

Larger Pipes Are Needed

If someone had raised the question 10 years ago of how long it would be before Big Spring would require five million gallons of water a day, the very confident reply would have been "20 years."

We haven't quite reached that mark yet, but the spurt on demand Wednesday set an all time record of 4,782,000 gallons for one day's consumption. That's breathing right down the back of five million, and had the water mains been large enough to supply the demand, the five million mark would have been passed.

Of course this is still far from the average demand, but it does point up the necessity of reserves to meet these peaks.

The complaints received at the city hall point up to another necessity—one that is second only to supply. We speak of larger water mains. The present system of mains did not contemplate the consumption placed upon them and as a consequence those at the end of the lines are out of water on these hot days when folks turn on the hydrant to keep alive grass, flowers and trees as well as to keep air conditioners going. It is as though folks were dipping out of a stream all along the bank. If enough people dipped enough water, those on the lower end would be without water. The only way to overcome the difficulty would be to have a larger stream so that no reasonable amount of dipping would pull the stream dry. That's the answer for the city, but pipe is scarce and high. The solution may be several years in coming completely. Meantime, our advice is to rise up real early in the morning to water your yard.

Bigness Is Qualitative

Houston interests, it is reported, are considering building the world's highest building in that South Texas metropolis city. There is ill-concealed pride in speculation—pride that another biggest title would come to Texas.

In fact, some of the plans have been aired, including the "biggest" hotel, the "biggest" department store, the "biggest" theatre. Texans will not be so interested in the proposed 1,366 feet as they will be that the suggested structure would be taller by one foot than the palace of the Soviets in Moscow and that it exceeds New York's Empire State building by 118 feet.

This biggest business is a sort of phobia with us. Doubtless, it has its roots in the fact that we are geographically the largest state in the union. Nature has endowed the state with such abundant resources that Texas has been able to achieve pre-eminent distinction in several other fields.

Back of this, the romantic history of the state has given a peculiar sort of fervor to Texas state pride, so much so that out-staters sometime concede us another "biggest" title—that of being the biggest blowhards.

A lot of the boasting is in fun, because most Texans are wise enough that bigness is not a measure of size so much as of quality. Thus, the real test of a state or city is not so much in its stone and steel as it is in its people, their spirit and attitude. These attributes concern us a lot more than a biggest building.

CHILDREN CAN GIVE GROWNUPS GOOD LESSON

NEW YORK, June 18. (AP)—The children have a fair argument against the grownups in America.

The kids are compelled by law to go to school to learn what the adults want to teach them. But there is no law to make the grownups go to a school and learn from the children. Yet there is much they could learn from the diaper-and-knickerbocker set.

Everybody in America, for example, might live longer by studying the lesson unintentionally given by two-year-old Kenneth Liebman of the Bronx. This bouncing boy tumbled out his apartment window the other day, fell six floors, landed on the lawn with a dull thud and a small grunt—and got up and waddled off unhurt.

How did he escape injury? Because he was relaxed, as all normal children in normal homes are.

But if little Kenneth should have a similar accident thirty years from now, after civilization had gone to work on him, what would happen? He would see death grinning up from the ground at him, his muscles would tighten in fear against the shock, and he'd be picked up in the same condition as a shattered pretzel.

Only a few adults keep this life-saving virtue born in every child—the art of relaxation.

Most champions do. And that is one of the big secrets of why they are champions. They are coordinated because they have the priceless gift of relaxing in the middle of action. That's true of a racehorse like Citation, as it was of Charlie Schwab closing a multi-million dollar steel order. Or of Babe Ruth, with two strikes on him in a world series game, pointing to the bleachers and knocking the next ball for a home run right where he'd called it.

Tension kills more people in the United States than anything except over-eating. And over-eating, in millions of cases, is nothing but a nervous expression of tension. They actually worry themselves fat at the dinner table.

People who genuinely want to stay alive in the earth's garden are shortening their stay by tearing down their nerves and arteries fretting over a war that hasn't started, by better job they haven't got, the baubles they wear themselves out to get and would be better off without.

Anybody who owns too many possessions ends up by being owned by them.

An hour more of sleep each night by everybody would destroy more nervous tension than all the pills or booze in all the bottles ever blown. And you'd get to work on time—there's one more worry gone.

Platforms, And Parties

WASHINGTON, June 18. (AP)—The Democrats and Republicans are going to promise you, the voter, a lot of things this year.

Already Republicans are huddling to manufacture a platform to dangle before the voters at their convention which opens June 21.

The Democrats will put in a lot of work on their platform before they unveil it at the Democratic convention July 12.

But if history is any guide to the future, a lot of those promises won't be kept, no matter which party is elected in November.

If you doubt this, just look, for instance, at the promises the parties made in their Chicago platforms of 1944.

Right here a Democrat or Republican can jump up and say "Look here. Don't blame my party for failure to keep its promises. The other side blocked us."

But the point is that both parties, in the four years since 1944, have had an equal chance to make good because—

From 1944 until 1946 the Democrats have been running it since 1946.

The voters don't often get such a chance to put a finger at both parties equally and say "Why didn't you deliver?"

Some of the 1944 promises were kept. For example:

Both parties promised to put this country into a world organization to keep peace. They worked together and put us into the United Nations.

Both parties promised an income tax cut, and taxes were cut. True, it was the Republican-controlled Congress which rammed through a big cut over President Truman's veto.

The President argued that he wanted to cut taxes but in a different way.

But there were plenty of things both parties promised but didn't do. For example:

Civil rights. The Republican platform very specifically promised action on wiping out the poll tax, passing an anti-lynching law, and setting up a Fair Employment Practice Commission.

The 1944 Democratic platform, far more vaguely, suggested doing something about civil rights, meaning more civil rights for Negroes.

No civil rights law has been passed since 1944.

Washington Merry-Go-Round—

Stassen Has Helped U. S. By Stimulating Political Thought, But Fund Chest Low

(EDITOR'S NOTE—The character and prospects of Harold Stassen are analyzed by Drew Pearson today in his series of columns on G. O. P. candidates.)

WASHINGTON—Whether Harold Stassen wins or not—and he probably won't—he has done a great service to the Republican Party.

When other candidates were being coy, and while certain leaders were saying they did not want to be president, the refreshing Mr. Stassen announced that he was one who wanted to be president and proceeded to go out and hustle for it. Furthermore, he made other candidates hustle. Result was more scrutiny of candidates, more public thinking about the Republican nomination than in any other recent presidential year.

For this alone, the American people owe Mr. Stassen a large vote of thanks.

The Stassen campaign today is dragging. His campaign chest, once amply supplied, is now reported to be \$100,000 in the red. Many of the big-money boys, once enthusiastic over Stassen, cooled off after his Oregon debate. It was not that they disagreed with Stassen, but rather that they want to be on the winning bandwagon and they figured Stassen wouldn't win.

CRUCIAL DEBATE History may show the Dewey debate was the turning point in the race to decide who will be the next president of the United States.

Stassen, in challenging Dewey, figured he was playing safe. The advantage was against Dewey. Not only did it appear more popular at that time to outlast communism, but Stassen was accustomed to rough-and-tumble debate. After all his speeches he had invited questions from the audience. He had had a lot of practice. In his grain speculation charges against Ed Pauley, he had outtalked both Pauley and his defending senators. Holding press conferences was Stassen forte.

Knowing this, some of Dewey's friends advised him not to accept the Stassen challenge. The youthful Minnesota governor, Paul Lockwood warned Dewey, was battling a political trap.

"If I am going to be defeated," replied the usually cautious Mr. Dewey, "I know of no better issue to be defeated on. We cannot have thought-control in the United States."

The debate which followed sent Dewey's battered stock soaring. It may have decided who will be the next president of the United States. STASSEN WAS "TOO LIBERAL."

Three other factors are working against Stassen:

1. His youth. He is 41 and many people think he can afford to be aged in the wood a bit.

2. The party bosses. They don't want a man they cannot control, would much prefer a party hack named Speaker Joe Martin.

3. Stassen's liberal background, appears to be diluted with growing gobs of conservatism. Some suspect the onetime crusading governor of Minnesota of trying to carry water on both shoulders, in order to keep happy both his labor following and the large group of businessmen who have quailed his political machine.

These include: Henry Atwood, president of the National Bank, Minneapolis; Julian Baird, president of the National Bank, St. Paul; Harry A. Bullis, chairman of General Mills; Edward B. Cosgrove, head of Minnesota Valley Canning; Donald Davis, head of

Minnesota and Ontario Paper; Jay Cooke, prominent Philadelphia opponent of the housing bill; W. L. McKnight, head of the Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Co.

At any rate, Stassen, who once opposed the Taft-Hartley Labor Act, who favored strong anti-trust prosecution, and urged heavy taxes on high profits, has now pulled in his horns on many of these issues.

To his credit it should be noted that he has had the courage to take a stand on almost everything—even the dynamite-laden question of whether the U. S. ambassador to the Vatican should be recalled and whether U. S. taxpayers' money should be used for buses to parochial schools. As a result, a storm of criticism has poured on his head from his own church (Baptist) and other Protestant groups.

IMMIGRANT GRANDPARENTS Stassen has a unique American background and, despite his youthful years, a wealth of diversified experience. Like Wendell Wilkie, his grandparents were immigrants; two from Germany, one from Norway, one from Czechoslovakia. To get his education, Stassen worked on a farm, as a grocer's clerk, in a bake shop, and spent three summers as a Pullman conductor on the Milwaukee Railroad.

As a young Minnesota lawyer, Stassen was so forthright that in his first race for governor he defeated both the Farmer-Labor candidate and the old guard Republican machine. The AFL and

CIO generally supported him.

It was Senator Joe Ball, a St. Paul newsman whom Stassen appointed to the Senate, who later reciprocated by persuading the White House to appoint Stassen as a U. S. delegate to the first United Nations conference in San Francisco.

There, Stassen, a returned naval hero, did a good job. Given the thankless chore of conferring with the peace organizations desiring to "consult" with the U. S. delegation, Stassen not only kept them reasonably happy but made political friends for the future.

More important, he proved himself a better statesman than Vandenberg by battling against the veto. Van has received the major credit for constructing the U. N. charter, but it was the youthful Minnesotaan who foresaw the veto reefs ahead.

Should Stassen win out in his ambition to enter the White House, foreign policy would be in the hands of a man who had already conferred with Stalin, Molotov, Attlee and other world leaders. The young man from Minnesota has given himself as much preparation as possible for the big job to which he aspires.

Unquestionably he would be a much better president than various of his Republican stalemates, but certain of the party bosses would almost cut off their left arm before they would let him get the nomination. They would take him for vice president with great pleasure, however. And that, probably, is where Stassen will end up.

Texas Today—

WAR IS WAGED AGAINST DREAD POLIO RISE

BY WILLIAM C. BARNARD With polio in 55 Texas counties, vigorous civic cleanup campaigns are being waged from the Mexican border to the top of the Panhandle.

The campaigns are leveled at the fly—both the house and horse variety—for the fly is suspected of being the No. 1 carrier of polio, a virus disease. Physicians say that evidence is stronger against the horsefly than the housefly in spite of the fact that polio often spreads through cities where few horseflies are to be found.

Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, Wednesday praised the cleanup campaigns but said he didn't feel they would help this year but that "They'll bring good results next year."

"You can't expect to wipe out in a few weeks the probable cause of polio that has been accumulating for years," said Dr. Cox. Last night we talked with a physician who felt Dr. Cox was in error. He didn't want his name used: "I haven't time to get in any argument with Dr. Cox," but he added:

"Anything that kills flies is apt to slow the spread of polio. I feel that if Texas cities kill millions of flies it should get results in the immediate future. Not only do I think Dr. Cox is wrong... I think he is using poor psychology on the public."

The State Health Department reports a total of 428 cases for 1948, the worst record in the state's history for this time of year.

Texas newspapers are giving headline spreads and good picture coverage to the city cleanups. At Denton, more than 25 firms furnished trucks as a drive started. The Rio Grande Valley was foggy with DDT. Airplanes were hired to spray 25 communities in Hidalgo County alone. Seven crews with hand sprays worked Cameron County, also in the Valley.

Two mayors of twin cities, R. M. Vick of Bryan and Ernest Langford of College Station, proclaimed a state of health emergency following a tour of their areas and called for cleanups.

San Antonio is fighting both polio and diarrhea. The latter disease has taken the lives of 103 infants there this year. There were two cases of polio in one family at San Antonio—Patricia and Nicholas Curd, children of Cpl. and Mrs. Billy F. Curd, Randolph Air Force Base.

The Lubbock area has had few cases of polio, but the cleanup campaign in the Panhandle city has been roaring along, full tilt. There were no cases in Smith County, but the Smith County unit of the women's division of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis are holding precautionary meetings. Coleman expected to get a real bath of DDT, and Wichita Falls hoped for the same. More than 15,000 gallons of DDT have been sprayed over Harris County.

At Amarillo, the Globe, pressing a cleanup campaign, sent out a whole flock of news photographers. "They came back," the newspaper confessed, "with a whole batch of photographs. Malaya Is In Uproar

Malaya is in an uproar. This simple statement covers all the confusion of the British empire trying to get out of a tower of Babel (junior grade) in the midst of an outcropping of the Chinese civil war.

A state of emergency has been declared in four of the states of the new Malay federation. White planters and Chinese brokers are being killed, allegedly by Chinese Communists. Ten labor unions have been outlawed by decree. The death penalty has been proclaimed for anyone caught packing a gun without permission.

Let's go back to 1942, when the Japanese army conquered the peninsula from the British. After V-J day the British came back. The Malaysians were more or less welcomed there because they knew their own people were outnumbered by the huge Chinese and Indian groups.

The British proposed a Malayan union, designed to set Malaya free someday. The sultans said it would have given too much of their local power to their own central government, and besides would have made citizens out of the Chinese and Indians.

In the meantime a succession of strikes and other labor troubles had arisen. This was due partly to a guerrilla army of several thousand men in the interior who had been fighting the Japanese. Many of these were Communists.

As the Malayan union plan displeased the sultans, the British produced a plan for the present federation. The sultans signed after reading far enough to see there was a provision which did not give equal rights to the Chinese and Indians.

Not only the Chinese left-wingers were sore about this. So were the rich middleman class of Chinese, who control much of Malaya's business, belong to the Kuomintang, and contribute to Nanking's column.

Never-Ending Error Battle

Probably nothing fomented consternation more quickly among newspaper personnel, or brings more comment from readers, than the typographical error. In fact, the latter has been so apparent that upon occasion some publishers of periodicals have claimed to provide errors purposely, with the idea that it stimulated readers who detected the mistakes.

However, it is doubtful that any newspaper editors ever practiced such shenanigans, because their publications are wide open to attack from all sides by demon error without any promoting.

For example, there are nine chances for errors to creep into each item prepared by the Herald's local staff, and at least 10 chances for each item that reaches the office via the leased wire Associated Press Service.

Of the nine chances each local item must face before it emerges in print, six of them are chances for human error and three for mechanical error. That means, of course, that at least six people "handle" a story in some way before it is ready for the press, and somewhere along the line the story must pass through three pieces of mechanical apparatus.

Stories received over the leased wires face all of those chances with one added to the list from the mechanical side.

The struggle to eliminate the error problem constitutes a continuous battle in the newspaper office, regardless of whether it is a four-page weekly or a metropolitan daily. We at the Herald might call it the "battle of the nine and ten."—WACIL McNAIR

U. N. Leaders Still Have Hope

On three successive days last week three men were heard from who understand the United Nations and are determined to make it work.

On Wednesday Count Folke Bernadotte, without any military force at his disposal but with diplomatic support from the great powers, succeeded in mediating a truce in Palestine.

On Thursday the Secretary General, Mr. Trygve Lie, speaking at Harvard, brought forward a proposal of the Secretariat to raise "a small guard force as distinct from a striking force," to be at the disposal of the United Nations.

On Friday Senator Vandenberg obtained a decisive vote (64 to 4) for his resolution which is in substance a vote of confidence that the present Charter need not be scrapped because it can be improved and used more effectively.

The initial success of Count Bernadotte has shown that the basic conception of the United Nations is sound; that is to say that when the great powers are able to agree that they prefer peace to war, then small wars (which could become big wars) can be localized, the fighting regulated and reduced, and the opportunity to mediate the issues created. That is not everything. But it is a very great deal, and no one who understands the Charter or the realities of world politics would expect more. He will not expect the U. N. to resolve the great conflict between East and West. He will know that that can be done only by diplomacy or by war.

But he has a right to expect that the secondary conflicts, of which Palestine is a conspicuous example, can be dealt with through the U. N.—and without the intervention of large forces.

The root of the American vacillation on Palestine was the belief, based on misinformation and misunderstanding, that the partition recommended by the General Assembly could be carried out only by the intervention of a large international army. Last winter it was the general view—shared by many supporters of Zionism—that an army at least as large as the British, upward of 70,000 men, would be needed to "enforce" partition. Quite rightly, if that was true, Mr. Marshall and Mr. Forrestal refused to send American troops to fight Arabs and Jews in the Holy Land, or to permit the Soviet government to send a division of the Red Army into the Middle East.

But in fact, as events have shown, no international army was needed to enforce partition. What was needed was diplomatic action to induce the acceptance de jure of the partition which existed de facto. The truce, which Count Bernadotte has arranged, became possible when diplomatic action had been taken in Washington, London, Tel Aviv, Amman and Cairo which made it plain that the great powers would not support a war in defiance of the United Nations. No international army was needed for that. All that was needed was agreement by the great powers to withhold the armed force which only they could supply. A serious war cannot be fought in Palestine by the local armies. Therefore, once the great powers refrained from supporting the war, a truce was possible.

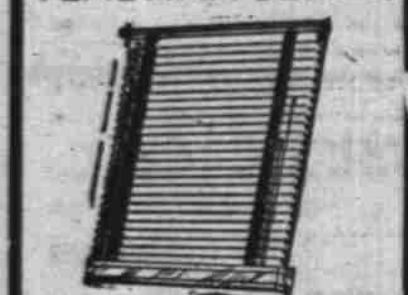

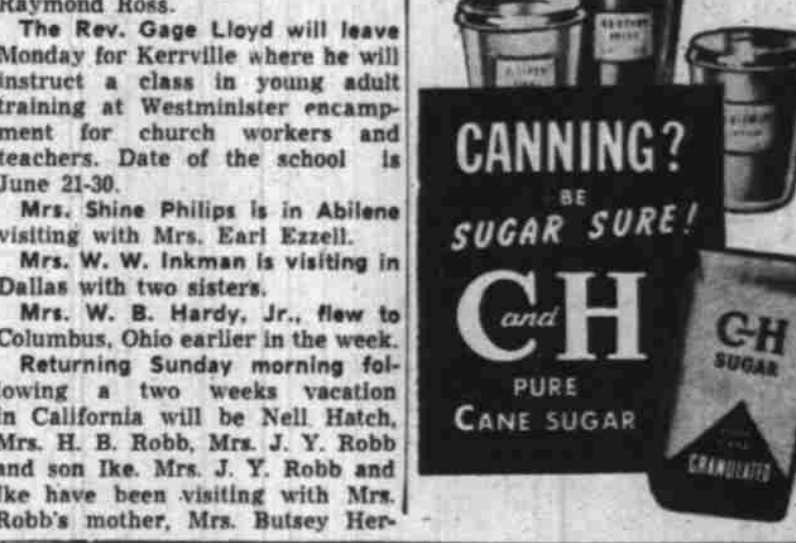

Blalock Cites Topsoil Value To Americans

Declaring that top soil—"that first 18 or 20 inches of the earth"—is America's greatest natural resource, Bryan Blalock, Marshall, cited the dairy industry as the most important part of this country's agricultural program here Thursday night.

Blalock spoke to more than 200 persons who assembled at the Howard County Junior college auditorium for a special program in observance of Dairy Month in Texas. Farmers, dairymen and students from Howard and Mitchell counties attended the event.

"We in America not only have the best milk, but also the safest milk in the world," the speaker declared. The American housewife purchases milk, ice cream and other dairy products without any apprehension about sanitation, but it is a different story in other countries, he explained.

People connected with the dairy industry also like to remind the public that milk is the most nutritious food available, he commented.

Beginning the formal program, L. A. Chapman, manager of the Colorado City chamber of commerce, introduced O. D. Dillingham, Abilene dairy products manufacturer. After a few remarks in which he praised milk producers of West Texas and pointed to the soundness of the dairy industry in this area, Dillingham presented the principal speaker.

Prior to the meeting, sandwiches and milk were served by Banner and Borden creameries at Big Spring, joint sponsors of the program.

Uses Shakespeare To Defend Film

LONDON, June 18. (U)—Harold Wilson, president of the Board of Trade, says Britons are getting a little sick of motion pictures about schizophrenia and amnesia.

"We are especially tired of some gangster films and some of the sadistic and psychological films of which we have seen too many," these films of diseased minds," he told the House of Commons last night.

Walter Elliott, a Conservative member of parliament, came right back at him.

"There is no film at its most extreme which reaches the depths of schizophrenia or of sadism reached by the great bard Shakespeare. Believe me, 'No Orchids for Miss Blandish' (a British-made gangster picture with some particularly sadistic moments) is a Saturday afternoon tea party compared with some of the works and sayings of the great Elizabethan poets."

MONTREAL, June 18. (U)—Three children were burned to death, another child is missing and five persons suffered serious burns early today in a fire in suburban Longueuil.

JUST WANTS GOOD WATER

FRISTOE, Mo., June 18. (U)—When a well driller told 73-year-old Mrs. Lou Brooks Thomas he had struck oil on her farm, she objected.

"All I want is good drinking water," she said, "and you can't get that from an oil well."

Bill Barnes, the driller, related yesterday that he hit a pocket of oil while redrilling a water well on Mrs. Thomas' farm near this West-Central Missouri town.

Mrs. Thomas ordered the well sealed with concrete and another one drilled nearby. In drilling the second well, Barnes reported finding a similar rock formation and a slight coating of oil on the water at 102 feet.

But Mrs. Thomas told him not to go any deeper. She said she was afraid he might strike oil again.

Soviets Criticize Howley Actions

BERLIN, June 18. (U)—The official Soviet newspaper, Tagliche Rundschau, today criticized the manners of Col. Frank L. Howley, U.S. representative on the Allied Kommandatura.

It complained that when he left the Kommandatura meeting Wednesday night after a 13-hour sitting he slammed the door of the chamber "as though he were in a stable."

After Howley left the long Wednesday session, pleading fatigue, the Russian delegates stomped out, crying "insult." The French general presiding at the time said Howley had acted properly and said it was the Russians who were rude.

Three Hundred Are Drowned In China

CANTON, China, June 18. (U)—Three hundred persons were reported dead and thousands homeless today as flood waters inundated Taishan County, about 70 miles southwest of here.

The reports were not confirmed. The rain-swollen East, North and West Rivers in South China also overflowed and flooded vast farming areas.

Sixty persons were reported drowned on the East River when three junks struck rocks and sank.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Jews Are Promised Savior By Ezekiel

Scripture — Ezekiel 34:11-16, 22-32; Daniel 7:13, 14; Zechariah 3:8-10; 6-12, 13; 9:9, 10; 12:10; 13:1; John 10:14.

After centuries of wandering in foreign lands or of living in their own — subject to alien people — Assyrians, Babylonians, Medo-Persians, Greeks, Egyptians and Romans — and in modern times, the Arabs and British, the Jewish people have their own nation — Israel — with a president and a constitution, for which they are willing to fight.

Persecuted and slaughtered in many lands in which they have taken root, discriminated against in others, their final recent martyrdom in Nazi Germany brought to a head the vital need of a homeland of their own, where they would feel safe and secure. Here they hope eventually to transfer many of their own homeless people and be able to "call every man his neighbor under the vine and under the fig tree."

Through all their sufferings remote from their own country in that old time of which the Bible relates, the Israelites were sustained by one great hope — that a Messiah, which means "the anointed one," would come to lead them and set them up again as a great nation — such as they had known under David and Solomon.

Ezekiel, one of the great prophets of Israel, who was with them in their servitude, comforted and called his people with the words, "Thus saith the Lord God: Behold I, even I, will both search My sheep, and seek them out." As a good shepherd He would deliver them out of the places where they had been scattered, and bring them to their own land. He would seek those that were lost, would bind up their wounds, strengthen them that were sick, and take care of them.

Furthermore, Ezekiel promised, the Lord would set over them one shepherd, "even my servant David." David had been their king in their time of glorious prosperity — but he had been dead for 400 years. He had been anointed with oil by Samuel, and combined in himself the functions of king and representative of God. His person was sacred, as with the anointing, a spirit entered into him. Some thought that David would come back in person; others that one of his line would be their Messiah.

How the hearts of these poor exiles must have warmed when Ezekiel, their fellow exile, repeated the Lord's word to them: "And they (his people) should be no more a prey to the heathen, neither shall the beast of the land devour them; but they shall dwell safely, and none shall make them afraid."

Zechariah, the prophet who was a contemporary of Haggai, and helped the latter rebuild the temple at Jerusalem after some of the people had gone back to Palestine, prophesied the coming of Jesus, describing accurately His triumphant ride into Jerusalem on

what we now know as Palm Sunday, and calling on the "Daughter of Zion" to rejoice.

"Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion; shout, O daughter of Jerusalem; behold, thy King cometh unto thee; He is just, and having salvation; lowly, and riding upon an ass, and upon a colt the foal of an ass."

The Jewish people of Jesus' time also looked back with nostalgia to the time of their greatest glory, when David was their ruler, whose long reign and continued prosperity made him their godlike hero. Therefore it was from his line that the Messiah was expected to come to restore the nation.

As long as the princess of David's family lived and received honors, not only from their own people, but from the princes and rulers of other lands, the renewed hope of national independence and eminence connected itself naturally with a descendant of the old stock. But the prominent members of David's family gradually disappeared leaving the Jews still hoping that some time their Messiah would come from his line.

Jesus did come from David through His mother, but alas, He did not come in glory, and the authorities of His time, while marveling at His learning and good works, refused to accept Him as anything but a man of lowly means, and a disturber of the peace and even a blasphemer, and they cried "Crucify Him; crucify Him!" Even His humble followers were slow to realize that this simple Man was the Son of God, the Savior of the world.

So they crucified Him on the cross, but He lives and continues His healing work for all who will listen to His words and heed them — the true Messiah!

Harbor Workers Will Continue To Strike

LONDON, June 18. (U)—Harbor workers voted today to continue a five-day-old wildcat strike involving 15,000 men and more than 100 ships.

The decision caused speculation as to whether the government will use troops to unload perishable food cargoes.

The strikers rejected a special tribunal's proposal for compromise of the original dispute over penalties against 11 dock hands who refused to unload a cargo of zinc oxide without extra pay.
