"Fiesta Day," July 22, will be proclaimed by Colorado City Mayor Elmer Martin as the beginning day of the Frontier Days Celebration.

The celebration will also include the American Junior Rodeo Association Rodeo and parade and will last from July 22 through July 26.

"Fiesta Day" will begin at 9 a.m. and last through midnight.

Chamber Ambassadors, acting as a posse, will begin a roundup of all beardless men and all women not dressed in Western attire at that time.

Any clean-shaven man or any woman not dressed Western, and not having a permit, will be taken to the "calaboose" located in the center of the downtown area.

Those arrested will

have the choice of paying a \$5 fine or spending 15 minutes in the jail.

Permits are now on sale for \$2.50 each and may be purchased from the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce Office until 5 p.m., July 21.

This is all being done in the spirit of fun and anyone not desiring to participate will not be "arrested," Chamber

Manager Starr Greenblatt said.

Participating merchants will offer special sales and giveaways throughout the day. Many merchants will remain open longer than usual to accommodate late shoppers.

Registration for free prizes will be offered by participating merchants with drawings at 7 p.m. on the "Fiesta Square." A grand prize drawing for a stereo and speakers will take place, from all combined registrations, at 8:30 p.m.

Two contests will be held in conjunction with the festivities. A beard growing contest will be judged at 8 p.m. and trophies will be awarded for the longest, neatest, ugliest and sexiest beards.

The second contest will be for infants through four-years-of-age dressed Western. The Best Dressed "Pint Sized" Cowboy and Cowgirl will be awarded a trophy as a prize.

Entertainment during the evening's festivities will include a local band, "Magic," and narration by Fred Crawford.

A well-known Lubbock "air personality" will also participate in judging and narration during the evening.

Royalty Owners Petition Senator On 'Windfall' Tax

A petition addressed to Senator Lloyd Bentsen is on the counter of the Colorado Record Office and the Barber Law Offices.

The purpose of the petition is to allow all royalty owners to voice an opinion against the "Windfall Profits" Tax.

Attorneys Dell and Dan Barber will carry the petition to an open hearing in Austin Thursday.

The hearing is being conducted on legislation to exempt royalty owners from the "Windfall Profit" Tax.

This tax came out of much debate and discussion by United States government officials.

The "Windfall Profits" Tax was signed into law on April 2 by President Jimmy Carter.

The tax originally proposed was to place out federal price controls on domestically-produced crude oil.

As a part of Carter's plan, the "Windfall Profits" Tax was supposed to prevent oil companies from realizing an unearned bonanza from higher prices and to provide a source of funding for new federal energy programs.

Under the original proposal, most of the "Windfall" tax receipts were to be set aside in a special trust fund to pay for mass transit programs, low income energy assistance and a greatly expanded synthetic fuels program.

Many of the features of the original proposal were retained in the final bill, however, the bill which resulted after months of congressional debate, is significantly different from the original concept.

Projected revenue has swelled to almost double the original estimate, the tax burden on different types of oil and different types of producers has been al-

tered and significant changes have been made in how the mammoth "Windfall" tax will be spent.

The tax is essentially an excise tax levied on the difference between the controlled and decontrolled price of oil.

Dell Barber commented, "We are taking this petition to Austin as a public service and it will not cost the signers a thing, but in order to be effective, we need at least 1,000 signatures from royalty owners from this and surrounding countries."

He emphasized the fact that all a royalty owner need do is sign name and address to the petition.

A husband or rela-

tive may sign for another member of the family if they have permission to do so from the other party, he noted.

"It is not necessary to have a producing lease in order to sign the petition. Just owning the rights and the possibility that one day they may have a producing lease is enough," Dell Barber said.

"We would like to have a good representation and make a strong showing from Mitchell County," he said.

"We have until 5 p.m. Wednesday to gather the needed signatures. I encourage every royalty owner to join us in signing the petition," he said.

Selective Service System Registration Reborn

Young men between the ages of 18 and 20, born in 1960 or 1961, who are United States citizens or resident aliens must register with the Selective Service System.

Men born in 1960 will register during the week of July 21. Men born in 1961 will register during the week of July 28.

All registration will take place at the U.S. Post Office.

Identification is required when registering.

In an effort to expedite necessary paper work, persons born in the months of January, February and March will register on Monday. Persons born in April, May and June will register Tuesday. Persons born in July, August and September will register on Wednesday and persons born in October, November and December will register on Thursday.

Persons on active duty in the military are not required to register.

The purpose of the registration is to improve the ability to respond immediately in the time of need, according to the

Selective Service System.

The information form obtained from and turned-in to the Post Office will be put on file in Washington, D.C. A copy of the information will be returned to the person registering with an additional form to complete and return if any errors are made in the registration form.

A registration card will not be issued but a

verification letter will be mailed to each person registering.

No receipt will be issued at the Post Office at the time of registration.

Since the start of the All Volunteer Force in 1973, it has been in a "standby" position.

There are no plans at this time for a draft, according to the Selective Service System.

Low Water Crossing Is Possible

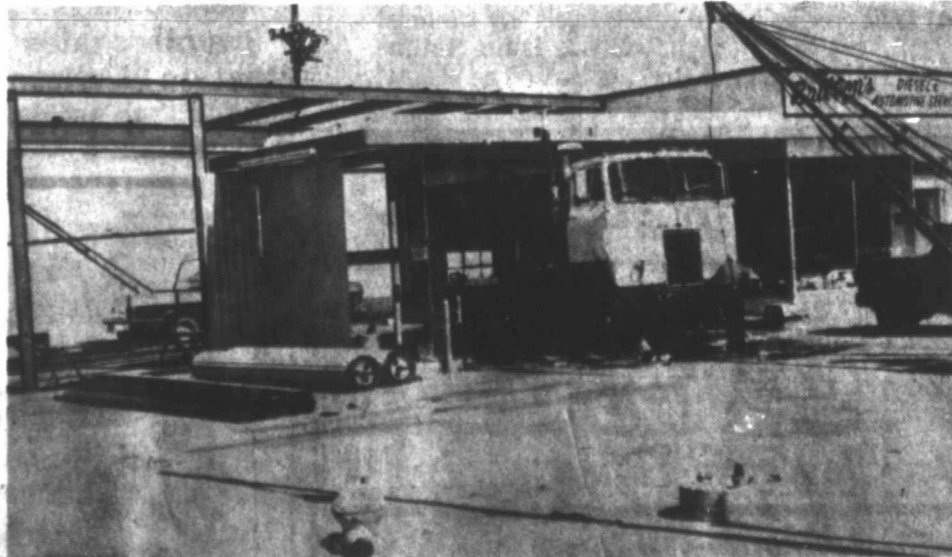
Mitchell County Commissioners will meet in regular session Monday at 1 p.m. in the County Courthouse and discuss a serious traffic problem on Interstate 20.

An informational item listed on the agenda includes review of the Accreditation Report recently made by the state in which the school was found to have no discrepancies.

A public hearing will be held July 28 at 7 p.m. in the administration building in order to set the budget for the coming year.

An additional item was listed on the agenda after a state auditor found an error which had been overlooked for some time.

A draft could not begin unless the Congress decides that it is needed. The purpose of the registration is to have the names and addresses of those who might be called first in the event a draft should become necessary, as in a national emergency.

In this event, draftees will be selected through a lottery based upon the date of your birth.

People selected for induction would be notified by mail.

In the event of a "draft" a local draft board would be established and consider any appeals.

Those who reach their 20th birthday in the calendar year of the draft will be the first group to be called. Others would be called as necessary, according to the Selective Service System.

The last person drafted in the United States was in 1972.

Several Mitchell County youths, eligible to register, were contacted and asked their opinions on the registration.

David Rivera commented, "I was ready for it and expect a draft to follow. I don't want to leave home, but I'm ready to go if I have to."

DaWayne Iglehart said, "It's something that's got to happen and I'm a little afraid, but if they call me, I will go because I am an American."

Dale McCombs said, "I hate to see the war come, but if it does, I'll be glad to serve my country."

Jeff Horton said, "With the government, you don't have a choice, guess I'll go."

Steve Walker commented, "It doesn't matter. As much as I like to hunt, I'd just as soon shoot Iranians anyway."

Rodney Wheeler said, "I don't think we ought to go, but if we have to, I will."

Mike Wilson, "I don't want to go, but I think they ought to have a draft."

In 1940, Life Magazine published an article about the first lottery draft number drawn.

Not unlike the youth of today, the draftees commented, "Thanks for the honor of being one of the first called, we're with you 100 per cent."

They also noted, "Although we are saddened by the thoughts of leaving families and jobs, members of the '158 Club' proclaim readiness to go to their country's defense and drink a toast to our future."

The number 158 was the first number drawn in the 1940 draft.

 seemed much cooler because of the breeze blowing in off of Lake Michigan.
 The reason for my visit there was to attend the International Convention of Lions Clubs. Some 40,000 people were there from all over the world and the opportunity to meet and talk with people from all over the world was a great treat and a rare opportunity.
 While I was there, I ran across several articles in the Chicago Tribune that I thought might be of interest to local farmers.
 One story was entitled, "Cotton's new kingdom is in Texas and California." The story related how cotton, once a great economic factor in the south and southeast, is almost a bygone era in that part of the

country with the Southwest, mainly Texas, and California taking over the bulk of the growing of cotton.
 The story noted that in 1979, only 250 acres of cotton were grown in Virginia and that after last year, Virginia's last cotton gin closed down and was moved to North Carolina.
 One of the main reasons for the shifting of the cotton kingdom was the boll weevil, smaller farms in the south and southeast and a number of economic factors that make it more economical to raise cotton in Texas and California.

For instance, the article written by Chris Bickers, states that "as late as 1950, for instance, the southeastern states—Alabama, Georgia, Florida, the Carolinas and Virginia—planted 3,945,000 acres of cotton, almost 21 per cent of the total national crop. The states of the Middle South—Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee and Missouri—planted 5,470,000 acres, a bit more than 30 per cent of the total crop. So in that year, the two regions which contain most of what we think of as the Old South accounted for better than half of all the cotton planted in this country.

"The proportion was far less last year. Southerners planted 638,000 acres in 1979, less than a sixth as much as they planted in 1950, and only about five per cent of the national crop. The Middle Southerners planted only 2,560,000 acres, less than half their 1950 plantings and less than 19 per cent of the national crop. The Old South's share of the cotton crop had dropped to less than a quarter."

That article relates that in 1979, the southwest had almost 60 per cent of the national cotton acreage and the Far West about 17 per cent.

The article noted that the prospects for continued high prices for cotton appeared good (I'm not sure where he got the information that cotton prices are high) and that cotton is more popular than ever around the world with world consumption of cotton having reached an all-time high with prices along with the demand.

The author noted that cotton may make a comeback in the south and southeast as cotton grown there is closer to the textile mills and due to the high

price of transportation, this would make up for some of the economic disadvantages in that portion of the nation.

I have the article in the office and everyone interested in reading it may come in and do so.

Another article in the same paper notes that "America is on the brink of a crisis in the loss of agricultural land that may soon undermine our ability to produce sufficient food for ourselves and other nations in our hungry world.

"Every day in the United States, four square miles of the nation's prime farmland are shifted to uses other than agriculture. Visualize a strip of land a half-mile wide stretching from New York to California. That's a million acres—the amount of prime farmland irreversibly lost to agriculture every year through urban sprawl.

Florida, producers of half the world's grapefruits and one-fourth of the world's oranges, will lose all of its unique and prime lands in less than 20 years if the current conversion rate continues. New Hampshire and Rhode Island also are destined to lose all of their prime agricultural land."

The article concludes with a warning, "Perhaps the greatest need of all is for public education. People must fully understand the irreplaceable value of prime farmlands, and the ominous meaning of the war between the bulldozer and the plow. When farmland goes, food goes. Asphalt is the land's last crop."

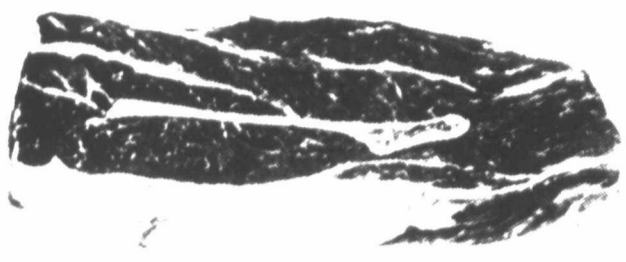

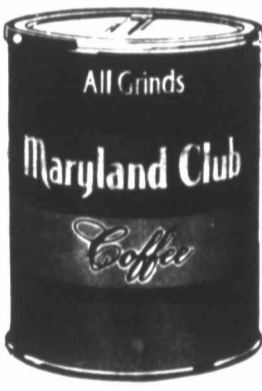
