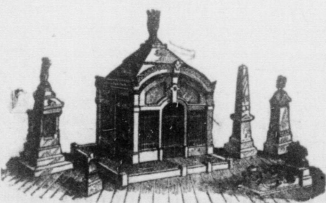

THE VALUE OF GIVING OUR Girls a Religious Education

A college career is a means to an end and its value is religious. It brings wealth to the mind and gives richness to experience. Both the means and the end are suggested in an exclamation of the Apostle Paul, "Thanks be to God who always leads us in triumph through Christ and makes manifest through us the savor of his knowledge in every place." The consciousness of God leading us in triumph through all experiences and showing through us the savor of his knowledge wherever we are—such is Christian education's value.

Every girl who can should go to college. Every girl who wills can. "The artist, it is true, is a son of his age, but we be to him if he is also his pupils or even his favorite." Let a beneficent divinity snatch him betimes as a suckling from his mother's breast and nurse him with the milk of a better time and let him ripen under a distant Grecian sky. When he has attained his full growth, let him return a foreign shape into his century not, however, to delight in his presence, but to purify it. Ah, men—men's sons, to purify it.

Children of Their Age.
Young women are children of their age; they must not become either its pupil or its master. They dare not become its favorites, and try to prophesy. They should be fed with ideals and ideas of a better time and ripen to womanhood under a distant Grecian sky. The Christian College is that Grecian land. It stands in some historic spot among the mountains on their eastern slopes where the daughters can see the drawings of new days and catch the first whispers of coming truths. Within its magic environment, it draws the girls of strong desires and aspirations, thirsty for knowledge, hungry for life. Here they find themselves; feel their powers; learn judgments; discover values. They come as maidens and leave as women, matured in mind and strong of heart. They come as "babes crying in the night"

and go forth as "voices crying in the wilderness." When they have attained their full growth, they go back to their homes, churches, business world and friends, not knowing how much they have changed, but changed to all who know them. They return no longer to merely adorn their communities with their presence, but by service to make them better. They go out into life, as Hall Caine said, to make this "century of humanity" because they live to emphasize the "moral interests of this day."

Treasures Multiplied.
In these colleges the young woman finds all needed forms of knowledge and discipline in the use of all methods by which knowledge is obtained. The very mechanism of college life are mastered and become instruments of subduing kingdoms and increasing happiness. She becomes a queen indeed, and the scepter of learning is a magic wand. Her treasures are multiplied. Opportunities crowd upon her. Better still is that "force of a life example"—the professor whose character and friendship ennoble her ambition. As within the shadows of the University of Leyden a stone marks the spot where John Robinson lived, taught and died, so in the memory of college women is engrained the name of some rare soul and teacher.

So she lives those golden years in an atmosphere charged with an enthusiasm for truth. No wonder she learns the lesson of integrity. Taught that power is more than possession, principles better than acquisitions, a college girl recognizes true standards of excellence in life. She gets the sense of ideal values. The admirable is admired, the trashy is disesteemed. She can feel the pathos of lost causes, she applauds those who champion them. "This is what a Christian College can do for a young woman. She learns how to be herself, make her way, to cheer, to raise, to guide, to others by showing them facts amid appearances. She is the "world's eye and the world's ear."

TO GET MAN HIGHER TOP IN GRAFT PLOT

LEARN WHERE NEW YORK'S VICE FUND WAS DELIVERED.

Powerful Official Is to Indict, Says Prosecutor—Becker, Jailed Police Lieutenant, Will Try to Fasten the Murder of Rosenthal on Gimmam Who Will Testify for State.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Within two weeks a powerful police official, not named as yet, will be indicted for graft as a result of developments in the Rosenthal murder case, according to the district attorney, and with him will be indicted two inspectors who have been doing the extortion "dirty work." Officials who have been investigating the astounding revelations of blackmail among grafters in criminal cases have found the man "higher up" and will soon have facts on the entire system, through which vice and crime in New York have paid \$3,000,000 annually to the police department.

Some idea of the extent of the graft which has been harried and exposed may be gained when it is stated that there are 10,208 policemen in New York, who cost the taxpayers \$16,000,000 a year. London, England, has 21,000 policemen, and it is the only city in the world that has a larger police force than New York. It is charged that police gamblers, pick pockets, housebreakers, murderers and thugs are still in partnership.

Line on Becker Defense.
Confirmed for his life, Police Lieutenant Becker, who is alleged to have controlled the underworld of New York, will try to fasten the murder of Herman Rosenthal, gambler, for which he is held responsible, on one of the State's witnesses. The Becker defense will be that the plan was only to kidnap Rosenthal, and that Becker had nothing to do with it. When Vallon, who was to have led the kidnapers, saw Rosenthal he became inflamed by an old grudge. Becker will claim, and shot the gambler dead. It is said Becker will have witnesses who will swear to this.

Mayor Is Accused.
Police Inspector Hayes, reduced and suspended for failing to suppress immoral resorts, says his presence will be that he held back from raiding the resorts because he was officially informed that Mayor Gaynor did not want the raids made. The inspector is said to have been involved in the Rosenthal case by statements of the prisoners.

Late last week the district attorney's office issued a reward of two uncaught gunmen, reading as follows:
"For 'Lefty Louie' and 'Gyp,' the Bloods' \$5000 reward, dead or alive."

An organized vice trust has been discovered. It has operated many places which are run in violation of the law, controlling 1200 women and thirty-six resorts. The syndicate is said to have been paying tribute on all sides, this including graft to police officials.

Schepps Tells All.
Sam Schepps confessed to District Attorney Whitman on the way from Albany to this city that he and Rose paid the murderers of Herman Rosenthal with Lieutenant Becker's money and that he had been the messenger between Becker and Rose while Rose was in hiding.

As soon as the train bearing Whitman and Schepps got here, detectives acting and under orders from Commissioner Waldo and Second Deputy Commissioner Dougherty to deliver Schepps at police headquarters made two attempts to take the informant away from the district attorney. Whitman warned the detectives that if they laid a finger on Schepps they would be arrested for oppression.

They backed down and reported to Commissioner Waldo, who rescinded the order. But by that time Schepps had been rushed by Whitman's men to the West Side court, arraigned for vagrancy, and held for one week—long enough for the district attorney's purpose to work out.

The efforts to snatch Schepps from the district attorney forced the first open clash between the police department and the district attorney. The district attorney charges that the police wanted to intimidate Schepps before permitting him to talk about the murder of Rosenthal and the blackmailing operations of policemen.

LITTLE MOTHER HAS BIG BABY
She Weighs Ninety Pounds, Her Child Eighteen.

GRAND JUNCTION, Col., Aug. 27.
"Mother and baby are doing fine," was the information given out from the home of Mrs. Antoinette Crosso, wife of a section hand here, who gave birth to a boy whose weight is just one-fifth of that of the mother. Mrs. Crosso weighs 90 pounds while the weight of the child is 18 pounds.

HE HAS A FAT LITTLE BRIDE
"Napkin Ring" for Wedding Circlet at This Ceremony.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Miss Albin Thill, a girl of 650 pounds, is now the wife of Louis H. Aikin, weight 135 pounds. At her wedding the bride groom supplied her with a wedding ring the size of a napkin ring.

TO STUDY EUROPEAN AGRICULTURAL FINANCE

Washington, D. S., August 26.—The Senate yesterday unanimously endorsed the foreign commission of the Southern Commercial Congress, which is to go abroad next May to study systems of agricultural finance in Europe. The commission also has been endorsed by the State Department and will thus tour Europe with the backing of the United States Government.

Endorsement of the Senate occurred in record time. Last Tuesday Senator Newlands of Nevada introduced the resolution endorsing the commission. Wednesday Senator Fletcher of Florida, president of the Southern Commercial Congress, addressed the Senate in favor of the resolution, which was referred the same day to the committee on agriculture and forestry. Yesterday Senator Hoke Smith of Georgia reported out the resolution favorably from the committee, and it was called up in the Senate by senator Smith and unanimously passed. Rarely does the Senate take such speedy action on any measure, and only then with emergency bills.

Senator Fletcher's speech in the Senate contained the complete proceedings of the conference of the Southern Commercial Congress, held in Nashville, Tenn., April 1-6, regarding the plan of a European investigation of rural finance, the results of the investigation to be used to inaugurate in this country some system similar to the European systems.

This document contains reports by Dr. Clarence J. Owens, managing director of the Southern Commercial Congress, and David Lubin, American delegate to the International Institute of Agriculture, held in Rome, Italy, who will accompany the commission on its tour, and other information concerning European agricultural finance. This was printed in full in the Congressional Record of August 14, with Senator Fletcher's speech.

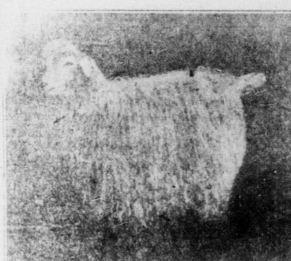

SOMEWHERE

East of Suez

It is perhaps just as well not to mention the exact place where the following little incident occurred, for it is not a large city, and my careful changing of a certain name might prove in vain if I did so.
