GREETINGS:

Throughout the United States, National Newspaper Week will be observed for the 22nd time October 15-21. Theme for this year's observance is "Your Newspaper: Heritage of Truth, Frontier of Freedom."

This is an appropriate reminder of the fact that a free press is one of the foundation stones of American democracy. The free flow of information to the public is essential to the preservation of our American way of life, yet this privilege is too often taken for granted by a people accustomed to individual freedom. When our forefathers guaranteed the right of Americans to own and control a printing press without government subservience, they assured us a right often denied people of other countries.

It is a right we must preserve and protect.

Our free American press stands today not only as the guardian of our freedom, but also as a shield against our own complacency and indifference.

Texas newspapers and newspapermen have consistently shown recognition of the great obligations and responsibilities which go with freedom of the press.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of October 15 - 21, 1961, as **NEWSPAPER WEEK** in Texas, and urge due recognition by all citizens of the contributions of a free press.

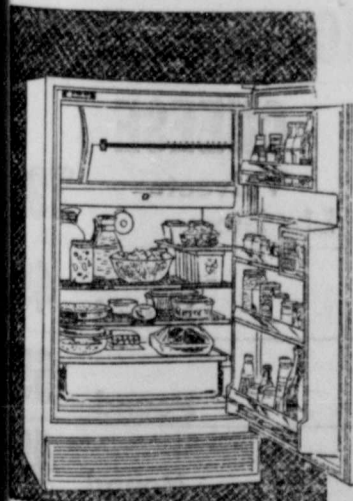

This beautiful, well dressed, and be-diamonded woman was found murdered near Jefferson only a few days after her marriage to a Rothschild.

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Year-round colleges, less work for the Attorney General and more realistic election laws could result from studies being undertaken by the Texas Legislative Council.

The Council, the Legislature's research arm, agreed to undertake eleven studies during the coming year. A total of 25 were proposed. List was trimmed down because there just isn't enough time or money to study them all.

Subjects selected for study include:

Election Code Revision.

Space Utilization by Institutions of Higher Education.

Coordination of Health and Welfare Service of the State.

Non-constitutional Duties of the Attorney General.

Opinion Authority of the Attorney General.

Laws Based on Population Classification.

State Hospitals and Special Schools.

Texas Utility Regulations.

Discrimination in Employment Because of Age.

Mentally Ill Children.

Health, Accident and Hospitalization Insurance Claims.

Findings will go to the 1963 session of the Legislature for the lawmakers' consideration.

TAX ATTACKED

Three gas pipeline companies brought suit in Austin to try to knock out the new tax on production of gas under dedicated-reserve contracts.

This is merely a token tax, designed to find out whether this new approach to the taxing of natural gas is constitutional. Suit was expected.

Two previous efforts to levy an additional tax on gas have been knocked out by the courts. Rep. Robert C. Eckhardt, Houston, devised this new method and believes it is valid despite some amendments he opposed on the grounds that they would weaken the chance of standing up in court.

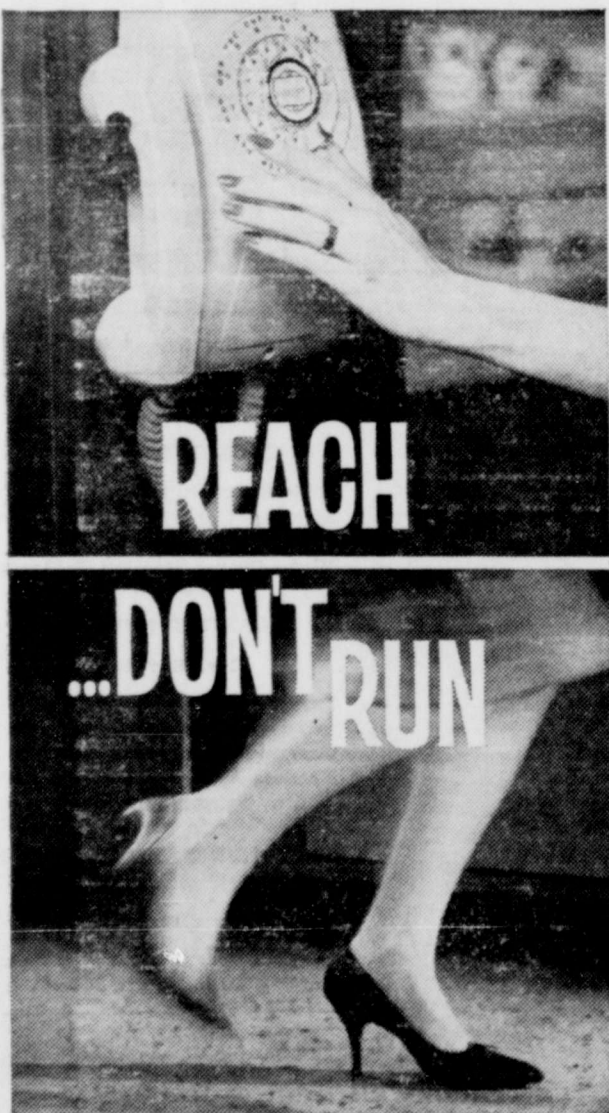
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Clementine Wilmeth Briley Writes from Temporary Home In El Paso

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Three members of the House of Representatives and two state senators were named by Sen. Bruce A. Reagan of Corpus Christi as a Subject Matter Committee to determine which of 25 suggested interim studies shall be made by the Texas Legislative Council.

Reagan is President pro-tem of the Senate and presided at the first meeting of the new Legislative Council. He and Sen. James A. Turman, Speaker of the House of Representatives, are ex-officio members of the Subject Matter Committee. Turman is chairman; Reagan vice chairman.

Designated membership on the committee were Senators Preston Smith of Lubbock and George Moffett of Chillicothe. House members appointed were Representatives C. W. Pearcy of Temple; Sam Collins of Newton; and Alonzo Jamison of Denton.

During the three 1961 sessions of the Legislature, 25 resolutions were passed, calling for special studies by the council. Of these 25, twelve were concurrent resolutions approved by both House and Senate. The remaining 13 originated in the House.

Among the 25 topics under consideration for special study were:

FM ROAD BUILDING PLAN

State Highway Chairman Herbert Petry Jr. of Carrizo Springs completed one major assignment for Gov. Price Daniel, but has a tougher one ahead.

Petry and Daniel worked out agreement with the Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association under which the farm-to-market road building program will be modified, along lines long advocated by the Texas Good Roads Association and the Highway Commission.

But now the plan has to be sold to the powerful Texas Farm Bureau at its convention in Galveston November 13-15. Governor Daniel vetoed the \$15,000,000 appropriation for

farm-to-market road construction from general revenue for the year starting next September 1, saying it was time to settle the question of rural road maintenance. He got together a committee of road-minded people.

County Judges and Commissioners agreed to this plan—pay for about \$17,000,000 of the present \$18,000,000 cost of maintaining rural roads out of the \$50,000,000 now going to FM road construction. They also agreed to build a total of 50,000 miles of FM roads, instead of the 35,000 miles now set as unofficial goal. Present mileage—34,000.

COURT OPENS

Appellate courts opened their fall terms, handing down dozens of decisions.

Key case of great importance was decision in suit of Key Western Insurance Co. of Abilene against the Board of Insurance, from both insurance and legal points of view.

Here the Supreme Court upheld a new requirement that appeals from decisions of the Board of Insurance on approvals of life insurance policies must be tried "de novo" or "anew" rather than accepting the old rule that an administrative agency is to be upheld if its decision was not arbitrary or capricious.

Of major importance also was award of \$139,250 to the City of Graham for damage done its sewage treatment plant by backing up of water of the Brazos River Authority's Possum Kingdom Dam. Case goes back for retrial of whether Graham can collect for damage to its water plant.

PADRE STUDY

Gov. Price Daniel got together

er his special committee to study the idea advanced by Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler to make Padre Island a state park instead of a national seashore area.

Sadler, a member of the committee, did not get word about the meeting and was not present.

State Parks Board Chairman J. Carter King of Albany, said the whole appropriation of the board for the next two years would not scratch the surface of making Padre into a state seashore area. King is worried about the 74 presently designated state parks.

Daniel asked the study committee to have a recommendation ready in time for the winter session of the Legislature to take policy action on the state

vs. federal issue. Daniel feels Padre should be dedicated as a public area, by one means or another.

ORPHAN'S RANCH

Orphans at the Corsicana State Home got a 4,180-acre ranch on the Lampasas River under a Supreme Court decision on the will of the late Mrs. Parrie Haynes of Bell County.

Other heirs contested, but the court turned the ranch to the Texas Youth Council, which runs the orphans' home. Atty. Gen. Will Wilson, who handled the defense of the will, said there is talk of making the ranch an outdoor branch of the Corsicana school.

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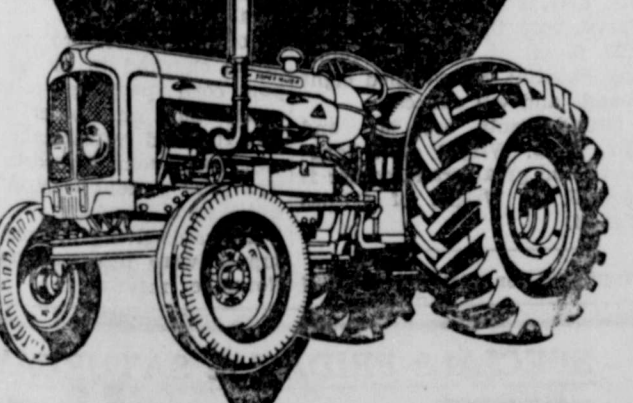
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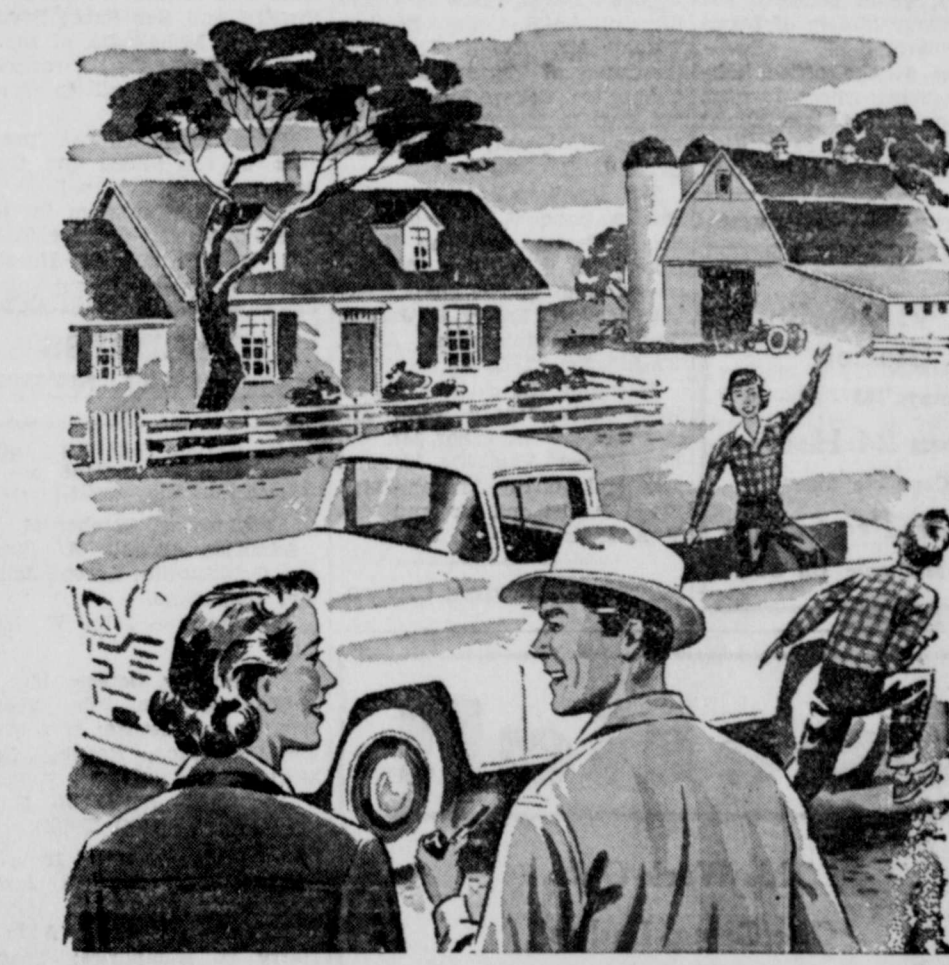
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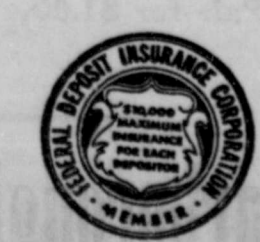
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1962 Wheat Program

The County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee has released information concerning wheat acreage allotments on the farms in this county.

In this statement, the committee chairman, E. L. Burkett, said that the acreage indicated on the allotment notices, mailed to growers before the August 24th referendum, is the 1962 wheat acreage allotment for ALL purposes.

In some sections of the county, apparently this is causing some confusion, Mr. Burkett said.

The allotment figures reflect the 10-per cent minimum diversion required by law for participation in the 1961 wheat program. And, he said, it is also the figure to be used to determine whether or not there is a marketing quota excess on the farm. If the planted acreage exceeds the allotment — or permitted acreage in the case of small farms, then the excess 1962-crop wheat from the farm will be subject to marketing quota penalties. And higher penalties were set by the 87th Congress.

Commenting on this facet of the county's agricultural operations, Mr. Burkett emphasized that personnel in the County ASCS office are prepared to explain fully all the details to farmers. He urged all Mills County wheat farmers to come into the county office for more details.

E. L. Burkett, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, issued a statement September 27, which concerns the wheat acreage history of farms in this county.

Inquiries at the office indicate that some wheat farmers think they would lose wheat acreage history and be entitled to smaller farm allotments in

the future if they divert more than the required 10 per cent of their wheat acreage under the 1962 wheat stabilization program.

The Chairman emphasized that this is not the case. He said that the program provides that full acreage history credit be given wheat farmers on all acreage they divert under the program. And this full history credit will apply in the establishment of all future farm, county, and State wheat allotments.

The Mills County U. S. Department of Agriculture official pointed out that the same kind of provision is now in force on farms retired under the Conservation Reserve and Great Plains programs.
