First Baptist Revival Planned March 27-April 2

First Baptist Church, Knox City, will begin revival services, Monday, March 27, and will continue through Sunday, April 12.

According to the Rev. Bobby King, church pastor, evangelist for this year's revival will be Milton Pledger of Mount Pleasant Baptist Church of Gainesville. Larry LeFevre of Rule will serve as song leader.

Rev. King pointed out that a special emphasis will take place each night of the revival. Monday night will be Senior Citizens, Tuesday will be Merchants' Night, Wednesday is Farmers'

and Ranchers' Night, Thursday is planned for Family Night, Friday is to be Oil Industry Night, Saturday is Youth Night, and Sunday is Children's Night. Rev. King also noted that testimonies and song by townspeople and out-of-town visitors relating to these various categories will be presented.

Noon luncheons will be held Monday through Friday of the week.

A nursery will be provided, and everyone is welcome to attend any or all services, Rev. King concluded.

School Board Race 'Heats Up' Among Upcoming Elections

A race for school board developed this past week with five candidates vying for two seats on the board. According to school officials, Arthur Boice, Anthony Logsdon, Butch Stephens, Mike Newton, and Brian Williams have signed up for the May 6 election. Boice was appointed by the board to fill out the unexpired term of Jimmy Tankersley when he resigned. Incumbent Terry Carter has not indicated whether or not he will seek re-election.

In the city election, Marj Brockett has filed for re-election to a two-year term, and Rob Harrison, who was appointed to the board when Jon Godsey resigned, has signed up for the remaining one-year term. As of Tuesday noon, Mayor Derrell Marion

or councilwoman Barbara Barnard had not signed for re-election.

The deadline for filing in both the city and school election is Wednesday, March 22, and as *The Knox County News* is mailed out on Wednesday afternoon, in case someone is interested in filing, they need to do so before 5:00 p.m. Wednesday.

Filing for the Knox County Hospital board election may take place until the April 11 deadline at 5:00 p.m. Any eligible person who desires to file for the one elective position may do so by submitting a petition containing 25 signatures of qualified voters to the hospital business office. Incumbent Greg Clonts has not indicated whether or not he will seek re-election.

Mammogram Unit To Be In Knox City April 5

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the regional breast care center at Women's and Children's Hospital in Odessa, "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment, breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage

has a 90%-97% survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women on Wednesday, April 5.

The mobile unit will be parked at Knox County Hospital in Knox City. Appointments may be made by calling 658-3535.

Now that the new toll-free telephone service is in place, a representative from the Vernon Social Security office will now be coming to Knox City once each quarter beginning April 12, 1989, the second Wednesday of the month.

Generally, people who wish to transact social security related business can do everything by phone and mail.

Examples of the business that can be handled by phone include:

- *Applying for Social Security benefits. A claim can be started over the telephone and completed by mail.
- *Applying for Medicare.
- *Changing name and address in Social Security records.
- *Reporting stopping or starting work or to report any event that can have an effect on benefits.
- *Reporting a lost or stolen check or delayed payment.
- *Arranging for direct deposit.
- *Getting an estimate of a benefit rate.
- *Requesting a statement of earnings.

physicians' services, outpatient hospital services, some prescription drugs, and certain other medical items and services not covered by Medicare hospital insurance. Because of changes to the Medicare laws passed by Congress last summer, Medicare medical insurance coverage is more comprehensive than in the past.

For people who enroll now, medical insurance protection starts July 1. The basic premium rate this year is \$31.90 a month, and it increases by 10 percent for each year an eligible person is not enrolled.

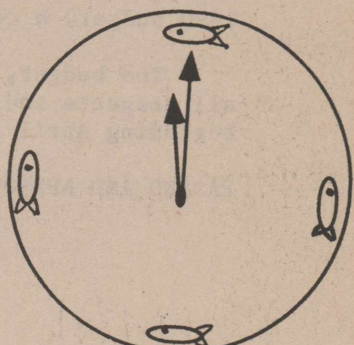

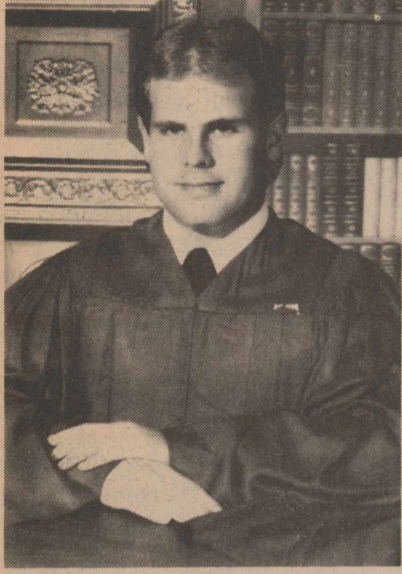

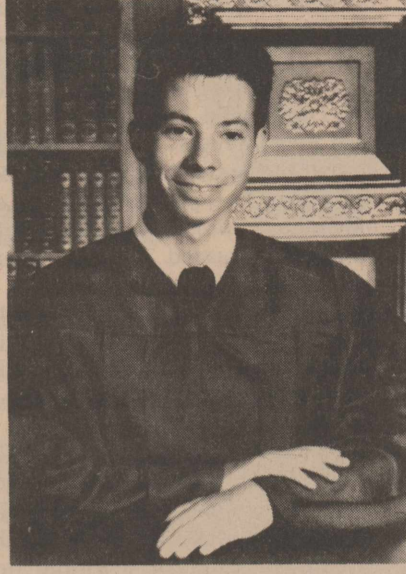
KEVIN HOECKENDORF

Kevin likes a little of all kinds of music. His favorite colors are red, white, blue and black.



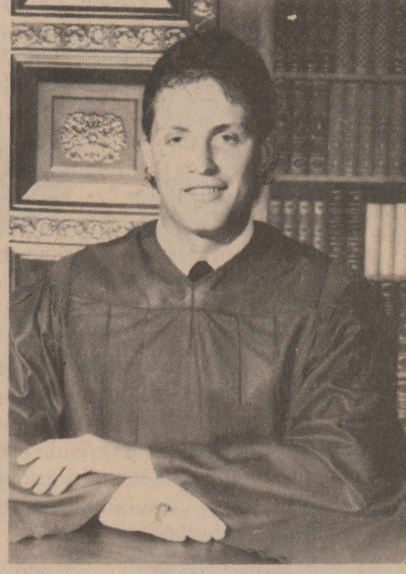
SHAWNEE RUSSELL

Mauro, Counts Push Gas Aid To Economy

AUSTIN - State Representative David Counts (D-Knox City) joined Texas Land Commissioner Gary Mauro in Abilene on Friday, March 10, to call for passage of bills which will create thousands of jobs in this economically hard-hit area and lead to cleaner skies for all Texans.

Land Commissioner Mauro and Representative Counts urged fellow Texans to make use of one of Texas' greatest resources, natural gas, to put the Texas economy back on its feet.

"West Texas has borne the full force of the oil price collapse," Mauro said. "Not only did the decline in energy markets have its immediate, obvious impact, but the decline knocked the legs out from under the government tax base. Increasing the natural gas use by even 1 trillion cubic feet per year will create 50,000 to 100,000 jobs in Texas."

These bills offer a wealth of possibilities for financially strapped West Texans," Counts said. "We need to put rigs back in action and people back to work. These bills show us a way to do that."

An alternative fuels bill would require the conversion of thousands of vehicles from gasoline and diesel to

compressed natural gas (CNG) or other alternative fuels. These vehicles include school and transit buses, state vehicles, and certain private fleets.

The bill anticipates private financing to cover conversion costs and provides an exemption if such financing is unavailable.

Another bill would amend the Texas Clean Air Act to require industrial and utility boiler operators in areas which do not meet air quality standards to pay penalties for burning fuel oil between April 15 and October 15.

The alternative fuels bill is being sponsored by Rep. David Cain, D-Dallas, and Sen. Don Henderson, R-Houston. The Clean Air Act revisions are sponsored by Rep. Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi, and Sen. Kenneth Caperton, D-Bryan. Rep. Counts is a co-sponsor of the Berlanga bill.

"I understand that the increased use of 1 trillion cubic feet of natural gas will put 328 new drilling rigs to work around here. That's music to a West Texan's ears," Counts said.

"Texas, by passing this legislation, can go a long way toward helping the nation and the world, while it helps itself," Mauro said. "It's a win-win proposition."

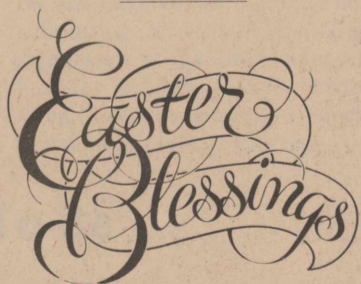

Barbara Barnard made a motion, seconded by Larry Staggs to adjourn. All voted in favor.

February 14, 1989

The City Council met in regular session with Mayor Pro-Tem Larry Staggs, Councilmembers Barbara Barnard, Joe Barnard, Marq Brockett and Rob Harrison present. Mayor Derrell Marion was absent due to circumstances beyond his control.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Pro-Tem Larry Staggs.

There were no Public participation for Public Comments.

The minutes of the regular meeting of January 10, 1989, was presented. Barbara Barnard made a motion, seconded by Marq Brockett to approve the minutes as presented. All voted in favor.

A Public Hearing was held on Tuesday, February 14, 1989, at City Hall, 200 North Central Avenue, Knox City, Texas, at 7:00 p.m. This meeting was to inform the Public of action to be taken in regards to Ordinance #1119 which pertains to Health and Sanitation in the City of Knox City, and Ordinance #1116 which pertains to Dangerous and Dilapidated Buildings in the City of Knox City. There was no Public attendance or participation for this very important matter.

The Mayor Pro-Tem and City Council discussed additional unsanitary lots and dilapidated buildings that pose a health hazard. After a lengthy discussion and reviewing pictures of the property a motion was made by Barbara Barnard and seconded by Marq Brockett to start the legal paper work on three (3) additional lots which need to be cleaned up in the City of Knox City because of unsafe conditions and the health hazard they pose to the Citizens of the City of Knox City. All voted in favor.

The City Council discussed to approve a resolution to waiver the permit fees for the Housing Authority to remodel, repair and do the upkeep work on the Housing Facilities. After a discussion of this matter, Barbara Barnard made a motion, seconded by Marq Brockett to waiver the permit fees for the Housing Authority to remodel, repair and do the upkeep work on the Housing Facilities. All voted in favor.

The City Council discussed to approve a resolution agreeing for the signatures of Mayor Derrell Marion and City Administrator Lynward Wilcox to be the two (2) individuals to have access to the City of Knox City's Safety Deposit Box #552 in the vault at the Citizens State Bank, Knox City, Texas. After a discussion of this matter, the City Council were all in agreement that these two (2) signatures would be satisfactory for access to the Safety Deposit Box.

The City Council discussed to approve the amending of the Dispatchers Policy and Procedures Manual, Section 006, #6:04. After a lengthy discussion of this matter, a motion was made by Rob Harrison and seconded by Barbara Barnard to amend Section 006, #6:04 of the Dispatchers Policy and Procedures Manual. Rob Harrison, Barbara Barnard and Marq Brockett voted in favor of the stated motion. Joe Barnard abstained from voting.

The City Council discussed to approve to amend the 1988-1989 Budget to comply with the Texas Uniform Budget Law, Article 689a-15, seq. V.T.C.S. A motion was made by Rob Harrison and seconded by Barbara Barnard to amend the 1988-1989 Budget. All voted in favor of the stated motion.

City Judge Walter Rauch came before the Mayor Pro-Tem and City Council to present the City Judge Monthly Report for the Month of January, 1989. The results of the four (4) charges filed for the month were as follows: Three (3) paid and one (1) Warrant issued.

Fire Chief Roland Marion came before the Mayor Pro-Tem and City Council to present the Fire Department Monthly Report for the Month of January, 1989. Roland stated that the

Fire Department made eight (8) fire runs for the month, with one (1) of these runs being a false automatic alarm activation. Roland has also been making inspections of Dangerous and Dilapidated Buildings within the City of Knox City along with Police Chief Gil Gillilan.

EMS Director Tommy Guy Waldrip came before the Mayor Pro-Tem and the City Council to present the Ambulance Monthly Report for the Month of January, 1989. Tommy stated that the expenses for January, 1989 were \$3390.05 and the income was \$2,953.03. There were a total of thirty-four (34) ambulance runs for the month. Five of these runs were fire runs.

Water Superintendent Charles Pack came before the Mayor Pro-Tem and the City Council to present the Outside Maintenance Monthly Report for the Month of January, 1989. In addition to the routine work of brush hauling, cleaning at the Cemetery, reading water meters, flushing fire hydrants and tilling pot holes, the Outside crew also did some cleaning on various lots, worked on sewer lines and mowed the grass at the softball field.

Police Chief Gil Gillilan came before the Mayor Pro-Tem and the City Council to present the Police Department Monthly Report for the Month of

January, 1989. The Department answered one hundred and ninety seven (197) calls for the month. There were twenty two (22) Offenses reported and four (4) charges filed in City Court. The siren was tested the 1st of January and was found to be in working order. The Department met with the Grand Jury on the 4th of January and presented one (1) case. An Indictment was handed down on a Felony D.W.I. case. The Department also had Court on the 5th, 16th, 23rd and 24th of January. Gil is also continuing to inspect Dangerous and Dilapidated Buildings within the City, making reports to the City Council and presenting photographs. After the Council's approval, letters are mailed to the property owners and the buildings are posted. The junk car auction was held Saturday, February 11, 1989 at the sewer plant. With a total of sixty eight (68) junk vehicles having been removed from the streets, the twenty eight (28) remaining were sold for a total amount of \$647.50.

City Administrator Dick Wilcox presented the Monthly Accounting of the month of January, 1989. A motion was made by Rob Harrison, seconded by Marq Brockett to record the Monthly Accounting as presented, along with Minutes of the City Council Meeting. All voted in favor.

Rob Harrison made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Joe Barnard. All voted in favor.



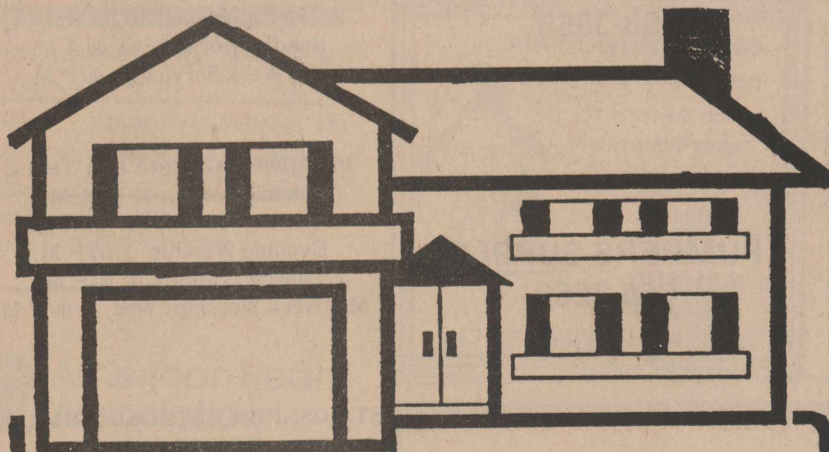
