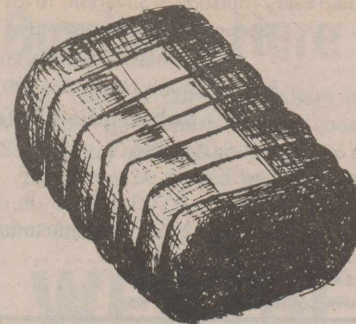

February is Heart Month

No diseases are glamorous, least of all heart diseases. They're serious killers. In fact, every 34 seconds, an American dies from cardiovascular diseases and stroke. The unfortunate fact is that many of these deaths are preventable and Briscoe County volunteers are banding together in February to help fight heart disease.

The 1993 campaign message is "We offer a special incentive for learning stroke's warning signs. It's called Life!" The campaign will emphasize the importance of knowing the warning signs of stroke. These warning signs are sudden weakness or numbness of the face, arm or leg on one side of the body, sudden dimness or loss of vision, loss of speech or trouble talking or understanding speech, sudden severe headaches with no apparent cause or unexplained dizziness, unsteadiness or sudden falls. If any of these symptoms occur, immediate medical attention should be sought.

Mrs. O. C. Rampley will lead the 1993 Dear Neighbor Campaign with the help of The Century of Progress Study Club for the Briscoe Division American Heart Association. The Dear Neighbor Campaign highlights distributing the warning signs of stroke and collecting donations through the mail from Briscoe residents. Mrs. Rampley and The Century of Progress Study Club will be addressing and mailing letters to Briscoe County friends and neighbors to encourage their help during the American Heart Month.

Of special significance is the volunteer hours donated by Mrs. Rampley and the Century of Progress

members. These volunteers know first hand the ravages of heart disease and have worked diligently to raise funds and support the educational programs of the American Heart Association. Last year, thanks to their time and efforts, Briscoe County Division raised \$1198 to help fund research and education to prevent the nation's and Briscoe County's #1 Killer, heart disease.

Many Briscoe County neighbors may not realize that they, or a loved one, has directly benefitted from AHA programs such as CPR courses, Blood Pressure Screenings, Nutrition Awareness Week, and other AHA community programs. Also, new advancements in high blood pressure control, pacemakers and surgery to help children born with heart defects all have evolved from AHA-funded research. The funds raised during February are vital to the AHA continuing its efforts.
