RANGERS ANNEX ANOTHER GAME IN CONFERENCE

FOLLETT /IGH GRIDDERS ARE
VICTIM NO. 2, LOSING TO
PERRYTON WITH A
21-6 SCORE

The Perryton Rangers defeated another conference contender last Friday when they put their name on the long end of the score at Follett. The final score was Perryton 21, and Follett 6.

Ray McWilliams, quarter back, did most of the ball carrying and did a good job of it. McWilliams made two of the 3 touchdowns—in the first and last quarter, Jones making the other. Clyde Jones did not get to carry the ball very much, but he did get to make one touchdown and kick the extra points after each touchdown. Jones made the second touchdown during the second quarter. Granville Lilly put in his bid for honors too. Granville had two mighty bad elbow and a weak back to keep him down a little, but he let Follett know he was there plenty of times. Ed Schroeder gained yardage around both ends for the Rangers, and he did some nice punting. Glenn McWilliams, substituted at left half for Granville Lilly, gave the crowd a demonstration of good football in the third quarter when he went around left end for a 28 yard gain. Glenn looks like good material for next year's Ranger squad. On the defense Fred Kuhn and "Toots" Garrison, center and left tackle, showed up well. Follett gained very little yardage during the entire game through the line. Most of their gains were made on end runs and passes. Follett gained very little territory during the entire game. They failed to make any first downs in the first 3 quarters, and made only 4 in the last quarter against the second string boys.

Ferguson, Perryton, kicks off to Follett, and Hicks returns the ball from his own 40 to his 45 yard line. Hicks over center for 1 yard; Hicks over center for no gain; Hicks punts 35 yards to Perryton's 20 and McWilliams returns it to the 24 yard line. Lilly around right end for no gain; Schroeder over left tackle for 21 yards and a 1st down; McWilliams around left end for 5 yards but both teams were off side and the play was not counted. Lilly goes around right end for 6 yards; McWilliams through the left side of the line for 22 yards and a 1st down; Schroeder over left tackle for 1 yard; Lilly over center for 1 yard; Perryton receives a 15 yard penalty. Schroeder punts to Follett's 28 yard line. Laubhan over center for 2 yards; Hicks tries left tackle for no gain; Hicks punts out on Perryton's 48 yard line. Schroeder attempts left end for an 8 yard loss; McWilliams passes to Kent for 6 yards; Schroeder around left end for 14 yards and a 1st down; Lilly around right end for 8 yards; McWilliams over right tackle for 9 yards and a 1st down. THE ANALYSIS OF LIQUOR

nor has she ever given a better performance than as the daughter, who married to a Spanish grandee, refuses to give up her handsome Irish army officer.

Claude Rains gives an excellent portrayal of the grandee of Spain as does Louis Hayward as the young Irish lover.

The members of the cast are too numerous to mention in their entirety, but among those of special prominence who do exceptional work are Billy Mauch, Donald Woods, Harry O'Neill, Pedro de Cordoba and George E. Stone.

Two operatic sequences, staged by Natale Carosio, add to the beauty and magnificence of the picture.

Original music that fits not only the scenes, but the moods of the scenes was written for the production by Erich Wolfgang Korngold. Special tribute must be paid to the direction of Mervyn LeRoy, and the screen play by Sheridan Gibney.

Publisher, Liberty Leaguer Applaud Pres. Roosevelt And Attack Gov. Landon

Numbered among various prominent business men who announced for President Roosevelt Saturday, all of whom have been opposing the New Deal, were Ralph Beaver Strassburger, multi-millionaire publisher of Norristown, Pa., and William Lockart Clayton, of Chattanooga and Houston, world's largest cotton merchant.

In his newspaper, the Norristown "Times-Herald", Mr. Strassburger, who was a delegate to the Republican national convention at Cleveland, said: "I am going to vote for President Roosevelt because I sincerely believe it is my patriotic duty to do so and because his re-election will best serve the interests of the country."

"As a life-long Republican, I have arrived at this decision only after most careful consideration. I am convinced that President Roosevelt has brought the country back to a stable prosperity. He has accomplished this recovery at not too great a cost in public debt and taxes. A comparison of this nation's per capita debt and interest charges with those of other countries shows that we are the most favored nation on the globe."

"The per capita national debt of the United States is \$266, the per capita interest charge is \$6.45. Compare this with Great Britain's \$761 and \$22.83 and France's \$517 and \$16.31. Not to be grateful for our good fortune and seek to preserve it would be like flying in the face of Providence."

"Perhaps I have a keener appreciation of this country's marked advantage because on frequent trips abroad I have discussed this situation with leading British and French financiers. They are all impressed with the sound comeback of the United States. They are also convinced that Roosevelt's wisely tempered course has protected this country from disruptive extremes of Communism and Fascism, which have destroyed democracy in so much of Europe."

Mr. Clayton is a former prominent member of the American Liberty League and originally contributed \$10,000 to it. In a statement issued

in Chattanooga he said: "Contrary to my intention to refrain from voting, I have now been persuaded by the tenor of Gov. Landon's speeches to vote for the re-election of President Roosevelt. The biggest question in the world today is the question of peace and how to maintain it. And that is closely linked to international trade and how to restore it."

"The policy of reciprocal trade agreements inaugurated by the present administration is a step taken to correct this situation. Gov. Landon condemns his policy and promises, if elected to scrap it. His position is an expression of such narrow, unenlightened nationalism and provincialism that I am convinced his 'leadership' would not differ from that which his party inflicted upon the country from 1921 to 1933. I believe that this narrow nationalism, for which the Republican party stands today, is in itself a policy which would carry us rapidly in the direction of both regimentation and radicalism."

"A vote for President Roosevelt is a vote to keep Secretary Hull in office, where his work, just beginning to bear fruit, may go forward with infinite benefit to the nation and to the world."

KANSAS LEADER FOR ROOSEVELT

SENATOR FISHMAN, REPUBLICAN LEADER FOR THIRTY YEARS, SAYS F. D. R. SAVES THE STATE

Simon Fishman, for thirty years Republican farm leader, long time personal friend of Gov. Alf M. Landon, owner of one of the largest farms in Kansas and prominent G. O. P. member of the Sunflower State Senate, said as he arrived in Illinois to make speeches for President Roosevelt's re-election:

"I stumped for our governor, in both of his campaigns but he turned out to be a Jekyll-Hyde when the presidential bee hit him. He is calling our president a dictator but at Ellsworth, Kansas, Sept. 18, 1934, he said: 'From the very first I advocated the granting of unusual powers to the President. That doesn't go so well with us in Kansas, even when we are reminded of 'statue pride' and 'favorite son.'"

"Gov. Landon was probably the most enthusiastic New Dealer in the State. He was also in favor of inflation of the currency, the licensing of agricultural producers, processors and dealers and an ardent advocate of price fixing. Of course, he talks very different now."

"It was Roosevelt who saved Kansas. The Government put \$462,000,000 into our state and now Landon counters with promises of a 'new' farm program that would cost three times as much as the Roosevelt farm program which worked so successfully and the Landon so-called program obviously could not work at all, because while encouraging overproduction it makes the sale of surplus crops impossible."

The record shows that Republican Senator Fishman carried 15 of the 18 counties in his district in 1932, a better record than Gov. Landon chalked up that year.

MAKE AAA SOIL PAYMENTS SOON

WASHINGTON OFFICIALS STATE THAT SEVERAL WEEKS WILL ELAPSE BEFORE CHECKS ARE MAILED OUT

The Agricultural Adjustment Administration announced today that initial payments of 90 percent would be made to producers under the 1936 Agricultural Conservation Program in the North Central, Western, and East Central Regions. Producers in the Southern Region will receive 90 percent of the Class I payments and 100 percent of the Class II payments, and producers in the Northeast Region will receive full payment. Payments will be made as rapidly as possible, but due to the amount of work involved several weeks will elapse before they can go out in volume. Texas is in Southern region.

H. R. Tolley, Administrator of the Agricultural Adjustment Act and related Acts, said: "The decision to make initial payments of 90 percent in some Regions is in line with the policy previously followed. In former years administrative expenses have been deducted from the second part of the payment, and the same procedure will be followed this year. Complete information on participation and expenses will not be available for several weeks," Mr. Tolley added, "although it is known that the number of farmers taking part in the program is in the neighborhood of 4,000,000. This is substantially in excess of participation for any one year under the adjustment program."

"From the standpoint of sound business procedure, therefore, it was deemed advisable to take advantage of the safeguards provided by the program in order to avoid possible deficits, and, at the same time, avoid holding up a large share of the applications for payments until all of them are completed."

"The second part of the payment will be made as soon as participation and the expenses of the County

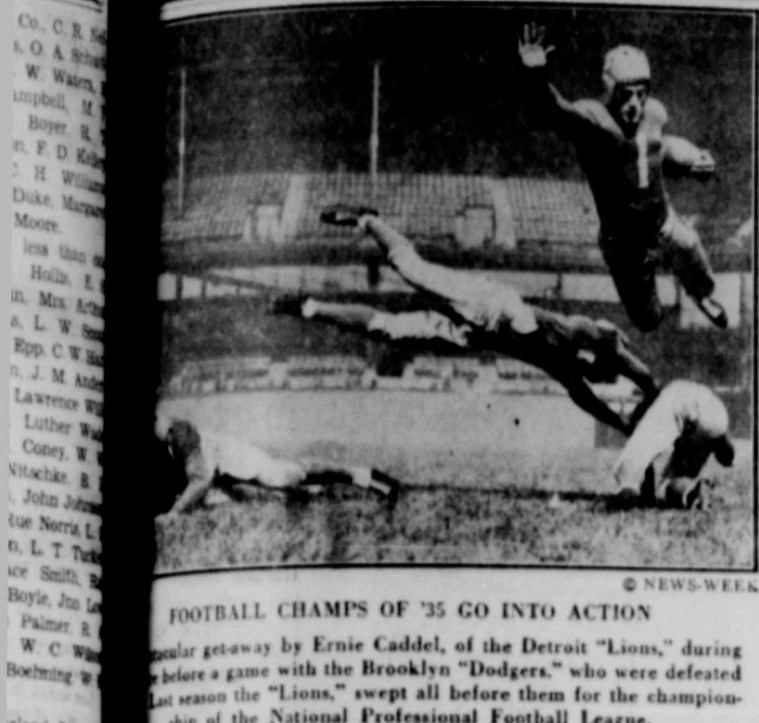

International Sunday School Lesson

Sunday school lesson

October 25, 1936
CHRISTIANITY AS LOVE
Acts 18: 1-4; 1 Cor. 13: 1-13

INTRODUCTION

Paul had encountered much opposition in the cities thus far visited. He had suffered bodily injury many times at the hands of his enemies. But at Athens he had been greeted by Grecian gestures of polished curiosity. From the summit of Mars Hill the great apostle had been permitted to deliver a masterpiece that will ring down through the ages. But few conversions resulted, and Paul "departed and came to Corinth."

I. Labors With Aquila and Priscilla

The edict of Claudius which banished all Jews from Rome had brought Aquila and Priscilla to Corinth where they wrought their occupation of tent-making. As Paul was also skilled in this trade, he made his home with this Godly pair and worked with them during the week. As the Jews met at the synagogue on the Sabbath, the apostle availed himself of the opportunity to preach to them there. Paul did not go to the synagogue to keep the Sabbath, but to preach the gospel. It will be well for us to remember that the whole Jewish law had been nailed to the cross. (Cor. 2:14), but the unconverted Jews were not aware of this fact, and continued their legal ritual throughout the larger part of the first century.

II. Love Superior To Tongues, Alms

Martyrdom
To this same congregation where Paul had labored he sent a letter. While at Ephesus, he had learned of Corinth's failure to live the new life they had so nobly begun. They bit and devoured one another, split into factions, and flouted with the devil on a wholesale plan. The thir-

teenth chapter of his first letter to them stresses love as superior in the field of Christian graces. Many of the Corinthians could speak in tongues. But it seemed that they could not or would not love one another. They went for the spectacular rather than consecrated living. The writer reminds the congregation that tongues of men and angels avail naught without love, that even feeding the hungry, if not prompted by genuine love is of no avail to the giver. Yea, even though the body is given to ashes at the martyr's stake, it registers not on the credit side of heaven's ledger unless love has seasoned this supreme sacrifice.

III. Love's Qualities

Love manifests itself by being humble, patient, kind, appreciative of truth, constant and enduring. Love would still remain after prophecies failed. Tongues ceased, and knowledge passed away. The day of miracles would cease, but love never. When the perfect law of liberty came (James 1:25; 1 Cor. 14:10) that which was "in part" was done away. This was accomplished with the completion of the book of Revelation (Rev. 22:18,19). Faith and hope abide with us still (1 Cor. 13:13). But they will have served their mission when our earthly career is over. Hope will be transformed into reality, faith into sight. But love will span eternity. Gathering with each new sacrifice and suffering here below a more resplendent hue; deepening in tenderness and mellowness with each conquest for truth, glowing with a ruddiness that comes only from the sunshine shed abroad by the Sun of Righteousness, her smiles will grace the dome of heaven and perfume with exquisite fragrance the eternal, etherial realm of the blest.

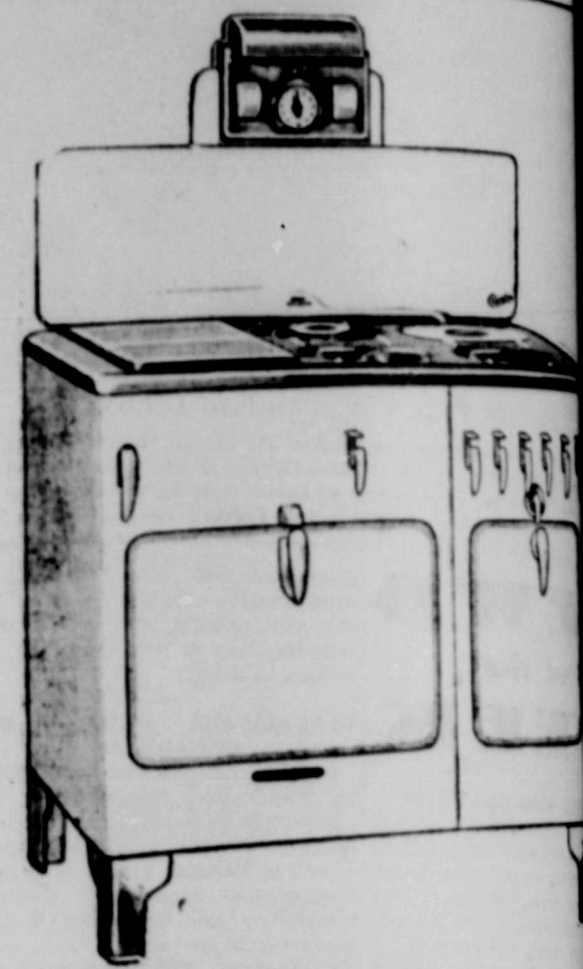

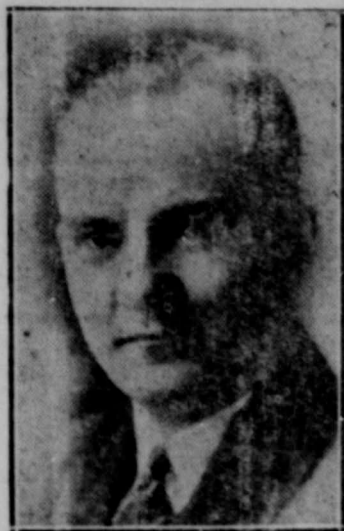

HARRY W. COLMERY

National Commander, The American Legion



HARRY W. COLMERY

A natural ability for leadership, boundless energy and a keen mind are the three qualities which have carried Harry W. Colmery to exceptional success in every field of activity that has captured his interest.

In the service during the World War, he earned the silver bar of a first lieutenant of aviation, at a time when flying was a far more difficult and hazardous occupation than now. In The American Legion his widespread popularity and ability raised him to the highest offices in his post, department and the national organization. As a lawyer and a citizen, he is recognized by all as among the ablest in the state of Kansas, his home.

By birth Mr. Colmery belongs to the East; by adoption he is a true son of the West. He was born at Bradock, Pennsylvania, December 11, 1890, a son of Walter Scott and Flora K. Thomas Colmery. Like the average typical American, success did not come to him on a silver platter; for what he has worked and studied. He received his preliminary education in the grade and high schools at North Bradock, Penn. Before entering college, he spent three years in the employ of the Union Railroad Company, at Bessemer, Pennsylvania. Matriculating at Oberlin College, in Ohio, he was graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Arts, in 1913, and immediately thereafter began to study law at the University of Pittsburgh, from which he received his degree in Law in 1916. It is typical of Harry Colmery that during the whole three years he studied at the University of Pittsburgh he also worked as an instructor at the Carnegie Institute of Technology.

Admitted to the bar in Pennsylvania upon graduation, he shortly moved to Utah, was admitted to the bar there and began the active practice of his profession. When the United States entered the World War a year later, he forsook his career and enlisted for service. He was sent to the Officer's Training Camp at The Presidio, California, and in November, 1917, received a second lieutenant's commission in the Army Air Service. He was transferred to active duty at Kelly Field, Texas, and later was transferred to Caruthers Field, Fort Worth, Texas, where he was promoted to the rank of first lieutenant with the status of a pursuit pilot. Receiving his honorable discharge April 24, 1919, he returned to the practice of law at his adopted home, Duchesne, Utah. From May 31, 1919, until May 15, 1929, he was a captain in the Army aviation reserve corps with full flying status.

With the inception of the American Legion, in 1919, Mr. Colmery became interested in its organization and has since devoted much of his time, energy and knowledge to its progress. He first turned his attention to the organization of Legion posts in Utah, was acting chairman of the committee on resolutions at the first convention of the Department of Utah, and was a member of the first Utah department executive committee.

In 1920, Mr. Colmery moved to Topeka, Kansas, was admitted to the bar there, began the practice of law, and promptly became active in building up the Department of Kansas of the American Legion. He became a member of Capitol Post No. 1, in Topeka, of which he remains an outstanding leader. In 1926, as chairman of the Post's membership committee, he more than doubled all previous post membership records. His record of interest and success attracted such attention that in 1927 he was appointed Department Judge Advocate, an office he held until 1929. In the meantime, in 1928, Capitol Post had further honored him to be its commander during the term 1929.

The story of Mr. Colmery's rise to leadership in the national organization is equally inspiring. He has twice been chairman of the National Legislative Committee, 1930-31 and 1931-32, the only person to serve two years as national legislative chairman. He remained a member of the committee at the Louisville National Convention. In 1931, 1932 and 1933 he was chairman of the National Convention Legislative Committee and in 1934 was chairman of the sub-committee on adjusted compensation. Other national

posts held by Mr. Colmery are: Member American Legion Endowment Fund Corporation, 1933-36; board of directors, 1935-36; vice-chairman National Defense Committee, 1934-35 and 1935-36; member post executive committee, chairman department legislative, safety, and post membership committees; chairman and member of many other department and post committees; chairman of the committee presenting the case of a veteran's hospital for Kansas, Liaison Committee to Veterans Administration, and chairman of The American Legion Junior Baseball Western Sectional Tournament Committee, 1933-34. He has spent considerable time preparing and presenting hundreds of claims for disabled World War veterans and has advised many others about claims.

Mr. Colmery occupies a high place in the civic life of his home state and community. He is a member of the law firm of Doran, Kline, Colmery and Cosgrove. Other professional and civic affiliations are: Member American Bar Association, Kansas State Bar Association, Topeka Bar Association, Bar Association of the City of New York, and Phi Delta Phi Legal Fraternity; he was president of the Topeka Chamber of Commerce, 1926-27, member of the board of directors of the Topeka Chamber of Commerce for three terms, and is a past member of the board of directors of the Kansas State Chamber of Commerce; he was president of the Topeka Kiwanis Club, 1923-24, and district trustee of the same, 1924-25. In addition, he has served on directorates and important committees of philanthropic and charitable institutions too numerous to list.

A talented and forceful speaker, Mr. Colmery has appeared before audiences throughout the United States, on many occasions speaking in behalf of the ideals and objectives of the American Legion. In school he was a talented athlete, having been a letter man at both Oberlin College and the University of Pittsburgh. His knowledge of athletics has made him an invaluable aid in carrying forward the youth activities program of the Legion.

Mr. Colmery married Miss Minerva Hiserodt in December, 1919. They have three children, Sarah Elizabeth, Harry W. Jr., and Mary Caroline.

WASHINGTON SIDELIGHTS

One often hears the expression, "I'll admit that conditions are better. I'll admit that my business has improved. I'll admit that all business is better, but—How are we going to pay for it?"

That is a fair question. Let us analyze the facts.

Deducting the cash on hand, the national debt has increased about 10 1/2 billion dollars in the last 3 1/2 years.

Yet our annual interest bill is more than 100 million dollars less than it was in 1923, when the public debt was considerably less.

How can this be?

It simply means that the interest rate has been greatly reduced not only on the new debt, but that the old debt has been called and refinanced at a much lower rate.

It is interesting to note that if amortized over a period of years, the necessary annual payment to pay off the entire present national debt—principal and interest—would be less than the annual payment to pay off the 1923 debt under the rates then prevailing.

But this is not all. It is morally certain that we will get back about 5 billion of the 10 1/2 billion increase. This will be done through collections on various loans and advancements that have been made.

In addition, the national income has increased from 39 billion to above 60 billion dollars. The value of all securities and of all properties has vastly increased.

These are all record figures. If the soldier's bonus is left out and that was simply trading one form of obligation for another and did not increase the national debt, and therefore hangs on a different hook—the appropriations made by Congress for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1936, were actually 1 1/2 billion less than the appropriations for the fiscal year before that.

And yet, with improved business conditions, the situation will be better cared for than with the larger appropriations of last year.

If similar reductions can be made for the next two years, the national budget will be balanced.

There should be and I believe will be such reductions. Unnecessary emergency activities can and should be eliminated.

If this is done, I believe it will be far better than the wholesale bankruptcy, liquidation and repudiation that would have been the inevitable result if the do-nothing policy had been continued.

"Human Rehabilitation"

An Address given by Paul Worden, Educational Adviser of Perryton CCC Camp, to the Perryton Lions Club.

The five purposes of the CCC are: first, personal relief; second, conservation; third, financial rehabilitation; fourth, natural rehabilitation; and last, human rehabilitation.

Important as the first four of these purposes are, I am going to brush them aside and talk to you about this last one, "Human Rehabilitation". It seems to me that the accomplishment of the purpose of human rehabilitation into definite results is nothing more or less than putting over a worthwhile educational program in the camp.

To understand better what I mean by human rehabilitation, picture the average group of young men enrolled in the CCC, a typical cross-section of the youth of America. They had the misfortune to be growing into man-hood at a time when the depression had literally slammed the door of opportunity in their faces. Many of them, had their education cut short, and their home life disrupted. They represent all possible educational levels and all types of complex human problems, this cosmopolitan group forms the nucleus of the young men of our nation, ages 17 to 25.

These men need first of all, food, clothing, shelter and medical attention, but beyond that they need encouragement, work, a chance to find themselves, a complete change in mental attitudes. None of these needs could be met in idleness and despair. So besides putting these young men to work on the project and placing them in healthful living conditions, the problem of human rehabilitation is being solved by offering to each enrollee a chance to improve himself by taking part in an organized and supervised educational program in the camp.

In December, 1933, Dr. C. S. Marsh was appointed Educational Director of the CCC and he set up an organization which closely parallels the CCC-Army set-up. In each of the nine Corps Areas which the U. S. is divided into, a Corps area director was appointed. Mr. L. W. Rogers, is Corps area director for this, the Eighth Corps with headquarters at Fort Sam Houston, Texas. Then in each CCC district there is a district educational adviser, who has under him a camp adviser at each camp in his district.

It is the duty of the camp educational adviser to organize the program, keep it going and change it from time to time as the need arises. He should teach some of the course himself, and recruit the instructors for other subjects from the technical force, W. P. A. teachers, the military staff, and enrollees themselves.

The educational program must be worked out for each camp separately. There is no set of rules or standards mapped out and imposed by those in higher authority. The educational levels of the enrollees in each camp vary widely. Many of the boys are there for only six months or a year, so "flexibility" must by necessity be the guiding principle.

The courses and activities must grow out of the need and wishes of the men.

Individual counseling, guidance, and the power of suggestion must be relied upon in selecting the courses to be offered. No part of the program is compulsory, but the boys are encouraged to participate. Informal study and round table discussions with the instructor guiding rather than dominating the group, characterize the methods of teaching. Formal class room instructions as usually carried on in high school or college is out of the question.

As I just said, the program in each camp must by necessity differ from the programs in all other camps, but for the sake of an illustration let us see what a typical camp educational program includes. Usually there are from 15 to 25 different subjects being taught. They are divided into the following groups: academic subjects, vocational subjects, on the job instruction and informal recreational activities.

The academic subjects now being offered in the Perryton camp include: elementary reading, writing, and arithmetic; journalism, public speaking, and soil conservation.

It is in the vocational subjects that the most fruitful work is done. This is true because of the sense of achievement that comes to a man when he makes something with his hands; and because of the natural interest of enrollees in preparing for a job after their CCC days are over.

The vocational subjects now being taught at the Perryton camp are: typewriting, bookkeeping, blacksmithing, automobile mechanics, free hand lettering, cooking, and baking. In the near future, courses in poultry raising, plane surveying and wood working are to be added.

On the job instruction possibly rivals the regular vocational subjects. This type of teaching involves the advantage of both theory and practical experience. While a group of enrollees are engaged in some one project such as tree planting, dam building, or running trace lines, the foreman in charge will put them through a regular course in the theory of that particular kind of work.

The informal activities include music, dramatics and arts and crafts followed as hobbies. In most camps, the regular classes are on a schedule of one hour periods and once, twice or three times a week. Classes are usually held on four nights a week with the fifth night given over to a regular religious service and to a weekly "Stunt night" program which utilizes enrollee-talent. Educational films and lectures are regularly made use of as added attraction in the educational program.

Briefly then we see what is being done toward human rehabilitation in the CCC camps. When we think about the thousands of boys that have and will pass through the CCC, and finally find their place as a useful citizen, we get a glimpse of the results of this work.

It would be an easy matter to collect the data telling how many acres of land had been terraced how

many dams had been constructed, how many trees have been planted, how many parks have been built, by the CCC. The size and proportions of the figures would surely surprise you. The value of all this work done with CCC funds could then be reduced more or less to dollars and cents. But it would be impossible to estimate in dollars and cents, the value of human rehabilitation of the young men of our nation.

Each man who passes through the CCC gains a new outlook on life, and many are taught useful vocations. The monetary value of this kind of work cannot be counted, but still the benefits are real and undisputed. Certainly our country will be repaid many times over for this reclamation of its youth.

To the STOCKHOLDERS of the OCHILTREE NATIONAL FARM LOAN ASSOCIATION

In the last four issues of the OCHILTREE COUNTY HERALD, we have had the Code of the Association (as adopted by your Board of Directors) in order to correct a taken idea some of our men have as to what the Association's relation to the Federal Land Bank is, and what responsibility each member has, and also the responsibility placed on your Board of Directors.

In 1917, the Congress of the United States passed an Act, establishing a CO-OPERATIVE system by which the Farmer and Ranchman could get credit at a lower rate of interest, and on longer time payments, by establishing 12 Federal Land Banks, those Land Banks in turn organized the local Farm Loan Associations over their respective territories. The Federal Government does not loan the money; they only endorse the bonds of the Land Banks and guarantee their payment in order to make them saleable on the market at a low rate of interest. Your notes and mortgage goes into the Land Bank and are put up to secure these bonds, and the stock that you are required to take is held by the Bank to pay the delinquencies in case there are some that fail to meet their payments. If all of us would keep our payments up we would get a dividend on our stock, but if some fail to pay it falls back on the ones that do pay, therefore if you fail to keep your loan in good standing it not only hurts you but it also hurts your neighbor, as your Association has to guarantee all notes accepted, and all delinquencies are charged back to the Association making the loan.

For several years prior to 1929 this Association had kept its payments up and we paid a dividend on our stock, and the Land Bank had paid the Federal Government back for the stock the Government had bought to start with, but since that time there has been so many that have failed to keep their payments in good standing that the Government has set up other agencies in order to carry over through the depression; it has set up what is called the Commissioners Loan, which permits the borrower to get twenty-five per cent more on his land by giving a second lien on his land, and it has authorized the taking of a crop mortgage for carrying over delinquencies where it is impossible for the borrower to pay it otherwise. But as the Government has set up still other agencies such as Wheat Loans and Soil Conservation, etc., the Bank requires the directors of the Association to investigate and make a full report on each borrower, as to whether he is doing his best, or if he is using the money so acquired to pay other debts; as the Land Bank holds first mortgage on the farm, and it is through that farm you get the money, it should receive first consideration.

Now as to the Association and its duties. The local Association is composed of the borrowers who hold stock in the Association, and under the rules and regulations they hold an annual meeting in January of each year for the purpose of hearing the report of the preceding year, and the election of a board of directors for the following year. The board of directors are composed of five members elected at each annual meeting, who serve for one year without compensation, except they are allowed to draw their actual expenses, and they in turn elect a Secretary-Treasurer whose duty is to attend to all matters pertaining to the Association, and to keep a record of same, and report to the directors and to the Bank when called on, and to collect all money due the Bank or the Association; he is under a heavy bond for the faithful discharge of his duties.

As a member of the Association it is very important that you attend the annual meeting and elect a board of directors that will give of their time and thought. This Association has about \$100,000 in stock at this time, and the board of directors are under a heavy obligation as it is required to investigate each loan and guarantee it to the Land Bank before they will make a loan, the same rule also applies to extensions, as they must also be approved by the directors before they will be accepted by the Bank.

We find there are some people who think that the Federal Government is furnishing the money on our loans, but they are not. It is strictly a cooperative organization and must stand on its own merits, the Government only guarantees your notes in order that the Land Bank can go on the market and sell its bonds with a low rate of interest to get the money to let you have at less than half the interest you had to pay before it was organized.

In other words, if you fail to keep your loan in good standing by either paying your installments as they come due, or making application for extension in case it is impossible to pay it, and to remember that the Bank holds first claim on your farm and for them to carry on with you it will be necessary for you to show your good faith by putting them first, by giving additional security on any other proceeds from the farm.

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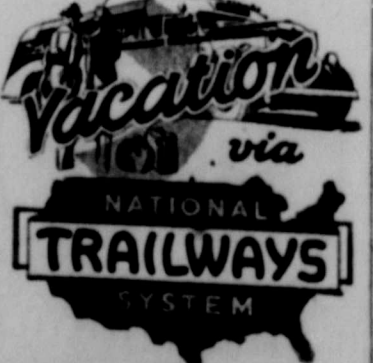
