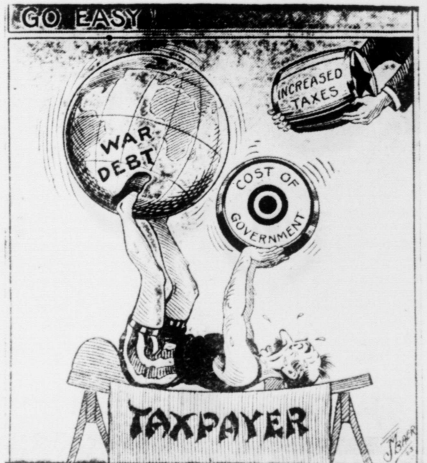

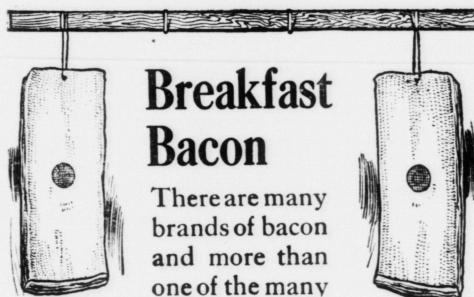

John D. Rockefeller Jr. is the teacher of one of the largest and best-known Bible classes in the world. Recently the class celebrated its twenty-fifth anniversary, with a banquet at one of the New York hotels. The writer was in New York at the time and read quite interestingly of the banquet the next morning. Speeches of Mr. Rockefeller, Mr. Schwab, and other Big Men were reported.

Mr. Rockefeller told of some interesting experiences he had had because he failed to look like the man people expected to see. On several occasions he had been overlooked, pushed aside, disregarded entirely, by reception committees and photographers who were looking for him.

One story he told was especially interesting. Thomas W. Lamont of J. P. Morgan & Company was taking a trip to the Pacific Coast. A reception and banquet had been arranged for him, but unfortunately he had not been notified and got off at the wrong end of the platform.

"I am a second thought there was an accident at the station and I was running past him when a camera and asked what was the matter."

"Shut up, you damned fool," was the answer. "There's a devil of big banker from New York getting off here."

Mr. Schwab said: "When I die I do not want monuments of bronze and marble, but I want to be remembered by flaming furnaces and stacks which might mark one step forward in the industry of this great and glorious country."

And that is the key to the greatness of the great: The task and not the man, is the Big Thing.—Exchange.

A little common sense is a mighty good thing if made use of.

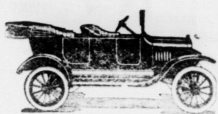

DO YOU KNOW—

THAT THE Poultry industry in the United States is bigger than the Cattle in dustry? And haven't you noticed that there is always a good demand for poultry at most all seasons of the year? Of course we realize that the present local facilities for handling large quantities of poultry is inadequate, but when the poultry production of the country is increased, the facilities for handling will be provided.

LAST WEEK We urged the raising of more poultry on Kimble County farms and ranches, as a sideline, that will bring in extra dollars. We want you to take a few minutes and do some figuring; estimate the number of chickens and turkeys that you can raise on your place, without extra expense for feeding, and with only a little expense for providing housing room. Then estimate what this number will produce, considering a fair market; then there is the extra work that will be required; but when you have thought it out, you will find that the money you receive for this extra work will be equal to that which you receive for working with cattle or sheep, amount of time considered.
