We Visit London

Beginning on June 9, 1950, we spent three and a half days trying to see London, the largest city in the world. London proper covers only one square mile, and with Westminster, forms the heart of present-day London which is made up of thirty boroughs, and has a population of over eight million people.

The heart of London is St. Paul's Cathedral. There are 70 other churches in what is known as Old London, all of which are closed on Sunday. They are patronized by the down-town working people on week-days but are too far from any residential district for a Sunday visit. The heart of Westminster is Westminster Abbey where the great kings, queens, statesmen, poets, writers, and military leaders of the British Empire are buried. Westminster Abbey also houses the grave of Britain's "Unknown Soldier."

Under the guidance of Bill Ivie, a former R. A. F. bomber pilot, we visited St. Paul's, the Houses of Parliament, Westminster Abbey, and the Tower of London in one day, each of which could be viewed for a whole week and not be fully covered.

The Tower of London was started in 1078 by William the Conqueror for the purpose of protecting and controlling the city. It has been added to until now there are eighteen acres within the walls, many buildings, and fifteen towers still standing, of which the White Tower is the oldest and the Bloody Tower the best known. One may, today, go through the upper door of the Bloody Tower and walk along the parapet where Sir Walter Raleigh took his daily exercise while a prisoner there. The crown jewels of Britain, of which there are more than forty pieces valued at approximately three hundred sixty million dollars, are displayed in the Wakefield Tower. Barracks are still maintained inside the walls, and on the parade grounds, dozens of ravens may be seen hopping about, picking up food thrown to them by visitors. The English say that as long as there are ravens in the Tower nothing bad can happen to England; so, they are under government protection. We saw where thirty-four political prisoners had been beheaded in the Tower, and the chapel within the walls where some of them are buried.

On June 10, we attended a wedding at Stokes Poles in the church and sat under the Yew tree where Grey wrote his elegy. Just back of the church is the ancestral home of William Penn which is now for sale for approximately forty eight thousand dollars. Passing Runnymede Green where the Magna Carta was sealed, we visited Eton, a school for boys who are registered by the time they are six months of age. The school has educated seventeen of England's Prime Ministers, and its enrollment is fully booked to 1963.

We visited beautiful Windsor Castle where the royal family spent a part of their time in residence, and went on to Hampton Court, a vast palace built by Cardinal Thomas Wolsey and which he later gave to King Henry VIII. This palace will house fifteen hundred people and is now partially occupied by retired and disabled military men of Britain and their families. The formal and sunken gardens, parkways, greenhouses, and drives rival any in Europe. Here we saw a wisteria vine with a trunk more than two feet in diameter, and a grapevine that completely filled a hugh greenhouse.

On Sunday we saw the changing of the guard in front of Buckingham Palace, the London residence of the royal family. This was a colorful pageant in which the old guard stood at attention while the new guard marched on the grounds to meet them. After much marching and saluting, the key was handed over to the new guard; then, the Scottish Highlanders with their bagpipes came on the field followed by the Court Band. After some forty-five minutes of music and maneuvering, the old guard is dismissed.

We walked through King James Court, viewing the homes of Queen Mary and Princess Elizabeth, King James palace where the Duke of Windsor lived, and on through Kensington Gardens and Kensington Palace which is

Hookworm Danger Signs Are Given By Health Office

AUSTIN, Sept. 7. — A puny little parasite no more than a quarter inch long when it's full grown can turn a champion weight lifter into an anemic cream puff.

Even while it's still a baby, this pernicious parasite can make a wheezing weakling out of a top field hand, and turn a boy's muscles to the texture of soft butter.

It's a hookworm. State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox, with understandable disdain, puts the finger on it as the cause of so-called toe itch, dew itch, ground itch, and summer scratch.

Says he: "All these itches are provincial ways of saying hookworm."

Dr. Cox says his department has been waging a ten-year battle against hookworms in Texas, and that deep inroads have been made into its natural habitat, especially in eastern and southern sections. Health experts know what it is and how it gets into the human body, but the big job is in convincing people that they ought to do something about it.

Hookworms live a double life, the health official says, half in the intestines of a human being and half in the soil around an open pit privy. The female lays eggs while attached to the intestine.

Eggs pass from the body, and hatch within 24 hours. Then the young worm lies in wait for the first unsuspecting barefoot person — usually a youngster — to come by. It pierces the foot skin and slowly inches its way deeper and deeper into the body until it reaches the intestinal tract where the cycle starts again.

"It is a disease," Dr. Cox says, "that stunts the growth of children, causes skin discoloration, loss of weight, and anemia." Severe infestations often cause a morbid craving for such things as chalk or dirt, he adds.

But it's easy enough to control — merely by properly designed sanitary pit privies or septic tanks. That, and wearing shoes.

A good many children in various sections have had light infestations at their lives, and have never known what it means to feel entirely well.

Tailback — Doug Johnson.

Jackson will call signals from his fullback position. Johnson and Jackson are to do the passing, and Suggs and Johnson will divide the punting chores. Pippin will be the kickoff man and will do most of the place kicking.

Black has been nominated to be safety man on the defense, with Watts calling defensive signals.

The Loboes will operate entirely from the single wing formation, and their defensive setup will normally feature a six-man line, unless they run into an aerial circus, which would call for a five-man forward wall.

Donald Watts and David Pippin have been elected co-captains of the Lobo eleven.

The Loboes used the Cisco Junior College Wranglers this week to work on their passing game. They held a passing scrimmage to work on both offensive and defensive tactics. The sessions proved beneficial to both clubs.

Several of the players will fill in at other positions if needed.

Little was known here about the Nocona team, except that the Indians will outgrow the Loboes. Nocona always has a strong eleven and competes with Bowie for top honors in the Class A circuit in that section.

Coach Everett said his boys would make the trip in a school bus and will return home immediately after the game.

occupied "by grace and favor." "By grace and favor" is an expression describing the free residence of retired servants of the royal household or military personnel, or any other persons to whom the royal family feel they owe care and protection.

A ride through the parks of London brought us to "Orator's Corner," a corner of Hyde Park where any soap-box orator may

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be free to carry the lance; that it had been only five hundred years since the English carried lances; and that five hundred years was too short to expect an Englishman to change his way of doing things; and to talk to the men and women on the street.

The Englishman on the street blames the slow recovery of England on the lack of administrative ability of the men at the head of the government; on the small loans from the United States; on the unrest of Britain's colonies and the subsequent acquisition of what Marshall Plan funds England has obtained; and to the almost total depletion of England's natural resources. We found Winston Churchill to be the most popular man in England; and we did not find one person who was pleased with socialized medicine.
