Reports from the cooperative officers and management included the announcement that plans are being made to go to a one-party system with free service throughout the county. Further announcement of the new innovations will be announced later.

The cooperative is operating in the black, according to manager Thomas Wristen, and at the present time is operating with the lowest rates of any telephone cooperative in the area.

School Bus Law For Motorists

Austin — A new state law effective August 30 will no longer permit Texas motorists to stop and then pass a school bus which is loading or unloading children.

Col. Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said the new law, passed by the 62nd Legislature, applies in both cities and rural areas and requires motorists moving both directions on the same roadway with a school bus to stop and remain stopped as long as the flashing lights on the bus are in operation.

Under current law, which applies only in rural areas, drivers must stop for a stopped school bus, but may then proceed around it at a speed of not more than 10 miles per hour if safe to do so.

The new law will not require those vehicles on another roadway of a divided highway to stop, and stops are not required if the bus has stopped in a loading zone of a controlled access highway where pedestrians are not permitted to cross.

Speir noted that provisions of the new law will be strictly enforced to afford maximum protection to the school children of Texas.

Record Marijuana Crop "Harvested" Last Week

What is reported to be the largest haul of raw marijuana in Texas history was taken in north Coleman

County Tuesday, August 24, and destroyed by burning the following day.

Two van loads of marijuana plants weighed 2,750 pounds. Officers estimate

the wholesale price of the plants at \$275,000, and add that when refined and rolled the marijuana would have a retail value of \$1 million.

Charged and indicted by grand jury on Wednesday on possession of marijuana was James Clifford Moore, 32, of Balmorra, who had been employed as a cowboy on the Webb Ranch where the marijuana was found. He was released Wednesday afternoon on \$10,000 bond.

The news broke here early Tuesday afternoon when undercover narcotic agents of the DPS brought in Moore, turning him over to Sheriff Corky Chapman. The report is that the undercover agents had the field under surveillance since Monday night.

The field of marijuana, with stalks six to 10 feet high, covered three-fourths of an acre and was located in a creek bottom.

Early Wednesday afternoon the two vans of marijuana plants were taken to Sheriff Chapman's place, just north-east of Coleman, for burning. The plants were pulled from the vans, spread along the ground doused with diesel fuel and set afire.

Five narcotics agents out of Dallas, acting on a tip, found the field of marijuana and later arrested Moore. Additional help was required to clear the field and load the plants into vans. It is understood that the field was plowed under on Wednesday morning.

MAYOR PROCLAIMS SEPT. 5-11 4-H WEEK IN S. A. COMMUNITY

September 5 through 11 has been proclaimed 4-H week in Santa Anna by Mayor Thomas Wristen. The Santa Anna 4-H Club has planned special activities for each day of the coming week to promote interest in the local 4-H Club and its activities.

Final plans for the observance will be made tonight (Thursday) at the first regular session of the club. President Jimmy Benton will be in charge of the meeting which will begin at 8:15 p. m. at the Community Civic Center.

Initial plans for the 4-H emphasis week include Sunday—4-H Day; Monday—Health Day; Tuesday—Color Day; Wednesday—Display Day; Thursday—Heart Day; Friday—Clover Day; and Saturday—Agriculture and Homemaking Day.

The official proclamation, signed by Mayor Wristen, reads as follows: "BE IT RESOLVED, that the week of September 5th through 11th, 1971 be officially declared as Santa Anna 4-H Club Week."

The Santa Anna 4-H Club has been one of the most active in the area in the past years and the group of local youngsters are anticipating another good year.

The two-day total at the William Brown farm in the Buffalo community was two inches and another two inches was reported in the Plainview area.

At the Calvin Campbell home in the Liberty community, one-half inch of rain was measured on Friday and another one and one-quarter on Sunday.

Rain in the Trickham, Whon, Rockwood area was scattered with amounts varying from place to place.

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In Our Opinion

LEGISLATION known as "The Rural Job Development Act of 1971" has been proposed and has created some attention from legislators since the plight of the big cities due to the influx of people from rural areas has caused the cities some problems.

Many cities are becoming aware of the fallacy of trying to attract people from rural areas just for the sake of growth. As their populations increase their ability to provide jobs for them becomes less and less, so now ways and means of sending them back to the farm—or to small communities—is being studied. So far there has been no real success, but the job development program would provide tax incentives for new employment-providing enterprise locating in non-metropolitan areas. This method is supported by much of the business community, and there are two reasons for it. First, most businesses are looking for anything that would cut their tax bite, and second, in many instances, with the exception of large manufacturing concerns, management would not have the problem with union labor. Usually the labor force in the small communities are not organized, and although still controlled by the minimum wage law, there would not be the usual annual round of contract negotiations and strikes so numerous in the metropolitan areas.

Also, the rural communities look with favor on the law because it would tend to keep their labor force at home and offer some incentive for their young people to stay where they are, rather than migrating to the cities seeking employment. It used to be that each community had something to offer many of the graduating high schoolers if they were not going to attend college, and some incentive for the college grad to return home after he got his degree. But now, with good transportation, locals too often fail to support local merchants, with the mistaken idea that they can save money by going to the larger places to buy. However, when they count transportation costs, it often costs them more to do so. That in turn, cuts down on the employment possibilities of the local merchants and, in turn, hurts the community as a whole.

If someone could come up with a plan to help get industry and employment back to the rural areas, everyone would profit. The cities could be relieved of some of their congestion and unemployment problems, and the rural areas could build back toward what they once were.

Many people who now live in metropolitan areas would much rather live in the more sparsely settled country-side, but because there are no jobs available they cannot. However, if rural jobs were available they would move out and would enjoy living that much more.

It is said that the Treasury Department opposes an ykind of tax incentives for the project, but bureaus, like politicians, have a way of changing their minds when the pressure of public opinion is brought to bear.

AS THE NATION GROWS more socialistic, day after day, with more government controls, more red tape, more federal and state reports that businessmen and individuals have to fill out and return, under penalty of some law or other, the ones who are supposed to benefit from all this get less and less.

Some examples of this tell the story:
Social Security beneficiaries receive well below the income needed by the millions of elderly who must depend on those payments to live. While those paying in are paying more and more, the recipients are getting no more. The sad fact is that administrative costs continue to climb and some of us wonder if we will ever see a dime of the money we have paid in. Yet it is mandatory that we pay in every year.

Recent changes in the Medicare-Medicaid program also puts a burden on the old people as well as on the doctors and pharmacists. It allows but two prescriptions a month with a maximum cost of \$12, and should someone require more than that, a board must approve it—each time a prescription is filled. In other words, one with long-term medication must have each refill approved before he can get his medicine. He could die in the meantime! Of course the pharmacists are up in arms, because the red tape will eventually kill the program like it does every one it gets into. Yet at the same time the administration of this program will cost more than the program itself. What is the future of such stuff?

Recently a business man kept track of the time he paid a bookkeeper and the type of work he did. At the rate of \$100 a week, the bookkeeper spent 60 per cent of his time keeping government records and filling out government forms, while he spent 40 per cent of his time working for the business man. In other words, the business man spent \$60 a week paying for a government employee with no return to himself. That above and beyond his tax bill.

Some of us don't know just how much taxes we are paying!



Austin — The Legislative Redistricting Board, its hands tied by a court order, has called for a staff research toward reapportionment of both the Texas House and Senate.

If the Board were permanently enjoined from action, the thorny reapportionment chore may be handed back to the Legislature in a special session this fall. Board was created in 1948 to redistrict where a legislature fails to do so in its first regular session after a decennial census.

Day before the five-member panel was to meet and begin work on Senate realignment (a task left undone by the Legislature this year), an Austin judge entered a temporary restraining order. At the same time, Judge Herman Jones set a hearing for September 2 on a petition for an injunction.

Rep. Fred Head of Henderson filed the suit to stop Board action, contending 1970 census figures are not yet all in, and that reapportionment should wait until the 1973 Legislature.

On August 2 Judge Jones declared the House version of reapportionment by the Legislature this year unconstitutional. Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has promised an appeal to the Texas Supreme Court.

Meanwhile, Martin who was named temporary chairman of the redistricting Board in absence, left a message expressing hope that the panel will begin work "at the earliest possible date" on House reapportionment in event the High Court rules that is its duty.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, another member of the Board, also called for early staff attention to a House redistricting bill, although both he and Martin agreed Senate reapportionment is the first objective.

Board has 20 separate plans already submitted for recarving the Senate's 31 district in line with the 1970 census and federal court rulings of substantially equal population for each.

"FREEZE" BRINGS SUMMER CHILL — The President's wage-price freeze continued to be the closest-watched and fastest-changing news event at the state capital.

Gov. Preston Smith's proclamation to state agencies to disregard the presidential order and place pay raises for state employees in effect September 1 was quickly invalid by Attorney General Martin.

Martin then went to Washington to plead for exceptions for state workers and school teachers who had been assured raises by legislative action and (in the case of teachers) valid contract well before the freeze order date, August 15.

Meanwhile, Texas State Employees Association filed a formal petition for exemption of 60,000 state employees from the order and hinted at court action if refused.

Teachers kept close watch on Washington announcements to see if subsequent federal agency rulings would permit their raises covered by contracts signed prior to August 15 to be granted September 1.

INFO OFFICES OPENED — Internal Revenue Service announced opening of nine offices in southern Texas to answer questions, study complaints and investigate alleged violations of the wage-price freeze.

Offices are located at IRS headquarters in Austin, Beau-

mont, Waco, Corpus Christi, El Paso, San Antonio, Houston, Harlingen and McAllen.

Questions on new import duty surcharge will be referred to the Office of Customs in Houston.

LABOR DAY TOLL PREDICTED — Fifty-two may lose their lives in traffic accidents during the long Labor Day weekend, predicts the Department of Public Safety.

If Texans can't drive more safely than that, Governor Smith told his traffic Safety Committee, serious consideration may have to be given to declaring a state of emergency on three-day holidays and calling out the National Guard to supplement police activities.

Smith's committee reviewed plans for an intensive Labor Day Safety campaign.

DPS Director Col. Wilson E. Speir urged motorists to refrain from drinking while driving, to avoid fatigue and to modify driving speed in accord with heavy traffic conditions.

All uniformed officers of DPS will be on highways Friday through Monday to enforce traffic laws. Maximum use will be made of radar and breath-testing devices. DPS special reports on fatal accidents will continue.

AG OPINIONS — Public junior colleges may charge tuition in amounts greater than rates specified by the Legislature and may authorize additional fees, Attorney General Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

- Lessee or operator of a natural gas well on a state tract may not legally deduct from royalty due the state a portion of the cost of production, gathering, sale or delivery of gas.

- Provision that an owner may record and use more than one brand or mark to identify his livestock remains in effect.

- State employees can travel first class on airlines if no tourist class seats are available — and are entitled to out-of-state travel expenses up to \$35 a day.

- Two bills encompassing types of service now credited under state retirement system are constitutional and not in conflict.

- Legislation relating to eminent domain proceedings does not violate constitutional requirements of deposit of money. Bill aimed to provide condemnors "full benefits at any stage of litigation process short of a final adjudication."

CHILD COUNCIL FORMED — Governor has established Council on Early Childhood Development to aid children under six.

Council will study early childhood programs and develop plans for strengthening them. It also will train parents

and potential parents in the "art" of child care and guidance and implement new programs for education, health and social services to children.

APPOINTMENTS — Dr. James Richard Dolby of Waco was named acting director of community services for the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

Lutcher B. Simmons of Orange is new general counsel of Texas Water Development Board, effective September 15.

Governor Smith appointed Mrs. Barbara Tomme of Fort Worth to the Advisory Council for Language Handicapped Children.

Smith also announced these recent appointments:

- Lyndon Olson of Waco to Brazos River Authority Board of Directors.
- Joe A. Myers of Stockdale and L. B. Davis Jr. of Longview (reappointments) to State Board of Morticians.
- John M. Scott of Fort Worth (reappointment), Henry E. English of Dallas and Avery Mays of Dallas to the Trinity River Authority.

POOR DISTRICTS TO GET AID — School districts with the most children from low-income families will get \$822,456 in additional federal aid under new grant allotments announced last week.

A total of 641 districts are eligible for aid to finance teacher hire, materials purchase and medical services. Allotments range from \$69,995 for Houston to \$31 for Hamby district, Taylor County.

SHORT SNORTS

Motorists no longer can stop and then pass a school bus loading or unloading children under a law effective August 30.

Bowhunters will get a special chance at deer, javelina and wild hogs during Aransas National Wildlife Refuge archery season September 17-30. William E. Pool has resigned as executive director of State Bar of Texas.

State (in San Antonio North Expressway case) is testing a federal court ruling that it can not build highway with its own money if application for federal assistance is rejected.

Thirty-seven applications to sell \$33.3 million in securities were filed with State Securities Board last week.

Albert W. Brisbin of Washington, D.C., succeeds B. Frank White as Internal Revenue Service regional commissioner for an eight-state area with headquarters in Dallas.

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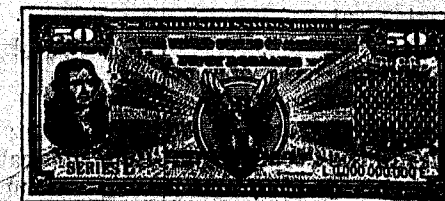

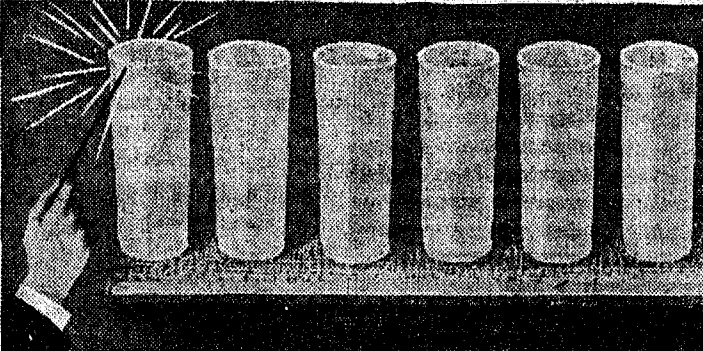

Would you like to make a set of musical glasses?



You may have seen someone set up a number of glasses—each filled with a different amount of water—on a table. Then, by striking the glasses with a stick, he plays a number of familiar tunes. If you have, you surely wondered how it was done, and you may have wanted to do it yourself.

You can make your own set of musical glasses by following these simple instructions.

Here is what you will need:

1. Six drinking glasses
2. Water
3. A pencil

Set the six glasses in a row. Fill the first one with $\frac{1}{2}$ inch of water; fill the second glass with 1 inch of water, the third one with $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches of water, and so on. The sixth glass should have 3 inches of water in it.

Now use the pencil to strike each glass about $\frac{1}{2}$ inch from the top. Listen to the different tones produced by the glasses—because each glass has a different length of air column left in it, each one will sound different.

Experiment with different amounts of water in the glasses until you can play a tune on the glasses. If you have a test-tube rack and eight glass test tubes, you can make a kind of xylophone. The eight test tubes can be filled with the right amounts of water to produce the notes of the musical scale.

With more glasses, you can make a double set, and you and a friend can learn to play duets to entertain others.

ZINC DEFICIENCY IN SORGHUM — THE SYMPTOMS AREN'T ALWAYS CLEAR

When it comes to diagnosing zinc deficiency in the soil, sorghum growers have to be pretty good plant dieticians. That's because crop hunger symptoms may not appear until it's too late to do anything about them!

Though sorghum requires only a very small amount of zinc to thrive, a certain level of this vital micronutrient must be maintained at all times for good crop production. Without adequate available zinc, the vigor of the plant is reduced, growth is slower, maturity is delayed, yields are cut, and quality suffers.

How can so minor an element have so major an effect? Because zinc is related to the normal use of carbon within plants; it is needed for protein metabolism. It forms part of the enzyme systems which regulate plant growth.

And, since zinc is concentrated in the sorghum plant where growth is greatest — in the shoot tips, nodes and seeds — a vigorously growing crop requires more zinc than one which is developing slowly.

When symptoms of zinc deficiency do appear in sorghum, they generally show up as pairs of oblong yellow areas on the side part of the leaf blade, between the midrib and the margins. If the deficiency is severe, there may be two or three pairs of these spots, which forecast the probability of greatly reduced grain and forage yields.

In some hybrid or parent lines, however, it is possible to get tremendous yield response to zinc — even when deficiency

symptoms never appear!

To overcome these two kinds of deficiency — obvious and hidden — more and more growers are turning to zinc chelate such as Sequestrene to clear up or prevent zinc hunger. "Farmer's Lung" In City Offices

Breathing in organic dust can set off a respiratory disorder called "farmer's lung." The disease is not exclusively rural by any means.

Spore-laden dust from moldy hay can trigger the disorder. So can the droppings of birds such as pigeons. But more and more cases have been reported recently among office workers.

The disease is on the increase.

Exhaustive investigations at the University of Wisconsin Medical Center have uncovered mold growing in some warm, wet air conditioners. The spores were spewed from the air ducts throughout entire office buildings.

The spores penetrate deep into the lungs and inflame the area where the exchange of oxygen and carbon dioxide occurs. Eventually, the body becomes starved for oxygen. The first symptoms resemble pneumonia — chills, fever, cough, and especially, shortness of breath. The much more serious chronic phase can lead to a breathlessness so severe that the person cannot walk across the room. Loss of weight is characteristic of both acute and chronic phases.

Continued exposure to the offending substance can lead to progressive lung damage and eventual lung failure. Better ventilation can help remove the substances; and sometimes it is possible to wet down moldy material. Farmers who find it difficult to avoid exposure to moldy

hay often take special steroids to ward off the disease.

At the University of Wisconsin, researchers have seen conditions which are expressions of the same basic disease mechanism. Maple bark stripper's disease, pigeon breeder's disease, bagassosis, and mushroom worker's disease are some of the exotic names. But the Wisconsin clinicians put them all together under this single term: hypersensitivity pneumonitis. Pneumonitis means an inflammation of the lungs.

Governor Smith cited the Texas Highway Department for more than 40 years of leadership in highway beautification and safety, service and efficiency of the highway system.

He described the Highway Department as "The State's Largest Gardener" which plants more trees, wildflowers and ornamental shrubs than any other organization in the State.

Governor Smith urged "all citizens to lend their total support to the highway program and the Texas Highway Department."

Highway Department installations across the State will stage special open house and other special ceremonies to mark the observance.

Highway Week in Texas has been under sponsorship of the Texas Good Roads Association since the first such observance a decade ago.

All residents of Coleman County may obtain answers to questions on operation and interpretation of the Presidential order of August 15 on prices, rents, wages and salaries from the Coleman County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Office, according to Rankin McIver, Chairman of the County ASC Committee.

County ASCS offices all over the United States have been

chosen as information centers to answer questions from all citizens on President Nixon's Executive Order which is designed to stem inflation and strengthen the national economy.

The Coleman County ASCS office is receiving official answers to questions concerning the President's action, and any person in Coleman County who wants or needs precise information should get in touch with the County office, McIver said.

"Ours and all ASCS offices throughout the nation will function as information centers in all locations outside of highly urbanized areas," McIver said.

County ASCS offices are not to handle complaints or appeals, he said. They will serve only to provide official information. Persons with complaints will register them with the most convenient district or sub-district office of

the Internal Revenue Service. "Neither will interpretations or guesses be made by the ASCS county office people. They will answer only those questions for which they have been supplied answers. If they don't know the answer to a specific question, they will say so. If a member of the public wants the county office to obtain an answer, the question will go by phone or mail to the nearest IRS district office," Rankin said.

Normal function of ASCS county offices is to administer farm action programs of the U. S. Department of Agriculture on the local level. County Committee Chairman McIver said ASCS service to farmers will continue without interruption.

"Our county office people welcome the opportunity to serve their country and are happy to make the extra effort in this crucial period," he said.

The 37 cents per \$100 valuation includes 15 cents into the road and bridge fund and the remaining 22 cents to the common and jury funds. The tax rate is lower than in adjoining counties and is hardly sufficient to defray necessary county expenses.

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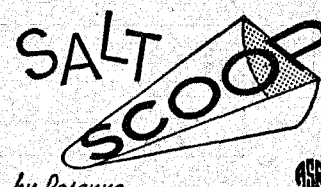

Today we think of salt as being readily available, abundant and inexpensive. It was not always that way.

Centuries ago the value of salt was so great that it was used as a medium of exchange nearly everywhere. Special rations of salt given Roman soldiers, called *salarium argenti*, led to the term "salary."

Wars have been lost because armies lacked salt. During Napoleon's retreat from Moscow, soldiers' wounds would not heal because their systems lacked salt. Thousands died.

In 1777, Lord Howe captured General Washington's stock of salt, a severe loss. During the War of 1812, salt imported from Europe was difficult to obtain and cost \$5 a bushel.

Production begun at Syracuse freed the North of Civil War salt worries. On the other hand, by 1863 the South could not buy salt at any price. Sources in Virginia and along the Louisiana gulf coast had been lost.

Availability of salt again became a problem during both the first and second World Wars, especially in Europe. At the end of World War II, when every pound counted on the Berlin airlift, salt was carried in by the ton. During the war, the salt industry was rated one of the U.S.' five most critical.

HOLIDAY TOLL SET AT 52 BY DPS DIRECTOR

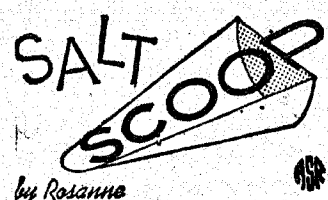

If your memory stretches back far enough, you might recall something called a "depression plant." It also was known as a coal plant, coal coral or kitchen coral. But it is best known as a salt flower. They were, and still are, fun and inexpensive to grow. Children especially like to watch the crystals appear and enlarge. To make one, here is all you need:

1 object (clinker charcoal briquet, piece of coal, brick or sponge)
6 tbsps. non-iodized Morton table salt
6 tbsps. household bluing
6 tbsps. water
1 tsp. ammonia

Mix the ingredients and pour over the object in a wide dish. When the object is saturated, add colored ink, fabric dye or food coloring for effect. Try several colors, unmixed. (Do not use iodine.) Rub dish edges with petrolatum to prevent the flower from growing over the sides. Mix and add another recipe to continue growth. Keep flower moist.

How does it grow? The solution is absorbed by the object, then evaporates upon reaching the air, leaving the salt behind. The bluing is a key, as it causes salt to crystallize out on the corners and edges of other irregular-shaped crystals rather than on the sides of cubic crystals.

Brands, Marks To Be Recorded After August 30

Livestock owners of Texas need to record all livestock brands and marks with the County Clerk's office after August 30, according to the new brand law passed by the last session of the Texas Legislature.

Under the new law all the brands now recorded will expire six months after the effective date of September 1.

Persons now using a registered brand or mark must re-register within this six month period, which ends February 29, 1972. After this time any unrecorded brand becomes available on a first-come basis. The brands and marks must be re-recorded every 10 years.

Periodic re-registration are enacted to clear the records of brands no longer being used.
