Farrell visits with BOED, media

Construction to begin soon

Emerson Farrell, CEO of FGE Power, visited Colorado City last week with a couple of his colleagues. He met with BOED staff and members of the media during his visit, saying it would be a "few more months until groundbreaking" on the power plant project.

The CEO talked about the challenges of producing electricity in a deregulated market, contracts to sell electricity, and surprises in the process so far.

With power plant bankruptcies in the news, Farrell was asked how FGE would be able to turn a profit in a competitive market while others have not been able to do so. He said he thinks most of the plants being shut down have an old business model, use old-school



techniques for producing energy and have processes that are inefficient.

"A lot of them have no plan for the future," he said. "I'm looking at 20 to 30 years down the road."

Farrell said FGE will focus on keeping costs down, which he believes is key in the deregulated market. He also pointed to long-term thinking as something that's necessary in the power generation business. The businessman

cited three things he sees as necessary for the success of generating electricity: 1. Cost sensitivity 2. Creation of jobs and 3. Environmental sensitivity.

Competing with renewable energy sources, such as wind energy, is challenging, but Farrell stressed that FGE's investors are committed to

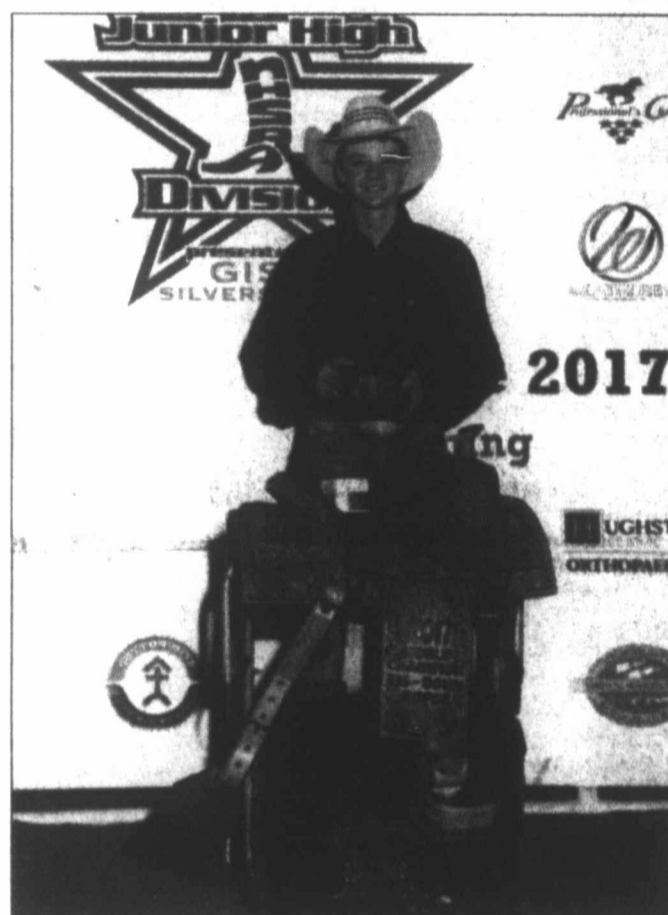

CHS students win national FCCLA contest division

Results are in, and two Colorado High School students have won the national FCCLA contest in their division. Jisell Ventura and M'Leah Alexander received gold medals and a perfect score on their score sheets.

The two CHS students were part of a group of five competing from Colorado City. They competed in the "Focus on the Children" Star Event, assisting a student who has Rheumatoid Arthritis during her horse therapy sessions at Take the Reins Therapy Center near Dunn.

More than 7,500 Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) members, advisers, alumni, and guests from across the country gathered in Nashville, TN for the 2017 National Leadership Conference. The meeting provided Colorado High School members with the opportunity to attend leadership and program training, hear national speakers, meet the

Westbrook 8th grader wins two national titles

Jacob Walters, an 8th grader at Westbrook ISD, won two national titles at the National Junior High Rodeo Finals. Part of his performances will be aired on television on Sunday, July 23rd.

Walters joined the top four rodeo athletes in each rodeo event from all 50 states, Australia and Canada to advance to nationals to compete for cash, prizes and scholarships. The rodeo was held during the week of June 18th - June 24th in Lebanon, Tennessee. Each contestant competed in two go rounds during the week and the top 20 in each event advanced to the short round which was held Saturday night.

Walters won the first round of the tie down calf roping and was second in the second round which put him first in the average by seven-tenths of a second going in to the short round. He held off the second place contender, and fellow Texan teammate, by tying his short round calf in 10.7 seconds to secure his first

CISD trustees accept bids, approve new lunch prices

Bids were accepted in preparation for the fast-approaching 2017-18 school year during the Colorado ISD Board of Trustees meeting Monday evening. The board approved bids for food, fuel, and commercial insurance.

New Cafeteria Director Becky Sanford made recommendations in the bids for bread and dairy products, and the board

approved bids accordingly. Lowe's Market will supply bread and Borden's Dairy will supply milk and related dairy products to the district again this year.

Borden's prices were two cents cheaper on cartons and the company uses the plastic containers preferred by cafeteria staff. Lowe's submitted the only bid for bread.

Matlock was the only bidder to provide

fuel for the school district. CISD Financial Officer Shelia Redwine was pleased to recommend the local company, saying the company is easy to work with and provides quick service and delivery.

The Texas Association of School Board Risk Management Fund will, once again, supply the district's commercial insurance on buildings and properties. TASB sub-

mitted the only bid. While district leaders expected insurance rates to increase, the jump is more than what they planned.

Superintendent Reggy Spencer said the district's deductible will increase to \$100,000 and premiums have increased by \$20,000. The policy includes auto insurance as well.

Blow-out leads to fatality

A blow out caused a crash Sunday evening that resulted in the death of a 14-year-old Brownwood girl. The accident occurred near the west interchange, just west of Colorado City.

The call came in at 7:55 p.m. on Sunday, July 16th, that a one-vehicle accident had occurred on I-20 two miles west of Colorado City.

According to a report by the Department of Public Safety, Ana Maria Gonzalez, 14, of Graham, was driving a 2005 Chrysler Town and Country van east on the interchange when the left rear tire blew out. She lost control of the vehicle and it went into a side ditch, slid through the bar ditch and rolled several times.

Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department Chief Tom Carlock said firefighters used the jaws of life and a chop saw to cut through the top and side of the van away so passengers could be

"Patsy Ann" was the youngest and last survivor of the six children born to C.C. Harless and Veda Preston Harless of the Lloyd Mountain community of Scurry County. She was a graduate of Snyder High School, class of '57, where she was considered by many to be a natural beauty, full of wit and charm. Shelter going strong, planning event

The Colorado City Animal Shelter is nearing its first anniversary, and the two hard-working women who run it came to the weekly meeting of the Lions Club to talk about what has been accomplished and what is needed to continue the good work.

Rustine Lendermon and Dawn Hawley were the guest speakers at the club's meeting. They said over the course of the last year, 99 dogs from the local shelter have been fostered and adopted into loving homes.

The dynamic duo have an event planned to increase that number even more. On Tuesday, August 1st, an anniversary grand opening and adoption event will be held at the shelter, located at 140 Kimball. Everyone is encouraged to come out, bring donations, sign up to volunteer, or adopt the newest member of your family.

While it's a sad statistic, the high number number shows the dedication the ladies have to finding homes for these unwanted pets. Hawley works with area, state and national groups to

find foster homes and permanent homes for the animals.

"We just want to give the animals a chance, but it's a tough road. The volunteers work really hard to help, and Dawn works day and night on finding homes," Lendermon said last Friday.

Dogs and cats and adopted or fostered out to many places, so go as far away as Colorado and Washington. Some lucky pups have been adopted by soldiers and people have driven all the way from Kerrville to pick them up.

The website www.rescueme.org is a big help in getting the word out about available dogs.

The city strives to keep the adoption fee of \$30 a minimum in an effort to make it easier to get the dogs adopted. Though euthanasia is sometimes necessary, it's never the preferred option. When an animal is adopted, the new owners have seven days to bring proof of rabies vaccination and 30 days to spay or neuter their pet.

Volunteering at the shelter means physical work, as the facility currently houses 17 dogs. Volunteers often take the dogs out of pens to allow time to clean. They also feed, water, exercise and play with the dogs who are usually grateful for the attention.

When the shelter first opened, it was just a few pens inside a metal building. Through donations, a few improvements have been made possible. The facility now has a chain-link fence and some insulation. There are two free-standing air conditioners and two water cooler ACs.

Lendermon said she's in the business of working with pet owners to help them take responsibility for their pets. Some animals are picked up more than once,

and citations are issued to owners who don't take measures to contain and take care of their dogs.

Animal Control services are specific to the city limit only, as Lendermon and Hawley are city employees. Sometimes those services mean going on welfare concern calls, and the duo conducts investigations as needed.

Lendermon said she deals with calls on all types of animals, including cats, dogs, skunks, raccoons, snakes and even the occa-

sional wild hog. When she needs help, she knows she can count on Colorado City Police Officers to come to her aid.

TUMBLEWEED SMITH Salado Legends celebrates 25 years

When Jackie Mills took over the operation of Salado's Tablerock outdoor theater in 1992, there was \$1.34 in the bank account and some unpaid bills. "It was the first time I had done anything like this and I was an easy mark," she says. "I just thought it could be a great thing for Salado and surrounding communities."

She wanted to present an extravaganza on the Tablerock stage featuring costumes, lights, singing, dancing and the early days of Salado, all performed by a cast of 50 people. Some of the original cast members are still playing their parts. "There's a story to it and a love story," says Jackie. "All the music is original." Jackie wrote the lyrics but had to get help with the music. She worked with a composer many late nights in a recording studio.

"It took me nine months to write the story. And I still didn't have the end of it written when we started rehearsals. Cast members would look at the script and wanted to know about how the play would end. I told them just to be patient, that it was coming. Finally I figured out how I was going to end it. The title is Salado Legends."

One scene is about the Civil War and has black powder rifles and a cannon. Jackie says it's very noisy. When Salado was first founded, it was a town of teetotalers. Residents were serious about that. When someone tried to open a saloon, it was a big flop. "All the women went to the building, brought chairs and their knitting and sat down in front of the door. Do you think a man would cross that threshold? Of course not. So the saloon moved to a nearby community."

When Jackie took on the job of running the theater, it had been abandoned and weeds had just about taken over the audience area. That had to be addressed first, then came building sets and getting the theater ready for a show. "There was no place to go but up, so we did." Jackie's husband is an engineer and helped design an overall layout of the theater. For those first performances, the audience either sat on grass or bought their lawn chairs. Now there are seats for 600.

"For those first performances I borrowed costumes from Baylor, lights from the Temple Community Center and all kinds of things from several people. Some were afraid to see me coming for fear I'd ask them for something. But we made money with the very first performance, enough to buy lights. And the next performance we made enough to get something else."

Apparently Tablerock is in good financial shape now (nobody working on the show gets paid). It just purchased a new sound system for \$5,000. About a thousand people attend the annual three-night run. "It's always the last two Saturdays in July and the first Saturday in August. This year it'll be July 22, July 29 and August 5th."

Tablerock is named for a huge flat rock on a nearby creek. "Indians went there to sun and drink the water for medicinal purposes. It's loaded with minerals. Tablerock is a place of healing."

Dangers of summer temps explored

Heating Up!
With summer here, so are the 100-degree days of West Texas. Being out and about in very hot temperatures, there are several different heat related illnesses that people need to be aware of. There are different signs and symptoms that a person needs to be observant for while out working or participating in recreational activities in the hot summer heat. Heat illnesses/injuries are real and they can occur very fast, but most are easily preventable and can be reversed if treated appropriately and in a timely manner. The 3 types of heat injuries are below in mildest to most severe.

Heat cramps- Heat cramps are painful, involuntary muscle spasms that usually occur during heavy exercise in hot environments. The spasms may be more intense and more prolonged than are typical nighttime leg cramps. Fluid and electrolyte loss often contribute to heat cramps. (Mayo Clinic, 2017)

Heat Exhaustion- Heat exhaustion is a condition whose symptoms may include heavy sweating and a rapid pulse, a result of your body overheating. (Mayo Clinic, 2017)

Heat Stroke- Heatstroke is a condition caused by your body overheating, usu-

ally as a result of prolonged exposure to or physical exertion in high temperatures. This most serious form of heat injury, heatstroke can occur if your body temperature rises to 104 F (40 C) or higher. (Mayo Clinic, 2017)

Each type of injury has some similar signs and symptoms. However, Heat stroke is more severe and needs to be treated more rapidly and aggressively. If heat stroke is not treated immediately there can be irreversible organ damage, brain damage or death. The main difference is the body's temperature. A body temperature of 104 Fahrenheit is the main sign of a heat stroke. This is usually accompanied by altered mental status, some sort of delusions or unresponsiveness. The person usually has flushed, hot and dry skin. A fast heart rate, increased respiratory rate, and low blood pressure are usually present due to the volume depletion/dehydration.

Heat exhaustion usually has moist cool skin with possibly heavy sweating. This is usually accompanied by an increased heart rate, weakness and dizziness due to the volume depletion/dehydration. Muscle cramps are usually present as well. There are several symptoms in all the heat related illness that are similar and mimic each due to the similar pathophysiology due to the decreased circulating volume in the body.

The treatment of the different type of

heat related illness are somewhat similar for heat cramps and heat exhaustion. The first thing is to stop the strenuous activities, get in a cooler spot and start drinking fluids. When it comes to fluid choices, water or some sort of sports drink with electrolytes are the best for fluid resuscitation. Carbonated beverages (cokes), coffee, or alcohol are not sufficient and should probably be avoided if there is a heat illness concern.

Heat stroke requires more extensive treatment aggressively. Cooling measures must be started quickly with fluid resuscitation. If shivering occurs, which also increases the body's temperature, other medications might be administered as well. If there is a concern for heat stroke, call 911 and begin cooling measures with whatever is available. Cool cloths, water, fan or ice packs all can start cooling measures.

With summer here, the best way to prevent heat illnesses is to be prophylactic. If you are not used to being in the heat, try to get acclimated slowly over several days. Wear loose light clothing. Use sunscreen and avoid getting burnt. Stay hydrated with appropriate fluids. Also, remember to never leave any person, child or animal in a parked car! 718 children left in vehicles have died of heatstroke since 1998 (no-heatstroke.org).

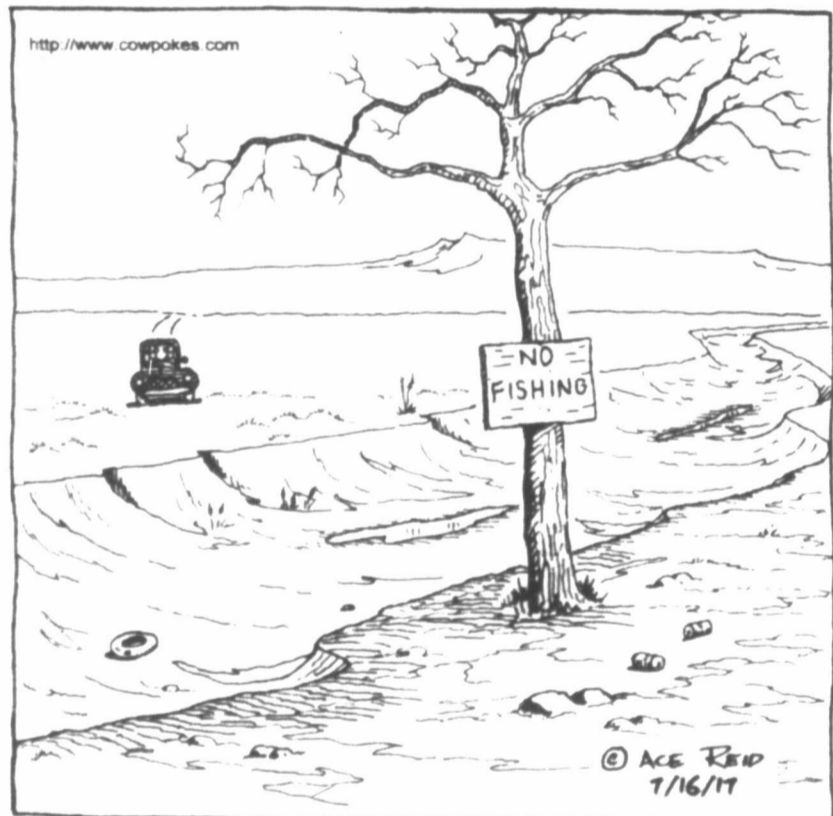

to the project. He said financing is backed by BlackRock, the largest energy financier in the world.

FGE is part of ERCOT, the Electric Reliability Council of Texas. ERCOT operates the electric grid and manages the deregulated market for 75 percent of the state, or about 24 million customers. Farrell said selling outside of the state would be difficult, but that's not FGE's plan.

"Our objective is to help Texas. We want to generate power for Texas," Farrell said.

The energy company CEO said FGE won't begin construction until the electricity is sold. He said FGE is ready to start construction as soon as those contracts are signed. In the risky business of energy generation, it's not enough to have hope. Nothing will happen until the electricity is sold.

Though he's faced opposition from small groups of citizens, Farrell said he remains committed to building the plant in Mitchell County. He said one of the things important to FGE officials

is building the power plant in a location where much-needed jobs would be created.

On the topic of water, Farrell said the plant would have enough by the time it's needed for operation. He talked about the recent change of plans in the purchase of water from the county.

Water is a critical component of the operation of the plant, and FGE was trying to contract with the county to purchase water from wells drilled on county-owned land. A group of citizens came out against the project, and after comments were made in opposition, Farrell announced that FGE would not seek a contract with the county to purchase water.

During the meeting last week, he expressed surprise over the opposition. He said the plant won't use potable water and seeks to help all citizens. According to Farrell, FGE officials thought it would be a good thing to buy water from the county, thereby helping all citizens by creating revenue for the county.

However, some citizens oppos-

ing the deal said the water from those county-owned wells is potable and expressed their concerns over the sale of what they deemed the county's most valuable natural resource. Because of the opposition, FGE is now pursuing the purchase of water from private landowners and companies.

Though only a small group of citizens opposed, Farrell said he didn't hear that the majority of citizens wanted the deal to go through and that communication falls on the shoulders of county leaders.

"We rely on county leadership to communicate with us if the majority of citizens want something," the CEO said.

FGE is still partnering with the City of Colorado City to purchase wastewater, which will be "cleaned up" and used in the plant's operations. "The city has been a good partner," Farrell said.

Farrell said there's no date for groundbreaking yet, but he expects dirt to turn in a few more months.

To meet federal guidelines, the price of elementary lunches will see a small increase in the upcoming school year to \$2.10, with reduced lunches staying at 40 cents.

All students in Colorado City schools get to eat breakfast for free. Faculty pays \$1.50 for breakfast and \$3.50 for lunch. High school lunches will stay at \$2.25 per plate for students and 40 cents for reduced lunches. The price for visitors to eat is \$4.

The board gave unanimous approval for the district to enter into an interlocal purchasing co-op with Region 18 Education Service Center. The agreement is approved around this time every year to give the district the opportunity to price check and possibly order things like office supplies from the cooperative.

Spencer said the agreement only provides the option to use the service, but the district is not obligated to do so.

Mitchell County AgriLife Extension Agent Audra Graves was approved as a member of adjunct faculty during the meeting. The approval makes provisions for

CISD students to travel to 4-H activities with Graves and still be counted as being present for the school day.

Adjunct faculty members can direct the activities and participation of students, pending approval by the district.

The first day of classes for CISD students will be Wednesday, August 16th, an earliest start date in several years. The early start was made possible when the board voted to become a District of Innovation, and the date was chosen so that it coincided with the start of dual-credit college courses at WTC in Snyder.

An early start means an early dismissal date next May, but changes may be on the horizon as the Texas Legislature convenes for a special session beginning this week. Spencer said the legislature has proposed changing the testing calendar, pushing back STAAR and end-of-course testing by two weeks. The later dates would have students testing when they would normally be taking field trips and attending awards ceremonies.

Spencer said he's not sure what

that means for CISD students just yet. Decisions will have to hold until the special session ends in 30 days.

The last couple of years, Colorado High School's English I and English II students have received extra preparation for testing and it has paid off. Spencer said the passing rate has been pushing 70%, and local students have been beating the state average.

Extra prep came in the form of Cliff and Sandra Vlasin coming in to work with teachers and students to help students succeed. However, the couple is retiring. Fortunately, former CISD faculty member Kitten Arthur will be taking over for the Vlasins.

Arthur has received training and will be visiting CISD schools to provide help for teachers and students.

Former Wallace faculty member Steve Reese is returning to the school district. He will be taking the position of principal.

There are two positions still open in the district, pre-k teacher and Life Skills teacher. Spencer said many school districts are looking for teachers this time of year.

extracted from the wreckage. Firemen also stayed on scene several hours to help reroute traffic.

Carlock said two ambulances and four medics from Mitchell County EMS worked quickly to make decisions and transport the injured from the scene. Members of the Mitchell County Sheriff's Office, Department of Public Safety, Texas Department of Transportation and Colorado City Police Department also assisted with the crash.

Belen Martinez, a teenage girl from Brownwood, was pronounced dead at the scene. Her body was transported to Kiker-Seale Funeral Home in Colorado

City. According to investigators, the young girl was not wearing a seatbelt.

Margarita Martinez, 42, of Brownwood, suffered serious/incapacitating injuries and was transported by helicopter to Hendrick Medical Center. Martinez was determined to have been wearing a seatbelt.

Isaias Renteriaz, a two-year-old boy from Graham, was the only person not injured in the crash. The boy was restrained properly in his carseat.

Isabel Gonzalez, a 15-year-old girl from Graham, was treated for minor injuries at Mitchell County Hospital and then released. The







report said she was wearing a seatbelt at the time of the crash.


Joselyn Renteriaz, a 10-year-old girl from Graham, suffered serious/incapacitating injuries and was transported by helicopter to University Medical Center in Lubbock. The girl was not wearing a seatbelt.

No injury information was provided on Erika Martinez, a 13-year-old girl from Brownwood. It is also unknown if she was wearing a seatbelt at the time of the crash.

The information about the crash is from the DPS preliminary crash report. Information can change or be corrected based on the investigator's findings.

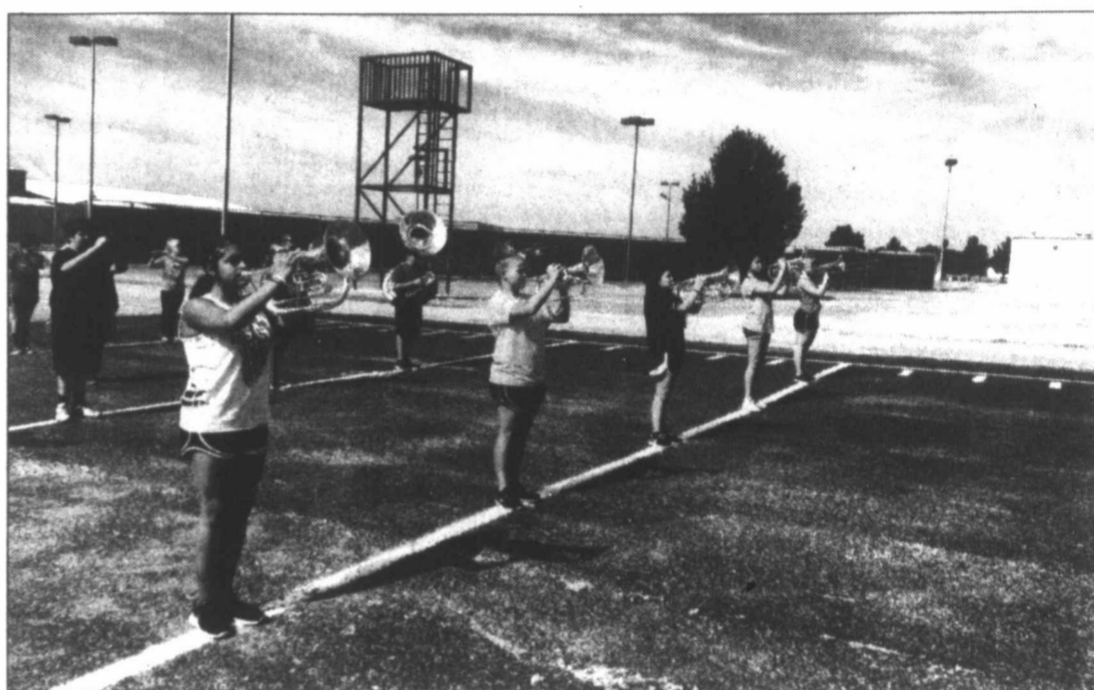

Wolves 2nd, Wildcats 4th, Bulldogs 1st in picks for upcoming football season

When Dave Campbell's Texas Football magazine hits the newsstands each summer, football fans know it's time to buy their tickets, cross their fingers and remember that their favorite team will start the 2017 season with a perfect record.

In Mitchell County, Colorado City will participate in Class 3A – DII, District 2 along with Idalou, Coahoma, Stanton and Lubbock Roosevelt.

The Wolves are tapped to finish second behind Idalou with Coahoma (3), Stanton (4) and Lubbock Roosevelt in the final spot. Fifth year Head Coach Dan Gainey will return five offensive and eight defensive starters back from last year's 4-7 bi-district finalist team, according to the magazine.

Linebacker Marcus Gutierrez was selected the pre-season defensive MVP, and running back Mark Caballero of Idalou was the offensive MVP according to the magazine. The Wolves represented the district in the playoffs last year as the runner-up posting a 4-1 district record losing only to Idalou.

The Westbrook Wildcats will represent Mitchell County in the very tough District 6 1A DI, along with Garden City, Sterling City and Robert Lee. New Head Coach Homer Matlock will welcome back three starters on offense and three starters on defense from last season's 6-3 (1-2 district) team.

Matlock, in his first season as a head coach, will be assisted by

Jake Diggs and get additional assistance from former head coach and still Athletic Director Jim Hill.

Garden City was ranked in the top 10 throughout the season last year, and again, expectations are the Bearcats will win the district. Sterling City (2), Robert Lee (3) and the Wildcats is how the magazine predicts the district will end up.

Westbrook, with several talented youngsters returning, could lead a push if the team can stay healthy.

The Loraine Bulldogs expect to keep their seven-year streak of playoff appearances alive this season as three offensive and three defensive starters return. The Bulldogs will compete in District 7 1A DII with Blackwell, Highland and Trent.

Second year Head Coach Eric Sanchez won the district championship last year and will return the pre-season offensive MVP quarterback in Dakota Smith. Smith was honorable mention all-state last season, along with being named the district offensive MVP last year.

The Bulldogs are favored to win the district title again with Blackwell (2), Highland (3), followed by Trent, according to Dave Campbell's football magazine.

The Bulldogs were 9-2 last year and will field a good group of young players again this season. Blackwell will be a true test for the Bulldogs, as they return all their starters from last season.

The Mitchell County Sports Complex will be the place to be to see some exciting baseball action next week. According to Complex Manager Darlene Moore, two state tournaments will be played simultaneously at the facility, a first-time happening in the Texas Teenage Baseball Association.

Tournaments will feature teams in the Midget division for players 9 and under and Freshman division for players 12 and under.

Each division will see teams from Colorado City, Roscoe, Coahoma, Winters, Ballinger, Comanche and DeLeon competing against each other. Games will start at 6 p.m. on Monday, July 24th-28th on four fields at the complex. Championship games are slated for Friday, July 28th in each division.

Everyone is welcome to attend games, and the entrance fee will be minimal. FirstBank & Trust will provide a big golf cart so el-

derly and disabled fans can still come out and catch the baseball action.
