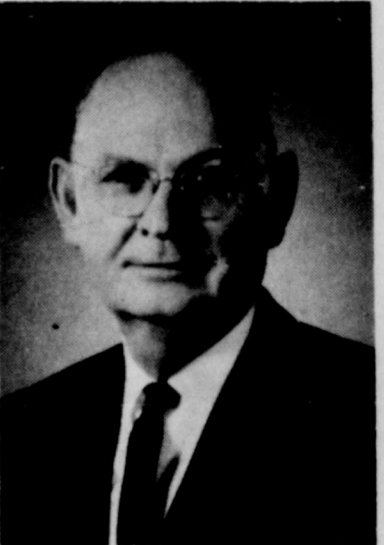
All stockholders and their families are urged to attend, Phillips said.

Abernathy Is Seeking Re-Election



JUDGE ABERNATHY

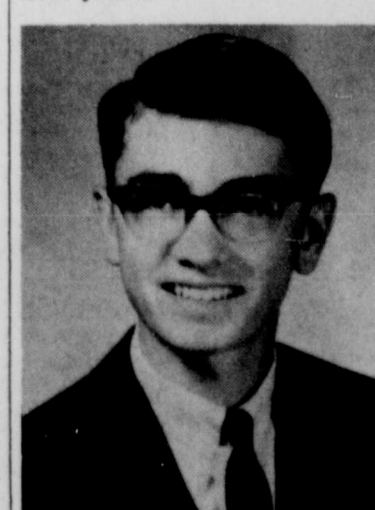
Hale County Judge C. L. Abernathy, now running for reelection, recently outlined some of the duties and responsibilities of his office. As chief administrative officer of the County, Judge Abernathy presides over the County Commissioners Court, where all fiscal and business problems of the County are handled. In addition, he presides in County Court, Juvenile Court and Probate Court. The number of cases in each of these Courts is steadily increasing. In 1965 Judge Abernathy handled over 1000 criminal cases of adults and over 200 cases where juveniles were involved. Several hundred estate and guardianship cases were handled in Probate Court, along with a large number of cases of mental illness and mental retardation.

The work being done with juveniles in Hale County, under the direction of Judge Abernathy, has gained favorable recognition, statewide. As a result of his work in the field of mental health, special awards have been given him by the Texas Association for Mental Health and the Texas Social Welfare Association. The Texas Legislature, in 1965, honored Judge Abernathy by passage of its Resolution, H.S.R. 312, commending him for his work while Chairman of a Statewide Planning Committee, leading to passage of the law setting up the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

Mike Skipper has been named Valedictorian and Miss Donna Skeen as Salutatorian of the Class of 1966, it was announced by Curtis Davenport, AHS Principal. Date of the Baccalaureate ceremonies for the Class is May 22, with Commencement exercises to be held Monday, May 23.

Skipper is the 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy F. Skipper. His ranking at the top of the class was determined on a 4-year grade average during his attendance at AHS. Skipper's average was 96.47 for the four years.

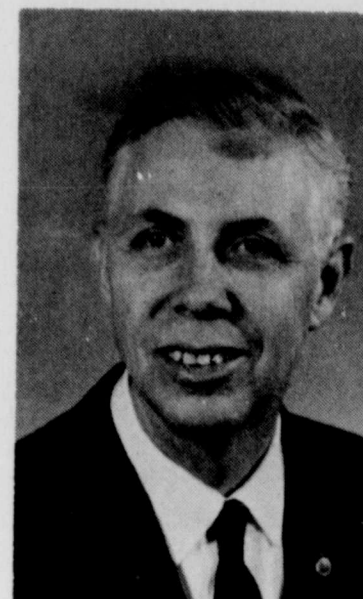
NEWS BRIEFS
