

Republicans to Make Vigorous Drive in South Leaders Increase Margin of Victory in Primary

New Compilation Of Votes Fails To Alter Leadership

Moody Boosts Majority
Over Other Contestants;
No Run-off Needed In
Congressional Race.

TOTAL WILL STAY WITHIN 700,000

Mayfield Increases Lead
Over Connally And Pro-
nouncements Forecast Close
Second Primary.

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, July 31.—Latest tabulation of returns from Saturday's primary by the Texas Election Bureau shows little change in the state races. The leaders maintained their margins by approximately the same ratio, when the first votes were tabulated Saturday night, and, with the exception of one or two congressional races, the candidates no longer were in doubt of the ultimate result.

Indications were the total vote would not exceed the 700,000 figure set by observers before the primary. Run-off campaigns were certain in races for the senate and lieutenant-governor. The only congressional race which produced a run-off was in the 17th district, where Oscar Calloway and T. P. Perkins still were running a neck-and-neck race for the runner-up position to Col. R. Q. Lee, Calloway at last reports had a narrow lead over Perkins.

Governor Dan Moody on latest returns had amassed a total of 288,796 votes, increasing his majority slightly over his three opponents.

The day's tabulations saw Senator Earle B. Mayfield, leader in the

Sponge Is Again Used In Gotham

Liquor Conspiracy Indict-
ments Returned Against
Others In Connection
With Clean Up Drive.

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, July 31.—The prohibition drive to sponge up the night clubs of New York continued today.

The Federal Grand Jury which indicted 107 persons yesterday for conspiracy to violate the liquor laws in 18 night clubs returned eight more indictments today, which named 31 additional defendants for liquor conspiracies in eight other night clubs.

While the grand jury was handing down its new batch of indictments Deputy Marshals visited six of the places named in yesterday's indictments and attached prohibition padlocks to the barroom doors.

In these clubs, court orders were served on the proprietors restraining them or any of their employees from serving liquor under penalty of contempt of court proceedings. The evidence on which the indictments were based was gathered by four prohibition operatives from Washington, who disguised as wealthy and carefree men of leisure, took an active and expensive part in the career of the city's night life circles for more than four months. They patronized the night clubs in evening attire.

Their presence in New York was not even known at the office of the prohibition administrator here and they acted under direct orders from Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt, Deputy United States Attorney General.

SCARFACE IMPLICATED Police Probe Of Brooklyn Slaying Started

NEW YORK, July 31.—Police questioned the young son of a former mayor of Miami, Fla., today, in an effort to connect the gunmen of Scarface Al Capone, Chicago, racketeer, with the slaying of Frankie Yale, one time enemy of Capone who was "put on the spot" in Brooklyn on July 1.

After a long conference between District Attorney David of Brooklyn, police inspectors in charge of the detective forces of Brooklyn and Manhattan, Chief of Police Reeve of Miami, and Parker A. Henderson, Jr., whose father now dead, was once a Miami mayor, police announced they had definite information the gun which killed Yale came from the Capone arsenal.

Cotton Confab To Be Held Today By Industry Leaders

One Hundred Of State Cot-
ton Men Will Gather At
Dallas For Meeting Car-
rying Out Plan.

DALLAS, July 31.—One of a series of meetings sponsored by the southwest cotton council will be held here tomorrow night, when about 100 Texas agricultural, financial and industrial leaders interested in stabilization of the price of cotton will gather at a banquet.

Governor Dan Moody, honorary president of the council, Clarence Owsley, former lieutenant governor, W. W. Davidson, Justice J. W. Pittenger and Col. C. S. E. Holland of Houston, officers of the council, will take part in the informal meeting.

Among those from out of the state expected to attend are S. Ochsenschlager of New Orleans, president of the Lane Cotton mill, and Col. J. O. Thompson, Alabama capitalist.

Details of procedure for the council will not be discussed. Those attending the conference, however, will keep in mind the ultimate purpose of the council which is to unify and centralize the thoughts and activities of the agricultural, financial and industrial south toward one end, that of stabilizing the price of cotton and discouraging violent fluctuations in the market.

FURLOUGHS GRANTED Thirty Days Of Leave Given 3 Convicts

AUSTIN, July 31.—Thirty day furloughs were granted Tuesday by Gov. Moody to three state prisoners. One was W. J. Glasscock, sentenced from 5 to 10 years from Wichita county on a murder charge. The furlough stipulated that Glasscock must be accompanied by a guard and must not leave Hunt county, in which he is to visit his seriously ill mother at Caddo Mills.

Furloughs also were granted two liquor case convicts, Cleveland Carter, one year, Smith county, and Scott Mitchell, one year, Mitchell county, so they can visit their wives, both reported to be ill.

COOLIDGE'S PART His "Bit" Will Be To Keep Affairs Straight

SUPERIOR, WIS., July 31.—President Coolidge's chief part in Secretary Hoover's campaign for the Presidency will be to continue to so conduct public affairs as to move the electorate to return the Republican party to power.

Apart from this Mr. Coolidge has agreed to undertake no special activities in the course of the campaign. The contributions to Mr. Hoover's campaign, the chief executive feels, antedate the commerce secretary's nomination as Republican Standard bearer, inasmuch as ever since he was sworn in as president of the United States on Aug. 2, 1923, Mr. Coolidge has always striven to give the country a government which embodied of the voter's satisfaction and loyalty.

WAY SEEMS CLEAR FOR ULTIMATE PACT

Questions That Were Stum-
bling Block At Geneva
Confab Bob Up Again In
Newest Treaties.

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 31.—The Franco-British compromise formula proposing a solution of the naval disarmament deadlock in which the preliminary disarmament conference of Geneva is embodied probably will prove acceptable to the United States as a member of that conference.

In advance of a study of the forthcoming British communication on the subject, Government spokesmen appeared today to see no objection to the plan and they anticipated it would result in the re-opening of the Geneva Preliminary Conference, probably in the fall.

The terms of the Franco-British understanding are believed to agree with the French theory that an all-embracing naval tonnage total be assigned to each power under the projected universal disarmament, or rather limitation of armament, treaty, for which the League of Nations hopes to pave the way through the deliberations of the preliminary conference. France is willing it is understood, that a specific construction program for each category of ships within the limits of the total or global tonnage allotment shall be laid down by treaty. The subject of the white matter, it is believed here, is that at last France and Great Britain appear to have arrived at an solution of the submarine problem which prevented extension of the Washington five-power naval reduction treaty to other than capital ships and aircraft carriers as far as tonnage limitation was concerned. It was French rejection of any limitation on submarine construction that led the British then to decline to accede to any limitation on anti-submarine craft, such as cruisers, destroyers and smaller vessels.

Size Of Cruisers Is Important Item

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, July 31.—Questions on which the United States and Great Britain did not agree at the three-power naval conference at Geneva appear to be involved in the naval compromise agreement which has been reached between France and Great Britain.

The British conception of the size of cruisers is understood to be an important part of the agreement. The size of guns is left out although this question appears conditioned by the size of these cruisers.

HOOVER A FISHERMAN Catches Nearly Dozen Trout On Trip

BROWN'S CAMP, NEAR HORN-
BROOK, CAL., July 31.—Herbert Hoover demonstrated his skill as an angler today by catching nearly a dozen rainbow trout in Beaver Creek.

Accompanied by Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, president of Stanford University, and another friend, the president's presidential automobile left his cottage here shortly after dawn and motored nearly ten miles to a point where the highway ended. The party fished in the creek there until saddle horses could be obtained from a nearby ranch. The mountain trail then led through trees and underbrush for 10 miles to what proved to be good fishing grounds.

LUBBOCK YOUTH HEADS CONFAB

COLLEGE STATION, July 31.—The opening session of the Boys' Congress, made up of representatives of the United Club Boys of Texas, was held today in connection with the annual Farmers' Short Course.

Organized along the lines of the state legislature, the Congress has a senate and a house of representatives. Twenty-one senators and 38 representatives attended the first session of the congress, which will consider boys' club work problems. Each senator represented a separate county while representatives were elected on a basis of one for each 25 club boys attaining certain standards.

Hearing Held For Youth Who Killed General Obregon

Toral Admits On Stand He
Was Influenced In Deed
By Nun Who Is Charged
In Slaying.

MEXICO CITY, July 31.—Jose De Leon Toral, assassin of President-elect Alvaro Obregon, admitted in testimony before a criminal court today that the nun Conception "la Chica" influenced him in his deed.

His hearing before a court today marked the first step in the legal procedure which is aimed at trial and punishment for the assassination of the president-elect. It took place in San Angel, where the crime was committed. The accused was placed on the stand by a lawyer to defend him. He answered no, and the court made the customary offer of an attorney which Toral refused. The court, nevertheless, appointed two lawyers to defend him.

Watkins, Business Expert, Outlines Advancement Program For Lubbock

Importance Of City Planning Scheme, Airport, Publicity
Campaign And Good Roads Stressed In Speech By
Former General Motors Promotion Manager

"Would you be surprised if I told you that in my opinion one of the biggest things that Lubbock can do is to spend some fifteen to twenty thousand dollars to employ an engineer to come here to lay out the city and to plan your growth," Charles E. Heavy Jail Terms Dealt To Scores Of Mill Strikers

Sentence Range From Two
Months For Minor Offend-
ers To Half Year For
Ringleaders In Riot.

NEW BEDFORD QUIET AFTER MONDAY ROW

Three Women Leaders Are
Sentenced To Three
Months Each In House
Of Correction.

(By Associated Press)
NEW BEDFORD, MASS., July 31.—The District Court today slowly ground out its great grist of textile strikes riot cases as an aftermath of the disturbances late yesterday and last night about the mills and the Central Police Station. The day passed without further demonstrations.

All the pickets who were arrested yesterday in connection with the mass picketing of the mills were charged in court with rioting. Judge Frank A. Miller, who heard the cases, was confronted with benches of 20 to 30 persons, who were taken from the police station to the court house in relays. The majority were found guilty and given sentences to the house of correction ranging from two months for the minor offenders to six months for the leaders of the demonstration.

The cases were appealed and the defendants were held in bonds ranging from \$50 to \$1,500 for the appearance in the Superior Court. "Six months" sentences were meted out to Fred E. Beal, of Lawrence, Joseph Cabral of New Bedford and Jack Rubenstein, of New York, leaders of the Textile Mill Committee, the local radical section of the strikers. Three women leaders of this section, Marion Botello, Marie Sylvia and Ellen Dawson, were given three month sentences.

BRENNAN IMPROVED

However, Condition Still Is
Regarded Serious

CHICAGO, July 31.—Condition of George F. Brennan, Democratic national committeeman from Illinois, although described as "still very serious," was reported improved today. The Bulletin issued this afternoon said Mr. Brennan was "resting easily."

Dr. C. R. G. Forrester, one of the staff of attending physicians, said his patient had a "fighting chance" to pull through. Yesterday the veteran Democratic leader underwent an operation for septic poisoning resulting from an infected tooth. Today his condition began to improve and hope was entertained that he would recover.

BIG POSTAL DEFICIT

Shortage Of \$100,000,000
Forecast

WASHINGTON, July 31.—Postmaster General New today forecast a deficit of more than \$100,000,000 for the post office department in the fiscal year 1929 based on estimates of pay increases totaling \$75,000,000, a loss of revenue through lowered rates of \$16,000,000 and increased pay to railroads of \$13,000,000.

Pointing to the 1928 deficit of about \$32,000,000, Mr. New said he had hoped the department would break even this year, but added there is "No such thing as running with regard to balance while one body fixes your rate of receipts and another fixes the rates of expenditure."

MAKES SURVEY OF PROBABLE STRENGTH

NEW YORK, July 31.—The Republican party will wage a vigorous fight for the Democratic "Solid South" electoral votes, Senator George H. Moses of New Hampshire said today, reversing his recent stand that the party would be unwise to campaign there.

Hundreds of encouraging letters from the South has now convinced him, the Republican eastern campaign manager said, that Hoover had a splendid chance of victory in the Southern states. "My correspondents tell me," he asserted, "that I am crazy if I think Hoover will not get the electoral votes of the South. 'Tis in a highly chastened mood as a result of those letters."

The New England senator, who visited New Jersey yesterday, said he found "some trouble" there, but he declared he was optimistic.

Minnesota and Illinois were said, he said, adding that Chicago presented the only problem to Republican leaders in the latter state, although he said he had been variously observed to wish Wisconsin and Minnesota. The senator said nothing about the party's chances in the LaFollette state.

Obey Town Order

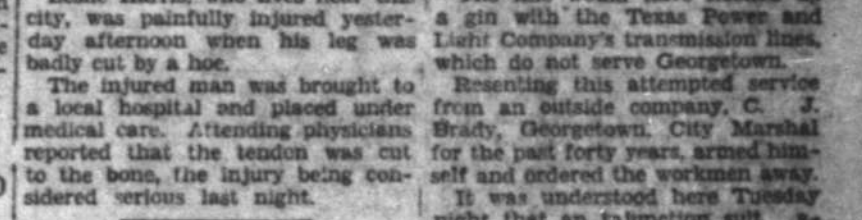

AUSTIN, TEX., July 31.—Like a scene from a western melodrama, with the participants gathered at dawn in a corn field without neckties and socks, forty workmen of the Texas Construction Company were routed Tuesday by an Iowa City Marshall and a night watchman and prevented from strutting a power line across the I. O. N. Railroad right of way and a negro's corn field.

The line would have hooked up a gin with the Texas Power and Light Company's transmission lines, which do not serve Georgetown. Resenting this attempted service from an outside company, C. J. Brady, Georgetown City Marshall for the past forty years, armed himself and ordered the workmen away.

It was understood here Tuesday night that an injunction suit against the City of Georgetown, is being considered by H. G. Doring, owner of the Georgetown Oil and others at Bear Creek and Wallburg. Doring claims to have been able to get only part time power service in violation of his operating convenience from the Georgetown mu-

So far as is known, political history of America has never offered before such a fine example of the equality of the sexes and the equality of wife and husband before the law.

They Don't Really Compete.
Judge H. F. Atkinson is circuit court judge. Judge Edith presides over the juvenile court. She was appointed in the first place, to fill the unexpired term of her predecessor. In 1924 she was elected and this year she led in the primaries, which shows her popularity.

Over 2000 children, many of them delinquents, have had their lives straightened out by this competent, sympathetic woman. These two judges, husband and wife, maintain that men and women in the same profession have a bigger chance at married happiness than the average couple with different lines of work.

Unfavorable Cotton Conditions International
(By Associated Press)
BOSTON, July 31.—Present unfavorable conditions in the cotton industry are international in scope and not peculiar to New England or the United States in general, A. S. Pearce, secretary of the International Federation of Master Cotton Spinners said today in an address before the directors of the National Association of Cotton Manufacturers.

He said that conditions in New England were similar to those in Lancashire, England, which he described as "The Worst of All." These conditions he said were due to competition of the far east where mills were being operated 20 hours a day and where 6,225,000 new spindles had been added to mills in China, Japan and India during the last 15 years.
After describing the technical equipment of the Lancashire Mills and their financial position Mr. Pearce expressed the opinion that sounder conditions could be brought about through amalgamation after writing off the major portion of the mill debts.

Roads in Coleman County Improved

First Stretch Of Highway Included In Maintenance Program Is Given Topping Treatment.

English Barrister Defeats Hahn Badly In 800 Meter Race; American Woman Wins In 100-Meter Race.

(By Associated Press.)

OLYMPIC STADIUM, AMSTERDAM, July 31.—Douglas G. A. Lowe, young British barrister, retained the Olympic 800 meter crown this afternoon by outclassing a great field, including the American favorite, Lloyd Hahn, and smashing the Olympic record with the most spectacular performance of the third day of the track and field championships.

What was expected to be the most exciting middle-distance struggle in Olympic history with world's champions and record holders all assembled turned out to be a rout. Lowe, came from behind in the last 100 meters to beat his nearest rival, Erik Bylund of Sweden, by ten yards, while Hahn after leading almost from the start staggered home fifth, badly whipped.

Hahn was passed by Herman Engelhard of Germany and Phil Edwards of Canada while the two remaining Americans, Earl Fuller and Ray Watson, were eighth and ninth respectively.

Lowe not only dealt another blow to the apparently groggy American runners but his time, 1 minute 51 4-5 seconds, beat by 1-10 second the former Olympic mark set by Ted Meredith in 1912.

In a day marked altogether by the shattering of three world's record and two Olympic standards, Yankee fortunes again ebbed and flowed. Hahn's defeat was off-set by a triumph by Ed Hamm in the running broad jump and victory for little Miss Elizabeth Robinson in the women's 100 meter finals in the women's 100 meter finals in the world's record time of 12 1-5 seconds.

Hamm's winning leap of 25 feet 4 3-4 inches displaced the Olympic mark set in 1912 by the American, A. L. Guterson, and gave the Georgia Tech star possession of all the jumping honors worth mentioning.

He out-leaped S. P. Casor, negro rival from Haiti, and his own countryman, Al Bates, who finished third, while the former champion, Dehart Hubbard, failed to reach the finals.

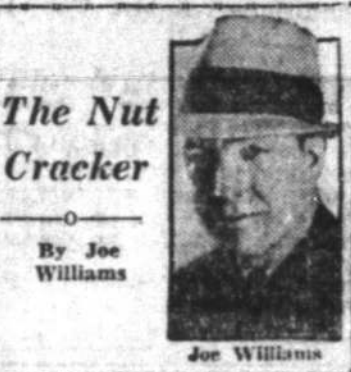

Gene Tunney Retires as World Heavyweight Champion

Titlist Fought Against Heaney For Last Battle

Tunney Departs From Ring Just As Dramatically As He Made Entry 10 Years Ago.

By EDWARD J. NEIL.
(Associated Press Sports Writer)
NEW YORK, July 31. (AP)—As dramatically as he entered the boxing ring ten years ago, Gene Tunney, heavyweight champion, stepped from his throne today and back into private life—flushed with the ring forever.

And surroundings that lent every aid to his desire to retire "as gracefully as possible" from the game that has made him an international figure, and a millionaire, since that desperate fight ten years ago when he fought a tight and hard battle with the big man, with a husky note in his voice, told fifty newspapermen and friends that he was through.

Confirms Rumors.
For days rumors had circulated that Tunney's final ring engagement took place in Yankee Stadium last Thursday night when "Tom Heaney" best of the present crop of challengers, succumbed to the champion's merciless power and ring mastery in eleven rounds. But Gene refused to confirm these stories until he stood today at the side of William Muldoon, the 32-year-old New York state boxing commissioner and "grand old man of sport," to talk to those who had gathered in the ancient harbor.

Then, standing before the luncheon table decked with flowers in one of the finest of the city's hotels, Gene looked down on the faces of newspapermen and intimate friends who had followed his career from the day he entered the professional ranks, fresh from service overseas in the marine corps, a moderate sized youth unable to find a job anywhere else. In his ears were ringing the words the snow-haired commissioner, Muldoon, erect and solid for all his 32 years, had just uttered, in awarding the heavyweight title to Gene Tunney, champion of champions.

Retires With Reluctance.
Gene seemed to fight for control of his voice and features as he said in a low voice, hardly heard through the room, "this is the greatest moment of my life greater than the night I won the heavyweight championship at Philadelphia two years ago. I am leaving from that honor with reluctance."

Choosing his words with precision, the first heavyweight champion to retire since Jim Jeffries, finally tried to put the ring behind him, went on to explain he wished to leave no impression there was anything wrong in the situation or that he felt he was bigger than the game itself. As he talked his assurance came back to him and he spoke clearly and firmly.

"I have won the highest prize in boxing," he said, "I have defended it against the man from whom I won it and then against the best opponent a long series of eliminations could provide. I feel now that I am entitled to give it up in the most graceful manner possible."
Leaves at Pinnacle.
"Every man owes something to his profession and I am not innumerable to the duties I owe boxing. But I have been ten years now in the boxing game, and I feel that ten years in such a violent sport is sufficient. A man must be young to stand it, while I feel that I still am young. I wish to step out while I still am at the pinnacle."

Tunney then outlined a plan he had worked upon for some time with Commissioner Muldoon whereby his place can be filled through an elimination tournament. A trophy in the form of a huge foam cup will be placed in the hands of a committee of trustees, headed by Commissioner Muldoon and Tex Rickard, to be known as the "Muldoon-Tunney trophy." The cup will remain in the hands of the committee of 26 but on it will be inscribed the names of each successor to Gene's crown, when the public recognizes them as such.

Fulfills Obligation.
In a way, Gene said, the award of this trophy would fulfill the contractual obligation he owes Tex Rickard to fight for him again in 1930. Under the agreement-binding promoter and boxer Gene already has fought Heaney. Rickard accepted the cup as completion of their mutual obligations. After pointing out what boxing had meant to him, detailing the friendships he had made, and explaining the attractiveness of the game as a sport, Gene read a prepared statement in which he set forth some of his reasons for retirement, but failed to mention definite plans for the future.

Tunney will leave the ring a millionaire almost twice over through earnings that have yielded mightily to profitable investments. As the challenger for Jack Dempsey's crown in 1926 Gene drew \$250,000 as his share of the \$1,000,000 that over 100,000 of the fight faithful paid to see the king of sluggers decked. When Manassa Jack came back to try again at Chicago, the gate reached \$2,500,000, a record that probably will last for all time. Of that awesome sum, Tunney received \$991,000. Motion picture rights, newspaper work, and advertisements have brought the champion over \$500,000.

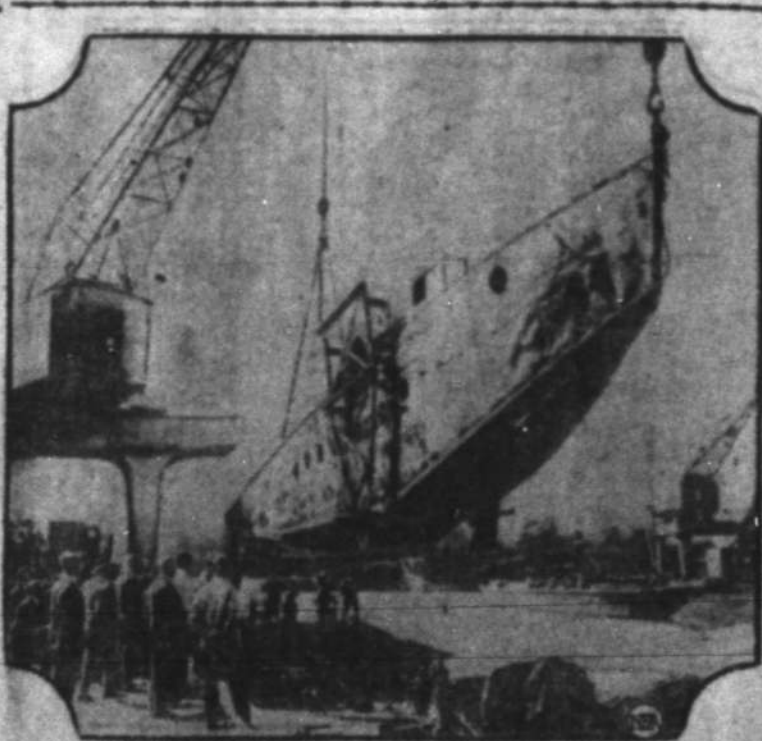

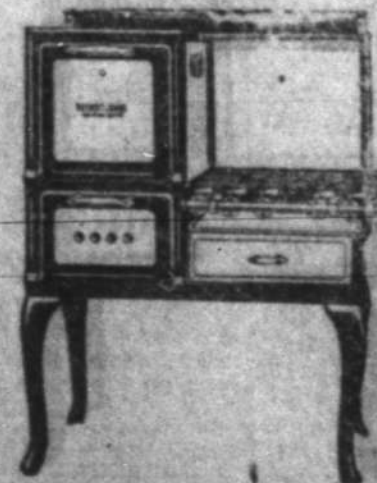

LAW OF POVERTY.

A few days ago one of the best known and usually most interesting political correspondents and commentators in "free, enlightened, liberty-loving America," expressed the opinion that the only definite development in the campaign to elect a citizen to its highest office, thus far, had to do with the rival parties' organizations and projected expenditures of great sums—"ample funds"—for the purpose of bringing out the vote on November 6.

The method consists, in the main, of hiring workers with automobiles, who call on indifferent voters at their homes, carry them to the polls and return them. The workers thus employed, if shrewdly chosen, are as a rule men with large family connections, or leaders in fraternal associations, or otherwise adapted to maximum effectiveness. It is not too much to estimate that the employment of five workers by each of the two parties, at, say, \$20 a day, in every doubtful precinct in the county might increase the total vote by one-third over the total cast in 1924.

And also increase the campaign expenditures by several million dollars. But to what end—whether good, bad or inconsequential?

Must this be the means and the way of assuring that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth? Is this the way the great parties' leaders, desiring to direct the national administration, would go about disapproving the contention that neither the moron vote nor the indifferent vote should be wanted at the polls any more than the corrupt vote, and that the bringing out—or dragging in—of the first two groups is anything but a remedy for the conditions created by the infallible activities or "the gang" on election day? Is this the political chiefs' answer to such warnings as Dr. William B. Munro, professor of municipal government at Harvard university, has uttered on that score?

It is a situation and a practice alike shameful enough for a nation created and reared as the United States was created and reared—in the cause of establishing and maintaining for men their God-given unalienable right of liberty. And for commonwealths, as for individuals—the law of liberty is not to be dissociated from the way of righteousness.

Considering the context, there is nothing far-fetched about applying the Apostle's words on "the perfect law of liberty" to the commonplace political concerns of a nation and its every subdivision. And that community—that body politic—which looketh into this law, and continueth therein as a doer of the work, shall be lessened its deed.

It was in a day and for an American generation that needed no such "practical" political schemes as that which Mark Sullivan describes as the one definite development of the 1928 presidential campaign, that William G. Simms wrote these deathless words on the interrelation of liberty and righteousness:

"The only rational liberty is that which is born of subjection, reared in the fear of God and love of man, and made courageous in the defense of a trust and the prosecution of a duty."

The coupling of "liberty" and "trust" and "duty" casts a white light on the grave problem created by the common public indifference to the constituting and the conduct of government. Neither fear of God nor love of man, neither gratitude for the prize of independence and what it cost, nor appreciation of the obligations it imposes upon every citizen, is to be seen in a situation of cajoling or threatening or "inducing" an American to have some practical regard for the character and abilities of those who seek the offices wherein his nation's destinies are directed.

"Some have said that it is not the business of private men to meddle with government—a bold and dishonest saying, which is fit to come from no mouth but that of a tyrant or a slave," a political philosopher wrote many centuries ago. "To say that private men have nothing to do with government is to say that private men have nothing to do with their own happiness or misery that people ought not to concern themselves whether they may be naked or clothed, fed or starved, deceived or instructed, protected

or destroyed."

In its broader aspects that counsel is more applicable to the duty and conduct the vital interests and the rights of citizens—an dot their children—in a representative democracy than to the people of any other land. They should be, they must be, less concerned with the exaltation than with the protection of their nation, to which righteousness—integrity, strength of character, vision—in their governmental offices is essential.

The performance of civic duty in the creation and maintenance of upright government is commanded by the perfect law of liberty.

EXPERTS.

Nothing is to be gained, says an article in the Progressive Farmer, by attempting to bring a milk plant into a community that is not ready for it. Pointing out that 2,000 cows averaging two gallons of milk a day should be the minimum supply, the article emphasizes the need for abundant water supply on farms, and also for good roads within a radius of at least 15 miles of the town where the plant is situated. It reminds milk-plant enthusiasts that no permanently successful livestock development ever has been successful in a tick-infested section, and that the first step in any such program should be the eradication of the cattle tick. Yet in south Texas, if all the communities now supporting successful creameries had waited for the 2,000-cow minimum, many would not have started to this day. It is true that a large supply of milk is necessary for the most profitable operation; but starting on a smaller scale—even if it be found to close for part of the season—is not without its advantages. One is that it gives dairy farmers an opportunity to grow into the business, and also to grade up and increase the size of the herds with the help of experience and without the need of incurring large debts. Going in debt to buy high-priced dairy cattle in order to support a creamery, is not the wisest way of beginning.

Good roads and eradication of ticks are essential; but some of the need for abundant water to cool milk in home dairies has been overcome in some parts of Texas, at least, by wide distribution of cheap electric power and up-to-date refrigeration methods. The most important requisite for success in supporting a milk plant, after all, is the determining of a community to stick to the job until it is done. Enthusiasm, tenacity and industry will overcome most of the handicaps. And every Texas town where dairying has been increased during the past five years will testify that it also has increased the community's general prosperity.

FALSE AUTO LICENSE.

Use of false license plates on motor vehicles in giving the police authorities in San Antonio, as elsewhere, considerable trouble. In answer to Col. Martin L. Crummins' protest that fully 500 cars thus misnumbered are operated on the streets and highways, an official estimate gives the offenders as 200—which is bad enough.

As any intelligent person knows, the law requires that the plate obtained for a licensed car be displayed throughout the year on that vehicle, and on no other. The data required of the owner and filed in the tax-collector's office are all necessary to a proper check on the car.

Various motives lead to violation of this regulation. Some persons evade paying license fees by using the same set of plates on two or more automobiles. This year, for the first time, plates are designated for front and rear, which is intended to discourage that practice. Other owners escape a portion of the annual fee by transferring a number from a light to a heavy car. A few fly-by-night dealers in second-hand vehicles are perhaps the worst offenders in this respect.

When an automobile is used in an unlawful act—as in a robbery or the transportation of intoxicating liquor—it almost certainly bears a false number. As a result, the eye-witness who gets that number probably accomplishes nothing but to send the officers on the wrong trail. Giving a fake address upon registration is another favorite device of the habitual lawbreaker.

Because of those circumstances the decent citizen should be scrupulous in complying with the regulations, lest he find himself in bad company. Even the average tax-dodger would resent being classed with the bootlegger and the payroll bandit. He has no just ground for resentment, as he has not shown respect for authority or gratitude for its protection. One law-infractor too easily leads to another.

As a rule the car owner realizes that keeping its record straight is important. Accident, theft or other circumstances might arise in which this information

might be of use.

BUY HOME MADE GOODS.

Manufacturers of the United States, among the largest business men of the world, are strongly in favor of all Americans buying their goods in America.

Selfish, you say; and perhaps so. But if big business men like these manufacturers think it is good policy for the country to buy goods at home when possible, then all cities throughout the land ought to investigate the practicability of applying the same principle as near home as possible.

An article in a recent "Made in U. S. A. Bulletin," sets out that Europe can always do a fair business with the United States, for this country is a large buyer of foreign goods at all times. Even in the products that are made in this country, there is a field for creation of business by foreign producers.

PRESS COMMENT

Getting Results in Industry

Chicago Daily News, John J. Raskob, vice president of General Motors Corporation, and chairman of the Democratic National Committee, discusses in the Magazine of Business a problem foreshadowed by the founder of the science of economics, Adam Smith, and lately dramatized by Professor Ripley of Harvard.

The problem is that of reconciling the interests of hosts of scattered stockholders of corporations with those of the men in immediate control of those enterprises. Absentee ownership is an evil under all conditions. Yet a wide distribution of ownership is for some reasons highly desirable, embracing as it does the best form of industrial democracy. But how is the management of a vast corporation to be kept alert, progressive, faithful to the owners and intelligent in its treatment of labor?

Mr. Raskob is not a theorist. He treats the question in the light of his own experience, facing the problem frankly and formulating it

attention to a new "industrial set-up," which at least partially fulfills the desired solution.

It is based in the principles that the managers of an industry shall be numbered among the owners of that industry. By managers he means not alone officers and directors, but superintendents and others occupying key positions. There is, he contends, no way to prevent a lapse by such persons into self-complacency and routine methods, save that of giving them a stake in the industry, of making their income dependent, in part at least, upon their efficiency and zeal.

This arrangement has been adopted by Mr. Raskob's company in a certain form, but that form is not the only one possible. The policy he advocates admits of various applications. Stock ownership, in all probability, is the most expedient form, but bonuses, advances in salary as express considerations for conspicuous merit, promotion and honors are not to be overlooked in cases where stock ownership is not expedient.

Mr. Raskob believes in systematic and whole-hearted co-operation in industry as their indispensable condition of permanent success. The set-up which he favors is designed to protect the interests of the stockholders to insure loyal and competent management, to maintain peace between the managers and the force of employees, and to stimulate the legitimate ambition of all on behalf of the enterprise.

YOUR HEALTH

BY DR. MORRIS FISHER, Editor, Journal of the American Medical Association, and of Hygiene, The Health Magazine.

Life in the open is pleasant in the summer; it is, however, surrounded with hazards of which few people know and which are disastrous unless carefully considered.

In considering precautions for safe camping, Dr. Walter M. Dickie of the California State Board of Health points out two of the most useful tools that a camper can carry are a spade and an ax, and the spade is the more useful of the two.

A spade permits the digging of trenches and the leveling of the camp site. It is useful for burying all remains of food, empty tin cans or bottles, and body waste. It helps get rid of camp garbage which attracts flies and insects.

Burying Waste In the disposal of waste by the use of the spade, they should be buried at least 25 feet from any stream or body of water and should be buried deep enough so that they cannot be dug up by animals or gotten at by insects.

A spade is also useful in putting out permanently camp fires which may get the fire to fields and forests. If every camp fire would be buried properly under six or eight inches of dirt, vast sums of money and many lives would be saved that are lost today by forest fires.

One of the worst nuisances in any camp is the insect pest, and of all the insect pests, flies and mosquitoes are worst. The camper should protect himself against such insects. This he will do by the use of proper screening or netting and by proper sanitation of camp surroundings, particularly if he is concerned with a permanent camp.

Relieving Irritation In most of our states malaria is not frequent. No doubt, danger of the mosquito bite today is primarily the irritation and the secondary infection that sometimes follows through scratching.

The irritation is relieved by a weak solution of camphor or menthol, which physicians prescribe mixed with suitable lotions.

FRALIN DUG BUSINESS
MOVED

Only last week witnessed the last of the oldest buildings moved from the square, leaving only three wooden structures where a few weeks ago they were all of wood. Mr. Fralin is to build one of the most modern bricks in this part of the country, upon which work has already begun. But this article is interested mostly in the old building that has just been removed. The original of this building, 2520 feet long, was erected back in 1909 and was completed the first of July. It was erected by the C. B. Livestock company as a temporary restaurant to serve the crowd on the first anniversary of the city's birth on July 8. It was only a temporary affair, erected in the space of a few days, and it seemed to be the intention of the builders to tear the shack down in a few days, yet with a little remodeling the building has stood for 19 years. "And the lumber is just as good as the day the building was erected," says Mr. Fralin. That was the way the C. B. company did things in those days.

Service As School Building The restaurant did not last long as most of the trade went to the pool parlor farther down the street, and it was soon abandoned. The building remained vacant until the fall when it took on the business-like appearance of a school building while the new \$10,000 plant for the town was being erected. By the middle of October however the new building was completed and the old

restaurant was again vacant, as the happy children moved into their apartments.

First Drug Store Installed In the first part of 1910 the new drug store was installed. One glancing through the old files of the Review may see a quarter of a page ad asking the building men to "pony up" and supply a home for this enterprise, and finally after several months, the old restaurant building and school house was remodeled, an extension of some 25 feet added to the back, and the new drug store moved in. A Dr. Stoops from Iowa, along with our own Joe Parks of the Parks-Ruthford company were the first owners of the store, and it was named the Crosbyton Pharmacy. And that was a real drug store, too, with a doctor, a fountain, toilet articles, and everything that goes in the making of a real drug store. These men handled the store until 1913 when it first changed owners and became the property of W. C. Booten, of Cuero, Texas.

Under Mr. Booten the business grew and thrived. Again in 1915 the store changed hands and the time the name was also changed, it being sold to G. D. Atkinson of Childress, Texas, who changed the name of the firm to the Atkinson Drug company. He kept the firm for several years and then sold to the present owner, R. H. Fralin, who kept the store to the present time. Fralin's new building will be one of the most modern

Calling Of Large Amounts In Loans Perturbs Brokers

Wall Street Forces Call Money Rate Higher When Banks Call Large Sums In Loans.

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, July 31.—Wall Street brokers, whose combined borrowings on stock and bond collateral have averaged between four and five billion dollars this year, found themselves temporarily pinched for funds when banks and large corporations called between \$50,000,000 and \$60,000,000 in loans today and they forced the call money rate from 6 to 8 percent before their demands were satisfied.

Meanwhile, stock prices advanced sharply and then made irregular recovery as professional traders sought to make capital out of the sudden "squeeze" in money. Trading was unusually light, total sales falling below 1,500,000 shares. Call money rates invariably advanced around the end of the month as funds are withdrawn from the market for monthly settlements, dividends and interest payments. Ordinarily, the rise is a gradual one as new funds are quickly supplied by banks to replace those drawn from the market, but today the rate advanced in quick succession from 6 to 6 1/2, 7, 7 1/2 and 8 percent. Unusually sharp fluctuations in the call money market on recent settlement dates have aroused widespread concern in Wall Street, and have led to suggestions of organized efforts to control the situation.

DAILY MARKETS

NEW ORLEANS COTTON
NEW ORLEANS, July 31. (AP)—Persistent long liquidation and selling induced by favorable weather in the belt and a bearish private crop condition and yield estimate coupled with lower Liverpool cables than due were responsible for a decline of practically \$2.50 a bale in the cotton market today.

Prices were on the downgrade from start with only a 10 points rally around mid-session. In the final trading, October contracts touched 19.60. Closing at that figure or net 48 points down. The general market closed barely steady at a net decline of 44 to 49 points.

Liverpool cables were 6 to 7 points lower than due. First trades showed losses of 11 to 14 points and prices continued to decline after the start under evening up by the long interest and some trade selling induced by the comparatively dry weather man. This decline carried prices off 22 points below yesterday's close.

A private report making the condition average 70.3 and indicated yield 15,100,000 bales was construed as bearish and added to the eastness.

WALL STREET STOCKS

The United States Steel corporation, making its report public after the close of the market, earned \$4.86 a share in the first six months as against \$5.90 in the first half of 1927, but earnings in the June quarter were \$2.75 against \$2.11 in the first quarter and \$2.75 in the second quarter of 1927.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK
KANSAS CITY, July 31. (AP)—(U. S. D. A.)—A week to lower undercurrent prevailed around the 11 market circuit on most all killing classes of cattle, choice yearlings proving the exception. Fed steers scaling above 1100 lbs. and western grass steers were unevenly weak to 25c lower. A slow eastern dressed beef market was a bearish factor in the trade on grain feeds and the lack of feeder buyer competition a depressing influence on grass steers. Choice yearlings steers at Chicago scored 16.80 while strictly choice 14.60 lb. heaves landed at 16.35. Aggregate receipts were estimated at 36,100, as

compared with 25,500 a week ago, and 42,510 a year ago.

FORT WORTH LIVESTOCK
FORT WORTH, July 31. (AP)—The cattle trade here today was bare of slaughter steers. The stock, however, was strong and active, and calves were steady to strong. Other classes were unchanged. Cows sold from \$7.25 to \$8.50, yearlings \$12.50 to \$13.00 and calves up to \$12.75. Hogs were 10c to 15c higher. The top was \$11.00 with the bulk selling from \$8.60 to \$11.00. Packing sows were steady at \$8.50 to \$8.75. The sheep trade was steady. Fat wethers sold for \$8.25, fat lambs for \$12.50 and feeder lambs from \$8.00 to \$10.00.

COTTONSEED OIL
NEW YORK, July 31. (AP)—The cottonseed oil market was more active and easy today closing 12 to 20 points lower, the decline establishing new lows for the season. Prime crude nominally prime summer yellow spot 9.40; September closed 9.38; October 9.38; December 9.47; January 9.48; March 9.55.

NEW YORK, July 31. (AP)—Larger private crop figures and favorable weather reports were reflected in more active selling and a decline of about \$2.50 a bale in the cotton market today. to be found throughout the West. Old Review Building as Old As the Town.

Last month saw another of the old landmarks of the town give way before the oncoming tide of progress. The old Review building, standing just south of the present site of the plant, on South Berkshire street, was recently torn down and the lumber hauled away to go into the building of the Calvary Baptist church in the south part of the city. Dimly scrawled on the side of this old building could be seen in large white letters the sign: "The White Printing company," as a gentle reminder of the first editor that dared to "put in" his shop and walk the streets of the one horse town in search of "news" when there wasn't any. "Them was the days" when "shooting the bull" was what was expected of the country editor

and one has only to look through the columns of the Review back in 1909 and see that Mr. White was an adept in his line.

The town was only five months old when Mr. Frank E. White, then editor of the "Jones County Talk" took a liking to it and decided that it needed one of the proverbial pen-slingers in its vicinity. Accordingly, he set to work immediately and by the first of January, 1909, he moved in. The roof on his new building was only half finished, according to what can be found in the old files, but that didn't matter, for the second week in January, the first issue came off the press. It was a five column, 16 inch sheet, eight pages, just full of the town news.—Crosbyton Review.

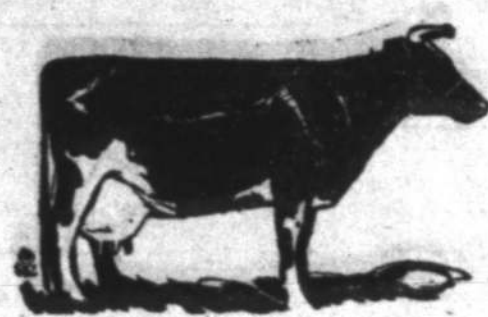
