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Capt. John R. McKone, One of Two Survivors Shot Down In Barents Sea. At Sheppard AFB

A survivor of one of the Cold War's most dramatic and tragic incidents has arrived at Sheppard Air Force Base for additional Air Force schooling.

He is Captain John R. McKone, the navigator of the USAF RB-47 shot down by a Soviet fighter plane over international waters in the Barents Sea in July 1960. Captain McKone and Captain Freeman B. Olmstead, the co-pilot and other survivor, were pulled from the frosty northern waters by a fishing boat, taken to Moscow, and held prisoner from July through the following February.

They became the central figures in a tension-filled drama that went to the very highest levels of government on both sides of the Iron Curtain and into the Security Council of the United Nations.

After seven months of imprisonment and interrogation by the Communist secret police, Captains McKone and Olmstead were released and returned to the United States.

The full story of the two rescued fliers has been told by William L. White in his book titled THE LITTLE TOY DOG. As the author and the two captives themselves admit, this is a rather odd, almost misleading title for their story. It is intended as a tribute and remembrance for the other four USAF officers who lost their lives when the RB-47 was shot down. The significance of "little toy dog" is fully explained in the book.

After his release and return to the United States in February 1961, Captain McKone was sent to the University of Pittsburgh where he was recently awarded a masters degree in international affairs. He came to Sheppard shortly after his graduation.

I spent the better part of a morning talking with Captain McKone recently. He is a forceful, articulate man brimming with anecdotes and sidelights of his Cold War "combat" experience. To me, he still appears some-

what thinner than the picture in the book showing him and his fellow crew members before the ill-fated RB-47 flight. I had hoped to find out something of what his life has been like since he was released by the Communists and returned to his Air Force career. Quite naturally, the events of the flight, the shootdown, and his imprisonment kept intruding on the whole interview.

Captain McKone says the interest in the two fliers when they returned to the United States was amazing. He received letters and wires from all over the Free World, very little of it "crank mail." He says he was glad the American people were interested in the case and didn't take it lightly. He credited public opinion with playing a large part in bringing him and Captain Olmstead back home.

How did he feel the drama of the whole affair had affected him and Mrs. McKone?

"Both of us matured a great deal," he said. "We learned the art of patience. And we also

Examination For Immigration Patrol Inspector Available

A new examination for Immigration Patrol Inspector has been announced by the U. S. Civil Service Commission, for filling positions paying \$5,355 a year with the Immigration and Naturalization Service of the U. S. Department of Justice.

These positions offer young men interested in immigration law enforcement, an opportunity to begin a career in such work with on the job training for positions of greater responsibility. As Immigration Patrol Inspectors, they patrol areas along international boundaries by automobile, on foot, by boat, or as observers in aircraft, in search of aliens who have entered or are attempting to enter the United States unlawfully.

No experience is required for these positions. To qualify applicants must pass a written test of verbal abilities judgment and aptitude for learning a foreign language; those who pass the test will be interviewed to determine if they have the personal qualities needed for the work. Since the duties are arduous applicants must be in sound physical condition. They must be at least 68 inches tall, weigh at least 140 pounds and have reached their 21st birthday at the time of appointment.

The closing date for receipt of applications is Dec. 14 1962. Full information is given in Announcement No. 289B which may be obtained with application cards from many post offices throughout the country or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25 D. C.

WHILE POLITICIANS CAVIL

The publicly regulated electric industry has been a political whipping boy for more years than most of us care to count. The goal of most of its detractors has always been the same—to socialize the production and distribution of electric power, and to create a nationwide political monopoly of this essential service at a cost of untold billions in tax money.

In view of that, it wouldn't be surprising if the industry, reeling under these political blows, had dragged its feet and shown a minimum of enthusiasm for improving and expanding its facilities, and for venturing into new and little charted areas of science.

But the industry's attitude has been precisely the opposite. It is fighting for its life. A few facts tell the substance of the story:

The investment of the investor-owned, tax-paying electric power industry now amounts to \$46 billion. By 1970, a mere eight years from now, it will be \$88 billion. And by 1980 that figure will, it is expected, be doubled.

In that year the industry's capacity will reach the stupefying figure of 2.3 trillion kilowatt hours of energy. Putting this in more understandable terms it is estimated that the per capita energy used then will be 11,797 kilowatt hours, as compared with 4,525 in a recent year.

As for venturesomeness, today 129 of the electric utilities are participating in 24 atomic projects involving a cost of \$700 million. The purpose is to open new doors and windows—and to find just what methods of nuclear utilization promise the greatest efficiency and safety.

While politicians cavil and complain, the taxpaying power industry achieves.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

California witnessed recently what is perhaps one of the most outlandish displays of brass in a long time.

The nation's largest operator in the field of trading stamps filed suit in a court against the California State Board of Pharmacy.

Early this year, the Board of Pharmacy which sets the professional standards for pharmacists made a ruling that trading stamps are not to be given with prescriptions.

The State Board stated that handing out trading stamps with prescription drugs is unprofessional, undignified and unethical.

The stamp company charged that the State Board of Pharmacy was seeking to "prevent and eliminate competition."

The stamps firm's allegation becomes most interesting when the broad doctrine it sets up is closely examined.

For they say in effect, that anyone, no matter how engaged, who receives money from the public for goods or services should increase the price of that goods or services so that tribute is paid to a stamp firm.

For there is no such thing as giving out a few stamps. Each month a business that gives

stamps must buy stamps with from 2 to 3 per cent of its gross volume.

If successful in court, stamps firm have an unlimited opportunity for expansion here.

For example, if professional men are barred from use of any regulation forbidding, the practice, who knows but next thing doctors will be forced to give stamps. Thus, for instance, if a doctor's fee is \$100 for a tonsil and adenoid operation, he will be forced to reschedule his fees so that operation will in the future cost \$102 with trading stamps given with every operation.

And a \$10 dollar dental filling will become \$10.20. But dental patients will have the solace of knowing as the drill buzzes away, they are piling up trading stamps.

Perhaps in time, even morticians can be compelled to give trading stamps, after adjusting their prices to take care of the cost of stamps.

This eventual result will also bring fringe benefits to dying as they will have the comfort of knowing that when their funeral bill is paid, their survivors will get stamps that will get them a lovely set of hand engraved water tumblers.

Or as some w't suggested, perhaps the Internal Revenue Service is missing a bet. It should offer trading stamps on tax payments made at an early date. In fact, a tax increase of around \$1 1/4 billion will enable the government to give stamps to all taxpayers. This thing has some real possibilities.

Social Security Information

Employers should mail social security tax reports to the Internal Revenue Service by October 31, 1962, on the wages paid their employees during the calendar quarter ending September 30, 1962, according to Erton F. Tate, district manager of the Wichita Falls social security office.

Tate pointed out that in order to make sure that the employee receives credit for the wages reported, his social security number as well as his name must be shown on the report EXACTLY AS ON HIS SOCIAL SECURITY ACCOUNT CARD.

If an employee does not have a social security account number, ask him to contact the Wichita Falls social security district and apply for one. If he has lost his card, have him take or send the stub from the old card to the district office and he will get a duplicate card. If he has lost the stub also, he should contact the social security office who will arrange to get a duplicate for him.

If a woman changes her name, be sure that the name on the quarterly report is the same name as on her social security card. If she hasn't changed her name of her card, have her contact the social security office to get her correct name on the card. Do not report the new name until you are sure the name is changed on her social security records.

HOW TO SCORE A 160,000 MILE BULLSEYE — Astronaut Walter M. Schirra Jr. left nothing to chance on his history-making space flight. He was watching as his SIGMA 7 space capsule, the candy-striped retro-rocket package strapped to the heat shield, was hoisted (1) to the top of the gantry at Cape Canaveral. He checked progress as technicians gingerly lowered (2) the capsule into position atop the Atlas booster, closely observing his all-important "brakes." Enclosed in the candy-striped dome, the "brakes" consist of three small bucket-size solid fuel Thiokol retro-rocket engines each 12 inches in diameter and 15.5 inches long. Their performance brought to a successful climax Schirra's six-orbit flight which had started at 8:15 AM (EDT) Oct. 3 with a spectacular blastoff (3) from the launch site. At 5:07 PM (EDT) the retros fired in perfect sequence, burning for about 11 seconds. Together they generated sufficient reverse thrust to slow the capsule velocity by about 500 feet per second, thus easing SIGMA 7 out of its orbital path. Owing to the performance of the pilot, capsule, "brakes" and the large supporting team, Walter Schirra splashed safely into the Pacific 21 minutes later, having scored an almost-perfect bulls-eye after a flight covering 160,000 miles. Schirra climbed (4) out of his capsule at 6:15 PM (EDT) aboard the carrier Kearsarge to the cheers of the Navy crew.

Dear boys and girls— You and I usually take trips in the summer. Seeds travel in the fall. They want new homes so they will have room to grow. They have new coats to travel in. The coats are hard and will keep the seeds dry. Seeds travel in many different ways.

Some seeds have wings. Some have parachutes. When the wind blows these seeds sail along in the air. Sometimes they go only a little ways. Sometimes they sail for a long time. Then they float down to the ground. See if you can find an old dandelion flower. Its hair will be all white. Blow on it and watch the seeds go floating off.

Some seeds like to hitchhike rides. Sometimes they ride on animals. After awhile the wind might blow them off the animal or maybe the animal will scratch them off. Then they have found a new home. They will grow there. Have you ever had a seed to hitchhike a ride with you? Walk through a field and see if any seeds ride on your socks or pants legs. We don't like for seeds to ride with us because they usually stick. We pick them off and throw them on the ground. We have helped the seed to find a new home.

Some seeds think they are sailors. They fall into the water. Then they float to a new home. Some seeds go for a sail on the sea. Others float in ditches. Did you ever see sticks and grass float down the river or ditch? They are carrying seeds to new homes. Some of the seeds will grow up to be trees. Others will be pretty flowers or grasses. Some of them will be weeds.

Sometimes seeds are carried and planted by man. Many years ago when the Pilgrims came to our country they brought seeds to plant. Those seeds had a long ride didn't they? Have you ever carried seeds to their new home and planted them?

After the seeds find their new home they wait until the wind blows dirt over them for a blanket. Then when they are covered they stay nice and warm under the dirt while it is winter. In the spring the warm rains come to help them and the warm sunshine helps them so they begin to grow. They grow into big plants. In the summer new seeds begin to grow on the plants. When fall comes again the new seeds are ready to go away and find new homes.

Fall is here. Look in the fields and in the air and in ditches of water. See how many seeds you can find that are traveling to new homes.

"Week" To Focus Spotlight On Growth Of South's Forest Industries

National Forest Products Week Oct. 21-27 will be an observance of special significance to the South because of the region's progress in forest management and its almost infinite potential for growth and development of forest based industries.

During the "week," special ceremonies will be held involving the participation of millions of citizens in Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North and South Carolina, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia.

The manufacture of lumber, paper and other forest products in these states support annual payrolls that total billions of dollars. Future opportunities are even more impressive.

Southern Pine, the region's principal tree species, now provides a large share of the nation's structural lumber and about half its pulp and paper. Other industries based on the species are naval stores, chemicals, furniture and new plants specializing in "engineered wood." Some clues as the possibilities ahead may be found in current developments, for example:

1. Almost a year ago, to the day, unprecedented movements of lumber from South to Midwest and East commenced. Both the volume and frequency of these shipments have accelerated in recent months.

2. Intergration of forest products manufacture on the part of many lumber companies has been beneficial to the paper industry, as well as to the lumber economy. More than 1,000 lumber companies in the South now are mechanically equipped to convert the "leftovers" of lumbering into pulp chips and other products. Pulp chips from sawmills now represent 15 percent of the South's total raw material for paper manufacture.

3. Greater utilization of the timber harvest is having increasingly significant conservation impact. Commercial uses have been developed for bark and even the sawdust may be used for fuel and compressed products.

4. The time is imminent when the South will surpass the 40,000,000 mark in total "tree farm acreage. More than two-thirds of the nation's "tree farm" acreage is located in the 12 states.

5. Natural properties of Southern Pine, like strength and modern processes, such as seasoning and "pre-shrinking," have well adapted the species to new systems of building and to various forms of "engineered wood." A number of new plants specializing in the production of glued laminated structural sections have located in Southern states, close to sources of timber supply.

Added incentive to the South's celebration of "Forests Products Week" comes from Dr. Edward G. Locke, Madison, Wisconsin, Director of the U. S. Forest Products Laboratory.

Dr. Locke says the current crop of Southern Pine, produced under good forestry practices, has quality as well as quantity. "This quality is exceptional, so much so, in fact, that it should

lead to many new and improved uses of wood as a building material."

According to U. S. Forest Service reports, current sawtimber growth exceeds removal by at least 30 percent.

Monthly Examinations To Fill 154 Vacancies In Dept. of Public Safety

Monthly examinations are now being given to fill the 154 vacancies in the uniformed services of the Texas Highway Department of Public Safety, according to Major Harry Hutchison, Regional Commander of this region for the Texas DPS.

The commander said this new method of recruiting has not been used in the entire history of the Texas Department of Public Safety prior to this year. Entrance examinations were formerly given two or three times a year, now the examinations are given the second Saturday of each month throughout the state of Texas.

The cities in this region where the entrance examinations are

given include Lubbock, Amarillo, and Wichita Falls. December 8th will be the last date for entrance examinations to be given for entrance in the next student patrol school, a sixteen week training period which will begin at the Department of Public Safety Law Enforcement Academy in Austin.

When all benefits are considered, as well as the fact that these jobs offer a career of service to their fellow Texans, we regard them as outstanding opportunities for young men. They will have an opportunity to attend the best state police academy in the nation, to receive training in police science and

administration under the direction of some of the nation's foremost professional authorities.

Hutchison said that upon successful completion of the sixteen weeks training course, graduates will become commissioned officers and will be assigned to the field. The salary while in training will be \$331 per month and will increase to \$395 or \$412 per month upon graduation, depending on the nature of the patrolman's assignment. Longevity pay increment of \$10.00 extra per month will be added for each five years of service for each of the uniformed services, which are the Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Driver's License, and Motor Vehicle Inspection. In addition, uniforms and equipment will be furnished, and the officers will participate in the state retirement plan. There are other

personal benefits they will have such as job security, annual vacations, sick leave and insurance benefits.

Applicants must have a high school education or the equivalent, be in good physical condition and be of good moral character. They must be not less than 5'8" nor more than 6'4" tall, and weigh not less than two pounds or more than three pounds per inch of height.

Those who meet the basic qualifications of their applications will be permitted to take the new written examination on the second Saturday of each month on which they must qualify plus passing an oral interview board before they can start training at the Academy.

New York. Scholastic and physical requirements for all the academies are very strict. Congressmen in the top half of their class scholastically and are required to pass College Board examinations in order to be considered. Applicants also must pass physical examinations to gain admission to the academies. Students interested in learning more about a specific academy should contact Congressman Purcell by writing him in his office. The address is House of Representatives, Washington 25, D. C.

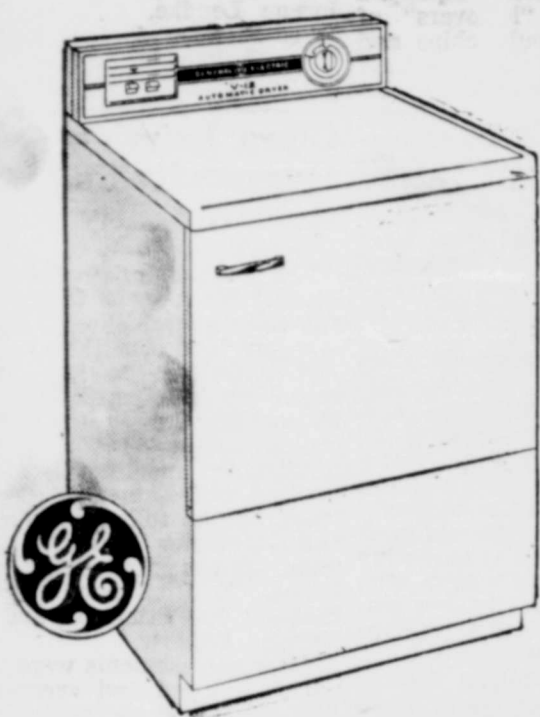

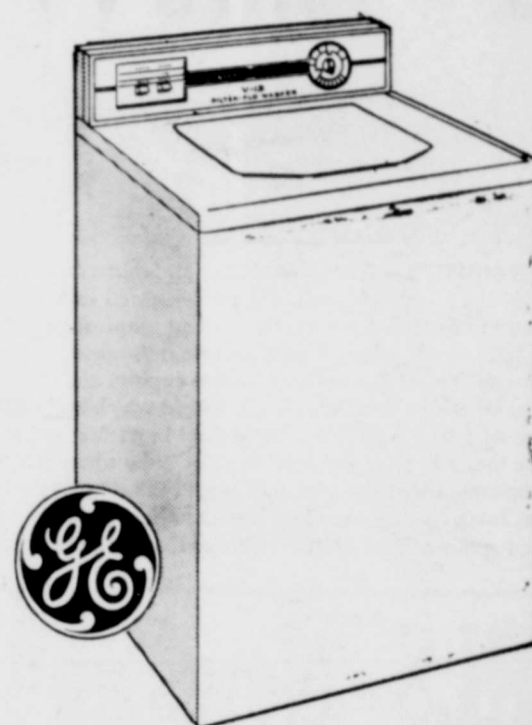

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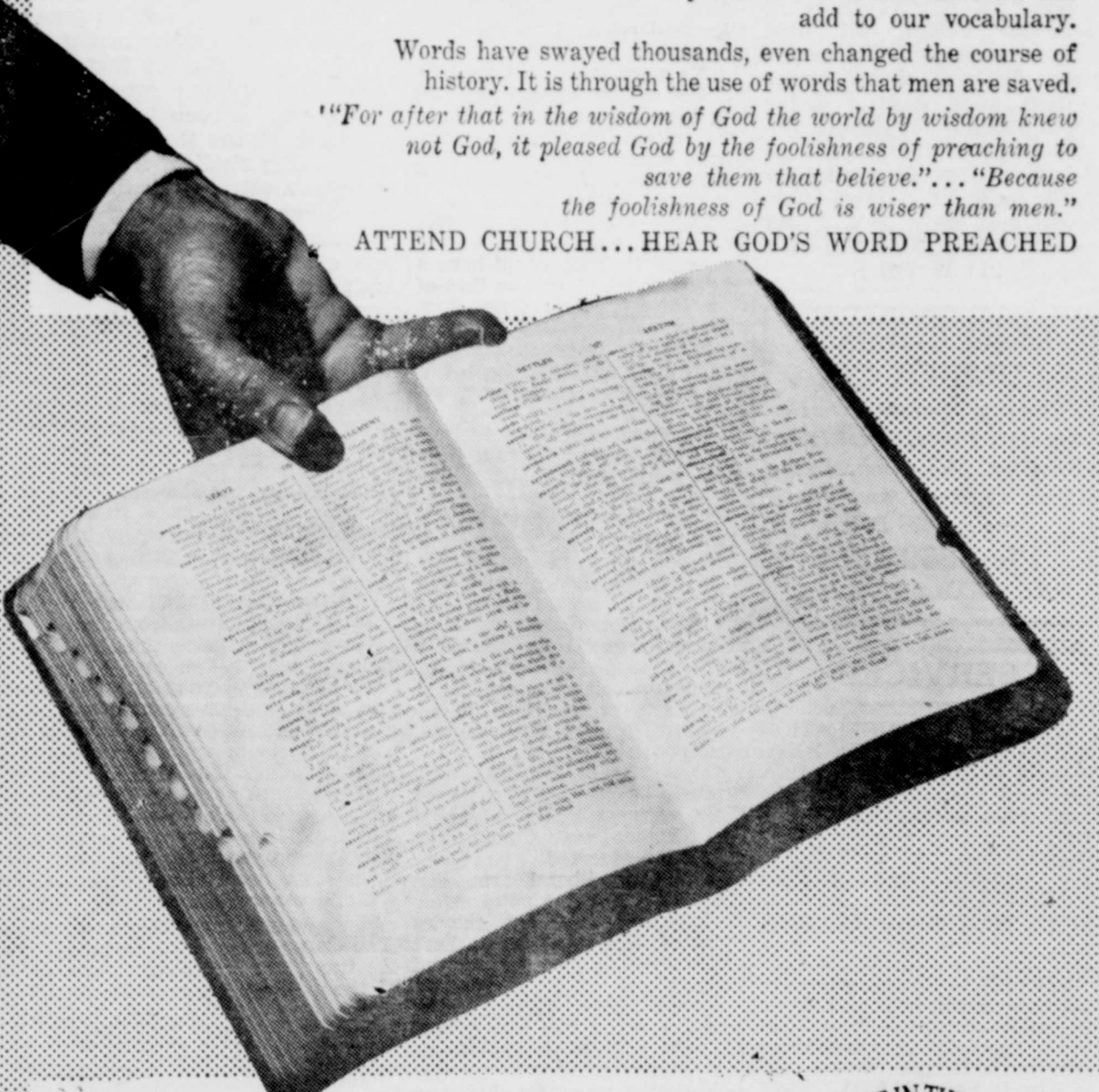
