Over 400 Registered For R. F. C. Work

Over 400 Dawson county residents have registered for R. F. C. work at the last registration and over 200 have been put to work, this week with \$1,500 to be paid to these workers on this coming Saturday night. This amount makes a total of \$12,000 spent in this county.

Many worthwhile improvements have been made in Lamesa and Dawson County with the labor being paid for out of this R. F. C. fund. The following projects have been finished or are to be finished in the near future: Sidewalks at the high school and grammar school; practically all church building sidewalks and leveling lawns; the cemetery has been leveled; streets in towns have been cleaned; vacant lots have been cleaned of rubbish and weeds; Hancock School had their grounds cleaned and many trees set out; Sparenberg and Ackery schools have had extensive work done on their grounds with trees and shrubs set out. Higginbottom and Klondike as well as others twenty schools are having work done on their grounds.

The court house lawn is being spaded up this week so that the grass will grow better. The county commissioners have had extensive work done on county roads and lanes, in each precinct.

The childrens wading pool in the city park was built with R. F. C. labor in cooperation with the Lions Club and this week grass has been set over the city park grounds.

This R. F. C. money is new money in this county and has helped many families in need in the last few months.

Dime a Democrat is Assessed Texans

A dime a Democrat is the quota assessed Texans by the Democratic National Committee. The Texas National Democratic organization of which Roy Miller is director, Senator Margie E. Neal, co-director, and Frank Scofield, finance director, has assumed the task of raising \$75,000 which is 10 per cent of the \$750,000 deficit of the Democratic National Committee.

This rather formidable sum is proportionate to what Texas has received and expects at the hands of the Democratic party, it was said in a statement released by National Democratic Headquarters at Austin.

Postmaster General James A. Farley, who is chairman of the Democratic National Committee, is requesting so large a sum of the Texas organization is actuated by the extraordinary record made by the state in the campaign last fall. Texas it will be recalled, furnished the largest Democratic majority for Roosevelt and Garner, and contributed the second largest sum of money being exceeded only by Roosevelt's own state of New York.

The amount requested from Texas was approximately one tenth of the Democratic votes cast in Texas last November. In determining the quota for each county in Texas the organization decided to allot the quota in proportion to the votes cast. Ten cents for each Democratic vote cast approximates very closely the sum expected from Texas.

There were 1664 votes cast in Dawson County. The quota therefore is \$166.40.

"Every Democrat in Dawson county ought to feel that the New Deal is worth at least a dime to him," Frank Scofield said. "We are now advising county chairmen of the sums expected of them and anticipate no difficulty in raising Texas' part of the party's debt."

Tips on Taxes

LEGISLATIVE NEWS SERVICE OF THE TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION, AUSTIN

Austin—It is known that the costs of the State government for the next two years will be substantially lower than for the past two years. The single uncertainty is what may be done with reference to appropriations for support of public schools. Other major appropriation bills have been finally passed by both houses of the Legislature. They represent reductions varying from 25 to 40 per cent. The aggregate reductions will probably be from 30 to 33 per cent.

However, the possibility of upsetting the results of the start toward economy—and it is only a start, notwithstanding the impressive savings made—is by no means remote. There are two very pressing influences that may supply the necessary support to bring about the enactment of laws that will open new sources of revenue, which would eventually neutralize the progress already made. These are the insistent demand of public schools for liberal appropriations and the desire to balance the State budget and wipe out the existing deficit during the next year, or two at most.

Thus far, no general new taxes have been levied. The sales tax, that was the most important means suggested for raising new revenues, has been killed again. This time, its death is supposed to be final, but it is known that plans are being made to revive the idea, dress it up in a new Spring outfit, bring it out as the angel of public school education and the Santa Claus for sadly depleted county and city treasuries, through an ingenious proposal to split the proceeds between the schools, counties, and cities, which has been a prolific cause of the increase in the cost of government in this country for the past ten years.

Those who oppose the new taxes will need to be alert during the closing days of the session of the Legislature. It is also well to bear in mind that up to the present time the fundamental causes of high taxes have not been removed. Nothing has yet been done that will provide effective barriers against a return of extravagance, once the present emergency is passed. Changes have been proposed, which, if finally adopted will give some degree of permanence to measures of economy. The fate of these really constructive changes is still uncertain and there seems to be possibility that some of them will fail.

The amendment placing an arbitrary limit on total expenditures of the State government has been finally passed by the Senate by the necessary two-thirds vote. It is yet to go through the house. The judiciary reorganization amendment, making drastic changes in the set-up of the courts and promising important economies, which passed the House some time ago, awaits an uncertain fate in the Senate.

Amendments proposing reorganization of county government are yet to be acted upon. This is also true of a bill which proposes county unit system of public school administration. These latter two subjects are vital because local taxes are much more burdensome than State taxes.

The Senate has passed unanimously a bill limiting the amount of compensations which would be allowed county and precinct officials. The reductions will radically affect official incomes in counties of populations above 25,000. The tax compensation allowed any county official in Texas would be \$5,000, and this would be possible only in counties above 150,000 population. The following maximums have been set: In counties under 10,000 population, \$2,000; between 10,000 and 25,000, \$2,950; between 25,000 and 37,500, \$3,900; between 37,500 and 50,000, \$4,850; between 50,000 and 75,000, \$5,800; above 75,000, \$6,750; above 150,000, \$8,000. The rates do not apply to all fee officers alike. The maximums are for more important county officers. Lower figures are fixed for justices of the peace, constables, etc.

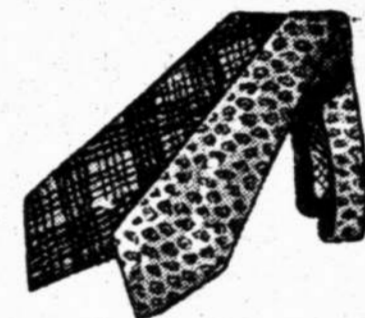

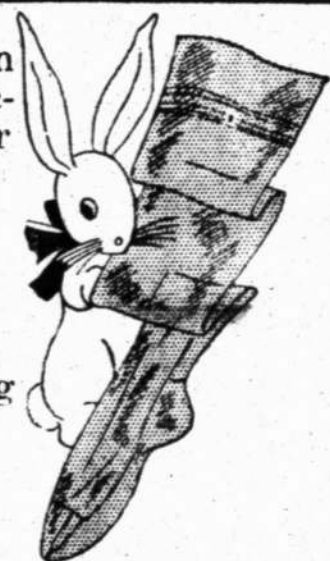
