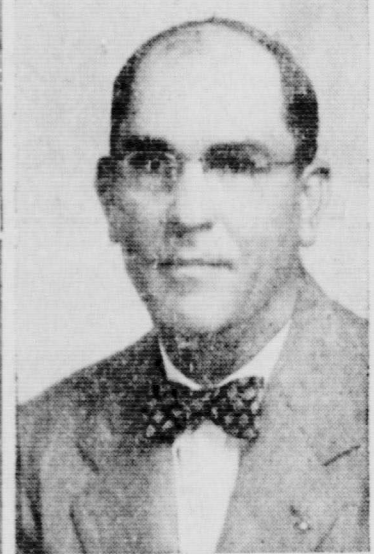

Strawn Extension Is Indicated As Hale Well Flows

An extension for Strawn sand production in the area five miles northeast of Cisco was reported today when the I. Weiner et al No. 1 Ted Hale flowed 25 barrels per hour on a four-hour completion test. An official potential test had not been run.

The Hale lease offsets production on the W. W. Bradley-Courtney lease. The field has been designated as the Courtney Field, being named for the discovery well.

Evans, David and Bradley of Eastland have staked location for their No. 1 Fred Davenport as an offset to production in the same field. Location is in Section 31, Block 4, H&TC Survey. Permit calls for depth of 1,700 feet with rotary equipment.

Bankline Oil Co. filed a potential report for its No. 11 A. V. Clark which was completed recently. The test showed 450 barrels of 41 gravity oil in 24 hours through a 24/64ths choke with good pressure. The well is in the Owens Field five miles northeast of Cisco.

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Dr. George Cox Elected Health Officer Again

AUSTIN, Nov. 16 — The Texas State Board of Health has elected Dr. George W. Cox of Austin to his eighth consecutive two-year term as state health officer.

The vote of the nine member board was unanimous in favor of keeping Dr. Cox in the post he has held since 1936, the longest tenure in the 70-odd year history of the State Department of Health.

Dr. O. B. Kiel of Wichita Falls, chairman of the board, called Dr. Cox, "outstanding among the health officers in the nation." "The job he has done in this capacity is remarkable," Dr. Kiel said. "I speak for the whole board when I say Texas is fortunate to have such a man as Dr. Cox heading its public health activities."

In addition to Dr. Kiel, present board members are Dr. S. D. Coleman, Navasota; Pat J. Cavengaugh, a San Antonio pharmacist; Dr. John H. Mitchell, Tyler; Dr. A. W. Rogers, Corsicana; J. P. Burden, San Angelo; Dr. T. C. Terrell, Fort Worth; Dr. B. E. Pickett, Carrizo Springs; and Dr. L. S. Oates, Center.

Dr. Cox has aligned himself with the public health movement in Texas throughout his professional career. He is a former member of the State Board of Health. His medical degree was conferred at Tulane University. Some of the highlights of his tenure as the leader of State public health activities are:

A reduction of typhoid fever death rates of 97 per cent; a 96 per cent cut in malaria mortality; 43 per cent reduction in syphilis death tolls.

The common diseases of childhood - scarlet fever, whooping cough, diphtheria and measles - have been so sharply curtailed that last year the combined death rate from these causes was less than one-third that of diphtheria alone 15 years ago. Influenza and pneumonia deaths have also fallen off sharply since 1937.

500 per cent increase in the number of local health units has occurred under the administration of the veteran health chief who strongly advocates decentralization of the states health facilities "so people can get to them."

He is a past president of the United States-Mexico Border Public Health Conference, a diplomate of the American Board of Preventive Medicine and Public Health and a member of the American Public Health Association, American Medical Association and the Texas State Medical Association. He is also director of the Division of Emergency Medical Services and Public Health within the framework of the State's civil defense organization.

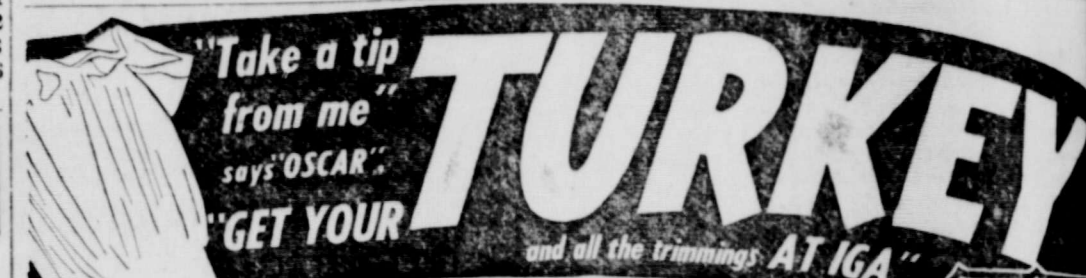
