New Marriage Law Effective June 13th

The new marriage law will become effective on June 13 and after that date a different procedure will be necessary in securing a license to wed. The bill was passed by the Texas legislature as an emergency issue and to become a law 90 days after its passage.

Heretofore all that was necessary to pay a visit to the preacher was a trip to the county clerk's office and as soon as she could write the necessary information on the certificate the couple were ready to be married.

Article 4601A

The law now stated that the parties on one part must visit the clerk and make application for a marriage license. The clerk will examine the parties under oath and reduce their examination to writing to which they must subscribe their names as to their age and residence. In the absence of one party and affidavit from some other party as to the age of the absent one must be furnished the clerk and the affidavit and sworn statement filed in the office.

Article 4601B

The application must be made not less than three full days nor more than 30 days before the license is to be issued. As soon as the application is made the county clerk will enter the information in a book furnished entitled "Notice of Intention to Marry."

Article 4604C

After three full days the license can be issued after the man presents a certificate from a reputable physician as to his physical condition in regard to venereal disease.

The county clerk of Runnels county has received all information and materials to begin enforcing the law on June 13th. The book of those intending to marry will be kept in the clerk's office and will be available to anyone who wishes to inspect it. This will make surprise elopements almost impossible where parents suspect such and keep a close check on those entered in this book.

After a license is issued it may be taken to any minister or magistrate and the ceremony performed.

The returns were to be announced at the general session at noon. The convention adjourns this afternoon. This convention is the second largest in the history of Rotary. The Cleveland convention in 1926 was the largest. More than 9,500 attended the convention here.

Quake Kills Many People

BUENOS AIRES, May 31.—Twenty-four are known dead and scores were injured as the result of an earthquake which destroyed parts of several towns and villages in the province of Mendoza. The big quake came in a series of tremors, the longest of which lasted four minutes. Telegraph and railway connections were destroyed and it is believed that trains are being held up on account of twisted wreckage on the roadbeds. Damage was estimated to be very heavy.

Baldwin to Resign After Labor Victory

LONDON, May 31.—The possibility that Premier Stanley Baldwin may resign immediately as a result of the landslide majority of votes cast to the labor party in the British general election, was admitted at headquarters of the conservative party today. The present ill health of the king may be a determining factor in the premier's decision. In view of the king's illness it was said that Premier Baldwin may carry on the government's affairs.

Decoration Service Is Well Attended

The most successful decoration day program ever held here was that of Thursday afternoon at Evergreen Cemetery. A large crowd of people gathered at 6 o'clock and the program as advertised was carried out in every particular.

Shortly after 6 o'clock the ex-service men formed in their line of march at the cemetery gate and with the color guard leading the band, followed by the National Guard and Legionnaires, marched to the center of the grove where the service was held. The program there was opened by the Ballinger Band playing the march "Gloria" which was followed by a prayer by Rev. E. W. McLaurin, chaplain of the Pat Williams post.

Commander M. C. Atkins made a few introductory remarks in which he stated that the American Legion was trying to make Decoration Day mean as much in the South as it does in the North. He also referred to the cemeteries of France and told how they were being cared for and what Decoration Day meant there in the great American cemeteries.

Following his remarks he introduced Dr. Wallace Bassett who in a short talk spoke of the soldier dead of our country, for what they served and died of and the liberty it is ours to enjoy today. His words and thoughts were well chosen for the occasion and he held his listeners at perfect attention during his talk.

The Ballinger Band played "Stars and Stripes Forever" as the ladies of the American Legion Auxiliary scattered to all parts of the cemetery, with a lady taking her place beside the grave of every soldier buried there, with a bouquet in her hand. A firing squad of 16 members of the National Guard fired a salute to the dead and as Taps was blown the flowers were tenderly laid on the graves of the dead of all wars.

The American Legion were delighted with the attendance and co-operation of the people here in the service. It was the largest crowd that has ever attended a decoration program and in the grove where the new improvements have recently been made, the large crowd gathered in a very impressive service.

Heat Wave Fatal to 13

NEW YORK, May 31.—New York is still sweltering today in the heat wave which took a toll of 13 lives in the area of Greater New York yesterday. The heat killed four persons, and 11 were drowned trying to escape the heat.

BOSTON, May 31.—New England continued in the grip of a heat wave today. There were five deaths reported due to the heat. Eight were drowned and 30 prostrations were reported in Greater Boston.

FORD AIRPORT HERO IS TO HAVE MEMORIAL STONE

PONTIAC, Mich., May 31.—A three-ton boulder, taken from his father's farm, will be unveiled at the dedication of Pontiac's Municipal Airport June 15 and 16 to perpetuate the memory of Harry Brooks, chief test pilot of the Ford Airport, who was drowned a year ago off the coast of Florida while attempting a non-stop flight to Miami from Detroit.

Brook's father, Harry Brooks, Sr., and Henry Ford have both been invited to attend the unveiling. The ceremony will be the highlight of a two-day dedication program which will include maneuvers by at least 75 commercial pilots and a squadron of 25 army airmen from Selfridge Field. Governor Fred W. Green and a host of city and county officials will be present.

A five-day good-will flight will precede the airport dedication.

Trying to Force New Tariff Bill

WASHINGTON, May 31.—An effort to force public hearings on the new tariff bill for the first time in history, threatened the project. A lively battle was on in the senate even before the measure was formally considered. Senator LaFollett of Wisconsin, sponsored the resolution directing the Senate Finance Committee to hold public hearings on the measure. The house enacted this bill last week. The proposal met with very prompt opposition by administration leaders but LaFollett predicted that it will be approved by the combination of democrats and independents. The administration leaders, worried about their program for recessing congress from early June until September, looked upon the move as another attempt to embarrass them.

NEW YORK IS PLANNING TALLEST BUILDING YET

(By International News Service)

NEW YORK, May 31.—Proposal for a huge civic center building—taller than the Woolworth Building—will be made in the report of the Regional Plan of New York and its Environs to be made public May 27.

The proposed structure would tower 1,000 feet toward the sky and would be ultra modern in design.

It would be built just north of the present city hall, according to the suggestion of the regional planners who have outlined a development plan covering the 425 municipalities within a 55-mile radius of New York.

The regional plan provides in outline form a proposal which would care for a population of 20,000,000 with room enough for each family to have a home of its own on a lot 40x100 feet. The present population of the area is 10,000,000.

Seven months research and an outlay of nearly \$1,000,000 has been expended on the regional plan details of which will be made known at a meeting in the engineering societies building.

New York, New Jersey and Connecticut state officials as well as representatives of municipalities involved will attend the meeting where it is expected to form a public association to put the regional plan into effect. George McAneny, former chairman of the Public Service Commission and a former president of the Borough of Manhattan will head the new organization.

NEW INDIA AIR MAIL
GIVES BANK PROBLEM

ABERDEEN, Scotland, May 31.—The new air mail to India has caught the bank authorities napping.

An Aberdeen business man purchased a draft in Calcutta for a large sum on March 28. It was bought from a bank and drawn on the P. and O. Banking Corporation, Calcutta.

The draft was sent by the first air mail, which left London on March 30. It was presented for payment in Calcutta, on April 10, 11 days later.

Under usual arrangements the money would not be due for payment until April 20, and the London bankers who handled the money had failed to realize that their covering advice note would need to be in Calcutta ten days earlier than customary.

The draft despatched from London was honored, but the bank in India had to put out funds for 10 days.

Screen Deaths
Losing Novelty
For Movie Man

HOLLYWOOD, May 31.—Death is no stranger to Wallace Beery. He has been shot to death, trampled to death, crushed to death, burned to death, and skinned alive. He has been eaten by sharks and swordfish, by cannibals and wild beasts. He has committed suicide a time or two. In all, Beery says that during the past sixteen years he has been killed thirty-five times, although fortunately none of the deaths were fatal.

Beery has had a checkered career. His public never knows what role he will play next; whether he will be a comedian or a college professor, a villain or a hero. He has clowning in circuses, herded elephants, sung starring roles in musical comedies, played "cop" and almost everything else during his pursuit of fame as an actor, which began when he was a boy.

"Good recording voices are more common among women than men," announces Director William J. Cullen, who has just finished testing hundreds of applicants for screen roles. "I wanted a boy and a girl to star in a picture; I found a girl almost immediately with a voice suited to the leading feminine part, but I have made hundreds of tests of boys without finding the voice I want," states the director.

The amateur scenario writers of the nation have quit. Talking pictures are too much to buck up against. The amateur scenario writers wrote reams during the reign of silence; they were undisputed by the frequently published fact that only one in about every million manuscripts was accepted. But now the studios have hired dialogue writers from the professional stage to do most of their script, the amateurs have walked out. Radio Pictures formerly handled an average of 1500 manuscripts from amateurs each month, they report, and now they are not

bothered by more than 300. Needless to say, the change is welcomed by the studio scenario editors.

The editors do admit, however, to a little sentimentality about the loss of their contributors. "We miss the bird's eye view of the nation's day dream," says Henry Hobart, Radio Pictures associate producer. "The great stream of manuscripts presented an interesting cross section of the national mind. The authors of New England almost invariably write stories about the sea; the authors of New York would tell us about crime and the underworld; those writing in the west sent us romantic cowboy stories."

One of the largest forces of motion picture expert electricians ever assembled on a set will handle the 376 lights assembled for the theatrical sequence of "Burlesque," now being made by Paramount. One hundred electricians will be on hand, with a myriad of helpers. The total candlepower of the lights to be used in the sequence will run into millions.

Thirty of the lamps are of the sun-arc type, developing 750,000 candlepower each. Four portable generators will be used to supply "juice" for the immense illuminating battery.

MICHIGAN TO CHASE
CRIMINALS BY RADIO

LANSING, Michigan, May 31.—Governor Fred W. Green has signed a bill providing for a state police broadcasting station to be used in establishing a state-wide radio network for apprehension of criminals. Such a system is already in operation in Detroit.

The broadcasting station will be located in East Lansing. All state police and the offices of county sheriffs will be equipped with receiving sets permanently tuned to a wave length of the state police station. The system will make it possible to close out all the main roads in any section within a few minutes after the reporting of any important crime.

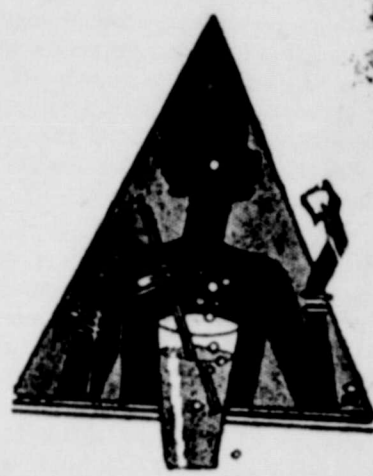

BERLIN MAKES PLANS FOR AN AD CONGRESS

BERLIN, May 31.—Although the World Advertising Congress in Berlin will not convene until August, the Berlin congress bureau has already begun preparing for it.

The congress, whose motto is "advertising is prosperity," will be opened on August 11 in the great radio hall in the western part of the city. Minister Stresemann will be present at the formal inauguration.

Following the congress, all the delegates will make a tour through Germany. No less than 30 cities, including Munich, Frankfurt, Leipzig and Dresden, have invited the delegates to be their guests on this tour.

Sound Pictures Take Spotlight On Movie Lots

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., May 31.—Of the 17,000 theatres in the United States showing motion pictures or combining them with vaudeville, approximately 3,000 are wired for sound by means of one or another of the several methods of reproduction. New installations are being made at the rate of 300 each month on an increasing scale and selling organizations estimate that at least 5,000 of the best houses in the country will be equipped to show talkies within the year.

Consequently, few pictures are being produced without sound effects or musical accompaniment, and most of the studios are working on full dialogue features exclusively.

Even the "die hards" are coming around in answer to the constant urge of public demand.

Charlie Chaplin, well known defender of the "last ditch" in the silent film field, is making small concession to the "new art" in his latest picture by introducing sound effects in several scenes, and Edwin Carewe, staunch supporter of the "charming silence" of the old practices in screen technique, is including several singing sequences in his filming of Longfellow's "Evangeline," although neither will be graced by dialogue.

In the celluloid version of the Acadian love lyric, Dolores Del Rio will sing in French an unpublished chansonette by Marie Antoinette and the theme song "Evangeline," written by Al Jolson. The first screen star to sing for a phonograph and over the radio, the Mexican actress has the added distinction to be the first to sing in a foreign tongue for the sound pictures.

Song sequences are becoming increasingly popular, at least with the producers. They have not been used long enough as yet to judge the public's reaction, but it will be favorable, film critics believe, as the melodious passages allow love scenes time necessary to properly establish their importance without allowing an apparent slowing of tempo.

Many of the major producing companies are going in heavily for musical comedies, operettas and revues and some of the most famous figures of the stage are being drafted for singing parts.

One of the latest of the vaude-

ville headliners to desert the foot-lights for the sun-arcs is Ann Greenway, signed by Radio Pictures for featured roles in "Rio Rita" and "Hit the Deck."

Two of the show writers who have left the Alley of Applause for the Street of Make-believe are Bert Kalmar and Harry Ruby, who have written many popular song hits, their latest being "The Five o'Clock Girl."

SAY WHALE HUNTERS DISCOVERED AMERICA

PARIS, May 31.—Whale hunters from the Basque country and not Christopher Columbus discovered America.

This is the reaction of French savants to the honor paid France by Meade Minnigerode, author of New York.

Minnigerode has just sprung a sensation by asserting that cod fishers from Brittany visited the Newfoundland banks in 1392, one hundred years before Columbus set out to prove that the world was not flat.

Camille Jullian, historian and member of the French Academy, told International News Service, that the real discoverers of America came from the country just half way between Brittany and Spain.

"Mr. Minnigerode may be correct about the cod fishers but there is every indication that they were preceded to Newfoundland by other French seafarers by nearly a century," said Professor Jullian. "After the Basque fishermen had driven the whales from the gulf they continued to pursue the sea monsters first to Iceland and Greenland, and finally to Newfoundland."

"Etienne Clairac, another old writer, notes that as many as 3000 fishermen left the Basque coast for America long before Columbus."

For several months the Society of Friends, the famous Quaker body, which has a great interest in the little place where the real founder of Pennsylvania worshiped, as a Quaker, have been busy at work.

With the generous help of many Americans, several of whom made a special pilgrimage to Jordan's from the United States, and many other sympathizers, enough money has been raised to buy tracts of lands surrounding the Meeting House.

German Heiress Pays Tribute To Henry Ford

DETROIT, May 31.—Henry Ford is "100 per cent human."

That is the way Miss Clairmore Stinnes, daughter of the late German steel magnate, characterized the automobile genius here after a 90-minute conversation with him. "Mr. Ford is undoubtedly one of the most outstanding men that I have ever met in the United States," Miss Stinnes said. "I'm not at all certain but what he is one of the most outstanding men I have ever met—he is 100 per cent human. With all of his wealth, success and varied interests, he is human enough to sit down and talk with visitors."

Miss Stinnes, accompanied by C. A. Soderstrom, Swedish sportsman, is making a two-year world-wide tour, collecting data and recording her impressions and experiences in the form of a book. Soderstrom is making motion pictures of the trip.

Miss Stinnes said that she and Mr. Ford talked mostly about her world tour. Mr. Ford later took her on a personally conducted tour through the Ford collection of Americana.

"Mr. Ford didn't say much about my father," Miss Stinnes continued. "He did say he was very sorry he had never met him. He also said he admired him very much and that he was very marvelous and successful in everything, except, in that of caring for his health," she added.

Continuing in her praise of the automobile genius, Miss Stinnes said:

"Mr. Ford is an organizer. I like him particularly because he does not run his industry to hoard money. He puts his dollars back into the enterprise. He makes prosperity and keeps providing work for more and more people who want to work."

Ninety per cent of Detroit's prosperity and success, Miss Stinnes vouchsafed, is due to Henry Ford. "Every time you say Detroit in Germany," Miss Stinnes said, "one thinks immediately of Henry Ford."

When the possible "automobile war" in Germany between Ford and the General Motors Company was mentioned, Miss Stinnes spoke eagerly:

"But doesn't it seem to you that a corporation cannot be compared with a personality—personality such as Ford's for instance?"

She added quickly, however: "But then, he made such a tremendous impression on me only a short time ago."

Bumper Wheat Crop Forecast For Southwest

KANSAS CITY, May 31.—The sun-burned soldiers of the vast prairies of the southwest, where today the eye can see only a velvety green carpet of wheat, are polishing up the artillery for another offensive on the wheat crop.

The harvest army will launch its campaign between June 5 and 10 in central Texas. In that region the big Berthas—combine harvesters—and the smaller weapons—binders—are in repair ready to start the annual northward march on the ripening golden grain.

Forty million acres in the great southwest will be mowed down by the harvest army in two months time. The harvest will move northward, once it starts, at the rate of 20 to 25 miles a day, reaching the great fields of Kansas the latter part of June.

Like huge hospitals, grain elevators and mills are completing work on additional storage space. The crop this year will be a bumper harvest, according to all present indications. Private estimates place the probable yield between 600 and 650 million bushels. The yield last year was 579 million bushels and the 10 year average is 549 million bushels.

Just as the Red Cross moves in behind advancing troops to pick up the casualties, so are the owners of truck lines preparing to follow the harvesters to pick up the threshed grain and remove it to mills and elevators.

Going over the top is not a spectacular charge for the harvesters army. The weather must first reach the sweltering stage. The offensive begins in each locality rather timidly. Here and there a hardy soul enters the field with a binder. By the next day other binders and combines appear and soon the entire vicinity is humming with activity as the golden fields become barren earth again by the assault of the harvesters.

The biggest worry to the grain growers right now is the probable price. The carry-over supply of wheat is the largest in years. At the same time, this year's acreage of 40 million acres, has been exceeded only five times. Slow export demand is blamed for the large carry-over.

While the wheat farmer scratches his head as he thinks with his harvest weapons, wondering what to do with the bumper crop, a dozen situations may arise overnight to relieve the over-supply which now threatens to lower prices. Rust, smut, frost in Canada, or a continuation of the unseasonal rains in the southwest can reduce the 1929 bumper yield to a below normal crop.

One of the biggest harvest time worries of the past—the shortage of labor—has nearly been eliminated. Improved machinery, especially the combine harvesters and tractors, have made it possible for two men to harvest 25 to 30 acres of wheat a day. In the past a dozen men were required to do the same amount of work.

Chicago Clinic Aims to Lower Doctor's Bills

CHICAGO, May 31.—You not only can be as sick as you can afford, in Chicago—you can be sicker.

Heretofore the poor man has been unable to have expensive diseases. He simply couldn't afford to be diagnosed, say, for gout, or for chronic dyspepsia. If you mentioned feeling certain symptoms, the doctor said:

"Well, it'll take a long series of treatments to cure that. Now first—." And the patient's bill resembled Lithuania's war debt.

The Chicago Medical Society is out to reduce the cost of being ill, for the man of modest means. Suggestions of free clinics in the past have met with a chilly shoulder. One prominent physician was expelled from the sacred medical circle, and it was mentioned by others who resigned in protest against his dismissal that he was in the right strictly, because of his connections with a clinic.

The Medical Society heatedly denied the connection, but the clinic business suffered.

Now the Medical Society announces a plan to make treatments, diagnoses, or even operations, fit the purse of the patient. No reduction in the usual cost of neurosthenia for millionaires is contemplated, but the working man shortly will be able to have disorders unavailable to his fellows in less fortunate cities.

Dr. J. V. Fowler, past president of the society and one of its trustees is author of the new plan.

A centralization of all clinical and diagnostic facilities into a series of community hospital centers throughout the city and over Cook county is the plan.

Patients could go to their family physicians, as before, and the family physicians could take them to the community hospital centers.

Diagnostics facilities, advice of staff doctors, and treatment opportunities would be offered at these centers at a moderate cost, thereby reducing the cost of being ill.

"For those unable to meet the regular costs of diagnosis and treatment, a philanthropic fund would be available from which they could obtain money to pay the needed bills," Dr. Fowler explained.

The spectacle of men of moderate means saddled with installments on operations, along with their radio and automobile installments, affected the citizens of Chicago with shudders that were in due time passed along to the physicians in the form of public opinion, expressed by daily papers.

In the future, when and if the plan is adopted medical attention will be paid for in cash, at the time, and in accordance with the patient's financial standing. Even hospital bills would be influenced by the new policy.
