Red Cross Call Is Urgent, Fry Committee Declares

Disappointing Response So Far In Drive

"Up-to-date we have not had a very favorable response. We have raised less than a third of our quota of \$1,900."

That R. E. Fry's response yesterday to the question, "Have the people of Floyd county subscribed the quota assigned us in the \$500,000.00 war relief fund of the American Red Cross?"

Fry and his committee have contacted practically every resident taxpayer of Floyd county by first class mail, with return reply postcards enclosed, and the replies they have received indicate the apathy of the people.

Evidently the people of Floyd county are not yet convinced of the importance of the drive.

That the Red Cross war relief fund actually needs \$1,900 from Floyd county people; or

That the responsibility is the responsibility of all the citizenship and not just a few of them.

"This is really an urgent call. The Red Cross officials tell us so, the president tells us so," Mr. Fry said.

"We do not want to see Floyd county left in its quota, and we want to inspire the citizens of the county making their donations and making them quickly. We think this is not only a duty but a privilege, under the circumstances."

The Red Cross War Fund campaign is composed of Frank Perkins, Lockney; Carl Daniel, South Plains; Fred Zimmerman, Floydada; J. E. Krite, Dougherty; M. Polk, Glen; G. C. Collins, Sand Hill; G. W. deCordova, Allmon; E. Goode, Aiken; J. M. Harrison, Aiken; with R. E. Fry, county chairman.

Any of these committeemen will receive contributions which individuals may not want to authorize their bank to pay. Also donations to the War Relief fund may be made in person at either The First National bank at Floydada or the First National bank at Lockney.

The call of the committee for donations to the War Relief fund was made last week in the following terms:

"The American Red Cross is now called upon to serve our nation in its hour of need."

"We face vast and definite responsibilities for service to our armed forces."

"The Red Cross today is launching a campaign for a war fund of \$500,000,000."

"Our president has issued a proclamation supporting this appeal."

"Our county quota is \$1,900.00."

"We must and shall not fail in this crisis."

"You are urged to make your contribution immediately."

"We are counting on you to give liberally."

Those who have delayed mailing their cards to the chairman but plan to do so are asked to make the haste.

And those who want to make their donations in some other manner are asked to contact some member of the committee or to leave the money at the bank of their choice.

Fred N. Warren, state supervisor of Emergency loans, was in Floydada Wednesday and pointed out the service available to farmers.

Metal Works Defense School

Planned To Open January 12, School Authorities Announce

A defense school in metal work, under the sponsorship of Floydada Public schools, will begin on January 12, according to plans announced last week by H. G. Barber, vocational teacher of the school.

The object of the school is to train young men in the care, repair, construction and upkeep of farm machinery. Sheet metal work, blacksmithing and welding are among the things that will be taught.

Both farm and town youth are eligible to attend the school and young men within the ages of 17 to 25 are eligible. It is announced.

Fifteen to 18 students can be accommodated in the school, authorities say.

January Food Stamp Program Calls For One Change In Blue Stamp Food Items

Surplus Marketing administration today announced only one change in the blue stamp food list for families taking part in the Food Stamp program in Floyd county.

Except for the removal of raisins from the January blue stamp list the commodities obtainable are the same as the December blue stamp foods.

The complete list of blue stamp foods for the period of January 1, 1942, to January 31 in all stamp program areas is as follows: Butter, all cuts of pork (except that cooked or packed in metal or glass containers), fresh grapes, pears, apples, oranges, and fresh vegetables (including potatoes), corn meal, shell eggs, dried prunes, hominy (corn) grits, dry edible beans, wheat flour, enriched wheat flour, self-rising flour, enriched self-rising flour, and whole wheat (Graham) flour.

Drivers License Good In Floyd Until June 30

Many Floyd county people who listen to the radio and read the newspapers get confused by the inconsistent advice to see about renewing their drivers licenses.

It is a very natural thing to happen. Assessor-Collector Geo. B. Marshall pointed out this week, but he makes this suggestion:

If you live in Floyd county, remember that all Floyd county drivers' license are numbered about 900,000;

They do not expire until June 30, 1942.

And the State Department of safety which handles drivers license procedure will not accept applications for drivers license from Floyd county until April 1, with the following exceptions:

(1) If your drivers license is badly torn up or illegible because of use and wear, you can make application now;

(2) If your drivers license is destroyed or lost you can obtain a new one by seeing the patrolman who visits Floydada regularly on Fridays and spends from 8:30 until 11 a. m. here, and who will issue you a new drivers license upon examination to determine your ability to drive safely.

Otherwise, wait until April 1. And remember that all your assessor-collector has to do with drivers licenses is to stamp your old license, showing its renewal to June 30, 1942, or to provide forms for those who have torn or illegible licenses.

When April 1 arrives and it is time to apply for renewal or drivers license there will be plenty of forms available in convenient places in the county, the assessor-collector points out, but meanwhile keep in mind that your radio man or your newspaperman probably is entirely correct in what he says but he is not talking to Floyd county people when he urges you to renew your drivers' license at once. You can't do it until April 1 if you live in Floyd county, and the license you now hold is good to June 30, if it has been properly stamped.

Please observe this story is about your drivers' license. Do not confuse drivers license with automobile license and the purchase of automobile, truck or farm truck license and the purchase of automobile, truck or farm truck license plates which is another matter entirely.—Ed. Note.

Lock Your Car In A Garage For Safety Against Theft At Night, Sheriff Suggests

Lock and key dealers ought to do a land office business in Floyd county during the next few weeks.

The fact, suddenly discovered, that no more tires and tubes for their cars may be available for an indefinite time on account of the activities of the descendants of the Rising Sun in the far Pacific, has made the citizens tire-and-tube conscious with a vengeance.

A modern Floyd county man afoot without his automobile or truck would be a counterpart of the cowboy of yore whose horse got away from him. He wouldn't know what to do.

Advice from Sheriff Fred N. Clark is to lock your car up in your garage at night, to discourage tire and tube thieves. A tire and wheel stolen from an open garage or from the automobile that sets on the open street is a misdemeanor. The value is less than \$50 in money. But if the thief breaks a lock to get to the tire and tube he has burglarized your premises and has committed a felony. He is going to take the careless citizen's tire first, from the unprotected car. That's the line of reasoning in the sheriff's advice to residents of the county who have asked him what about it.

Some are branding their tires for identification in case of theft, others are taking down names and styles and serial numbers and asking their service station men to do the same, so as to have a double record.

But a tire and wheel that are gone in the night may not re-appear again in a hundred of 300 miles. Which is why the sheriff says put your car under lock and key in a garage, and since few have locks and keys the dealer who has these for sale ought to fare well. Perhaps you can dig up a lock and key on your own premises. It is almost sure to be one you have discarded.

Few people here lock the out-buildings around their premises, in fact a small percentage of the people of Floyd county have anything under lock and key.

But this is going to be changed, we opine, so far as the garage is concerned. People are going to keep their tires and their wheels if they can. They're sure not going to walk until they have it to do. For the truth the automobile and the truck have a lot to do with the living people of Floyd county make.

Tire Rationing Program Questions and Answers

school buses and company buses used to carry workers to and from their jobs. Company buses are barred, however, if public transportation facilities are "readily available."

Q. Will farmers have to go back to the old metal wheel tractors and implements?

A. No. The regulations approve purchase of new tires for farm equipment, other than automobiles or trucks, if tires are essential to operation of the equipment.

Q. Where do motorcycles and bicycles come in?

A. Motorcycle tires are subject to rationing; bicycle tires are not and their sale is unrestricted at the present time. However, no more bicycle tires are being manufactured except to fill defense orders.

Q. Who will do the actual rationing?

A. Local rationing boards, made up of members of local defense councils, are being established. They will have final jurisdiction within their communities and will issue certificates on application permitting eligible persons to purchase tires.

Q. How many tires may each ap-

proportion, including the condition of the tires he wishes to replace and the quota for his state or county. The regulations provide that every new tire bought must be "mounted" on the vehicle, which eliminates a spare.

Q. Who determines the state and county quotas?

A. Each month, the Office of Price Administration will assign the number of tires which may be sold nationally and in each state or county.

Two Months Supply

Q. Are there enough retreads and used tires available to take care of need of those ineligible to buy new tires?

A. Probably not. Officials say a "very rough" estimate of the number of used tires now in dealers' stocks is 1,500,000; the supply of retreads held by dealers is estimated at about 200,000.

Q. How long would that last?

A. Hard to say. Only comparable figure was a recent estimate by Price Administrator, Leon Henderson that 8,000,000 new tires are now in stock and that, under unrationed,

ed goods, and finished products, including farm products.

Q. What is the "important exception?"

A. No new tires may be purchased for a truck which is used to transport commodities to an ultimate consumer for personal, family, or household use.

Q. Does that mean delivery trucks operated by a retail grocer, a department store, or other business?

A. Yes.

Q. What about milk or bakery trucks?

A. Technically, they fall under the ban; in practice, it is believed possible that some future provision may be made for their benefit. But it may involve enforced "pooling" of their delivery facilities to reduce the number of trucks operated by each company. Most firms operating large fleets of trucks or taxis, however, have fairly large stocks of new or retreaded tires on hand and may not suffer immediate effects from the rationing plan.

Most Buses Included

Q. What about buses?

A. Buses with a capacity of ten or more passengers, used exclusively for public transportation, are exempt from the rationing plan.

Q. What about taxis?

A. Taxis are in the same class with the average motorist.

Q. How are truck owners affected?

A. The only trucks for which new tires may be obtained are those used "exclusively" for transportation of ice or fuel, materials for construction or maintenance of public highways, public utilities or production facilities; transportation essential to roofing, plumbing, heating and electrical repair services; transportation by any common carrier or for waste and scrap materials; or transportation with an important exception.

EDITORIALS

Never a prospective year such as 1942 before! Wars we have been in, mighty conflicts our people have seen, once particularly in 1860 and once particularly in 1917. But world-wide forces are now at work as never before. All the peoples of all the earth are doing their utmost either willingly or unwillingly to do the most destruction. When America shall have begun really to work at a job such as that undoubtedly we can do it as well as any other job we ever tried. A people who can change in two generations a philosophy of scarcity into a philosophy of over-production in farm products, in machinery, in houses, and everything—they can also do other unbelievable things. But the job cut out is a stupendous one. We do not know about our boys who are going to camps by the million, to fly in the air, to fight on the ground, or to chart the depths of the seas in search of an enemy. We do not know how strong is the enemy, although we know he is much better prepared now than we. But we do know what our intentions are. We do know we are going to win a war at any cost. And with our minds all turned to that one objective, this year of 1942 is sure to see so many changes we will hardly recognize ourselves as the same people who made plans for war in the latter part of 1941.

What effect is the war going to have on the practices you follow in your business after the war is over? We do not mean what are you going to do when the postwar depression, whatever they will call it then, happens, nor what you will put your money into so that it will be safe. We mean, when they go to beating swords into plowshares, trying to make use of the war instruments of a hundred kinds they are now making. As soon as the war is over and we have won a glorious victory the pendulum will swing the other direction and our people will never want to hear of war again. We'll be doing as many anti-war things then as we are doing pro-war now. And there will be all the thousands of army trucks, jeeps, big and little tanks and anti-tank wagons, and airplanes that fill the sky—all with nothing to do. Five years from now do you suppose some outfit will be selling a hook-up to make a field power plant out of a jeep, or will they have tanks stripped down to use with a cleverly-applied blade as a road-working machine or a terracer, or possibly made over into some kind of power-driven device not even now thought of. Certain it is there will be plenty of head-scratching to put to some practical use the billions of dollars worth of war-machinery. You and I and our boys may not be here to use them, but there will be somebody. And you know how it is, that after all the warriors have returned home, the dead buried and mourned, a spring day will come and somebody will be going up and down the field planting seed and hoping for a harvest. To this fellow's needs whosoever he may be the discarded war materials will be applied some way somehow.

Uncle Sam's black out on news that may have value for our enemies is going to begin—or has begun—right at our doors. All draft boards have been notified not to give out information on numbers nor names in contingents sent to training centers, and all things of that kind. While it may be possible, and in fact is quite probable, the enemy knows all about it that he wants to know the Selective Service board is acting on the theory that none of this information is going to be volunteered.

In the long run the most serious thing we may have to dread in the United States is the home front. How much punishment will the folks at home take is the big question mark among those who foresee possibilities of a long war and a hard war. What, for instance,

will the folks stand, after Japan shall have been disposed of we'll say in 1943, if the war lasts another 10 years, and unhappiness, misery and death pile up? How much of this will you stand for the sake of what we call the American way of life, for the sake of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness—not for this generation, understand, but for another generation?

In the same mood of thought, this war may use up (on both sides) all that can be borrowed, begged or taken in men and money. And from this year may ensue (as has ensued from every big war yet) some new types of epidemics, deaths in ways of which we have never yet heard. These kind of things hit the home front because the battle line is being protected and the home front must do the best that it can with what limited facilities may be left. Nor is this pessimistic. It is pointing to what war is. Make up your mind that way. It is the probable. If the improbable happens and we get out of the war soon so much the better. In other words, it was the Black Death which ended a hundred years of war in the Dark Ages, it was a combination of smallpox, yellow fever, dysentery and diarrhoea which took the greatest toll during our own Civil War, and it was influenza in 1918 and 1919. We must make up our minds to stand much, and stand steadfast at it in order for a new order of life to be guaranteed for all the peoples of the next generation.

While the number of bootleggers in the State of Texas must not be within one-hundredth of the number which were in the country during the latter part of the federal dry era, there are still a few who are risking collision with the law. High liquor taxes probably will increase this number during the next twelve months. Factually, the Texas Liquor Control board reports seizure and destruction of nineteen stills, 3050 gallons of mash and thirty-one gallons of moonshine liquor in the month of November. Thirty-one were arrested in these connections and six vehicles of one kind and another confiscated. As long as there is money to be made there are men who will try to make it, however long the chance they take. With few exceptions all of the arrests and confiscations made were east of the Trinity river. If there are any bootleggers west of the vicinity of Fort Worth they escaped detection during the month of November.

Tires and tubes are so valuable now they are not replaceable. Insurance companies which have made pledges under theft insurance policies to replace tires and tubes have found themselves up against the inevitable—just none to buy at any price. All policies like this are likely to be cancelled. A fair way to carry your own insurance would be to take the numbers of your tires and put them away so that when thieves get yours you can give your officer a clue to work on. Sheriffs offices have had a hard time trying to recover tires for owners who couldn't give any identifying marks of any kinds. Just a telephone call saying "Sheriff, somebody has stole my tire" is a mighty slight clue with millions like them all over the country. If you could take down your numbers and get the station that serves you to do the same it might be helpful.

Several newspapers over the area are not printing papers this week or if they are, are printing abbreviated editions while some or all of the force are taking brief vacations. The Foard County News, for instance, will be missing on exchange desks this week-end. It used to be almost the rule instead of the exception, and even daily newspapers followed a rule not to print a newspaper on Christmas day.

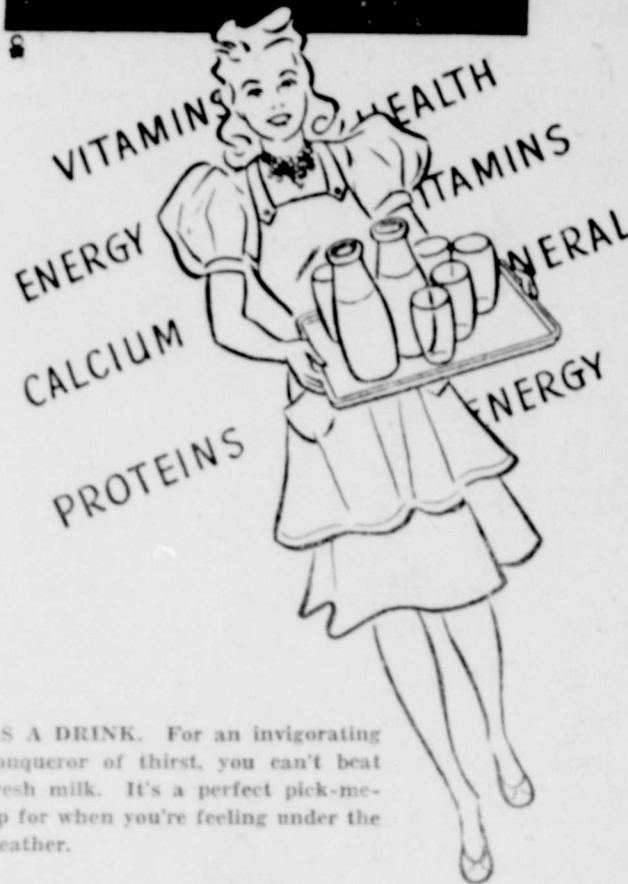

Wet Year Does Not Mean No More Drouths

Periods Of Heavy Rainfall Usually Eight To Nine Years Apart

One of the wettest years on record has been experienced in the Floyd County Soil Conservation district. The total precipitation for 1941 was 43.6 inches, but this does not mean that the danger of drouth has been eliminated. W. H. Nelson, chairman of the Floyd County Soil Conservation district, says, "long-range records show that an unusually wet year is often followed by a very dry year. Only in two or three instances during the last 50 years has a very wet year been followed by a year of more than normal rainfall. Records from several points in the Southern Great Plains show that periods of unusually heavy rainfall are from eight to nine years apart." Conservation-minded farmers can avoid the consequences of a dry year, the chairman continues. "An occasional wet year like 1941 is just as natural on the Plains as a long dry period," Nelson believes. "Most any farmer can benefit from favorable conditions, but the really successful farmer must be able to cope with all conditions as they come. He can hope to do this only when soil and water conservation practices have become the every-day farming habit."

"There is no physical excuse for drouth storms, regardless of whether it is wet or dry. Farmers who have battled the dust during the long drought know this now. One of the farmer's greatest assets is the knowledge of how to use conservation practices to protect his land against damage by both wind and water erosion. The valuable experience gained in the past must not be forgotten just because we have had one of those occasional wet years," Nelson declares. "More and more farmers of the Floyd County Soil Conservation District are coming to this realization. It is the opinion of Mr. Nelson. He points out that 136 farmers now are operating with the district in carrying out complete soil and water conservation programs on every acre of their land. "These farmers are placing themselves in a position to give the fullest cooperation to the nation in the vast food production needs for the war and to profit financially, and at the same time are protecting the productivity of their soil by checking erosion," Mr. Nelson points out.

Autoists Told How To Save Their Tires

The rationing order of tires, issued by the OPM, makes it apparent that the war may make some passenger vehicle tires virtually impossible to obtain.

Accordingly the order has slowed down the 3,000 Floyd county motorists on curbs and made their automobile stops and starts a bit more slow as well.

Following the drastic announcement of rationing comes a set of rules from OPM dealing with conserving tires now in use. It suggests:

Cut out high speeds. Inflate tires often to proper pressures. Don't stop short or make jackrabbit starts. Avoid striking curbs, road holes and rocks. Check wheel alignment twice a year. Change wheel positions every 5,000 miles. Repair all cuts, leaks and breaks promptly. Don't speed around curves.

Cut Out Pleasure Trips
In addition, government experts asked owners not to use their cars unless necessary. Cut out pleasure trips by auto, they advised, and utilize the public transportation systems whenever possible.

"Get together with your neighbors," it was suggested, "and work out a co-operative system for traveling to and from the office, the store, etc. It is wasteful to use several cars when one will do."

"Carry home small packages instead of asking the merchant to deliver them."

After January 4, tire sales will be limited to individuals and agencies requiring them for the maintenance of industrial efficiency and civilian health. The OPM has announced, and local boards set up by the Civilian Defense Council will determine who falls in this class.

Dealers are not optimistic regarding the number of tires to be distributed to the average user under the rationing plan.

They pointed out that about 30 per cent of the crude rubber for the United States comes from areas already controlled by or under invasion by the Japanese and another 43 per cent from adjacent Dutch and British islands.

While our stockpile is large, they said, we will have to reduce consumption of crude rubber by nearly 80 per cent if a safe margin is to be maintained.

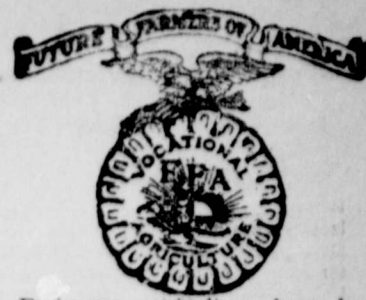
