Wheat Money Swells Perryton Bank Deposits
Big Wheat Fires Cause \$50,000 Loss To Ochiltree County FarmersFIFTEEN HUNDRED ACRES UNCUT
GRAIN DESTROYED DURING WEEK

MONDAY AFTERNOON FIRE FANNED BY GALE
TAKES THOUSAND ACRES; R. H. FRAN-
CIS LOSTS COMBINE IN FOURTH
OF JULY FIRE; NO HAIL

Wheat growers of Ochiltree County and the Perryton territory have suffered heavy losses during the past week on account of numerous fires which have started in fields of golden grain. The worst wheat fire in the history of the county was that of last Sunday afternoon when approximately one thousand acres of uncut grain was burned a few miles south-

of Perryton. Thousands of acres were saved through the heroic efforts of hundreds of volunteers who tried like Trojans to check the flames and destructive flames.

The Sunday fire started in the field of E. R. Buckminster, near lease to Roy Jeffroy of this county. The real cause of the fire is never known as the combine had been pulled out of the field five hours before and no one was working near at the time. Fanned by the high gale blowing from the south, the flames spread rapidly and soon thousands of acres of grain and stubble were afire. The fire was stopped on the north side of the Spearman-Perryton highway and whopped out on the sides by hundreds of volunteer fire fighters. Two men, Tex Evans of this county, and Bill Redrick of Canon County, Colorado, were overcome by heat and smoke. They were brought to Perryton in an unconscious condition but soon recovered sufficiently to be taken to their homes.

A check-up of the Sunday fire has the following losses. T. T. Williams and T. R. Stewart, 140 acres, no insurance; F. P. Rogers, 25 acres, insured; J. A. Russell, 30 acres, no insurance; Arthur Pearson, 210 acres, no insurance; Morris McGee, 320 acres, no insurance; R. Oringer, 75 acres, insured. Tractors, trucks and even automobiles were pressed into service to help combine out of the path of the leaping flames and to pull plows which were used for making back furrows.

A fire southeast of town on the fourth destroyed several hundred acres of grain, the exact amount not being known. This fire started from a tractor and burned a combine owned by R. H. Francis. Mr. Ellis lost 200 acres of extra wheat, the ground being farmed by O. W. Heidrich. Others who lost small acreage were Lambert and Dale Schwab, J. D. Wade, who lost the fore part of last week.

It is believed that the total losses on account of fire will amount to at least \$50,000. Fortunately there has been no hail losses in this section to date.

HOLD MAN FOR
HI JACK CASE

DALLAS TALIFERRO HELD UP

FORT WORTH & DENVER
AGRICULTURAL AGENT
LOOKS OVER SITUATION

M. B. Oates, agricultural agent for the Fort Worth & Denver Railway Co., was in Perryton on Wednesday of this week looking over the big wheat crop and the thousands upon thousands of bushels of wheat which are piled on the ground on account of the shortage of cars on the Santa Fe. Mr. Oates refused to be interviewed as to why he was in Perryton, a town far from any of their roads, but we can draw our own conclusions.

The Fort Worth & Denver now have an application before the Interstate Commerce Commission to build from the south into Pampa. It is known that they intend to extend on north through to a connection with their main lines in Nebraska. Through Perryton would be the logical route for them to take. There is no town in the North Panhandle that would furnish more tonnage than Perryton. Perryton needs another railroad and it would welcome the Fort Worth & Denver and give them all possible assistance in building here.

Truck Turns Over

Spills Occupants But None Seriously Injured; Happened South East of Town

A truck containing five occupants turned over, July 4, southeast of Perryton, spilling the passengers, none of them being seriously injured. Compton, harvest hand was said to have suffered worst, receiving cuts and bruises when he was thrown through a fence. Dallas Talliaferro also received bruises.

The accident happened just north of the Carl Ellis place. Traveling at a slow rate of speed, the truck hit some ruts in the road. Attempting to jerk the wheels out of the tracks, the truck was sent into the ditch and turned over. The men were on their way to the Pletcher place where they were helping harvest.

WATER PLANT E-
LECTION AUG. 10

VOTERS WILL BALLOT ON SALE
OF MUNICIPAL WATER TO
TEXAS-LOUISIANA CO.
FOR \$100,000.00

The voters of the City of Perryton will go to the polls on August 10, to vote for or against the proposition to sell the municipal water plant to the Texas-Louisiana Power Co. for the sum of \$100,000.00. Geo. M. Perry has been appointed as presiding judge of the election with Mrs. Bernice Allen, C. E. McLarty and Mrs. L. M. Waide as assistants.

The council has, by a vote of every member, approved the sale of the plant to the utility company. The proposition of the power company and the fifty years franchise to be granted them provides that the same water rates as now in effect under city ownership will prevail. The power company also furnishes the city water free of charge for the flushing of the sewer system and for the washing of all paved streets. A small monthly rental charge will be made for each fire hydrant.

Two trucks collided near Twichell, Monday evening, and while both machines were damaged, no one was injured in the accident. MORE PAVING
FOR PERRYTON

COUNCIL ORDERS ESTIMATES
PREPARED FOR ONE AND
ONE-HALF BLOCKS
ON MAIN ST.

The city council, acting upon a petition presented by the property owners, have ordered the city engineer to prepare estimates for one and one-half blocks of additional brick paving on north Main Street. This will extend the paving from the Santa Fe tracks to the city limits on the north.

Petitions are also being circulated for many blocks of additional paving, both in the residence and business section. It is almost certain that Wilson, the first street east of Main, will be paved from the Burrow Lumber Co. to the Johnson Motor Co. warehouse. Allen Avenue from Main to Wilson, running south of the Johnson Motor Co. will probably be paved also.

In the residence section, petitions are being circulated and many signatures have already been secured on the following streets: McMillen from Wilsey to Rhodes; Wyman, Wilsey to Black. There is also considerable talk of paving Black, the street leading from the schoolhouse to Main St. This is one street that needs paving badly and one that the city should cooperate in to the fullest extent for there is no street in town which serves the public as a whole more than this street.

The Lacey Paving Co., who have the contract for the fourteen and one-half blocks now going in, are making good progress. Main Street is now completed as far south as the Johnson Motor Co. with two blocks to go on south. Just as soon as Main Street is completed, the side streets included in the present contract will be constructed. It is expected that at least forty blocks of paving will be put in this year. The estimated cost for a thirty-two foot street in the residence section, constructed of brick the same as now being installed in the business district, including cost of concrete gutter and curb, will not exceed \$200.00 for a fifty foot lot. This can be handled in ten yearly payments and no property owner can afford to do without the paving.

Howard Lilly Killed

Son of Sam Lilly Dies From In-
juries Sustained When He
Falls Under Truck

One of the saddest accidents ever to happen in this city resulted in the death last Tuesday of Howard Lincoln, the little thirteen year old son of Sam Lilly of this city. Howard was riding on the side of one of his father's large trucks when in some manner, he lost his hold and fell beneath the wheels of the truck. The accident happened on Monday and he was immediately rushed to a hospital where everything that medical skill and loving hands could think of was done, but it was of no avail and at five o'clock on Tuesday, he passed away.

Howard Lincoln was born at Lamar, Colorado on February 12, 1916 and at the time of death was almost thirteen and one-half years of age. He is survived by his father and three brothers: Granville, Evelyn and Willis Neal and a large number of relatives, friends and acquaintances.

Funeral services were held at the Methodist Church in this city on Wednesday afternoon, Rev. E. C. Raney, pastor of the Methodist Church having charge of the services with the Wilson Funeral Home in charge of the arrangements. The remains were laid to rest in the Ochiltree cemetery. The sympathy of the entire community goes forth to the bereaved father, the brothers and other relatives in their sad loss.

\$700,000 HIGHWAY ROAD
BOND ELECTION IS SET
FOR SEPTEMBER THIRD

A petition signed by over fifty tax payers was presented to the Commissioners' Court on last Monday asking that an election be called in Ochiltree County authorizing the issuance of \$700,000 worth of road bonds to be used for the purpose of hard surfacing an east and west and north and south highway across the county. With very little discussion and with only one dissenting vote the Court voted in favor of the election and the bond issue and set Tuesday, September 3, as the day for the holding of the election.

The roads to be hard surfaced are Highway No. 4, running from the Oklahoma line, through Perryton to the south-east corner of the county, and Highway No. 117, which runs from Booker through Perryton, to the Hansford County line east of Spearman. Action is under way in Hutchinson and Hansford counties for the issuance of bonds for the purpose of paving 117 in those counties. If this is done, Amarillo and Perryton will be connected by a paved highway.

The state will go fifty-fifty on No. 117 while on No. 4, the county will pay one-third and the state and federal government the other two-thirds. Those that are familiar with the present status of the state in regard to future highway legislation feel that Ochiltree County will never pay one cent of this proposed bond issue, for it is almost certain that at the next regular term of the legislature the state-wide bond issue will pass. One of the provisions of this act is that counties and road districts that have voted bonds for the purpose of hard surfacing state highways will be refunded the amount of the bond issues. This means that if Ochiltree County votes these bonds, they will soon be refunded from the state-wide bond issue.

High winds and electrical storms accompanied the rains, but little or no damage was reported. Reports of a light hail in northern Oklahoma were made known but little damage was reported.

The fall in some parts of the county was reported as being much heavier than in Perryton.

Deposits in the two Perryton banks, the First National and the Perryton National, doubled in the six days of banking business from the time of the regular call, at the close of business on June 29, to close of business on last Monday, July 8. On June 29, the combined deposits of the two institutions were approximately \$806,000.00. On July 8, after just six days of business, they had mounted to the stupendous total of \$1,696,000.00. Considerable increase has been made since Monday.

STORMS DELAY HARVEST

.97 OF INCH

Nearly an inch of moisture was received in Perryton, Sunday and Monday nights of this week, according to the official government gauge kept by Jack Allen, delaying harvesting in this community.

The fall Sunday night was recorded at .72 of an inch while the rain Monday night measured .25, making a total of .97 of an inch. Another rain on July 1 amounted to .47 making the total for the month so far, 1.34 inches.

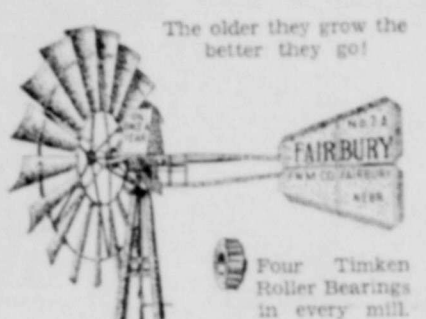

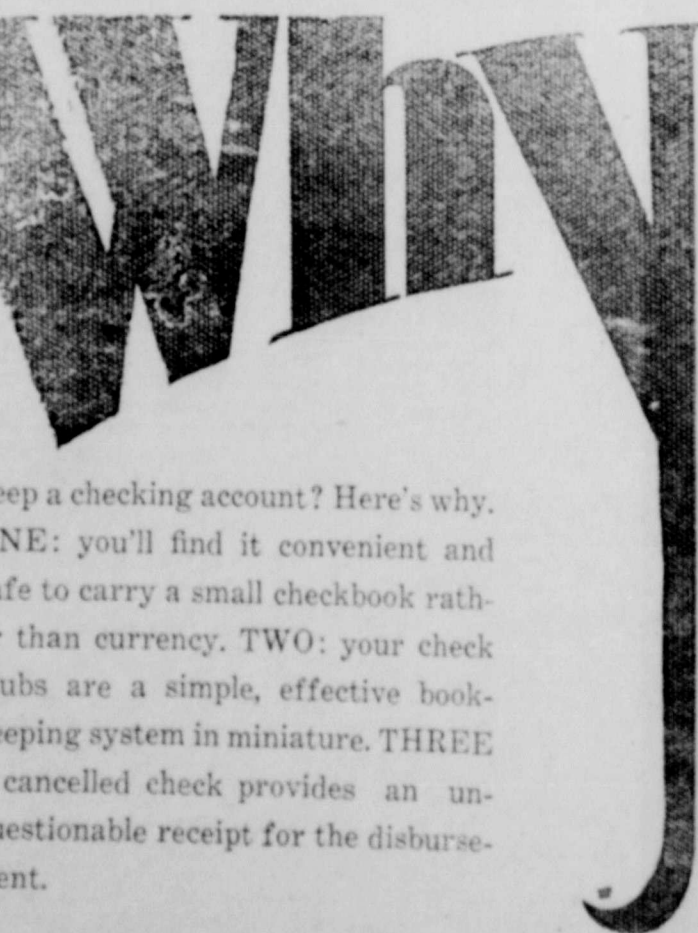

BRAINS AND SOIL MACDONALD READS HAZLITT THE FEAR OF DEATH A BRAVE COW

This nation, with its annual income of NINETY THOUSAND MILLIONS of dollars, treats education generously. But the value of education depends not on money, but on the brains on which the education money is spent. A crop depends not entirely on the seed, but more on the soil.

Nearly nine hundred years ago, when Abelard, taught logic and theology the young men in the University of Paris, they gathered in Wintertime in a stone lined room, not heated, taking notes by candle-light.

And many, too poor to pay for candles, climbed the church steeple on bright moonlight nights, to continue their studies there by moon light.

A few such students might be worth more to the world than a thousand million dollars of endowment. Edison gave to the world more money than wealth has ever given to education. So did Pasteur. Neither ever went to college.

Ramsay MacDonald flying from Scotland to London in a British bombing plane, a parachute strapped over his leather flying coat, read Hazlitt on the way.

Hazlitt, who worked himself into a fury over the French Revolution, quarreling with everybody that did not approve it, little thought that within 100 years of his death, a Socialist Laborite would be Prime Minister of England, without any revolution.

Still less did Hazlitt imagine that a British Labor Prime Minister would fly to his work.

Max D. Steuer, brilliant New York lawyer, says the best cure for any man that fears death is Hazlitt's essay on death.

Briefly Hazlitt says that, since we don't worry because we were not alive 100 years ago, we should not worry because we won't be alive or conscious a hundred years hence.

In rural England, huge lion, knocked out of his cage in an automobile collision, jumped into a cow pasture. A cow with a young calf

dashed at him and gored him, attacking him again and again, until he killed her. Others, later, killed him.

The cow, not the lion, is the interesting animal, in that story, for she represents mother love, with its boundless courage. How many men would have attacked the lion with no better weapon than a cow's horns.

Consider also the marvelous inheritance of memory. The cow's ancestors, probably, had not seen a dangerous wild beast, in more than 1,000 years. But, at sight, the cow knew that the lion meant danger to her calf, and rushed to the attack. Man is not the only animal "fearfully and wonderfully made."

A. H. TANDY BURIED AT
WOODWARD LAST FRIDAY

A. H. Tandy, age 78, a pioneer settler of Texas and Oklahoma, and a resident of this community since 1907, died at San Antonio, last Monday afternoon, following a long period of ill health. Although "Father" Tandy, as he is commonly known in this section, has been failing for some time, news of his death came as a great shock, not only to members of his immediate family, but to all who knew and loved him.

His daughter, Mrs. L. L. Morris, of Tulsa, Okla., who has spent much time with her father in recent years, was notified while visiting in Amarillo, last Friday, that her father was very low. She took an airplane to San Antonio, in order to reach his bedside before the end came.

Mr. Tandy left a wealth of love and esteem and his memory will endure long after his departure from this life.

A. H. Tandy was born September 16, 1850, in Kentucky. His father came to Texas in 1852, settling in Fort Worth. In 1893, the family moved to a ranch near Woodward, Okla. Mrs. Tandy died in 1906.

The Tandy family came to this vicinity in 1907, living on a large ranch west of Notia, in Roberts and Ochiltree Counties. In recent years Mr. Tandy made his home at the Moody Hotel.

Besides a number of grandchildren, Mr. Tandy is survived by four daughters and three sons: Mrs. Walter Scott, San Antonio; Mrs. L. L. Morrison, Tulsa, Okla.; Mrs. Nan Brownlee, Santa Fe, N. M.; and Mrs. Charles Conrad, East Walpole, Mass. Lacy Tandy, Cress, Texas; Will Tandy, Canadian, and Walter Tandy Abilene—Canadian Record.

The body was taken to Woodward, Okla., where funeral services were conducted, Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

THE FARM RELIEF BILL

After several years of discussion and political wrangling, the long looked for farm relief bill has at last become a law. Appropriations amounting to \$500,000,000 have been authorized for the purpose of carrying out its provisions. Rather elaborate machinery is to be set up for its execution, and a large sum will go to those who happen to get on the new federal payroll.

In fact, it is suspected that a good many farm leaders are as deeply concerned with the payroll feature of the bill as with any other of its provisions, and a rather lively scramble for jobs may be expected. Incidentally, the success of the plan will depend to a great extent upon the caliber of the men chosen to operate it.

That some measure of relief for the farmer will result, at least temporarily, seems probable. Whether the new law will be of lasting benefit is more doubtful. If it shall be made the means of building up another great political machine, it may in the end prove a hindrance to the farmer's prosperity, rather than a help.

However, for the present at least the country is committed to this experiment. Let us hope that the plan may be found to possess all the merits which its sponsors claim for it.

That said election shall be held in accordance with the general laws of the State of Texas, and shall be governed as nearly as may be by the laws governing and regulating general elections.

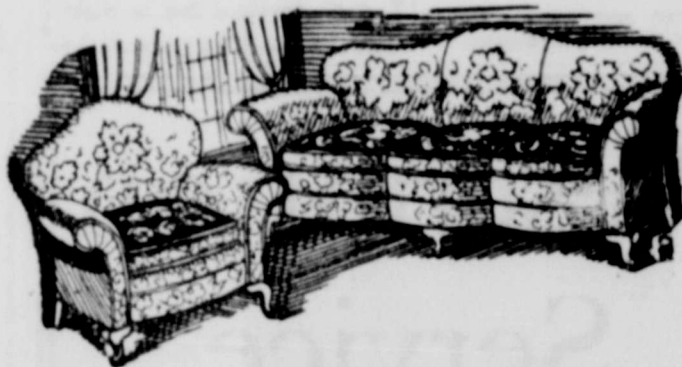

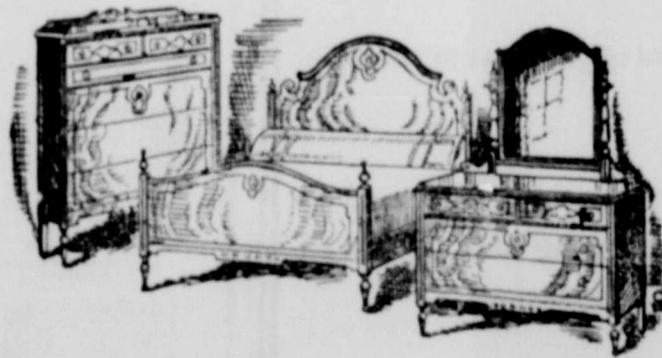

On Tuesday evening a large crowd of neighbors and friends gathered to charivari the newly weds at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Hurter. A most enjoyable evening was spent.

HELPING TO BUILD TEXAS

When the Knight dairy farm at Clarendon was burned, the barns were replaced and electrical equipment installed throughout, according to the Clarendon News, which says that every mechanical part of the work at the dairy from milking machines to the cooling system is now done by electricity. The Knight home also was completely electrified with a range, lights and other electrical appliances designed to lighten and brighten housework.

Hill County is grafting and top-working many native pecan trees, grafts being put in the main trunk and buds inserted in the limbs. By 1931, it is calculated the trees will be bearing paper-shell nuts and the prices received are expected, on present market quotations, to be three to four times those paid for the native pecans.

Fifteen hundred and sixty-six carloads of Texas grapefruit were shipped from the Rio Grande Valley during the season recently closed, a grain of 530 cars over the total last year. This year's Texas crop—grown mostly in Cameron and Hidalgo Counties with some orchards in Willacy—was valued at \$1,600,000. Grapefruit census shows 2,806,403 grapefruit trees in Texas and when they all come into bearing within the next few years, there will be a distribution problem to be met and overcome.

Texas is sixth in winter wheat production this year, according to Department of Agriculture estimates, which place the Texas crop at 31,813,000 bushels out of an expected total of 622,148,000 bushels, based on June 1 condition report of 79.6. The five-year average is 549,257,000 bushels.

Donley County has produced more than a half-million baby chicks and four-fifths of them have gone to Donley County farmers.

A steam power plant to cost \$1,500,000 or more is to be built on the Devils River near the Southern Pacific bridge, according to announcement from President E. B. Neiswander of the Central Power & Light Co. in the Del Rio News.

With a lot of interest the results from the Texas sunflower crop are being awaited. Probably 3,000 acres of land in Dawson Co. have been planted to the crop according to a Lamesa dispatch. One man made 600 to 700 pounds of seed per acre last year and sold it at 3c to 6c a pound, with the result that he announces he will plant 1,500 acres this year.

The Smith County blackberry crop will bring in \$200,000 this year, according to an estimate made after a survey of the 7,500 acres devoted to the crop.

The Nacogdoches canning plant, just completed by local capital at a cost of \$18,000 is starting operations. It will employ 75 workers and take care of the product of 200 acres of tomatoes in that vicinity.

CONTRACT FOR SALE OF PERRYTON MUNICIPAL WATER PLANT TO TEXAS-LOUISIANA POWER CO.

STATE OF TEXAS, COUNTY OF OCHILTREE. This contract of bargain and sale entered into this 9th day of July, 1929, by and between Texas-Louisiana Power Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Delaware, with permit to do business in the State of Texas and with its general office in the City of Fort Worth, Tarrant County, Texas, hereinafter referred to as the "Company," and the City of Perryton, Ochiltree County, Texas, hereinafter called the "City," the City acting herein by and through its Mayor and City Council, witnesseseth:

That the City of Perryton, through its Mayor and Councilmen, hereby agrees to sell to Texas-Louisiana Power Company, and to transfer and convey said Company, as going concern, free and clear of all debts, liens and encumbrances of every kind and character, the following described property:

All of the physical assets and property comprising the present and entire and complete water works plant and distribution system, together with such additions and betterments as may be made by the City before the consummation of this contract, together with all leases, equipment, structures, real estate, buildings, air compressors, pumps, motors, water tank, source of supply, pipes, valves, meters, tools, operating supplies, easements and right-of-way contracts, and all property used or useful in connection with said water works plant and distribution system, whether mentioned herein or not, save and except fire hydrants.

Texas-Louisiana Power Company hereby agrees and binds itself to buy the above described property and pay therefor the sum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars, payable as the City of Perryton may elect, such election to be made and the Company notified prior to the holding of the election by the qualified voters of the City as hereinafter set out.

The rates to be charged for water service by the said Company, subject to the powers of present and future regulatory bodies created by law will be in accordance with the schedule attached and marked Exhibit "A".

The City agrees that any and all of said property shall be conveyed with full warranties of title and free and clear of all liens and encumbrances. The City shall deliver to the Company abstracts of title properly certified to covering all real estate above described, and shall also furnish to the Company proof that there are no chattel mortgages outstanding on any of the above described personal property. The City agrees to make title to all the

above described property good and merchantable and agrees to execute all instruments of conveyance and assignment that may be found desirable completely to consummate this contract.

It is understood and agreed that this contract is subject to the holding of an election by the qualified voters of the City of Perryton, and their approval of the sale as provided by law and the granting to the Company by the City of a franchise for the operation of the said water works and distribution system in the City of Perryton, for a period of at least fifty (50) years.

This contract is executed in duplicate, each party hereto receiving an original.

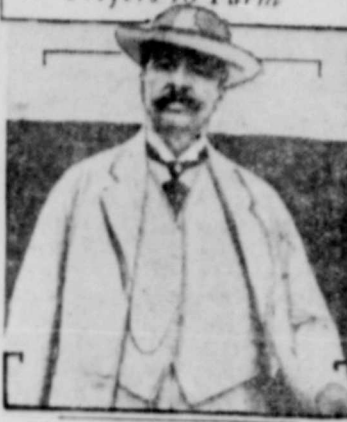

ing, and went to a front window where a rocker stood waiting. I love to watch morning passers, while my morning paper is coming.

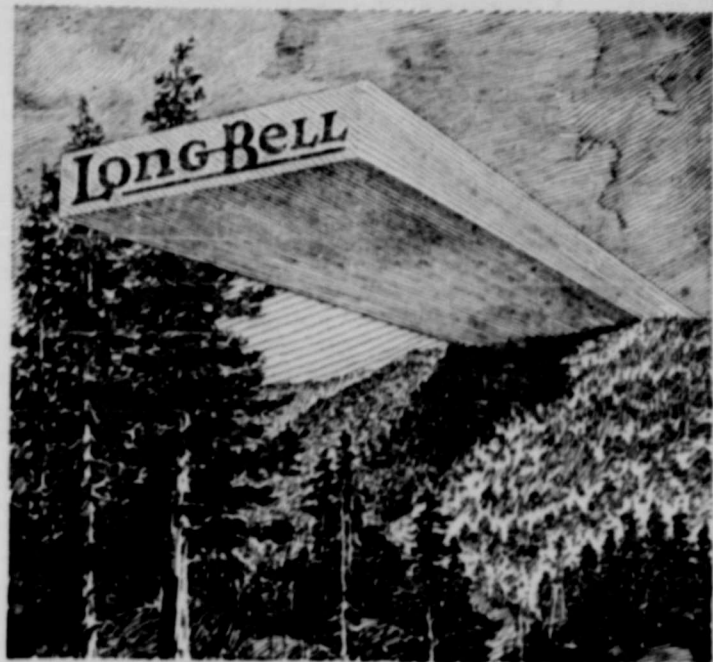

Had I been fully dressed, I might have frightened him by rushing out and seizing the darling in my arms. Do we grown-ups get a "kick" out of the worthy deeds we do for others, if any? Sometimes I have to study awhile, before I can recall any good deed I have done lately. I have not quite become "as one of these."

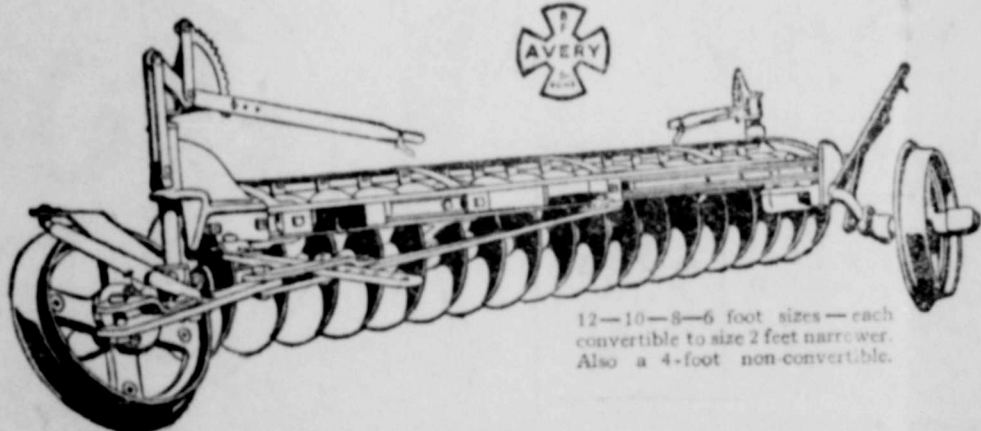

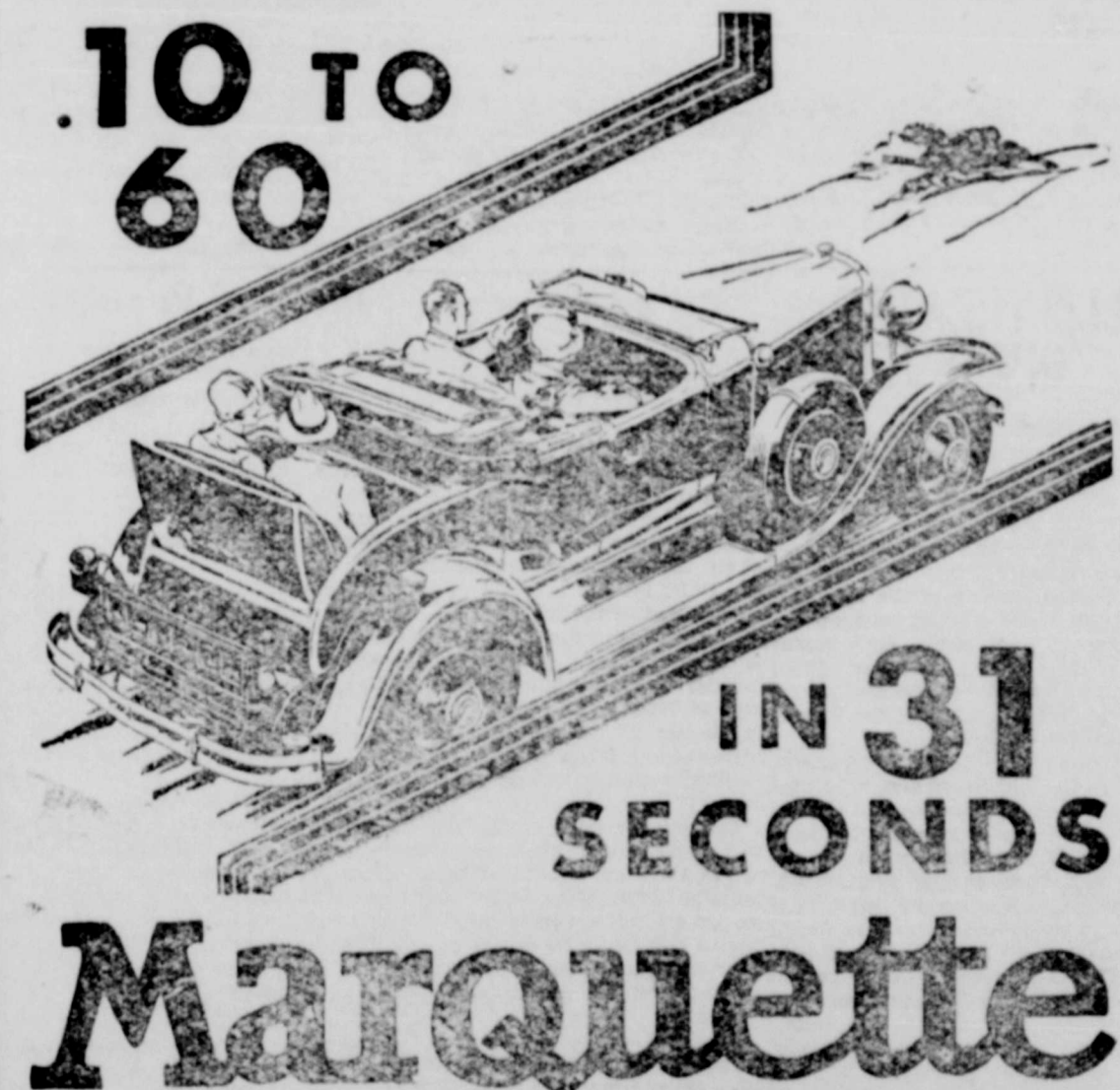
