

K. C. Political Gang Leaders Shot To Death

KANSAS CITY, April 6. (AP) — Charles Binaggio and Charles Gargotta, recognized political and underworld chiefs, respectively, of Kansas City's Northside, were shot to death early today in their political club here.

Police immediately began a minute investigation of gangland and political activities here in search for a clue to the double murder.



Binaggio, 41, whose political power as a Democratic faction leader here has grown rapidly in the last few years, was found slumped in a chair at a desk at the rear of the club room.

One shoulder was sprinkled with cigarette ashes. There was a pool of blood on the floor. On the wall above Binaggio's body was a portrait of President Harry S. Truman.

Gargotta's body was found near the front door where he had been brought down with a bullet in the head. He had clung desperately to a venetian blind as he fell. Police said Gargotta obviously was trying to flee for his life.

Both Binaggio and Gargotta had been shot four times in the head. Robbery was dismissed immediately as a motive. Gargotta's clothing contained twenty \$100 bills, four \$10 and in his billfold, a large old-style one-dollar bill.

Binaggio still wore his diamond-studded wrist watch and had \$24 in his pockets.

Police detectives expressed the belief the men probably were slain by out-of-town gangsters because "no one in Kansas City is tough enough or brave enough to pull such a job."

Binaggio was head of a political faction opposing remnants of Pendergast's once-powerful political organization.

The club where Binaggio was found shot was headquarters for his political group which controlled several populous Northside wards.

Li. Harry Nesbitt of the police homicide squad said no weapon was found in the clubroom.

The political leader recently was a witness before a federal grand jury investigating underworld activities.

Chief of Police Henry W. Johnson said it looked as though Binaggio was shot by an acquaintance since he apparently was relaxing in the chair when he was killed.

The bodies were discovered by a cab driver who noticed water running out the front door of the clubroom. A broken water pipe had caused the overflow. Police said the men were apparently slain shortly after midnight and the bodies found about 5 a. m. (EST).

Police Sgt. Wayne Gibson said powder burns on Binaggio indicated a whopper fired the shots had been standing nearby. Powder burns also were found on Gargotta, Binaggio's political associate recently was the subject of several national attacks.

Gargotta figured in a gangland slaying in 1933. He served 19 months in prison on a charge of assault with attempt to kill.

Bryn Mawr Girl Found In Florida

HARRISBURG, Pa., April 6. (AP) — A pretty 19-year-old Bryn Mawr College girl, missing since March 24, has been located at Miami Beach, Fla.

Gertrude Colston Nauman telephoned her socially prominent parents, Mr. and Mrs. Spencer G. Nauman, at their Harrisburg home yesterday.

Nauman left for Florida immediately with the girl's uncle—Conway H. Olmstead of Chicago.

Miss Nauman's mother said the girl was suffering from nervous exhaustion and that plans were being made to bring her back home. She had been living in a Miami Beach hotel, the mother said.

NLRB SEEKS TO ABOLISH AUTHORITY OF COUNSEL

WASHINGTON, April 6. (AP) — The National Labor Relations Board today told senators today that its division of powers with the board's general counsel, Robert Denham, has been a "failure." It said Denham's separate authority should be abolished.

Paul Herzog, NLRB chairman, told the Senate Expenditures Committee the board supports President Truman's plan for reorganizing the agency.

The plan calls for removing Denham's present independent authority and making him subordinate to the board.

Herzog said in his prepared testimony that the present division of

power fixed by the Taft-Hartly Act has caused friction within the agency, "confusion among management and labor unions," and has provoked "uncertainty and litigation."

Witnesses representing the National Association of Manufacturers and the United States Chamber of Commerce told the committee yesterday the President's plan, if allowed to go into effect, would undermine public confidence in the board.

Herzog said the President's plan would replace "all investigatory and regulatory functions," not in him as chairman, but "in the five

men who comprise the entire" NLRB.

Other functions of the general counsel as well, Herzog said, would go not to him, but to the board.

He said divided responsibility under the present arrangement has caused different sets of policies, so that:

"The spectacle of a double standard confronts management and labor when they seek guidance from the federal government at the very threshold of their labor problems. This double standard causes a waste of time, energy and money for the government as well as for private parties."

Construction Of New City Rodeo Plant Slated

Construction is to start promptly on the new plant for the Big Spring Rodeo Association.

The \$25,000 plant will be a concrete horseshoe stadium and will be one of the most if not the most modern rodeo units in West Texas and the Southwest.

The huge bowl will seat approximately 7,200 people. Plans call for inclusion of 100 box seats, each accommodating six people.

Contract for construction of the stands and arena was awarded to Baker Willis, Big Spring, this week. The cost figure embraces only the grandstand and arena. It does not include corrals, chutes, auxiliary structures and other items necessary to round out facilities.

The affair, located south and east of the Ellis Homes area, will be 500 feet long and 210 feet wide. Plans will be located at the open.

Something like 12,000 cubic yards of earth will be moved to provide for the bowl.

This will put only the top two seats above ground level and make it possible to walk down to practically all seats. At the same time, the bowl effect is expected to practically eliminate the wind nuisance, long a disagreeable factor of rodeos in West Texas. Rodeo officials pointed out that the bowl arrangement also would eliminate the hazard of children falling out of elevated stands.

HALE WINS BOARD POST Returns of School Election Canvassed

H. T. Hale was named member at large on the county school board, while Bob Asbury will represent Precinct No. 3 and L. L. Underwood will serve from Precinct No. 4, county commissioners announced Wednesday afternoon, following a canvass of election returns from all school districts.

Hale polled 166 votes, winning over B. F. Logan who received 78 votes. Asbury was the choice of 44 voters in No. 3, while Underwood received 34 in No. 4.

All common school districts in the county also named trustees by their own. Election results by districts follow: Caudle—T. M. Dunagan and E. E. Morris tied with 4 each; Asbury, 8; Hale 6 and Logan 2.

Hartwell, Logan 6, Hale 0; no district trustees named since district becomes dormant this year.

Six Children Perish In Fire

TORONTO, Ontario, April 6. (AP) — Six children burned to death early today in a blaze which turned their home into a mass of flame within minutes.

Their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Harding, escaped through the flames with two other children. The rest of the family died in their beds.

One of the surviving children, 14-year-old Paul Harding, said, "I heard my sister Ruth calling to the others to 'Wake up, wake up, but I guess they didn't make it.'"

Neighbors with an extension ladder climbed to a bedroom window and screamed "We can't get in—it's too hot," said one witness.

Another said he awakened to find Mr. and Mrs. Harding, with their two sons who escaped, hanging on the door.

"They were all holding hands," the neighbor said. "Mr. Harding shouted 'Get me a ladder.' He seemed to be crazy. He screamed, 'Call the fire brigade. My house is on fire.' Then he ran back across the road."

Firemen fought the blaze with three hoses, but could make no headway. The roar of the flames could be heard for blocks.

Fear 60 Drown

OPORTO, Portugal, April 6. (AP) — Sixty textile factory workers were feared drowned in the sinking last night of a motor barge in the Douro River. The barge, piled high with freight, capsized after ramming a rock.

Lattimore Gives Lie To Charges That He Is Top Russian Spy

Sen. McCarthy Is Branded As 'Irresponsible'

Far East Authority Hits 'Terror Reign', Asks Solon To Quit

WASHINGTON, April 6. (AP) — Owen Lattimore, accused by Senator McCarthy of being Russia's top spy in the United States, swore today that the charges are "base and contemptible lies."

He said McCarthy has "flagrantly violated" his responsibility as a senator and has made unauthorized use of secret government documents.

Lattimore, an authority on Far Eastern affairs, took note of McCarthy's contention that he can prove Lattimore is or was a Communist and declared:

"I was not and have not been a Communist; and I am not a Communist now."

Lattimore made his denial in testimony prepared for a Senate Foreign Relations Subcommittee investigation of McCarthy's charges that Communists and Red sympathizers have infested the State Department.

In a 10,000-word statement, Lattimore said McCarthy has violated his responsibility "by making the government of the United States an object of suspicion in the eyes of the anti-Communist world, and undoubtedly the laughing stock of the Communist governments."

He accused the senator of "instilling a Reign of Terror among officials and employees in the United States government, none of whom can be sure of safety from attack by the machine gun of irresponsible publicity in Joseph McCarthy's hands."

Lattimore is director of a school of international relations at Johns Hopkins University.

Lattimore said McCarthy has:

1. "Without authorization used secret documents obtained from official government files."

2. "Villified citizens of the United States and accused them of high crime, without giving them an opportunity to defend themselves."

3. "Refused to submit alleged documentary evidence to a duly constituted committee of the Senate."

4. "Invited disrespect to himself and his high office by refusing to live up to his word."

As for the McCarthy charges, Lattimore said that in effect they amount to an accusation of disloyalty and treason. Then he added:

"McCarthy's charges are untrue. As soon as I heard of the substance of the charges I denounced them for what they were: base and contemptible lies."

Lattimore noted the senator had promised the Senate that any charges he made under "the cloak of immunity" he would repeat off the floor so, as Lattimore put it, "their falseness could be tested in a court of the United States. Lattimore added:

"He said that if he should fail to do this he would resign. He has been called to repeat his charges so that they could be tested in a court of action. He has failed to do so. And he has not resigned."

Lattimore declared:

"I think that I would be the instrument of a great service to the country if the senator should resign."

Woman Killed In Automobile Crash South of Lamesa

LAMESA, April 6. (AP) — Mrs. Jess Ward, about 55, of Taiban, N. M., was killed and three other persons were hurt last night in an automobile crash 12 miles south of Lamesa.

Two children riding with Mrs. Ward, believed to be her grand-children, were injured. Arvin Nelson, about five years old, was in a serious condition with internal injuries. Marietta Nelson, eight years old, was not seriously hurt, nor was Ruben, N. Vela of Lamesa, driver of the second car.

Highway patrolmen said both automobiles were going north and that Mrs. Ward apparently was turning to the left when the Vela car struck her car on the left side.

Mrs. Ward was the sister of J. W. Franks, who lives near Coahoma, and J. D. Franks, formerly of Big Spring but now a resident of Hobbs, N. M.

WOULD HIKE BENEFITS Jobless Payments Extension Asked

KEY WEST, Fla., April 6. (AP) — President Truman sent to Congress today a message recommending extension of unemployment compensation payments to an additional 4,000,000 persons and raising benefits by approximately 20 per cent.

Mr. Truman sent the message to Washington by a courier in the hope it can be transmitted to the House before it recesses this afternoon.

The message calls for legislation spelling out recommendations he made in his "State of the Union" budget and economic messages to Congress in January.

White House officials said the President pleads in the message for enactment of legislation at this session since federal law must be supplemented by state enactments and many legislatures are meeting in 1951.

The text was not made public here, but presidential aides told reporters the five-point program suggested would up average payments by 20 per cent and extend coverage to employees of from one to seven persons. In many states the laws now apply to employees of eight or more.

One White House aide said that if the President's recommendations had been in effect in 1949, the jobless would have received \$850,000,000 more in benefit payments during unemployment periods than they did under current laws.

Now much more the addition of 4,000,000 persons under the coverage would have upped this figure was not estimated.

Brother Of City Man Succumbs At California Home

Sam Winham learned this morning of the sudden death of a brother, Lucien Winham, 57, at his home in Oakland, Calif.

Aggravated in the best of health Lucien Winham was stricken suddenly with a heart attack. A native of Shreveport, La., he had been with the U. S. department of agriculture for nearly 20 years.

Since 1942 he had been chief meat inspector for the western district. During the war inspection of meats to armed forces on the West Coast and in the Pacific fell under his jurisdiction. He had visited in Big Spring several times.

Two sons in the armed forces were enroute home today. Four sisters reside in Oakland, and two brothers, Carroll Winham of Phoenix, Ariz., and George Winham of Texas were due to leave for Oakland. Conspicuously from a recent attack, Sam Winham will be unable to attend the rites.

Letter Explains Cut In Hospital's Size

WASHINGTON, April 6. (AP) — The government's action in reducing the size of the Corpus Christi Naval Hospital and eliminating its service to veterans is explained in a budget bureau letter made public today by Senator Connally, (D-Tex.).

Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson recently announced that the number of beds at the Corpus Christi hospital would be reduced from 400 to 100 by July 1 and that the 120 beds previously allocated to the Veterans Administration would be eliminated.

After noting that the Corpus Christi Naval Hospital was built of temporary construction in 1941 and that its activities were being curtailed along with those at other hospitals in an economy move, Lawton said:

"It is my understanding that in developing the current curtailment program, the (Secretary Johnson) took into consideration all existing allocations of beds to the Veterans Administration and discontinued or reduced them only in places where it could not be avoided or where it would cause a minimum of inconvenience."

"In terminating the allocation of 120 hospital beds at Corpus Christi, he was probably influenced by the fact that the Veterans Administration has a substantial surplus of beds in the former Navy hospital at Houston, which has a capacity of 327 beds and recent patient load of 606, and also by the fact that a new Veterans Administration hospital of 250 beds is nearing completion at Big Spring, and will be opened within the next three or four months."

WILL SERVE AS CONSULTANT

Dulles Named Acheson Aide

WASHINGTON, April 6. (AP) — The State Department said today John Foster Dulles, New York lawyer and foreign policy expert, had agreed to serve as consultant to Secretary of State Acheson.

A formal announcement said the Republican leader was asked to take the position by both President Truman and Acheson.

Only last night, Presidential Press Secretary Charles G. Ross denied reports that Mr. Truman proposed to name Dulles to a top policy post with the rank of ambassador at large.

The State Department today said Dulles "will advise Secretary Acheson on broad problems in the field of foreign affairs and on specific lines of action which this government should follow."

"His work will not be confined to any specific area of the world. His broad background and wealth of experience qualify him for consideration of problems in Europe, the Far East and other areas of

the world, as well as problems affecting the work of the United Nations.

"Mr. Dulles, whose cooperation has been extremely valuable to the department in the past, will assume his duties in about two weeks, after completing a brief vacation."

It was learned today that the Dulles appointment was worked out by Acheson and Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) after Mr. Truman had authorized Acheson about 10 days ago to take such action in an effort to restore real bi-partisanship in foreign affairs.

The President, Acheson and Vandenberg finally agreed on Dulles as the best man for the job within the past day or so.

Today's announcement made clear that although he will have top rank under Acheson and Under Secretary of State James Webb, he has not been given the formal title of ambassador at large. Nonetheless, it appeared that he will rank along with Ambassador Philip Jessup as one of the mainstays of Acheson in working out major foreign policy problems.

CENTRAL AIRLINES SEEKS PERMIT

Helicopter Mail Service For Fort Worth, Dallas Area Seen

"I'm looking forward to the day when we can run our whole airline with helicopters," said Keith Kahle, the keen, 38-year-old president of Central Airlines, who just filed an application with the Civil Aeronautics Board to provide helicopter mail service for the Fort Worth-Dallas area.

He hopes to start service by next summer when the Greater Fort Worth International Airport opens, midway between Dallas and Fort Worth.

He has quite a plan: His helicopter will be able to carry a thousand pounds of mail. It will tote mail from the International Airport to and from post offices at Dallas and Fort Worth. It will land on vacant plots near the post offices. And the helicopter also will make regular stops at Fort Worth's present municipal airport and the Love Field Airport at Dallas, leaving and picking up mail.

And Kahle has other plans: "Just as soon as suitable passenger-type helicopters are available, we are going to ask the Civil Aeronautics Board to allow us to haul passengers in the Fort Worth-Dallas area," he told us. "When we can, we want to put helicopters on the whole Central Airlines system. The utility of a helicopter will far exceed any type of aircraft we are using now on short-haul trips. When we can take off from downtown Dallas and land on the courthouse lawn at Gainesville and stop next to a park in the middle of Ardmore, Okla., and so on up the line — this business really will have arrived! Then we'll really be serving the public!"

Central Airlines has 11 planes. It's a feeder airline company operating in Northern Texas, Oklahoma and Southern Kansas. Kahle is a native of Oklahoma, operates a flight school in Oklahoma City on the side and once wrote an aviation column for the Daily Oklahoman.

NEW YORK, April 6. — A Brooklyn bobby-walker walked up to the steel-barred circus "cat" cage and gripped her girl friend by the elbow.

"Geeeee . . . lookit da kowwager!"

Cougar, or "kewger" it was really a leopard, it was part of opening night for the "Greatest Show on Earth" at the traditional Manhattan premiere in Madison Square Garden.

Fresh from winter quarters in Florida, the Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey circus filled the big sports palace from basement sidehalls to trapeze rigging lost among the roof girders.

More than 13,000 New Yorkers, who'll run to a circus as fast as any one else, flocked into the cavernous garden last night to see what the "big one" has to offer this season.

After a month here, the show moves on to Boston, goes under canvas for the first time in Washington, and then zig-zags west to Denver and back to Miami for the November closing.

Nobody wants a circus to change much, and nobody will be disap-

pointed. The 1950 model may have a high gloss polish, but it's still the same old circus.

It has clowns and cotton candy, fancy hats and souvenir cakes — and plenty of that good, rich elephant smell that spells out C-I-R-C-U-S for you with your eyes closed.

And those elephants, all 28 of them, will eat your peanuts as fast as ever.

The sword-swallowers and the fat lady are back, so are the tallest man and smallest midget. And there are lions 'n' tigers 'n' everything — including cassowaries, hipopotami and gnus.

Also present was the ghost of Gargantua the great.

The famous gorilla, the top attraction for 13 years, died last November.

In a nice gesture, the circus placed his air-conditioned cage, empty now, at the very center of the side-show. Old friends came as they always had, this time to mourn and look at Gargantua's placid widow, M'Toto.

They also played to see her two adopted babies, Gargantua II and Mile. Toto. These little apes are in the play-pen stage, and have a big rubber ball and little red wa-

gon to play with. The crowd felt a certain kinship. The gorillas were non-committal.

Upstairs, the 50 acts of the main show — 11 of them new — stepped off briskly but still stretched over three hours.

The high moment belonged to Harold Alzans, chief of the high wire Alzanses.

Whether he was playing to the crowd, or whether he suffered from opening night roughness, he had several partial slips 45 feet above the sawdust — and no net.

The last eight feet of his aerial

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Negroes Pay With Lives For Killing

HUNTSVILLE, April 6. (AP)—James Willis Blackmon and William Smith Jr. died in the state's electric chair here early today for the fatal shooting of a Houston bus driver.

The two Houston Negroes were convicted and sentenced to death in the Dec. 22, 1948, slaying of Leslie D. Gibbins.

Blackmon was placed in the chair at 12:03 a.m. and pronounced dead at 12:08 a.m. Four minutes later Smith was strapped in the chair and pronounced dead at 12:17 a.m.

Neither of the two showed any emotion. Both declined to make last minute statements.

The two confessed slaying the 26-year-old bus driver after Blackmon appeared in the office of District Attorney A. C. Wiborn at Houston in February, 1949, and said he "thought" officers were looking for him. Smith was arrested a few hours later.

Israel Has Own Farm Aid Program

TIBERIAS, Israel (AP)—The Israeli government is being asked to loan \$300,000 to owners of banana plantations and vegetable growers in the Galilee district. The growers were hard-hit by the record-breaking snowstorms and cold wave which affected the Tiberias area and all of Israel early in February.

The banana plantation owners estimated their losses alone at over \$1,000,000. Many banana trees were destroyed by strong wind and snowstorms. The tomato, potato and vegetable crops generally were wiped out, causing a severe shortage of such commodities in the Israeli market.

Navy Protects Its Equipment

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Navy scientist says private industry can profitably borrow a page from the Navy's book on how to protect electrical equipment from fungi and moisture.

Dr. Walter N. Ezekiel says electrical equipment in transit or stored in Washington, Philadelphia or other places with temperate climates are subject to the same fungi or moisture damage sometimes seen on the electrical power drives of guns in the tropics or aboard ships.

And such damage can largely be avoided, declares Ezekiel, chief mycologist of the Navy's Bureau of Ordnance. Writing in "Electrical Manufacturing" magazine, the scientist says an important factor in preventing such deterioration is the use of materials naturally resistant to moisture and fungus in electrical equipment of all kinds.

He lists as "fungus-encouraging" such products as starch, sisal, cotton, paper and cardboard, and plastics utilizing these materials as fillers. Ceramics, nylon and plastics that are filled with either mica or glass are "inherently better materials that do not support growth," says Ezekiel.

Neil Gwynn May Be Ousted From Gallery

LONDON (AP)—"Neil Gwynn" by Sir Peter Lely in the National Portrait Gallery may not be Neil after all, and it may not be by Sir Peter. Officials of the solid old government institution pondered this possibility and began searching yellowed catalogues to find out where they stood.

The picture has hung there 39 years with a discreet label setting out that it shows the actress of Charles II's day who "attracted the favor of the king and had apartments in Whitehall," then his palace. But one gallery functionary admitted the identification may be a mistake.

"There are numerous portraits said to be of Neil Gwynn, but all differ," he said. "This one bears no resemblance to any."

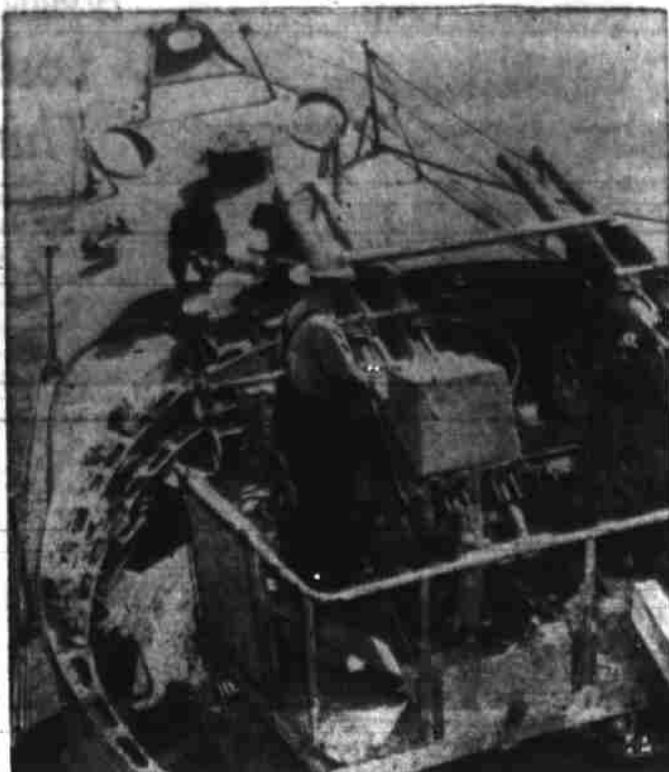

Simba, 7 year-old male lion, greeted the trio of bears by sinking his teeth in a cub's throat, then choking the 150-pound intruder.

The mother bear and the surviving cub fled back to their own cage.

During Tuesday night, the bear, Mama, clawed loose a door bolt in the bear cage at the Alameda County Zoological Gardens. The door opened into a back alley.

Mama was curious. So were her cubs, Lucky and Jinx. Coming to another cage, the bears managed to pry loose an outside bar.

Shortly after midnight wild jungle cries were heard for a quarter of a mile around. The wife of Zoo Director Sidney Snow responded on the double.

"Simba was standing over the dead cub, Jinx, a two-year-old black female," said Mrs. Snow. "He apparently just killed her, but made no attempt to eat."

"The mother—we call her Mama—and her other cub, Lucky, also two, were up on their wooden sleeping box. Mama was well back, taking what cover she could from the box, but she was protecting the youngster and growling defiance."

"Simba, standing over his kill, looked up at her from time to time and made an angry growl. Simba's mate, Fury, was also in the bear cage but she seemed almost to be sleeping and apparently took no part at all in the fight."

The lions were prodded back in their cage. On the way back, they had to pass Mama.

Mama took a furious swipe at Simba. Simba slunk away.

Autopsy May Clear Up Mystery Of Woman Found Dead In Hotel

LOS ANGELES, April 6. (U)—An autopsy today may help clear up the mysterious death of Mrs. Sally Oswald, 39, whose nude body was found yesterday in a hotel room with ink scribbles on her back and chest.

Police were unable to determine immediately whether she committed suicide, died of alcoholism or natural causes, or was slain.

A 50-year-old man was arrested last night after a minor traffic accident and placed in the psychopathic ward of General Hospital. P. O. Wylie of the police psychopathic detail said the man told him he believed he killed a woman Monday night and slept with the body that night and Tuesday night.

Detectives said Mrs. Oswald recently was discharged from the psychopathic ward of General Hospital.

The inscription on her chest, written with a ballpoint pen, read "It's for the best. The words 'and I loved you' also could be made out. Some pen marks on her back were illegible."

Mrs. Oswald, a waitress, divorced her husband, Robert, in July, 1948. Police quoted him as saying a man had threatened her life. Oswald said he had not seen her since March 25.

The case bore some resemblance to the death of Mrs. Jeanne Asford French, 45, sometime aviator, Feb. 10, 1947. Obscene words had been written in lipstick on her breasts.

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Redwoods Doing Well In East

BERKELEY, Calif. (U)—American redwoods are found mostly on the west coast. But there is no reason they should not do well in the east, says Prof. Woodbridge Metcalf, extension forester of the University of California. Many redwoods have been transplanted in eastern states, he says. Most northerly is found at Lima, Penna. At least four are growing in South Carolina.

Mahon Defends Appropriations Committee's Armed Forces Bill

While Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) of the House armed services committee is clamoring for an additional \$363 million for additional warplanes, our own Rep. George Mahon has sounded a somber note of warning.

Excessive spending for national defense will cause economic ruin of the United States, he told Congress Tuesday. Mahon was chairman of the House appropriations sub-committee which drafted the armed forces money bill just under \$13 billion.

Rep. Mahon bluntly accused backers of bigger allotments for air power of waving the flag for political reasons. Then he went on to say that "The air power of the Army and Navy, great as it is, is not the thing that strikes terror into the heart of the enemy. It is our industrial capacity, our ability to fight back and to continue to fight back, that the enemy fears."

Continuing, he ventured that Russia had so few long range bombers that they could be destroyed relatively briefly.

Mahon was speaking in defense of the sub-committee's report which was adopted by the appropriations committee. He had every right to do this, for testimony has been received over nearly four months before the recommendation was

made. Testimony filled four bulky volumes. Moreover, it should be remembered that it was Mahon who once before went to bat for the Air Forces when he felt that the strength was below that required for minimum safety. Having the opinion of the nation's best military minds at his disposal, he does not now feel that an impromptu and arbitrary raise is indicated.

Although he did not mention it, the proposal of Rep. Vinson could be the powder keg to touch off another bitter inter-service rivalry to grab off big bites of the increase.

There is more than a little truth in what Rep. Mahon says about flag waving for political purposes. Although the military must be kept at an adequate level, it must not become the tail that wags the dog. Not only would that bring economic ruin, but with it the threat of a militarily ruled nation. There ought to be some lesson in the fact that we have grown singularly great and remained so as a country that jealously regarded its civilian status.

In this, along with his emphasis upon a flexible and progressive fighting machine that will constantly seek new weapons and instruments, Rep. Mahon has performed a sound service.

Controlled Production Is Bound To Accompany Farm Price Support

In the Rio Grande Valley thousands of acres of vegetables are being plowed up because it's cheaper for the farmers to get rid of them that way than to pay the cost of harvest at today's market prices. Plowing them up is a dead loss and being forced to sell them at current prices would be a still bigger expense to the growers.

While this slaughter of the little green pigs of the Rio Grande Valley was going on, President Truman returned to the economics wars by calling on Congress to put a stop to the piling up of enormous farm surpluses and adopt the Brannan plan instead of "artificially high" price pegging.

The President wants legislation that would tighten production controls on products being produced in excessive amounts, and apply the Brannan plan to perishables. He underscored his advocacy of production controls by approving a bill which provides controls for potato produc-

tion.

What would have happened to the Rio Grande Valley's vegetable crop if the Brannan plan had been in operation? The growers would have been guaranteed a certain price for that portion of their crops that came under production controls the rest would have gone to market at whatever price the market offered. Thus the growers would have received adequate compensation for the approved portion of their crops; consumers would have received the benefit of lower prices on the market.

A great many growers don't want controls on what they grow. A still greater number don't like the "subsidy" idea of the Brannan plan. They ask: Why not apply this thesis to all industry? Most all want some sort of relief from ruinously low prices.

One thing is certain, however. Pegged prices without some form of production or acreage control is out the window. You still don't get to keep your cake and eat it too.

History Behind Dispute Over Secret Documents Published

WASHINGTON, D.C.—THERE'S A LONG history behind the present dispute between Congress and the President over this question:

Does the legislative branch of the government (Congress) have a right to see secret files in the executive branch (headed by the President) or does he think it better not to disclose them?

Herman Workman, an attorney of the Justice Department, has made an exhaustive study of the history behind this dispute and published his findings in the Federal Bar Journal.

The conclusion he reaches — that the Congress can't compel the President to turn over executive records — is his own, not those of the Justice Department although the Justice Department has taken exactly the same stand since the start of the American government.

THIS IS A BRIEF SUMMARY OF HIS study:

Although Workman says there have been many instances where Congress was turned down in its demands upon the executive branch, he lists 29 cases as outstanding.

Those 29 cases cover refusals by 17 Presidents, (starting with Washington) and their department heads to heed congressional demands. When the department heads refused they did so with presidential approval of their action.

(The Presidents, besides Washington, were: Jefferson, Monroe, Jackson, Tyler, Polk, Fillmore, Buchanan, Lincoln, Grant, Hayes, Cleveland, Theodore Roosevelt, Coolidge, Hoover, Franklin D. Roosevelt, and Truman.)

'Cotton Elmer', Burned Up Over Corrected Version Of Secret Meeting, Orders Probe

WASHINGTON — Oklahoma's surly Sen. "Cotton Elmer" Thomas was so burned up after this column corrected his version of Gen. Bradley's secret testimony on the possibility of war that he has now ordered a Senate subcommittee to investigate.

The subcommittee is supposed to find out how this column got Gen. Bradley's secret testimony. Sen. Thomas had reported that the chief of staff was not worried about war with Russia. To keep the record straight, however, this column gave a word-by-word account of Bradley's remarks, which differed considerably from Sen. Thomas's version.

Following this, "Cotton Elmer" named three senators to investigate this columnist — Joe O'Mahoney of Wyoming, William Robertson of Virginia and Homer Ferguson of Michigan. They are now checking on all the secret transcripts to find which one might have slipped into Drew Pearson's hands. What stumps the investigators, however, is that the column also quoted what Gen. Bradley said off-the-record—which doesn't even appear in the stenographic transcripts.

So far the subcommittee suspects a certain Republican senator of leaking the story to Pearson, but I can assure the subcommittee that his chief suspect wasn't even present during Bradley's testimony.

Meanwhile, this column serves notice that any time a responsible official is misquoted on anything the public is entitled to know about this column will do its best to get the true facts.

MORE TO INVESTIGATE

What Bradley said, summed up briefly, was that Russia won't have the industrial capacity nor the atomic stockpile to start a war for at least two years. However, he warned that Russia is a bully nation and might get careless whom she pushes around. He also refused to predict what Russia might do after two years.

Gen. Bradley also made other significant observations the public is entitled to know but which this column didn't have space to print in the story now being investigated. So here is some more for the investigators to investigate.

Sen. Burnet Maybank of South Carolina questioned Bradley sharply on whether the \$13 billion budget was an absolute minimum.

"I certainly would hate to see the figure become any smaller," replied Bradley. Then he declared flatly: "This amount was determined before we learned that Russia had the atomic bomb."

He assured, however, that he was willing to go along with a \$13 billion budget for the sake of economy.

In other words, suggested Massachusetts' Sen. Leverett Saltonstall, "as a good citizen you believe we should live within our means."

"Yes, but I would like to qualify that," Bradley hesitated. "You don't want to qualify the good citizen part," smiled Saltonstall.

Then Bradley explained: "The eventual strength of our country depends upon its industrial capacity. We must not destroy that by spending too much money by spending too much money. So if I came here recommending \$30 billion or \$40 billion for weapons, you should

start searching for a new chairman of the joint chiefs of staff."

"It is true that our forces—Ground, Air and Navy—are not sufficient now to fight a major war," Bradley emphasized. "Nor do we expect to be sufficient for such a calamity by the end of fiscal year 1951," he continued. "But I feel that we are going to achieve the necessary forces to prevent a disastrous attack from crippling this nation. I also believe that we will be able to win a war if it comes."

He predicted that this country's "mobilization base"—its industrial potential, reserve forces and military education system—would "win a war if it is thrust upon us."

"This is a risk that we take," solemnly added the chief of staff.

SKY-PILOT

New Chaplain Bernard Braskamp is probably the first chaplain in congressional history who doesn't use a prepared script in delivering the opening prayer before the House of Representatives—a matter of fascination and pride to his boss, Speaker Sam Rayburn. When Rayburn recently complimented him on it, the chaplain replied:

"Mr. Speaker, I can't pray sincerely by reading something I have prepared. That would be like telling the Good Lord: 'Look, Lord, this is my prayer for tomorrow, so be ready for it. I sit in my rocking chair at night until I have a mental outline of my invocation and, with his help,

I always find the words to express it the next day."

This doesn't mean, the chaplain hastens to explain, that he shouldn't continue to exhort God by such beautiful entreaties as the Lord's Prayer, "but once in a while I think he likes to hear from us."

The Rev. Mr. Braskamp, 63-year-old son of Dutch immigrants, gave up a promising baseball career to enter the Presbyterian ministry. The late Harry Hopkins once carried his glove at Grinnell College, Iowa, when Grinnell had one of the best college nines in the West.

Harry was one of the younger students and he used to carry my glove into the dining hall, asking for pointers on how to be a pitcher," recalls the House Chaplain.

"I guess I wasn't much help, being a shortstop myself, but Harry wasn't cut out for baseball, after all. I guess I wasn't, either."

Losing Job Sometimes Is Best Thing That Can Happen To One

Much concern is being voiced today over the rising tide of unemployment in the nation. The picture varies from state to state, but the overall figure is placed at somewhere between four and five million. It will be suggested this spring when the colleges throw a half-million graduates upon the labor market, which already is glutted. The majority of these boys and girls eventually will be absorbed, of course, but in the meantime they must take whatever odd jobs are available and wait for openings in their chosen fields.

Unless the period of unemployment is unduly protracted, the young graduate need not worry if he fails to make a connection immediately upon going out into the world. The experience of tramping the streets and interviewing prospective employers will be good for him, and he will be more able to appreciate the big opportunity when it comes.

But unemployment can be a real tragedy for the married man with a large family, as we all learned anew during the recent coal strike when the public was called upon to aid many mining communities, where little children actually were going naked and hungry.

Sometimes the family man has only himself to blame when the loss of his job leaves him without resources. It is human nature to splurge when things are going well, and there is hardly a shack in America where you will not find a car of the latest model standing outside while an expensive radio blares within. Add liquor to these luxuries, and it is not surprising that the head of the house is caught napping by the inevitable rainy day.

However, with the best intentions in the world, the paterfamilias may find himself in the same boat with his extravagant neighbor. Recently, I was discussing the case of a mutual friend with a visitor. This man had been employed for years at a good salary, but now had been unemployed for some months, and was having difficulty in getting food for himself and his family. I expressed surprise that he had not been able to save anything on his excellent salary.

"Save!" exclaimed my visitor. "Good Lord, man, do you know what it costs to raise a large family like mine—especially when three of the children are growing girls?"

Naturally, it would be heartless folly to minimize the evils of unemployment in an extreme case such as the foregoing. But when a man is young, strong, well-educated and without dependents, I find no sympathy for him if his first reaction to losing his job is to apply for a government handout instead of starting right in to look for another position.

Indeed, the loss of a job may prove the turning point in a man's career if he is worth anything at all. Most men, no matter how talented, tend to follow the path of least resistance, and so waste years in a routine occupation among uncongenial associates, when they ought to be outside working for themselves. Under certain circumstances, unemployment can be turned into a real blessing.

It may be argued that a steady job, of whatever kind, affords security, and that security should be the goal of every man's striving, regardless of what may happen to his dreams. That argument never was valid, and never less so than in this atomic age.—R. G. MACREARY.

Hindu Plot Discovery Throws Wrench Into New Delhi Meet

THIS COLUMN YESTERDAY RECORDED the good news of the conference in New Delhi between Prime Ministers Nehru of India and Liaquat Ali Khan of Pakistan who are trying to bring peace to their feuding nations.

Today we have to report that already this peace effort has been rudely jarred. The Bombay police announce the discovery of a Hindu extremist plot which is said to be aimed against peace and to include the assassination of Nehru.

Fourteen or more leaders of extremist organizations have been arrested. Among them is V. D. Savarkar, Hindu leader and formerly president of the militant Hindu Mahasabha. He was acquitted on charges of conspiracy growing out of the murder of the late Mahatma Gandhi, the saintly exponent of peace.

BUT WHY, IN HEAVEN'S NAME, A plot against Nehru and peace? Because there is a strong party of extremists who want Hindu India to make war on Moslem Pakistan as the result of reported mistreatment of Hindus in Moslem territory. Nehru stands for the peace sought by the Mahatma whom he revered.

That's the immediate cause of the hostility. However, the real basis of the bitterness goes back for generations. It lies in the age-old religious warfare between the two peoples. With the passage of time it has become political-religious.

It was this Hindu-Muslim which precluded a politically unified India. Persuaded when England signaled her intention of granting independence. The ideal would have been to bring the vast subcontinent under one government so that its diverse resources could be equally

shared. But the divide was too great to be spanned.

THE BATTLE OVER THE QUESTION of unity was at its height when I was in India in 1943-4, and the crux of the matter lay in the fact that the Moslems were a minority. There were roughly 50 million Moslems as against close to 300 million Hindus.

I discussed this matter with the late Mahomed Ali Jinnah, leader of the Moslems and later to be their first governor general after they received independence. Jinnah saw all the economic benefits of a unified Indian Peninsula, but he was afraid to trust that Hindu majority of 3 to 1 against him. Had it been a 50-50 break, I am sure the great man would have agreed to unity.

The result, of course, was that the Indian Peninsula was split into two nations—Moslem-Pakistan and Hindu India.

THAT NATURALLY CREATED SOME awkward territorial divisions and, what was worse, many nationals of each government had to be left in "enemy" territory. Out of this dislocation of populations have grown bloody and destructive communal feuds.

So now the point has been reached where there are factions which actually want war. And there are violent-minded people who apparently have gone so far as to plot against the life of Nehru because he "works for peace."

However, I believe we can take comfort from the very fact that the heads of the two great nations of the Indian Peninsula are meeting in the interests of peace. Someday, this goal, for which Gandhi gave his life, will be reached.

Oyster Ranchman Details Joys And Sorrows Of His Business

NEW YORK, N.Y.—ROYAL TONER HAS been throwing oysters in and out of beds for 40 years.

He doesn't do it for a laugh—it's his living. And it has given him a vast sympathy for people who raise century plants. "Century plants must be the only things more trouble to grow than oysters," he said.

Toner, who operates a 6,000-acre bivalve ranch, spoke with deep feeling. Right now he has some 700,000 bushels of oysters in his beds.

Operating an oyster ranch is something like dry land farming, except you can't see your crops. And it is something like running an underground hotel, except the guests stay longer and are more finicky.

"YOU GET THEM AT BIRTH AND you have to switch them to different beds three or four times," said Toner grimly. "Each time you have to dredge them up and plant them in deeper water. And they don't shell out a profit until they're five or six years old and ready for market. All that time your money's tied up."

You have to take more care of them than you do with children, too. A man can let his kids go swimming at Coney Island, for example, but he couldn't grow oysters there.

"The bacterial count is too high," Toner explained. "The state wouldn't allow oyster beds that close to polluted areas. It's even stricter about oyster raising than about dairy farming."

The time every oyster rancher dreads most is the summer spawning time. For a few days after birth, until they settle and anchor on bits of old shell thrown on the shallow bottom, the young oysters are free-swimming larvae. They look like tadpoles under a microscope.

ant fathers then," said Toner. "Any storm or sudden cold snap can wipe out our whole year's set—the cash money we'll be counting on five years later."

"A big storm even churns up sand and smother the older oysters. The 1938 hurricane was the worst thing that ever hit our business. It not only lifted up our packing plant and dropped it down kiling wood. It cost us about a quarter million bushels of oysters."

An even bigger blow to the \$70 million a year industry was the change in eating habits that took place when Americans started ordering fresh fruit cocktail as appetizers instead of "half a dozen on the half shell."

"It is easier to cut a grapefruit in half than an oyster," admitted the rancher. But a self-shucking oyster isn't necessarily the answer.

"THE BUSINESS IS COMING BACK now—everything moves in circles," said Toner. "Do you know the Chinese raised oyster 5,000 years ago? Julius Caesar sent oysters packed in snow all the way from Britain to Rome."

Chrysler Studying Peace Offer

DETROIT, April 6. (U. S. — Chrysler Corp., strikebound for 72 days, scanned a union peace offer today.

Whether the proposal would break the long deadlock over financing \$100-a-month pensions remained to be seen.

However, the CIO United Auto Workers had abandoned their demand that a specific number of cents an hour be set aside in a pension trust fund.

In the dispute killing 140,000 workers this was considered significant. Chrysler has resisted a settlement on a cents-an-hour basis.

The union made its offer yesterday. It said its proposal "completely overcomes" management objections.

A previous Chrysler offer to put \$30 million into a pension fund has failed to bring a settlement.

The union yesterday proposed:

(1) That an actuary determine the cost of pensions for workers retiring within the next five years. The size of Chrysler payments to a pension fund would be sufficient to keep the fund sound. Payments could be on an hourly, weekly,

monthly, or annual basis.

(2) The fund would provide pensions of \$100 a month, including federal social security, to all employees at 65 with 25 years service.

(3) The company would set aside money at a rate which would pay off all back and future service credits if the plan were continued 30 years. Back service means all

DENTON, April 6. (U. S. — North Texas State College officials are investigating a hazing incident in which a student was stranded on an island in Lake Texoma Sunday night.

Dr. W. J. McConnell, college president, said Gerald Wallace of Kaufman, was blindfolded and left on the island with only a blanket and no food. He was found shivering, by men looking for two missing fishermen. The temperature had fallen to 42 degrees and the wind was blowing 30 miles an hour.

GUADALAJARA, Mexico, April 6. (U. S. — A number of passengers were reported slightly injured today when the Guadalupe-Nogales passenger train jumped the rails near Nanchal, 200 miles northwest of here.

The report of the wreck gave no details other than that five cars—two sleepers, a coach and two private cars—overturned.

LOGAN, W. Va., April 6. (U. S. — Census taker Amy Carper was about to leave a housewife she interviewed Wednesday when the lady pressed \$5 into her hand.

"I can't accept that," said the surprised Mrs. Carper. "The government pays us, you know."

Boxer Slain By Brother-In-Law

LONGVIEW, April 6. (U. S. — Gordon House, 24, a boxer, was shot to death last night in a thickly populated oil field section six miles west of here.

Deputy Sheriff Dough Hays said the shots were fired in self defense by House's brother-in-law, Leon Folmer, and "no charges are contemplated against anybody."

Moore said House fought with his estranged wife's father, C. R. Folmer, and chased Leon Folmer, her brother across several neighboring yards. Moore said Leon Folmer went to his home, got a pistol, and when House returned Folmer fired.

Convicted Lawyers' Sentences Upheld

NEW YORK, April 6. (U. S. — Contempt sentences imposed on lawyers who defended 11 convicted Communist leaders have been upheld by the U. S. Supreme Court of Appeals in a 2-1 decision.

The sentences call for jail terms ranging from 30 days to six months for the six men, including Eugene Dennis, a Communist Party official who acted as his own attorney.

In sustaining the penalties, the Court of Appeals yesterday held that the lawyers employed "crude tactics" and "willfully obstructive tactics" during the nine-month Red conspiracy trial.

The jail terms "will tend to deter imitation of that behavior in other trials," said the majority opinion, written by Judge Augustus Hand. Judge Jerome Frank wrote a separate concurring opinion.

Judge Charles E. Clark disagreed, saying the lawyers should have had a hearing before being sentenced. However, he joined the other judges in criticizing the attorneys' conduct.

40 Die In Wreck

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, April 6. (U. S. — Reports reaching this city today said a train loaded with Easter holiday travelers plunged from a collapsing bridge into the flooded Indian River near Tangua, Rio de Janeiro State, killing 40 persons and injuring 200.

Navy Investigating Blast That Destroyed Giant Flying Boat

PEARL HARBOR, April 6. (U. S. — The Navy sought today to learn why a newly-mounted engine on its Marshall Mars caught fire, causing an explosion that destroyed the giant 80-ton flying boat yesterday brought the ship to an emergency water landing and escaped minutes before 8,000 gallons of high octane gasoline exploded.

The Navy launched an inquiry to learn:

1. Why carbon dioxide extinguisher equipment failed to check quickly the fire in the newly-installed three engine?

2. Why the wing tank cell of aviation gasoline exploded after the engine fire apparently was quelled?

A Navy source said pictures taken from a navy helicopter show the fire apparently was put out several minutes before the explosion shattered the Marshall Mars. He

did not elaborate.

The huge flying boat, holder of the world passenger cargo record of 301 persons and crew of 49, had developed engine trouble Tuesday. A new engine was installed and the crew took it out yesterday for a test run. Then it was scheduled to take 40 passengers to Alameda, Calif.

Fire broke out about one mile off Keshi Lagoon, the old clipper base between Honolulu and Pearl Harbor. The pilot nosed it around at 1,000 feet and brought it down.

This was not the first major accident involving a Mars flying boat. In 1945 the 72 1-2 ton Hawaii Mars crashed into the Chesapeake Bay near Annapolis only two weeks after it was launched at the Glenn L. Martin plant near Baltimore.

The plane nosed crazily toward the water after a portion of the vertical fin broke off at 6,000 feet.

The pilot crash-landed her into the bay at 125 miles an hour. The ship sank in a matter of minutes. One member of the 10-man test crew was injured.

The ship was raised, but later was scrapped.

The seven crewmen who escaped from the Marshall Mars were cheerful.

U. S. Drops Plans To Try Chambers On Perjury Count

WASHINGTON, April 6. (U. S. — Any idea the government may have had for prosecuting Whitaker Chambers for perjury has been dropped, it was reported today.

The Justice Department, which once indicated that such a prosecution was possible, has made no further public statement. However, high officials say the matter is now closed, that no action against Chambers is contemplated.

Chambers' dispute with Alger Hiss over the truth before congressional committees and a federal grand jury about the alleged operations of a prewar Soviet spy ring in Washington made legal history during the last two years.

The dispute was climaxed by Hiss' conviction on perjury charges three months ago. The case was based on his denial before a New York grand jury that he had ever passed State department documents to Chambers for the benefit of the ring. Hiss, a former high-ranking State department official, was sentenced to five years, and has appealed.

Man Who Fought Villa Succumbs

BROWNSVILLE, April 6. (U. S. — A 55-year-old man who helped defend Matamoros against bandit Pancho Villa died at his home here today. He was Samuel Souther, a native of Melrose, Mass., who came to Brownsville in 1910 from Oklahoma.

Souther joined the forces of General Emiliano F. Navearte in 1915 to help defend Matamoros from the marauding Pancho.

Returning to Brownsville, Souther became a nightwatchman, a job he held until six weeks ago when he became ill.

He is survived by his wife, three daughters, and nine grandchildren.

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New Taxes Add \$1,800,000 To State Revenues

AUSTIN, April 6, (U.P.)—New taxes jingled enough additional money into the state treasury last month to meet all major expenses for the first time in six months.

That was the report of State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert yesterday. He said the first month of levy of the 10 per cent omnibus tax increase and the penny-a-pack cigarette tax increase raised \$1,800,000. The new taxes were ordered at the special session of the legislature.

Calvert said full force of the new taxes will not be felt for another month. Payments of crude oil taxes and other major taxes are not due until the month after they accrue.

The month's income was more than enough to cover all allocations for public welfare, teachers retirement, rural roads and the foundation school fund needs Calvert said. It was the first time that happened since August, 1949.

After March expenses were met, there remained \$184,000 for the general fund, he said. The general fund had been making up deficiencies in the omnibus fund in all previous months of the fiscal year.

VA Postpones Firing Of 4,700

WASHINGTON, April 6, (U.P.)—The Veterans Administration today called off, at least temporarily, its plans to dismiss 4,700 hospital and clinic employees next Monday.

The VA also abandoned for the time being plans to close a number of medical clinics, but said it will go ahead with the scheduled dismissal by next Monday of 3,000 non-medical personnel.

The agency said Veterans Administrator Carl R. Gray, Jr., has asked the Budget Bureau for a supplemental fund of \$2,100,000 to keep his medical personnel employed through the end of the fiscal year next June 30.

Gray had ordered 30-day dismissal notices sent March 10 to about 7,800 VA employees, including the 4,700 doctors, nurses and other medical personnel.

He said then that the dismissals, which were set for April 10, were necessary to stay within budget appropriations.

Gray sent telegrams today to managers of all hospitals and to regional offices having out-patient clinics. He ordered them let him know by tomorrow the actual number of employees affected by temporary deferment of the proposed medical personnel cuts.

Gray notified the Budget Bureau he needs \$1,110,000 for the salaries of 3,070 medical personnel in VA hospitals for the remainder of the current fiscal year, and \$1,080,000 for 1,700 positions in out-patient medical clinics in the regional offices.

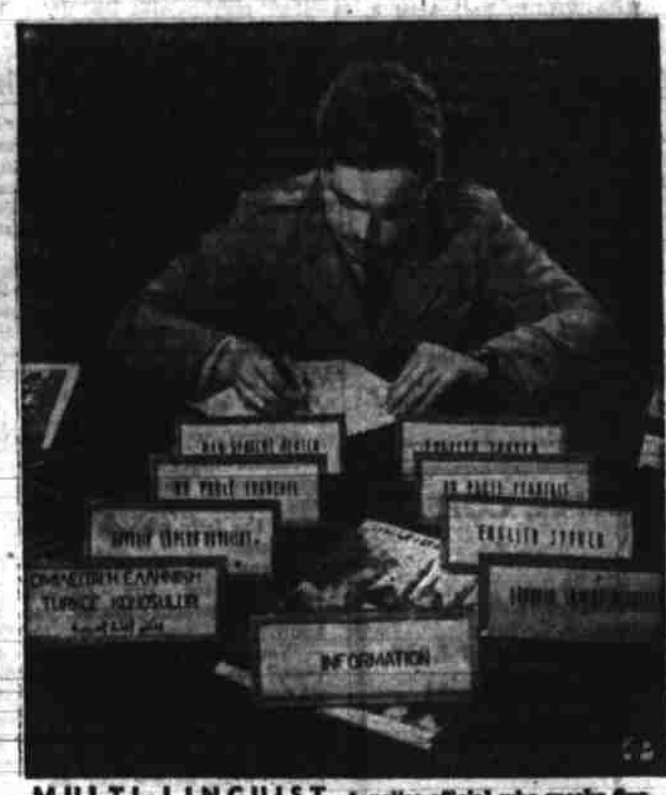

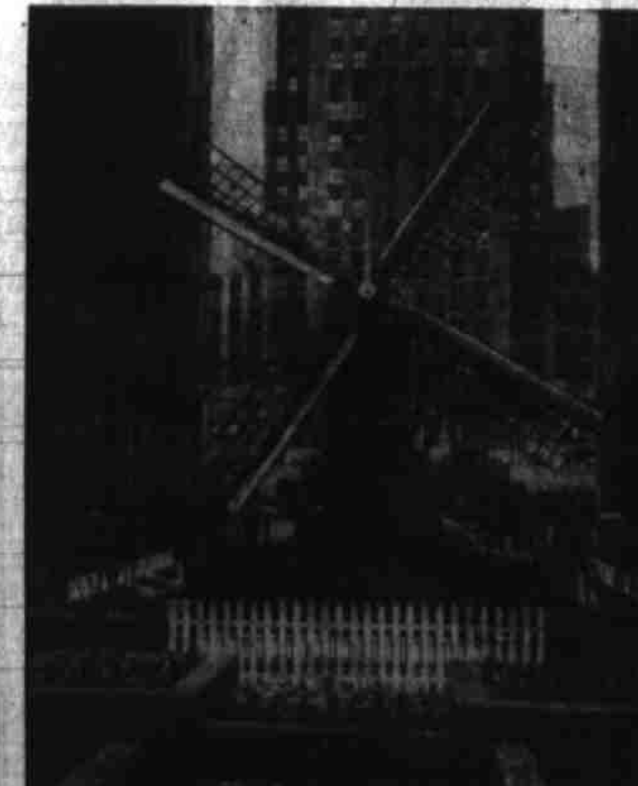

Big Spring Garden Club Members Attend Flower Arrangement School

Twenty-three Big Spring garden club members, who have been attending the flower arrangement school sponsored by the local Garden Club, met Tuesday night and Wednesday at the St. Mary's Episcopal parish house.

Mrs. E. W. Allard of Lampasas was the leader for the school. Mrs. Allard is a national flower show judge and is authorized to teach flower show schools as well as conduct flower arrangement clinics. She is a member of the National Chrysanthemum society and American Iris Society. She has written several articles for state and national flower magazines and pictures of her arrangements have appeared on the covers of these bulletins and magazines.

Mrs. Allard belongs to the Lampasas Garden club, the Bud and Blossom club and assists in sponsoring flower show schools in Lampasas, teaching flower arrangements in the home-making classes of the high school. She is a pupil of J. G. Conway and Mrs. S. Aral in Japanese arrangement.

For their first attempt at arrangements, Mrs. Allard directed the local women in an adaptation of 17th century classical Japanese arrangement. During the sessions Wednesday, she led them through the process of making formal table arrangements and circular formations.

Mrs. Allard's home town of Lampasas sponsors a flower show each November which brings national publicity to its some 4,000 residents. There are three senior garden clubs of 75 members and seven junior clubs in the city. Junior clubs have contributed as many as 110 arrangements to the shows. For two successive years, the show took a blue ribbon from the state organization and in one of those years took the horticulture achievement award for the state.

Mrs. Allard emphasized the idea that even though a club is located in a small town, it can still be given important recognition if the members are willing to work on worthwhile projects. She said that the Lampasas club sponsor a weekly column in the newspaper. This is written by a local club member and given local club news. She also discussed a radio clinic which the club sponsor. Howard County TB Association Meet Set For April 12

A meeting of the Howard County Tuberculosis association has been set for April 12. Among the items of business to be considered is the offering of tuberculin patch tests through the schools.

This project, carried on steadily for several years by the association, is due to get underway on April 17.

Within a few days pupils will be furnished slips to be taken home for parental approval of the routine tests. In the past some parents apparently have misunderstood the purpose of the tests and have declined to let their children

participate. In the tuberculin tests a patch is placed on the child's arm and left undisturbed for a few days. The underlying area is then examined for any reaction. In event there has been reaction this does not indicate tuberculosis. It does, however, indicate the need for further diagnosis, possibly by x-ray.

Object of the test is to discover any possible cases of unsuspected tuberculosis in their incipency. The matter for final diagnosis or treatment, in event either is indicated, is between the child and the family physician. The association only furnishes the patches which are administered by the health unit and health nurse.

Britons Reported Drinking Less Beer

LONDON (U)—Beer drinking Britons are drinking less beer now—days. Latest figures show the country's production of the stuff dropped to 1,531,769 bulk barrels a month. Analysts say the slump is due probably both to high beer prices—resulting from high taxes—and the growing popularity of entertainment found outside saloons. They guess the onset of home television, may aggravate it.

Japan To Drink More

TOKYO (U)—The Japanese government will allow breweries and distilleries to produce 22,000,000 more gallons of alcoholic drinks in the fiscal year beginning April 1. Raw materials are more plentiful. Allowed production this current fiscal year was 94,000,000 gallons.

CUSTOMS INSPECTRESS RILES TEXAN

Watch The Women Is Haley's Tip To Men Touring France

By J. EVETTE HALEY
TOURS, France—The water-front Communists of France were quiet when our ship crossed the Channel from England and came into port at Le Havre in the middle of the night, though three days before they had tied it up with a test strike. The automobiles that the S. S. Washington carried for export, as well as the three belonging to American tourists, had been swung out of the hold and on to the dock when daylight came. All baggage was soon hustled out through an impenetrable fog for customs clearance. The immigration officials quickly checked our passports and we walked down the plank on to the soil of France. We have by design come well ahead of the tourist rush.

At the custom counters parcels are grouped under plainly marked alphabetical divisions there was a hurried search for personal baggage, and no little scurrying about after articles misplaced by porters who had little regard for their ABCs. In such predicaments the agents of the American Express are handy for those deficient in French.

nature of bureaucratic edicts and laws, just draw a federal female official. Like most countries France forces a declaration of the amount of money and travelers checks that the individual carries. Likewise, she has her restrictions on certain imports, such as ayons, that a tourist might carry and use in trade. While other women at the inspectors stands were having their flimsy things circumspectly passed by men with a polite question and an admiring glance, and never being asked about their cash, this female official was making a shambles of the well-ordered bag before her.

She piled out every article, fingered every stocking, and inspected and counted the money in her victim's purse. Then, with the officious air of a job well done, she left this lady to restore the pile to order if possible. And so, with broadened emphasis, the time-worn advice to tourists in France is to warn the men to watch the women.

Once through the customs we began to pick our car which had been rolled just outside and near the terminal on the rebuilt docks. Le Havre's harbor installations, the third most important in France, had been left as a pile of rubble after the bombings of the war. They have been rebuilt in expansive and substantial style, and most of the debris from blasted buildings has been cleared away.

Americans can ship their cars on the boat they take and thus have them waiting when they arrive in France. The charge, is on the basis of weight, and by the United States Lines will take about five good Texas calves for a station wagon Mercury. The AAA district offices will arrange international licenses for car and driver, and have them, along with other necessary papers, in their office at the port when the owner lands.

Everything of a removable nature, such as windshield wipers, outside mirrors and cigarette lighters and tools, should be taken out and carried as baggage in the stateroom to escape the levies of the stavedores on the docks. At Le Havre one American who had failed to follow this advice was loudly wanting to know where his windshield wipers were, but no satisfactory answer came out of the fog.

An archaic truck backs up and fills your tank since the gas has been removed before loading as a safety measure. After the vendor has pumped in the required sum-

ber of liters—for everything here in on the metric system—and charged you at the rate of nearly 60 cents a gallon, you are ready to wipe the dripping fog off the spark plugs and try to take off. When you car fails to start, the trucker will tow you up and down the docks until it does.

Thus within a reasonable length of time, you can be feeling your way through the fog past the shells of buildings, and down the well-paved highway toward Paris. In spite of the northern latitudes of the coast of Normandy—approximately that of upper Maine—spring was at hand, and when the fog lifted it presented a landscape that was already green and unlike anything seen in America—the rather rolling, extremely frugal, well-kept countryside of the tiny farms of France.

Meanwhile, the train that was waiting at the station when the boat arrived has rolled away on its two hour run with the bulk of the American passenger cargo, hell-bent as usual for the glory and gaiety of Paris. We wanted, rather, to see the life on the land of France.

After a leisurely hour's drive due east, we turned south at Rouen, along the Seine, and then veered Southwest—at times a little confused at the intersections because all roads apparently lead to Paris. And so they do, for Paris is the pride of the French and the ultimate terminus for much of the world that travels for pleasure and diversion.

A drive through the western part of France toward the Pyrenees and the Spanish border, across the fields of wheat and through the vineyards, takes in what some consider the garden spot of France. In the lovely country around Tours are many of those monuments to the vanity and the ostentation of the French kings—their turreted, wide-walled monumental castles that suggest a little gloomily the gay life that once swirled through their high-vaulted chambers and through their formal gardens. That life of royalty is dead and long since gone, but on the land Louis' rules, the sturdy peasant still remains, concerned primarily—as in ages past and in time to come—with the problems of sun and rain and soil.

Thus in our course we had already by-passed Paris. Another reason for our doing so was that Paris was rather cold at this season of the year, and particularly so at this time since the Communists had not only shut off its power and transportation, but the

flow of gas in its mains.

People were walking to work—or to whatever passes for work in Paris—and we met a lady who had driven from the city that morning without breakfast, and who reported there was nothing cooking in the city except the unpalatable brew stirred up by the Reds.

Since our party is somewhat allergic to Communists, even at a respectable distance—though Communists can be respectable at no distance—and since France was letting this treasonable mob run roughshod over Paris as we passed, we were temporarily willing to let them have it. But the farming country through which we passed was hard at honest work and singularly peaceful.

People were cold in New York because of a coal strike when we left; people were cold in Paris because of a Communist strike when we arrived. What an interesting analogy. Obviously we should feel at home in France. We continued our southerly course on good paved roads through apparently unending avenues of trees, trimmed to perfection of every surplus twig, and cleaned up to the smallest fraction by people in the country scrambling for fuel.

Everywhere in Normandy great draft horses, hooked singly be-

tween the shaves of high-wheeled carts, were drawing the carefully conserved manure from stables to the little fields. There it was being pitched off in small piles by the drivers, and vigorously scattered with pitchforks by men and women who have thus toiled over and cared for this land for ages.

Horses through Normandy run to the Percheron order—the great draft animals that originated here in France—and are all fat and well-kept. Everywhere farmers were plowing their fields, sometimes with one, more frequently with two abreast, and sometimes with three noble animals hooked in tandem.

The drivers were usually dressed in rubber boots, though the fields were not muddy, and in ample though dirty clothes, as is usually the case with men everywhere engaged in the tough work of tearing their livings from the soil. Notwithstanding their fine teams they never ride, but tramp in long strides, up and down the fields at a deliberate pace that seems set for the ages, alongside their powerful and dignified animals.

Everywhere fields were in perfect order and the prospects for grain were fine, auguring well for the French and a further restriction of

the market for the American farmer. Our first impression is that this peasant people is completely aware of the vigorous economy of nature. There can be no waste if there be survival.

Nature's rigorous ways can be cultivated but they cannot be denied. In obvious harmony with this ancient and irrevocable law, many peasants could be seen with shallow bags swung from their shoulders, taking their well-measured strikes up and down the hills that constitute their fields, scattering commercial fertilizer as they walk. They suggest Biblical days and ways when men genuinely believed in the axiom that "as ye sow, ye also reap."

The kind-loving peasantry of France was sowing with honest labor. Meanwhile the plinks of Paris were cultivating a crop of an entirely different order.

Lunch on a bun is easy on the budget, has many delicious variations and takes only a short time to prepare. It's always a hit with the children, especially if they "can fix their own" and is equally popular with guests. A salad is all that's needed to complete the meal.

There is the hamburger favorite for something special that intrigues guests—round meat loaf, sliced that just fits the bun. The loaf may be served hot or cold and family and guests can make their own sandwiches. Accompany the loaf with potato chips and big slices of tomato—fresh onion rings too, if you like. The meat is ideal for picnics, since it can be carried in the cans in which it was baked.

You may use your favorite meat loaf recipe or here is one that has an unusual twist using rolled oats.

CUT-TO-FIT MEAT LOAF
1 1/2 pounds ground beef
1 cup rolled oats (uncooked)
2 eggs
2-3 cups tomato juice
1/4 cup finely grated onion (pulp and juice)
2 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon prepared mustard

Put the beef and rolled oats in a medium-size mixing bowl. Beat the eggs with a rotary or electric mixer until foamy and add to meat and oats. Add the tomato juice, onion, salt, pepper and mustard. Knead thoroughly with fingers of mix with a fork or spoon so that ingredients are well mingled. Pack firmly into two No. 2 cans; put in a spoonful of meat at a time and pack down before adding the next. If meat is lean you can pack to within one-half inch of the top; if not you will need to leave an inch at the top for drippings. Bake in a moderate (350 degrees) oven for 45 to 50 minutes. Remove and let stand five minutes. Loosen top edge of meat from can with a spatula and unmold. Each roll may be sliced into 4 to 6 slices and served on buns.

There is nothing more delicious than open meat buns with barbecue sauce. Slice open buns and toast lightly. Season ground meat to suit family, brown quickly. Lay each patty on the buttered half bun. Cover with tasty barbecue sauce. Put under broiler, until

done, "saucing" the meat several times.

For Peanut Lovers
For the peanut lovers, spread buns sliced in half with mayonnaise, then peanut butter. Lay partly crisped bacon strips on top, put under broiler until bacon is crisp and peanut butter is puffy.

Something a little different for the picnic crowd are the jumbo size twelve-in-one sandwich buns. Yeast dough is baked in round cake pans to make jumbo buns. The resulting bun-shaped loaves are split to form three layers. Put egg salad filling between two layers and ground ham filling between the others. Cut the buns in wedge-shaped pieces, like you cut a layer cake.

The chuck wagon of the old west has all but vanished in fact; but in memory, it is responsible for some of the best eating and the wildest legends of prodigious feasting in this country. A good chuck wagon man in the old days could produce a masterpiece of a main dish out of whatever ingredients the plains or the hills provided on any particular day.

Many a modern popular favorite takes its spirit, if not its method of preparation, from the colorful days of the old west. The special charm of the western cheese bun is the blend of cheese, shredded and blended with chopped green pepper, onion, hard-cooked eggs and olives, plus such assorted season as will point up flavors of the well-met assemblage.

Serve western cheese buns with plenty of hot aromatic coffee, a green salad and with fruit or some simple sweet for dessert.

Western Cheese Buns
1/4 pound cheese, shredded
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
2 tablespoons chopped onion
2 hard-cooked eggs, chopped
1/4 cup chopped stuffed olives
1 teaspoon salad mustard
3 tablespoons chili sauce
Salt pepper

Pickle Sauce
Blend together the cheese, green pepper, onion, eggs, olives, mustard and chili sauce. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Cut the buns in halves and toast them. Spread the bottom halves with the cheese mixture. Place under low broiler heat or in a moderate oven until cheese is melted. Cover with the top halves of the buns and garnish each portion with a pickle fan.

Kraut Cheeseburger
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
2 tablespoons chopped onion
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
1 cup chopped sauerkraut
1 cup (1/2") cubes bologna sausage
1 cup grated American cheese
6 hamburger buns or 12 slices enriched bread.

Melt butter in a skillet; add onion and green pepper and saute for three minutes. Add sauerkraut and bologna sausage and cook for an additional five minutes. Add grated cheese. Cut buns in half and spread kraut mixture on bottom half of each bun; cover with bun top. Place on a cookie sheet and toast under a preheated broiler (400 F.) for five minutes on both sides.

Open Face Barbecue Beef Sandwich
2 tablespoons fat
1/4 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped celery
1 cup (1/2 pound) ground beef
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 (No. 1) can condensed tomato soup
2 tablespoons prepared barbecue sauce
4 frankfurter buns, cut in half and toasted

Melt fat in a skillet. Add onion and celery and saute until tender. Add beef and brown. Combine salt, tomato soup and barbecue sauce

and add to meat mixture. Cover and simmer for thirty minutes. Serve hot on toasted frankfurter buns.

Baked Beans on the Bun
8 buns
6 frankfurters, cooked
2 tablespoons tomato catsup
1 1/2 cups hot baked beans
Salt buns and toast. Place 1 frankfurter, split in each bun. Spread 1 teaspoon catsup and 1/4 cup baked beans over each; close bun top over sandwich.

Or, use leftover beans, season with a bit of mustard and mayonnaise, mash, spread on bun, slice wieners open, broil under broiler. Chili sauce, diced cheese and pickles gives a still different flavor.

The cold meats are delectable for lunch on a bun. Take a slice of ham, a slice of turkey or chicken, and serve with cream sauce.

Or, tongue slices may be spread with well seasoned cooked spinach on a bun topped with a zippy horseradish cream sauce. Spiced ham, broiled on a bun with tomatoes is also a tasty morsel.

Luncheon Sandwich
12 slices toast
6 hard cooked eggs
1 cup cheese sauce
1 or 2 apples, sliced
Watercress
Butter

Butter slices of toast. Arrange slices of egg on one slice of toast, cover with another slice, more egg slices, and top with a third slice of toast. Pour hot cheese sauce over all. (Make cheese sauce by melting one-half pound rich cheese with one-half cup milk, stirring to make smooth.) Arrange slices of apple on each plate. Garnish with watercress. Yield: 4 sandwiches.

There is no better accompaniment for these lunch on a bun dishes than cold slaw.

Cole Slaw Salad
4 cups shredded cabbage
1/2 cup mayonnaise
2 tablespoons vinegar or lemon juice
1 tablespoon grated onion
1 teaspoon celery seed
1 teaspoon sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper

Crisp the shredded cabbage in ice water if necessary. Combine mayonnaise, vinegar or lemon juice, grated onion, celery seed, sugar, salt and pepper. Drain the cabbage thoroughly and mix with the dressing. Serve in lettuce cups. Garnish with a dash of paprika, a green pepper ring or a strip of pimento. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

and water and add to hot milk, stirring well. Add salt, parsley, chives and butter or margarine; cook until thickened. Remove from heat and allow to cool. Add flaked fish, celery, egg, and salt and pepper to taste. Mix thoroughly. Add enough crushed cereal flakes to hold mixture together. Shape into desired size cutlets, roll in cereal flakes and saute in hot fat until brown. Makes 6 servings.

Use Pineapple For Flavor In Sweet Biscuits

Pineapple, most often used as a dessert flavor or meat accompaniment, plays a new role in this new sweet biscuit recipe. It takes the place of the more usual currant or raisin filling in a good hot bread to serve for breakfast or with a luncheon salad.

The dough, flavored with nutlike bran cereal is easy to handle. Treat it gently as you do any quick-bread mixture. This is a roll-up filled biscuit. You won't have trouble with the filling cooling out if you leave about a half-inch of plain

biscuit dough unspread along the outer edge of the roll.

Bran Pineapple Biscuits
1/4 cup ready-to-eat bran
2-3 cup milk
1 1/4 cups sifted flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup shortening
1/4 cup crushed pineapple, well drained
1/4 cup sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon

Soak bran in milk, sift flour, baking powder, and salt together. Cut in shortening until mixture is like coarse cornmeal. Add soaked bran, stir until dough follows fork around bowl. Turn out on floured board and knead lightly a few seconds; roll into a rectangle 8 x 11 inches thick. Brush lightly with melted butter and sprinkle with mixture of sugar, cinnamon and

Stir to coat vegetables with fat and serve at once. Makes 2 to 3 servings.

481 Job Placements Reported By TEC

A total of 481 job placements were made here by the Texas Employment commission in the three months ending March 25, the quarterly report released by the agency indicated today.

SOCIALIST MOVE SEEN

Bankers Fight HST's Plan To Reshuffle Executive Offices

NEW YORK, April 6. (AP)—Some bankers are getting alarmed at part of the President's plan to reshuffle the executive offices. They see in it the attempt of the camel of socialism to get its nose under the tent of the national banking system.

Bankers representing the American Bankers Association, are going to Washington Tuesday to urge the Senate to block that part of the President's reorganization plan. It calls for the abolition of the separate comptroller of the currency, who monitors the national banking system, and the placing of his duties and powers in the hands of the secretary of the treasury.

The ABA doesn't charge that this is the first step toward nationalization of the banking system, but a few of its members do. And ABA does oppose the proposal and contends the nation's bank examiners should be kept free of control by other governmental agencies, particularly one with political ties, such as the secretary of the treasury is apt to have.

Some of ABA's members go further and see in the proposed shift a threat to state banks also. Arthur T. Roth, president of the Franklin National Bank at Franklin Square, Long Island, who is egging all bankers on to put pressure on the Senate, says:

"If the office of the comptroller

of the currency is abolished, the secretary of the treasury would take the comptroller's place on the three-man directorate of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. State banks are members of the FDIC, and this dominating position of the secretary of the treasury would obviously give him great influence over the state banks as well as the national banks."

The objectives the President seeks in giving the comptroller's duties to the treasury are: Economy of operation, and elimination of overlapping functions.

The ABA contends that neither objective would be achieved. First, the comptroller's office receives no appropriation from Congress and costs the taxpayer nothing. Its expenses are borne out of the examination fees it charges national banks. Second, its examiners' reports are accepted by FDIC and also by the Federal Reserve Board. Therefore, there are no overlapping functions to be eliminated, in the bankers' opinion.

The fear of nationalization stems from several things. As it is now, the comptroller is appointed for a five-year term, overlapping various administrations. The secretary of the treasury, as a cabinet member is tied closely with whatever administration is in office. Since the comptroller gets no funds from Congress, although he reports directly to Congress, he can be free of political pressure from other

government agencies. Some bankers think that future secretaries of the treasury might not be.

Bankers know that the interest rates they charge are tied fairly closely to the interest rates the treasury sets on government securities. They don't want to see the secretary's powers over them further increased.

Among the comptroller's powers, which would thus pass to the secretary, bankers contend are: Chartering of national banks, approval of branch offices, approval of consolidations and of conversions of state banks into national banks, and power to determine solvency and appoint bank receivers.

Not all bankers are fighting the plan. One reason is, Roth says, that some bankers think the shift of the comptroller's duties to the treasury is part of the Hoover Commission's reorganization plan, for which they have general enthusiasm.

Roth tells the bankers that the Hoover Commission made no recommendation for changing the status of the comptroller's office, and that this idea is entirely separate.

The Senate Expenditures Committee is holding a hearing Tuesday on opposition to the proposal. Unless more than half (49) of the senators vote to block the reorganization, it automatically goes into effect by the middle of May.

World War II Is Banned In Italy's Schools

ROME (AP)—World War II? What's that? Officially, Italy's postwar high school graduates have never heard of it. Nor, in the classroom, have they ever heard of Benito Mussolini.

For the past five years, in Italy's grammar schools and high schools, history has stopped in 1918. Allied Military Government first placed a ban on secondary school teaching of Fascist history and the events leading up to the war.

The occupation authorities wanted to avoid "classroom controversies". They ordered references to Mussolini and Fascism edited out of textbooks, sometimes with the rough expedient of paper and paste. The ban has never been revoked, although Allied military rule ended with the Peace Treaty in 1947. An Education Ministry commission has been studying the problem of objective presentation in the classroom of the controversial Fascist era, but a spokesman said he does not know when they will finish the job.

Returns On Car Theft
CHICAGO (AP)—If somebody takes your car here, the chances are about 5 to 1 that you will get it back. The police department says 4,300 motor vehicles were stolen in Chicago in 1949 but all but 801 of them were recovered.

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
