Wheeler County Receives Bicentennial Saturday Flag

Wheeler County received the National Bicentennial flag in ceremonies on the lawn of the county courthouse Saturday, Nov. 16, 1974. The flag presented by Don Easley of Lubbock to County Judge Kent Sims was raised with the American flag by members of Wheeler and Kelton Troops. Also presented were American Revolution Bicentennial Certificates to County Bicentennial Committee, County Judge, the mayors of Wheeler, Mobeetie and Shamrock. Certificates were presented by Jim Thomas of Amarillo, representing the American Bicentennial Commission of Texas. The certificates were received by Mayor Calvin Stuart of Wheeler, Mayor Seibert of Shamrock, Mayor Harrison Hall of Wheeler, Wheeler County Bicentennial Committee chairperson, and County Judge Kent Sims.

The national certificate for the flag was presented by Don Easley, former editor of the Wheeler Times and presently District Director of Housing and Urban Development in Lubbock. He presented the presentation as a personal representative of President Ford and extended President's personal greetings and good wishes to Wheeler County people for their Bicentennial project. Mr. Hall presided at the ceremony which was made possible through the cooperation and hard work of a committee from over the county. The members of executive committee are: recognized; they are Clyde Whittle of Shamrock, vice-chairperson; Mrs. Gold Williams of Shamrock, secretary; Mrs. Ray Briscoe, treasurer; Lowell Lasley of Wheeler, Publicity chairman; Dean Johnson of Kelton, festival chairman; Mr. Harris, Heritage chairman and Ernest Henderson of Twitty, horizons chairman.

In his speech, Hall recollected his school days when school would let out on Veterans Day, Nov. 11, for the raising of the flag over the Courthouse. He further commented that it was his duty to list the good and the bad points of this country the list of accomplishments and achievements would be endless.

The ceremony was very enjoyable and the Wheeler County Bicentennial Committee is to be commended for their work in making Wheeler the 36th Bicentennial Community in Texas.

MUSTANGS ROLL OVER SILVERTON OWLS 19-0

Silverton became the Wheeler Mustangs sixth victim of the year last Friday night and the 19-0 domination of the Owls gave Wheeler a second place tie with the Wellington Skyrockets in the final district standings.

If the Owls thought that they could do the same to the Mustangs that they did to the Shamrock Irish the week before, those thoughts were quickly dispelled when the Mustangs took a 7-0 lead on the cold night before the game was three minutes old.

The five Mustang seniors went out on a winning note and were stalwarts in the season ending game that gave the Mustangs a 6-4 record.

Seniors Kent Ware and Don Chapman both scored touchdowns and even the Mustangs JV got into the act with a scoring toss from freshman quarterback Bobby Guthrie to Tony Hefley, another first year man for the Mustangs.

Chapman recovered a fumble at the Owl 21 on the first play of the game and from there it was all downhill although the Mustangs saw several scoring chances blown with fumbles.

The Mustangs fumbled a yearly high of nine times in the game and coughed the ball up to the Owls on four of these miscues.

Ware needed 67 yards to go over the 1000 yard mark for the year and the hard running tailback responded with 163 yards for the night and got 20 of them after Chapman recovered the fumble.

It took the Mustangs seven plays to score their first touchdown and Ware rambed with ball six of the plays and scored from the 1 over left guard. Verden's kick made it 7-0 at 9:04. The Owls made only one threat of consequence in the game and this was after the Mustangs had taken their quick lead but this threat was snuffed out at the Wheeler 20.

A short 8 yard boot that traveled out to the Owl 33 on the last play of the first quarter set up the black and gold for their second TD.

On fourth down at the 25, Don Brown circled his right flank on a keeper for 16 yards to the Owl 9 where he was knocked out of bounds.

Turning to the other end, Brown ran the option to perfection and pitched to Chapman who romped over untouched.

The Mustangs were a little slow getting the extra point try off following Chapman's run and the Owls partially blocked Verden's try and the score remained 13-0.

Wheeler used the inside kick twice in the game and both worked with Ware on the recovery each time.

The first came right after second touchdown but the Mustangs blew the opportunity when Ware lost his second fumble of the night at the Silverton 19.

Keeping the pressure on the Owls, the Mustangs weren't in danger of losing

the game but putting the ball on the ground was about all that kept the score respectable from the Owls viewpoint.

An interception by Ware at the Silverton 45 and run-back to the 29 was the signal for the subs to take over with a little over two minutes to play.

BUS CONFERENCE IN DECEMBER
