

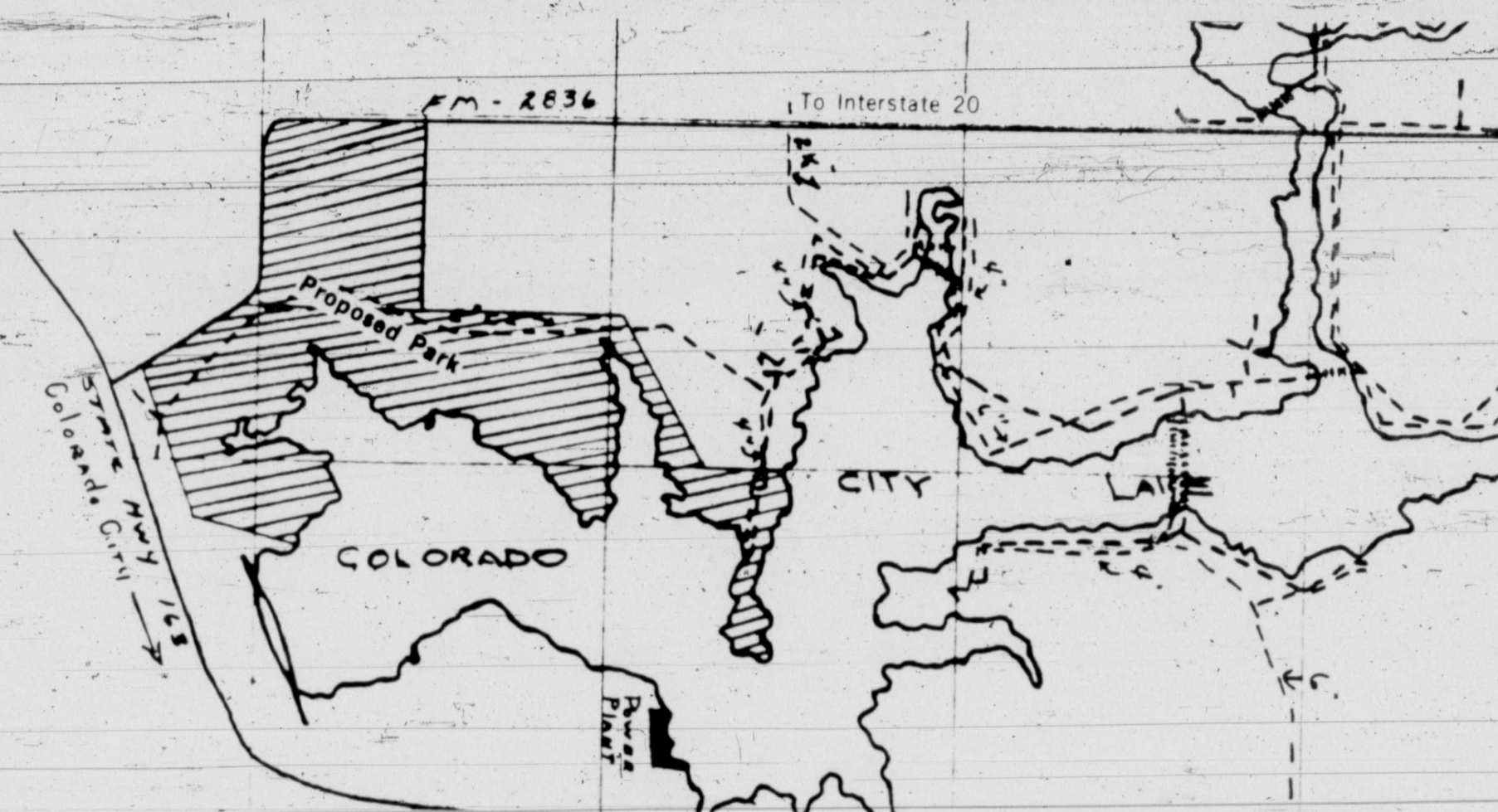

Referendum Nears

Wheat Producers To Decide Quotas

Dates for mail referendum on 1971 crop wheat marketing quotas have been set for July 27-31, according to Eddie Braswell of Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The 1971 wheat crop comes under the provisions of Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938 and requires that a marketing quota referendum be conducted on or before Aug. 1.

The Agricultural Act of 1965, as amended, extended its voluntary wheat program through the 1970 crop year. Braswell said, "and specifically suspended marketing quotas for wheat producers only for the duration of the Act."

Previously announced for the 1971 crop wheat was a national wheat marketing quota of 1,210 million bushels, along with the national allotment of 43.5 million acres.

Braswell said that price support loan rate for the new crop, estimated domestic certificate value, required acreage diversion percentages and other program details will be announced in advance of the referendum.

Program information to wheat producers, along with ballot voting instructions and individual farm allotments, will be mailed about a week prior to the referendum, the ASCS office manager explained.

Individual allotments will be based on the 1971 national allotment of 43.5 million acres, as compared to 45.5 million-acre allotment in effect for the current crop year.

"Mitchell County's wheat allotment for 1970 was 5,737 acres," Braswell said.

Marketing quotas, to be put in effect, must be approved by

two-thirds or more of those voting in the referendum.

If quotas are approved, producers will be limited to their allotment acreage beyond which they cannot harvest without a marketing quota penalty. Any excess acreage production would be subject to penalty unless it is stored under bond.

If they remain within their allotments and divert the required acreage, advised Braswell, "they'll be eligible for price-support loans and domestic wheat marketing certificate payments."

If the referendum fails to carry, he continued, "producers staying within their 1971 allotments and complying with other terms and conditions which may be prescribed by the Secretary would be eligible for support loans at 50 per cent of parity."

A delegation of city and county leaders appears today (Thursday) before Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission in Austin seeking a state park for Lake Colorado City.

Plans for the approximately 500-acre project has been quietly under way for more than six months.

City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr., who will be spokesman for the delegation before the board at 10:30 a.m., is hopeful for favorable action by the state.

Sadler will propose officially that the new state park be located on approximately 463 acres of land located along the west shore line of Lake Colorado northwest of the lake damsite near junction of State Highway 163 (to Sterling City) and Farm Highway 2836.

Most of this acreage is owned by Texas Electric Service Company but also includes the city's J. F. Merritt Lake Park.

If the state desires to designate and operate the state park, the city manager said, "we are ready - through co-operation of Texas Electric Service Company - immediately available to the state."

In the delegation with City Manager and Mrs. Sadler in

Austin to formally request the state park are Mayor Mike Hurt and three city councilmen and their wives - Chairman of Commerce President and Mrs. J. C. Britton, Mrs. and Mrs. Evelyn Kelley, Mr. and Mrs. F. L. (Buck) May, County Judge Ermer Martin, County Judge-elect Bill Carter, Precinct 1 Commissioner Marcus Vest, Immediate Past Chamber of Commerce President and Mrs. Don Benson, Chamber Manager Sefton-Pickens, Mr. and Mrs. Drew Ballard, Mr. and Mrs. Dick Wistrand, Jimmy Harrison and Truman Nix, also representing the Chamber of Commerce.

J. R. Singleton, Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission director, has been in Colorado City with Mark Gosdon, planning director for the state parks system, to personally inspect the proposed park site.

In addition, in recent weeks, district parks personnel also have been in Colorado City and at the lake for additional study and planning.

Cooperating with the study have been personnel and officials of Texas Electric Service Company, the firm which built the lake and Lake Champion.

Initial proposal for the park was made to Singleton and God-

son here in Colorado City late in January at a conference attended by a group of officials representing city, county, schools and chamber.

Presenting a special brochure of information concerning the lake area and the park proposal at the January conference were Sadler, Benson and Joe Bell.

The delegation Thursday, in their meeting with commissioners, will submit formal proposals from City Council, Commissioners Court and Colorado Independent School District.

"The West Texas area from here to New Mexico border has no state park facility on water," City Manager Sadler said, "and our study reveals this new park will serve this need and that the acreage can be made available to the state with practically no initial cost... thus saving Texas taxpayers money."

"This park fits into the state plan for extending recreational facilities in West Texas and would be readily accessible to more than 500,000 persons in 20 counties west of Lake Colorado City."

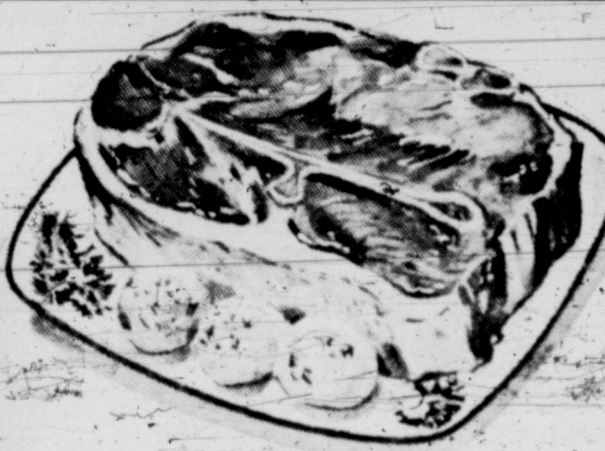

Family Affair Golf Event At Sweetwater

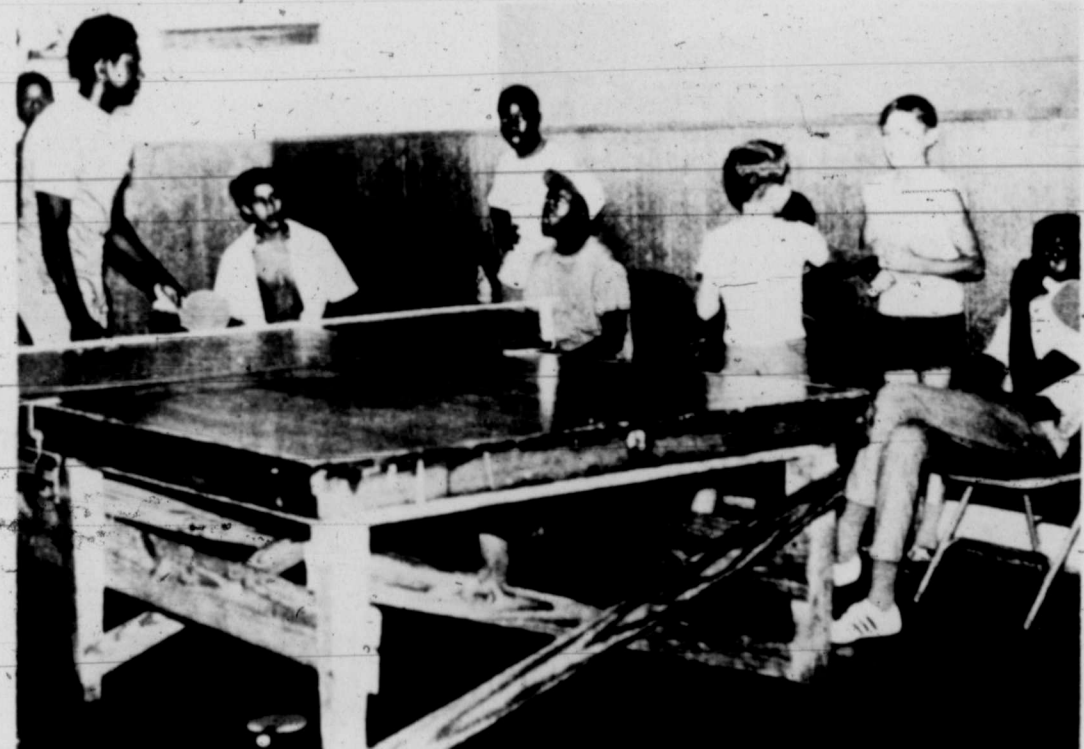
"Second annual family affair" golf tournament will be Friday and Saturday at Sweetwater Country Club.

Friendly is the way you are, unless you're mad at the world and feeling unfriendly.

Friendly is a smile in the eyes and in the heart.

Friendly is a wave of the hand or a helping hand when somebody stalls and needs a shove.

Friendly is remembering other people's rights and safety, along with your own.

Friendly is law-abiding to the letter--even when the Highway Patrol is not watching.

Friendly is caring.

WISH it could be added in truth, here, that all people who are naturally friendly just naturally drive friendly. They don't.

Some of the gentlest women ever born say bad words and turn into aggressive drivers if another driver pulls into the parking space in front of them.

Men who wouldn't harm a stray kitten yell like crazy in heavy traffic. And some of the nicest kids you ever saw think "peeling" is the greatest.

Drive Friendly. The car you don't smash could be yours.

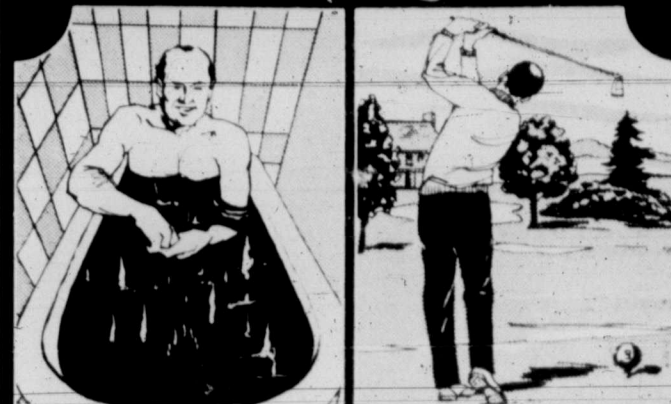

PARK From Page 1 is established by the fact that 91 per cent of all lake permits are purchased by lake visitors from outside of Colorado City. And 90 per cent of the 500, 000 population in the 20 coun- ties west of our lake is within 110 miles driving distance to Colorado City, Sadler empha- sized. The park proposal does not include Lake Champion. However, if the state agrees to the proposal then Colorado City would "immediately turn over all its facilities of Mer- ritt Park to the state and would remove the municipality from the issuing-selling of recrea- tional permits on Lake Colo- rado. This would leave state park entrance fees and the usual expenses at privately-owned lake camps as the only costs for persons using the lake and park. City officials emphasize that, by immediately acquiring the city's Merritt Park, the state would have at least minimum facilities already available while state improvements are planned and carried out. The municipal park at the lake, although small as it lacks the major park site on the north, has paved road looping through its area, 13 shelters, 2 shower facilities, 2 flush- ing restrooms, 80-by-60 fish- ing dock, concrete boat ramp, electrical outlets, treated water and other facilities. Water and sewer lines ex- tend to the new proposed park area.

Conservation Leaflet

Gardening and conservation is subject of a new USDA leaflet written by the Soil Conservation Service.

District Conservationist Don Hodges of the Colorado City Soil Conservation Service office said the 8-fold leaflet, titled "Gardening on the Contour", outlines ways to control erosion in the backyard garden.

It tells, for example, how rows can be laid out on the contour using a carpenter's level mounted on a 2 by 4. The leaflet also explains how rainwater which drains from a neighbor's property might be diverted away from your garden.

"Some of our gardeners in the Mitchell County area are excellent conservationists," Hodges said. "Many use mulches on the soil surface to help reduce erosion and to improve soil fertility similar to the way conservation farmers use crop residues. A few local gardeners compost their grass clippings and three leaves for this purpose."

Others use hay, straw, cottonseed hulls or peat moss. Preventing erosion in a garden is just as important to a gardener as it is to any other land user," the conservationist pointed out.

Hodges said copies of the new leaflet are available free at Soil Conservation office here.

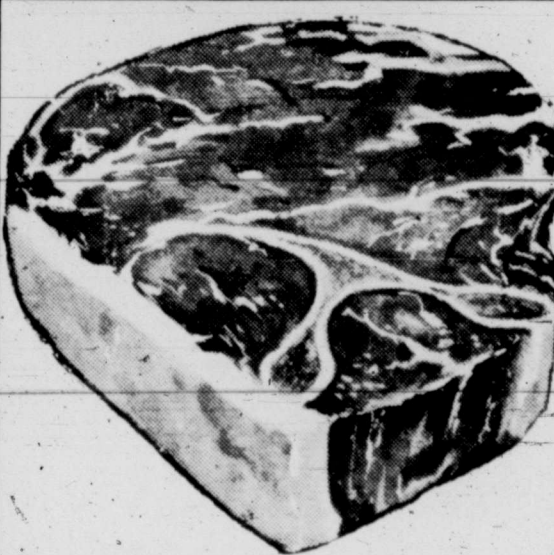
