PAYMENT OF POLL TAXES LAGGING

Less Than 50 Per Cent Paid; Total in 1937 Was 530—Deadline Monday, 31

Payment of poll tax in Terrell, this year, is lagging far behind preceding "election years," according to officials, and the fact that up to noon Thursday only 229 receipts had been issued, bears this statement.

Alert, civic-minded citizens need no reminder that poll tax must be paid before midnight, January 31—AND THERE ARE ONLY TEN DAYS LEFT! Realizing that this is a day in which a mere existence is maintained only through hustle and a strict adherence to business, and that time slips by all too fast, the small item of paying poll tax is sometimes overlooked, unintentionally.

In 1938 the electorate of Texas will have an opportunity to elect from the Governor to the Constable. But the little matter of failing to obtain a poll tax receipt will disfranchise the person from voting during 1938—scheduled and special.

Terrell Completes 1937 Range Soil Program: Ranchers Due About \$45,000

The terracing program carried out by Terrell county ranchers under the government range program has been completed, according to Ernest Williams, county agent. This work was started in October and finished in December, being done under nearly every soil and topographical condition prevailing in the county. Approximately 16,000 acres were protected with spreader dams and terraces and ridges.

With information and experimental data on such work unavailable, it is easy to understand that mistakes could not be entirely avoided. However, most of the ranchers realized this. Rains, both slow and hard, fell during and after the work was completed and caused breaks in the terraces of a minor nature. According to Mr. Williams, most of the breaks occurred where the terraces crossed a ditch or an old road. In such places the machines used in the work cannot

throw the dirt as high as it does on each side. Also, there is more strain from the water at these places, and hand work is necessary.

Terrell county has thousands of acres of land on which only burro grass and blackbrush grow. Ranchers have stated that this land is not washing and does not especially need terracing. There are two types of water erosion—the kind where the waters comes together and washes gullies, and the kind where the water spreads out and takes the soil off in a thin sheet. Grass prevents either type. Terraces are a means of holding the water where it falls, thereby stimulating grass growth. Land is not terraced just to keep the soil from washing away, but rather to make the water soak in. Mr. Williams stated. Engineers estimate that about seven-tenths of the rain that falls in this county rushes on into the creeks and draws where it does no good.

Progress Items Taken From Our Exchanges

FLORESVILLE—

Shipment of a bumper crop of spinach in the Floresville country has been delayed by recent rains according to the Chronicle-Journal. Loading of the first car was begun last Friday. One farmer alone, A. T. Ferguson will, it is reported, ship 100 cars of this staple, provided no extreme bad weather is encountered.

ALPINE—

According to the Alpine Avalanche, the latest donation to the Big Bend Park fund comes from the Elks lodge at Breckenridge. The members, at a recent meeting, subscribed \$70.75 to supplements that already subscribed to purchase land for the proposed park. Accompanying the donation was a letter extolling the scenic grandeur of the park site, and a wish for success of the project.

Also reported by the Avalanche is the starting this week of work on the new post office building.

FORT STOCKTON—

The Pioneer last week reported that the Elmsore Land and Cattle Co., largest ranch operator in Pecos county, is preparing to enter a carload of feeder calves of choice Hereford strain, in the Denver stock show. The calves, 45 in number, averaging 486 lbs., were trucked to Alpine last Wednesday, and loaded out there for shipment by rail.

The Pioneer also reports that Thomas Elmsore, charged with the murder of Bynum Shaw on March 17, 1936, is free on bond of \$7500. His next trial, the third, will be held in Sonora, having secured a change of venue.

PECOS—

Miss Reba Foster, 27, a sufferer from chronic appendicitis, was recently operated upon, states the Enterprise. Examination of her veriform appendix after removal disclosed a pin lodged therein. Miss Foster recalled swallowing the pin when she was 7 years old.

Work started last week on the Pecos elementary school building, the Enterprise also reports. The cost is estimated at \$65,000. The school board have asked for bids on oil burners which may be installed. For the most part heat-

ing in Pecos is by gas. Pecos prosperity is mirrored by reports in the Enterprise that bank deposits during 1937 had increased 20%. Deposits in the city's two banks as of Dec. 31 were \$1,494,432.

MARFA—

According to the Big Bend Sentinel, the State Highway Department will, on January 25, review bids for construction of 22 miles of Highway 90 east of Valentine. The remaining link of unsurfaced road on Highway 90 in Culberson county, will be open for bids by March 1, provided the right-of-way in that county is fenced. Construction of pavement from Valentine to the Culberson county line is expected to start about February 1.

MCCAMEY—

According to the News, Upton county is now on a cash basis, due to payment of taxes by large pipeline companies operating in the county which had been delayed for four years on account of litigation. At the beginning of the year the county cash balance was \$72,000. Outstanding warrants amounting to \$19,000, have been called in for payment.

MONAHANS—

According to the News, a new post office was assured this place with the awarding of a contract to a local contractor. Specifications call for a one-story, 30x73 feet building, at an approximate cost of \$5,000. The building will be completed and ready for occupancy by March 1.

BARSTOW—

Another chapter in the bitter fight to remove the county seat of Ward county from this place to Monahans will be revealed in district court, which convenes in February. Summoned as witnesses, according to the Ward County News, are 454 residents from the eastern portion of the county. An injunction against removal of the site was granted to Barstow residents, on grounds that the votes in Monahans were in excess of poll taxes of record.

HELLO EVERYBODY!
You know, boys and girls, this Adventurers' Club of ours signs of spreading all over the cockeyed world. Just a few ago we enrolled a native boy from Java, and today here comes from Sweetwater, way up in British Columbia.

Bill Simpson is his name, and he is a homesteader in a corner where farmhouses are far and few between. But in 1908 Bill doing his homesteading in Saskatchewan, and up there, at that you were lucky if you saw a farmhouse in ten miles of travel. That's the section Bill is going to tell us about today. He's going to tell us the story of the horse that knew more than a man. And Bill has the genuine eye-witness lowdown on that story, too. You see, Bill was the man.

It was a few days before Christmas. Bill and his closest neighbor—a fellow named Barney—had driven into town, a distance of forty miles, to lay in a supply of groceries. It's hard to imagine a place that's forty miles away from the nearest grocery store—it's a fact, nevertheless. And Bill and Barney drove that forty—not over roads, but on a rough trail over the virgin prairie winding route picked out by the horse himself, as he skirted wet places and alkali spots, trying to find where the going was.

CAUGHT IN A PRAIRIE BLIZZARD

It was over that sort of road that Bill and Barney started for home. They planned to drive twenty miles, spend the night at the homestead of a man they knew along the way, and drive the other twenty miles on the following day. They had covered about the first twenty miles when a blizzard broke over their heads.

A prairie blizzard is a thing you just can't fight. It comes pelting down with such force that it is impossible to travel against it. You've just got to travel in the direction in which the wind is blowing. The snow comes down so thick that you hardly see two feet ahead of you. And that's just the sort of that Bill and Barney ran up against.

"The temperature dropped," says Bill, "until the sleigh runners screamed as they passed over the cold snow. The wind rose, driving snow particles at us with stinging force. The cold penetrated our bodies, and before we had gone half mile we were performing the craziest looking acrobatics you ever saw in an effort to keep warm."

For a mile or so after the storm broke we were able to keep the horses headed along the trail. But every vestige of the trail was obliterated and we had to trust to luck as we headed for our destination. It began to dawn on us then that, though it was only miles to the homestead of our friend, we would probably never find it in that blizzard—that we would drive on and on until we died.

Even then we were not far from freezing. Barney, who is superstitious, kept crying over and over again: "Oh, me poor fellow, I'll never see her again. The storm devils will get me many time in the next couple of hours I felt myself becoming drowsy. I just wanted to take a short nap—just a short nap. That's what I was telling myself. But I knew in my heart that ever lay down I would never wake up again."

BEAT BARNEY TO SAVE HIS LIFE

So Bill forced himself to beat his arms about and rub his face with snow to keep himself awake. After one of those sleepless nights he turned to speak to Barney—and found him peacefully asleep in the bottom of the sleigh box. He had to beat him with a blacksnake whip to get him awake again. "Awake, Barney," he says. "The exertion brought with it a feeling of that may have saved my own life."

By that time Bill had lost his bearings and even his direction. He gave the horse a free rein, trusting in his instinct. On they went. The snow, by that time, was falling in dense curtain that it was impossible to see even as far as the head. There isn't a man in the world who wouldn't have been in such a storm. But the horse showed no hesitancy. He kept on.

Then all at once he began to slow down. A few paces farther he came to a stop before what looked like a huge mound of snow. Had he, too, lost his sense of direction? Bill shouted "Get up, Barney. The horse didn't budge. Bill was about to take the reins when the thought came to him to investigate that mound of snow."

LUCKILY THE HORSE KEPT HIS BEARINGS

He climbed down from the sleigh. The mound was roundly shaped—for a snow pile. Bill thrust his hand into it, then realized that the horse knew things that he didn't. That was a snow-covered pile of straw that had been left there by threshers in the fall.

"I pulled the wagon up into the shelter of the house," says Bill, "and was preparing to pull out some of the straw to make a fire, when I saw what looked like a star off toward the horizon. I knew there was no possibility of seeing a star through such a storm, and realized to my bounded joy that it must be a light gleaming in the house of our friend with whom we planned to spend the night."

Bill headed the horse toward the light and drove on. The house all right, but they were coming up to it from the direction from which they should have approached it. Almost passed it," says Bill, "and if we had, we would have to our deaths in the howling wind and deepening snow. Thinking that saved us from doing so was—the horse."

Bill and Barney spent the night at that homestead and the next morning after the storm was over. In late Bill never passed that place without remembering his battle with the elements—and the horse that kept his bearings when Barney had both lost theirs.

The Sanderson National Farm Loan Association held its annual meeting in the offices of the Sanderson Wool Commission Co., at 3 p. m. January, 11, 1938.

Twelve members of the association together with guests were present.

The condition of the Sanderson NFLA was reviewed in the annual report submitted by its board of directors and its secretary-treasurer, A. E. Creigh, Jr.

The Sanderson NFLA has in its charter the counties of Pecos, Brewster, Terrell, and Val Verde and since organization of the association on April 14th, 1934, has made Federal Land Bank loans to local ranchmen in the amount of \$1,025,300.00. The association has likewise made land bank Commissioner's loans for an additional amount of \$165,800.00. The association has a membership of thirty-three.

The stockholders after reviewing the business of the association elected directors of the association, Joe Kerr and Frank K. Harrell to serve for three years, Albert Appel and C. B. Cochran to serve for two years, and Joe D. Nichols and G. J. Henshaw to serve for a one-year period.

A talk was made by Hon. Joseph Kerr on the value of the Farm Credit Administration to livestock ranchmen in West Texas and the borrowers were urged of the necessity not only to keep their interest arrangements with the bank in current form, but in every case possible to retire the installments each interest paying date even though the borrower might be entitled to defer payment upon it.

After adjournment of the general stockholders' meeting a directors' meeting was held in which the financial condition of the Sanderson National Farm Loan Association was fully revealed by the directors and election of officers of the association was held. G. J. Henshaw was elected president of the Sanderson NFLA and Alfred E. Creigh, Jr., as secretary-treasurer, and the loan committee and alternate committee was set up for the year's business. The investigators selected by the board of directors for the coming year as appraisers for the association were R. E. Corder and W. D. Hunter.

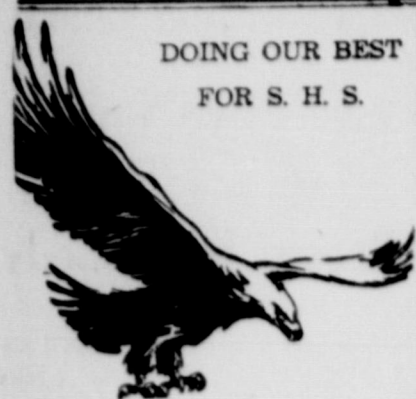
