Advantages Of Frozen Lockers Told Rotarians

Carl Morrison, who is co-owner of the Burk Frozen Locker Co., with Virgil Brookshear, had as his guest Tuesday at the Rotary Club, R. L. Shannon, Frigidaire representative, who told of the progress made in frozen food lockers in the past 13 years.

"It is a far cry from the wooden crates first used in 1931 by a firm in Wisconsin, to the present modern metallic boxes," Shannon said. The invention of frozen food boxes was caused by necessity of farmers and cattlemen in Wisconsin having an abundance of farm products, cattle, hogs, etc., and no market for them, so a few farmers banded themselves together and decided to preserve the products by freezing, for their own uses. From this humble beginning there are now over 100,000 frozen food plants in the United States."

His talk was followed by a round-table discussion which was very interesting and instructive. Walter Riley will have the program next week.

Burk Leads Co. In Per Capita Rubber Drive

Burkburnett is leading the county in collection of scrap rubber on a per capita basis Thursday morning, as the total collections needed 160,000 pounds.

According to reports, Geo. Byerly of the Magnolia wholesale has collected through his warehouse and filling stations approximately 4,000. With the other stations this brings the total to 160,000.

W. R. Hill, chairman for the scrap iron drive, stated that the Dohner Oil Co. shipped 309,680 pounds of iron and steel this week, along with 1600 pounds of brass and 750 of rubber.

A total of 960,404 pounds of scrap rubber had been collected in this county by Tuesday night, to give the county a per capita rating of 13.05 pounds, comparable to state records in the nationwide campaign. According to the latest figures, Nevada rates highest with a per capita record of 20.09 pounds, Montana is second with 13.42, and Wichita County ranks third with 13.05 per capita.

Total figures for Wichita County as released by W. O. Kimmel, chairman of tabulations, include: Wichita Falls, 617,691 pounds; Iowa Park, 31,144 pounds; Burk Burnett, 156,285 pounds, and Electra, 142,364 pounds. These figures give Wichita County a high rating, based on the 1940 census, in comparison with the rest of the nation, Kimmel said.

Final Drive
Citizens are joining in a final drive to raise the per capita basis still higher, drive leaders said. The North Texas Oil and Gas Association has distributed post cards to its members to be mailed to pumpers. The pumpers are requested to make a thorough check of all leases, encouraging their children to locate all available scrap rubber and to purchase defense stamps with proceeds from the salvage.

Scrap Rubber Needed

Rural families in every community are urged to collect scrap rubber on their farms and turn it in at the nearest filling station as their part in the nationwide scrap rubber collection campaign.

It is of greatest importance that our war industries have this rubber in order that they may continue to operate without interruption.

A large share of the nation's rubber scrap is on farms and it is the patriotic duty of every farm family to see that every bit of this scrap is placed at the disposal of our war industries. Every article made of rubber, no matter how large or small, including everything from old tires and worn out overshoes to discarded rubber toys, should be included in the collection.

White Russians Defy Reich

As the war clouds gathered in Europe in 1939, one of the questions often debated was whether nationality or ideology would prove the stronger motive in determining the attitude of the mass of people when and if the war actually came.

One answer to that question came last week in a news dispatch from Vichy stating that the White Russians who fled to France in 1920, when the Communists came to power, are now sticking up for Russia against Germany. There are said to be about 60,000 White Russians in Occupied France and, of this number, 20,000 are of military age. The Reich is giving them their choice of fighting for Germany or suffering the horrors of concentration camp, and they are choosing the concentration camp rather than fight against their native Russia.

Even Grand Duke Vladimir, pretender to the Russian throne, refused an offer of the Germans to support his claims if he would call upon all White Russians to line up with the Nazis. The Grand Duke in no way attempted to conceal his feelings and emphatically declared that he would not support any military operations against his homeland.

Use Convicts Patriotism Wisely

American officialdom has done well in its job of getting our prison populations into step with the rest of the nation in this time of war crisis. Convicts are being given a chance to prove their patriotism. They are being treated like people rather than pariahs.

At the Missouri state penitentiary, for instance, 1,500 convicts are enrolled as blood donors for the armed forces. And so far, no one has yelled about "criminal" blood "tainting" wounded soldiers who need transfusions. That is a case of scientific education triumphing over superstition.

At Ohio penitentiary, nearly 300 first offenders have been drilling four nights a week, preparing to take their places in the Army when parole and government officials decide that they are worthy of their freedom and a chance to serve their country at the risk of their lives. That is a case of justice triumphing over prejudice.

And, fortunately, the idea of the convict "legion of the damned," has not been encouraged and allowed to obscure the real issue. In Georgia, a move to create such a legion from among the state's road gang prisoners has met with a quick refusal from the War Department. "Fighters, incarcerated," a group of Oklahoma lifers, who wanted to form a suicide crew for a refitted old battleship, got nowhere, either.

Just as long as we continue to squelch such ballyhoo yet encourage honest efforts to make war workers out of our convicts, we'll get results. This war may rehabilitate more criminals than many years of peace—if we use our convicts' patriotism intelligently.

Men Wanted In The Signal Corps

An opportunity for men and women between the ages of 16 and 50 who have some basic training in radio, electrical or telephone work, or experience in radio work, to receive further training at the expense of the government as employees of the Signal Corps of the U. S. Army at a salary of \$120 per month, was made known by the U. S. Civil Service Commission today.

Men 18 to 44 will be given the opportunity of entering the enlisted reserve of the Signal Corps and are invited to avail themselves of the opportunity for training for this specialized branch. Ample training opportunities exist, however, for qualified persons who are not within

the enlistment age, who are not physically qualified for active service, or who do not wish to enter the enlisted reserve.

Appointees to the position of Junior Repairman Trainee (Radio) at \$1440 per year will receive advanced instruction, 8 hours a day at schools established in San Antonio, Texas and Shreveport, Louisiana, in the fundamentals of overhaul, maintenance and repair of radio equipment. Upon completion of the training period, trainees will be eligible for assignment to more responsible duties with salary increases.

No written test is required. Applicant's qualifications will be judged from a review of their training or experience.

Interested persons should apply today for further information to the Secretary, Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, at the Burk Burnett, Texas, post office.

were held at 3 o'clock at the First Methodist church with the Rev. C. W. Dennis officiating.

I Give You Texas

From inland sea and island,
From forests dark and wide,
From lone lakes deep and silent,
Where peace and beauty bide;
From mines that pour out treasure,
From wheat-fields golden red—
We come with marching measure,
Till earth trembles with our tread.

From the hanging hillside village,
From the mesas high and clean,
From the valleys rich with tillage,
And meadows neat and green—
We come with hearts impassioned
With love of Liberty,
And free souls forged and fashioned
By faith and loyalty.

From streets where tower and steeple
Swim dimly in the sky;
From marts where busy people,
Their tasks and labors ply;
From shops where forges glimmer
And great trip-hammers jar—
We come, both saint and sinner,
Prepared for Freedom's war.

We come from hills and prairies,
From canyon, shore and street,
And this our common prayer is:
That God will guide our feet;
And temper mind and spirit
And sanctify each heart,
That each might haply merit
The grace to play his part.

The stirring lines above were written by R. F. Shand of Kerrville, whose son was one of the first Texas heroes to give his life in the present war.

"When picking up the papers that record the happenings in the little towns, one gains renewed faith in life," someone has written. "Here are set forth that which uplifts a community—the activities of the business men, the church items, farm news, and all the thousand and one happy social gatherings, as well as the marriages, birth, deaths and daily occurrences that make up the simple annals of the great common people who are really the foundation of this broad country of ours."

A favorite story (one that William Jennings Bryan used to tell on himself): When Bryan was a young lawyer, he took an active part in a campaign against the Governor of Nebraska but in spite of the fiery speeches of denunciation which Bryan delivered, the Governor was re-elected. Some time later, there was a celebration in Bryan's home town and the Governor was to be master of ceremonies. What made it embarrassing to Bryan was that he was on the program, too.

As the time approached for him to be introduced, the Governor smiled and motioned to him. Bryan thought, "What a magnanimous man; he has forgiven me for all those sledge-hammer speeches against him." When Bryan reached the chief executive, who had the program in his hand, the Governor looked up and said, "Young man, do you sing or recite?"

Texas is so titanic that it is bounded on the north by the Aurora Borealis, on the south by the invisible lines of equinox, on the east by primeval chaos and on the west by Judgment Day.

If all the mules in Texas could be made into one mule, he could kick the "man" out of the moon. If all the bales of cotton produced in Texas were made into one stack, you would have a stairway to the pearly gates. If all the hogs in Texas could be made into one hog, he could dig the Panama canal at a single root of his mighty snout. And if all the steers in Texas could be made into one steer, he could stand with his front feet in the Gulf of Mexico, one hind leg in Lake Michigan and the other in Hudson's Bay and, with his tail brush the Northern Lights out of the Alaskan skies. Light out of the Alaskan skies.

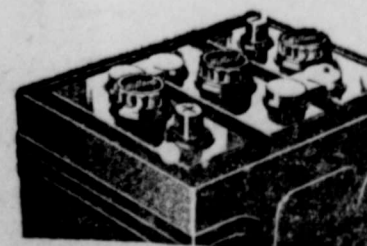

Fresh Nazi Offensive Forces Red Army To Yield Key Post Back of Kharkov; Rommel Drive Perils All Middle East; U. S. Names Leader for European Zone

The strategic importance of the Aleutian islands, off Southwest Alaska, is indicated by the above map. From Kiska, near the western end of the chain, to Tokyo the distance is less than 2,000 miles. Dutch Harbor lies 2,400 miles northwest of San Francisco. Jap landings in the fog-blanketed Aleutians have focused America's attention on that area.

RUSSIAN WAR: Nazis Pay Dearly

Marshal Timoshenko's Red army had sustained blow after blow on the Kharkov front as General von Bock's Nazi hordes tried a breakthrough to swing around Rostov, gateway to the Caucasus oil fields. Stubbornly resisting German forces numerically and mechanically superior to them, the Russians had been compelled to fall back to new lines. Here they had withstood heavy attacks of tanks, infantry and planes.

A Russian communique acknowledged the loss of the railway junction city of Kupiansk, 60 miles south-east of Kharkov.

The Reds were following a strategy that had served them well in last year's bloody campaigns—of fighting fiercely until forced to fall back, then withdrawing slowly to strongly prepared positions. Meanwhile they were taking an enormous toll in Nazi dead and slowing down Hitler's timetable.

Meanwhile, Britain brought additional grief to the Nazis with a world record raid on the German port city of Bremen. More than 1,000 planes raided Bremen, leaving it in flames. A British communique reported the loss of 52 planes.

TAX BILL: Biggest on Record

The average income taxpayer faced the prospect of paying about twice as much as he is now paying when the new federal revenue bill becomes operative.

As approved by the house ways and means committee, the new bill would provide a gross revenue estimated at \$5,924,000,000—the largest tax ever collected in United States history. At that, it was a billion and a half short of the treasury department's original request for new levies to help finance war outlays.

Surprising to many fiscal experts was the house committee's action in striking out a provision making it mandatory for husbands and wives to file joint income tax returns.

The average wage-earner would be affected three ways under the new tax measure. The bill provides a normal income rate increase of from 4 to 6 per cent; exemptions for single men would be reduced from \$750 to \$500 and for married men from \$1,500 to \$1,200; surtaxes would be increased from 6 to 12 per cent on the first \$1,000 of net taxable income.

U. S. INCOME: To Hit 117 Billion

Marriner S. Eccles, chairman of the Federal Reserve board told the nation that a new all-time record of 117 billion dollars for the annual national income would be reached during the war years.

Mr. Eccles warned Americans that this tremendous spending power will be far in excess of the consumer goods available to the buying public. Strict curtailment of all but necessary purchases, greater personal savings and steady buying of government war bonds, he said, will stop inflation.

The 1942 national income will be about 110 billion dollars, he said in a radio address. This will be about 30 billion more than it was in 1939.

EUROPEAN FRONT: U. S. Takes Steps

A further step in the program to make the fighting efforts of the United States and Britain more effective and to pave the way for the second front was taken when the war department announced the establishment of a "European theater of operations for United States forces."

Director of this European theater was Maj. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, recently assistant chief of staff of the war department general staff, who had already arrived in London when the announcement of his appointment was made.

Laconic was the statement issued by the new commanding general in which he said that "formal establishment of a European theater is a logical step in co-ordinating the efforts of Great Britain and the United States."

EGYPT: Tank Sceptic Chase

Sidi Barrani had fallen and Salum had been abandoned as the British strove by fierce rearguard actions to slow down the rush of Marshal Rommel's victory-flushed tank armies in engagements on which the fate of Egypt and Suez depended.

The serious plight of the British had been apparent following the surprise surrender of Tobruk in nearby Libya. Foxy General Rommel lost no time in following up his advantage by slicing into Egypt.

General Ritchie's battered forces had not made a stand at the Egyptian border because of the danger of encirclement, but had withdrawn to Mersa Matruh, 157 miles east of the Libyan frontier.

The British had been in possession of Sidi Barrani since December 11, 1940, when they drove out Italian troops which had occupied the town less than three months before and then launched a drive which swept 400 miles across the Libyan desert.

FAMILY MEN: Deferred by Draft

The departure of many a married draft inductee for training camp was halted when President Roosevelt signed legislation authorizing deferment of family men until the supply of single men is exhausted. This marked the first time in American military history that the policy of so preserving established families had been fixed by law.

Draft headquarters announced that married men with children would be the last to be called into service, but emphasized that they could count on no permanent deferment. The deferment clause applied only to men married before December 8, 1941.

Financial assistance to dependents of service men was provided in the measure, with the government furnishing the bulk of the monthly allowance check and the service men the balance. The allotments would go to army men up to and including the grade of line sergeants and navy men including third class petty officers.

Allowances include \$50 a month for a childless wife of a service man, \$62 for a wife with one child and \$72 for a wife with two children.

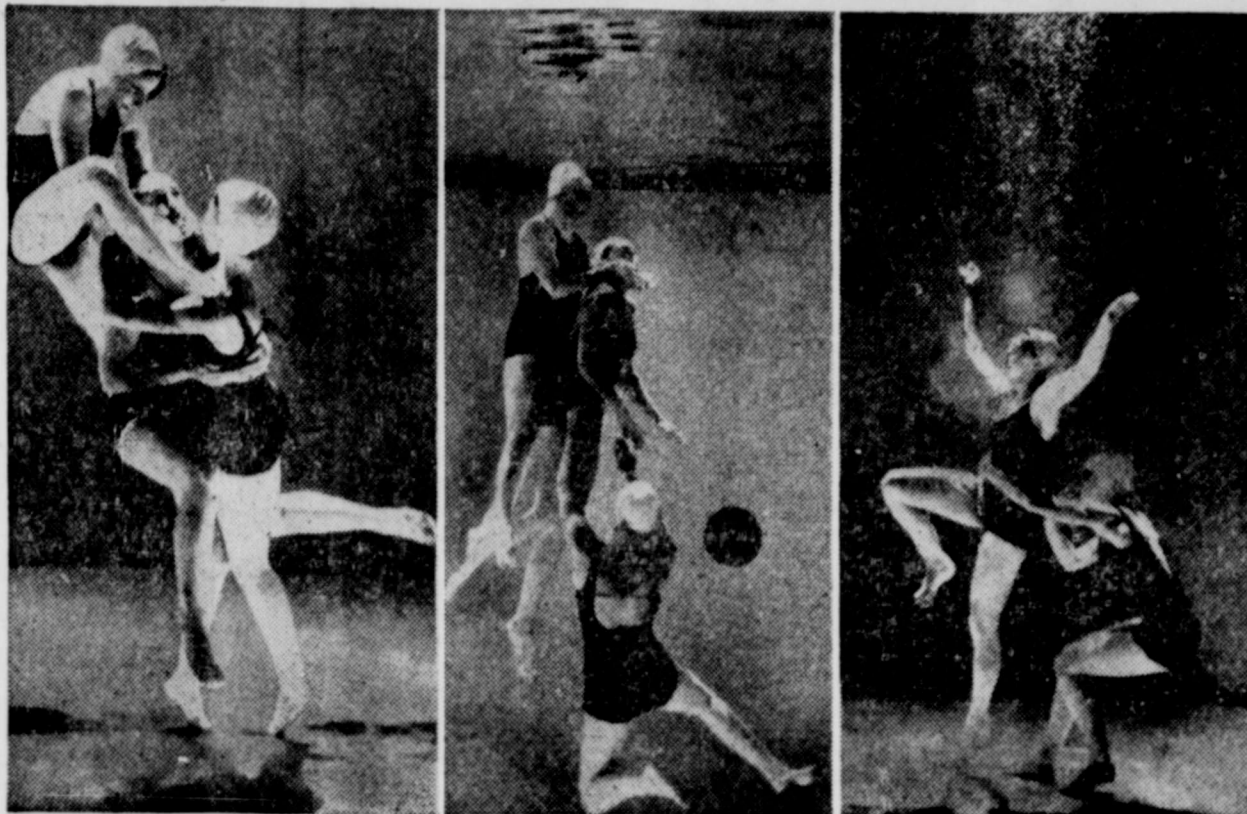
HIGHLIGHTS . . . in the week's news

Although the pope is giving no audiences, he is receiving his immediate collaborators, the dispatch disclosed. Doctors attending the pontiff were hopeful he could go to St. Peter's on the eve of St. Peter's day for the traditional visit to the apostle's tomb.

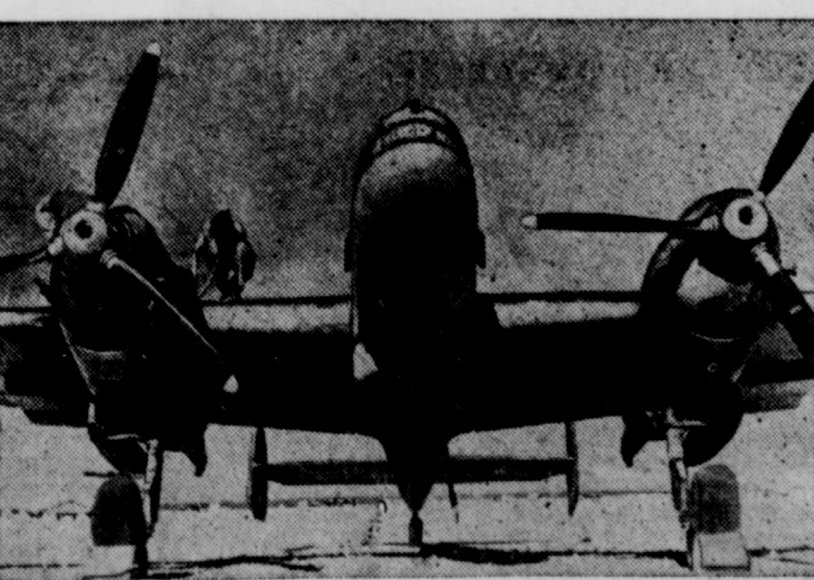

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War Industries
Need Workers

Pointing out that more than 80 per cent of all jobs in Texas war industries are filled by workers who have had specialized training, Donald W. Hawkins, manager of the Wichita Falls office of the United States Employment Service today urged people in this area who wish war plant jobs to apply for the necessary training in the free war industry training schools.

"Most of these war industry jobs," said Mr. Hawkins, "are entirely new to Texas. Special pre-employment training is necessary before the employers will hire people to fill them. This training is provided to both men and women free of charge by the National Defense schools. There are openings now in these schools, and local people should investigate them through the Employment Service, which refers trainees to the schools."

The training program is operated jointly by the state and federal government in cooperation with the public schools and provides courses to prepare workers for aircraft, shipbuilding, munitions and other jobs in which there is or will be a heavy demand. It is virtually impossible to get one of these jobs without the training, which has already landed thousands of workers in good paying war jobs.

Machine shop, aircraft engine mechanics, aircraft sheet metal (including riveting), drafting and inspection are the courses offered. The training is open to men

Even this is not true in all cases, since boys and girls from 17 to 24 years may be assigned to National Youth Administration war work centers where they will be boarded and paid a small wage while training.

The war industry schools are operated on a 24-hour daily basis so that all equipment can be constantly used and to provide training at all hours for trainees who must work while attending.

Mr. Hawkins urged that any one in or near Wichita Falls who is interested in entering a training class in the subjects listed contact him at the United States Employment Service, located at 723 Tenth Street.

Half Million Lose
Federal Checks

Washington, July 1— Nearly 300,000 people lost their jobs or their government aid today by the scrapping or curtailment of three depression-born federal agencies that have cost more than \$17,000,000.

Congress abolished the civilian conservation corps yesterday by denying it funds for the fiscal year beginning today. The start of a new government business calendar also saw the works progress administration cut to skeleton form and heavy reductions in the national youth administration program.

In the background of the transaction there was a change of eras—from men hunting jobs to jobs hunting men.

The life of the CCC ended at midnight, and demobilization of some 60,000 enrollees and 15,000 civilian employees of the corps began this morning. The WPA, its appropriation whittled by two-thirds from last year, was trimming its rolls down from 700,000 to 400,000. The NYA, with funds also cut by two-thirds, commenced dropping 60,000 persons from its out-of-school training program to reduce the number in this activity from 130,000 to 70,000.

Schooling of Texas children may suffer heavily if gasoline rationing is extended to Texas.

That's the conclusion to be drawn from study of a school tax survey just received here. The survey, compiled from reports of independent school districts and official state records, shows that last year petroleum and its products bore 39 per cent, or virtually two-fifths of the total cost of schooling Texas boys and girls.

Or to put it another way, two out of five Texas school children were educated last year through taxes on the Texas petroleum industry and on gasoline. A total of 600,000 Texas boys and girls out of the state's scholastic population of 1,539,066 had their entire school expenses paid by petroleum and petroleum product taxes last year.

The report, compiled by Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association statisticians from figures obtained from independent school district tax collectors and from state officials, shows \$91,754,249 was spent for educating Texas school children last year. Of this amount, \$23,254,172 was paid by the Texas petroleum industry in state and local taxes for school purposes. An additional \$12,384,568 was paid for schools in gasoline taxes by individual Texas motorists, making a total of nearly \$36,000,000 from petroleum and its principal product. Not only gasoline taxes but also oil taxes would be seriously affected by rationing, it was pointed out, as Texas oil output would drop even lower if the market for Texas gasoline were cut further.

Of the average per pupil school cost of \$59.62, oil and oil products paid \$23.25.

Revenue from these sources have aided the State Tax Board to cut the State school ad valorem tax rate to its present 16 cents, less than half its constitutional maximum of 35 cents per \$100 valuation.

While oil and oil products bear two-fifths of the cost of Texas public schools, the pay an even larger part of the general state taxes. Last year, the Texas Mid-Continent report shows, the Texas petroleum industry paid 55 per cent, or well over half, of all state business and property taxes. If sales taxes are included, petroleum and its products bore 62 per cent, or close to two-thirds, of all state taxes.

GOVERNMENT REGULATION OF
Consumers Credit

Below we print Section 5, of Government Regulations of Consumers Credit which went into effect May 6, 1942.

(Each Charge Account has to comply with the following regulations:)

SECTION 5. Charge Accounts:

Except as otherwise permitted by this regulation, each charge sale and charge account shall comply with the following requirements:

(a) **Maximum Maturity:** Except as permitted by section 9, no listed article shall be sold in a charge account with an agreement that payment therefor may be deferred beyond the 10th day of the second calendar month following the calendar month during which such article was sold.

(b) **Restriction:** When a charge account is in default, the Registrant shall not extend credit to the obligor for any charge sale or installment sale of any listed article until the default has been cured by one of the methods described below.

(c) **Default:** A charge account shall be deemed to be in default if any article (whether listed or unlisted) for which credit was extended in such account has not been paid for in full on or before the 10th day of the second calendar month following the calendar month during which such article was sold, except that:

(1) A charge account shall not be deemed to be in default because of a failure to make payment for any article purchased therein prior to May 1, 1942, unless such article shall not have been paid for in full by July 10, 1942;

(2) If an article was sold in a charge account prior to May 1, 1942, under a definite agreement between the seller and purchaser (evidenced in writing) that such article need not be paid for until a specified date the account shall not be deemed to be in default with respect to such article unless such article shall not have been paid for in full by the date so agreed upon; and

(3) For persons with seasonal incomes, adjustments are permitted in accordance with section 9.

(d) **Curing Default:** When a charge account is in default, the default may be cured either:

(1) By payment in full of the amount in default;

(2) By the purchaser entering into written agreement in good faith to pay the amount in default within a period of 6 months or less from date of such agreement by substantially equal installment payments of not less than \$5.00 per month or \$1.25 per week at substantially equal intervals not exceeding one month; or

(3) By the purchaser filing with the creditor a Statement of Necessity in accordance with section 10(d) and entering into a written agreement in good faith to pay the amount in default within a period of 12 months from the date of such agreement by substantially equal installment payments at substantially equal intervals not exceeding one month.

(e) **Conversion of Charge Account into Installment Credit Prior to Default:** If the seller and purchaser agree to convert into an installment credit the whole or any part of a charge account arising from the sale of a listed article the charge for which is not in default, the agreement shall be in writing and shall provide that the installment credit shall be retired within six months from the date of the agreement by substantially equal payments of not less than \$5.00 per month or \$1.25 per week, at substantially equal intervals not exceeding 1 month.

(f) **"Floor Authorizations":** A Registrant shall not be deemed to have violated section 5(b) if he makes a charge sale of a listed article, the cash price of which is \$5.00 or less, for immediate delivery to the customer in person and (1) the person authorizing such charge sale on behalf of the Registrant acts in good faith without knowledge that the customer's charge account is in default, and (2) the Registrant, upon discovery that such charge account is in default, promptly requests the return of, or the immediate payment in full for, the article sold.

You will note from the above excerpts all customers are required to make payment in full covering their accounts not later than the 10th day of the second calendar month following the calendar month during which such accounts have accrued.

Kindly make payment at once, and keep your credit good.

Additional charge cannot be made to an account which is past due.

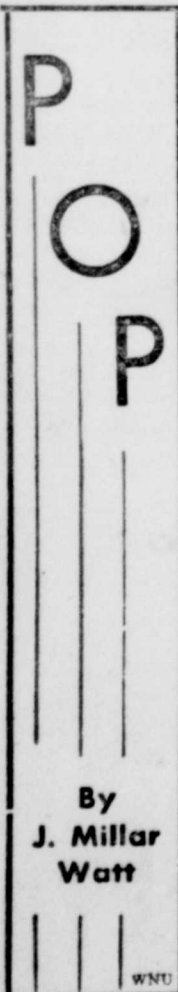
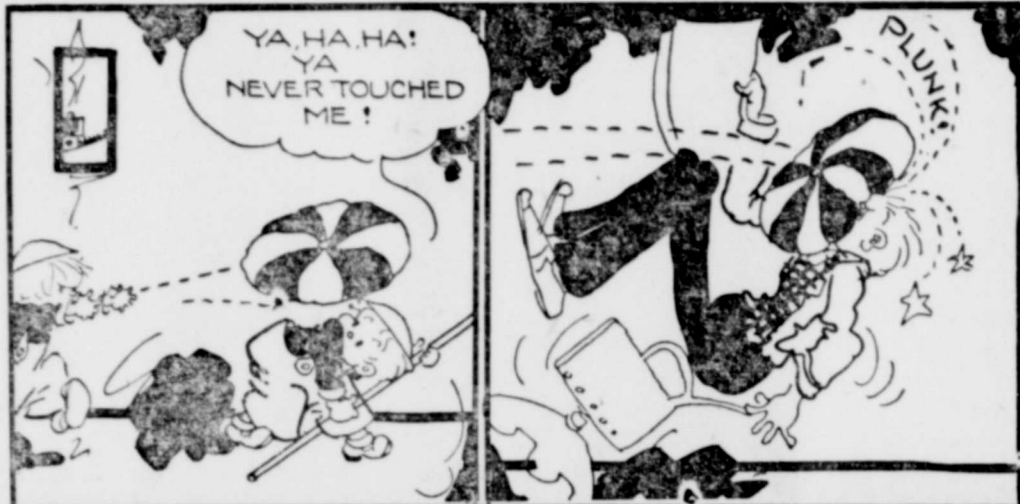

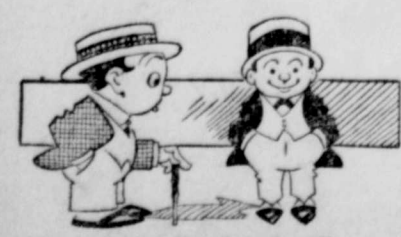

These Barbecued Hamburgers Are Appetite-Tempting! (See Recipes Below.)

Outdoor Fun

The delicious aroma of meat cooking over a crackling fire, toasted buns, and freshly roasted corn or potatoes—all these make for plenty of summer fun. Toss together your outdoor cooking equipment, bright, gay colored cloths, napkins, and gather some wood for your picnic. Plan to have lots of hearty, nourishing food to give your picknickers so they will have plenty of that up-and-at-them spirit.

Crunchy green salads packed in jelly glasses or paper containers, steaming hot coffee, baked beans, or macaroni and cheese, and barbecued meat. Dispel the chilliness of cool nights with your picnic outdoors.

Hamburgers are old favorites, but you can make them extra delicious by drizzling a tasty barbecue sauce over them while they cook.

Barbecued Hamburgers.

(Serves 8)

2 pounds ground beef
1½ teaspoons salt
Pepper to taste
2 tablespoons vinegar
1 tablespoon flour
1 teaspoon chili powder
2 teaspoons brown sugar
2 teaspoons salt
½ teaspoon pepper
1 medium-sized onion, chopped
1½ tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
½ cup catsup
1 tablespoon hot water

Have any of the thriffter cuts of beef ground—such as chuck, flank, shank, neck, or heel of round. If meat is quite lean, ask your butcher to grind in some suet. Mix meat thoroughly with salt and pepper. Cook on a greased griddle-grill with thick slices of onion. Mix rest of ingredients well and drizzle over hamburgers as they cook. This sauce is also excellent over frankfurters which have been pricked with a fork.

To make a new kind of "cheeseburger," add ½ cup grated cheese to each pound of hamburger, mixing lightly.

Hamburger Puffs.

(Serves 8)

2 pounds chuck steak, ground
2 cups grated raw potato
4 tablespoons grated onion
2 teaspoons salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
½ peeled clove of garlic, minced
4 tablespoons milk
4 tablespoons fat

Combine all ingredients except fat. Form into 16 patties. Cook in fat on a greased grill or skillet over medium heat until brown on both

Lynn Says:

For best results in outdoor cooking use a small fire. Be sure you have a deep bed of coals before you start broiling or frying your food.

To start the fire, use a soft quick burning wood like pine, spruce, hemlock, laurel, poplar, or aspen. For a good bed of coals, use a hard wood such as maple, oak, ash, beech, birch, hickory, or any available hard wood in your community.

Seasoned wood which has not lain on the ground long enough to become wet or rotted, but long enough to dry out, is best for fires. Wood without bark makes the best kind of fire, as bark will cause a fire to smoulder. To start a fire more easily, use split wood, as it burns more easily than round logs.

You won't be a sissy if you kneel when using a hand axe for chopping or splitting wood. If you use seasoned wood, it can easily be broken into convenient chunks for the fire.

*Roast Corn.

Have a hot fire and let it burn down until there is a good pile of red embers. Soak the ears of corn in their husks until good and wet and lay them, still in the husks, in the hot ashes. Bake for 30 minutes or until corn is tender. Turn the ears occasionally.

*Roast Potatoes.

Bury potatoes in hot ashes and roast as you do the corn, until they are tender. They take longer to roast than the corn. Serve with lots of butter, salt, and pepper.

*Marshmallow Dessert.

(Serves 6)

Small bars of plain chocolate
12 graham crackers
12 marshmallows

Toast 2 marshmallows over the coals to a crisp, gooey state, and then put them inside a graham cracker and chocolate bar sandwich. The heat of the marshmallow between the halves of chocolate bar will melt the chocolate just enough, and the graham crackers on the outside are nice to hold.

Do you like to go primitive and roast meat over a forked stick or long-handled fork? Then, you'll like:

Kabobs.

For each person, allow ¼ pound round steak, ½ of a medium-sized onion, and a few slices of bacon. Cut the meat in 1-inch squares, cut the onion lengthwise, from top to bottom. Cut the slices of bacon into thirds. Place beef, onion, and bacon on a fork or stick, alternately, and broil over coals until done.

A salad that is both health-cramped and delicious for a picnic is this one made with plenty of vegetables and cottage cheese:

Vitamin Salad.

(Serves 6)

1 cup celery, diced
2 cups cottage cheese
¼ green pepper, diced
1 cup carrots, shredded (cooked)
2 cups cabbage, shredded fine
½ cup mayonnaise
Salt

Toss together all ingredients and serve on crisp lettuce leaves.

A cookie treat to take with you on your picnic is this sugar-saving one:

Fruit Treats.

(Makes 12 Treats)

2 cups sifted, enriched flour
3 tablespoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
2 to 4 tablespoons shortening
½ cup milk (about)
1 tablespoon honey or corn syrup
2 eggs

12 cooked apricots or prunes

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cut in shortening. Beat 1 whole egg and 1 egg yolk, reserving white for tops. Add milk and honey to beaten eggs and add flour to mixture. Stir in only enough to hold flour together. Turn on lightly floured board and knead together ½ minute. Roll ¼ inch thick, cut with doughnut cutter. Place on baking sheet and place an apricot or prune in the "hole" on each one. Brush with egg white and sprinkle biscuits with cinnamon sugar. Bake in a moderately hot oven 12 to 15 minutes. Cinnamon sugar: Mix 3 tablespoons sugar with ½ teaspoon cinnamon.

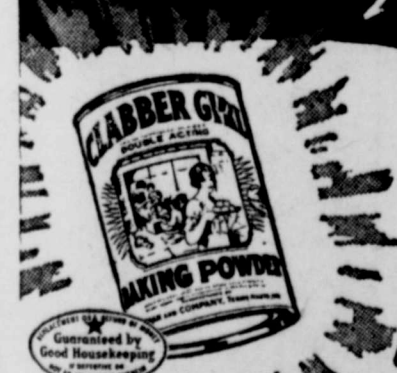

Five county officers and several of the precinct officers are without opposition this year and only their names will appear on the ballot in those particular places. Those fortunate enough not to have opponents are County Judge Guy McNeely, County Attorney Temple Shell, County School Superintendent J. B. Golden, County Treasurer Tom McHam, District Clerk Glenn Haynes, and county Commissioner M. L. Hines of precinct 3. The justice of the peace R. A. Palm, is also without opposition and all the above are up for re-election. Right good evidence that the voters are pretty well satisfied with the present incumbents.

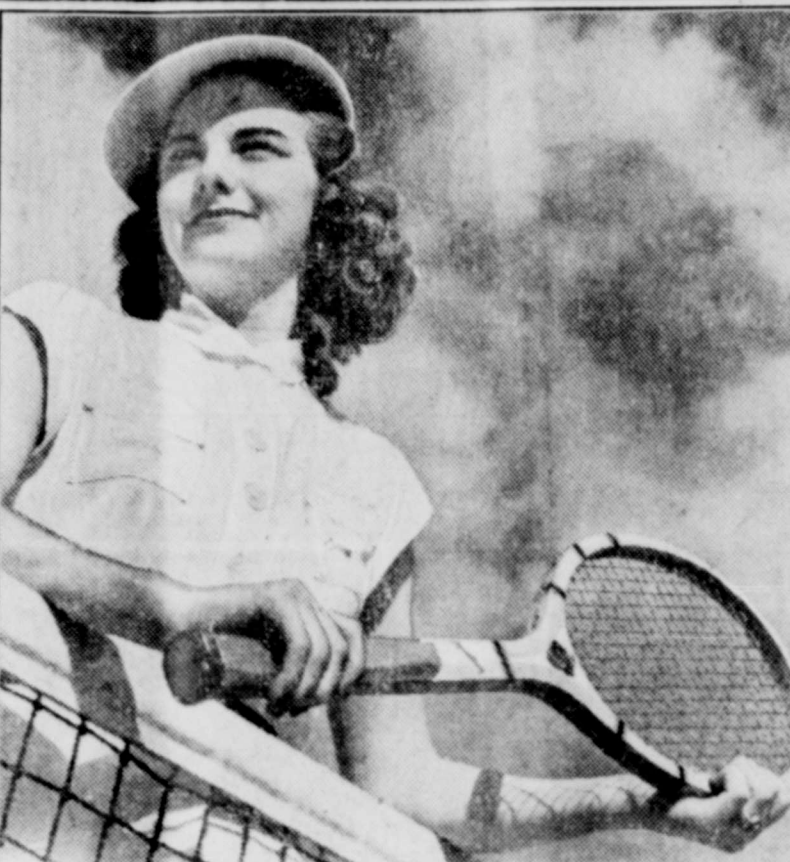

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The SNAPSHOT GUILD
PROPS IN PORTRAITURE

Simple props, such as the tennis racquet and visor worn by this attractive model, will help to make your informal portraits successful.

Informal portraits sometimes fail because of two reasons: first, the subject may be one of those people who just can't appear at ease before a camera; second, the subject has nothing to do and thus appears artificially posed. There's not too much we can do about the first situation, but it's easy to remedy that second condition. Just introduce a few "props."

What are props? Well, in its photographic sense the term covers practically any existing or fancied object. But generally speaking, props for informal portraits include only ordinary items found in almost any home. For instance, in this week's illustration the tennis equipment could well come under the heading of props. Perhaps the subject is a tennis player—it doesn't make much difference—because she looks as if she had been playing. And the props in the picture are

almost totally responsible for that effect. Take them away, and you'd have nothing but an ordinary picture of a rather attractive girl.

Clothes, although most of us don't think of them that way, come under the heading of props, just as do books and chairs. Different clothes will create different moods in informal portraiture. For instance, consider how changed our tennis player might appear in an evening gown. Take advantage of that fact the next time you picture people. Show them in several different types of clothes.

You'll find it pays to assemble a grab bag of different types of props for use in informal portraiture. Include sports' equipment, books, drapes, different types of hats, etc. It will help to make your informal portraiture more interesting to your subject, as well as to you.

HEADS LEGIONOlin Culberson Delivers
Keynote Speech

Victor Nobles of Wichita Falls was elected commander of the fourth division in the executive business session Sunday afternoon. The women's auxiliary of the Legion passed the election, declaring that an insufficient number of delegates were present for voting.

Culberson said the United States had sunk one of the best navies in the world in a disarmament conference, and now was the time to determine no such pacifism should ever dominate the nation again.

He said the kind of country and world that would result after the war depended on plans made now. "We have got to stop this business of being such gentle fighters and get rough," said Culberson.

He continued by saying each age won its own liberty by fighting for it and protecting it, and when an American thought of the sacrifices of Bataan, he should be determined to fight.

Commander Andy Dilworth of the state legion, San Antonio, said that isolationism and pacifism must be met by the legion after the war is concluded.

"I demand," said Dilworth, "that after the war is over Hitler, Himmler and his crew of murderers be lined up against a

brick wall and shot."

Dilworth, who said he had traveled 40,000 miles since the war started, said there was no complicity in Texas or the rest of the nation. The people are willing to fight if they know what to do," he said.

Col. H. B. Claggett could not attend the convention and sent as his representative Col. Joseph T. Clement. Colonel Clement invited the legionnaires to inspect the field.

The staff with Colonel Clement included Lieut. Col. J. W. Messler, Lieut. Col. J. W. Adan, Maj. P. J. Calder, Capt. L. Klienhaus, Capt. E. B. Turner, Capt. J. E. Rowe, Capt. J. J. Madden and Capt. J. L. Martinus. These officers brought greetings of the present soldiers to soldiers of the first World War.

The convention opened Sunday morning at a sermon by Rev. A. R. Cooper. Sunday noon a banquet was held at the Town Hall with H. R. Hayes of Burk Burnett as master of ceremonies.

The speakers at the banquet included Culberson, Dr. Martha Woods, Houston; Mrs. John T. Portelle, Marlin; Claude Riley, Wichita Falls; Commander Howard Hudgens, Vernon, and others.

Following the banquet the men and women held separate sessions. Commander Jess Thompson, Rockdale, presided over the legionnaires' business session. In resolutions offered by Senator George Moffett, Chillicothe, R. O. Brookshire, Burk Burnett and W. J. Danforth, Fort Worth, member of the national executive committee of the legion, the division voted to allow veterans of the present world conflict to join the legion. The resolutions also demanded a complete physical examination for ever soldier as discharged when the war ended.

Dr. Danforth was endorsed by the convention as candidate for national commander of the American Legion.
