## Smith Deplores Injection Of Religion Into Fight Tales Of Horror Echo From Storm Stricken Territory

### Hurricane Leaves Pitiable Plights In Florida Areas

Picture of Indescribable  
Horror Is Drawn By Red  
Cross Worker; Bodies  
Are Stacked In Piles.

DEATH TOLL ESTIMATED  
BETWEEN 700 AND 800

Unless Bodies Are Buried  
Within 48 Hours May Use  
Airlanes to Sprinkle  
Lime Over Territory.

(By Associated Press)  
WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., Sept. 20.—A death toll of between 700 and 800 persons, mostly in the Lake Okechobee-Everglades region of Florida, was estimated today by Red Cross officials to have been taken by last Sunday's disastrous tropical hurricane which, after sweeping over the West Indies, wreaked destruction in the thickly populated Palm Beach county of that state.

Hundreds of Bodies Unburied  
The menace of disease arose as hundreds of bodies lay unburied while relief workers worked day and night to alleviate conditions. Property damage estimates ranged from \$10,000,000 to \$75,000,000 for the county, while it was reported not more than five per cent of the buildings in the section came through the hurricane without damage.

Chairman Howard W. Smith, of the Palm Beach county Red Cross committee, declared that virtually all the dead are in the Everglades district, around Pahokee, South Bay and Canal Point. Previously a death list of 600 had been estimated in the county.

Conditions Growing Worse  
Declaring that health conditions are growing worse every minute, he said it might be necessary to attempt to try to bury the bodies of the dead.

Chief of Plainview, W. S. Clark, said on the Sunday, that the defense for the county was being handled by the county attorney, J. H. Bland.

Raymond Bailey and August Frost, youthful Lubbock boys, were found not guilty of theft by a jury in Lubbock county court yesterday afternoon.

The charges grew out of the theft of \$27 from a station filling station several weeks ago. A third companion of the two boys on trial, Robert Frost, pleaded guilty to the theft of the money earlier this week in the county court. He was fined \$5 and costs and sentenced to 120 days in the county jail.

Fleeting Ignorance of Theft  
The two boys on trial yesterday stated that they knew nothing of the theft before or after it happened. The youthful defendants were released on bond.

### HAZING RESULTS IN PROBATION OF FOUR

The students, two of whom were reported members of the football squad, were said to have given a number of freshmen an exceedingly warm reception to the institution early this week.

### Tech First Year Students Arrive For Orientation

More Than 700 Expected To  
Gather At Convocation  
This Morning; Officials  
Will Talk In Gym.

Lubbock was littered last night with green-capped freshmen as a deluge of the first-year Tech students from every section of the state as well as near-by states swarmed the city in preparation for the opening of the Tech freshman orientation at 10 o'clock this morning.

With the official inauguration of the fourth term of Texas Technological college this morning, prospects for the coming term point to the greatest year in the history of the institution. That the 1928 freshman class will be near or above the 1,000 mark was indicated by the fact that more than 700 advancement registrations have been made by potential fish of the school.

Banner Year Inevitable  
A banner year seems inevitable for the school as prospects for a larger enrollment are coupled with the new buildings, greater facilities, equipment, more efficient bus lines operations and a larger faculty.

Freshmen became thicker last night with the arrival of each additional bus or train. In the meantime scores of the first year students were being housed in the city.

### Young Is Found Guilty Of Bigamy

First Wife Breaks Into Hysterics and Mother Denounces Jury As Verdict Is Announced; To Appeal

Clint Young, 25-years-old, Smith county, defendant on trial in 9th district court charged with bigamy, was found guilty by a jury yesterday afternoon and sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary.

Verdict Brings Scenes  
Shattering the tense silence which preceded the reading of the verdict, the frail-looking youthful first wife of the defendant burst into hysterical screaming and crying which ended in a faint of exhaustion that required medical aid to revive her.

Breaking down under the realization of the "guilty" verdict the aged gray-haired mother of the young defendant also began to cry hysterically, denouncing violently the jury for what she termed the injustice in sentencing her son to the penitentiary.

Defendant Is Calm  
Young received the news of his sentence calmly, trying vainly to

### How the Hurricane Traced Its Path Across the Islands



The swath of death and destruction cut by the hurricane that swept Porto Rico, the Bahamas and struck the Florida east coast with unabated fury is graphically shown in the map above. In devastated Porto Rico, hundreds were killed, half the population is homeless and 100,000 people face the danger of famine. Warnings of the storm had been broadcast and therefore Jupiter, West Palm Beach and other Florida points dotting the east coast down to Fort Lauderdale, were ready for the gale. Miami, on the edge of the storm, was lashed by the hurricane, but was reported to have emerged without serious damage.

### Offers Are Many For Airport Site

Movement for Lubbock's proposed municipal airport developed into definite proportions last night with the announcement of George E. Benson, chairman of the airport committee of the Board of City Development, that between fifteen and twenty sites had been offered as a site for the field.

The sites almost completely surround the city, extending in every direction, Mr. Benson said. He stated that each of the sites would be given a careful consideration before a decision was made.

Select Best Obtainable  
With such a wealth of sites already offered and with additional ones coming in every day a suitable site from every standpoint should be selected, he said.

After a selection is made by the airport committee, the site will be recommended to the Board of City Development. The next step in the planning of the airport is a survey of the site to be selected.

### Democratic Nominee Scores Methods Employed by G. O. P. And Opposition In Campaign; Blames Ku Klux Klan

Declares Party Is Using Ill  
Means to Win Presi-  
dency; Cites Records Of  
Offices In New York.

STATMENTS GREETED  
WITH WILD APPLAUSE

Denounces Practices of Ku  
Klux and Blazing Cross  
In Distributing Tons Of  
Vile Literature In U. S.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 20. (AP)—Carrying his fight for the presidency into the border state of Oklahoma, which is torn by political strife, Governor Smith tonight deplored the injection of the religious issue and "whispering" methods into the campaign, defended his record as chief executive of New York, and urged the voters of the state to make their choice in the November election solely on the ground of what best promotes the interest and welfare of the republic.

Assaults Mrs. Willbrandt  
In a speech prepared for delivery here in the coliseum, which has a seating capacity of about 10,000, the democratic nominee directed an attack at former Senator Owen of the state, who has bolted the democratic party to support Herbert Hoover, assailed Mrs. Mabel Walker Willbrandt, assistant attorney general, as a "dishonest" campaigner in behalf of Mr. Hoover, and made specific reference to the Ku Klux Klan, whose members, he said, have the effrontery to refer to themselves as 100 percent Americans.

The New York Governor, in his advance draft, did not refer to the Rev. John Roach Straton, of New York, one of his most outspoken critics, for whom a place on the platform had been reserved. Friends of Smith said he probably would have something to say extemporaneously about the Baptist clergyman, particularly if he attempted to challenge him to debate.

Believes G. O. P. Is Guilty  
In condemning some of the campaign methods used against him, Governor Smith declared there was "abundant reason for believing that republicans high in the councils of the party have commenced a large part of the present campaign if they have not actually promoted it."

"They may, through official spokesmen," he added, "disclaim as much as they please the responsibility for dragging into a national campaign the question of religion, something that according

## Smith Carries Fight For Victory Into Oklahoma Territory; Makes Attack On Methods of Opposition

to our Constitution, our history and our traditions has no part in any campaign for elective public office.

The democratic nominee rebuked Mrs. Willibrand particularly for her appeal to Methodists in Oklahoma to take a stand against his candidacy, and asserted that "by silence after such a speech the only inference one can draw is that the administration approved such political tactics."

### Presents Question

"What would the effect be upon these same people if a prominent official of the government of the state of New York, under the suggestion of a gathering of the pastors of my church that they do for me what Mrs. Willibrand suggests be done for Hoover? The democratic nominee inquired.

"It is dishonest campaigning. It is un-American. It is out of line with the whole tradition and history of this government, and to my way of thinking, is in itself sufficient to hold us up to the scorn of the thinking people of our nation."

Doesn't Petition Catholic Vote. Then, in his prepared advance from which he was expected to deviate somewhat in delivery, Governor Smith made this declaration: "I have emphatically declared that I do not wish any member of my faith in any part of the United States to vote for me on any religious grounds. I want them to vote for me only when in their hearts and conscience they become convinced that my election will promote the best interests of our country."

By the same token, I cannot refrain from saying that any person who votes against me simply because of my religion is not, in my way of thinking, a good citizen."

### Threats Cheer His Arrival

The democratic standard bearer, who was acclaimed by a cheering throng on his arrival today, many in the crowd having come from various sections of Oklahoma, and nearby states for the occasion, trained his guns on former Senator Owen at the outset of his prepared address. He challenged the former Oklahoma senator "and all his kind" to point to a single instance in his public record "upon which to base their case."

"The fact is they have searched and searched in vain for the slightest evidence of improper partisanship or conduct. They find no such thing. It did not exist."

"And in the face of this Senator Owen and his kind have the nerve and effrontery not to charge but merely to insinuate some evil which they are afraid to call 'damnable'."

Assessing that Owen and his kind are not sincere, Smith declared that "they know that this Tammany cry is an attempt to drag a red herring across the trail."

Strides At Ku Klux. The nominee said that "one he widely circulated, particularly through the southern part of the country," was that as governor he had appointed practically no one to office except Catholics. He then reviewed his appointments to show that this was not the case.

Referring to the Ku Klux Klan, the New York Governor said the order breathes "into the hearts and souls" of its members "hateful millions of their fellow countrymen because of their religious belief."

The text of the speech Governor Smith prepared for delivery here tonight follows in part:

"Our country has achieved its greatest growth and become a model for the nations of the world under a system of party government. It would be difficult to predict what might be the evil consequences if that system were discarded. If it is to survive, campaigns for the presidency must be fought out on issues really affecting the welfare and well being and future growth of the country. In a presidential campaign there should be but two considerations before the electorate; the platform of the party and the ability of the candidate to make it effective."

"In this campaign an effort has been made to distract the attention of the electorate from these two considerations and to fasten it on malicious and un-American propaganda."

Seems Whispering Campaign. "I shall tonight discuss and denounce that wicked attempt. I shall speak openly on the things about which people have been whispering to you."

"A former senator from your own state, a member of my own party, has deserted the party which honored him, upon the pretense, as he states it, that because I am a member of Tammany Hall, I am not entitled to your support for the high office for which I have been nominated. Tonight, I challenge the truth and sincerity of that pretense. I brand it as false in fact. I denounce it as a subterfuge to cover treason to the fundamentals of Jeffersonian democracy and of American liberty. What Mr. Owen personally thinks is of no account in this campaign. He has, however, raised an issue with respect to my record, with which I shall deal tonight without mincing words. I know what lies behind this pretense of Senator Owen and his kind, and I shall take that into account."

"I could tax your patience for the rest of this evening with similar expressions from men and women who are the leaders of thought and affairs in the state of New York, independent in politics, most of them never affiliated with any political organization."

Knows What Is Fact. "I know what lies behind all this and I shall tell you. I specifically refer to the question of my religion. Ordinarily that word should never have been used in a political campaign. The necessity for using it is forced on me by Senator Owen."

and his kind, and I felt that at least once in this campaign, I, as the candidate of the democratic party, owe it to the people of this country to discuss frankly and openly with them this attempt of Senator Owen and the forces behind him to inject bigotry, hatred, intolerance and un-American sectarian division into a campaign that should be an intelligent debate of the important issues which confront the American people."

### New York Knows Him

"In New York I would not have to discuss it. The people know me. But in view of the vast amount of literature anonymously circulated throughout the country, the cost of which must run into hundreds of thousands of dollars, I owe it to my country and my party to bring it out into the open. There is a well founded belief that the major portion of this publication, at least, is being financed through political channels."

"I can think of no greater disaster to this country than to have the voters of it divide upon religious lines. It is contrary to the spirit, not only of the Declaration of Independence, but of the Constitution itself. During all of our national life, we have prided ourselves throughout the world on the declaration of fundamental American truth that all men are created equal."

"Our forefathers in their wisdom, seeing the danger to the country of division on religious issues, wrote into the Constitution of the United States in no uncertain words the declaration that no religious test shall ever be applied for public office; and it is a sad thing in 1928 in view of the countless billions of dollars that we have poured into the cause of public education, to see some American citizens proclaiming themselves 100 per cent American and in the document that makes that proclamation suggesting that I be defeated for the presidency because of my religious belief."

Grand Dragon In Fight. "The grand dragon of the Realm of Arkansas, writing to a citizen of that state, urges my defeat because I am a Catholic and in the letter suggests to the man, who happened to be a delegate to the democratic convention, that by voting against me he will be upholding American ideals and institutions as established by our forefathers."

"The grand dragon that thus advised a delegate to the National convention to vote against me because of my religion is a member of an order known as the Ku Klux Klan, who have the effrontery to refer to themselves as 100 per cent Americans. Yet, totally ignorant of the history and traditions of this country and its institutions, and in the name of Americanism they breathe into the hearts and souls of their members hatred of millions of their fellow countrymen because of their religious belief."

Denounces Blasphemous Cross. "Nothing could be so out of line with the spirit of America. Nothing could be so foreign to the teachings of Jefferson; nothing could be so contradictory to our whole history; nothing could be so false to the teachings of our divine Lord Himself. The wild, mad, un-Christian mockery of the use of the blasphemous cross, the cross upon which Christ died, as a symbol to instill into the hearts of men a hatred of their brethren, while Christ preached for the love and brotherhood of man."

"I fully appreciate that here and there, in a great country like ours, there are to be found some ignorant or misguided people, and under ordinary circumstances, it might be well to be charitable and make full and due allowance for them. But this campaign, so far advanced, discloses such activity on their part as to constitute in my opinion a menace—not alone to the party—but to the country itself."

No Objection to Record Fight. "I would have no objection to anybody finding fault with my public record, or to anybody circulating the whole United States, provided he would tell the truth. But no decent, right-minded, upstanding American citizen can for a moment, countenance the shower of lying statements, with no basis in fact, that have been reduced to printed matter and sent broadcast through the mails of this country."

"One lie widely circulated, particularly through the southern part of the country, is that during my governorship I appointed practically nobody to office but members of my own church."

Cites Appointments. "What are the facts? On investigation, I find that in the cabinet of the governor at 14 men. Three of the 14 are Catholics, 10 Protestants, and one of Jewish faith. In the various bureaus and divisions of the cabinet offices the governor appointed 26 people. Twelve of them are Catholics and 14 of them are Protestants; and appointed by the governor, make a total of 197 appointments, of which 28 were Catholics, 104 were Protestants, 12 were Jewish and four I could not find out about."

What he says, however, has been seized upon by the enemies of the democratic party and the ages of progressive government. They have thus made my record an issue in this campaign. I do not hesitate to meet that issue. My record is one of which I am justly proud and it needs no defense. It is one upon

which I am justified in asking your support. For the present, let us examine the record upon which has been cast the light of pitiless publicity for a quarter of a century. I am willing to submit it to you and to the people of this country with complete confidence.

"Has there been one flaw in my record, or one scandal of any kind connected with my administration that gives meaning to this cry of Tammy rule?"

Republicans Strong Against Him. "The republican party will leave no stone unturned to defeat me. I have reduced their organization in the state of New York to an empty shell. At the present time sixty millions of dollars of public improvements are in progress in my state. If there was anything wrong or out of the way does it not strike you, as men and women of common sense, that the republican party in New York would leave no stone unturned to bring it to light?"

One scandal connected with my administration would do more to help out the republican national committee in its campaign against me than all the millions of dollars now being spent by them in malicious propaganda. Unfortunately for them they cannot find it, because the truth is not there. I challenge Senator Owen and all his kind to point to one single flaw upon which they can rest their case. But they won't find it. They won't try to find it, because I know what lies behind all this and I will tell you before I sit down tonight."

Cites Statements. "Take the statement of a man who has not supported me for the governorship, Charles Evans Hughes, a statement not made for political purposes, but in presenting me to the bar association of New York City. He described me as 'one who represents to us the expert in government and I might say a master in the science of politics.' He said of me 'the title that he holds is the proudest title that any American can hold, because it is a title to the esteem and affection of his fellow citizens.'"

Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, in conferring upon me an honorary degree, stated that I was alert, effective, public spirited and courageous, constantly speaking the true voice of the people."

"I have appointed a large number of judges of all our courts, as well as a large number of county officers, for the purpose of filling vacancies. They total in number 177, of which 64 were Catholics, 90 were Protestants, 11 were Jewish and 12 of the officials I was unable to find any thing about so far as their religion was concerned. This is a complete answer to the false, misleading, and, if I may be permitted the use of the harsher word, lying statements that have found their way through a large part of this country in the form of printed matter."

Sees Danger for Country. "If the American people are willing to sit silently by and see large amounts of money secretly poured into false and misleading propaganda for political purposes, I repeat that I see in this not only a danger to the party, but a danger to the country."

To such depths as this insidious manner of campaign sunk that the little children in our public schools are being made the vehicles for the carrying of false and misleading propaganda. A Cedar Rapids, Iowa, public prints tell us that a number of school girls asked their parents if it were true that there would be another war if Smith was elected. When questioned by their parents as to how they came to ask

such questions, one of the girls said: "We were told at school that William started the war in 1917, and if Governor Smith were elected, he would start another war."

Plays Baptist Publication. "As contemptible as anything could possibly be is an article on the very front page of a publication devoted to the doings of a church wherein the gospel of Christ is preached. I refer to the Ashland Avenue Baptist, a publication coming from Lexington, Ky., in which a bitter and cruel attack is made upon me personally and is so ridiculous that ordinarily no attention should be paid to it. It speaks of my driving an automobile down Broadway at the rate of 50 miles an hour and specifically states I was driving the car myself while intoxicated. Everybody who knows me, knows full well I do not know how to drive an automobile, that I never tried it. As for the rest of the contemptible, lying statement, it is as false as this part."

Ferris Presides. Scott Ferris, Democratic National committeeman, presiding, called the attention of the crowd to the fact that he had arrived at the hall. He introduced Governor Johnson, who welcomed the presidential nominee to the state.

The crowd went wild when Smith showed up. Both bands played "The Sidewalks of New York," and the cheering was deafening.

Smith brought the crowd to its feet, cheering, when he said there were "plenty of smart republicans in New York who are trying to find some flaw in his record," and if they had been able to find anything wrong, former Senator Owen "wouldn't have to be talking about me."

Wild Outburst. There was another wild outburst when Smith declared that the country would be successful if it divided on sectarian lines, and when Smith branded as a lie the charge that he favored Catholics in making state appointments, there were cries of "ham, ham," referring to the Baptist minister who was on the stage with Dr. John Kosch Stratton, of New York, and a few shouts for "where's Stratton?"

The demonstration grew in volume, but Smith succeeded in waving it down, as he told those interrupting him that they were "talking up radio time."

At the end of his speech, Governor Smith, apparently attempting to get under the wire with the radio, omitted large chunks of his speech. While he assailed Mrs. Willibrand, he did not follow text where he accused her of "dishonest" campaigning against him, and left this out entirely.

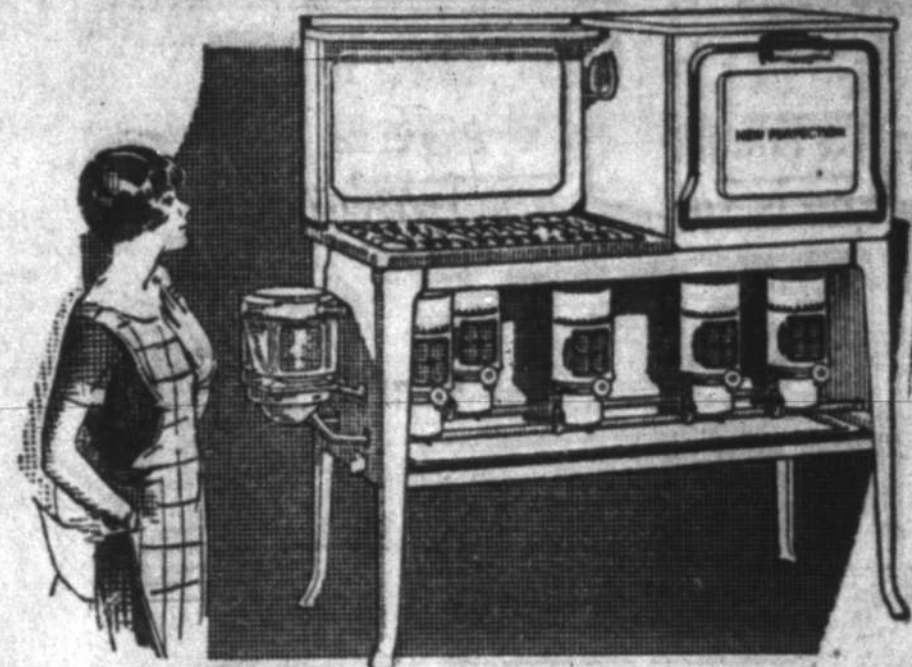

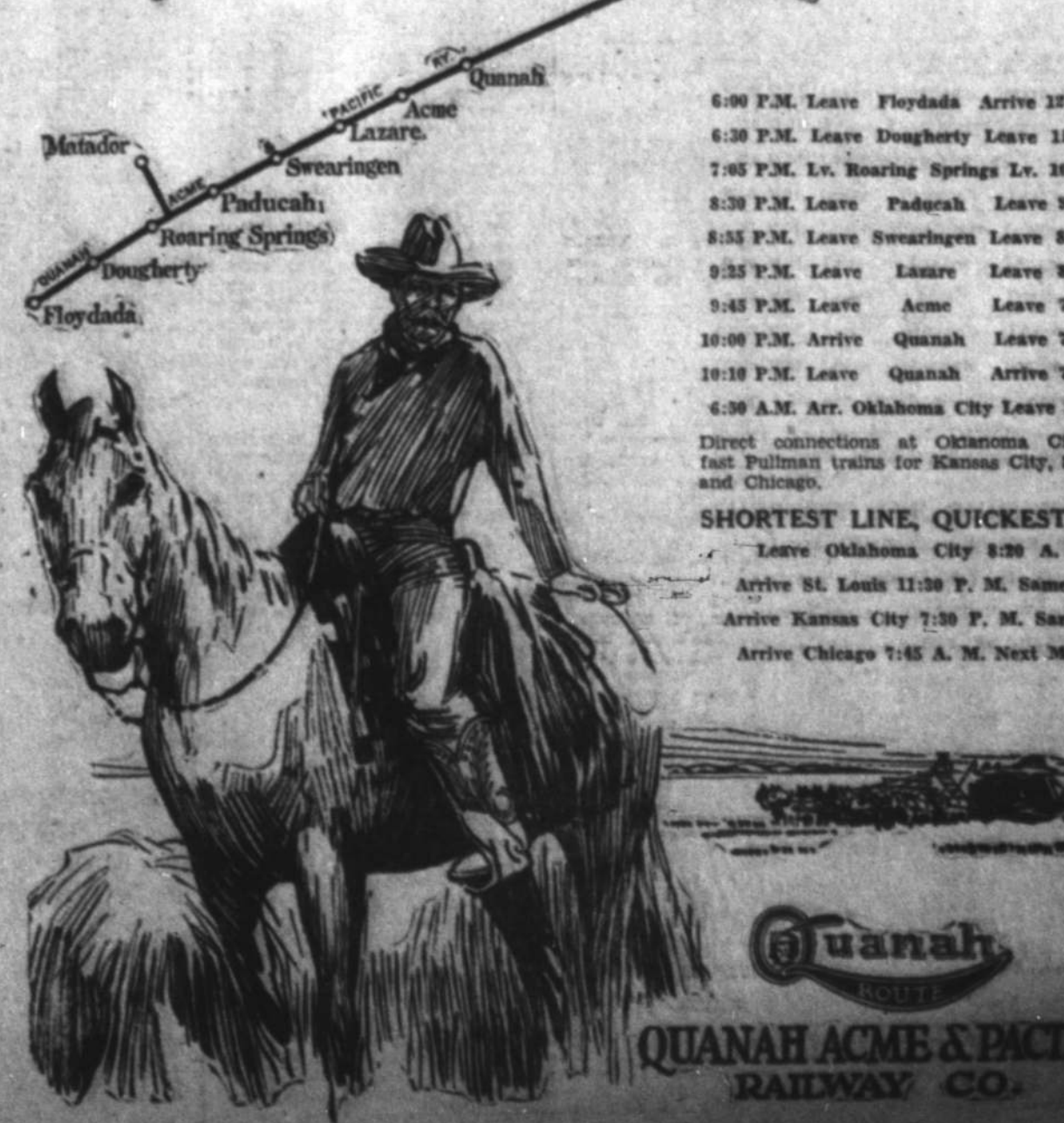

As it was, by dividing the day's spoils in two bitterly contested games, the St. Louis club kept a lead of two games over the Giants. The rivals met again Saturday, but with only nine games remaining for each club it appeared tonight anything but a promising chase for the fighting young men of McGraw.

Defeat in the second game was a heart breaker for the old campaigner Alexander, who was out pitching his youthful rival, Carl Hubbell, and seemingly headed for victory until a crack in the Cardinals defense paved the way for the big Coast rally in the eighth.

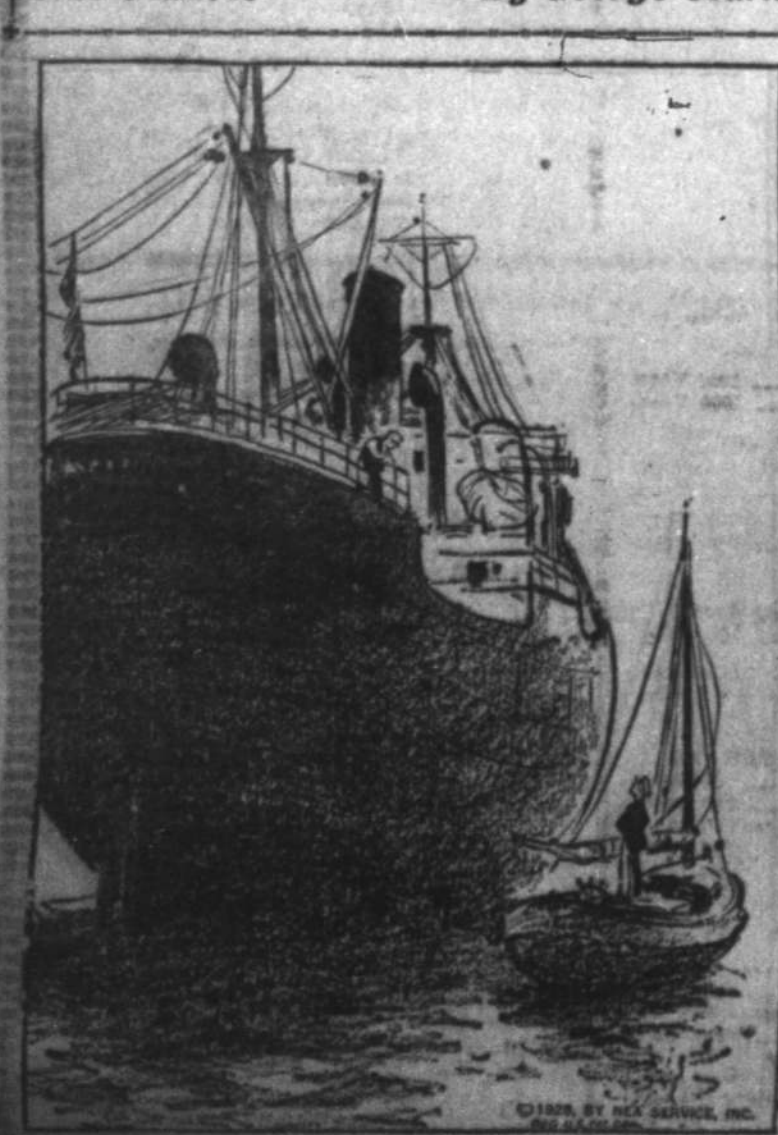

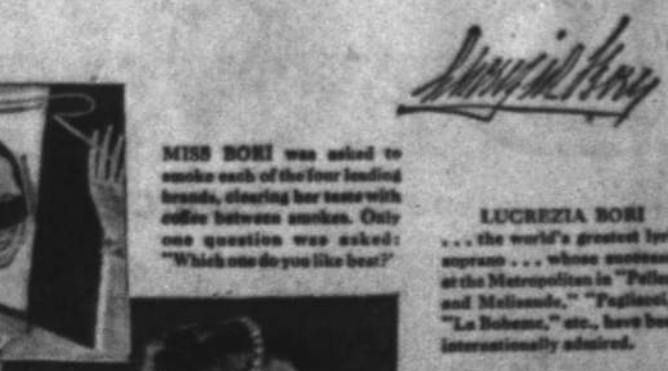

## THE CAUSE FOR PROSPERITY

Secretary Mellon has just issued an optimistic business review, which will be quoted many times during the next six weeks in support of "republican prosperity." The secretary says that conditions over the country as a whole are prosperous, but that there are a few spots which are "suffering from natural causes."

Where prosperity reigns, it is due to the republican administration. Where times are hard it is due to "natural causes," in the opinion of Mr. Mellon. He further points out that "There is nothing unfavorable in prospect for the farmers. The year 1928 should be a good one for agriculture. Of course, there are farmers who never made a profit and others who make money every year. I can not foresee the effect of the many economic laws of the world, but at present there is certainly no cause for worry."

If farmers over the country are prosperous, it is due entirely to what the secretary calls "natural causes," that is, it is due to good seasons, fair markets and honest labor by the producers. The republican party has done nothing to promote farm prosperity except to talk about it, and there is not the remotest probability that the republican party expects to do anything about it if Hoover is elected in November. The farmer must depend upon "natural causes."

As a matter of fact, most of the present national prosperity is due to natural causes, the only exceptions being found in some of the industries which have had specific assistance through the republican tariff. The same natural causes which have brought about prosperity this year will bring it about again next year, regardless of the political party that may be in power at Washington.

About 98 per cent of the talk about "republican prosperity" is bunk.

## TEXAS WOMEN IN INDUSTRY

Deplorable conditions are indicated in the recent report of the state labor department which shows that more than half the women and girls employed in industry in Texas are working for wages insufficient "To provide the minimum requirements of a decent existence."

The survey made by the department covers every branch of industry, and shows that 44 per cent of the women and girls employed in industrial establishments earn as much as \$15 a week as the minimum upon which any woman depending upon her own resources can live.

Declaring this condition "grave," Labor Commissioner Charles McKeamy recommended the enactment of a workable minimum wage law for women and children designed to remedy existing conditions and to assure living wage for all workers.

The conditions were revealed in inspections made in 3474 establishments employing 77,286 workers, of which 43,583 were men, 33,504 women and 199 children under 15 years of age. Sixty-five per cent of the men reporting were found to be receiving \$15 per week or over.

According to the report, printing and publishing concerns have the best record in the matter of wages and hours. Lowest average wages were being paid by laundries, and the longest hours were exacted in hotels and restaurants.

A special survey of the textile mill industry revealed that the 26 mills reporting employ 5286 workers and operate on an average schedule of 55 hours a week paying men an average weekly wage of \$19 and women \$13.50. In 284 instances wives were found to be employed in the mills along with their husbands and 2228 children under 15 years of age were working. Four hundred and nineteen families were renting from others, and only 114 families owned their own homes. It was found, however, that in practically all mill villages the rent houses are kept in good repair, water and lights furnished free and reasonable rents deducted from the employees' wages.

The labor department has filed 35 com-

plaints for violations of various labor laws and of this number 19 have resulted in convictions, six have been dismissed and 10 are still pending. In addition to the cases prosecuted, the labor department has issued scores of formal notices that infractions of the labor laws must cease, and that employers must install proper guarding of machinery, ventilation of work rooms and elimination of all hazards possible.

The next legislature will be asked to take some action to remedy labor conditions, especially those affecting the women and girl workers. Texas will never permit such conditions as the labor department has outlined to continue, and the demand for the necessary changes will come from every section of the state.

## EQUALITY OF OPPORTUNITY DEMANDED

"We believe in the liberal support of our institutions of higher learning," reads the foreword to the platform plank of the Texas democrats relative to the public schools and institutions of higher learning. "Their existence and support by the state encourages our youth to seek the highest educational advantages and constantly enriches society with a body of young men and women whose minds have been trained for leadership and service in public activities and the vocations of private life. We recognize the value of higher educational institutions and their necessity for the education and training of our youth."

This bid of advice was given to the lawmakers: "We encourage the legislature to adequately support and maintain these institutions. We believe that their activities should be co-ordinated to the end that the greatest value possible shall be secured for the money expended in their support."

In other words, liberal appropriations should be made by the lawmakers. There is another paragraph in the plank that is certain to provoke opposition in certain circles.

"We advocate the enactment of legislation which will eliminate duplication of effort in these institutions of higher learning—an acreage that all local funds be deposited in the state general revenue fund."

This closing demand will cripple main institutions of higher learning in Texas, according to those familiar with conditions and who know the cost of conducting institutions of higher learning.

Duplication of effort should be eliminated. It costs the people of Texas a huge sum every year. Public schools were not overlooked by the platform makers at Dallas. This is the declaration of policy advised by the state convention:

"We recommend that the stabilized minimum per capita school apportionment of \$15.00 be continued and that an adequate appropriation of an equalization fund to aid rural schools be provided. We further recommend that the provisions of law be continued by the 41st Legislature to guarantee the payment of tuition of children from rural districts while attending high schools in other districts."

It was the viewpoint of the platform makers that public education is a problem of statewide nature and not a local problem. Therefore, the following recommendation was made to the lawmakers of the 41st legislature:

"The inequality in educational opportunities existing between children living in rural communities and those living in cities and towns should be corrected as nearly as practicable. We hold that public education is not a district problem nor is it a county problem, but that it is a problem of statewide nature. Our educational system should be made to afford an equality of educational opportunities between children living in rural communities and those residing in cities and towns."

There was no side-stepping on the part of the platform makers. They had an answer to face and faced it boldly. Hence their demand for trained and developed brains for all the children of all the people in the rural districts as well as in the cities and towns of the Lone Star commonwealth.

## SMUGGLERS

Dr. J. M. Doran, federal prohibition commissioner, who read a paper before the international congress against alcoholism in Antwerp, said that there are now "At least 25 ports in foreign countries used almost exclusively as bases for smuggling liquor into the United States."

That international liquor smuggling has reached enormous proportions nearly everywhere well-informed persons know. In addition to the 25 ports where liquor smuggling is carried on "almost exclusively," there probably are many others from which liquor ships set sail for American waters on ports close to the American mainland from which it is comparatively easy to smuggle contraband liquor into the United States. Dr. Doran proposes that the foreign governments concerned require that only authenticated landing certificates be produced by ship masters, showing that liquor exported has been actually unloaded in the port for which the vessel cleared. He continued:

"The earnest efforts of the United States to enforce its laws make it not inappropriate to suggest that other nations co-operate with the United States to combat the international illicit traffic in liquor."

## YOUR HEALTH

Any factor that causes unusual wear and tear on the human tissues may have a secondary effect on the tissues of the heart. These tissues are then unable to withstand the strains of ordinary life.

The heart may be incapacitated from birth due to some deficiency in its development before the child is born.

The most common cause of heart disease in children and in young adults is infection, particularly with the germs that attack the tonsils and adenoids. Other secondary results of such infections are rheumatism and St. Vitus' dance.

While such infectious diseases as diphtheria, influenza, scarlet fever and measles may lead to unusual circulation of bacteria or poisons, and possible secondary inflammation of the heart, an attack of acute rheumatism or St. Vitus' dance or chronic attacks of tonsillitis are far more likely to be followed by or associated with heart disease.

Another common cause of diseases of the heart is syphilis. This is a potent source of disease of the whole system of blood vessels. In the presence has been associated with hardening of the arteries, inflammation of the linings of the blood vessels, the appearance of clots in the blood stream, and particularly the presence of weak spots in the blood-vessel walls.

These weak spots cannot stand the pressure of the blood stream and gradually give way. The resulting dilated spot in the blood vessel wall is called an aneurism.

Old age is not infrequently associated with weakness and failure of the heart. The human body begins to wear out slowly after passing the middle milestone.

Changes develop in the walls of the arteries and in the pressure of the circulating blood, with resultant inequalities of nutrition and stress. These soon manifest themselves in disordered action of the heart.

### WILL C. BROWN HAS FINE

Will C. Brown, of the Johnson community informed us this week that he had one of the best prospects for an all around crop in his life, and up to that time the worms or other insects were not bothering to any precipitate degree. He had just returned from a journey to central and east Texas, and said that while their cotton stalks were larger, there were several inches between the bolls, form and blooms, and was not half as closely jointed as the Terry county crop. After spending a week or two there, he could see a vast difference in farming in that section and this. He reports that his cotton is bunched and lapping in the middles, while the cotton further east looks spindly and uncertain.

He also reports that his corn was looking as black as a cloud, and the ears were hanging off like a cave-man's club. He informed us that he had never seen better corn in the Caudoupe river bottoms than we have right here in Terry county on our sandy soils. He also remarked that our best cotton was on the sandy soils, and the only question for the future was whether these soils, and he thinks deep plowing and keeping the knives out of it till it gets a good start will partially solve this disadvantage any way.

While it is not too late for worms, by any means, not a great portion of our territory is affected yet, but a close watch should be kept on the crop, for it would be a huge crime for our present prospects to be wiped out in a few days. Both the farmer and the business man are now praying as never before for continued dry weather in order that the worms may better be held in check.

Tom Bingham has just returned from a visit to relatives at Rule in Haskell county and reports that the boll worms are working havoc in that section and it could be just possible that they will also make their appearance in this section.—Terry County Herald.

### Heavy Bonds Set On Young Slayers

Beeville Barbers Charged In Killing of Man In Hospital Bed Unable to Make \$22,500 Bonds.

(By Associated Press)  
CORPUS CHRISTI, Sept. 20.—Robert Lohringer and Ralph Whitenton, Beeville barbers charged with the hospital slaying of E. C. Young, filling station operator, remained in jail here tonight unable to furnish bonds of \$15,000 and \$7,500, respectively. Young was shot to death as he lay on a hospital bed after an operation.

A writ of habeas corpus was granted Lohringer in district court at Sinton today and his bond set at \$15,000; bond for Whitenton, whose case was agreed bailable, was fixed at \$7,500.

Mrs. Young, wife of the slain man, testified at the habeas corpus hearing that improper relations between her husband and Mrs. Lohringer led to the killing. She said she asked Lohringer whether he intended killing Young and that he answered in the affirmative. She said she pleaded for her husband's life but that Lohringer insisted "I am going to kill him the first time I lay eyes on him."

Dr. H. R. Giles, who operated on Young three days before he was killed, declared in the hearing that the patient was "as helpless as a baby."

Miss Gladys Houser, Mrs. Lynette Hayes and Miss Annie Sugarc, attendants of the sanitarium where Young died, testified they saw Lohringer and Whitenton enter Young's room.

The second purported wife of the defendant, Thelma Lawson, former Plainview nurse, was not in the courtroom at the time the verdict was returned.

Testimony in the case brought out that Young was married to his first wife in 1925 at Florida and to his second in Lubbock in 1927 without obtaining a divorce. He has lived with his first wife since that time.

Will Be Appealed  
Fred Pearce, counsel for the defense, said late yesterday that the case would be appealed. He said that a motion for a re-hearing of the case would be made to the court this afternoon.

It was the theory of the defense in the trial that Young, who was with Thelma Lawson for the first time, was too drunk to know what he was doing, and that, medicine given to him by the Plainview nurse to sober him proved as a drug, making him unconscious of his actions.

The two were married in the courthouse here in December, 1927, evidence showed.

Second Wife Testifies  
Thelma Lawson took the stand for the state and testified that Young told her that he had been divorced from his first wife before the second marriage ceremony was performed.

Arguments were finished about three o'clock yesterday afternoon. The verdict was returned about 4:30 o'clock after about thirty minutes deliberation. The throng of spectators which attended the hearing stood by awed as the tense excitement of the trial reached a climax with the hysterics of the two women.

The young Mrs. Young was so revived and was reported in an improved condition last night. She and the mother of the defendant each testified for the defense.

Judge Clark M. Mullican presided at the trial and District Attorney Durwood Bradley prosecuted.

place the whole area of 100 square miles under quarantine.

A method of remedying conditions was proposed by the Red Cross chairman "to spray the whole section with lime from airplanes."

"Unless bodies are recovered and buried within the next 48 hours, complete evacuation of that territory will have to be effected, including relief workers," Selby said.

Workmen, he declared, are resorting to burying the bodies in quicklime "as it is impossible to pick them up and bring them to the cemetery."

Selby said his estimate of the property damage to the county still is \$50,000, but insurance adjusters estimated the loss might reach \$75,000.

Chairman Selby denied reports rioting has occurred in the stricken area. Plenty of armed guards are on duty, he said.

An airplane has been scouting over the area, spotting bodies, he declared, adding that many corpses had drifted away to almost impenetrable places.

"Approximately 75 bodies have been stacked up near Pahrake for two days," he said, "and we have been unable to bring them here for burial."

Communication with towns in the area are entirely cut off except by boat.

Negroes Resent Burning Of Bodies of Victims

OKLAHOMA, Pa., Sept. 20. (AP)—An unconfirmed report reached Red Cross headquarters here today from Pahrake, Pa., devastated with great loss of life in the tropical hurricane, stating hundreds of homeless negroes were "becoming unmanageable."

The report said unrest started when a number of negro bodies were cremated. Surviving negroes were said to have resented this. No coffins were available yesterday at Pahrake.

A detachment of national guardsmen already is in the town.

Hunger and Epidemics Start in Porto Rico

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Sept. 20. (AP)—Under the leadership of Henry M. Baker, Red Cross director of disaster relief, the Red Cross completed its survey of approximately one-quarter of Porto Rico's storm area today and reported its estimate of damage and casualties.

In that area, it was said, 35,450 homes were destroyed, 3,361 are injured of whom 270 are in hospitals and there is an immediate necessity of feeding 154,000 people.

In addition to hunger an epidemic of influenza has started and shelter must be provided for typhoid fever, influenza and malaria may increase the death toll.

At Guayama 200 cases of influenza have made necessary the immediate establishment of an emergency hospital for which tents have been dispatched from San Juan. If these and others exposed to the elements are not given shelter immediately, the Red Cross officials believe a dangerous epidemic is in prospect.

RANGER PEOPLE HURT  
Three Are Hurt When Coach Strikes Bridge

RANGER, Sept. 20. (AP)—Three Ranger residents were injured shortly after noon Thursday, when a coach of the West Texas Coaches struck a concrete bridge near Wink City, 35 miles from Ranger.

The injured are D. C. McRae, employee of a local insurance company and his wife, and Mrs. J. H. Fox of Ranger.

WACO, Sept. 20. (AP)—Twenty officials of Central Texas cities and towns, members of the Texas League of municipalities, went on record here today as favoring an amendment to the auto license law which would return to cities at least 15 per cent of the amount of the motorists pay in auto license taxes and against certain rulings of the state fire insurance commission.

### Should Be Enough Judge Says 5,641 Police Plenty

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Sept. 20. (AP)—Ten year old Ed Hanlon, released by a kidnapping band after 13 days imprisonment, today heard Judge Frank Comerford declare that 5,641 policemen should be sufficient to eliminate all kidnapers from Chicago.

### NEGRO FOUND GUILTY

Jury Deliberates 25 Minutes In Slaying Case

DAY ST. LOUIS, Miss. Sept. 20. (AP)—St. Louis, negro on trial here for the murder of John Dambrino, filling station employee in a jail break August 14 was found guilty as charged by a jury verdict here late today. The jury deliberated twenty-five minutes.

Judge W. A. White who presided over the trial in circuit court, announced that sentence would be passed upon Richardson Saturday morning.

Richardson was charged with the slaying of the automobile man and shooting Chief of Police Mark Oliver, of Bay St. Louis, when the two went to his cell in search of the key of a stolen automobile the negro, held for theft, was thought to have had on his person.

### Killer of Boys To Be Returned

Sheriff Leaves for Canada To Bring Northcott and Mother Back to California; Search for Bones.

RIVERSIDE, Cal., Sept. 20. (AP)—While Riverside county officials today prepared for the extradition Northcott, named in a murder complaint as slayer of four young boys on his Riverside county chicken ranch, investigators who have dug up a collection of fragmentary bones identified as those of humans, marked time tending further development from the north.

Sheriff to Go After Killer  
Sheriff Clem Sweeters, who had directed the pick and shovel search for human remains at the Northcott ranch, made preparations to leave, possibly by airplane, for Vancouver, B. C. to get Northcott and his mother, held in Calgary.

The woman, Mrs. Louisa Northcott, who also was named in the murder complaint, was declared in press reports from Canada to have been arrested yesterday. Her 21 year old son, who is accused of having made degenerate attacks upon his boy victims before killing them, was arrested near Vernon, B. C.

CALGARY, Alta., Sept. 20. (AP)—Mrs. Louisa Northcott, arrested here yesterday afternoon for Riverside, Calif., authorities, on a murder complaint in connection with the Northcott chicken ranch killings, tonight admitted her identity to Calgary police officers.

Aged Man Is Held In Extortion Plot

Charged With Sending 4 Threatening Letters To Raskob Home; Demanded \$100,000.

(By Associated Press)  
PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 20.—Charged with attempted blackmail and extortion in demanding \$100,000 from Mrs. John J. Raskob, wife of the democratic national committee chairman, under threat of death of her husband, Frank C. Mooney, 67, formerly of Wilmington, Del., today was held for the grand jury in \$100,000 bail.

Four Letters  
Four letters alleged to have been written by Mooney from Philadelphia are the basis of the charges. Detectives said Mooney had confessed writing the letters.

Mooney was accused of having threatened to destroy the Raskob home at Claymont, near Wilmington, unless the money was paid.

In one letter the writer reminded Mrs. Raskob of a recent accident when an elevator in which Mr. Raskob was riding in a New York hotel fell, inferring he was responsible for the accident.

Decey Letter Sent  
Adcey letter was sent to the North Philadelphia postoffice and Mooney called to get it Wednesday night. Well dressed and slightly stooped, he walked up to the general delivery window where detectives watched him. Mooney was not escorted there but was captured after he tried to jump from an automobile driven by a negro, who escaped.

Curtis Is Visitor With Sioux Indians

Republican Vice-President Nominee Fraternizes With Ancient Kinmen In South Dakota.

ROSELAND, S. D., Sept. 20. (AP)—Motoring into the bleak and hills in the Rosebud Indian agency over forty miles of slippery mud roads, Senator Charles Curtis, the republican vice presidential nominee, spent the day here fraternizing with his ancient kinmen, the Sioux.

Delivers Address  
Surrounded by the aged, bronze-colored chiefs of the tribe, Senator Curtis went to the race track this afternoon and from the tiny judges stand delivered an address to the crowds huddled in the rudely constructed grand stand and circling about the track.

Introduced by Senator McMaster of this state, the nominee emphasized the responsibilities of citizenship against the use of "fire water" and against excessive indulgence in "modern dancing." He urged them to build homes and to till the soil and above all he asked that the Indians exercise their newly acquired right to vote.

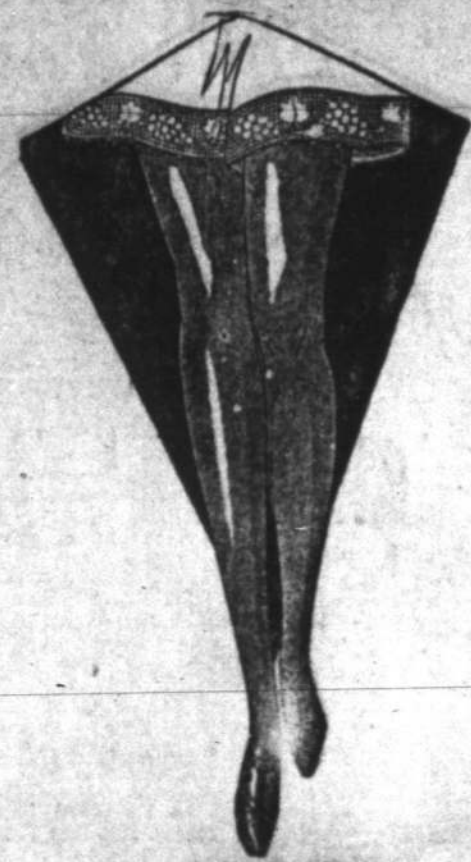
