Storm Damage Is Hundred Million, Robinson Says Smith Says He's For Principle Of McNary-Haugen Bill

Democrat Nominee Opens Fight For Victory In Omaha

Scores Coolidge and Hoover For Stand On Farm Relief and Promises System Of Farm Commissions.

SAYS HE WILL MAKE CLEAN-CUT CAMPAIGN

Charges Republicans Have Violated Their Platform Promises and Deceived The Farmer.

(By Associated Press)
OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 18.—Attacking the republican party, President Coolidge, and his opponent, Herbert Hoover, for their stand on farm relief, Gov. Smith in the heart of the grain belt to open his speech making campaign for the presidency, declared tonight he stood for the "principle" of the McNary-Haugen bill, twice vetoed by President Coolidge.

Is Matter of Method
"What remains of the McNary-Haugen bill is a mere matter of method," the democratic nominee asserted in an address prepared for delivery in the auditorium here, "and I do not limit myself to the exact mechanics and method embodied in that bill."

Just before making this declaration, Governor Smith, in his prepared text:

"Various people have attempted to misrepresent and confuse my attitude with respect to the McNary-Haugen bill. I do not propose to leave the slightest doubt in anybody's mind on that subject."

Democrat For Principle
"As I read the McNary-Haugen bill, its fundamental purpose is to establish an effective control of the sale of exportable surplus with the cost imposed upon the commodity benefited."

"For that principle the democratic platform squarely stands, and for that principle I squarely stand. Mr. Hoover stands squarely opposed to this principle, which the farmer could get the benefit of."

Sullivan Given Two Years For Forgery

Pleads Guilty to Charge Of Theft of Checks; Wanted At Other Towns On Same Charge.

Jack Sullivan, on trial charged with forgery, was found guilty by a jury in 90th district court yesterday afternoon and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

Sullivan pleaded guilty to the charges. The defendant is wanted at Fairview, Tahoka, Levelland, and other South Plains points on similar charges. He will be tried at these places before his sentence is begun.

Charged With Theft of Checks
Sullivan was arrested several weeks ago by county officers after it was charged that he stole some company checks from a community store near here and was passing them in various towns.

Clark M. Sullivan is presiding in the criminal case this week and District Attorney Durwood Bradley represents the state in the prosecution.

Andy McDonald Post \$25 For Recovery of Car

Eighteen Contracts For \$2,347,977 Of Road Work Are Let

Proposal To Extend Highway 53 Is Referred To Highway Engineer; Contracts Are Largest Let.

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Sept. 18.—Eighteen road contracts involving \$2,347,977, bringing the total for the two-day session to \$2,812,921, were let today by the state highway commission.

In addition, the commission ordered inspection of new routes and proposed designations of state highways in a number of sections and gave state and federal aid to projects in Hardeman and Tyler counties.

Largest Amount Ever Let
This was the largest amount of contracts ever let at a single session.

The commission took no action on its controversy with the board of control concerning most of the half-million dollar purchase of road machinery recommended by the commission.

Among counties receiving favorable consideration from the commission:

Local Proposal Referred
Lubbock, Terry, Gaines, Andrews and Ector—referred to State Highway Engineer proposal to extend Highway 13 from Brownfield to Highway 1 at Odessa via Seminole and Andrews.

Donnell—Referred to State Highway Engineer designation from Catara to La Salle county line.

Harden—Allotted one-third of state and one-third federal aid for grading and drainage structures on 21 miles of Highway 51.

Contracts Let
Jim Wells county—Limestone base course from Duval county line to Aliso on I-3-2 miles of Highway 12-A. Hedges construction company.

SECOND GROUP VISITS NORTHWEST THURSDAY

Eleven Towns Are Visited In Tour; Much Progress Is Noted In Section; All Plan to Attend Fair.

Thirty cars loaded with the Lubbock High School band and other Lubbock Fair boosters cut out a slice of the South Plains yesterday and carried a message of good will and information from Lubbock and the Panhandle South Plains Fair to thousands of citizens of that section of the Plains.

Tom A. White, general chairman of the booster trips, headed the delegation that made the first of a series of four good will crusades.

Start Second Trip Today
With the dust barely settled on roads to the east and north, Edgar Trueman and his committee will be out early today to sign up citizens to go on the second trip that will be run to the northwest and west tomorrow.

The boosters who returned late yesterday afternoon, third and weary, as well as dusty, from the last jaunt over the east and north Plains, reported a hearty welcome in every town, ranging from the turning out of school at Lordsburg, to an apple feast at Abernathy.

Tell Of Fair Plans
Speakers from Lubbock told the thousands of people in the eleven towns about plans for the Fifteenth Annual Panhandle South Plains fair that will be held here October 1 to 6, inclusive.

"Prepare to exhibit your products, bring all of your family, this is your fair," read the circulars distributed by the section of the "Show Window of the Plains" and calling attention to six big days with rabbit races, fire works, free acts, Cotton.

Airplanes Search For Ship's Crew

Seventeen Believed Lost As Steamer Is Yanked Beneath Depths; Five Survive Two Days On Raft.

OWEN SOUND, Ont., Sept. 18.—Airplanes flew above Georgian Bay in Lake Huron today in vain search for more survivors of the cattle ship Manasco, which sank as though yanked beneath the stormy waters by some mysterious monster of the deep.

Five survivors were recovering in a hospital, saved after pitching on a leaking raft for two days and a half. One member of the crew was known to be dead, and 17 others were believed to have been lost.

Had Cattle on Board
The Manasco, converted passenger ship formerly known as the Macanese, had made its last regular trip for the season, but was pressed into service for a special trip to transport 40 head of cattle from West Bay, Manitoulin Island to Owen Sound. There was a crew of 21, Donald Wallace, driver in charge of the cattle, and his friend George Lambert completing the personnel.

Boat Sinks Suddenly
Early Saturday a storm was encountered, but the boat rode easily.

MAY SET NEW RECORD

September Building Shows Promise of Big Total

That the month of September will be a record month in the way of building activity was promised this week as the permits yesterday totaled almost \$12,000.

The permits which have maintained a record pace throughout the year have increased steadily throughout the month of September. The total for the month now stands above the \$100,000 mark with thirty-nine permits. Five hundred sixty-two permits have been issued this year for a total of \$2,898,238.

Yesterday's permits were to R. H. McCauley for the construction of a brick veneer house at 2102 20th street and to C. L. Gunn for the construction of a residence at 2321 8th street for M. S. Gunn.

Enrollment Of Lubbock Schools Is Increased 135 Students During Week

System Experiences Greatest Era Of History

Lubbock's public school enrollment has reached unprecedented heights with the addition of 135 new registrations since school opened September 5, it was announced late yesterday by M. H. Duncan, superintendent of the city schools.

More Than 1927
The city's total enrollment now stands at the 4204 mark, 1000 higher than the corresponding enrollment of a year ago, and 500 more than the highest total enrollment at any one time during the school term last year.

This substantial increase in enrollment gave promise of the 13 city schools reaching the 5000 mark for the year which was predicted early this month by Superintendent Duncan. Total enrollment for the entire previous school term was 4069, only 400 above the present enrollment.

Has Largest Senior Class
More than 250 seniors are enrolled in the high school here, promising the largest graduating class in the history of the school.

With the exception of the four outlying ward schools, the Mexican and the negro school, all of the city schools have reported a considerable increase above the initial enrollment.

Late registrations brought the enrollments to the following mark: high school, 900; junior high 698; central ward 534; Depew 625; George M. Hunt 975; E. Carter 507; Sanders 175.

HOOVER RETURNS
G. O. P. Nominee Completes First Eastern Invasion

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18. (P)—Herbert Hoover returned here tonight after two days of campaigning in northern New Jersey where he made his first invasion of the industrial East in a tour that carried him through a score of more towns.

Is Killed Stalling
Lt. Williams of Detroit one of the "Three Musketeers" who came here to thrill massed thousands at the Mine field national air races, was killed while stalling before the crowd.

A formation of planes led by Colonel Lindbergh, who filled in for the dead aviator throughout last week, dropped overhead as the crash was carried to the grave. Flowers were dropped as taps sounded over the casket.

Continued Search
Meanwhile police of Western Canada were hunting Gordon Stuart Northcott, 26, and his mother, Mrs. Louise Northcott, to arrest them on murder warrants after Los Angeles officers continued to find asserted instruments of death on the Northcott chicken ranch near Riverside.

Two more axes, stained, police said, with blood, were uncovered in the cellar of the Northcott home, today.

HAS ACTIVE DAY

Four Pleas of Guilty Are Entered in Court

Yesterday was an active day in the Lubbock county court as four pleas of guilty were heard by County Judge Charles Nordyke.

Jack Frost pleaded guilty to a charge of theft of less than \$50 and was sentenced to twenty days in jail and fined \$5 and costs. Frost was arrested several weeks ago in El Paso and charged with the theft of \$27 from the cash drawer of a El Paso filling station.

J. W. Bailey was fined \$25 and costs on a charge of aggravated assault after a plea of guilty had been entered. He was sentenced also to five days in the county jail.

Democrat Vice-Presidential Choice Returns From Stricken Area; Death Toll Mounts; Food Riots On In Rico

Deaths In Area Will Total Near 400 Mark. Red Cross Man Says; Georgia Hit But Wind Dies Down.

THOUSANDS STARVING IN PORTO RICO ISLE

Rescue Workers Continue Efforts to Save Off Death and Starvation in West Indies.

(By Associated Press)
JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 18.—Returning from the Palm Beach storm area, Senator Joe Robinson, democratic vice presidential nominee said today property damage in that section was being estimated at between \$75,000,000 and \$100,000,000.

He declared relief workers had told him that in West Palm Beach alone between 2500 and 4000 people were homeless and are being cared for in hotels and school houses and other public buildings which had withstood the force of the hurricane.

Section-wide Movement For Better Poultry Moves Up Another Step; To Be Active This Year.

Completing one of the important steps in the movement for better poultry on the South Plains the charter for the South Plains Poultry association was granted yesterday by the state, according to Associated Press dispatches received here last night. The charter application has been before the state for the past several weeks.

Is Outgrowth of Sentiment
The application for the charter was the outgrowth of section-wide movement for a centralized and closely organized poultry marketing association similar to those in California and Texas points. A series of meetings were held here, attended by farmers and business men, in the interest of the work and the organization of the association, resulted.

The association has no capital stock and the incorporators are listed as E. L. Hicks, Douglas Pounds and J. W. Berry.

Will Be Active
County Agent D. F. Eaton, one of the strong workers for the association could not be reached last night in regards to plans for the association's work this winter. He has stated, in the past, however, that active work in the association will be carried on during the coming season.

LET PIPE CONTRACT
\$2,000,000 Line To Be Laid From West Texas Fields

NEW YORK, Sept. 18. (P)—Contract for laying the 10 and 12 inch pipeline which the Texas Pipe Line company will build at a cost of more than \$2,000,000, has been awarded to Smith Brothers of Dallas. It will have 120 miles of 10-inch pipe and 470 miles of 12-inch. The pipe is moving out of Youngstown from Youngstown sheet and tube mills. Work starts October 1. The line will tap pools in Pecos, Winkler, Crane and Upton counties.

By SISTER MARY
BREAKFAST—Cantaloupe, cereal, cream, creamed fresh beef, crisp bread toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Corn a la Creole, lettuce sandwiches, peach custard, milk, tea.

DINNER—Veal stew with dumplings, fried summer squash, fresh pear and cheese ball salad, elderberry pie, milk, coffee.

Corn a la Creole.
Six ears corn, 1 small onion, 2 green peppers, 3 tomatoes, 2 tablespoons butter or olive oil, salt and pepper.

Cut corn from cob. Mince onion. Remove seeds and white fibre from peppers and mince. Peel and dice tomatoes. Melt butter in a frying pan and add onion. Cook 10 minutes. Add remaining vegetables, cover and cook 30 minutes. Season with salt and pepper and serve on toast with slices of crisp broiled bacon.

If oil is used in place of butter more salt will be needed in seasoning. And if the corn is not freshly picked, 1 teaspoon sugar should be added with corn.

An old gray farmhouse with a built on lean-to sagging into an old-fashioned garden of peonies and phlox, cosmos and zinnias, huddles in the midst of a smart summer colony I know.

One wonders how old Farmer West has managed to hold on, for golf greens and tennis courts and club houses back right up to the back doors of the old gray house.

But in the heart of the sophisticated playground, Old Man West goes serenely on his way, tilling his hundred acres of rich black loam, driving his plows to town, scorning to use an auto except for "gadding," wearing his tattered straw hat and soiled overalls, carrying in his pockets of milk, all undaunted by men in the most swaggy golf clothes and blazers.

swimming and canoeing and availing and using his world of shore and lake and flowered green meadows for nothing, but a playground for grotesquely "thrilling" games.

Real estate men have offered Old Man West enough money for his farm so that he could never admit to touch a spade or hoe or plough to his black mucky acres.

But they can't fool him. He knows that the old gray house with its 75-year-old New England doorway would be torn down or "dolled up" into a modern club house. He knows that his black rich land would no longer grow corn and potatoes and wheat and oats, but would be made into tennis courts and golf courses and "allotted" into 40-foot wide pieces of land, selling at more a foot than Old Man West's milk check is for a whole month.

"But what'd I do with myself?" he asks. "Sure I could live on the income. But where'd I live and what'd my job be? I'm only 65 and aim to keep a-going till I'm 80."

And the realtors talk to him of "nice, modern little houses in town" where he can raise chickens and have a garden, and Old Man West only says, "But this is my home and my father's and grand-

father's before me."

The real estate men just can't get it at all. Here's an old man going on 65 years old, rising at dawn, feeding stock, plowing and reaping and fighting for every dollar of profit, when by the mere process of giving up his land he could live in leisure and luxury and ease for the rest of his days.

Dealing as they do with this modern day's rapid exchange of property, with houses as investments and not homes, they have no understanding of Old Man West's feeling of identity with his sweet cherry trees that shade the mossed old roof, with the flowering quince and surmount that top the living room window pane, with the green hidden bed of valley lilies that his daughter Kate planted one spring before she died, and with the richest field of all that yields the largest, yellowest grain of any field in the country.

And the summer women cannot understand Mr. West whom they never have seen in anything but her crispy starched blue and white housegown, who raises garden things for the summer people, looks after hundreds of chickens, makes butter, feeds 15 people three times a day, works in her own flower garden in her spare moments, but who seems to have no envy of them and their ways.

The Wests know the glory of their own home and their own job, that's all.

Another misnomer convention is "Always play through strength." Assume that you are second hand and have the lead on the third round. Dummy's remaining cards are:

Spades 8 6 5
Hearts A Q
Diamonds A K Q J
Clubs K J

Following this convention literally you would lead through the strongest suit, diamonds. But east may be holding the Ace-Queen of clubs. If you lead a diamond, the declarer will probably be delighted for it will give him an opportunity to discard losing clubs on the winning diamonds in the dummy.

Before leading through the dummy, always attempt to visualize your partner's hand and then lead in a manner which will not enable the declarer to capture your partner's possible winning cards. If you cannot draw an inference as to your partner's holdings, lead through broken suits such as A X X, A J X, A Q X, K X X, Q X X, K Q X, K J X or K 10 X.

FORT WORTH, Sept. 18. (P)—Proration order now in effect in the Winkler county field will be extended for an additional six months when the first six months order expires on November 5. Chairman Gilmore of the Texas railroad commission announced at the conclusion of a special hearing in Fort Worth Tuesday.

The hearing was called and held on the question of reducing the present production allowance from Winkler county from 175,000 barrels per day to 150,000 barrels per day as recommended by the operators' advisory committee.

After a conference with his colleagues at the hearing, Commissioner Terrell, Chairman Gilmore also announced that the 25,000 barrel cut would also be ordered, effective October 1. Extension of the general proration order, which allows changes in the amount of production allowed as circumstances indicate from time to time, was unanimously urged by all the operators in attendance at the hearing.

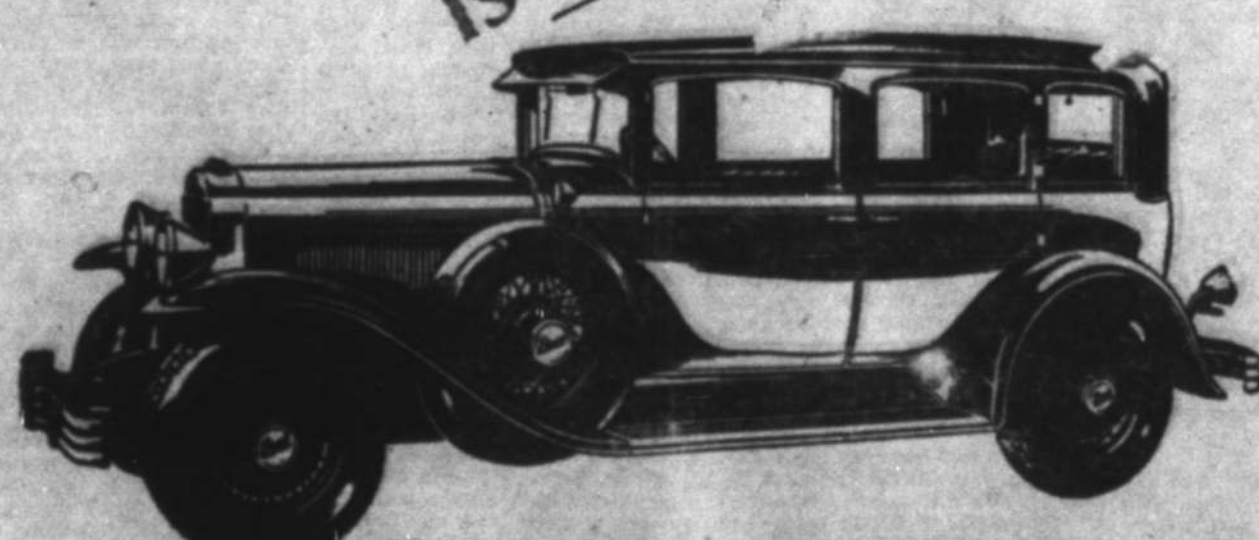
