SOUTH APPEALS TO HOUSE BOARD IN COTTON PEST

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, May 7.—The appeal of the South for help to control the pest of the cotton boll worm was presented to the house rules committee today with the appearance of a group of southerners to urge that the Buchanan bill be given early consideration in the house.

Representative Buchanan, Democrat, Texas, explained that the basis for determination of the amount the farmer would receive was the value of cotton produced in neighboring areas.

The Texas said his measure provided for payment by the federal government of the entire cost of setting up the non-cotton zones, because, he said, under the Texas biennial session of the legislature it was impossible for his state to procure money to make the appropriations.

HARMONY WING IN TEXAS WINS IN DEMO VOTE

SMITH IS DEALT BIG BLOW IN PRECINCT CONVENTIONS

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, May 7.—Delegates elected at the precinct conventions of the Democratic party Saturday will go to the county conventions of this state tomorrow for the greater part uninstructed as to individual candidates, the tabulation of results of more than 3,000 precinct reporting shows.

While both sides claim victory, on account of the nature of some of the resolutions adopted, it was generally conceded that the "harmony" wing had won a sweeping victory in sympathy with prohibition or bone-dry Democrats.

Majority Uninstructed
Returns from 71 counties comprising the bulk of the voting power of the state gave 1,481 delegates uninstructed, 1,234 instructed to vote for a dry plank and for a candidate in sympathy with prohibition enforcement, 326 instructed for Gov. Smith of New York, 93 for Jesse Jones of Houston, 45 for Governor Dan Moody, who has already declined a favorite son role, 17 for Senator Walsh of Montana and 3 for Gov. Donahay of Ohio.

Dallas county, home of the constitutional Democratic movement was carried by the "harmony" faction, led by Governor Moody, whom the constitutional Democrats charge with playing into the hands of Governor Smith. The "harmony" plank carried off 414 delegates against 263 delegates uninstructed, 250 instructed for Smith and 170 for Jones.

OFFICER SHOT WHEN ACCUSED SEES WARRANT

IRVINE, Ky., May 7.—The sheriff of Estill county, Arthur Brookshire, 45, was shot to death last night by Dave Estes, 30, alleged bootlegger, whose home the officer was attempting to search. Estes was arrested. Shortly before midnight county authorities made preparations to take the prisoner away when it was learned that a crowd of more than 500 had gathered at his home where lay the body of the slain sheriff.

According to witnesses, Brookshire was killed when he showed Estes a search warrant.

Booze War Believed Cause Of Slaying

KANSAS CITY, May 7.—Fred Shestall, alleged bootlegger, was shot to death early today in his motor car at the rear of his south side apartment house home. His body was found slumped over the steering wheel, a revolver, with one shot fired, gripped in his right hand.

Blood on the driveway indicated his shot had wounded one of his assailants. A resident of the apartment, awakened by the firing, said he saw three men run from the driveway and flee in a motor car. Police believed Shestall may have been killed by robbers.

Posses Hunt For Kentucky Marauders

SHEPHERDSVILLE, Ky., May 7.—A federal posse continued to search the hills of Bullitt county today for two men who escaped under fire yesterday when seven others were arrested in connection with the slaying of Mrs. Kate Browning, 60, shot down as she fled with five members of her family from her burning home at midnight Friday.

Prohibition agents invaded the county after local officials had indicated that investigation of the burning and slaying would be delayed for several days. Their nine warrants charging conspiracy to intimidate a federal witness were based on reports that the family was at the home.

Methodist Leaders Score U. S. Immigration Policy

(By Associated Press)
KANSAS CITY, May 7.—The present immigration policy of the United States as regards exclusion was assailed and the admission of all nationals on a quota basis was urged in a resolution adopted by the quadrennial general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church here today.

Exclusion Policy Rapped
The resolution, presented by Dr. E. Stanley Jones, missionary to India, gave hearty approval of the restriction of immigration, but condemned the exclusion of some nationals as a "vindictive, un-American and un-Christian" policy.

It asked "all christian citizens to unite in removing, as soon as possible, such legislation as restricts immigration and the right of citizenship on the ground of race and color."

The conference halted in the midst of its business session for a special prayer for war-torn China. Bishop George R. Grose of the Shantung area led the prayer at the request of the Rev. Perry O. Hanson, missionary of the Tsinan area, where Chinese and Japanese troops recently have been embroiled.

Asks Divine Help
Bishop Grose prayed that "God stay the forces of violence in China and remove the passions of men so that peace may prevail there."

Mr. Hanson, who has spent 25 years in China, said he believed that prevailing conditions there would lead the Chinese to grant any demands Japan might make. He said China was in a "terrible condition" in the Tsinan area and he estimated that 1,000,000 persons had died of starvation in that immediate vicinity since the first of the year.

Pledging itself to the wisdom of unification and "to our earnest desire for unification," the conference today unanimously approved continuation of its commission of unification with the Methodist Episcopal church, South, or "any church of groups," of which steps were proceeding satisfactorily. It was recommended in the approved resolution that action be taken to render our attitude officially permanent.

LAMESA, May 7.—E. H. Mosely of the Ely Forrest Oil company at Pride, 20 miles north here, died Sunday afternoon at 2:30 of a paralysis stroke. Mosely was 57 years of age and leaves a widow, Mrs. Eva Mosely and two children, Mrs. C. A. Preston here and Bill Mosely of Amarillo.

Other near relatives are W. M. Mosely, Melrose, N. M.; J. A. Mosely, Copperas Cove; A. W. Mosely, Childress; W. A. Mosely, Virgil; Mosely, T. B. Mosely, Mrs. Maggie Walker of San Antonio, and two sisters in California. Interment will take place today in the Pride cemetery.

CREW OF SHIP EXONERATED IN SUB'S SINKING

INQUIRY BOARD SAYS PAULDING CREW IS NOT RESPONSIBLE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, May 7.—Lieutenant Commander J. S. Baylis, the skipper, and all others on board the coast guard destroyer Paulding when she crashed into and sunk the submarine S-4 off Provincetown, Mass., last December 17, have been exonerated of all blame in connection with the disaster in a report by a coast guard board of inquiry.

The report, made public last night with the approval of Secretary Melton, disagrees with the original decision of a naval investigating board attaching "serious blame" to the Paulding commander for alleged failure to sight the submarine in time to prevent the collision.

Secretary Wilbur, however, had referred this phase of the inquiry to the treasury, which has supervision over the coast guard, for its attention.

Charge Unwarranted
Taking up the testimony of witnesses in the naval investigation in detail, the coast guard board found nothing to warrant the charge that any of the Paulding's men were responsible, emphasized particularly the absence of a warning flag in the vicinity of the submarine's trial course, and recommended that no further action be taken and that Commander Baylis be notified officially that neither he nor any of his officers or men is held responsible for the disaster.

Lorenzo Boy Hurt In Fall From Tree

Jack Herrington, 7 year old son of J. D. Herrington, of Lorenzo, sustained a broken arm yesterday when he fell from a tree at the Herrington home.

He was brought to a local sanitarium where it was revealed that the break came just above the elbow joint, a very serious fracture. He was resting nicely today. The fall severed feet, it was said.

Brownlow Reported Greatly Improved

Bennie Brownlow, manager of the Lubbock Hubbers, is reported much better and will be released from the hospital within the next few days. However, the manager will not be able to make the next road trip, which starts Friday April 11.

Sheron "Blackie" Adams, center-fielder for the Hubbers, who is also confined in a hospital, is reported to be much better.

COUNTY CONVENTIONS TUESDAY HOLD SPOTLIGHT WITH DEMOS AND G. O. P. PLANNING SESSIONS

The political pot will start brewing in earnest in Lubbock county and over the state tomorrow as democrats and republicans hold their county conventions. Practically every county in Texas will hold a democratic convention and from indications coming in from over the state there will be more republican conventions than ever before in the history of the Lone Star state.

Delegates from practically all of the 31 democratic precincts will gather in convention here Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, the session to be held in the district courtroom. County Chairman Frank Wheelock announced. At the meeting delegates to the State Democratic convention at Beaumont will be selected, whether the Lubbock delegation will be instructed or uninstructed, and if instructed in what manner, and whether or not the much discussed democratic loyalty pledge will be placed upon the ballots will be decided.

Republicans Meet At 3
The republicans of the county will meet at 3 o'clock in the county court room with delegates from seven precincts present. Postmaster John L. Vaughan, a G. O. P. leader here, announced. Dr. L. E. Burr, county chairman, will preside. One delegate to the State Republican convention will be instructed to support that wing of the Texas G. O. P. led by Hon. R. B. Cramer, of Brownsville. The convention here will also go on record as supporting the 18th Amendment to the Constitution. Mr. Vaughan prophesied. The state convention of Texas republicans will be held in Dallas on May 22.

Mr. Wheelock declined to forecast the action of the democrats.

Plane Shot Down
SHANGHAI—According to a dispatch from Tsinan the Japanese this morning brought down an airplane of the northern forces which was engaged in bombing the foreign settlement there. Casualties were not mentioned. Another war office dispatch sets the number of those murdered in the anti-Japanese demonstrations at 13 with 28 others missing of whom two are believed to have been murdered. Looting is said to be continuing on a small scale.

Trading Rampant
NEW YORK—Bull traders launched another offensive on the New York stock exchange today and "Bears" rushed to cover as prices soared \$2 to nearly \$15 a share. \$56 great was the volume of trading that the ticker fell nearly 45 minutes behind the market by early afternoon. More than three score individual issues were lifted to new peak prices for the year or longer.

Requisition Long
JEFFERSON CITY, Mo.—Gov. James M. Blair issued a requisition today for Governor Moody of Texas for the extradition of Jack Barry Long from El Paso, Texas, to Springfield, Mo., where he is wanted in connection with the robbery of the People's Bank of Springfield on Dec. 27, 1927. Several holdup men raided the bank and got about \$25,000.

New Mail Line
NEW YORK—An international air mail line from New York to Mexico City by way of Dallas, San Antonio and Laredo will be placed in operation shortly after June 1, according to information received today by Postmaster John W. Philip.

12 Hurt In Riot
BALBOA, Canal Zone—Twelve persons, including six American bluejackets and one American officer, were injured in a riot in Panama City last night between bluejackets attached to the cruiser Rochester and the ammunition ship Nitro and Panama police and civilians. Clubs, stones and bottles were used by the rioters who fought half an hour before they were dispersed.

SENATOR GEORGE W. NORRIS

NORRIS IS SENATE'S LEADING
CHAMPION OF LIBERALISM

NORRIS IS SENATE'S LEADING CHAMPION OF LIBERALISM. EDITOR'S NOTE: This, the 23rd of a series of Presidential Campaign Portraits, tells the story of Senator George W. Norris of Nebraska. Tomorrow's article will discuss Senator Walter F. George of Georgia.

NEA Service Writer. ASHINGTON, May 7.—With Senator George W. Norris of Nebraska one may disagree, one may believe that he is mistaken, but no one who really knows him can ever for a moment doubt his sincerity of purpose or cease to respect him.

For Norris—independent, insistent, irreconcilable or whatever you want to call him—is almost everything that the public expects a senator to be, and which a lot of them aren't.

Even his opponents in the senate have no enemies there; admire his rugged fearlessness of this man whom the La Follette forces have chosen to wear their dead leader's crown in the 1928 fight for the Republican presidential nomination.

But this veteran, who has grown

the Progressives. One thing is certain—he will always be found in the forefront to which the liberal view inclines.

Though a Republican, he led the historic fight to overthrow "Uncle Joe" Cannon's exorbitant in the house to 1910 and succeeded. He changed the house rules and thereby accomplished one of the greatest reforms in the history of American politics.

Of course, there was a price to pay. He cut off his patronage. Republican leaders disowned him. Politically, he was an outcast in Washington. But the people of Nebraska felt differently; two years later they promoted him to the senate.

The same independence had characterized his course there. He even voted against the declaration of war against Germany and today he is the only member of the "willful twelve," as Woodrow Wilson branded them, who is still in the senate.

In 1926, after the exposure of the Vire scandal in Pennsylvania, he led the stamp for Vire's Democratic opponent.

Senator Norris and Senator Borah are often mentioned in the same breath as champions of progressivism, but between their political records is a gulf that is abyssal.

The explanation is this: Borah has won renown for his battles against measures. Norris, in addition to that, has won renown for his battle for measures.

He has waged one of the greatest

During his 25 years in House and Senate, he has made no illusion. There isn't a chance of my being made the Republican party's candidate for president, he said. Probably the best description ever given of Senator Norris was written by Ray Clapper, noted Washington correspondent.

Clyde have a grand time debating politicians in Washington with their encounter George W. Norris. Clapper wrote: "I don't always speak everything, for how are they going to be cynical over a man that doesn't wear any scenery, who blurs out everything that he thinks, seems patronage, taunts the machine and even campaigns against his own party—and flourishes politically all the while?"

That is Senator Norris—best of purpose, fearless of punishment, indifferent to party ties and slender purse, who lives modestly in a Methodist boarding house near the Capitol on his salary as a senator.

"If I ever inherited a million dollars," he once smiled in the course of a personal conversation, "I think I would go to a first class restaurant and find how it feels to order first class meal without looking at the price figures on the menu card."

But Senator Norris is not opposed to wealth honestly acquired and honestly used—the fable of the fox and the grapes does not apply in his case. Only when it is dishonestly acquired, as in the case of spot money, and dishonestly used to oppress the less fortunate, does he object. And then his voice in the senate becomes thunder.

That explains his relentless fight against the power lobby, the "bread and butter" and many of his other battles.

He is engagingly frank. For 10 years he has fought to keep Muscle Shoals out of private hands and reserve this great natural resource to the people through government operation. He admits that this is a hard fight. He knows that the cards are stacked against him. But he keeps on fighting, hoping that some day the nation will see the light.

Personally, Norris is one of the most likable of senators. Courteous, genial and candid, he never tries to hide behind a famous "New don't quote me this line. Anything that Senator Norris says, he is perfectly willing for the world to hear."

Although past 65, he looks much younger. His hair is gray, his eyes are black, his eyes are deep, his face is broad, his manner affable, his smile contagious, his voice and necktie move toward rather loud hue. He smokes cigarettes—lots of them—and, unlike any men who are prominent, can enjoy a good story as well as tell.

He is now rounding out 25 years in Washington, having been elected to the house in 1902 and to the senate in 1912.

Partly lies rest lightly upon Senator Norris. Theoretically, he is a Republican, but actually he is a Christian. All of which means that does not what he pleases politically regardless of whether his nose takes him into the camp of Republicans, the Democrats or

MANY PRESENT FOR C. C. MEET IN GREENVILLE

EAST TEXAS CHAMBER OPENS CONVENTION; 20,000 ATTEND

(By Associated Press) GREENVILLE, Tex., May 7.—The greatest crowd in the history of Greenville gathered today for the formal opening of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce convention. Registration figures showed that more than 20,000 visitors were here and officials predicted that the attendance would be swelled to at least 35,000 before the parade tomorrow which will end the festivities.

The city was in gala attire and all business was at a standstill while the citizens went about welcoming visitors. Delegations from Dallas, Port Arthur, Bryan and Shreveport paraded the streets while Bryan and Port Arthur made strong bids for the next convention.

Opened by President

The convention was opened by President R. M. Kelly of the East Texas chamber who pointed out notable achievements of the chamber during the last year.

"East Texas as a whole has caught the vision of leaders as evidenced by the astonishingly strong

financial support accorded the organization in all parts of its territory," Mr. Kelly said. "I am happy to report that the financial affairs of the organization are in fine condition."

In the annual report that was submitted last year at Tyler, it was said that only 28 counties were affiliated with the organization. Today the entire 67 counties invited by the original organization committee have shown their belief and faith in their section and its regional chamber of commerce by giving whole hearted support.

Progress is Lauded

"A new spirit is sweeping East Texas—this section is undergoing perhaps the most revolutionary change in its history. This change is noticeable in a score of physical manifestations. There is hardly a community in East Texas without a building program; there is hardly a community that has not joined the ranks of development and progress by organizing a local chamber of commerce."

One of the most important accomplishments of the agricultural department of the chamber, Mr. Kelly said, was the perfection and distribution of the "Etex marketing label" which insures high grade products.

President's Recommendations

Mr. Kelly made the following recommendations: "First—Adequate support of Texas A. and M. college and the teachers colleges in East Texas to the end that these institutions may function at maximum of efficiency and meet the needs of the youth of the land."

"Second—A continuation and, if possible, an enlargement, of the safe

farming program as sponsored by this organization in co-operation with the extension service and other agencies.

"Third—Since timber is one of the chief products of East Texas, and the problem of timber protection, conservation and reforestation is one of great and growing importance to the people of this section, I strongly urge that necessary financial support be accorded to the forestry division of A. and M. college in order that it be enabled to function properly. I am of the opinion that the support given by the legislature in the past has been far below the sum necessary to meet the needs of this department and I respectfully urge a liberal measure of support in the future."

Experiment Stations

"Fourth—A personal survey of the sub-stations of the Texas experiment station located in East Texas reveals that these stations are sorely handicapped in doing research work so necessary to this section, due to lack of equipment and finances; therefore, we should fully solicit the legislature to provide more funds in the future for the support of these stations in order to give a much needed service in the proper development of agriculture in this territory."

"It is specifically recommended that provision be made for research work in the feeding and care of dairy cows in this part of the state, since the industry is undergoing a great development at this time, and no work of this character has ever been done in East Texas."

who are lined up with the supporters of the eighteenth amendment. Jose Jones received 28 of the 92 delegates tabulated for him in the state from Dallas county. Smith loses in Harris. Opponents of Smith carried the conventions of Houston and Harris county, in which the national convention will be held, by a vote of about two to one. The anti-Smith element counted 60 precincts with 161 delegates, the Smith supporters 31 precincts and 84 delegates and seven precincts, carrying some 10 votes were classed as "neutral."

Governor Smith made perhaps his worst showing in Tarrant county, and Fort Worth where the W. T. U. is strongly entrenched. Practically every one of the 100 precincts refused to support a single resolution submitted by supporters of the New Yorker.

Bexar Is Uninstructed

Thirty-three of the 35 Democratic precincts in Bexar county (San Antonio), a strong Republican center were for uninstructed delegation while three were pledged to Governor Smith and three to dry candidates.

Governor Moody has made it plain that he is insisting only on a fight against the nomination of Governor Smith and not against his reelection after nomination, which the constitutional Democrats demand. Moody means that he expects the New York man to be nominated despite a show of prohibition ardor by the Texas delegation at the national convention.

Smith Backers At Houston May Bolt

HOUSTON, May 7 (AP)—With the anti-Al Smith forces assured control of the Harris county democratic convention Tuesday on the basis of practically complete returns from Saturday's precinct conventions, threats to bolt and send a contesting Harris county delegation to the state convention at Beaumont were made by Smith leaders Monday.

A checkup indicated that at least six precincts will have rival delegations at the county convention, each claiming to be the lawful delegates from its precinct. The six precincts have 26 of 288 votes in the convention. R. L. Henry, chairman of the Harris county Smith-for-president club, issued a call for a caucus of Smith delegates tonight.

Mereta Man Killed In Auto Accident
