Less Than Half The Voters Here Took The Trouble To Vote Tuesday

Less than half the voters of Loraine took the trouble to go to the polls in the general election Tuesday. Only 243 votes were cast.

The precinct voted Democratic by an overwhelming majority and voted favorably on three of the 9 constitutional amendments. For Governor Daniel not 234 and Mayor 3; U. S. Senator Yarborough 228 and Whittenburg 8. Amendments Nos. 3, 4 and 8 were favored, the others rejected. The vote: No. 1 40 for 130 against; No. 2 49 for 121 against; No. 3 115 for 53 against; No. 4 90 for 85 against; No. 5 53 for 111 against; No. 6 71 for 102 against; No. 7 79 for 92 against; No. 8 115 for 70 against; No. 9 67 for 98 against.

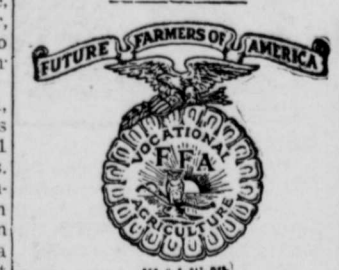

In 1937, 21 percent of the nation's farmers produced 33 percent of all farm products and half of the farmers produced 90 percent. Thus, 50 percent of U. S. farmers produced only 10 percent of the total farm production.

Unit labor cost rose 33 percent between 1917 and 1937. Prices rose 32 percent during the same period.
