SCHOOLS ACROSS TEXAS have now passed their first "No Pass, No Play" hurdle, with the losses in some school districts being extreme, while in others they were minimal.

At the class A school of Marathon, for example, the loss of five members of the school's football team forced the cancellation of the remainder of the school's football schedule.

We are not sure at this point if Marathon was fielding a six-man or an 11-man team, but regardless of that point, the team had to cancel its schedule. A lot of 11-man teams would have been in trouble by losing five or six players, Bovina being a prime example.

Across the state, the average loss was 16 per cent of the students in extra-curricular activities. Some schools kept their losses lower with a well-organized tutorial and/or counseling program.

Most school officials with whom we have discussed the "No Pass, No Play" rule agree on one major point: While schools must have an eligibility standard in order for academics to be upheld, the six-week "punishment" is far too severe.

"It's the death penalty," stated a spokesman for one football team that was stricken about as badly as the one mentioned earlier.

The tendency that we dread is the good possibility that several of those athletes who are ineligible for the current six-week period will drop out of school entirely.

A coach told me this past week that he had heard athletes make the remark that if they were on the failing list, they planned to drop out of school.

When this happens, these former students will be out on the streets, prime candidates for delinquency, drugs and crime of all sorts.

Is the punishment too severe?

At Plainview, where the school system lost 49 of 192 students involved in football (25.5 per cent), Superintendent Lamont Veatch says he thinks there is a strong chance that some students declared ineligible will drop out of school rather than bring up their grades.

"A person ought to be able to feel they've got a chance to come back," was Veatch's comments.

Most school officials, coaches, etc., feel that a week's ineligibility is plenty for a student involved in extra-curricular activities.

And, while athletics has received most of the publicity, from our way of thinking, the schools' marching bands stand to be hurt a lot worse than the football teams. For most of the bands, the six-week period comes just prior to the bands' UIL marching contest.

Band directors across the state find themselves having to plug holes, revamp their marching routines, etc. Whereas most football teams have substitutes they can move up where a player is lost, band directors don't usually have that luxury.

Having already seen one editorial that praised the "No Pass, No Play" system, we thought it appropriate to call attention to the pitfalls of the students who might possibly drop out of school entirely.

If this happens, then our state will find itself with more potential criminals, or welfare candidates, which adds to the cost to taxpayers. Consider this before giving Mark White and Ross Perot a pat on the back for the "success" of "No Pass, No Play."

Ponies Score Moral Victory

Ordinarily you would find little to rejoice about in a 55-0 loss, such as the Bovina Mustangs suffered to Abernathy last Friday night.

But the Mustangs considered the game a "moral victory," compared to the 77-0 loss they had chalked up at Abernathy a year ago.

And Abernathy Coach Larry Aldridge paid a compliment to the Mustangs, saying they were quite an improvement over last year's team. "Last year we had to lay down on the ball to keep from scoring a hundred points. This year, we just played our regular game," Aldridge told Bovina coach Bill Talley.

"I thought we played reasonably well at times. We made nine first downs, and advanced the ball inside their 20 twice," Talley pointed out.

In fact, the Mustangs came within an eyelash—or an official's back—of scoring against the potent Antelopes on one of the team's trips inside the 20.

But receiver Rey Duran, trying to get to a Blake Scaff pass, ran into the official and couldn't get to the ball.

"I felt confident Rey could have caught the pass. It was the first time in my coaching career I had seen a play like that one," Talley said.

The Mustangs had to settle for a field goal try, which did not work. They had another unsuccessful kick attempt on their other drive.

The Mustangs ran the ball a little better than they had in recent

games, quite an accomplishment since their top two ground gainers missed the game. Todd Ware injured his back during workouts, and Homer Renteria had a strep infection. Neither was able to play.

In the absence of Ware and Renteria, Hippy Gomez and Scott Scaff made some good yardage on the ground. Talley was particularly pleased with Scaff's showing, since he is the team's back-up quarterback, and had not worked at the runningback slot to speak of.

The team had a piece of good news, and bad news during the past week. Alazar Lara, a junior with senior eligibility, became eligible at the six-weeks mark, giving the team a "plus one" on the no-pass, no-play rule. Lara, a flanker back, was put immediately to work.

Lara started in Denver Riddle's starting spot. The bad news of the episode is that Riddle, who broke his thumb in the Springlake-Earth game, will probably miss the rest of the season.

"We just can't stand to lose players like Denver. We'll miss him," Talley said.

This Friday, the Mustangs travel to Olton, to meet another tough team. Olton has a 4-3 season and 1-1 district record, and is expected to challenge Abernathy for the district crown.

Olton is led by triple-threat quarterback Troy Don Allcorn, but Allcorn has missed the team's last couple of games with a bruised thigh, and Olton has played erratic.

"Olton has good team speed, probably more speed than Abernathy had, although Abernathy is a more physical team," Talley said.

If he plays, Allcorn is a good runner, passer and kicker. If his name sounds familiar, it's because his father, Gerald Allcorn, played for the Mustangs, and an uncle, R.V. Allcorn, was an all-state performer at Olton in the 1950s.

Court OKs Buying New Voting Booths

In order to comply with federal regulations, the Commissioners Court voted at their meeting October 16 to purchase voting booths (privacy stalls), which will be used during elections.

"The law requires a booth for each 150 registered voters. The smaller voting precincts will have adequate spaces for two people to vote," said County Clerk Bonnie Warren, who was authorized to order the aluminum "stalls."

It is hoped that the units will arrive by the constitutional amendment election November 5.

In other business, Sheriff Bill Morgan met with the court and

explained requirements for lighting and paint in the jail, for the facility to comply with the jail standards.

Boarding care bills for county foster children in the amount of \$1,299 were approved. The money will be reimbursed to the county by the state.

The court voted to contribute \$350 to the Texas Assn. of Counties to help toward the legal expenses in a case which would have a bearing on every county in the state.

Acting on another request from the Texas Assn. of Counties, the court passed a resolution urging the support of proposed constitutional amendments one and two in the special constitutional election November 5.

The proposed amendments supported by the court deal with the state water plan.

A bill for dues to the P.R.P.C. for 1985-86, in the amount of \$717.47 was approved on a split vote, with Judge Porter Roberts voting to break the tie.

Sgt. Scott, Trooper Bishop and Trooper Hunt met with the court requesting part-time help for the DPS paper work. Motion was passed to hire Amelia Taylor at Friona and Lena Cole at Farwell on a one-year trial basis, at \$100 per month starting November 1.

A citizens group met with the court to discuss a county road on which they live at the east edge of the county. During time of bad weather, feed trucks and milk trucks going to and from the Long Corral Dairy keep the road torn up, and it cannot be used unless a vehicle is pulled by a tractor. County Attorney Charles Aycock is to contact the owner of the dairy to discuss what can be done to alleviate the problem.
