Plans On New Charter For Lamesa Are Taking Shape, As Water Program Studied

Parents Must Pay Tuition On Some Transfers

Information concerning the transfer of pupils from their home district has been received today which will be of interest to many parents of the county.

The district to which a student transfers is expected to collect tuition from the parents of the child under the following conditions. When the high school student transfers from a district which does not have a 50c local maintenance tax; and from districts not applying for aid. The tuition to be collected is \$20.00 on elementary students and \$25.00 on high school students. The district receiving these students must collect this amount or lose it, for this amount will be deducted from the approved state aid grant, according to the new ruling.

The new state aid law also requires that a report of last year's expenditures must be made of all items paid for with school money and that an allowance will not be made this year for an item which was not purchased provided an allowance was made for it.

Numerous other changes were made which will be of interest to teachers and trustees, in the new state aid bill and full information may be obtained at the county superintendent's office.

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Applications To Cover Purchase And Improvement

August 8, which is only one week away, is the final date which applications for Tenant Farm Loans will be accepted. It was announced last week.

Those who have either been farming or the major portion of their income is from farming operations are eligible for application for one of these loans, in which the Federal Government will buy and make the necessary improvements needed.

Those who are successful in securing one of the loans will have the opportunity to own their own farms and have a long period of years to repay the loan.

It has not been announced as yet how many loans will be granted in Dawson County this year. In 1939 there were seven loans granted and these projects are now practically complete.

Complete details will be given to anyone interested at the offices of the Farm Security Administration in the northeast corner of the basement of the courthouse.

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Interest In 2nd Contest Expected To Draw Voters

In the County Judge's race, W. M. Yates, incumbent, will face Vernon D. Adcock in the run-off.

For County Clerk, Viola Thurston, incumbent, will face a run-off with Howard Humphrey.

For County Commissioner, Precinct Two, G. C. Aten and R. L. Butcher will run it off.

In Precinct Three, Oscar Kelley will face J. C. O'Brien in the second Primary for Commissioner.

In Precinct Four, Floyd Spencer and J. E. Debnam will enter the run-off for County Commissioner.

With the governors race settled, candidates are making every effort possible to create interest so that a representative vote will be cast on August 24th. Usually there is enough interest in the Governor's race in Texas to draw the vote out in the Second Primary, but since W. Lee O'Daniel stepped into the political spotlight of Texas, there has been no governor's run-off.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments

A JOINT RESOLUTION
S. J. R. No. 6
proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Section 26 of Article IV so as to provide that Notaries Public be appointed by the Secretary of State of the State of Texas; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray the necessary expenses for the submission of this amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 26 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 26. (a) The Secretary of State shall appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for each county who shall perform such duties as now are or may be prescribed by law. The qualifications of Notaries Public shall be prescribed by law.

(b) Nothing herein shall affect the terms of office of Notaries Public who have qualified for the present term prior to the taking effect of this amendment.

(c) Should the Legislature enact an enabling law hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the

State of Texas at a special election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT NOTARIES PUBLIC BE APPOINTED BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS."

"AGAINST AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT NOTARIES PUBLIC BE APPOINTED BY THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

H. J. R. No. 8
proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 30b of Article 16; providing that the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution limiting the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years, shall not apply to appointive offices of any municipalities that are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service Law applicable thereto; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment; making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto a new Section to Article 16 to be known as Section 30b which shall read as follows:

"Section 30b. Wherever by virtue of statute or charter provisions appointive offices of any municipality are placed under the terms and provisions of Civil Service and rules are set up governing appointment to and removal from such offices, the provisions of Article 16, Section 30, of the Texas Constitution limiting the duration of all offices not fixed by the Constitution to two (2) years shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of the Civil Service law or charter provisions applicable thereto."

Section 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at

the general election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT ARTICLE 16, SECTION 30, OF THE CONSTITUTION SHALL NOT APPLY TO APPOINTIVE OFFICES OF ANY MUNICIPALITY PLACED UNDER THE TERMS AND PROVISIONS OF CIVIL SERVICE."

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT ARTICLE 16, SECTION 30, OF THE CONSTITUTION SHALL NOT APPLY TO APPOINTIVE OFFICES OF ANY MUNICIPALITY PLACED UNDER THE TERMS AND PROVISIONS OF CIVIL SERVICE."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

A JOINT RESOLUTION
S. J. R. No. 4
proposing an amendment to Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature authority to provide for appeal direct to the Supreme Court in cases involving injunctions granted or denied on the grounds of constitutionality or unconstitutionality of any statute or on validity or invalidity of administrative orders; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and expenses of publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 3-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 3-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for an appeal direct to the Supreme Court of this State

from an order of any trial court granting or denying an interlocutory or permanent injunction on the grounds of the constitutionality or unconstitutionality of any statute of this State, or on the validity or invalidity of any administrative order issued by any state agency under any statute of this State."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the general election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1940, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR APPEALS DIRECT TO THE SUPREME COURT IN INSTANCES INVOLVING THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF CERTAIN LAWS AND ORDERS."

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR APPEALS DIRECT TO THE SUPREME COURT IN INSTANCES INVOLVING THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF CERTAIN LAWS AND ORDERS."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

A JOINT RESOLUTION
H. J. R. No. 45
proposing an Amendment to Article 8, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 9-A; providing that the Commissioners Court of Red River County, after a majority vote of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein, shall have the authority to levy a tax not to exceed Twenty-five (25) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for a period not exceeding fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of the County by the issuance of bonds under the provisions of the General Laws regulating the refunding of outstanding debts of the County; providing for the necessary proclamation; and appropriating funds to defray the expenses of the proclamation, publication, and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 8, Section 9, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto another Section to be known as Section 9-A, which shall read as follows:

"Section 9-A. Upon the vote of a majority of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein so authorizing, the Commissioners Court of Red River County, Texas, may levy an annual tax not to exceed Twenty-five (25) Cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for a period not to exceed fifteen (15) years for the purpose of refunding all the outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County and issue bonds under the provisions of the General Law regulating the issuance of bonds to refund said indebtedness.

"At such election, the Commissioners Court shall submit for adoption the proposition of whether such outstanding warrant indebtedness of the General Fund of such County shall be refunded into bonds, the amount of special tax to be levied, and the number of years said tax is to be levied. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters.

Dr. Cox Says:-

If your work is such that it causes excessive perspiration, add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water you take to help prevent heat cramps. This is advised by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, to forestall a possible increase in the number of heat victims as the Texas thermometer hits 90 degrees and above.

Laborers, mechanics, farmers and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat profusely are in danger of having their body salt content become deficient, with resulting heat cramps or heat fog. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat; the body may lose as high as forty to fifty grams of salt during hot days.

In industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be especially careful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they eat and drink.

Salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared salt tablets are not available, table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make

up for the deficiency caused by sweating. Alcoholic drinks should be avoided.

Heat cramp is characterized by pains (cramps) in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases, by nausea and vomiting. The body temperature remains about normal, likewise the pulse rate. Body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until there is a deficiency; then the abdominal muscles begin to cramp.
