EMERGENCY POWERS USED TO MEET COAL SHORTAGE

The coal strike forced state and city government to use emergency powers today to obtain fuel supplies for vital public services and telephone workers postponed a strike scheduled to start tomorrow. John L. Lewis, leader of the striking United Mine Workers, met with mine operators again as both sides sought to end the walkout.

Authorities in 10 states issued emergency orders in an attempt to keep hospitals and other public institutions operating. Layoffs idled more than 60,000 workers in industries dependent on coal and that figure was expected to grow within 24 hours. Another 372,000 UMW members are off the job along with 1,000 members of the rival Progressive Mine Workers.

The Ford Motor Co. said it would lay off 40,000 workers tomorrow and Packard will close March 6, sending 6,900 additional workers home.

Other auto makers were expected to make similar announcements today.

A threatened strike of CIO Telephone Workers was postponed 60 days when both union and management officials agreed to President Truman's request for further contract talks.

Democrats To Meet In McAllen

McALLEN, Tex., Feb. 23 (UP)—The State Democratic Executive Committee meets in McAllen this weekend and the question today was: when will the members find time to work?

Only one business session is scheduled—at 10 A. M. Saturday. It will adjourn in little more than an hour to allow the 64 committeemen to attend a coffee at Gov. Allan Shivers' spacious home.

A luncheon will be held at 1:15 P. M. hosts will be Ramon Guerra, a member of the Good Neighbor Commission; Lloyd M. Bentsen, former Good Neighbor Commissioner; V. F. Neuhaus, member of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, and Bill Whalen, State Youth Commissioner.

Tomorrow, some of the executive committeemen will speak at the opening of McAllen's Sports and Hobby Show. All members will attend a wild game dinner at adjacent Reynosa, Mexico, tomorrow night.

It was not known for certain if Gov. Shivers would be present for the session. However, Mrs. H. H. Weinert of Seguin, National Committeewoman, and George Pharr, South Texas political chieftain, planned to attend.

Negotiators in the month-old Chrysler strike met today for the 11th straight day with little apparent optimism. The auto industry's second largest strike since the war was stymied over pension demands by the C I O United Auto Workers.

Now however, the pension issue has been shunted into the background while company and union officials present new contract demands.

At Seattle, the Independent Association of Machinists has approved a strike vote against Northwest Airlines. Union officials said 85 per cent of Northwest's mechanics voted to strike if necessary and that they could paralyze the company's domestic and overseas operations.

Meanwhile, UMW leaders met with Anthracite Coal Operators again as contract talks dragged along with little change. The hard coal miners have not walked out, although they are working only three days a week.

Influenza, Old Style Hits Hard In West Texas

Influenza, of the "old-fashioned" type that hit during World War I, is occurring at epidemic rate in West Texas.

At Abilene, school officials said more than 7,000 children were absent from class because of 'flu.

Big Spring, too, was hit hard. Coach Carl Coleman called off spring football practice, and absenteeism in school was high.

At San Angelo, one first grade class was decimated—with 48 per cent of its total enrollment absent because of 'flu.

At San Angelo High School, the absentee rate was 12 per cent. Wichita Falls, likewise, reported a serious siege.

Doctors warned that the outbreak was not to be taken lightly, but thus far there have been no deaths attributed to it in the worst-stricken sections.

REVISED VERSION OF OMNIBUS BILL RUSHED BACK TO HOUSE

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 23 (UP)—Members of the Senate bowed to minority house demands today and churned out a new version of the multi-million dollar omnibus tax bill.

The measure, tailored to lower chamber specifications and lightened by the removal of one controversial amendment, was hustled back to the House where efforts to gain swift concurrence were anticipated.

Final passage of the bill in the Senate—actually for the second time—was tallied at 27-2, with Sens. Pat Bullock of Colorado City and Keith Kelley of Fort Worth casting the negative votes.

The upper chamber had started its remodeling of the revenue-raising bill by adopting a resolution asking the House to return the measure to the upper chamber.

Administration backers previously were primed to snap through emergency action agreeing to minority demands from the house.

Sen. A. M. Aikin, Jr., of Paris said that unless agreement was reached with the lower Chamber, the entire multi-million dollar program was threatened.

Also readied for action today was a cigarette tax bill which had been passed by the House and amended by the

Sheriff Capt. H. C. English said Loring admitted robbing Frank Dougan in Las Vegas and had waived extradition.

Senate. If the House rejects Senate amendments, the bill, which would put an additional penny-per-pack tax on cigarettes, would go to a conference committee.

The omnibus tax increase bill amendment, one of 19 changes in the original plan to raise \$22,000,000 for improving the state's obsolete hospitals, would set up a central agency for distribution of federal surplus commodities.

Rep. Callan Graham of Junction, one of the sponsors of the omnibus tax plan, told house members yesterday that a resolution to delete the amendment would be offered on the Senate floor today.

Sen. George Moffett of Chillicothe, sponsor of the criticized amendment, announced he would vote against the resolution although he believed it would carry.

Administration backers berated the Moffett amendment. Rep. Sam Hanna of Dallas said the legislature was "setting up liaison men between the hen house and a potato hill" and greating a "bureau within a bureau."

Rep. Lamar Zivley of Temple, a supporter of the amendment, estimated that Texas would receive \$1,000,000 in free surplus food, with all of it going to state institutions, by spending only \$39,000.

Earlier yesterday, Graham said the omnibus plan needed 100 votes or "the whole hospital program fails."

If the measure receives 100 votes, it will become effective immediately. Otherwise, it would not take effect until 90 days after it is signed by Gov. Allan Shivers.

Most of the other changes in the omnibus bill, which affects items ranging from playing cards to crude oil, were minor. Some of them will correct the inevitable typographical errors.

CLAIM ANTI-TRUST LAWYERS KILLED OWN CASE AGAINST A&P

The anti-trust lawyers previously defeated three times in different Federal courts "killed their own case" against the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Co. at Dallas, A&P will say in advertisements appearing in newspapers throughout the country this week-end. But this did not end the 10-year campaign against A&P according to the fourth advertisement in a series discussing previous unsuccessful attacks on the pioneer food chain by anti-trust lawyers. "The anti-trust lawyers were not satisfied with decisions against them by three Federal Judges," the ad says. "They still wanted to destroy A&P."

The advertisement tells how in 1944 the Dallas case based on allegations similar to those in the current suit to put A&P out of business had been thrown out of court by Federal Judge W. H. Atwell.

On appeal the ad says, the circuit at New Orleans, although reinstating the indictment, agreed that it was "vague and contained many allegations which were inflammatory." The court decided Judge Atwell "should protect A&P from these inflammatory allegations by striking them out." Judge Atwell struck these statements, the ad says, and instructed the anti-trust lawyers to furnish him "specific charges instead of

vague generalities."

"On February 26th while the Judge was still waiting for his answer in Dallas, and without any previous notice to him," the ad states, "The anti-trust lawyers gave a story to the newspapers in Washington, announcing that they were dropping the case in Dallas." In dropping the case, the anti-trust lawyers were quoted as saying they intended "to file a substantially similar suit in an appropriate jurisdiction at an early date." The "early date" proved to be the same day, A&P says in the advertisement. "As soon as one anti-trust lawyer killed the case in Dallas, another anti-trust lawyer filed a new case in Danville, Ill." the ad continued. "This new case made most of the same allegations that had been made and dropped in Dallas and that are being made against us today. 'Despite defeats in three Federal courts in widely separated parts of the country, they continued their campaign to destroy A&P.'"

When Judge Atwell heard of their action, he ordered the anti-trust lawyers to prepare an order for his signature dismissing the Dallas case, the advertisement says. In signing the order, the Judge told the lawyers, "This Nolle Prosequi does not have the sanction or approval of this court." Judge Atwell said, "That is a matter that may be presented to the other court and may be of interest to the people at large."

Ice, Snow Still Plague Northwest

CHICAGO, Feb. 23 (UP)—An ice and snow storm took a mounting toll of death in the Northeast today, and National Guardsmen stepped up evacuation of flood-threatened families in Louisiana.

The toll of dead from highway accidents, fires and explosions rose to 37 as the wintry storm piled a mixture of snow, sleet and freezing rain on the Atlantic seaboard from Pennsylvania to Maine and westward to the Great Lakes.

South of the storm area the weather was mild in Virginia, the Carolinas and the Gulf States, and it was so balmy in the inter-mountain west that golfers were out at Salt Lake City.

Only on the northern plains along the Canadian border did the mercury dip below zero. Transportation was snarled in New York and New Jersey as snow turned to freezing rain and laid a growing crust of ice and slush on rail lines, streets and airports.

Commercial airline schedules were upset, trains ran late and elevated and subway trains in New York City were short-circuited.

Rubber In Your Roads May Stretch the Highway Dollar



Laying a rubber road in Virginia. Particles of natural rubber are mixed with the asphalt surfacing to increase wear and reduce skidding.

It costs nearly a billion dollars a year to keep America's 3,300,000 miles of present highways and streets in repair, to say nothing of building new ones. So it is no wonder that highway engineers and tax-payers are watching with keen interest a new idea in road surfacing that may cut millions of dollars off the annual road repair bill.

The idea is to mix particles of natural rubber with the asphalt surface coating on a road. The Dutch tried it 12 years ago, and found that it made the road stand up better under winter cold and summer heat.

A test rubber road in Holland, after 12 years' use under heavy

traffic, is still in good shape, while adjacent strips without rubber have had to be repaired twice.

In 1949 four states—Ohio, Virginia, Minnesota and Texas—laid test strips of natural rubber-asphalt paving. If these prove as successful as highway engineers hope, a new era in road construction will be here. And in addition to extra wear, these rubber-surfaced roads have proved that they reduce skidding.

A free booklet describing these rubber roads and the tests which are being made can be obtained from the Natural Rubber Bureau, Dept. N100, 1631 K St., N.W., Washington 6, D. C. It is called "Stretching Highway Dollars—With Rubber Roads."

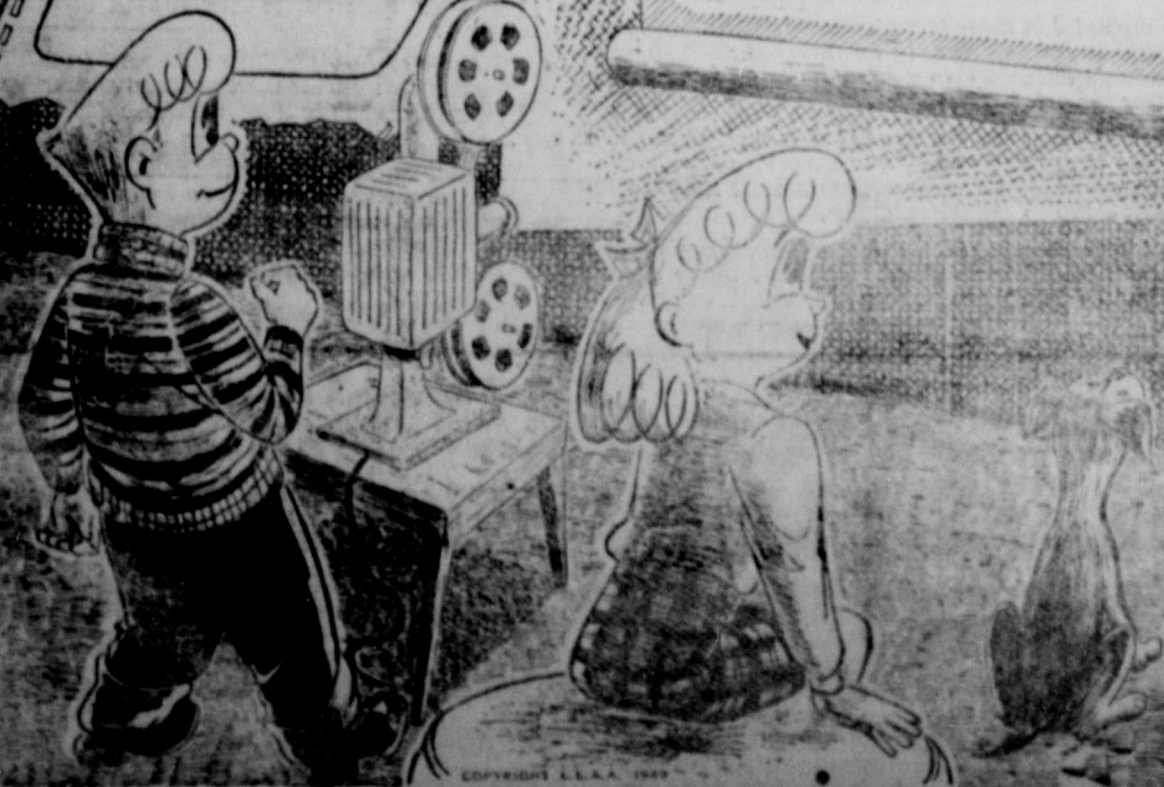

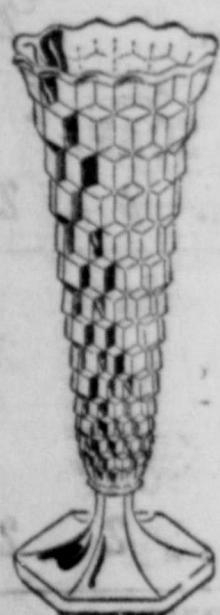

So the case was back in Dallas again.

Judge Atwell, carrying out the decision of the Circuit Court, struck out the inflammatory matter.

He said that without this inflammatory and prejudicial matter the Grand Jury might never have returned the indictment.

Judge Atwell said to the anti-trust lawyers:

"There are many statements in the indictment which are not at all in violation, and are highly prejudicial and inflammatory."

The anti-trust lawyers objected. They advanced an amazing argument. They said that the removal of their inflammatory allegations (which all four judges had agreed did not belong in the indictment) destroyed their case.

DR. SANDER INJECTED AIR INTO WOMAN'S BODY ON MATE'S PLEA

MANCHESTER, N. H., Feb. 23 (UP)—The husband of a dying cancer patient pleaded with Dr. Herman N. Sander to relieve her suffering and so he injected air into her veins, prosecutor William L. Phinney told Sander's murder trial jury today.

Atty-Gen. Phinney was making his opening statement to the jury which must decide if the doctor committed murder in being merciful. He said Dr. Sander told of the pleading husband and his response to his pleas when questioned by Robert E. Biron, medical referee of Hillsborough County Dec. 29.

The patient was Mrs. Abbie C. Borroto, 59, wife of a traveling salesman, who died Dec. 4.

Phinney, speaking extemporaneously in a quiet voice his hands pushed into his coat pockets, told the all-male jury of nine Catholics and three protestants that Dr. Sander first told Biron that she died of an abdominal cancer. Dr. Biron had been informed Dr. Sander wrote into Mrs. Borroto's hospital record that he injected 10 cubic centimeters of air four times into her bloodstream and she died within 10 minutes.

"Biron asked the doctor about the air injections," Phinney said. "Dr. Sander stated that due to the pleadings of Mr. Borroto to relieve his wife, he injected air into Mrs. Borroto's veins."

"Dr. Sander told Dr. Biron he realized the consequences of this procedure and further admitted to Dr. Biron that Mrs. Borroto died of the air injections. "He said he might have broken the law, but the law was not

right." Phinney said Dr. Sander had told Dr. Biron his conscience was clear and he believed he was morally in the right.

It was the fourth day of the trial which caused a world-wide debate on the right or wrong of euthanasia.

As court convened at 10:04 A. M., 55 spectators were crowded onto wooden benches at one side of the yellow-walled courtroom on the second floor of the court house.

The rest of spectators' section of the 45 foot square, low-ceilinged room was occupied by upward of 50 reporters.

Dr. and Mrs. Sander arrived early and sat together just in front of the railing which separates the bench and counsel tables from spectators and newsmen.

Mrs. Sander wore a gray suit. Her husband also was clad in gray, as the attorney-general spoke the words with which the state hopes to send him to prison for life, the defendant stared into space through his silver-rimmed spectacles. He and Phinney were school mates.

Says Churchill In Last Fight

LONDON, Feb. 23 (UP)—Win or lose, Winston Churchill almost certainly has fought his last great general election campaign.

That is apparent as the Nation votes in the general election that will decide Churchill's immediate future and that of the country he led through World War II.

If the conservative party wins today, the 75-year-old warrior will become prime minister again.

If the labor party wins, Churchill doubtless will continue to lead the opposition for a time. But there is a strong possibility that opposition within the party will demand he turn over active leadership to someone younger like Anthony Eden or R. A. Butler.

There seems little prospect in either event that Churchill will be inclined to fight another general election as leader of the Conservative Party.

Assuming that the next government stays in power its full five years, Churchill will be 80 before the next election. And, even for the extraordinarily long-lived British premiers, this would be a great age.

At 75, he shows the strain of the 2,500-mile campaign tour he made for today's election.

Jewelry Thieves Strike Again

CLEVELAND, O., Feb. 23 (UP)—Four masked men broke into the palatial suburban home of a wealthy Cleveland couple early today and escaped with jewels estimated by police to be worth \$350,000.

Elderly Mr. and Mrs. William G. Mather were awakened by the four men in the bedroom of their home. Three of the men were armed with pistols and the fourth with a sub-machine gun.

Mather, 94, one of Cleveland's richest men, is well-known as a Philanthropist. He made his money in shipping and coal.

Mrs. Mather, under a doctor's care after being struck on the head by one of the robbers, told police her jewels were worth "at least \$350,000."

The robbers forced the couple to open their safe, police said, and "appeared to know what they were after." They took only the

choice pieces of jewelry. Cleveland police, who helped in the investigation, said the robbers also took about \$150 in cash. Sergeant James J. Horkan of the Suburban Bratenahl police said it was not known immediately how the men entered the house, but that they left by a back door and escaped in an automobile.

The quartet was masked, wore gloves and had heavy socks pulled over their feet, Horkan said, evidently to hide their footprints in the snow.

Horkan said the men were in the house only about 20 minutes and during the holdup struck Mrs. Mather, who is 59, on the head. That was the only violence, they said, and added there was no apparent reason for that attack.
