Bell Asks For \$1.75 Per Month Increase In Rates

Southwestern Bell Telephone has filed for a rates increase that would mean an additional \$1.75 per month from residential and \$4.25 per month from business users.

The new rates, if approved by the Texas Public Utility Commission, would mean an increase for residential users in Aransas County from \$6.15 per month to \$7.90 a month.

Business rates in the county would go from \$13.95 to \$18.20.

The company filed Monday, July 7, for the statewide rates increase.

Bell officials said when filing that the proposed rate increase will bring in an additional \$326 million in revenues.

Officials said the rate

increase request is prompted in part by inflation, Texas's tremendous growth and expectation of increased wage and benefit costs when the company's contract with the Communications Workers of America expires in August.

Last year, 1979, the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) authorized Southwestern Bell to earn a 10.17 percent return on its investment in Texas.

This year, Doyle E. Rogers, the company's vice president for Texas, says, the company "needs to earn in the range of 12.5 percent in Texas to provide the incentive for investors to pour in the dollars necessary to provide continuing good phone service for the state."

Figures from the telephone company show a 47 percent increase in the number of telephones in homes and offices from 1972 to 1979 — from 3.2 million to 4.7 million.

Local phone calls by Texas customers has increased 71 percent during the past decade. Company officials say this increased

use demands increased construction of facilities.

"Billions of dollars are essential to meet that growth," Rogers said.

He added, "We cut expenses. We gain revenue through increased sales. But soaring double-digit inflation eats up all the gains we make."

Hearing On Proposed St. Charles Bay Sanctuary

A public hearing has been set for Tuesday, July 15, on a proposal to declare St. Charles Bay an estuarine sanctuary.

The hearing will begin at 7 p.m. in the Neptune Hall at Sea Gun Inn in Lamar.

Mike Hightower, director of the Coastal Division of the Texas General Land Office, said the purpose of the action is to preserve the estuary in its present state "without significant alterations."

The action will not close the bay, Hightower empha-

sized during a telephone interview at his Austin office Wednesday, July 9.

"Fishing and hunting will still be allowed," he said. "Oil and gas development will still be allowed, providing it doesn't permanently alter the estuarine system. Commercial fishing will still be allowed, within limits."

The normal procedure in an estuarine sanctuary, he said, is to set up a management committee and steering committee, and these two committees then work out guidelines for use of the

sanctuary.

"We're trying to set up reasonable goals and objectives that allow use (such as hunting, fishing and commercial activities) while maintaining the estuary in its natural state," Hightower said.

"People confuse sanctuaries with refuges, where nothing is allowed, and parks where everything is allowed," he continued.

"A sanctuary is in between. It isn't completely restricted — there is public access — but we don't put up

park benches either.

"A sanctuary is a natural field laboratory, and we hope to make it available for field tours by groups such as universities and schools."

The nomination of St. Charles Bay as a sanctuary is being done under the National Estuarine Sanctuary Program, and this program requires that at least one public hearing be held on the matter.

Hightower said Tuesday's will be the first such meeting on the St. Charles Bay proposal, but there will be

others.

Purpose is to get public input — both written and oral — and to answer any questions. Hightower added

the meeting is open to "anyone who wants to come."

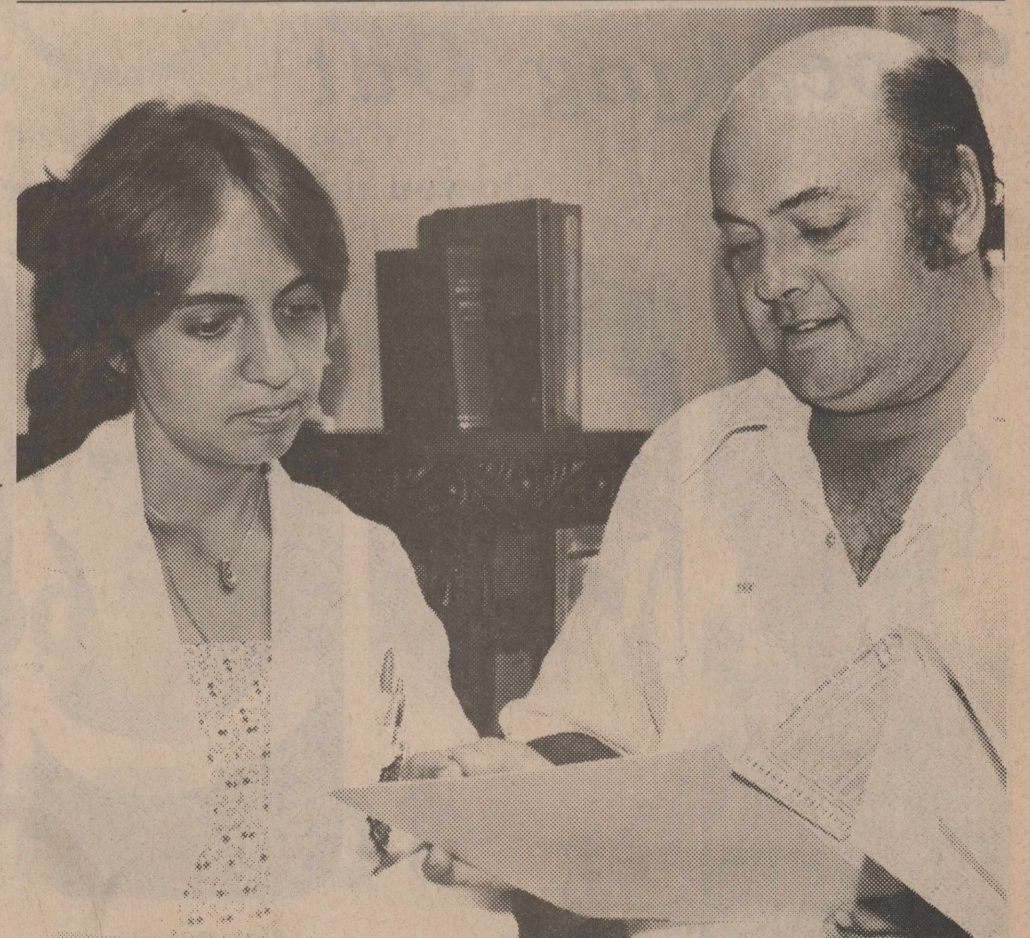
The meeting, in the Region 2 Education Service Center, Room 128, at 209

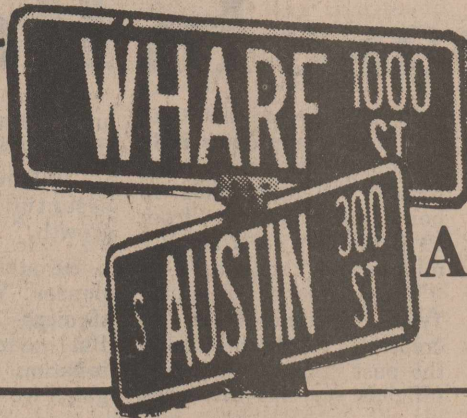
PHYSICIAN'S ASSISTANT

"A NATION HEALING IS A GOOD SIGHT TO behold..." President Carter observed as he signed a bill authorizing a two-acre site in the nation's capital for the first national memorial to the 2.7 million Americans who served in Vietnam.

This gesture, and gesture it is, I nevertheless heartily approve. However, for many veterans the struggle to re-adjust in the face of lingering physical and emotional infirmities lingers on. So, a better expression of national gratitude would be for the Congress to make certain that the "store front" counseling centers that have been so effective in helping Vietnam veterans to adjust be continued. Unless Congress renews the program it will end next year.

THE VIETNAM WAR, A WAR WE LOST, WAS A mistake, true enough, but not for the reasons that seem to have gained common acceptance today. All too often it appears to me that many people all but say that the draft dodgers, protesters and deserters of that day were right. We had no business getting mixed up in that affair. Perhaps we didn't, but if not, let us also say that national honor and commitment is meaningless, treaties are no more than waste of paper and ink.

No, the Vietnam War was a mistake first of all because the majority of those 2.7 million who served were not representative of a cross section of the democracy we presume to be. Instead they were by long odds people from minority groups, those who were least educated, often the deprived. Bad enough. But worse, we sent them into battle, carrying the Stars and Stripes with, literally, one fighting hand tied behind them. However uneducated many of these men may have been they possessed the wisdom, or if not that the human instinct to know that they were not being allowed to do their best, and so morale declined. Blame for this must lie with mealy-mouthed politicians, those who tolerated protesters in a nation at war, a democracy at war that carried democracy too far, and so on down perhaps to draft boards who were so "selective" as to draft only the less privileged.

PRESENTLY THE NATION IS EMBARKING UPON a program to register, not draft young men. And as everyone knows, there are howls of protest. If only for the sake of emphasis I shall make a perhaps radical statement, and then attempt to defend it. So, in my book any and all of those who protest the present registration should be sent to a rockpile for a twelve-hour day and succored on short rations. It's like this. Even in a democracy freedom is not just a right, it is a privilege of the highest order. If that privilege is to live and be maintained it must be defended and if need be, fought for. This means that the nation must always and forever be prepared to defend itself. Consequently in time of war and in times when war

threatens (and today that is always) men and women, no matter their personal views and beliefs, must stand ready to serve.

IN THIS CENTURY, IN TWO GREAT WORLD wars, the United States has been caught short. In each instance we went until the last minute to get ready for war -- train men, build ships and supplies, get into gear a war-time industry. As a result, on both occasions the wars lasted longer, more men died.

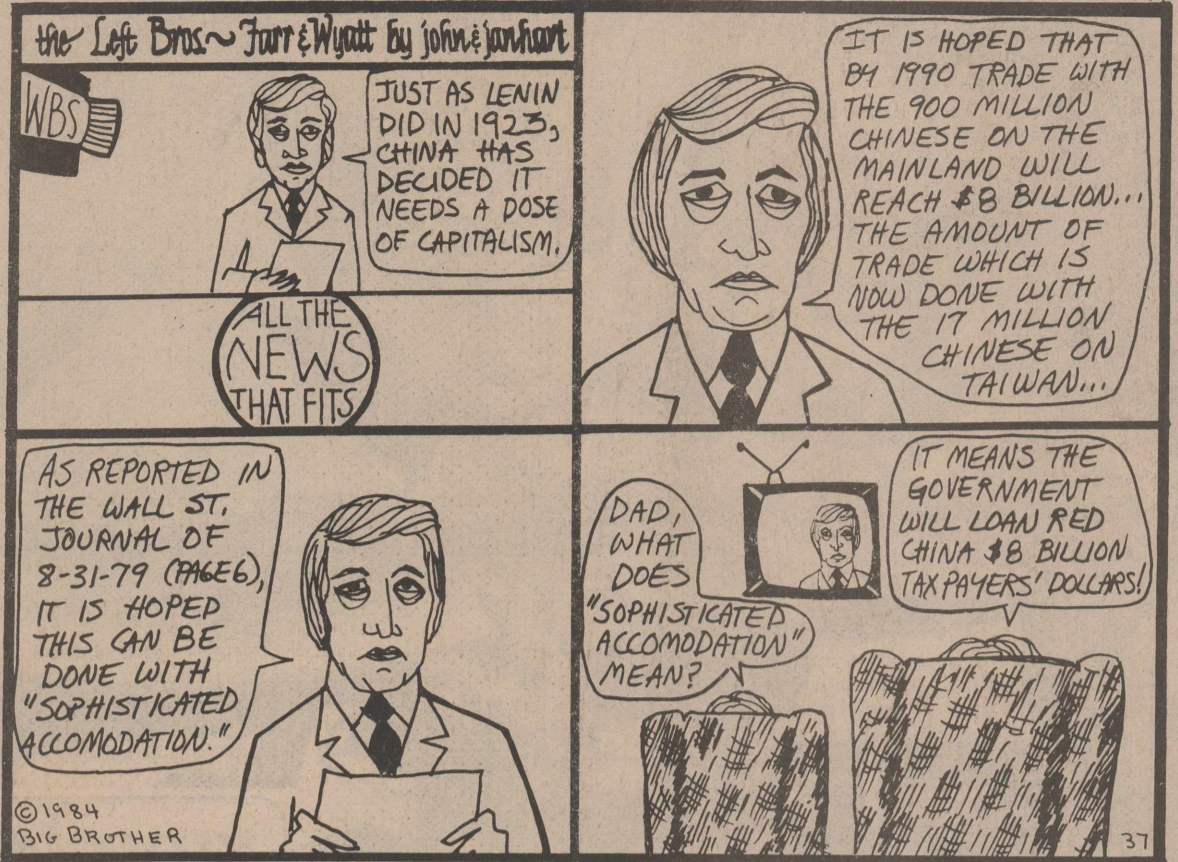
Therefore my harsh words for the idiots who protest the current registration. And idiots they are because they lack the sense to realize that should the United States be ever conquered, another regime would not for a moment listen to their protests, my rock pile would be kind treatment in comparison should they dare protest -- protest anything.

OUR WORLD HAS SUFFERED LEADERS WHO have held forth on peace at any price, always to no avail. But have we learned? Often, yes more often than not, it appears that we haven't.

TOMORROW, ANOTHER WAR. LIKE EVERYONE else I should like to think that it will never come to pass, but there is never a doubt in my mind that it will. "There are wars, and there shall ever be wars." Perhaps I misquote the exact words. I am not a very good Bible student, but the meaning is the same.

Yes, I grieve. It horrifies me when I think that civilized man must constantly be prepared for war. I look at the poor, the millions who suffer in the world each day and think how very nice it would be were we able to devote the money we spend for battleships, air craft, all the tools of war to help those people. I can dream of a world full of reasonable men and women, intellectually above condoning the horrors of war and suffering, a planet where everyone is well educated, comfortably housed and fed, but unless I am to deny the lessons of history, that will never be. Yet hope springs eternal in each man's breast. Yes, let us hope there will never again be a great war, but the only way to insure against it, feeble hope, is to always be ready for conflict, especially today when clever man has built weaponry that can potentially destroy all mankind in a matter of hours.

Let me offer a single instance that, to me at least, illustrates the abiding certainty of war. Two people fall into disagreement. They exhaust their ability to discuss and reason with each other. Fists, guns, knives come into play. Two men in a peaceful society have started a small war. They have done, they have followed the process that has since the beginning of time lead great nations to war. How many little wars go on every day? Read the headlines in your daily newspaper. Tune in the evening news.--ahab (C.M. Henkel)



Accent On Health

Now that school is out, children are taking to the out-of-doors. Unfortunately, ticks--many of them infected with Rocky Mountain spotted fever (RMSF)--are taking to the children, and have already caused one death.

"Confirmed cases of RMSF in the state were reported unusually early this year," says Janene G. Simons, of the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Epidemiology Division.

"Through the third week of May, nine confirmed and two unconfirmed cases were reported. A four-year-old boy died from the disease in Thorndale, located in Milam County. His sister also had the disease, but she is recovering," she reported.

Mrs. Simons said most of the cases reported so far this year occurred in northeastern Texas; however, three were found in Central Texas and one possible case was reported in Lubbock.

Paul Fournier, with the TDH Parasitology Branch, said that although RMSF is normally dominant in the northeastern and southeastern parts of the state, Texans in Central Texas and other areas should also be careful about ticks on the family dog and in the back yard.

"Many people tend to worry about ticks only when they go camping," he said, "and just take for granted the ticks found in their own yard or on the household pet. They can't stop to realize that the ticks found on their

own premises can be just as dangerous as the ones they find out in the woods."

Fournier cited as an example the recent death in Thorndale. "Two ticks collected from behind the house and one taken from the family dog were carrying RMSF," he explained. "Over the last several years, four fatal cases of RMSF resulted from exposure to ticks in the yard."

"What can be done to reduce the risk from ticks? Commercial repellents will help. "When you are camping or hiking in an area that could be infested with ticks, check your family frequently to see if any have gotten on them. After returning from an outing, check your clothes immediately after removing them, before the ticks can crawl off."

Fournier said ticks may take several hours to attach --and this is an important thing to remember. He said the risk of infection increases after the infected tick has attached itself and fed for several hours or more. "So the sooner you get the tick removed, the better," Fournier advised.

Ticks usually hang on grass or brush waiting for a host to come by. Often they get on a person's ankles or legs and then crawl upwards looking for a place to attach. "Since many cases result from exposure to ticks on dogs," Fournier says, "you should inspect your dog and detach it regularly."

Since you can get infected when removing ticks, it's a good idea to cover your fingers with a piece of paper, or to use tweezers or forceps. If you use tweezers, grasp the tick as close to the point of attachment as possible.

Not many tick attachments result in infection. But if fever does develop within the incubation period of three to ten days and you think you are developing RMSF, you should contact your physician.

The disease starts with a definite fever, and perhaps with chills, headache, or muscle aches. After about three days of fever, a rash normally appears, usually on the wrists and ankles. At first the rash resembles that of measles. Later it may spread to the rest of the body.

Live ticks submitted by physicians, veterinarians and the general public are tested by the TDH Bureau of Laboratories in Austin. All specimens and inquiries should be directed to the General Parasitology Branch, Bureau of Laboratories, Texas Department of Health, Austin, Texas 78756.

Even though a number of species of ticks are found in Texas, only a few are thought to be involved in the transmission of Rocky Mountain spotted fever.

It may seem elementary, but the key to protecting yourself against Rocky Mountain spotted fever is to avoid tick bites.

In Texas, the threat of the disease is virtually a year-round one. However, most Texas cases in

humans occur between April and September. That puts the state squarely in the middle of the biggest threat during the summer vacation months.

Ticks this year appear to be a particular problem, and anyone who spends time outdoors in a tick-infested area is likely to come in contact with them.

The first line of defense against ticks and other flying and crawling pests is an insect repellent. Specific directions for use are printed on the containers of the various brands.

Often, a tick may become attached to the body without the individual realizing it. It is important while working or visiting in tick-infested areas for humans to undergo total body inspection for ticks no less than every four hours.

It is important, too, to protect your pets against ticks. Often, a dog will become infested with ticks and later share them with its owner back at home. A tick infested with Rocky Mountain spotted fever is infected for life.

Just recently Russian newspapers themselves were reporting widespread com-

plaints from people who've been short-changed by cashiers in state-owned restaurants.

What this proves is that the United States has no monopoly on human nature and it's wise to count your change, regardless of what form of government you're dining under.

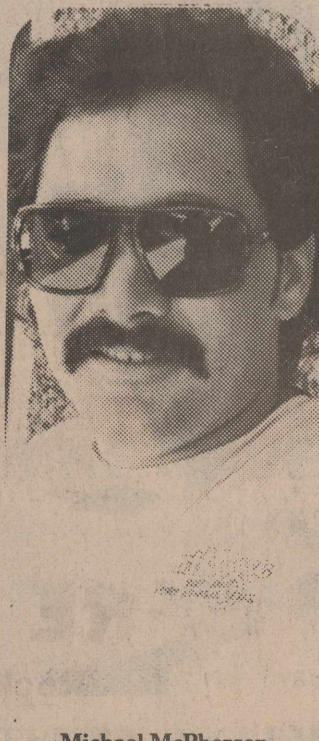

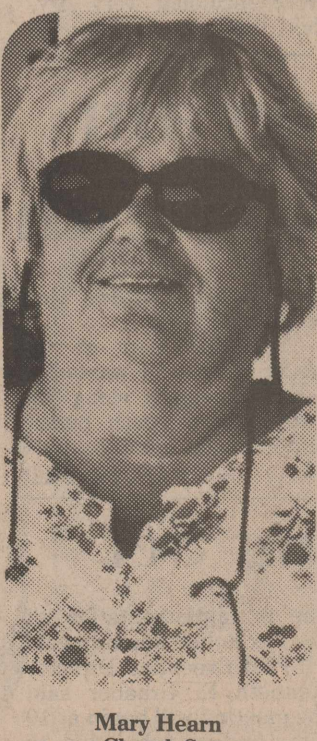

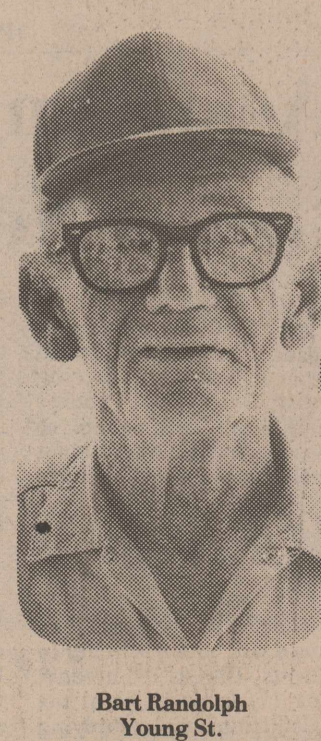

ness, menstrual disturbances, back stiffness and pain, and difficulty in walking.
Q. My hair has recently become very dry and lifeless. I'm taking a good multi-vitamin and plenty of extra C and E. What else do I need?
A. When vitamin A is undersupplied, the hair can become dry and lacking in luster and sheen. Nutritionists usually recommend from 25,000 to 50,000 units of A daily.
Also, research has shown that dry, lifeless hair may take on a glossy luster when a good salad oil (cold-processed vegetable oil such as safflower, soy, etc.) is added to the diet.

The amount to use appears to be one or two table-spoons daily.
(An added bonus is that dry, scaly skin has been known to become soft and lovely with the use of vegetable oil.)

Eyes And Answers

PREVENTION
Dear Dr. Petty: Is there anything I could have done to prevent my children becoming nearsighted? All three had to put on glasses when they were about twelve years old.
You didn't say whether or not you and your spouse are nearsighted but it would be my guess that at least one of you is myopic.
Although it does not hold true in every case, many offspring of nearsighted parents do become myopic themselves. The genes do seem to be involved in such cases.
However, some humans become myopic for other reasons: Long-time, concentrated, intensive eye work at close ranges (especially on flat surfaces) can induce myopia. Body chemistry imbalances are strongly suspect as a cause in some instances. Some believe excessively large pupils cause nearsighted blur. Others think the actual length of the eyeball is a factor also. So many cases becoming myopic at about the age of puberty make many of us feel fairly certain that hormonal imbalances are another culprit.
In view of all that, I can't say you could have done anything to prevent your children's nearsightedness.
Dear Dr. Petty: I'm not at all certain my headaches are caused by my eyes. They come on me when I get up and they go away about nine o'clock. Are they eye headaches?
Many volumes have been written on headaches, one of mankind's bothersome problems. And still, we do not have all the answers on them. Even so, much is known about this ailment.
Yours sounds as if it may be coming from some other source. Rarely do people have morning headache from eye use, especially after a good night's sleep and rest.
People who do an intensive amount of eye work in the evenings or quite late at night can experience some headache the next morning if they have an undiscovered visual problem. Most eye headaches follow a pattern of occurring during the day after normal use of the eyes. Afternoon or evening headaches usually stem from visual stress.
In your case, a good eye and visual examination seems in order.

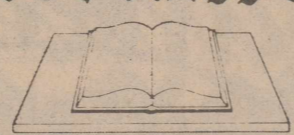

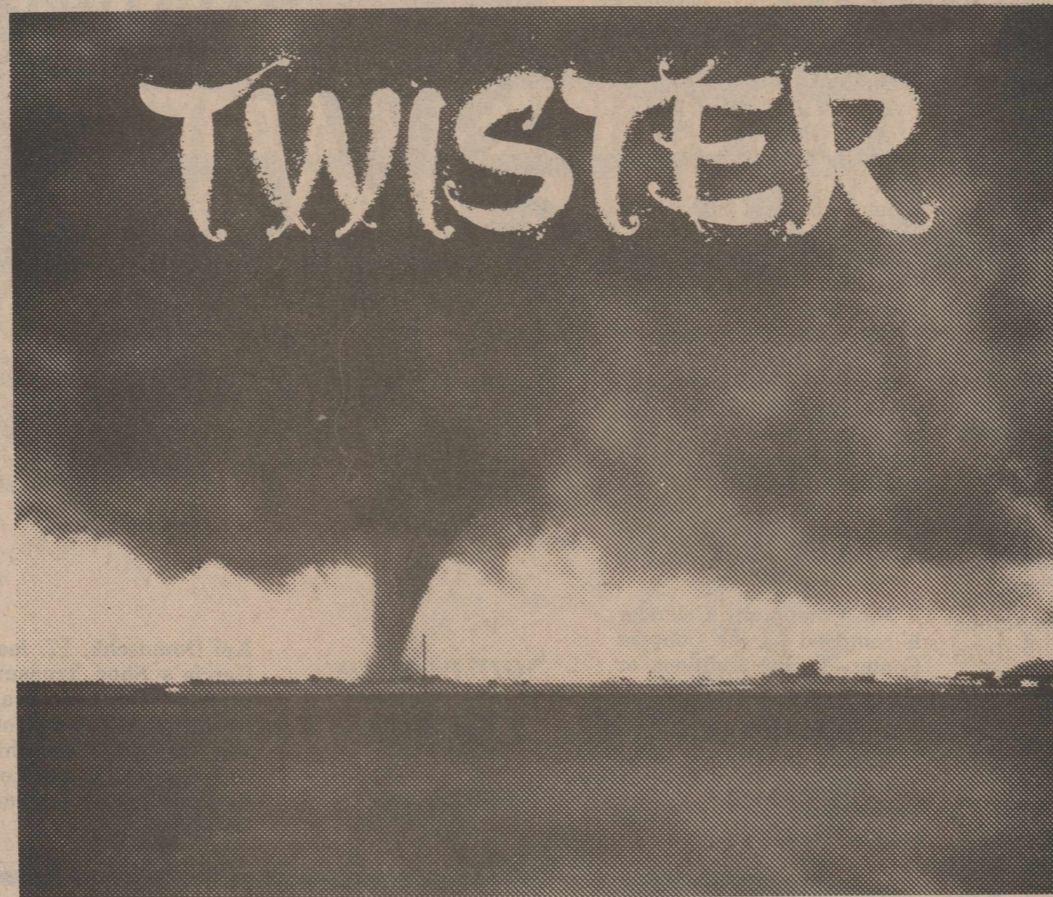

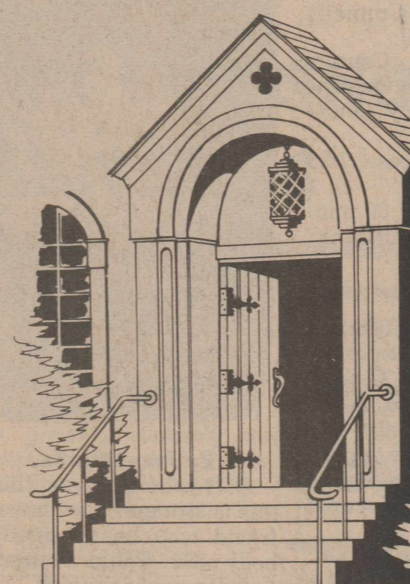

A Place Of Legends

The great red stone rears suddenly skyward, where it swelled liquid from the depths eons ago in earth's last fiery spasm. A square mile in size, it domes smooth and naked 500 feet above still clear Sandy Creek, where Comanches camped at already ancient hearths.

From the beginning, all who saw the mountain-rock were drawn to it by its size and beauty and strangeness. Finding sweet water, they would linger. And in the darkness, the rock would speak.

Sometimes it whispered so softly that one had to listen intently to hear it. At other times it wailed in agony or roared in anger. It was a place of the spirits, perhaps was itself a living god. The Indians called it Enchanted Rock, and its ominous presence wanders through legend.

The old Comanches, those who were dead before the time of the white man, told their sons that in the long ago a chief, seeking the rock's favor, sacrificed his daughter on its wind swept summit.

Seized by such cruelty, and the spirit of the chief. He was never seen again, but at night he was heard moaning as he wandered forever across the sterile face of the rock.

In the early days of white settlement, a Comanche raiding party returned to their camp at the rock's base with a captive white woman. She was out of her mind with fear, and at the first opportunity she ran away and went up on the rock. She was never found, but from that time forward she screamed down at the village in the dark hours. No warrior would

venture out to silence her, for she clearly was in the hands of the spirit that dwelt in that place.

In was in the fall of 1841 that Jack Hays, Texas' first great Ranger, was cut off from his men by Comanches near the rock. Hard pushed, he rode for the red heights, and from there he held his own against a hundred warriors.

The plaque near the summit says he fought from there, and the old frontiersmen believed he did so by lying prone in one of several shallow craters that are found there.

There are a hundred better places on that square mile of granite to fight from. In countless cracks and seams among the massive boulders scattered across the slopes, or in the maze of water-scoured caves on the steep north wall, a man could stand off or hide from a hundred or a thousand men. No one will ever know whether Hays found saving concealment . . . or whether it was the spirit of the rock that held those Comanches off.

Now in transition from private ownership to state park, Enchanted Rock remains as it was for countless centuries, huge, barren and mysterious, unnoticed of man's petty stirrings. And in the cool of night, when the sun's heat begins at last to rise from the glittering incline, Enchanted Rock still speaks, from somewhere deep within itself, with a voice almost as old as the wind.

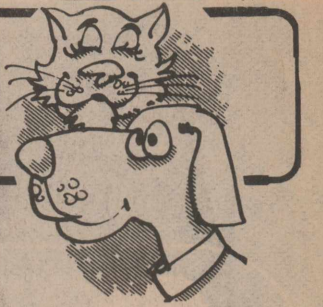


ART SUPPLY ARTIST OF MONTH

Pet Talks

Dr. Lutz is a graduate of Baltimore City College and Texas A&M University. He was an instructor of small animal diseases and surgery in the Veterinary School at Texas A&M and was in private practice in Waco for 25 years.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS:

Dear Dr. Lutz: My mother wrote to inform me that her dog has developed hard-pad disease. I have never heard of this condition. What is it?—Lola

Dear Lola: Hard-pad disease is one of the complications of canine distemper. Hyperkeratosis of the foot pads and nose may develop two to three weeks after an attack of distemper. The development of hyperkeratosis often parallels the onset of symptoms referable to damage of the central nervous system.

The pads of the paws may either be heavily cornified and thick, or thin but

unusually hard. There is no specifically known therapy. Good nursing, antibiotics for possible secondary respiratory and enteric infections, and B vitamins are recommended.

Dear Dr. Lutz: I am the owner of a three-year-old male mixed-breed dog. He is very high-strung and nervous.

My most pressing problem is that at times he can be vicious. He will be loving one second and start growling and showing his teeth while he is licking your hand. He has snapped and tried to bite for no reason.

My husband thinks he has a mental problem and at times wants to have him put to sleep. I would like to help my dog. I don't want to lose him. Is there anything I can do?

Thank you.—Jeanette
Dear Jeanette, This is one of the most challenging questions that I have received. I have done a great deal of research, and most of it is very technical. I will do my best to translate in terms that you and I can understand.

In the past few years, much has been written about normal and abnormal behavior in a dog. Undoubtedly, these problems are caused by the central nervous system. It is believed that they are, for the most part, associated with the deeper structures of the brain.

This system is called the limbic system, and is responsible for tameness and emotional stability. When this area of the brain is inflamed or destroyed, animals that were previously tame display varying degrees of wildness and savageness.

It is not unusual to observe behavioral changes in dogs following the recovery from

distemper -- particularly the encephalitic form.

I have made another observation in dogs that were adopted at age six months or older. These dogs were raised with a number of litter mates, and only understand the "Pack-Boss" theory. There is number one dog -- the bully -- and from there on down there is a "pecking order."

In your case, this could be the way it works. Your dog's way of thinking is your husband is Boss No. 1. Your dog considers himself as Boss No. 2, and you as Boss

No. 3.

If your husband scolds or disciplines the dog, he will, in turn, growl or snap at you. This is the "peck system."

If your dog has had distemper and recovered since you have had him or before you obtained him, he could have permanent brain damage. To correct this problem, first try a mood tranquilizer tablet developed by one of the leading veterinary pharmaceutical companies, Pitman-Moore.

The tablet could be mixed with the dog's food, and should be tried for at least 30 days. Your veterinarian will

know the medication indicated.

Second Suggestion: Castration. This often results in a more docile dog.

If none of the above is effective, try to find a new home for the dog as a watch dog. A classified ad in The Rockport Pilot would probably be successful.

As a last resort, give the dog to the Corpus Christi Humane Society so they can give the dog away as a watch dog.

Several acres were burned off before the blaze was brought under control, and the culprits, although

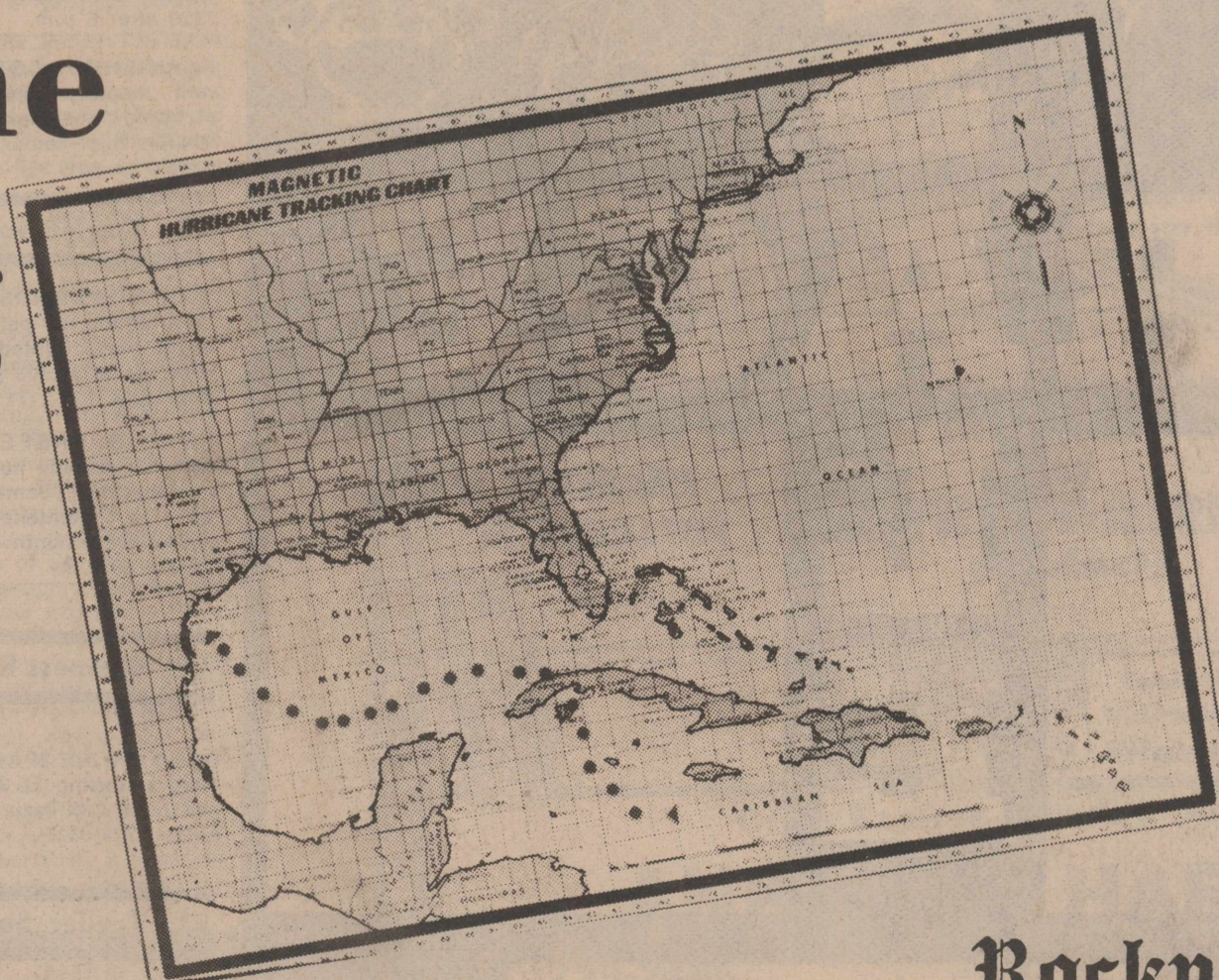
taken into custody, were later released.

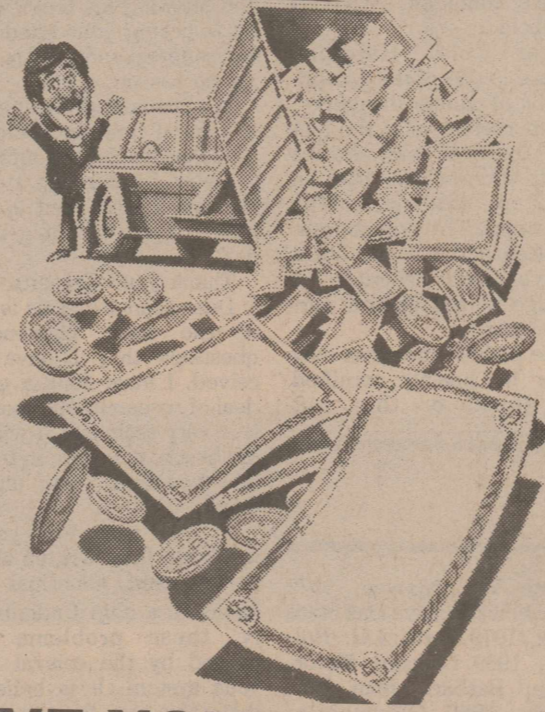

Fulton Approves Gas Rate Hike

Granting Aransas Natural Gas a rate increase and authorizing the mayor to submit an application for a \$200,000 grant highlighted the actions taken by the Fulton City Council Tuesday night, July 8.

Vernon Kleypas requested the 10 percent hike for the gas company, which will mean a boost of approximately 66 cents per month in bills for minimum users.

This increase, which the council unanimously approved, will go into effect in September.

The grant application, to be submitted to the Coastal

Energy Impact Program in reference to construction of a 1000-foot pier near Fulton Harbor, was approved overwhelmingly.

The wharf, which will extend to Thompson's Reef between the two existing piers, will be built on the land recently obtained from the Navigation District on a 29-year lease.

A resolution thanking the Fulton Volunteer Fire Department for erecting the street signs was adopted by the assembly, and the taxi permit was renewed.

Discussion on meeting the requirements of the Truth and Taxation Article followed, with Alderman Katherine McLeester making a presentation.

City Attorney C. Allen Lee suggested more research be done on the matter, however, due to some technical confusion.

The cash report and approval of bills then demanded a few minutes' time before the open forum and adjournment.

(Continued From Page 1) tance of preserving estuary systems, Hightower said one acre of estuary is estimated to have a monetary value of about \$82,000.

"About two-thirds of all commercial and sport fish depend on an estuary at some point in their life cycle -- particularly as juveniles," Hightower said. Thus the commercial and sportfishing industries are dependent on the existence of estuaries.

In addition, he continued, the estuary serves as a buffer reducing the threat of storms to coastal areas and as a "waste treatment system" filtering the water that runs off the land into the bays.

Hightower said the proposal is to designate the entire St. Charles Bay, a little more than 8,700 acres, as an estuarine sanctuary.

There are presently seven such sanctuaries actively established across the nation, he continued.

AUSTIN—The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has scheduled a public hearing on Tuesday, July 15, at 8 p.m. in the Aransas County Courthouse, to discuss commercial red drum (redfish) harvest quotas and proposed classification of certain species as game fish. The public is invited to attend.

The department is empowered by the Red Drum Conservation Act to establish red drum harvest quotas for the commercial harvest of red drum in each bay system and to close a bay system to the commercial harvest when 90 percent of the quota is attained.

The proposed classification of red drum, spotted trout (speckled trout), striped bass, snook, tarpon, sailfish, blue marlin, white marlin and wahoo as game fish identifies the nine species which currently are supporting recreational fisheries.

Another proposal would exempt monofilament cast and dip nets from the ban on

monofilament netting already adopted by the commission, and scheduled to become effective around September 1, 1980.

After public testimony is received in the hearings, the commission will take final action in its August meeting. The exact date of the meeting has not yet been announced.

Still Need To Conserve Water

The water situation in Aransas County is not yet critical, but area residents "still need to keep conserving," says J.C. Gurley, Rockport's Director of public works.

The water consumption, normally averaging 2.3 million gallons a day, soared this past (July 4) weekend, Gurley added.

"It like to have ruined us this past weekend!" he said, adding that water usage Saturday and Sunday averaged 2.7 million gallons a day.

"It's doing better now," he added, but he urged residents to use water sparingly. "The main thing now is not to waste it," he said.

If the water situation gets worse, Aransas County could start having the problems being experienced in other area cities where, for example, water customers are

being asked to water their yards only every other day. In some cities, Gurley said, residents are subject to stiff fines for watering their

Solar power in silver

One troy ounce of silver can provide backing for 400 square feet of mirrors "which reflect and concentrate solar rays to generate electrical power, to accomplish industrial reactions and to convert plentiful, inexpensive biomass -- such as corn cobs and sawdust -- into valuable gaseous and liquid fuels," says Richard L. Davies, executive director of the Silver Institute.

San Patricio buys raw water from Corpus Christi, treats it and sells it to surrounding cities -- and to the Aransas County Water Conservation and Reclamation District which resells it to the City of Rockport for distribution to county residents.

The San Patricio treatment plant has a 6.8 million gallon per day capacity, Gurley said, and "Rockport is the last customer on the line this way." The water goes to Ingleside then Aransas Pass -- then comes to Rockport.

Gurley said he talked to officials at the San Patricio district Monday and at that time "they seemed to be all right."

But there's still a long hot summer and a limited water supply ahead . . .

"We see patients together," Lynne said. "Usually I go in, interview the patient, do a quick physical and history, then Dr. Kovacs comes in and we both discuss treatment."

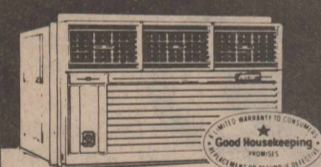

There was a fan turned on in the trailer, he continued, but he thinks it hadn't been on long before the arrival of the paramedics.

Two units from the county sheriff's office brought ice. Aston said after Davis was packed in ice his core body temperature could only be lowered to 107 degrees.

"It could have been higher," he added. "The thermometer only goes to 107 degrees."

Paramedics were aided in their efforts to revive the man by Dr. Fred Warren who was off-duty at the time but came to the scene after he was called.

Aston said Davis "arrested several times" while they were trying to prepare him for transport to a hospital.

At that stage, he explained, "you lose most of your patients by moving them."

He said Davis went into repeated cardiac arrest -- also common in severe heat stroke -- and at 9 p.m. Dr. Warren declared the man dead.

"We don't know for sure what he was doing," the chief paramedic added. "They're just rumors at this point."

Funeral services for Mr. Davis were at 11 p.m. Thursday in the Old Roundrock Cemetery in Roundrock, under direction of the Marshall Funeral Home of Aransas Pass.

Survivors include two brothers, Preston Davis of Rockport and Alton E. Davis of San Antonio.
