FUNERAL SERVICES FOR PEARL ELLIS SHOENY HELD LAST SATURDAY

Seldom is it our duty to record a death which has spread so much gloom over a community as that of Mrs. Pearl Ellis Schoeny, who died at Las Vegas, New Mexico, on December 25th.

Pearl Ellis Schoeny was born in this county on June 1, 1894, and at the time of her death was 27 years, 8 months and 25 days of age. She lived here until about ten years ago when she moved to Las Vegas. A few years after leaving here she married a prominent young business man of Las Vegas, Mr. Schoeny, who she leaves with two small children to mourn her loss. The father and brother, Smith and Carl Ellis, of this county and a sister, Helen, of Las Vegas are also left to mourn her untimely departure.

A total of \$612,246.52 was paid out for grain last year. The report shows a net gain of \$25,991.30. Of this gain, \$20,332.64 was returned to the stockholders as a dividend, while the balance, \$5,658.66, will be held in reserve.

All the officers and directors were elected to serve another year. They are J. H. Norwood, President; E. W. Gray, Vice-President; F. P. Rogers, Sec'y-Treas. and the directors are J. H. Norwood, G. C. Brillhart, T. H. Blair, F. P. Rogers, T. W. Gray, P. Apple, and W. B. Dennison. Among the motions carried was one deciding that hereafter all business would be strictly cash. It was also decided to change the annual meeting from January 1 to May 1, and that the Board of Directors can, at any time they see fit, increase the capital stock from \$50,000.00 to \$100,000.00.

FATHER OF MRS. P. H. SEBASTIAN DIES IN CALIFORNIA

The following item in regard to the death of Jesse Joplin, father of Mrs. P. H. Sebastian of this city and Mrs. Fanny Long of Gray, Okla., is taken from the Santa Ana Daily Register: "Death came this morning to Anaheim, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Jesse Fay, to Jesse Joplin, brother of County Treasurer J. C. Joplin. With his passing goes a man who for half a century was a prominent figure in southeast Missouri.

Mr. Joplin was born in Bedford county, Virginia, in 1840. When 21 years of age he moved to Missouri, where he later established a home at Farmington, St. Francois county.

Soon after arriving in Missouri, the Civil War begun, and he entered into service with the famous Second Missouri cavalry, with which he fought in General Sterling Price's cavalry. He was in many hard fights, and was wounded a number of times. He was married to Mariana Crow.

Of nine children born to the union, five are living. They are Mrs. Jesse Fay of Anaheim, with whom Mr. and Mrs. Joplin's home has been for the past three years, Mrs. Emma Sebastian of Perryton, Tex., who with her husband are now at Anaheim, Mrs. Fanny Long of Gray, Okla., Spottswood C. Joplin and Wayman Joplin, both of St. Louis, Mo.

Mr. Joplin was deeply interested in public affairs, and was known as one of the stalwart Democrats of his state. In the past fifty years there was hardly a Democratic state convention in Missouri that was not attended by Mr. Joplin.

As a man whose thought were always first of all for others, Mr. Joplin was a man whose hand was always out to aid those who needed help. He took into his home and raised a number of orphan children.

At Farmington he was engaged in general farming, largely in stock and grain growing.

Mr. Joplin and his wife came to this county three years ago. He became a member of Hi Bledsoe camp, United Veterans of the Confederacy.

Funeral arrangements have not been announced. Burial will probably be in Fairhaven cemetery, Santa Ana.

Mr. Joplin leaves besides his widow and five children, one brother, County Treasurer J. C. Joplin, and one sister, Mrs. Betty Martin of Elizabethtown, Ky."

POULTRY

SODIUM FLUORID EFFICIENT
Recently Discovered Insecticide for Fowls is Cheaply and Quickly Applied.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)
Nothing has given so much satisfaction in getting rid of chicken lice as sodium fluorid, used by poultry specialists in the United States Department of Agriculture. It kills adults and young lice, including the young which emerge from eggs present at the time of treatment.

Sodium fluorid can be obtained in two forms known as commercial, and as chemically pure. Both of these are in the dry state, the first being a dry powder and the second in small crystals, somewhat lumpy. While the chemically pure material is effective, it is not so easily applied by the dusting method as the more finely powdered commercial form, and furthermore, it costs more. The commercial grade should contain 90 to 98 per cent sodium fluorid.

This material is the sodium salt of the chemical element known as fluorine, and hence is a compound very similar to ordinary table salt, which is known chemically as sodium chloride. In asking for sodium fluorid, therefore, it is important that the name, "fluorid," be carefully stated to the druggist.

If the proper methods are followed remarkable control is obtained. One thorough application of sodium fluorid to all fowls will destroy completely all the lice present. It is essential, however, to see that treatment is thorough, and that every fowl is treated. It may be applied in two forms—as a dry dust and as a dip. In the dust form the action of sodium fluorid is comparatively slow; hence, if examined the next day after treating, or even two or three days later, a few lice may be found, but the material persists, and after four or five days all lice disappear. It kills, too, all lice emerging from eggs on the feathers. For best results small amounts of the material should be placed on different parts of the infested fowls.

Specialists have found what they call the "pinch method" to be entirely effective against lice, and to have the advantage of economy of time and material. The material is placed in an open vessel on a table, the fowl is held by the wings or legs in one hand while with the other hand a small pinch of chemical is placed among the feathers next to the skin in this way: One pinch on the head, one on the neck, two on the back, one on the breast, one below the vent, one on the tail, one on either thigh, and one scattered on the underside of each wing spread. Each pinch can be distributed somewhat by pushing the

thumb and fingers among the feathers as the material is released. It is advisable when dusting to hold the chickens over a large shallow pan, as in this way the amount of material ordinarily lost is recovered.

The material may be applied with a shaker, but this method has disadvantages when compared with the pinch method. The material is shaken into the feathers with one hand while the feathers are opened with the other. A second person is needed to hold and turn the fowl. In this method the amount of sodium fluorid used may be reduced by adding some finely powdered material such as road dust or flour. Fowls should be turned into the open as fast as dusted to prevent possible injury from breathing the dust. For young chickens, young turkeys, and indeed all newly hatched fowls the dusting method is recommended rather than dipping. This applies also to sick fowls.

The common objections to dipping poultry to rid them of lice have been overcome by the specialists by using the sodium fluorid solution. In general the dipping method is applied to the South and to summer treatments in the North. A rather warm, sunny day is preferred so fowls will dry quickly. Windy weather should be avoided.

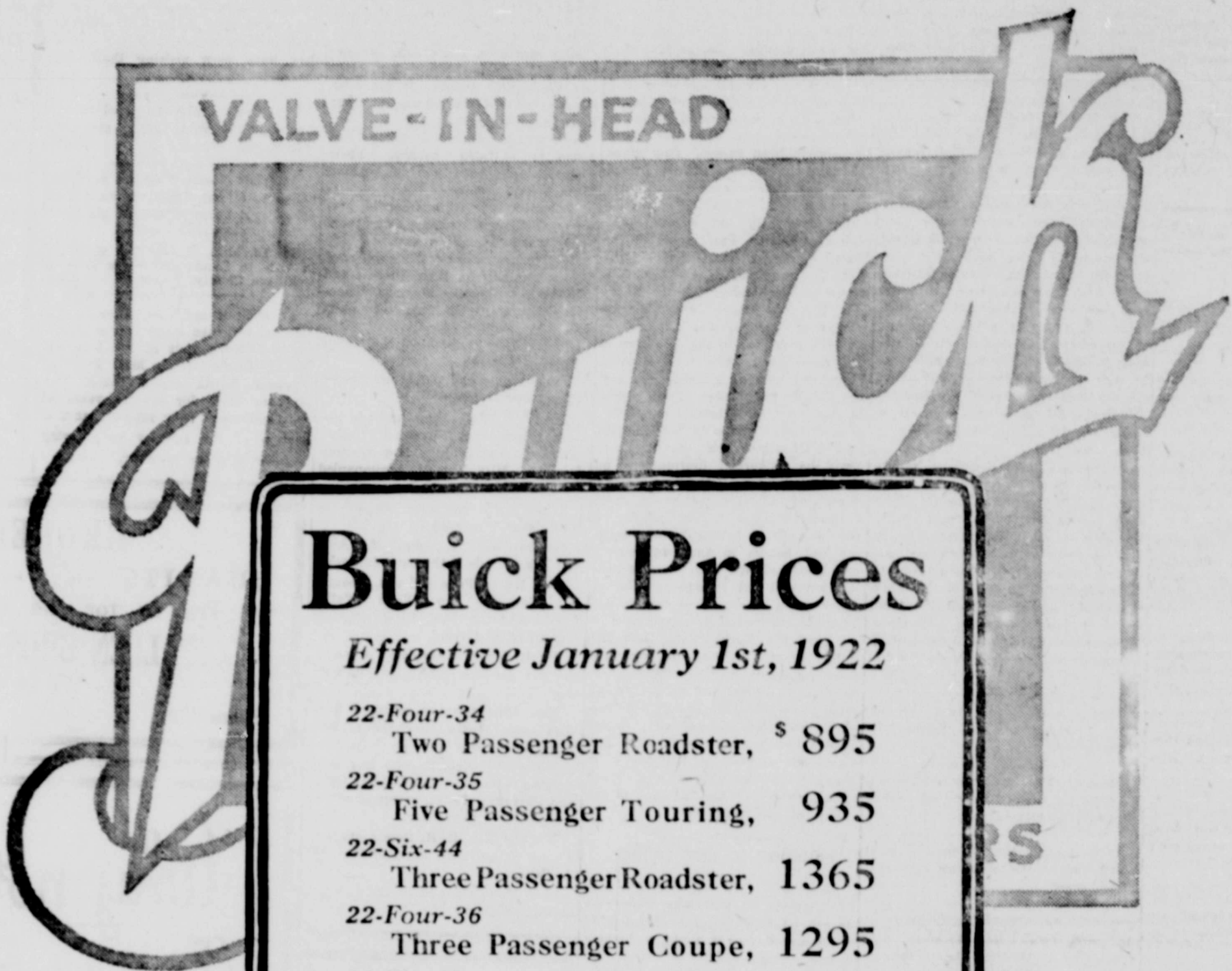

GOOD ROADS AID PROSPERITY

Instance Cited of Virginia Community Where Great Progress Has Been Accomplished.

That good roads are closely related to prosperity there is no question of doubt. Only a few years ago this section of Virginia had but one main road, one creamery, which went to the wall, and a mere handful of pure-bred dairy cattle. writes C. C. Conger, Jr., of Virginia in the Practical Farmer. One not familiar with the many blessings good roads bring about might wonder in what way good roads would affect creameries and pure-bred cows. Let us take, for instance, Rockingham county, and see just what good roads did in this section. In the dairy business alone, to say nothing of the prosperity good roads brought about in various other ways. Previous to our good roads the one creamery did some business during the summer months, when the dirt roads were at their best, but business dwindled to nothing during the winter months because farmers could not get over the roads to deliver their milk. The creamery finally closed down for the lack of milk. About this time a mere handful of progressive farmers began a movement for better roads, calling a meeting at a little village centrally located in the county. The attendance was good and a great deal of "good roads" enthusiasm was aroused. It was the first step in better roads that gained impetus by leaps and bounds. Today, in a few short years, we have a network of fine macadam roads throughout the entire county. Following good roads came creameries. They sprung up over night like mushrooms. Today the county is dotted with creameries, the sight of which does not look much like closing down for the lack of milk, particularly during the early hours of the day, when auto trucks are pouring in from the country, bringing milk from every nook and corner of the county. Pure-bred cows come with the creameries, till today scrub stock no longer dominates our farms. Ask any farmer why he disposed of his scrub cows, replacing them with pure breeds, and he will tell you the creameries did it.

Ask him what brought the creameries, and he will tell you better roads. While milk has slumped somewhat at times in this section, it has never halted the dairy business, and farmers are now reporting fair profits in dairying. The wealth that good roads has brought to this section in dairying alone is astonishing. We are striving for more wealth and prosperity by building still more good roads. Experience has taught us that good roads, wealth and prosperity go hand in hand.
