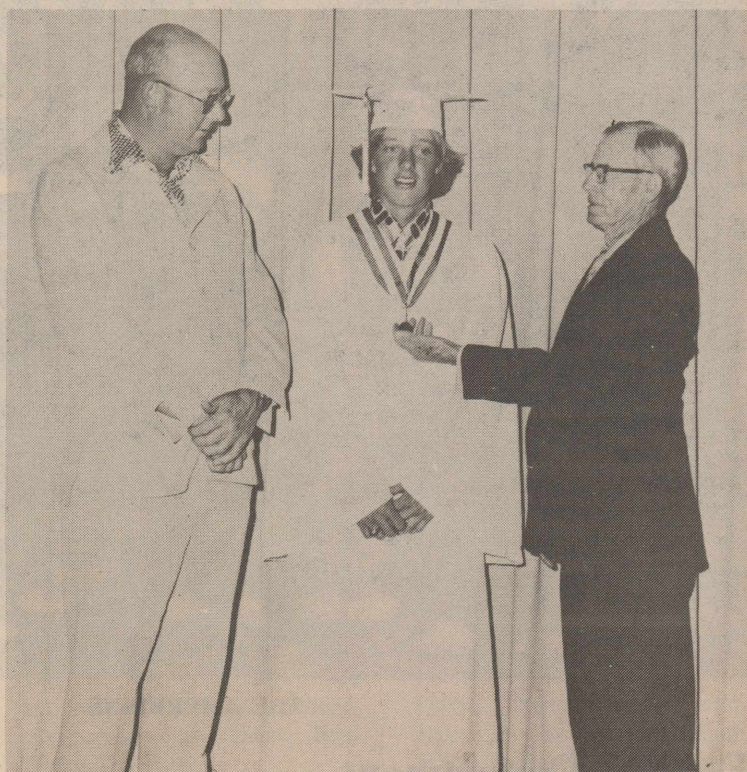

RICE PICTURE BLEAK--Rice producers in the U.S. are faced with an uncertain market due to record domestic and world rice production last year. U.S. rice stocks on Aug. 1 could be five times the level of last summer due to a 14 per cent increase in production last year coupled with an almost 16 per cent decrease in exports due to strong foreign competition. About 45 per cent of last year's U.S. rice crop still has not moved into market channels, and in about three months the 1976 crop will start coming in, points out an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

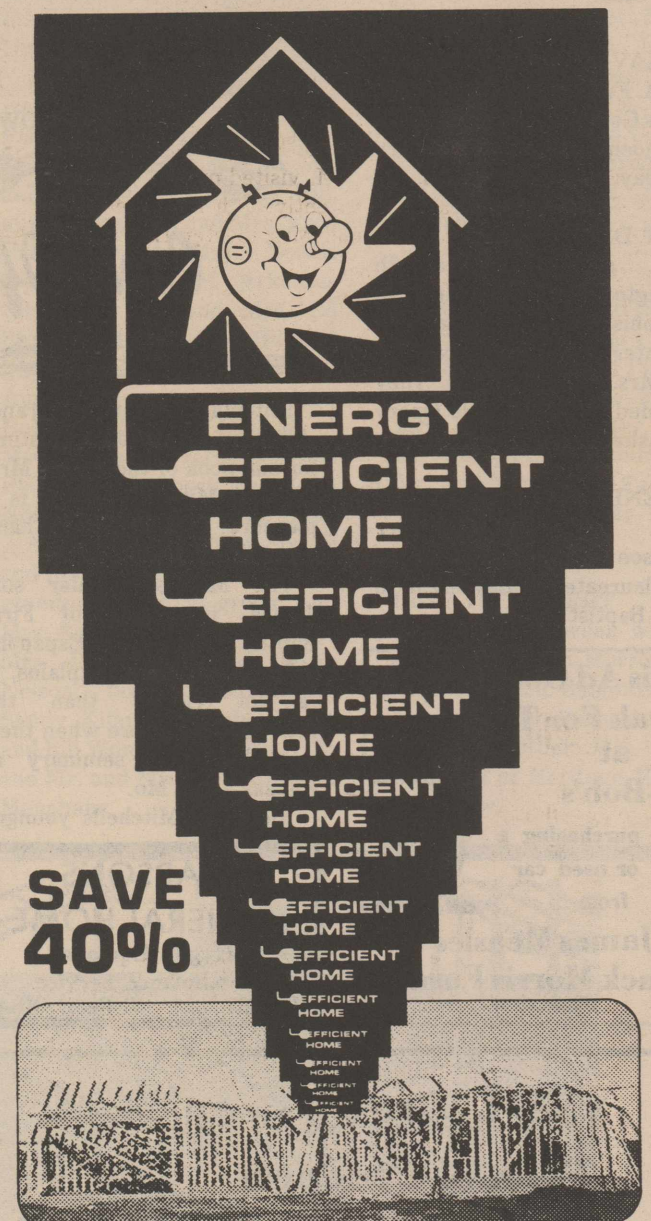

Cook Of The Week



Entertaining her two grandchildren is a favorite pastime for our Cook of the Week, Mrs. Howard Mitchell, but it is a pleasure that distance hampers.

The Mitchells' elder son, James, is pastor of First Baptist Church in Espanola, N.M. which, Helen explains, is "a lot closer" than the grandchildren were when their father was in seminary at Kansas City, Mo.

Ricky, the Mitchells' younger

son, lives here and farms with his dad.

Helen and Howard grew up in East Texas. They came to Hart in 1952.

Sewing is another of Helen's hobbies. She sings in the choir at First Baptist Church and is a member of the Zealot Club.

The recipe she shares for jerky is a new one which she got from a niece. She says it's very good. The tuna recipe, a croquette dish, is a favorite with the Mitchells. Helen

stresses that the secret is in making tiny croquettes which fry deliciously brown and crisp.

JERKY

1 1/2 lbs beef (flank steak, round steak, chuck steak, brisket)
1/2 t seasoned salt
1/3 t garlic powder or salt
1/3 t pepper
1 t Monosodium glutamate (optional)
1 t onion powder or salt
1/4 c Worcestershire Sauce
1/4 c Soy Sauce
2 T liquid smoke

Trim off fat. Semi-freeze meat and slice with grain into thin strips. Place meat into shallow baking dish. Combine all other ingredients and pour over meat. Marinate overnight. Preheat oven to 125 degrees. Lay strips of marinated meat in single layer on oven rack with baking sheet underneath to catch the dripping. Leave oven door open a crack and bake 8 hrs. to 12 hrs. or until meat is chewy. Test by tasting occasionally. You will probably use more meat than this so I double the sauce recipe.

TUNA ALA

2 7 oz cans Tuna
1 lge egg
1 heaping t baking powder
1/2 c sifted flour

Open the tuna and drain the water or oil in a measuring cup. Dump the tuna in a mixing bowl and add one egg. Flake and mix real good. Add 1/2 c flour and mix thoroughly with a fork. This mixture will be real thick. You may add some pepper; I find it doesn't need extra salt. Take your measuring cup and pour off all but 1/4 c of the liquid. Add the baking powder. Beat with a fork. It will foam; your measuring cup should be 3/4 full with foam. (If it doesn't foam, your baking powder may be old.) After the liquid has foamed, add to the tuna mixture. Mix again with a fork. It will be thin now, but is supposed to be. Use 2 ice tea spoons that are small, dip up about half spoonful of the batter and scoop it off with the other into a deep fryer half

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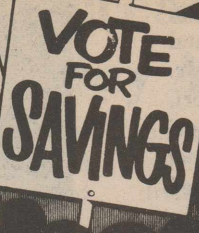
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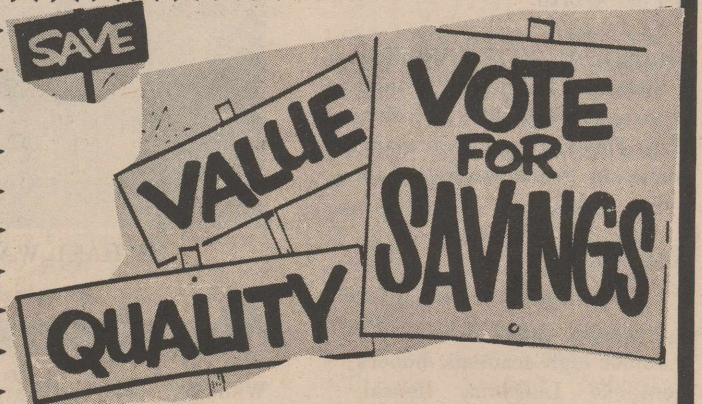
