The Morning Avalanche Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST—Sections of grape fruit, cereal, cream, fish and rice on toast, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Mock turtle soup, toasted crackers, banana and peanut salad, health bread, rhubarb, tapioca pudding, milk tea.

DINNER—Smother mutton chops with spinach, steamed rice, sliced tomatoes, whole wheat rolls, maple bavarian cream, vanilla wafers, milk, coffee.

Maple Bavarian Cream. One cup rich milk, 2 eggs, 1 tablespoon granulated gelatine, 4 tablespoons water, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1 cup maple syrup, 1/2 cup canned shredded coconut, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 cup whipping cream.

Scald milk in top of double boiler. Soften gelatine in cold water for five minutes. Beat yolks of eggs and slowly pour hot milk over them, beating constantly. Return to double boiler and cook five minutes. Add salt and softened gelatine, stir until gelatine is dissolved and remove from fire. Stir in syrup and let stand until cool and beginning to thicken. Add coconut and fold in whites of eggs beaten stiff, flavored with vanilla and sweetened with 1 teaspoon powdered sugar.

NEW OIL PLANT WILL BE ERECTED IN LUBBOCK

A contract has been awarded here for the construction of a wholesale distributing plant for the Continental Oil company, to W. G. McMillan, general contractor of this city. The plant will be erected east of the Santa Fe tracks just across from the freight depot, it was learned Wednesday.

The project consists of a warehouse, garage, pump house and oil tank supports, and is to be semi-fire-proof, built of reinforced concrete and brick, with wooden floors and steel gash.

Construction work is to begin Thursday morning, Mr. McMillan, who will superintend the job, reported.

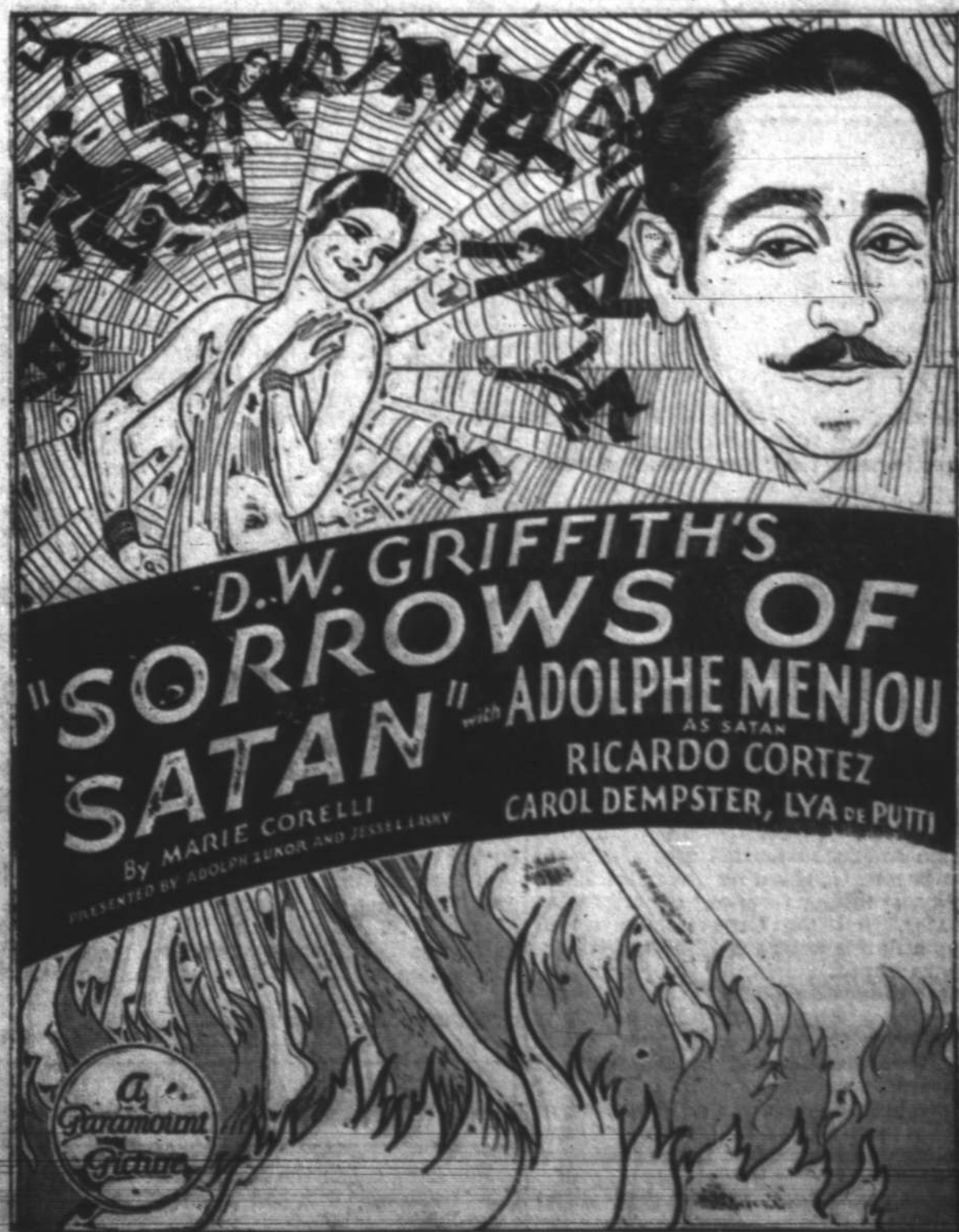

WEST AND SOUTH CONTINUE CAGE CONQUEST

TEXAS ENTRANT IS NOSED OUT BY TEAM FROM NORTH DAKOTA IN 19 TO 17 GAME AFTER ATHENS GRABS AN EARLY LEAD

(By The Associated Press)
CHICAGO, March 30.—Four teams from the far west, three from the northwest and two from the south, found themselves tonight among the sixteen teams which will still be in the running tomorrow for the high school basketball championship of the United States.

The egg had not worked its way into the double Oet at nightfall as play at the University of Chicago tournament continued.

Pacific coast adherents cheered Roosevelt N. M. and Eugene, Ore., to victory today and Rothell, Washington, and Pocahontas, Idaho, went through to the third round on a bye. Russell dropped out Fairfield, Maine, 20 to 13, and Eugene eliminated Jacksonville, Florida, with a 13 to 12 victory over Duval high.

Others Defeated
The northwest was represented by Wisconsin and the Dakotas. Eau Claire, Wis., toppled Athens, Texas, 19 to 17. Grand Forks, N. D., ousted Ridgely Park, N. J., 25 to 20 and Huron, S. D., eliminated its neighbor contestant from Lincoln, Neb., 25 to 16.

Of the southern entries London, Ky., came through 20 to 20 victory over Safford, Arizona, and Batavia, Ark., nosed out Muskogee, Mich., 25 to 20.

In the consolation round Athens, Tenn., the smallest hamlet represented in the tournament, got another wallop, losing 20 to 13 to Greenville, S. C., the Tennesseeans lost yesterday to Lincoln, Neb., 21 to 9.

The margin by which Eugene, Ore., put out Florida's state champions, and the starting victory of Huron, S. D., over the Lincoln, Neb., team were features of today's play.

Oregon Wins
The Oregon-Florida scrap was a horse race all the way, and the teams were seldom more than a point apart. Dorsett of Jacksonville missed a free throw just as the gun sounded for the point which would have tied the score.

The South Dakota entry made itself a high favorite with its draught of Nebraska's crimson cumberbuds, who fell to a team which guarded well, kept its head and scored by picking its openings carefully. Fisher, Lincoln forward, whose 25 points equaled Alpine have never been equalled in a single tournament game, was so well covered by Huron guards that he got not a single field goal, although he tallied five free throw points.

Episcopal Church Will Conduct Summer School For Pastors Throughout Region

DALLAS, March 30. (AP)—Entering the fifth annual season, summer schools for pastors of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, will be conducted in every section of the denomination's territory. The schedule, representing a church-wide system of 14 schools, includes an institute at Southern Methodist University, Dallas, for the section embraced by five Texas conferences, and at Hendrick College, Conway, Arkansas, for workers in the bounds of the Little Rock and North Arkansas conferences.

Succeeding the preachers' institute of January, pastors' schools are a recent educational development authorized by the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, to be conducted annually in college centers of the denomination's area to give special instructions to Methodist pastors and other Christian workers.

While organized by the board of missions in 1923, leadership in conducting the system of pastors' schools was given by the general conference of 1924, to the board of education. Other connectional agencies cooperating in the organization, support and promotion of schools are the missions, Sunday school, Epworth league and Lay Activities boards, together with the respective annual conference boards of these departments.

Dr. Stowessell Anderson, of Nashville, Tenn., general secretary of the board of education, has been assisting in formulating the courses of study by the following general secretaries of their respective connectional boards which have headquarters at Nashville, Dr. W. G. Cram, board of missions; Dr. J. W. Shuckford, Sunday school; Dr. E. S. Parker, Epworth League; and Dr. G. L. Morelock, Lay Activities.

Standardized courses of study with definite requirements for receiving credits and awards, according to Dr. Anderson, take into consideration the needs of college and seminary trained pastors, needs of the pastor who has received no college training; needs of city and rural pastors; need for content, methods and inspirational courses.

Three units are required in subjects included in a general course, three in Bible courses; three in Missions and Social Service, and three in Religious Education. A diploma is offered for the completion of 18 courses of study, each course being valued at one unit, three units being taken from each of the four divisions if the list of approved courses of study.

The staff of each of the schools included the bishop of the area in which the school is conducted; a board of managers composed of representatives of each of the participating conferences; a faculty composed of outstanding leaders in education and religion; and platform speakers of national reputation, coming from various denominational fields.

FOUR MONTHS TO BE SINCLAIR MINIMUM

STIFF JAIL SENTENCE FACES OIL OPERATOR FOR HIS REFUSAL TO TALK

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 30.—Harry P. Sinclair, wealthy oil operator and sportsman, may get a minimum of four months instead of one month in jail as a result of his refusal to answer questions in the senate's Tea Pot Dome investigation three years ago.

In announcing today that he would receive decision until tomorrow on a motion for a new trial, Justice Hitz in the District of Columbia told counsel he wanted them to be prepared at that time to present views as to whether the accused had committed one offense or four offenses.

One offense—Responding to informal questions by the court, counsel for Sinclair said their position if there had been any offense only one had been committed, covering all of the refusals to answer as set out in the four counts in the indictment on which a verdict of guilty was returned by a jury two weeks ago.

Government counsel took a contrary view, however, contending that there had been four separate offenses, one for each count which sets out that the specific question, which the lease of the Tea Pot Dome naval oil reserve in Wyoming refused to answer when called before the senate committee for the sixth time.

Should Justice Hitz overrule the motion for a new trial argument on the question of the number of offenses then would be heard and a date set on which Sinclair would be sentenced. The statute under which he was convicted makes mandatory imprisonment from one to twelve months and a fine of not less than \$100, or more than \$1,000.

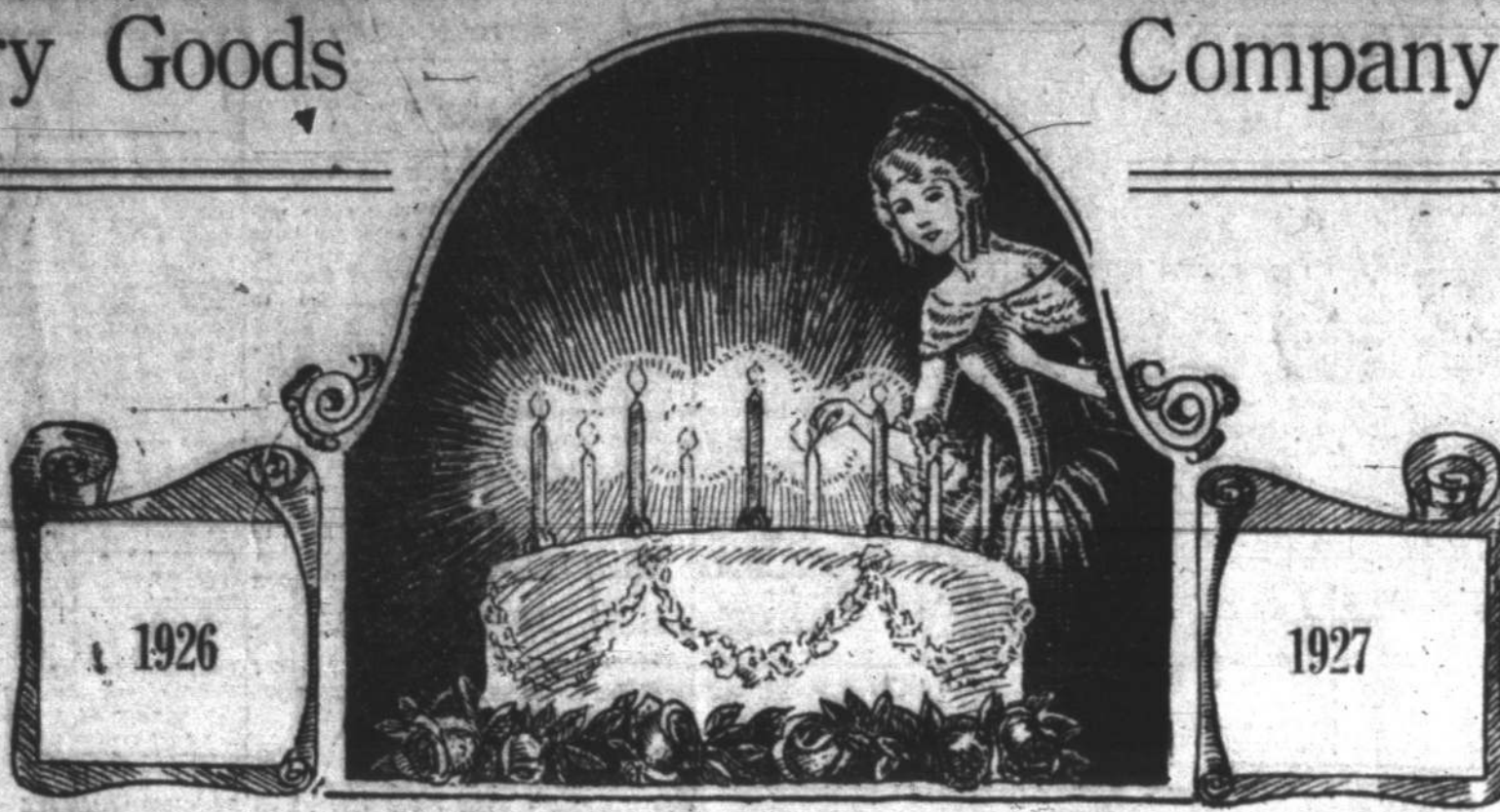
