Soil District Leaders to State Meeting

Representatives of Mitchell County Soil Conservation District will attend the 20th Annual Meeting of Texas Soil Conservation Districts in Dallas this week.

Planning to attend from the local district are Warren Anderson and R. A. Carey, supervisors of the district. They will join with agricultural leaders from across the state at the meeting, which opens Wednesday and continues through Friday.

Purpose of the annual conservation event is to allow district supervisors from all areas of the state to discuss mutual problems and to plan their district programs for the ensuing year.

In addition to work sessions, outstanding speakers, demonstration and a soil-water show — displaying newest in agricultural equipment and materials — will be on the state agenda.

Since its beginning in 1939, the Soil Conservation District movement has mushroomed until it now includes 99 per cent of the state with more than 185,000 farmers and ranchers working 1 hundred million acres. The Mitchell County SD District was organized in 1940, 1 year after the movement's origin.

TO PROMOTE TRAVEL

New Campaign for U. S. 80 Members

New membership drive for the U. S. 80-Interstate 20 Highway Association is being planned for the Colorado City area.

It will be part of an overall membership campaign with an aim to secure financing for a comprehensive 12-month promotional program for U. S. 80 and Interstate 20 across West Texas.

Final plans for the membership drive were made Thursday at a meeting of the association in Abilene. Representing Colorado City were Bob Riely, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce tourist and convention committee, and Sam Margolis, manager of Baker Hotel.

The Colorado City pair participated in the meeting with representatives from cities along Highway 80 stretching from Cisco to Monahans.

Fidelity Advertising of Abilene has been awarded a 1-year promotional account for the U. S. 80-Interstate 20 development program. The firms, which will work on a commission basis and draw a \$400

monthly retainer fee, is placing a full-time employee on the road to organize the association's membership and promotional interest.

The advertising firm's commission percentage will be based on amounts of membership fees collected for the association — 20 per cent commission for dues less than \$25,000; 15 per cent for dues between \$25,000 and \$50,000; 10 per cent for dues over \$50,000.

Cecil Warren of Abilene heads the association which is planning a \$100,000 budget. This is aimed to promote the highway route which has increasing competition from the U. S. 180 Association, a group which spends \$125,000 annually for promoting its route.

About 40 per cent of the U. S. 80 budget is planned for outdoor billboards and travel brochures, about 10 per cent is planned for each of advertising and miscellaneous work.

Reilly said the membership drive will begin in the Colorado City area within the next few weeks. Representative of the advertising agency and a Colorado City U. S. 80 Association member will contact local businesses in regard to the program.

Membership contacts already have begun in Abilene.

McSpadden, as the drive opens, reported that Texas has been the principal beneficiary in the allocation of March of Dimes funds raised in the state over the last 23 years.

More than 84 cents of every dollar collected from Texas March of Dimes has been put to use in aiding the state's disease victims and in research and education projects conducted by Texas institutions.

McSpadden said, "A large portion of the remaining 16 per cent" the county chairman emphasized, "has come back to our state in shipments of polio vaccine and gamma globulin and in other nationwide services conducted by The National Foundation."

The 1961 March of Dimes is scheduled throughout the remaining weeks of January. It is the "new" March of Dimes because 2 years ago the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis changed its name to The National Foundation and expanded its area of interest to birth defects and arthritis in addition to polio.

In the period from the first March of Dimes in January 1938 to last Sept. 30, Texas chapters of the March of Dimes raised a net total of \$28,253.31 at an average fund raising cost of less than 7 per cent.

At this point, \$20,758.74 had been received in Texas. South chapters in carrying out their program are making a great job of raising money to help the children.

60 Animals Sell for \$15,795

A top of \$1,000 was paid Friday as Mitchell County Hereford Breeders Association's 12th annual sale re-wrote the record books.

The thousand dollars Colorado City's Charlie C. Thompson paid for the grand champion bull topped 1 of the sale's records.

Tumbling other marks set in the previous 11 sales was the total sales of \$15,795 and the 60 animals consigned to buyers.

Noble Lamp 42, consigned by S. F. Buchanan, was the grand champion that drew the record price tag. The Hereford was calved Nov. 27, 1959, and is by Noble Lamp 14, out of Pretty Maid 62.

Its price was far ahead of the top of \$550 Tom Russom of Merkel paid for the junior champion bull — top money buy of the 1960 sale. It was also high above the \$635 top price of the 1959 show — the amount John Coles paid for the grand champion bull of that year.

The 1961 sale's total of \$15,795 was more than a thousand above the previous record of \$14,580 set in last year's event. And the consignment of 60 animals beat the previous mark of 51 animals set in the 1960 sale.

However, average price per animal was down Saturday from some previous years. For comparison, the 1959 sale with only 36 animals brought a total of \$12,820 for an average of \$356.11.

The 1961 sale — with 60 animals going into the sale ring — brought an average of \$262 for bulls and \$224 for heifers. Some buyers were quick to mention that a slight culling of animals would have boosted the average price.

Champion female of the '61 sale was RS Regina, by Zato Rex B17 out of RS Princess Lady, and was consigned by Roy Henderson. This champion also was bought by Thompson for a price of \$300.

Professional football star Sam Baugh, now coach of the New York Titans, bought the reserve champion bull, Super Diamond 10, consigned by Earl Brown.

Baugh paid \$420 for the animal, by Super Diamond out of Donna Anna, and bred by Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Howe of Roscoe.

Reserve champion female, RS Miss Gwen Model by Master Model and out of Miss Domino Gwen, was consigned by Henderson and bought by Thompson for Thompson.

Thompson was the largest buyer of the sale, paying out a total of \$2,385 for 6 of the animals.

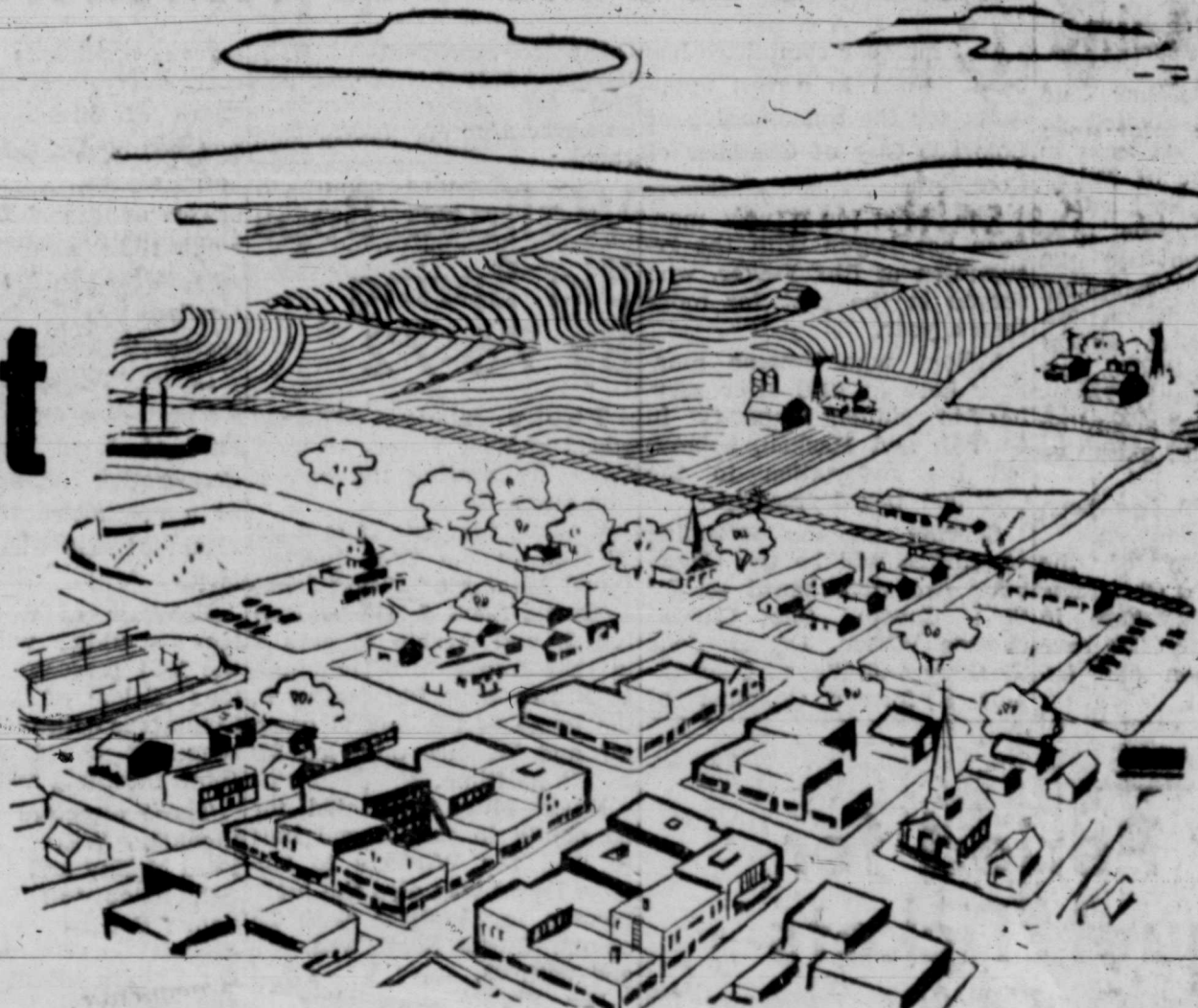

Roll call was answered with "one thought toward school improvement."

"What Do We Want In Education" was presented by Mrs. George Witten.

"It has been interesting to hear your thoughts on school improvement. Perhaps you would be interested to hear this quotation from Socrates: 'What then, do I call education? First, those who control circumstances instead of being mastered by them; those who meet all occasions manfully and act in accordance with intelligent thinking, those

who are honorable in all dealings, who treat goodnaturedly persons and things that are disagreeable; and furthermore, those who hold their pleasures under control and are not overcome by misfortune; finally, those who are not spoiled by success," Mrs. Witten quoted.

"First of all, the American public high school has no counterpart in any other country. With few exceptions, the public high school is expected to provide education for all the youth living in a town, city or district. Such a high school has become known as a 'comprehensive' high school, in contrast to the 'specialized' high schools which provide vocational education or which admit on a selective basis and offer only an academic curriculum. Dr. Conant says, 'I believe it accurate to state that a high school accommodating all the youth of community is typical of American public education. I think it safe to say that the comprehensive high school is characteristic of our society and further that it has come into being because of our economic history and our devotion to the ideals of quality of opportunity and equality of status,' she continued.

Following are some of Mrs. Girvin's recommendations from a report by Dr. James B. Conant, former Harvard professor, for improving public secondary education: The counseling system should begin in elementary school, articulation between schools should be good, 1 full time counselor for every 250 to 300 students is recommended.

There should be individualized programs with no classification of students according to clearly defined programs, such as college preparatory, vocational and commercial.

General educational requirements for graduation should include 4 years of English, 3 or 4 years social studies including 2 years of history and a senior course in American problems or American Government — one year of math in the 9th grade and at least 1 year of science in the 9th or 10th grade, which might well be biology or general science.

Students should be grouped by ability, subject by subject.

Students should be given a durable record of courses studied in four years and grades obtained.

Composition should occupy half the total time devoted to the study of English. A theme a week is recommended.

A grade of at least C should be required before moving to the next course in a sequence.

A free tuition summer school should be provided.

The board should be ready to offer 3rd and 4th year foreign language, no matter how few enroll.

Science courses should have at least three sections, grouped by abilities.

Homerooms should be significant social groups within the school. Students should be kept together in one homeroom for the entire senior high school course.

"Our school system is only as strong as interested citizens and parents make it. There are four requisites for the successful operation of a school:

"A school board composed of intelligent, honest, devoted citizens who understand that their function is policy-making and not administration; a first-rate superintendent;

A question often asked by deer hunters on their first hunt is "Should I get out and move around or should I find a good stand and wait the deer out?"

Old timers know the answer. It depends on the situation and conditions. Usually it's best to get on a promising stand and remain there.

By a good stand I mean one in range of a well-beaten trail or near a scrape or rut. The hunter must be able to see well enough to spot an approaching animal. At the same time, he should be concealed so that the animal will not spot him first.

Camp operators, land owners, and biologists working management areas, report that the one big reason why hunters miss their chances for bagging deer is that they move around too much. Hunters just don't stay put.

A well seasoned whitetail deer hunter will admit that he must have lots of patience. The hunter who can stay glued to a spot just off a heavily traveled deer trail or a fresh scrape, usually will get his deer.

If you stop and think about it this makes sense.

First if you know white-tails, you know that they beat out trails from one area to another. When moving about, they usually follow one of these trails.

At night, they bed down

where they can keep warm. In the early morning hours they arise and move about, feeding here and there.

The trails zigzagging through a range are their highways, their farm-to-market roads. Nearly always, if a hunter finds one of these turnpikes he should pick out a spot—either in a tree or behind cover—where the wind will blow his scent away from the trail. Then sit silently and motionless.

Deer are quick to notice anything unnatural, especially if it moves. So if you must move, move slowly.

I have missed lots of deer simply because I moved just as a nice buck stepped into sight. Deer have a reputation for appearing out of nowhere. This means that few holes are made by traveling whitetails.

I have talked with a number of hunters who were so surprised by the sudden appearance of a beautiful buck that they froze in their tracks. They couldn't even lift the rifle to fire it until it was too late.

It might ease the conscience of these hunters to know that very few big game hunters can remain completely relaxed when leveling their sights on a trophy animal. But they don't get so jittery that they miss an easy shot.

When you square off the cross hairs of a scope on a deer, try to visualize a target with a bull's-eye in the center. In most cases, the bull's-eye is just behind the shoulders. When the hairs are lined up on that spot, squeeze the trigger and it's all over. At least it should be.

A scope is not a must. In fact, in the heavy brush country of South Texas the scope can cause many misses. In such country a light, short-barreled rifle without a scope is the best bet.

In heavy brush, and especially during the rutting season, bucks are dashing about care-

lessly. It's not unusual for one to come crashing out of the thorn patches right on top of you.

In this case, it would be hard to find him through a scope. With iron sights and a light rifle you could jerk swiftly into position and send some lead after the fleeing animal.

In some areas of the state where there are open meadows and brakes, it's better to have some kind of scope.

According to most reports, quite a number of shotguns are being used this year for whitetails.

Personally I don't think much of scatter guns when it comes to hunting deer. In the first place, lots of deer are wounded each year because hunters try to drop them with shotguns at very long ranges.

Many deer taken this year will have buck shot in them from last year or from some year before that. Lots of these deer will be cripples.

The primary reason I don't use a shotgun is because in most cases so much good meat is ruined. One load of buckshot can pepper a deer full of holes, each one an area of wasted meat.

I've taken pictures of hunters who refused to have their shotguns included in the picture, because they were ashamed of using one.

No matter what gun you are shooting, the important thing is to stay put once you find a stand. Patience is most important in hunting the wounded deer. If you can maintain your patience, you'll probably get your deer.

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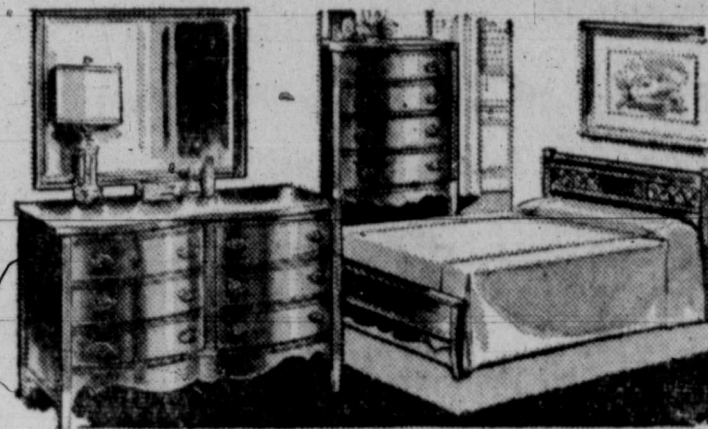

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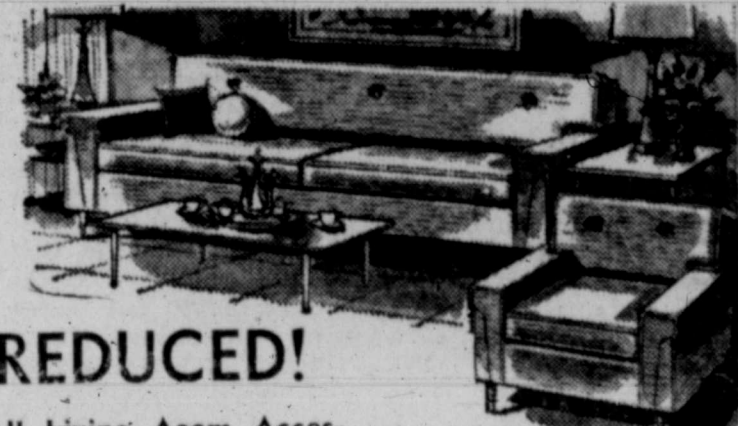
