Kenny Foundation Answers Common Inquiries On Polio

Released by the Kenny Foundation's Medical Staff

Development of polio vaccine has been heralded as a great step forward in the fight against poliomyelitis and has given the world renewed hope that final victory over this disease may ultimately be achieved. Sound estimates, however, are that victory over polio still is in the future.

Q. What are and are not symptoms of Polio?

A. Symptoms: Severe generalized headache, moderate fever, stiff limbs and muscle weakness.

A. Not Symptoms: Cough, cold, rash on body, redness of the eyes, or swelling of limbs.

Symptoms frequently abate temporarily after an initial illness of about 24 hours recurring within 2 or 3 days.

Q. What precautionary measures should be taken during polio outbreaks or epidemics?

A. Normal precautions against exposure to communicable disease. Avoid contacts with new groups of people and swimming in polluted waters. Guard the cleanliness of everything taken into the mouth. Avoid over fatigue, late hours, worry or irregular living schedules. Removal of tonsils, adenoids or teeth during the polio season may be a factor in exposures and in elective operations a delay to a more

favorable season is considered to be advisable.

Q. What is the Kenny Treatment and who developed it?

A. Briefly, the Kenny Treatment includes first, hot packs and attendant procedures to lengthen shortened muscles. Second, neuro-muscular retraining of the affected parts. The treatment was first developed by the late Sister Elizabeth Kenny.

The next meeting is set for Sept. 22 at the home of Mrs. L. G. Harris.

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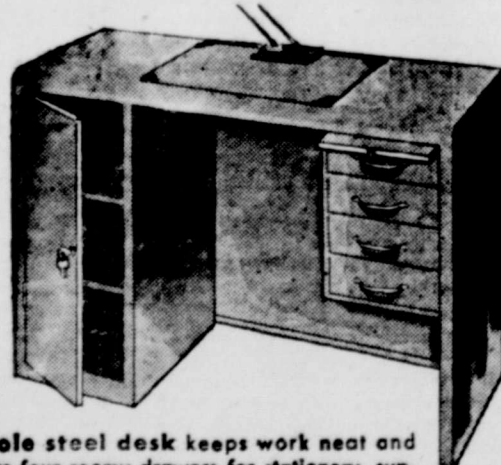
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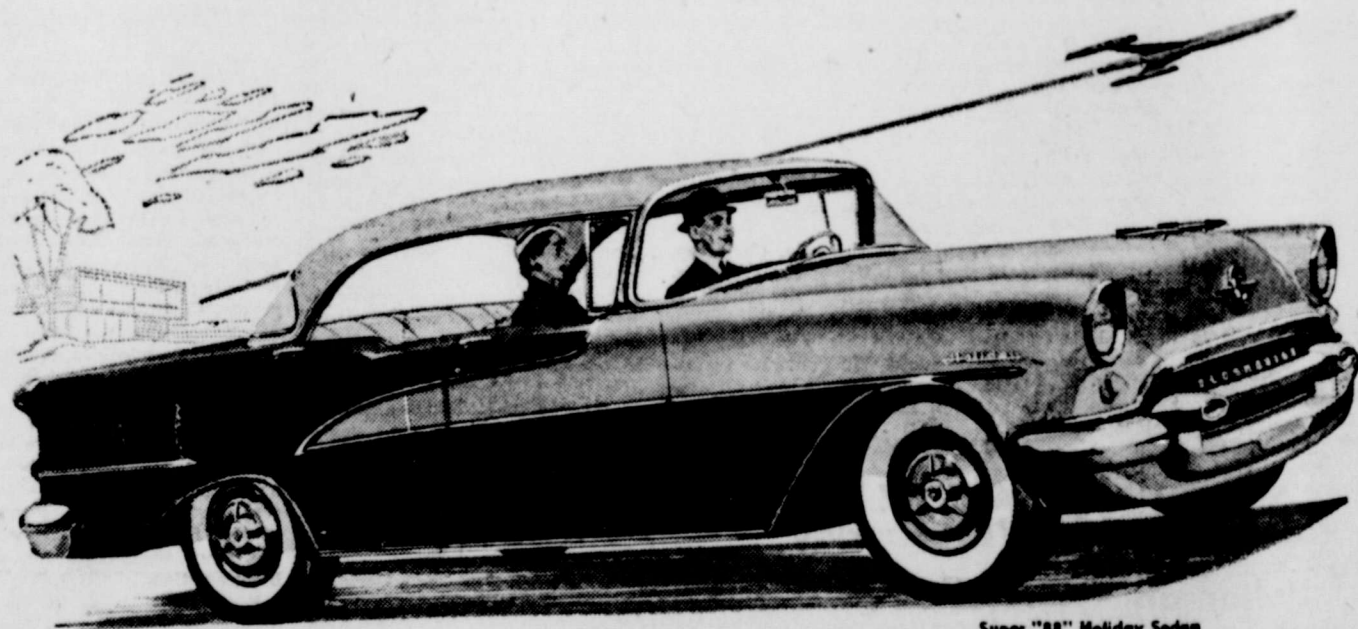
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Perhaps the most significant development to come out of the recent Grand Jury investigation into County affairs was contained in the statement released by the Grand Jury pointing out findings, over and above the indictments, which they felt the people of Cochran County had a right to know.

The Grand Jury said that they found negligence and sometimes almost "complete indifference" on the part of the Commissioner's Court when dealing with County funds. The Commissioner's Court is composed of four Commissioners and the County Judge.

They did not elaborate. They did not refer to any previous attempts at securing a County audit nor did they give any Court member credit for trying to secure an audit. They lumped them all in the same boat and left it up to the public to decide to whom they were alluding.

In scoring the Court in fairly rough terms, the Jury got at something that could not have been brought to the public in any other way. They certainly went what could be termed "over and beyond their call of duty" to inform the public.

In the days to come, any of the Commissioner's or Judges who have served during these nine years, and who feel they have an accounting due for efforts they have made to keep straight county funds, will certainly be welcome to tell their story to Cochran Countyans through the medium of the Tribune—if the length is within reason and not libelous.

But be that as it may, the public should take heed of the message the Grand Jury left them with. It could be the important cog in preventing a recurrence of any future "misapplications" of county funds.

Herewith, the Grand Jury's four page report, quoted in its entirety: We, the Grand Jury for the April Term, A. D. 1965 of the 72nd District Court, Cochran County, Texas, return herewith seven (7) felony indictments. In connection with the indictments returned, we wish to make the following report:

On August 13, 1965, this Grand Jury made a partial report to this Court, at which time, seven felony indictments were returned. We at that time asked that we be adjourned until September 8, 1965. We resumed our investigation on September 8, 1965.

We have heard testimony for ten full days dealing with the financial affairs of the County. In connection with this investigation, we have talked with approximately 40 different witnesses. We have also had a report from the Auditor who made an outside audit of the County records. The financial report on the different offices of the County, including the Cochran County Hospital, has been studied in detail, along with the testimony dealing with the financial transactions of the County in an effort to pin the responsibility for the misapplication of public funds as shown by the indictments returned by this Grand Jury. The study of records and testimony covering a period of several years has been a complicated and tedious undertaking. In assuming this responsibility as Grand Jurors of the County, we have attempted to gather all the facts and to give all parties an opportunity to relate to us any and all information which might be in any way connected with the financial transactions of the County.

We feel that it is our duty, in addition to the indictments we have returned, to report certain findings that we have made, so that the citizens of the County may know where and when the shortages have occurred.

COUNTY AUDITOR

From January 1, 1947 through December 31, 1964, the former County Auditor, Earl Cadenhead, received approximately Thirty Eight Hundred Dollars (\$3800.00) in salary checks over and above his authorized salary. In addition to this, he cashed personal checks out of County Funds in the possession of the County Treasurer in the approximate amount of Twenty Two Hundred Dollars (\$2200.00). These checks were held by the County Treasurer and never deposited in the bank to the credit of Cochran County. This full amount has been paid back to the County by Mr. Cadenhead since January 1, 1965.

COUNTY TREASURER

From January 1, 1947 through December 31, 1964, the former County Treasurer, Odel Smith, received approximately Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) in salary checks over and above his authorized salary. In addition to this amount, he cashed his own personal checks out of County Funds in his possession in the approximate amount of Thirty Five Hundred Dollars (\$3500.00). These personal checks were never taken to the bank and deposited to the credit of the County. Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) of this amount has been paid back to the County by Mr. Smith since January 1, 1965. The balance remaining unpaid at this time.

COUNTY and DISTRICT CLERK'S OFFICE

From January 1, 1947, through December 31, 1962, the former County and District Clerk, T. W. (Joe) Pierce, received approximately Thirty One Hundred Dollars (\$3100.00) in salary checks over and above his authorized salary. In addition to this, during the year 1952, he received approximately Twenty Five Hundred Dollars (\$2500.00) in fees through the office of County and District Clerk that were not turned over to the County Treasurer to be deposited to the credit of Cochran County. These total amounts have been paid back to the County since January 1, 1965.

COCHRAN COUNTY HOSPITAL

From approximately March 1, 1961, through December 31, 1964, Lewis Cole, the Superintendent of the County Hospital during that time, received approximately Nineteen Thousand Dollars (\$19,000) in cash receipts, through the operation of the County Hospital which were not turned over to the County Treasurer's office. This amount has been deposited with the County Treasurer's Office by Mr. Cole since January 1, 1965, and the books of the hospital now balance.

More details of the Audit will be available to the public at such time as the auditor has made his formal report to the County Commissioner's Court.

We have made this report in an attempt to point out the shortages that we have found and in the hope that it would prevent any unnecessary reflections against those in the County Government whose funds were not found to be short.

We think it necessary at this point to say that our Commissioner's Court, present and past, have been negligent, and at times completely indifferent, in their spending and supervision of the funds of Cochran County. We here and now call upon our Commissioners Court, as well as all the other officials of this County to assume the

GRAND JURY STATEMENT REPRINTED FOR THOSE WHO DIDN'T GET AN 'EXTRA'

The following statement, released by the Grand Jury last week, was included in a paper published Saturday afternoon. Since many of our regular subscribers did not get the "EXTRA" we are reprinting it for their benefit, both on the following page and the other columns on another page. All new information is found on page one.

The statement was made as the Grand Jury wound up its hearings, — a session that consumed 10 days of interviewing persons and gathering information. We strongly urge the people to carefully read the statement, so that they can more clearly understand the situation. It explains the money situation in respect to each office that was found short.



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responsibility that has been placed upon them by the Citizens of the County, and to be diligent in the performance of their duty and ever mindful of the trust that is theirs.

(Editor's Note: It should be pointed out here that the Commissioner's Court is composed of the four pet commissioners and the county judge—the judge voting only in cases of tie, but serving as chairman of the group.)

We as citizens of the County, should take a more personal interest in the affairs of our County Government, by electing qualified men and women to our public offices, and to continue this responsibility and interest by being sure that our officials are serving the best interest of the County.

Having completed our labors with respect to this investigation,

we, your Grand Jury for the April Term, 1965 of the 72nd District Court of Cochran County, ask leave of the Court to be adjourned until further order of the Court.

We ask that a certified copy of this report be furnished the Commissioners' Court of Cochran County.

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OLD TESTAMENT LIKE HISTORY

The Bible was not written to record history as its primary purpose, yet it contains much history. Twelve books of the Old Testament are classed as books of history. Below we give some thoughts gathered from many sources showing the accuracy and value of these books.

The honor of having produced the first historical narrative of wide scope and high accuracy must be accorded the Hebrews in the Bible.

The first five books contain the genesis of things, peoples and the world. Man may wonder as to the accuracy of the unknown things like creation, but it is significant that in those parts that deal with things nearer to us these books have proved accurate. These same five books show the exodus of the Jews, their wandering and attempts to enter Canaan. All this is a matter of accurate history.

We find the rest of the Old Testament history no less exact and trustworthy. One historian said: "Far and away the best of Hebrew historical narrative is the so-called history of David." Men have guessed that this was written by Abiathar, the priest. Professor A. T. Olmstead writes: "Whether written by Abiathar or not, the modern professional historian must do justice to his predecessor of 3,000 years ago. He has presented us a genuine history... an account of facts for coming generations. His objectivity is uncanny."

Edward Meyer said: "It is astounding that historical literature of this character should have been possible in Israel at this time. It stands far above anything we know elsewhere of ancient Oriental historical writing."

Paul, the apostle, said that "these things happened unto them for ensamples: and they are written for our admonition." (1 Cor. 10 11).

Two of the indictments brought by the 72nd District Grand Jury, Saturday, are new counts against a man not formerly indicted.

Lewis R. (Luke) Cole was named in two indictments returned before Judge Victor H. Lindsey, 72nd District Court Judge.

The specific counts were for taking funds with which he was entrusted as manager of the Cochran County Hospital and converting them to his own use. Cole, as far as the Tribune knows, was still manager of the Cochran County Hospital when the indictments were returned and this was the only present County official to be indicted.

His bond, as were these in all the other bills returned, was set at \$2,000.00 on each count.

In addition, the Grand Jury is

sawed a four page indictment pointing out just how the funds were misapplied in each office, how much replaced, and also how the scolding certain counts. Officials for being lax in their duties so as to not know of the misapplication of funds.

The Jury was finally dismissed by Judge Lindsey who thanked them for their efforts in what he termed "an unpleasant situation" and added, "I think the situation will be better from now on."

District Attorney Travis Shelton also thanked them on behalf of his office for their labors.

County Commissioner J. N. Foster also offered his thanks to the Grand Jury for their service to the county.

Here is the final list of counts brought by the Grand Jury in the now completed investigation into County misapplication of funds. Note that two are the same as were originally issued by the jury at its recent temporary adjournment; two are new indictments against a new man; and five are reworded indictments that will simply replace old indictments which will be dismissed.

NO. 1 —Indictment against O'Dell Smith for unlawfully and fraudulently paying and delivering to himself, by drawing a check on the county depository, the sum of \$380.90, which he did well know he was not entitled to.

NO. 2 —Indictment against Earl Cadenhead for unlawfully and fraudulently taking and misapplying by delivering to himself the sum of \$387.18 by check drawn on county depository; which he knew he was not entitled to.

NO. 3 —Indictment against T. W. (Joe) Pierce for taking \$524.85 in money and checks for his own benefit, with intent to deprive county of the value.

NO. 4 —Indictment against T. W. (Joe) Pierce for taking and converting to his own use \$259.66 in money and checks which he had on hand.

NO. 5 —Indictment against O'Dell Smith for taking and converting to his own use, by drawing check in the amount of \$300.00.

NO. 6 —Indictment against Earl Cadenhead for unlawfully delivering to O'Dell Smith a check in the sum of \$380.90 to which he knew he was not entitled.

NO. 7 —Indictment against Charlie Shaw, deceased, for unlawfully and fraudulently converting check for \$189.00 to his own use.

(This count will probably be dismissed in view of the fact that Mr. Shaw is deceased.)

NO. 8 —Indictment against Lewis R. (Luke) Cole for converting \$1,152.62 in money and checks which was in his possession to his own use. This bill, in three counts, only one of which may be charged against him, —misapplication of funds, embezzlement, and theft.

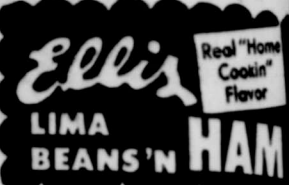
NO. 9 —Indictment returned against Lewis R. (Luke) Cole for converting sum of \$3,501.13 to his own use unlawfully. Again the bill is in three counts, only one of which he may be tried on, —misapplication of funds, embezzlement, and theft.
