4 year old boy drowns in river

The swift current of the rain-swollen Colorado River claimed the life of 4-year-old boy who was fishing with relatives at a point near where the river connects with Lone Wolf Creek.

The body of John Paul Gonzalez of Portales, New Mexico, was recovered by the rescue team at 2:43 p.m., Tuesday, approximately 100-feet from the point on a rock ledge where he had entered the water.

The boy's mother, Patricia Morris of Portales, was in Colorado City to visit relatives which include her mother Thelma Fay Morris and Joe Refugio Gonzalez, the boy's uncle.

According to statements, John Paul Gonzalez was in a group of

approximately 7 people that were fishing from the banks of the river when the boy fell in the rushing water.

One of the group jumped in after the boy, but was unable to rescue him due to the swiftness of the current.

A call was received by the Colorado City Police Department at 12:45 p.m., Tuesday afternoon, requesting assistance in the 100 Block of East Fairmount Avenue.

A 20-man rescue team consisting of officers from the Colorado City Police Department,

Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department, Mitchell County Sheriff's Office, Game Wardens and Department of Public Safety arrived on the scene and immediately began to search the area.

Two boats were launched into the river by the rescue team and several officers worked along the banks with the assistance of ropes tied to their life-jackets as they groped through the rushing water.

A two-man crew in one of the boats discovered the body as they worked down the river.

Rabies outbreak noticed

A greater than normal problem of rabid animals in the county has caused officials to urge people to be aware and take precautions.

It is the time of the year when possibly rabid animals including raccoons, foxes, coyotes and skunks are on the move to their summer home, said Joe Wallace, the city's animal control officer.

There is greater opportunities for people to come in contact with these animals now that they are on the move.

"The city has an aggressive eradication program," said police chief David Montgomery, "which we will continue to enforce."

The program involves the use of

traps which are used in an effort to cut-down on the skunk population, said Wallace.

Residents of Colorado City are encouraged to notify the Police Department with information about the sightings of skunks or other aggressive wild animals.

People living outside the city limits should contact the Mitchell County Sheriff's Office with information related to possibly rabid animals.

Among the precautions that should be taken include having animals that are pets vaccinated by the time they reach 4-months of age as required by state law, he said.

People should also be cautious around any animal that exhibits

aggressive behavior, Wallace said.

He said that seeing wild animals such as skunks during daylight hours is an indication that the animal is rabid.

During the past week a fox attempted to attack a boy at a location on Cherry Street. The indications are that the test for rabies that is being run on the animal will come back positive.

Many skunks suspected to be carrying the disease have recently been trapped, said Wallace.

Be careful if you find yourself around aggressive animals, call law enforcement officers with information and take the time to make sure that your pets have been vaccinated.

Ranch month proclaimed

The month of June has been proclaimed as 'Ranch Month,' according to a proclamation signed by Colorado City Mayor Jim Baum and Mitchell County Judge Ray Mayo.

Among the activities which will highlight the month include the '1st Annual Mitchell County Ranch Tour,' to be held on Friday, June 12.

The joint city and county proclamation notes that:

--In the 1800's the Mitchell County area had the distinction of being the 'home of cattlemen' and served as a business and social

capital of the West; and

--There are currently 350,000 of the 590,000 acres in Mitchell County devoted to ranching; and

--There are more than 30 operating ranches located in Mitchell County; and

--Ranching brought over \$20 million into the county in 1991.

"Ranching is an integral part of Mitchell County," said executive director Jay McCollum. "Ranches and ranching constitute a major part of the history and economic base of the county."

The ranch tour will recognize the progressive ranch operations in

Mitchell County.

Ranch tour committee members including Kevin Wright, district conservationist; Bryan Limmer, county extension agent; and Robert Hoback of Colorado Feed and Seed; have announced the following plans for the tour.

Ticket-holders will meet at the Colorado City Civic Center at 7:30 a.m. to form into a group for the tour.

Robbery suspects remain at large

An investigation has begun in an effort to identify suspects in connection with the robbery of a local business that occurred on Saturday evening.

Approximately \$500 was stolen from Henderson's Bell Station, 2200 Hickory Street, in a robbery that was reported to the Colorado City Police Department at 10:24 p.m. on Saturday evening.

The department has contacted law enforcement agencies from neighboring counties in an effort to identify the suspects, said Police Chief David Montgomery.

Police officers were told by witnesses of the robbery that two male subjects entered the business and took cash from the register.

Stolen in the robbery was

currency ranging from \$1 to \$20 dollar bills. Change and checks which were in the register were not taken by the suspects.

Witnesses reported that no weapons were displayed by the subjects during the robbery.

The suspects reportedly ran from the business to a late model car that was parked at a location near the Villa Inn. The car is described as being white and a four-door model.

The suspects were joined by two other male subjects when they reached the vehicle.

The car with the four passengers was last seen headed north on Highway 208 and witnesses indicate that it appeared they may have turned left at the Interstate 20 access road.

Gorman beats Loraine in Regional tournament

The Loraine High School Bulldogs baseball team was defeated by Gorman in a regional semifinal playoff game, played Tuesday afternoon.

The Class A matchup pitted state-ranked Gorman (17-5) against Loraine (13-3) in a match-up that was played at Abilene Christian University's Scott Field.

Gorman was declared the winner by the score of 12-2 in a contest that was called in the fifth inning.

Coach Bob Loy lead the Bulldog's to an impressive first full-year of baseball competition by guiding the team into playoff contention.

Pitching stand-outs for Loraine this past season include junior Chris Phillips who had a record of 7-0 and freshman Craig Finley who had accumulated a record of 5-0.

Leading the teams batting records for the season has been senior David Madrid who had a team-high .417 batting average and batted in 21 runs.

Gorman will advance to regional action and play the winner of the Baird/Petrolia contest.

The team is paced by the hitter-pitcher combination of Jason Dimore who averages .557 in the batters box and is 9-2 with a 1.89 earned run average when on the mound.

The Mitchell County Chapter of the American Red Cross has announced that two of its volunteers attended the 1992 Texas Disaster Institute and will begin working on a disaster plan for the county.

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Unemployment rate at 9.6%

The unemployment rate for Mitchell County rose to 9.6-percent, according to a recently released report.

According to the figures in the Texas Employment Commission (TEC) report there is a civilian labor force of 3643 people of which 3292 are employed and 351 are seeking employment.

"The economic picture in Texas is absolutely flat," said Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers as the TEC released the state's monthly job statistics.

The report placed Texas' unemployment rate at 7.4-percent -- exactly the same as last month.

"Our job growth is down considerably from previous years," said Nabers. "That was our concern last month when less than half as many jobs were created compared to one year ago."

"It remains our greatest concern this month as we compare all the way back to 1990 and realize that we are adding only about half as many new jobs as we did during

this time period in 1990. That is definitely not good!" she said.

There are two other areas of grave concern, according to Nabers.

Wages are losing ground to inflation and the state is seeing most job growth in the lower paying industries. "If this continues," she said, "and the trends are well-established, the standard of living for all Texans will ultimately drop."

"With wages slipping because of inflation increases and upper level jobs being eliminated, the economy is being negatively impacted," Nabers said.

"Add to that the fact that the majority of new jobs being created are low-paying ones, and you have a triple hit to the economy."

The TEC has reported that statewide the occupations adding the most jobs between 1980 and 1990 was the category called Janitors and Cleaners.

Real average weekly wages when adjusted for inflation have increased since 1984 statewide.

"We have our work cut out for us in the area of economic development," said Nabers. "Our economic prosperity as a state is tied to jobs."

--Scurry County's rate was listed as 6.8-percent with 10,822 of the labor force of 11,617 employed.

--Tom Green County's rate was listed as 5.8-percent with 42,990 of the labor force of 45,624 employed.

--Taylor County's rate was listed as 6-percent with 48,508 of the labor force of 51,602 employed.

--Howard County's rate was listed as 6.3-percent with 13,836 of the labor force of 14,766 employed.

--Lubbock County's rate was listed as 6.3-percent with 109,229 of the labor force of 116,573 employed.

--Nolan County's rate was listed as 8.6-percent with 7314 of the labor force of 8005 employed.

Grasping for breath after a slight exertion is a sign that the body is not using oxygen as efficiently as it should. A fit heart pumps more oxygen-rich blood through the body and has less risk of heart disease, hypertension or suffering a heart attack. If you would like to shed a few or more pounds, your body can only burn fat with the extra oxygen and fat-burning enzymes obtained from aerobic exercise.

You don't need a lot of fancy equipment to get on the road to fitness. Walking, running, swimming, cycling and dancing are all excellent forms of aerobic exercise. According to Cyndi Rohrer, director of Methodist Hospital's LifeStyle Centre, you do, however, need to set aside 20 to 30 minutes every other day to achieve a maximum aerobic benefit.

Rohrer suggests following a minimum program of warming up for five minutes, aerobic exercise for 20 minutes and cooling down for five minutes. If you are already in a conditioning program, or as you progress, gradually increase the aerobic minutes.

"Remember, some exercise is better than no exercise. So, even if you can't fit in 20 to 30 minutes, 10 minutes are better than zero," Rohrer said.

Warming up - Warming up slowly raises your pulse and prepares your muscles and joints for exercise, protecting you from

injury. Limber up, and ease into your activity slowly.

Aerobics - Follow the FIT guidelines for maximum benefit.

F - Frequency: three to five times a week. Four times is ideal, with a day off between workouts to avoid overuse injuries.

I - Intensity: in your target heart rate zone, which can be determined by an exercise instructor.

T - Time: allow 20 to 30 minutes.

Cooling Down - Take at least five minutes to ease out of your activity slowly and stretch your major muscle groups.

Tales abound about the cowboy and his horse. And, for the man who stole a horse, hanging was the punishment.

But, old court cases in Mitchell County don't substantiate that popular notion. Perhaps "Necktie" parties were given if a suspect was caught and tried without a legal trial.

Take, for example, the case of Ed Wightman. He was indicted by a Mitchell County grand jury for horse theft during May of 1890. He was charged with stealing a horse belonging to G. H. Colvin on or about April 28, 1890.

Colvin was the owner of the "O.K. Wagon Yard" in Colorado. The fact a jury wasn't empaneled until 1892 suggests Wightman must have rented a horse from The Wagon Yard and simply never returned it.

Apparently he was caught a couple of years later and returned to Colorado for trial.

Wightman had been sought by Sheriff Dick Ware when the offense occurred in 1890. But, by the time the horse thief was in custody, Ware had been voted out of office and was replaced by Y. D. McMurry.

Wightman elected to waive his right to a jury trial and instead entered a guilty plea before 32nd District Judge William Kennedy.

Now it was up to a Mitchell County jury of 12 men to set the thief's punishment.

In his instructions to the jury, Judge Kennedy noted the defendant had pled guilty to a charge of horse theft and the jury should assess his punishment for any period not less than five years, nor more than 15 years.

The verdict was returned by the foreman of the jury, Ed Boatwright and set Wightman's punishment at five years. Old Mitchell County court records indicate horse theft was a fairly common offense. That sentence was in line with the punishment set for other horse thieves of that era locally.

IN 1889, W. H. Stewart, alias Will Tabor, was given five years in prison for stealing a horse from J. B. Lucas. And, in another 1890 horse theft case, Doc Willoughby was also given five years in the penitentiary by a Mitchell County jury.

Undoubtedly some horse thieves were hanged when they were caught. But in Colorado, Texas, the punishment was never that severe. Or, if it was, no one is around to tell us about it today.

Another interesting segment of our town's early days was the saloon activity.

"Uncle Archie" was an early day saloon or dance hall owner in Colorado, Texas. A. B. Johnson, alias Uncle Archie, is remembered by old timers for his cooperation with the law.

Some residents of Colorado say the reason the town had no more shootings that it did was because "Uncle Archie" operated a clean saloon.

There is evidence that Johnson cooperated with local law enforcement officers. (He tipped off Sheriff Dick Ware when the dance hall operator heard a Chinese laundry was to be robbed).

But, there's also evidence Johnson worked with the lawless element of early day Colorado. It was he who loaned a pistol to Sam Seals, who was gunned down by Wade Hudson during a shootout at Phenix Park.

And, then there's the indictment dated May 6, 1890, which tells us more about the character of Uncle Archie.

He was indicted for keeping a disorderly house, "where prostitutes and lewd women were allowed to resort for the purpose of plying their vocation against the peace and dignity of the state."

It might be added Johnson also sold malt liquors in his saloon. But the indictment stressed the saloon owner's stable of women.

The said A. B. Johnson did then and there knowingly employ and have in service prostitutes, lewd women and women of bad reputation for chastity (who) conducted themselves in a lewd, lascivious and indecent manner."

And there were witnesses to these allegations. Men like Bob Addington, C. C. Brown, Ed Mulverhill, and Jim Morrow. How these men knew about these wicked women isn't stated.

Pending Johnson's trial, he was released on a bond of \$200. Listed as sureties were Tom Powers and C. E. Marlow.

Powers was also a saloon owner in early day Colorado. We don't know if Johnson was ever tried. Court records for this case have been lost or misplaced.

But the indictment tells us much about the early day social life for some cowboys in Colorado, Texas.

Mel Prather, organizer for the event, said he was pleased with the improvements over the initial festival in 1991. "For one, the show will be larger. Because of the show's growing popularity, we've had to add thirty more booths. But, even with the additions, we've still had to turn away a number of talented people," he said.

Discussing the exhibitors, Prather said the 1992 festival would provide a number of exhibitors making their first appearance in Snyder. Among those are participants with stained glass, wall clocks, crystal jewelry, pewter

Other newcomers include those with original sculpture and ceramics, handbags and luggage, and miniatures. There will also be lathe mesquite work and handmade jewelry.

Returning exhibitors will feature furniture in both finished and unfinished form, clothing, jewelry, and soft sculpture. Others will display hair bows, original art and limited edition prints, cedar chests, rag rugs and baskets, wood decorations and wall hangings, quilts and baby items.

There will be jams and jellies, fudge, original sauces and candies. In addition, participants will be displaying toys, dolls and doll furniture, wind chimes, bird house and even tree spirits.

Some of the more unusual items include punched tin, hardwood replicas of antique cars and jug decanters. Fishing rod holders will be on hand, as well as cedar baskets.

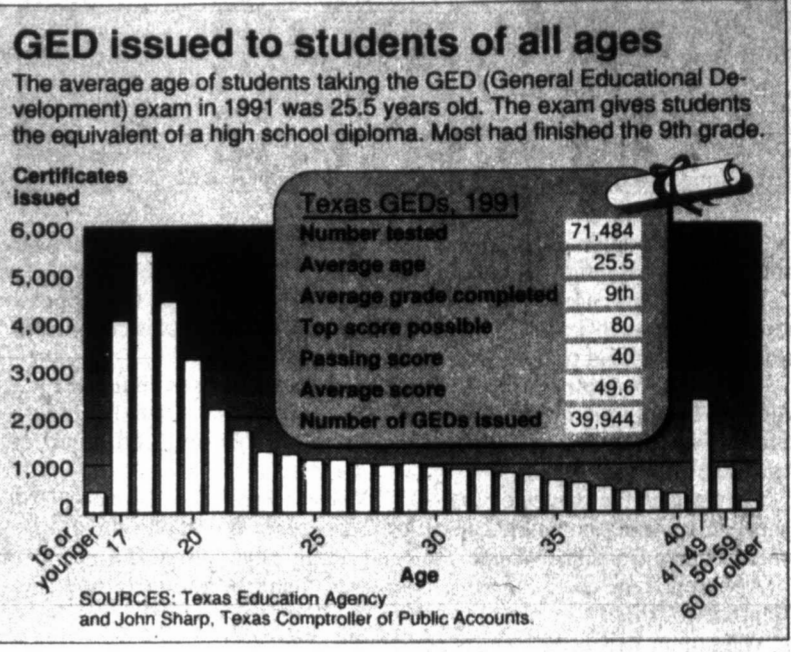

New database attaches value to Texas agribusinesses

Agriculture and agriculture-related businesses are worth more than \$52.8 billion to the Texas economy, according to Texas A & M University professor who constructed a new economic database.

The database, which apparently is the only one of its kind, uses "value added" figures to determine the impact of agriculture. It gives Texas another way to measure economic diversity and gauge state efforts to improve its economy, said Dr. Dick Edwards, an A & M professor and Texas Agricultural Extension Service economist in agribusiness.

"We've been saying in this state for several years that we need to diversify and get away from dependence on certain sectors of the economy, such as petroleum," Edwards said. "If we're going to look at stretching our economic base, we need to have these kinds of data."

One of the most talked-about ways of diversifying is promoting growth in industries that add value to Texas agricultural products, Edwards said. Those might be

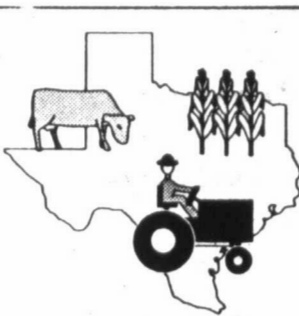
textile manufacturers that use Texas cotton or canneries that process vegetables.

Value-added figures are derived by taking sales in a value-added business, such as a grocery, and subtracting the cost of the goods sold. A loaf of bread might cost a grocer 60 cents and be sold for a dollar, meaning 40 cents' worth of value was added at the retail level. The grocer's profit and other expenses, such as labor and utilities, would come from that 40 cents.

The 40 cents would be a small part of the grocer's contribution to the entire \$52.8 billion. Value can be added to agricultural products at many levels, including manufacturing, wholesaling and retailing.

Of the \$52.8 billion, \$11.9 billion was in agricultural cash receipts, and the remaining four-fifths of the total is in value-added business receipts.

Because exact figures of the value added at various business levels must be estimated, Edwards and a team of researchers had to develop formulas for estimating value-added, agricultural-related

portions of businesses based on sales figures available for those businesses.

All figures are based on data from 1988, the most recent year for which all information needed is available. The database will be updated annually, Edwards said.

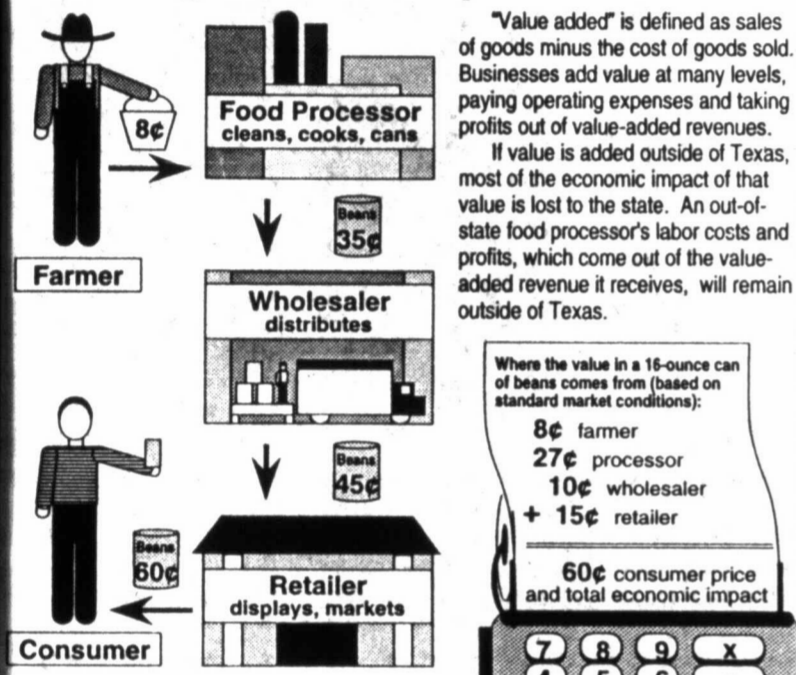
Because the Texas economy has grown since 1988, the agribusiness sector today would also be worth more than \$52.8 billion, Edwards said. Such figures show the importance of businesses that add value to a product, he said.

Data on agricultural cash receipts has been commonly available, Edwards said, but he knows of no other database that includes value-added receipts for other agriculture-related businesses.

The database, available for the first time in April, uses figures from each of the 254 Texas counties. County-level figures can be extracted from the database or combined for larger regions.

PEP PRIDE offers girls a 2nd chance

At the turn of the century, a pregnant girl in school had one choice. She could drop out and, from a practical standpoint, her formal education was complete. Many years later, there came to be an additional option. She could stay home during her pregnancy, have the baby and receive regular, but infrequent, visits from a Homebound teacher. Then came the day care concept, the baby staying at a center or with grandparents while the mother attended classes or worked to try to support herself and the child. Often, for all practical purposes, her formal education was finished. Now sixteen school districts in

this area, including Colorado City ISD--are banding together to carry the evolution of educating pregnant teenagers or single mothers one step further. Now, those girls can have two choices: They can remain on their respective campuses or they can have their own high school campus, complete with nursery facilities, and a real shot at getting a high school diploma. This month is the ending of the second year for this pilot program.

Colorado City, Loraine, Westbrook, Highland, Snyder, Ira, Anson, Sweetwater, Hermleigh, Blackwell, Roscoe, Roby, Rotan, Trent, Hamlin, and Stamford,

through the sponsorship of the West Central Texas Education Cooperative, have founded what they call PEP PRIDE, an acronym for Pregnancy, Education and Parenting Program for Redirection, Independence, Development and Enrichment.

In other words, the girls get a second chance to get a diploma, learn how to be a mother and, perhaps, learn a marketable job skill. Boys or fathers are also brought into the program and given much the same chance as the girls. In addition to learning Fathering, the boys learn academics as well as vocational subjects. John Sanderson, a Colorado City resident, teaches vocational classes at the Hobbs School.

The PEP PRIDE staff consists of several area educators. Dixie Haggard of Sweetwater is the Counselor/Coordinator, and visits Colorado City regularly. Janet and James Wesson of Snyder are Counselors and visit many other area schools. Donna Kennedy of Rotan manages the nursery at HOBBS Alternative Education Co-op at the old Hobbs School in Fisher County.

HOBBS itself is both an acronym for Helping Others Become Better and the name of the site of the new last-resort school for dropouts and potential dropouts. The school was established last year as a successful school pilot program.

The nursery is a new twist. Mrs. Kennedy is the day care teacher for infants and pre-school children at HOBBS, and teaches parenting skills for new parents.

Mrs. Haggard or one of the Wessons is likely to be the first PEP PRIDE a pregnant teenager or new mother will see. But instead of telling the girl (or girl and boy) what will happen, these special Counselors begin with questions: What do you want to do? Second

question: What would it take to keep you in school?

Then the girl (or girl and boy) can be told the options: Participate in the Homebound program and have the child; drop out and have the child; stay in school, have the child, keep the child and continue in school after the baby is born; or stay in school, have the baby, put it up for adoption and continue her education.

Mrs. Haggard said PEP PRIDE not only offers these options, it helps the student in trouble get legal services, helps her find housing, helps her get Social Security assistance when most needed and helps her obtain a drivers license if transportation is a problem. "Whatever it takes ... we try to get students back into the mainstream and help them continue their education," she said.

"There are other areas PEP PRIDE offers," said Mrs. Haggard. "We also offer educational services for young fathers. We are always available; all they have to do is ask for our help." Mrs. Haggard, Mrs. Wesson or her husband, James are available for both academic and career counseling.

V.H. Smith of Roscoe and Sweetwater is Vocational Counselor / Coordinator. In addition to assisting both girls and boys in the work place, the program offers vocational counseling and instructional assistance, budgeting, and how to start a new business.

PEP PRIDE staff members are always eager to plunge into the unknown to offer students proper services. The work of this pilot program has tripled since its beginning last year.

"We never know what to expect! Every day is a new adventure. It is interesting," Mrs. Haggard said in a possible understatement. "We are in a big program, helping students help themselves!"

David Ginkinger and Gary Matlock were in charge of the "Quick Draw" game booth at Project Celebration. This game is

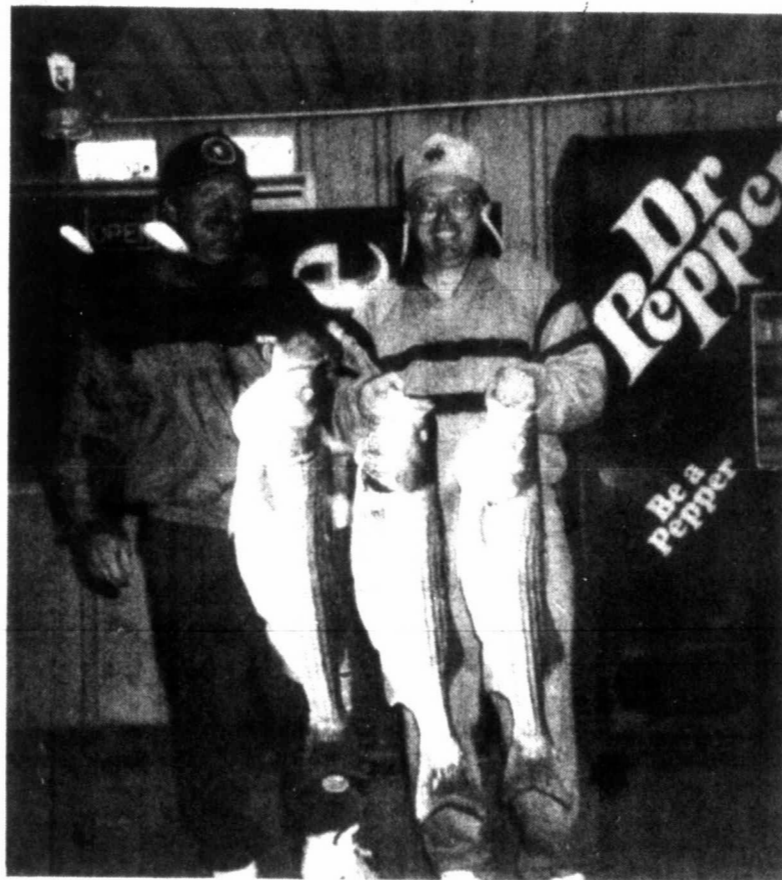
played by two people, each tying a rope around their ankle. The object of the game is to see who can jerk the other off their feet first!
