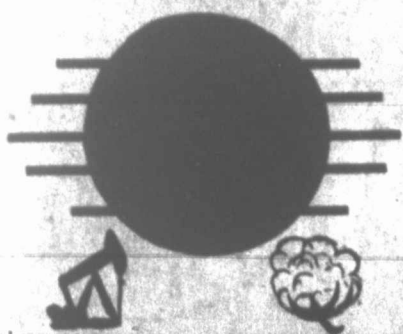

Swimming pool bid awarded

The Colorado City Council, in a called meeting Wednesday, awarded a \$177,535 contract to Aqua-Fab of Phoenix, Arizona to build a new swimming pool at Ruddick Park.

The Park Board had met earlier Wednesday to meet with the architects for the park project. When bids were originally opened, Aqua-Fab was the low bidder with a base bid of \$208,000 for renovation of the bath house and construction of a new pool. The architects negotiated the bid with the company and the Park Board agreed to recommend that the council accept the bid.

During bid negotiations, several changes were made in the plans. The wading pool for children, which had originally been planned for the north end of the pool was deleted and a separate wading pool, about 10-by-15-foot in size, will be built instead.

Aqua-Fab will use the present pool as a form for the new pool which should be completed by the first of July if not sooner, Horace Loving, architect, told the council.

Aqua-Fab's bid calls for 110 working days to complete the

Against local pair

Capital murder charges filed

A Scurry County grand jury Friday, meeting in special session, indicted Colorado City residents Dorrie Johnson Jr., 19, and Amanda Lynn Miles, 19, on capital murder charges.

Johnson and Miles were charged Wednesday with one count of capital murder and one count of aggravated robbery each in connection with the March 23 slaying of a Snyder convenience store clerk Jack Huddleston.

Both suspects were brought to Snyder Wednesday afternoon from Mitchell County Jail and are currently in the Scurry County Jail. Bond for the pair has been denied by Justice of the Peace Dan Callaway.

The two suspects and a third

individual, George Edward Miles, 30, were arrested in Colorado City Tuesday night following an armed robbery-shooting incident. The victim in that robbery, a 61-year-old convenience store owner Don Hall Burrus, was listed in fair condition at Mitchell County Hospital Friday morning. He is recovering from a stab wound to the back and two bullet wounds to the face. George Edward Miles and Johnson are charged with the Colorado City offense which occurred about 2:15 p.m. Tuesday at Burrus Grocery on Highway 80 East.

Burrus was hit, stabbed in the back and shot twice in the face

Electrical refund due

Local customers of Texas Utilities Electric Company will be receiving a credit on their May bills as part of a refund approved by the Public Utility Commission.

PUC approved the company's request to refund revenues overcollected from customers under its previous fixed charge for fuel used to generate electricity.

The company will refund a total of \$140.5 million to its customers, the amount overcollected through January 31.

"Customers will receive a

credit on their May bills," said Ben Lancaster, Colorado City manager of Texas Electric Service Company. "Residential customers will receive an average of \$24."

New, lower fixed fuel charges approved by the PUC in February and placed into effect in March. Customers are expected to save about 5 percent on their bills under the new charges. That's a total of about \$343 million annually.

The savings has been made

possible because the declining cost of natural gas has allowed the company to pursue lower-priced gas fuel. Gas is used to make slightly more than half the electricity used by customers.

TUEC provides electric service to more than 1 million customers—or about one-third the population of Texas—through its operating divisions, Dallas Power & Light Company, Texas Electric Service Company and Texas Power & Light Company.

Literary team wins district

The Colorado High School literary team won first place in University Interscholastic League competition in San Angelo April 4-5 and will now advance to regional competition April 25-26 at Odessa College.

Carl Moore, UIL literary coordinator at CHS, said the CHS team had a total of 151 points to win district, the first time ever for a CHS team. Sonora came in second with 149 points.

Teacher contract renewals OK'd

The Colorado Independent School District board of trustees Thursday night renewed teacher contracts, but took a cautious stand as far as pay raises are concerned.

Following an executive session, the board voted not to raise teacher salaries other than for state-mandated raises and to freeze salaries of other personnel.

The contract renewal was extended to 108 teachers in the school system. Newly elected board president Dr. Billy Bridgford explained that basically, the teachers will have the same salaries they had for the 1985-86 school year other than for the \$114 a month pay increase required by the state. The other school employees, such as custodians, secretaries and lunchroom workers, will have their salaries frozen for the coming school year.

In addition, the vocational teachers will have their contract days shortened by 10 days.

At the beginning of Thursday night's meeting, the board canvassed the election results from

last Saturday's school board election and swore in re-elected members Dwayne Harris and Floyd Lee Ritchey and new member Brenda Aguilon to three-year terms. Eddie Gregory, who was elected to a one-year unexpired term, was out of town and will receive the oath of office at a later date.

Outgoing board member Ronnie Aston, who was defeated in his re-election bid, was presented a plaque as was Eddie Piland, board president, who did not seek re-election.

Piland, who was in his ninth year on the board, offered a "word of appreciation to Charlie, Don and Geneva for the privilege of working with you. It's been a wonderful experience."

Piland was referring to Charlie Uselton, superintendent, Don Nimmo, assistant superintendent, and Geneva Findley, business manager.

"I appreciate the hard work you and the board members have put in," said Piland. "I

with a small caliber weapon during the course of that robbery. A pistol and a butcher knife along with part of the \$300 believed taken in the robbery has been recovered, according to Colorado City Police Chief Bobby Sparks.

Johnson and George Miles are now charged with aggravated robbery and attempted capital murder in connection with the

Colorado City crime. Johnson and Amanda Miles are charged with capital murder and aggravated robbery in connection with the Snyder slaying. The death of the 53-year-old Huddleston was the first ever recorded in Snyder in connection with a convenience store robbery.

Snyder police officers said Wednesday morning Johnson had been a possible suspect in

the Snyder case since March 24. Mitchell County Justice of the Peace Charles Ray Watlington set bond for each man at \$25,000 on the aggravated robbery charge and at \$50,000 on the attempted capital murder charge in the Colorado City case.

A \$25,000 bond was set for Miss Miles on the Snyder aggravated robbery charge.

also appreciate the voters and supporters of the school district for allowing me the privilege of serving on the board."

In the reorganization of the board, Bridgford was elected president, J. C. Britton vice president and Harris secretary.

In other business, the board approved a reciprocal agreement with City National Bank to use the school district's computer for a back-up in case of an emergency. If the school district's computer fails, the school district can use the bank's computer.

No action was taken on awarding of a bid for exterminator service for the various school

buildings. Submitting bids were Deavers Co. of Snyder, Oylor Exterminator Service of Colorado City and Davis Exterminating Service of Colorado City. The board instructed Mrs. Findley to have the bids clarified and report back at the next board meeting.

The board agreed to a 30-day trial period using Action Telecommunications Company for long distance service. Uselton said the company promises savings of 20 percent on long distance bills on all long distance charges under \$500 and 25 percent savings on all long distance charges over \$500.

possible so that a stainless steel gutter for the pool could be ordered.

A fund drive by the Park Board has helped bring in the other \$125,000 with which to match the grant.

Money with which to build the pool is coming from a \$125,000 matching grant from the Texas Park and Wildlife Commission. The other funds will be used to refurbish other parts of the park. Two water wells have already been drilled to supply water for an underground sprinkler system. New playground areas are also planned as well a hike and bike trail.

Apartment complex proposed

Calhoun Builders, Inc. of Mansfield, Louisiana has applied for federal assistance from the Farmers Home Administration to construct 32 apartments on three acres of land on Highway 208 North, east of the Colorado City Apartments.

Reimer Calhoun, Jr. in his application for federal assistance, has asked for \$900,000 from

the FHA with which to build the complex. The application states Calhoun Builders, Inc. will provide \$47,368 of the proposed funding.

The proposed complex will consist of 16 one-bedroom units and 16 two-bedroom units. The apartments are to be air conditioned and carpeted with one bath, combination living-dining

area and kitchen.

The buildings will be of rough sawn and masonry served by concrete streets and parking and will be connected to city water and sewer.

The proposed project will be located on Highway 208 North, east of the Colorado City Apartments, also owned by Calhoun.

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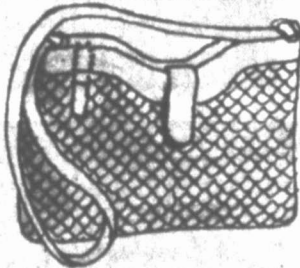

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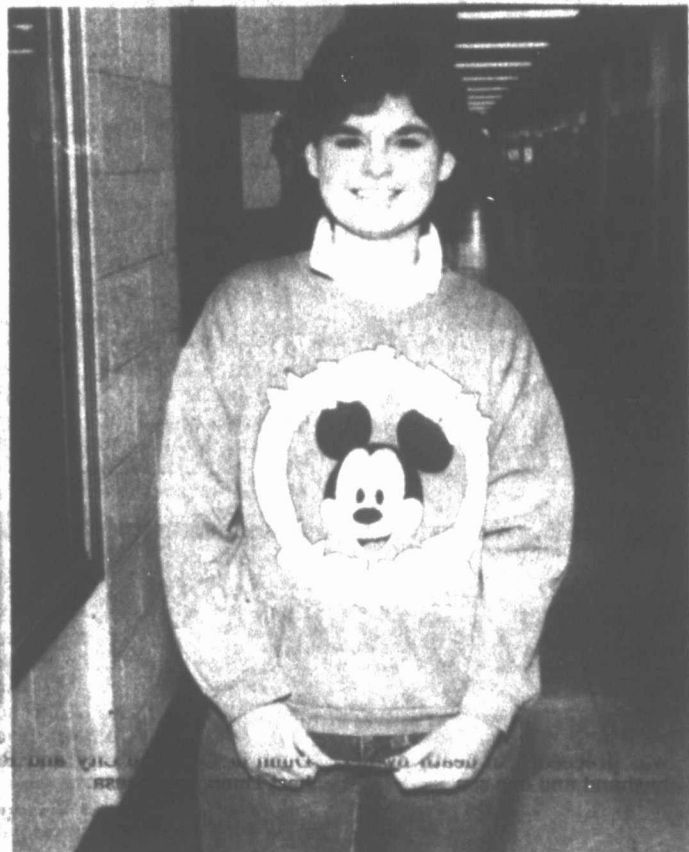

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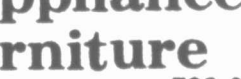

Lawn & Gardening Tips

(Q) What time of day should I water?

(A) Water when your plants are dry...morning, afternoon or night. Daytime watering may result in more loss to evaporation, but waiting until night to water may result in plant damage. Evening watering may promote turf-disease problems, but that's mainly in St. Augustine, and primarily in the fall. Mildew of flowers and shrubs may be encouraged by evening watering.

(Q) How often should I water my plants?

(A) There's no good answer to that. You don't take a drink by the clock...you drink when you're thirsty. It's the same with your plants. Too many variables can enter the picture: temperature, light, wind, rain and humidity.

Water your plants when they're dry, not before. Learn to recognize drought symptoms. Don't put any plant on a time schedule!

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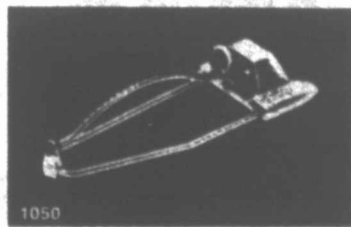

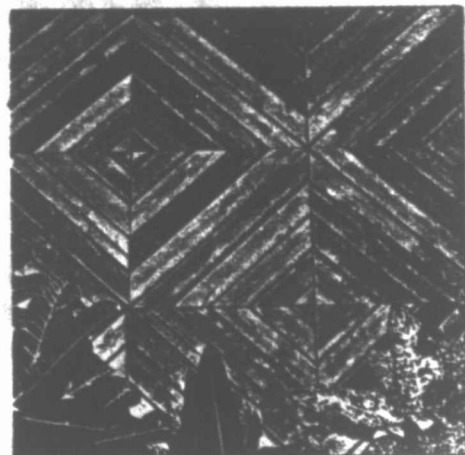
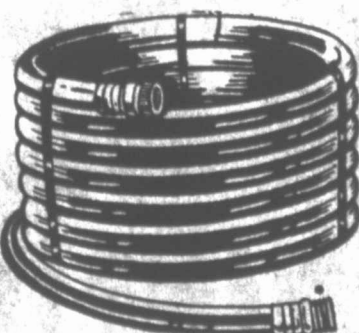
