Lose 30-0

Buffaloes Burn Longhorns

Hart Longhorns got burned Friday night with the blazing speed of the Petersburg Buffaloes and fumbled away the momentum in the first half.

Hart drove to the Buff's 23 before fumbling it away in the first quarter. The Buffs then broke wingback Quentin Berry for a 49 yard romp and tailback Mike Phillips got the final 26 steps to put up the first score.

The Horns established another drive that ended on the Petersburg 5 when Buff Eric Sell picked off a pass. The Buffaloes fumbled on their next series

but Hart was forced to punt. Petersburg's QB Todd Surbet then hit Phillips with a pass down the side for 75 yards and the TD. PAT pass fell incomplete.

Following the kickoff return to the 50, Hart was threatening when Horn Fumble was recovered by Sell in the end zone. Using mainly big plays, the Buffs scored again on a 33 yard run by Phillips. the PAT pass attempt was intercepted to end the scoring in the first half.

In the second half, the Horns, being down 18-0 were kept off balance by finding it necessary to play catch-up

ball. Unable to shut down the big play outside, Hart was scored on again on a 10 yard scamper by Berry. PAT pass was incomplete.

Hart again fumbled but Petersburg was unable to move the ball until late in the final stanza. At that point, a 15 yard Hart penalty tacked on to the end of a 16 yard pass completion carried the ball to the Horn 22. Five plays later Surbet hit Sell for 12 yards and the final score. The PAT pass was again intercepted.

The Longhorns threatened one more time in the last seconds as they drove to the Buff's 9 before being repelled by 2 consecutive QB sacks. The final score gave the 0-30 win to the visitors but anyone at the game must agree the Horns played better than last week.

The Longhorns take on the Silverton Owls next week here at home. Come out to support these young men as they try to put a whole game together.

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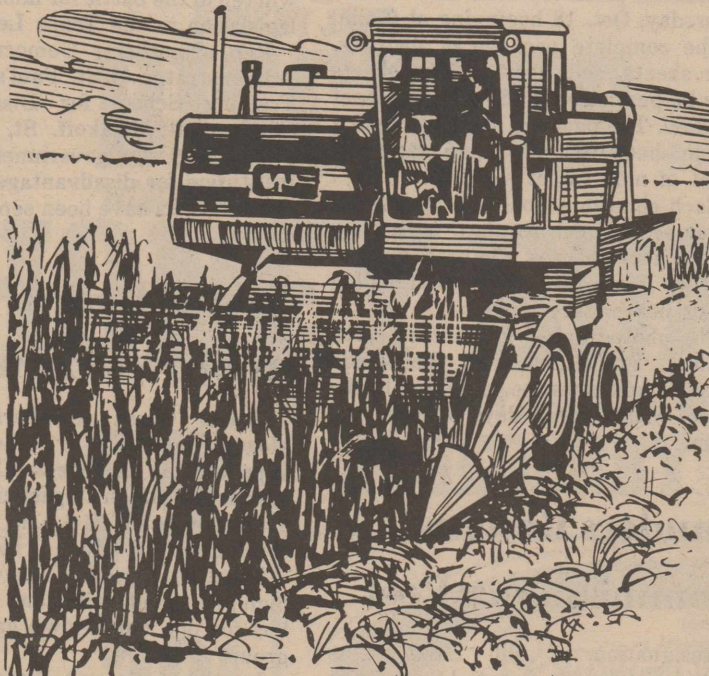
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Chi Psi Begins New Year With Hawaiian Luau

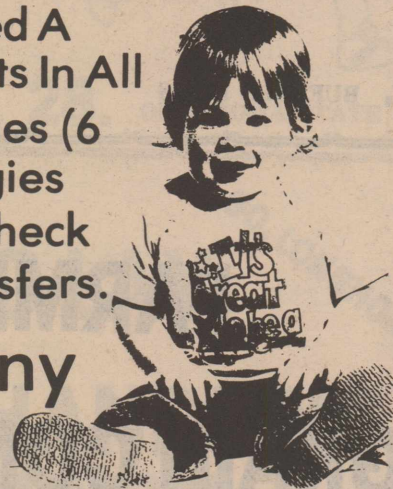

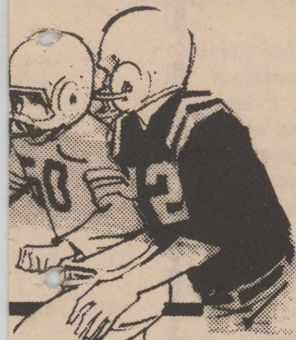

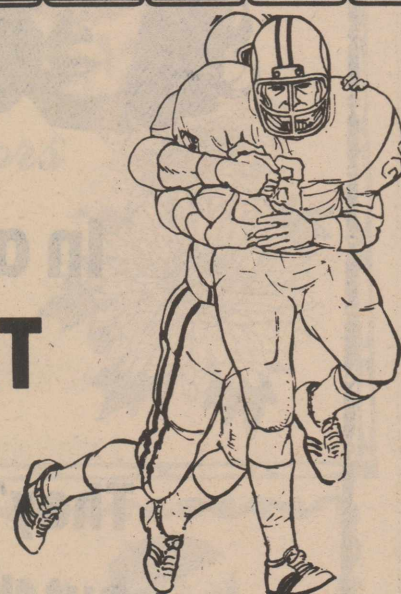
