2,500 MEN WANTED FOR HANDLING HARVEST

The farmers of Ochiltree county and Balco and Gray Townships of Oklahoma met in mass convention at the Court House in Perryton, Saturday to devise ways and means for securing help for the coming wheat harvest. The first question settled was that of wages. Three dollars for barge hands and four for stackers was finally agreed upon. The majority of the farmers were of the opinion that 2500 men would have to be secured to handle the wheat crop in the above territory and so voted to advertise through the Chamber of Commerce for that number.

Monday night the Chamber of Commerce met and the subject was discussed from all its angles. It was finally agreed to advertise for 2500 men, 500 for immediate use and the balance later as they may come in. Those securing the help to pay the necessary expenses of getting the men here. While a number of the Chamber of Commerce members were of the opinion that this number of imported men was not needed yet they want to aid the farmer in all possible ways, so a call has been made on the commercial bodies of the Pan-handle and the Federal bureau at Enid, Oklahoma for men.

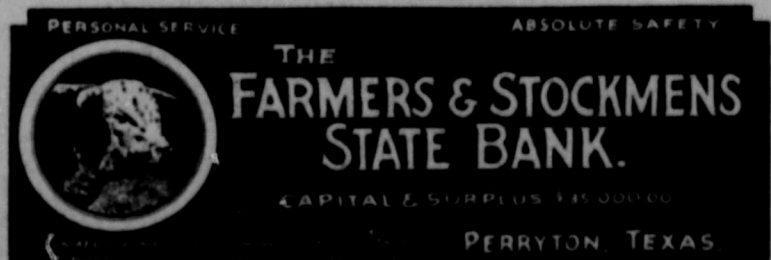

NOTICE OF ELECTION

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Perryton, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said city for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PERRYTON, TEXAS, that an election be held on the 16th day of July, 1921, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

Shall the City Council of the City of Perryton, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the City of Perryton, Texas, in the sum of Seven Thousand (\$7,000.00), Dollars, payable 20 years after date thereof, with option of redemption at any time after 10 years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of Six per cent per annum payable semiannually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of construction and improvement of the roads, bridges and streets, in the City of Perryton, Texas, as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18 R. S., 1911, and Chapter 9, Acts of 1921, Regular Session and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

That said election shall be held at the Court House in the City of Perryton, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election:

Geo. M. Perry, is hereby appointed manager of said election to be held at the Court House, as aforesaid.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 18, Revised Civil Statutes, 1911, and Chapter 9, Acts 1921, Regular Session Thirty-seventh Legislature, and the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said City, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS"

All those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of Perryton, attested by the City Secretary of said City, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the court house door, and at two other public places within the City of Perryton, for at least thirty days prior to the day of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city, and which notice shall be published once each week for four weeks, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty days prior to the date of the election.

When you tell the editor to put you on his subscription list you gladden his heart, but when you tell him and pay him at the same time you make both his stomach and his pocket feel good.

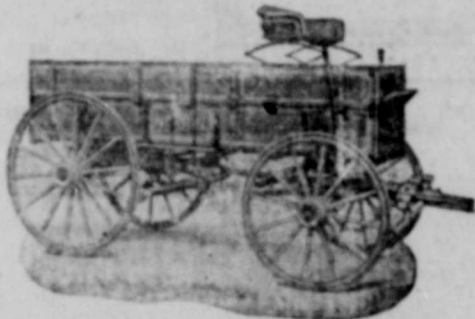

THE TRUCK BILL AGAIN

Hon. Lee Satterwhite, representa-
tive in the state legislature from
this district, publishes the following
analysis of the Truck Bill in the last
issue of his paper, the Panhandle
Herald.

"Some erroneous constructions are
being placed upon the new motor
truck law now being prominently
discussed throughout the state.

Some are of the opinion that the
law becomes operative July 1st this
year, but the reading of the publish-
ed law disclosed the fact that it does
not become effective until January
1st, 1922.

Also some are construing the law
to apply to one ton trucks, but the
Highway department in a telegram to
the Herald yesterday afternoon, re-
plying to an inquiry sent to the de-
partment, says:

"Trucks with intended carrying
capacity of one ton do not take com-
mercial rating."

This means that the one ton truck
will be charged an annual fee the
same as automobiles, that is, 35c per
horse power, but not less than a total
of \$7.50.

We also asked the Highway De-
partment if farmers, who use motor
trucks exclusively for agricultural
purposes would be required to pay the
mileage fee, and in reply to that
question the department says:

"Trucks operated exclusively for
agricultural purposes not required to
pay mileage fee."

The Herald has already construed
the law as is here given by the de-
partment, but representatives of the
State Automobile Association are con-
struing it to mean that the one ton
truck is included in the provision of
the law and that the mileage require-
ments applies to the farmer, who
drives out in his own pasture to feed
his cattle, just the same as the man
who freights over the highway.

As stated by the Herald in a form-
er article the supporters of the truck
bills proposed to eliminate the heavy
trucks from the public highways, and
not to prevent their use elsewhere.

The Herald editor did not support
the bill because we believed it too
drastic and it is our opinion that the
summer session of the Legislature
will materially amend the law as it
applies to the two and three ton, but
the heavier trucks will more than
likely be kept off of the public high-
ways, for the reason that the build-
ing of good roads is too expensive
to be torn up by motor trucks."

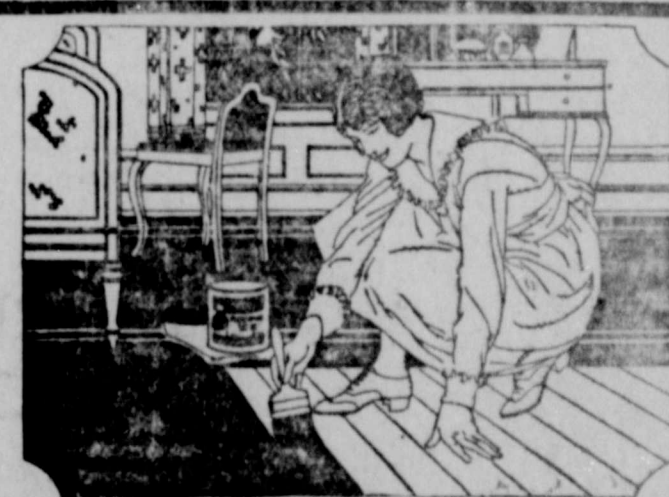

SECTION 2. No person who has not been a resident of the City of Perryton, Texas, for fifteen days immediately preceding the summons to work on such streets, shall be li- able or compelled to work on said streets.

SECTION 3. Any person liable to street duty, and who has been sum- moned to do such duty, shall have the privilege to furnish an able-bod-

ied substitute to work in his place, which substitute shall be accepted by the person in charge of such work, if he is capable of performing a reasonable amount of work; other- wise, he shall not be accepted.

SECTION 4. Every person liable to work on streets, by paying the Mayor or City Secretary of the City of Perryton, at any time before the day appointed to work the streets, the sum of \$1.00 for each day that he is summoned to work, shall be exempt from working each day paid for, and also exempt from any penalties for failure to work for the time which he has so paid.

SECTION 5. Each person sum- moned to work on the streets shall take with him such tools as he shall be directed by the party summoning him for such work, provided the tools required in such summons are such as the party summoned may be able to bring, and are adapted to the work to be performed.

SECTION 6. It shall be the duty of each street hand to perform his duties in accordance with the direc- tions of the overseer of the work be- ing done, and a day's work, within the meaning of this ordinance, shall be eight hours efficient service, when said service is voluntarily per- formed.

SECTION 7. No person shall be liable for more than five days work on the public streets and alleys of said town in any one year.

SECTION 8. The word "street" wherever used in this ordinance shall be construed to include all public alleys, parks and other public grounds of said city, whither specially men- tioned or not.

SECTION 9. Any person li- able to street work under this ordi- nance, by payment of \$4.00 on or be- fore the 15th day of July, 1921, and on or before the 31st day of Janu- ary, in each and every year thereaf- ter, shall be exempt from working the streets for the year in which the same is paid, provided, said sum may be paid to the Mayor, City Marshal or City Secretary, either of whom shall issue a receipt to the party pay- ing showing the payment of such sum, and such receipt shall be con- clusive proof of the exemption from street work of the holder thereof.

SECTION 10. The Mayor of the City of Perryton, Texas, shall have the power to summons out all per- sons liable to street work at any time the Mayor may deem it neces-

sary, or when ordered by the City Council, and such hand, may be cal- led out in detail, or the whole force at any one time, as may be deemed best, or as they may be directed, for the better improvement of the pub- lic streets, alleys and grounds of said city.

SECTION 11. It shall be the duty of the Mayor to give three days previous notice, by summons in per- son or in writing, to each person liable to street work, of the time and place and when and where such per- son is required to appear to work on the streets, and the number of days such person will be required to work, and the name of the person who will be in charge of the work for the city.

SECTION 12. If the summons be in writing it may be served by leav- ing a copy at the usual place of business of the person summoned, or if he has no fixed place of business, then by mailing a copy addressed to him with proper postage paid, and deposited in the Post Office at Per- ryton, Texas, the Mayor may serve the same by posting it on the door of the place of abode, and when so serv- ed, it may be served by the city Marshal.

SECTION 13. The Mayor shall have the power to appoint some one to summon the hands to work on the streets, and such person shall be ex- empt from working on the streets as many days as he was actually engag- ed in summoning the hands.

SECTION 14. It shall be the duty of the Mayor, or the overseer of the work, or any person by him appointed to summon hands for street work, within ten days after he has had the streets worked, to file with the City Attorney, or with the Mayor where the summons was served by his ap- pointee, a complaint in writing and under oath against each person who has been summoned to work the streets and who has failed to work and failed to furnish a substitute, and has failed to pay one dollar for each day he has failed to work or furnish a substitute, and also against each person so summoned who has refused to do a reasonable amount of work or who has refused to per- form the reasonable directions of the overseer of such work, named in the summons sent him.

SECTION 15. All the money paid into the City in lieu of working on the streets, by persons liable therefor, shall be placed in the City Treasury to the credit of the Street Improvement Fund, and shall not be expended for any other purpose than for the improvement of the streets, alleys and public grounds of such city.

SECTION 16. If any person, li- able to street work upon the public streets, alleys and grounds of the City of Perryton, Texas, after being legally summoned, shall fail or re- fuse to attend, either in person or by able and competent substitute, or fail or refuse to bring tools at the time and place designated by the per- son summoning him, or to pay to such Mayor or Marshal or Secretary the sum of one dollar for each day he may have been notified to work on the streets, alleys and public grounds, or, having attended, shall fail or refuse to perform good ser- vice or any other duty required of him by this ordinance, or the person under whom he may work, or, if any one shall fail to comply with any duty required of him as provided in this ordinance, shall be deemed gult- y of a misdemeanor, and, upon

conviction thereof, fined in any sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars.

SECTION 17. All money collect- ed in fines for violations of this or- dinance shall be credited to the Street Improvement Fund of said City, and shall not be diverted or used for any purpose other than the im- provement of the public streets, al- leys and grounds of said city.

This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage and pub- lication for the time required by law, when the same shall be signed by the Mayor and attested by the Secre- tary, with the seal of said City af- fixed.

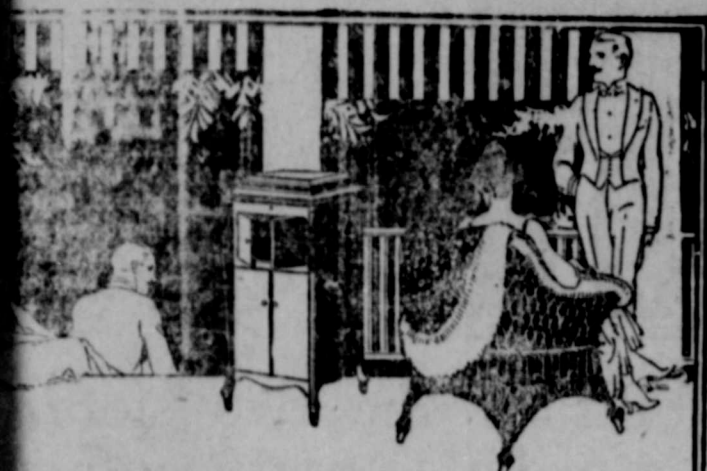

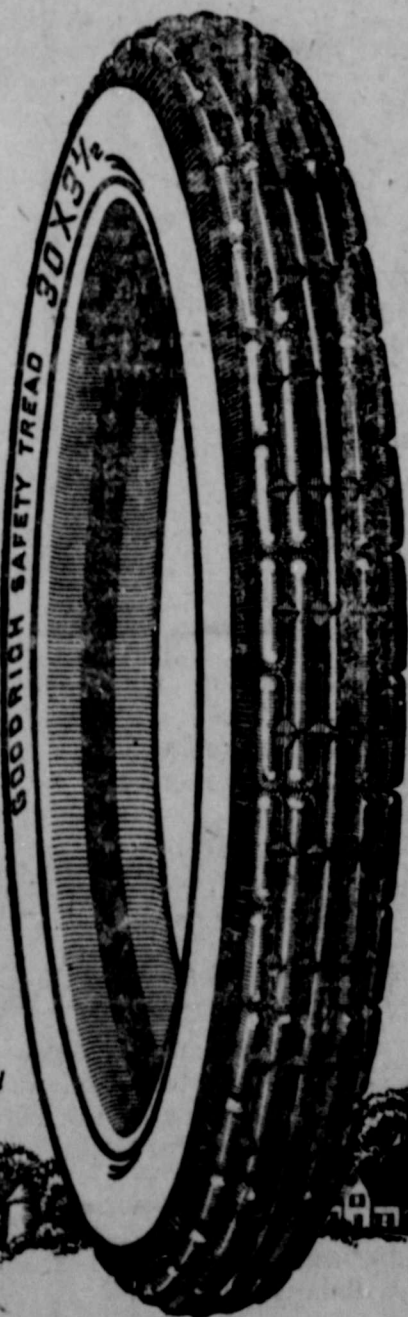
