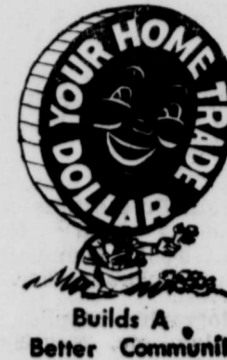

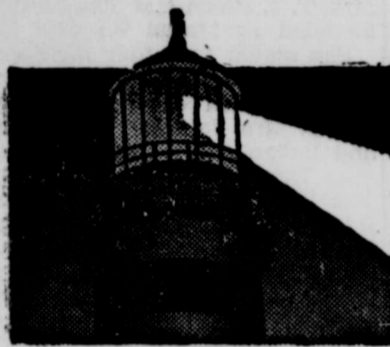

The Loraine Bulldogs turned in their best performance of the season when they defeated the Sweetwater B team 20-10 here Saturday night.

In the first quarter, quarterback Kenneth Brame was tackled in the end zone while fielding a Sweetwater punt for the first safety. Later in the quarter, Larry Rankin fumbled in his own end zone to give Sweetwater another two points.

Sweetwater halfback James Cagel ran 15 yards for the teams only touchdown. The try for extra points failed.

At the end of the first quarter, Sweetwater led 10-0.

In the second quarter, Rankin climaxed a 54 yard drive by going off left tackle for six yards and the first Loraine touchdown, but the try for extra points failed.

Ronnie Blair made a 5-yard plunge in the third quarter and Kenneth Brame scored the extra points on a keeper. This put Loraine in the lead.

The last Bulldog score came in the fourth after Sweetwater fumbled on the 39 yard line. Rankin ran six yards for the touchdown.

The Loraine Bulldogs will take on the Trent Gorillas for their first Conference game of the season, this Friday night at 7:30 p.m.

Both teams go into this game with no injuries reported, so get ready for a good ballgame between these two class 'B' ball clubs.

After last week's game we can say the Bulldogs know how to play ball, even though they started off looking bad, but turned in a mighty fine comeback after their first two bad breaks in the first quarter.

These workers will in turn select workers to assist them.

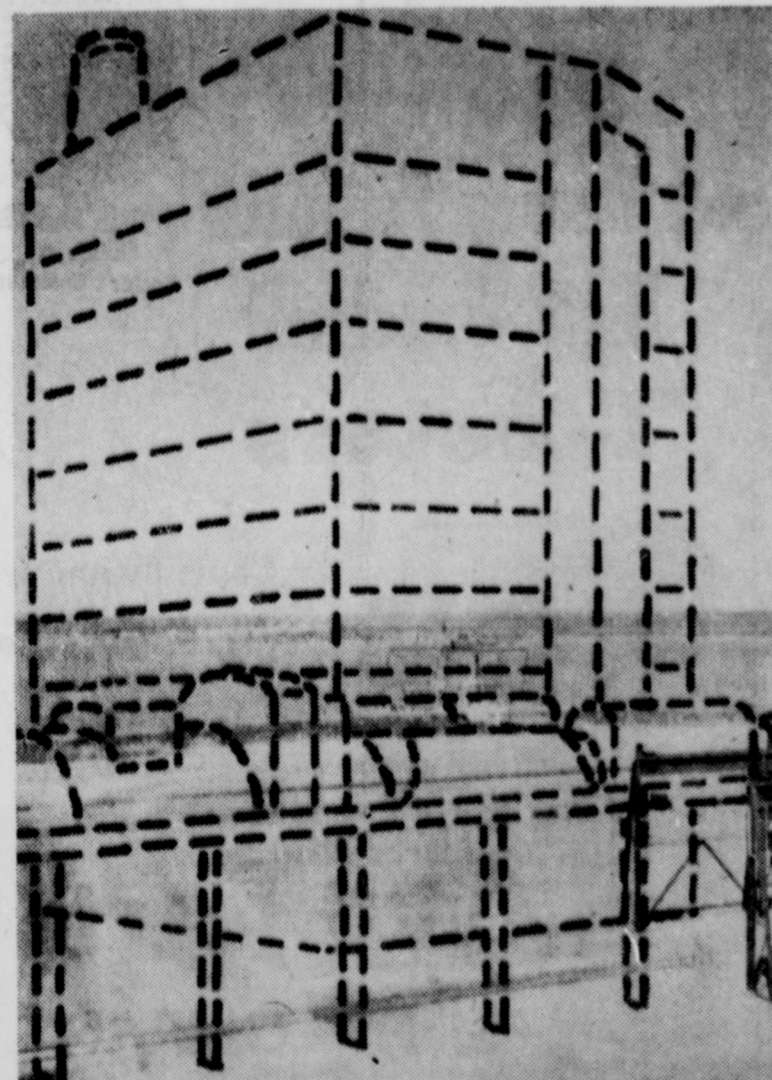
Mr. Mahon stated though the crops may not be producing in

TESCO Hosted Groundbreaking Oct. 15



The present Morgan Creek Plant, shown below, is located on the Colorado City Lake. On the left is a sketch of the new 500,000 kilowatt unit now under construction by the EBASCO Construction Company and is scheduled to be completed late in 1966. A ground-

breaking ceremony was held Thursday, October 15, at the Morgan Creek Plant to officially get construction underway. This new unit, to be one of the largest in the Southwest, will give the Plant a total generating capability of 833,000 kilowatts.

Texas Electric Service Co. hosted a groundbreaking ceremony held at the Morgan Creek Station, Thursday morning, October 15.

The new 500,000 kilowatt generating plant will cost \$30 million. President Beeman Fisher of Texas Electric, directed the groundbreaking exercises and the private luncheon which followed. There were some 65 invited guests and company personnel present.

Others participating in the groundbreaking were County Judge Elmer Martin, Dr. John Chinn, Colorado City mayor, and Charles C. Thompson, president of the City National Bank in Colorado City.

Among the invited guests were City Manager J. F. Merritt, Chamber of Commerce President Gus D. Chesney, Joe Bell, publisher of the Colorado City Record; Westbrook mayor D. A. Oglesby, Dr. Bruce Johnson, mayor of Loraine and Clifton Burfield, publisher of the Mitchell County News.

Company officials attending were B. B. Hulsey and W. G. Marquardt, vice president, J. M. Pennebaker, superintendent of power, Roy Bates, superintendent of the Morgan Creek Plant; L. C. Kinard, assistant superintendent; B. L. Brown, Sweetwater division manager, H. F. Clark, Snyder

manager, D. W. Benson, Colorado City manager; R. L. Beale, Big Spring manager, and J. L. Edwards, TESCO advertising department.

When the new unit goes into operation, the Morgan Creek Plant will be capable of generating a total of 833,000 kilowatts, almost as much as the entire TESCO system had in 1957.

The boys marched at the half, kept the girl's spirits up, and walked the girls off the field at the end.

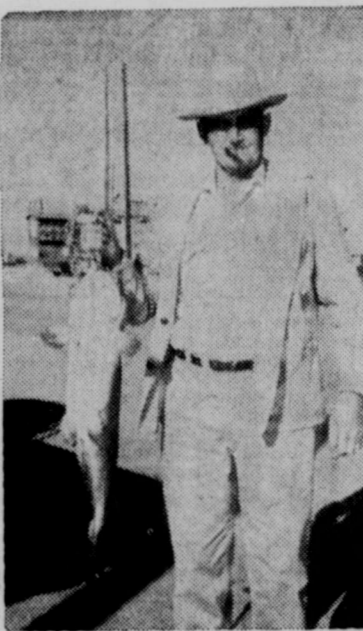
