Dairy Show Open Friday Morning

Supervisors Named For Sugar Registration

Judging To Start At 9:00 O'Clock Saturday Morning

To Hold School Of Instruction On Thurs., April 30

The time is April 28 and 29 for the Trades and Industrial groups to register and May 4, 5, 6, and 7 for the individual consumers to receive their Sugar Rationing Books.

All merchants of the county and those who fall under the classification of an industrial user will register at the Lamesa High School under the supervision of the Lamesa School authorities. The reason is that there is not enough of these in any community to justify setting up the machinery to do it in their own community. Grocers, meat operators, and boarding house operators will receive orders through the papers, etc., from Mr. Rogers and his helpers but they should be warned that they will need to get their forms some days in advance and fill them out except for signing before they report to the registrars at the High School.

As for the Individual Consumer Registration the task is much larger. Every person in the county will register at the elementary school in the district where they live except where the school is out. In that case the trustees who are positive that they cannot secure responsible workers who will carry on in the community without the leadership of their teachers may be able to make arrangements for their people to register at Lamesa. More Conservation Checks Received

The treasurer of the Dawson County A. C. A. reports that 205 additional soil conservation checks amounting to \$39,432.50 have been received for distribution in this county since last Thursday's issue of the paper.

This, with the 129 checks for \$28,072.00 received at that time, makes a total of 334 checks totaling \$67,504.50 received to date. It is expected that other checks will arrive daily, and farmers and ranchers will be notified immediately upon their receipt.

Commercial Sugar Users To Register For Rationing Tuesday At High School

The national sugar rationing will get under way in Lamesa next Tuesday, April 28, when the merchants, both wholesalers and retailers, and the institutional and industrial users will register at the Lamesa High School building for sugar purchase certificates and war ration stamp cards. This will be followed by registration on May 4 by individual consumers who will procure their sugar with the use of War Ration Book One. This individual consumer registration will take place at the Lamesa Elementary School on May 4.

The office of Price Administration of the U. S. A. has announced that "War is cutting off the supply of commodities which the United States usually exports from other parts of the world at the same time when war efforts are consuming greater quantities of these commodities than ever before. These acts will create a serious shortage of some vital products, among them is sugar. The main reason for this (Continued on Back Page)

The West Texas Recruiting and Induction District has been allotted quotas of enlistments for the Air Corps, the Armored Forces, the Coast Artillery Corps, Cavalry, Field Artillery, Engineers, Signal Corps, and Infantry, exclusively for men who ARE NOT YET 20.

Enlistments of men who are 20 and over, and are therefore of draft age, are welcome in the Army of the United States, Unassigned. Their preferences are followed in assignment whenever possible. But only men of 18 and 19 years of age are allowed the preference of enlisting direct into the branch in which they wish to serve. 18 and 19 year old men should see the Army Recruiting Service today.

America's Future Children's Health Warns Dr. Cox

Commenting today on the wide
spread interest and cooperation
shown by Texans in the observance
of Children's Week, Dr. Geo. W. Cox,
State Health Officer, said that
America has no better safe-guard
for her future than the promo-
tion of good health in the youth of
today.

"Americans have done a great
deal in the past to make the United
States a better and safer place in
which to live the all-important
years of childhood," Dr. Cox said,
"but in spite of all of this, Ameri-
can childhood has not yet been
as safe as it can be."

Dr. Cox pointed out that the na-
tional emergency naturally adds to
the health hazards that already
exist and urged parents of every
child in Texas to make sure that
their children have been immuniz-
ed against such preventable dis-
eases as diphtheria and smallpox.

Dr. Cox stressed the fact that al-
though most babies are born physi-
cally sound, the foundation for fu-
ture health is laid in the first six
years of life. All parents must real-
ize that raising child health stand-
ards is a job for them especially.
Dr. Cox said, and added that it
is better to keep them from get-
ting sick than to try to save their
lives when they are ill.

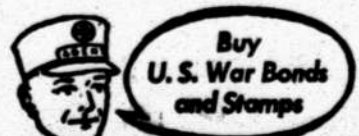

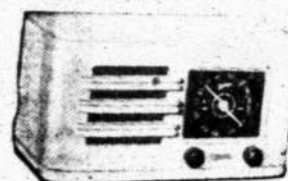

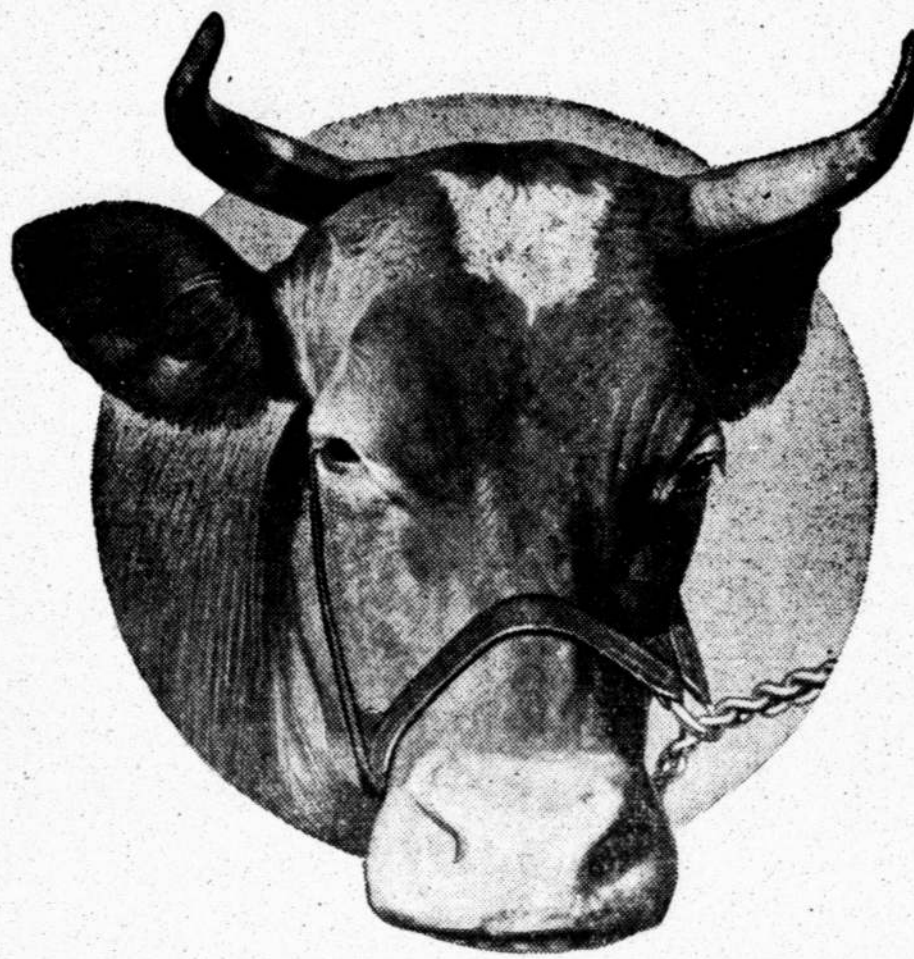

WAR EFFORT

WHY HAVE GOOD COWS:

Tests carried on by Dairy Herd Improvement Associations in Texas during past 4 years show these facts: A cow producing average of 3 gallons of milk per day, returns a profit of 9c per gallon above feed cost. A 2-gallon cow returns 7c per gallon profit, while a 1 gallon cow returns profit of 5c per gallon. These figures are based on milk selling at 17c per gallon.

How To Increase Milk Production:

1. Feed a balanced grain mixture according to production of cow. Feed all the good roughage that cows will clean up. If you do not have green pasture, feed one pound of alfalfa hay per cow per day.
2. Milk at regular intervals of 12 hours. Milk fast and milk out udders clean.
3. For greatest cow efficiency aim at a 10 months lactation period and 2 months dry period.
4. Keep plenty of good, clean, clear, cool, fresh water available at all times.
5. Contented cows will give more milk. Furnish cows with plenty of shade in summer and windbreaks in the winter.

PRODUCE CLEAN MILK-

The production of clean milk is worth many times the cost necessary to obtain same. A clean, dry milking place is worth a great deal, with a concrete floor being recommended.

1. All pails should be kept clean and should be sterilized before milking. Rinse all milk vessels with a chlorine water made of 100 parts of chlorine per million parts of water. Be sure to follow manufacturers directions for mixing this solution.
2. Before milking brush flanks and udder with a stiff brush, then dry by wiping with cloth.
3. Wash cows udder thoroughly with some of chlorine water. Squeeze cloth dry and dry cows udder.
4. Wash hands in chlorine water immediately before milking, then dry thoroughly.
5. Strain milk through sanitary strainer. Use filter pads of cotton discs.
6. Cool milk promptly. Use fresh well water. Water will cool milk 21 times as fast as air.

Women Run Town And Do A Good Job, Too

SPENCER, Tenn. — An invitation to attend an old fiddlers' contest or to eat a box supper means to residents of this Cumberland Plateau town what an official demand to "pay your taxes" might elsewhere.

This innovation in raising municipal revenue got its start in October, 1940, when eight civic-minded women got themselves elected to all offices of the town government, abolished taxes and started sponsoring "benefits" for municipal purposes.

They're Making Money!
Their plan has worked; there is a surplus in the treasury of more

than \$1,000, or about two dollars for each of the community's 508 inhabitants (1940 census), and now "Madam Mayor" and her associates are planning a community building.

"Mountain men always help one another in building houses and things of that sort," said Mrs. J. M. Gordon, the mayor and a middle-aged housewife whose husband is a farmer.

"That's the way we intend to build our community house. The stone has been quarried and the men will put up the building whenever they can spare the time from their work. But we'll probably have to wait until after the war is over to get the heating and plumbing fixtures."

Took Over In 1940.

An apathetic attitude on the part of the menfolk after former Mayor J. F. Kell died early in 1940 prompted the women to assume control of the town (county seat of Van Buren county) in the fall elections.

U. S. Health Dept. Needs Men For Health Program

Supplying the need for an immediate program of expansion in the medical personnel available for the Health and Emergency Medical Service, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, today announced that the United States Public Health Service is offering reserve commissions to physicians and dentists whose services may be used to care for evacuees in the event of enemy action.

Recruitment for those reserve commissions will be largely from older age groups, from those of minor physical disability, making them ineligible for military service, and from women physicians.

Dr. Cox, who serves as State Chairman on Health and Emergency Medical Service, pointed out that it is essential that staffs for operating base hospitals in safe areas be adequately planned to go into immediate effect, in event of disaster. "Caring for the sick and injured in the event of enemy action is a grave responsibility, and no one has the right to assume that we were immune from attack," Dr. Cox said. "Emergency base hospitals in safe areas to which casualties may be evacuated, together with lines of evacuation, and means of transport have been established in almost all sections of this state."

Dr. Cox said that applications for reserve commissions will be serviced by his office, and pointed out that while the commission covers a reserve, inactive basis so that the physician may continue service in his community, nevertheless those commissioned will be subject to immediate service in case of actual emergency.

Save Home Grown Legume Seed

A shortage of seed supplies for 1942 winter cover crops seems probable, according to E. A. Miller, agronomist of the A. and M. College Extension Service. The shortage is most likely to effect vetch, Austrian winter peas and bur clover, as well as pasture grasses and legumes, possibly including lespedeza. The outlook, Miller says, should prompt farmers to harvest at least enough seed for their own plantings and, if possible, have some to relieve the shortages of their neighbors.

The goal for winter cover crop seed for the United States in the Food for Victory program is an increase of 57 per cent over 1941, and

But after they abolished the taxes and began accumulating a surplus with their "benefits," nods of approval came from the men. J. L. Graham, the town banker, summed up what seemed to be the current consensus of the male population when he said of Mayor Gordon's administration:

"The ladies are doing fine. They're NOT going to have any opposition for a second term when they come up for re-election next October, either."

A Minor Point
There was some question as to whether the mayor actually resided within the town's corporate limits. She and her husband live on a hill overlooking Spencer.

But the townsfolk, it seems, just wink at this technicality. Said Graham:

"Her home might NOT be in the last survey of the city limits, but we sure count it a part of Spencer."

an increase of 25 per cent for hay crop seed.

Many Texas farmers have harvested sweet clover, alfalfa and cowpea seed in the past for their own plantings and for marketing, but harvesting of vetch, winter peas, bur clover and pasture grasses still is rather limited.

"There is great need for larger acreages of winter legumes for soil improvement," Miller says. "When more seed is grown and saved on the farms it should increase soil fertility, and produce larger yields and greater profits."

Yield of seed vary with weather conditions. From 200 to 600 pounds an acre of hairy vetch seed have been reported in east Texas. In spite of bad weather in the spring of 1941, more than 20,000 pounds of this seed was harvested on two farms in Bowie County.

Harvesting methods range from flailing out the seed on wagon sheets to the use of small combines. "The important thing is to leave a seed plot of winter legumes now and harvest the seed when sufficiently mature so it will be on hand when planting time rolls around next fall," Miller counsels.

shortage of sugar are clear.

"First, in normal times, 27 percent of the sugar comes from the Philippine Islands and from Hawaii. Today, we are receiving no sugar from the Philippines and our imports from Hawaii are substantially diminished because of the war.

"Second, 35 percent of our sugar normally comes from the West Indies, most of which is shipped by water to refineries in the northwestern part of the United States. Today, the ships which normally carried this sugar are needed to transport vital war materials. Much of this sugar must be transported to southern ports in order that available ships may be operated most efficiently. The shortage in rail transportation makes it difficult to assure adequate sugar supplies in the northwestern part of the United States.

"Third, sugar must be made available to supply the full needs of the men in our armed forces wherever they may be and a large amount of sugar must be used in the manufacture of explosives.

"Fourth, too many people, thinking only of themselves, have bought more sugar than they need thereby depriving their neighbors of their fair share of the available sugar.

"Rationing has become necessary in order to assure an adequate supply of sugar for war needs and to distribute fairly the remaining sugar supply among all the people."

Trade registration will require the registration of approximately two million establishments throughout the nation. Dawson County merchants, cafe and boarding house proprietors will register at Lamesa High School on Tuesday, April 28, between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 9:00 p. m.

Sup. V. Z. Rogers has announced the appointment of Prin. F. T. McCollum as Second Site Administrator for this particular registration. Faculty members will serve as registrars and will issue the sugar purchase certificates in the Trade Ration Registration.

G. M. Roberts, principal of the Lamesa Elementary School, has been designated as Site Administrator for the individual registration for May 4 in the Lamesa Elementary School building. Faculty members of the Lamesa Elementary School will serve as registrars.

Retailers, wholesalers, cafe and restaurant proprietors, boarding house managers, bakers, confectioners, ice cream manufacturers, and others selling sugar to the public or using it in manufactured products or serving sugar with meals in commercial establishments will be expected to present definite information concerning the use of sugar in their businesses in order to fill out the application forms promptly—the number of months during which sugar was sold in 1941, the quantity of sugar delivered to and accepted by the registering unit during 1941.

Institutional users will need to have information as to the quantity of sugar used during each month of 1941 in connection with meal and food services and these amounts will form the basis for the computation of allotments. The faculty members, it is to be understood, will serve as registrars only. Those registering are responsible for the supplying of correct and adequate information. The County Ration Board has appointed trade rationing advisors who will be on duty at the school buildings during the registration periods who will be charged with the responsibility of "furnishing competent advice."

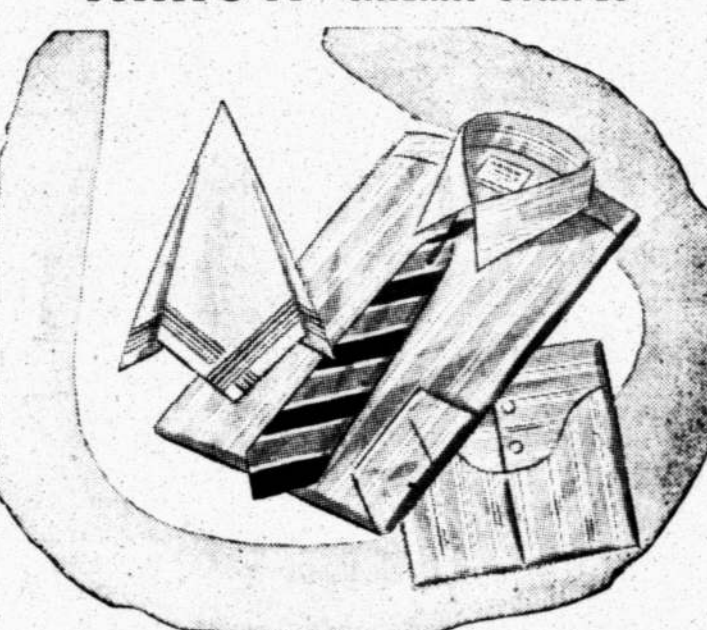
