Bartender trick hurts six

Six people were burned at an Iowa City, Iowa, college hangout after with a bartender's stunt set the bartop ablaze.

The bartenders at Et Cetera sent a stream of rum down the bartop and ignited it early Thursday, scattering some customers.

The flames raced up the arm of a young woman, setting her hands and face on fire, said Whitney Grabinski, a University of Iowa student. She was hospitalized.

Charges may be filed, police said.

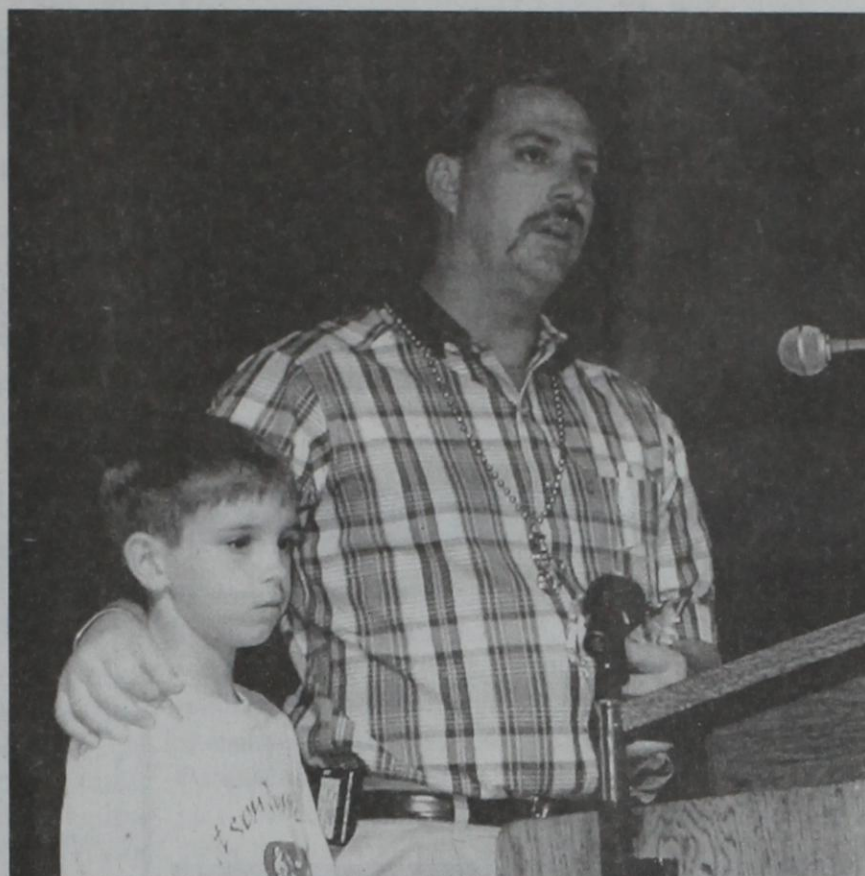
LOCAL WEATHER

The program was sponsored by United Methodist Women at the First United Methodist Church of Muleshoe.

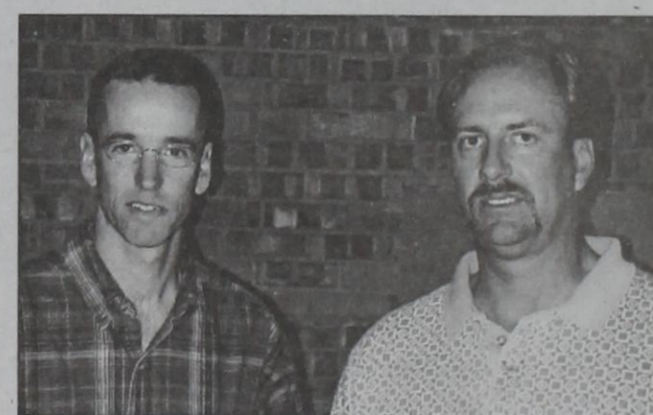
Ellis said he has been a member of the team since its inception in 1992;

Carter joined in 2000, and the Twin Towers project was his first disaster experience.

Both men served two

three-week tours working 18 to 20 hours a day.

Atwood, Cox to run at state

Kyle Atwood and Annie Cox qualified for the state track meet during the April 26-27 Region I meet at Ratliff Field in Odessa.

Atwood took first in both the 800- and 1,600-meter runs with times of 1 minute, 56.71 seconds and 4:34.05.

He finished more than four seconds in front of the second runner in the 800 and almost three and a half seconds ahead in the 1,600.

This will be Atwood's third consecutive trip to the state meet; he is the defending state champion in the 800-meter event.

"It was a slow pace (in the 1,600) today — I should have gone out faster in the third lap, but I wanted to save some for the kick. I saved too much," Atwood said after winning the race.

Cox, whose nickname should be "Nails" because of her tough-

ness and desire, placed second in the 300-meter hurdles with a time of 46.08. She had hit a hurdle in the finals of the 100-meter hurdles, bruising the back of her left leg, and was helped from the track. She returned to the track limping slightly for the finals of the 300-meter hurdles and trimmed 2.74 seconds from her district qualifying time.

Cox's second-place finish was only .08 of a second behind the winner and was bittersweet: She eliminated her teammate and third-place medallist Eva Pylant from the state meet. Pylant recorded a time of 46.20 — only a half step behind Cox.

In the field events, Sara Benham took the third-place medal by leaping 5 feet, 2 inches in the high

National Disaster Medical System response for disasters and was formed to deal with potentially high casualties in the Gulf War.

Ellis is commander of the team's Region 4, which includes New Mexico, Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana. Region 4 was alerted right after the attack, but the team was not sent to New York City until December.

Ellis also became the commander for 300 team personnel in New York after the original commander was called home. "It was the biggest challenge of my life," he said.

Ellis was given three New York state policemen and Carter, who had become part of the administrative team, to help him around New York. They said they quickly learned that Mayor Rudy Giuliani ruled the city with an iron fist.

While the two Muleshoe men were working on the World Trade Center disaster, American Airlines Flight 587 went down in Queens and the team helped with victim identification there.

Ellis said about 1,000

bodies have been identified from the World Trade Center, but about 20,000 body parts are unidentified. He said one part of the rubble burned at 2,600 degrees for 90 days.

Both men expressed appreciation for their Muleshoe lifestyle after spending time in New York City.

positions up for re-election.

Hospital-district voters, who cast their ballots in the high school cafeteria, are eligible to participate only if they live in a voting district that runs the entire length of town.

Basically, the district runs along American Boulevard from Houston Street on the east to Sherman on the west, but the district is irregular in shape.

On the east end, the district includes everything between American Boulevard and Birch Avenue, from Houston westward.

Farther west, the district boundary jogs north to include Boston, Chicago and Dallas streets, then back to American Boulevard. But toward the west end of town, it also includes the

area north of the tracks between West Tenth and Ithaca streets.

The northern boundary also jogs to the south of American Boulevard for one block — between West Sixth and West Seventh.

The south boundary, however, is more complex. Starting at Houston on the east end, it follows American Boulevard as far as the block just west of East Sixth Street.

From there, it jogs one block south to East Avenue B, one block west to East Fifth Street, one block south to East Avenue C, one block west to East Fourth Street and one block south to East Avenue D.

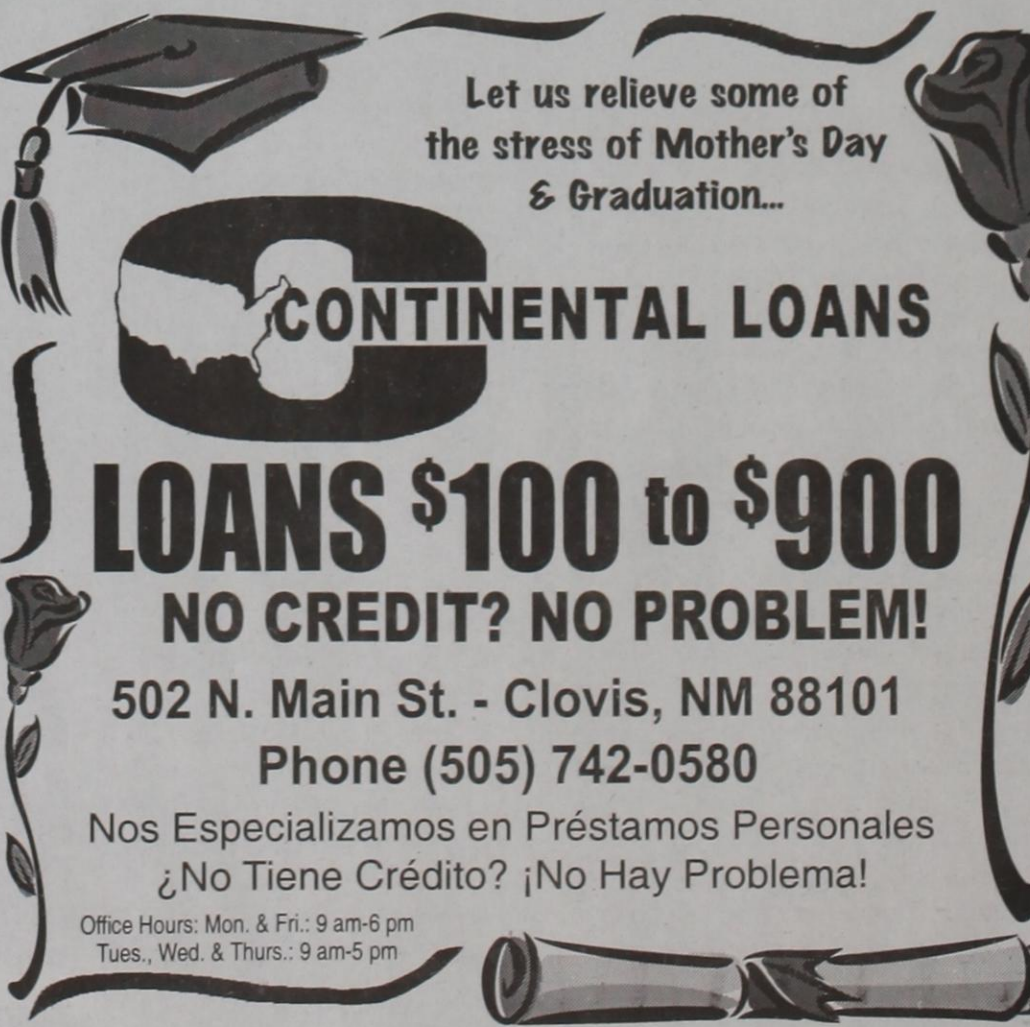
The boundary then runs west along Avenue D to West Second Street and

south on Second to West Avenue G.

Included is the area between Watson Junior High and DeShazo Elementary School and the blocks at both ends of Watson, but not three blocks west of DeShazo between West Fifth and West Eighth from Avenue C to Avenue D.

Generally speaking, farther west the boundary includes everything between American Boulevard and West Avenue F from West Eighth to West 15th streets.

West of 15th, the only blocks included are one bounded by Avenue C, Avenue D and 16th; the two between Avenue B and Avenue C from 15th to 17th; and the first two blocks south of American Boulevard and west of West 19th.



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Autumn sage, nearly ideal for our climate

Not many plants represent a better investment in our climate than autumn sage (*Salvia greggii*).

Granted, not everybody is crazy about the intense red or hot pink flower colors. But in situations where they don't clash with something, there are few plants that bloom more in the hottest weather and bring such color to the summer doldrums.

Judging from the name, I guess these plants originally only bloomed in the fall. That may be because their native habitat gets rainfall mainly in the fall. At least, a little water seems to be the only requirement for bringing on a burst of bloom.

I have only one (cultivar unknown) that's in a spot where it's had regular watering this spring, and it's covered with flowers and buds.

Most of the others, scattered around the farm, suffered quite a bit of damage in that last 8-degree weather we had, so they're having to regrow. The hot pinks didn't seem to fare any worse than the reds, though, so I guess they're equally as hardy as the original type.



One cultivar that wasn't harmed by the cold is 'Furman's Red.' I don't know whether this is a hybrid (which might explain the extra hardiness), but it certainly has a growth habit unlike the other varieties I've seen.

Most autumn sages are broader than they are tall — like 2 feet across, and some of them may eventually get 3 feet tall. 'Furman's Red,' on the other hand, grows very upright. It may reach 3 feet tall, but it's only 18 inches wide and the branches reach up rigidly, rather than being relaxed and sort of sprawling like the others. It's clearly more drought-tolerant than the others, too.

The flowers also tend to be more of a clear red than most, rather than having the magenta overtones that so many exhibit.

'Furman's Red' has been widely available, but the only place I've seen it offered this spring is by

mail order from High Country Gardens (2902 Rufina St., Santa Fe, N.M. 87507-2929) or on the Internet at www.highcountrygardens.com.

My choice of the hot pinks is 'Wild Thing.' It's often available at garden centers, but you also can get it from High Country Gardens.

Hummingbirds love autumn sage, and with a little water during dry spells, the plants will bloom almost constantly from April to frost. You can't ask for much more than that.

Lucille Loudermilk of Clovis contacted the *Clovis News Journal* for information on pruning and fertilizing crape myrtle (*Lagerstroemia indica*).

As for pruning, less is more. The season is not as critical with crape myrtles as with many shrubs because the flowers are borne on new growth later in the season. (Early-spring shrubs should not be pruned until after they bloom, so you don't cut off the current crop of buds.)

Just about the only reason to prune crape myrtles

would be to thin out the branches (unless you're growing it into a tree form). This can result in slightly larger flower clusters.

As for fertilizing crape myrtle, why? There may be spots in our area where the soil is so poor that crape myrtle will need some fertilizer, but I haven't seen evidence of it. Top-dressing with a little compost should be enough, and will help hold the moisture.

In our dry climate, moisture is certainly more critical than fertilizer when it comes to flower size in crape myrtles.

This might be a good time to point out that contacting the individual newspapers where this column runs is not a good way to reach the columnist.

David Stevens of Clovis was nice enough to relay the message, but it isn't the responsibility of the individual newspapers to do that.

TODAY'S RECIPE

WARM SHRIMP SALAD WITH SPINACH

1 1/4 lbs. large shrimp, about 28 shrimp

4 cups loosely packed fresh spinach leaves

4 thin, peeled slices of red onion, broken into rings

6 Tbsp. olive oil

2 sweet red peppers, cored, seeded and cut into 1/2-inch cubes

Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste

2 tsp. peeled and finely chopped garlic, about two large cloves

1 Tbsp. red wine vinegar

1/2 cup chopped fresh basil leaves or parsley

1/2 tsp. grated lemon peel

4 lemon wedges

Peel and devein the shrimp and set aside.

Trim any tough stems off the spinach leaves. Rinse well and pat dry; arrange the spinach leaves on four

dinner plates.

Arrange an equal portion of the onion rings in the center of each plate.

Heat the oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add the shrimp, red peppers, salt and pepper. Cook, stirring, for about two minutes.

Add the garlic and cook, still stirring, for another minute. (Do not let the garlic brown.)

Add the vinegar; cook and stir for 45 seconds and remove from heat.

Add half the basil and all the lemon peel; toss well.

Spoon the shrimp and sauce equally over the onion rings and spinach.

Sprinkle with the remaining basil.

Taste for seasoning, adding more salt and pepper if desired.

Serve immediately with lemon wedges.

Yield: 4 servings

South Plains pest projects get funding

SPECIAL TO THE JOURNAL LUBBOCK—Seven Integrated Pest Management research projects conceived by Texas A&M scientists and Extension agents working on the South Plains recently received more than \$70,000 in grants from the Texas Department of Agriculture. They are:

- \$14,740 to compare intensive field scouting, in which Extension agents work directly with producers to scout limited acres for insects, to survey scouting.
- \$14,732 to determine whether cotton variety selection and different planting dates will affect Lygus bug populations.
- \$11,982 to develop a comprehensive database of predators of cotton insect pests. The database will help producers make better pest management decisions.
- \$10,857 to identify plant diseases in High Plains cucurbit crops such as watermelons, squash, pumpkins and ornamental gourds.
- \$9,350 to examine how cotton plants compensate and recover from loss of pre-bloom squares caused by early insect pests.
- \$5,995 to evaluate flea-hopper management strategies to see if they increase insect control costs without boosting cotton yields.
- \$2,045 to analyze the usefulness of existing insect traps in monitoring and controlling the stem girdler complex of sunflower pests.
- \$726 for about 400 Hockley County fourth-graders to visit to area fields to help them learn about pest control in various crops.

Water district joins lawsuit over minnow

ALBUQUERQUE — High Plains Underground Water District and 16 other groups have filed a lawsuit challenging the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's designation of a critical habitat for the Arkansas river shiner, a small minnow.

"We believe the USFWS has violated the Endangered Species Act by failing to conduct a proper economic analysis," water-district manager Jim Conklin said.

"They are basically saying there is no economic impact from designating a critical habitat for the Arkansas river shiner," he added. "We believe the opposite is true."

About 98 percent of the proposed "critical habitat" is privately owned and its use could face restrictions, according to the district.

In April 2001, waste from the DFA plant was overflowing directly from City of Lovington manholes onto private property because the Lovington waste water system was unable to handle the volume of waste generated by the DFA, which was discharging the waste without the required ground water discharge permit.

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Cool weather delays Texas watermelon harvest

COLLEGE STATION
— Cooler weather earlier in the season is causing minor delays in harvesting the state's watermelon crop, Texas Cooperative Extension reports.

"The weather is not cooperating to some degree, especially for the dryland folks," said Dr. Juan Anciso, Extension integrated pest management agent in Edinburg, Texas.

Harvest usually begins in April in the Rio Grande Valley, but this year it is expected to begin the first week of May, he said.

Because of drought in the Rio Grande Valley, some dryland watermelons are at risk due to lack of water, Anciso said. Dryland crops depend on rain.

Anciso said even though harvest has not begun, producers there are expecting yields of 30,000 pounds per acre of irrigated watermelons and 15,000 to 20,000 pounds per acre of the dryland watermelons.

The annual average for irrigated watermelons is 40,000 pounds per acre.

Dr. Rodney L. Holloway, Extension pesticide assessment specialist in College

Station, said bright hot days and warm nights are optimum for irrigated watermelons.

Cooler temperatures and excessive rainfall slow growth, maturity and reduce sugars, which lowers the quality.

Diseases have not been a problem, but some viruses have, Anciso said.

Viruses cause crooked and distorted leaves. There is little that can be done about it, except to identify whether it was transmitted through white flies, aphids or if it came through the seed, he said.

"We are not too sure yet

what type of virus it is, but we know we have virus problems," he said. "We don't know how much it has affected the crop yet."

Holloway said white flies and aphids feed by sucking plant juices from host plants. Heavy feeding can cause mottling or yellowing of the leaves.

The different watermelon varieties are hybrids, open pollinated, and seedless, he said. About 15 percent of the Texas commercial watermelon production is hybrid.

Hybrids are high producers, more consistent in production and consistently

sweet.

He said about 40,000 acres of watermelons are grown from South Texas to the High Plains each year.

Holloway said Texas is the nation's leading producer of commercial watermelons, and 100 percent of the production goes to the local fresh markets.

Anciso said, "Not only are we producing during that time, but Florida as well as California start to produce, so there's lots of watermelons to eat."

Charles W. Neeb, district Extension director in Fort Stockton, said watermelon

planting in Winkler County is complete.

Dr. Dale A. Fritz, district Extension director in Bryan, said watermelons in Waller County are being cultivated and weeded, while others are being planted.

José Peña, Extension economist in Uvalde, said watermelons have been planted and are coming up to good plant stands.

Ronald C. Woolley, district Extension director in Stephenville, said watermelon planting continues there.

HOUSTON—Botox injections could be the solution for people who perspire excessively. So “don’t sweat it,” say experts at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"Excessive perspiration is not only embarrassing, but it can cause emotional, professional and social problems," said Dr. Ramsey Markus, an assistant professor of dermatology at Baylor. "This condition often leads to emotional stress, social stigma and high costs associated with clothing wear and cleaning."

Excessive underarm sweating, or axillary hyperhidrosis, is caused by the stimulation of sweat glands by nerves that regulate sweat production. Botox is a purified protein toxin that works by preventing neural impulses from turning on the sweat glands. The most commonly treated areas are the palms and the armpits.

The procedure is done on an outpatient basis in which the skin is first treated with a topical numbing cream.

Small amounts of Botox are strategically injected using a small needle that paralyzes the glands that cause excessive sweating.

Pain is minimal and anesthesia is rarely needed, however, sedatives and numbing agents may be used.

"When Botox is injected into the gland, there is a minor sting similar to an insect bite," Ramsey

said. "Once the procedure is complete there is usually no discomfort and patients can immediately return to daily activities."

Traditional treatments for excessive sweating include over-the-counter anti-perspirants, topical and oral medications and surgery.

Surgery can be an effective solution to the condition; however, it can prevent sweating in other parts of the body including the upper chest, arms and the neck.

The Botox injections take effect within three to five days and usually last five to 10 months. Although there are few restrictions regarding Botox treatments, patients who are pregnant or nursing, those who are allergic to Botulinum Toxin type A, and those with neurological diseases are not good candidates.

HOUSTON — Young sickle-cell patients continue to have an improved outlook as researchers learn more about how to lessen or prevent the complications associated with the genetic blood disorder.

"The study of sickle-cell disease has changed significantly over the last several years," said Dr. Brigitta Mueller, associate professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine.

"Now, we are applying knowledge from other fields — like research on strokes — to sickle cell. Many more scientists are now studying this disease in ways not conceivable five years ago," he added.

More than 70,000 Americans have sickle-cell disease, an inherited condition in which red blood cells have a "sickle" shape that causes them to get stuck in vessels.

The result can be debilitating pain and an increased

chance of stroke or organ damage.

The life expectancy for sickle-cell patients continues to increase as treatments improve. In the past, victims did not live to adulthood. Now, the life expectancy is about 45 years.

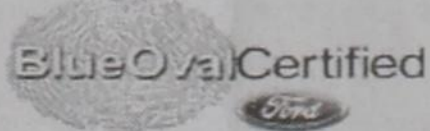
"If we can prevent some of the complications in children, they may be healthier as adults," said Mueller, also director of the Texas Children's Sickle Cell Center.

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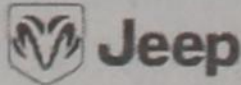
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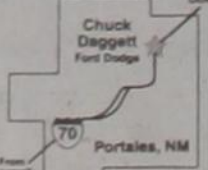
