When the Texas & Pacific Railroad made its advent into Eastland County during the early eighties, the Ranger group moved to the railroad and the settlers soon followed and Ranger became a permanent town. Being located in the center of a vast farming and ranching territory, Ranger thrived from the very beginning, and became the distributing point for building materials as well as shipping point for livestock to market.

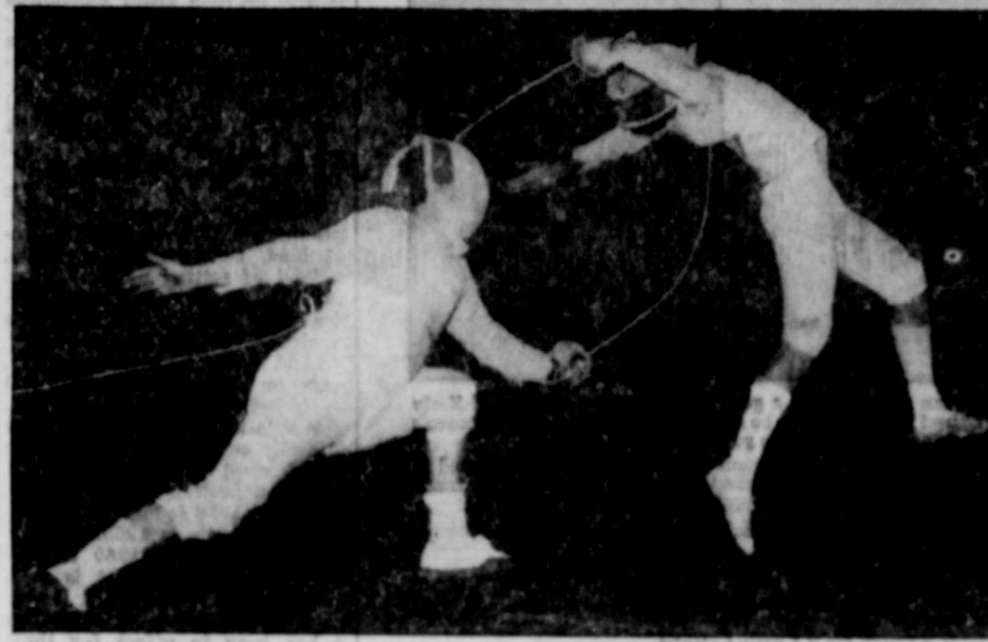

The Mommy dog was what the grown ups call a boxer, but I don't know why as she didn't box me. She had a family all her own. The other pal was a bearded dog but he looked just like a dog to me and not a thing like a bird. Guess when I am grown I will understand why the grown up people call things such funny names.

We three had such good times and then, you know what? Some one took two of my pals puppies (that's what the baby dogs are called.) Then the mama was gone too; and then the other pal got awfully sick and died, and I cried and cried. The awful thing was that some one had poisoned bacon and put on his fence for him to eat. I always shared my candy and cookies with him and just think; if he had shared his bacon with me—then my Mommy and Daddy would have cried because their little boy had died because of some one's horrible and merciless deed. (Guess they don't know about children and dogs speaking a language all their own, and how we share our food when the grownups aren't looking.)

State Teachers To Ask Increase In Salary

The Texas State Teachers Association is asking Governor Price Daniel to call a fourth special session of the Legislature to give all Texas teachers more than just a straight pay raise.

Here is what the teachers want: 1. An immediate base pay increase of \$495 a year for teachers with a maximum of up to \$5994 per year for master degree holders. 2. Double the present \$54 annual raise granted teachers as a bonus for length of service. 3. An increase of \$50 per classroom teacher unit in state funds for school and operation each year. 4. A boost of \$190 per year for each bus operated by a school system.

No estimate of the cost of the four-point program was given, nor was any suggestion given as to what taxes should be levied to meet the additional cost.

Miller, president of the association, said the teachers have no assurance the governor will call a special session to act on the proposed program.

Eastland County Traffic Deaths Less Than 1958

Sergeant C. A. Cockrell of the Eastland Sub Station of the Texas Highway Patrol, today released a Rural Traffic Accident Summary for July 1959 for Eastland, Stephens, Shackelford, Coleman and Brown Counties.

The Highway Patrol in this area investigated a total of 30 accidents with the following breakdown: Property damage, 22; Personal injury, 8, and Fatal accidents, 1.

Sergeant Cockrell reported a total property damage of \$12,176.00 with 1 persons injured and two killed. This is an increase of two accidents and same number of deaths for the same period of 1958.

Eastland County had the following breakdown: Property damage, two; Personal Injury, three; and Fatal accidents, none. Property damage amounted to \$6,735.00 with five injured and no fatalities. This is the same number of accidents and one less of deaths for the same period of 1958.

During July the Highway Patrol in the above named counties made 318 arrests for the following violations: D.W.I. four, Speeding, 232, Improper Passing, 32, Wrong Side of Road, four, Defective equipment, 26, and all other violations, 26.

City Commission To Enforce Dog Licence Regulation

All dogs in the city limits of Ranger must be vaccinated and licensed within the next ten days to two weeks, according to a resolution passed by the City Commission at their last meeting.

The Commission voted to enforce an old law which stated that all dogs must be vaccinated and licensed or they will be picked up and destroyed.

The city plans to hire a dog catcher to begin in about two weeks picking up un-licensed dogs. Dogs can be vaccinated at the Hodges Veterinary Clinic on Spring Road for \$2 each. In order to obtain a license there must be a certificate of vaccination presented to personnel at the City Hall. Licenses may be obtained at any time now between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. weekdays and 8 a.m. to 12 noon on Saturday. The cost of the

license will be \$1 for male dogs, \$1 for spayed female dogs, and \$2 for female dogs.

The reason for the enforcement of this law is to control the possible outbreak of rabies in the city. All dog owners are encouraged to have their dogs vaccinated and licensed before the dog catcher begins to pick up stray dogs.

Sgt. C. A. Cockrell Issues Warning for Scooter Owners

Many motor scooters and motorcycles are being operated on the streets and highways by operators who are not old enough to get a driver's license and by some who are old enough but do not possess a driver's license, said Sgt. C. A. Cockrell of the Texas Highway Patrol in Eastland.

The requirements of the law for the legal operation of a vehicle of this type for an operator between the ages of 14 to 16 are: 1. The scooter or cycle must be registered. 2. A Motor Vehicle Inspection Sticker is required to be carried on the person or exhibited on the vehicle. 3. The operator must possess a valid driver's license.

There is a provision in the drivers-license law for a person between the ages of 14 and 16 to obtain a commercial operator's license restricting them to a motor scooter or motorcycle, provided that this motor scooter or motorcycle does not exceed 5 brake horsepower. This license is for the operation of a motor scooter or motorcycle only and any violation of the restriction on the license could result in the suspension of the license for a period of one year. The operation of a motor scooter or motorcycle by anyone under the age of 14 is a violation of the law, and a person must be at least 14 to obtain a license for this type vehicle.

Sgt. Cockrell stated "Many violations of this type have been observed and called to our attention." Regular checks will be made in all areas in an effort to stop this violation. This violation is a misdemeanor punishable upon conviction by a fine of not less than \$1 nor more than \$100 plus court costs which is \$15.50 in most Justice of the Peace Courts in this area.

## USDA Announces 1960 Conservation Reserve Program

College Station, Aug.—Texas Farmers will receive a basic rate of \$12 an acre under announced plans for the Conservation Reserve of the Soil Bank for the 1960 crop season by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. A tentative goal of 452,000 additional acres was also announced for the State.

Principal changes listed for the 1960 Conservation Reserve in the USDA announcement include regulations relating to publicly owned land, tenure of ownership, method of setting payment rates and the determination of priorities when more applications are received than can be accepted.

Land owned by a state, county, town or local government will be ineligible for the program. This rule is already in effect on federally owned land. Land which has changed ownership (except through inheritance) since December 31, 1956 is ineligible to enter the program in 1960.

If land under a 1960 Conservation Reserve contract is sold, the contract generally may be assumed by the purchaser only after it has been in effect for three years.

**USDA Publication On Lightning Now Available**

ing still is listed as the causative agent in nearly one-third of all U. S. farm fires. Lightning damage is not confined to personal property for it is estimated that more than 1300 persons are injured and 500 killed by lightning every year. About 90 per cent of this accident toll occurs in rural areas, states the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council.

Farm buildings and homes can be protected from lightning damage by the installation of an approved, complete lightning protection system. This means more than just the installation of rods, says the Council. Today's systems are engineered to collect static charges from the entire building and the things in it and dissipate the static into the air.

The USDA has released a bulletin which gives the principles of lightning protection systems and the materials used to build them, the Council adds.

Although few farmers install their own lightning protection systems, the bulletin will enable them to determine whether installation work is being done properly, and to make periodic inspections of systems already installed.

For farm buildings as well as trees, a lightning protection system consists of three parts—a terminal (rod or point), conductors, and ground connections. The terminals are copper, aluminum, or galvanized steel rods or tubes, 10 to 24 inches long, installed at every projecting high point on a building. Conductors are the parts connecting the terminals with the ground and nowadays, usually are made of aluminum or copper cable, although rods also are satisfactory. A ground connection can be made in one of four ways: by driving a copper-clad or galvanized steel rod into the ground at least 10 feet, by stranding copper conductor cable and burying it in a trench, by clamping copper conductor cable to a buried sheet of metal plate, or by clamping it to an underground metal water pipe. Carefully made ground connections are vital to the operation of a lightning protection system, the Council adds.

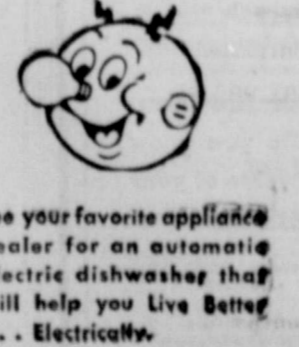
