ON PLANE INCIDENT

U, Soviets To Do Battle On UN Floor

By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER WASHINGTON (AP) — A bitter United Nations battle between the Soviet Union and the United States seemed assured today over the issue of which of the two great powers is responsible for threatening world peace.

The Soviet Union had charged the previous day that the jet reconnaissance bomber had violated Soviet air space. A Soviet note to Washington linked the RB47 flight with the May Day U2 spy flight which went down in the Ural Mountains.

The Navy said the trawler Vega was engaged in bold reconnaissance activities being conducted by the U. S. nuclear submarine George Washington.

The challenge was hurled by the Soviet government when Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko a few hours earlier demanded an emergency session of the U.N. Security Council.

About the time that the President's statement was being released at Newport, the Navy said in Washington that a Soviet trawler which cruised close to the Atlantic coast last April was an electronic spy ship.

U.S. officials said the Soviet decision to take the RB47 to the Security Council on the broad charge of U. S. Air Force aggression undoubtedly was designed to serve to major Soviet purposes.

In a statement from his vacation headquarters at Newport, R.I. Eisenhower declared the United States is "ready and willing" to go to the Security Council for a full discussion of what he called the "wanton shooting down" by the Russians of an RB47 plane July 1.

The United States declared in a note to Moscow Tuesday that the plane was shot down over international waters at least 30 miles from the Soviet coast on the Barents Sea.

### Miss Smith To Head Workshop

AUSTIN. — The appointment of Miss Ruth L. Smith as director of a planned four-year workshop for the Texas League for Nursing was announced by the President, Miss Stella McCullough, R. N., today. The workshop project has been planned for the improvement of nursing care of patients and is the result of a statewide survey. A Survey of Nursing Needs and Resources was a two-year study co-sponsored by Texas Graduate Nurses' Association, the Board of Nurse Examiners for the State of Texas, and Texas League for Nursing, in association with Texas Commission on Patient Care.

It was learned that the ratio of professional nurses in Texas is only 128 per 100,000 population. The national average is more than twice this number. Officers of the Texas League realize immediate relief through recruitment is not possible. The number of nurses needed to keep pace with Texas' growing population are not being trained or retained in active practice. In addition to the intensive recruitment efforts, the workshop aims toward strengthening the skills of those who are responsible for directing the nursing care of patients.

Since 1951 Miss Smith has been director of nursing at the Delaware County Memorial Hospital, Drexel Hill, Pennsylvania. She completed the master's program of study with a major in nursing education at Teachers College, Columbia University in 1947. She has planned and directed a workshop program, served as nursing services consultant to a number of hospitals and has been a frequent speaker for regional and state hospital and nursing association programs.

Miss Smith will join the Texas League for Nursing Staff at the Austin headquarters on August 1.

1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1/4 teaspoon red food coloring  
1 1/2 cups vanilla wafer crumbs  
3 tablespoons sugar  
1 1/2 cup butter, melted  
2 3-oz. packages cream cheese

Combine cookie crumbs, 3 tablespoons sugar and melted butter. Press mixture on side and bottom of 9-inch pie plate. Chill while making filling. (If desired, use only 1 cup of crumbs and arrange whole cookies around edge of pan.) Soften cream cheese. Gradually blend milk and cheese. Add instant pudding and beat until blended. Pour into cherry crust. Spoon cooled cherry mixture over filling. Chill. Makes one 9-inch pie.

Dessert cherries may be substituted by reducing sugar to 1 cup.

## Doomsday--Italiano Style-- Anticipated By Cult Today

**COURMAYEUR, Italy (AP)**—This is doomsday for 100 people huddled in a building 7,150 feet up Europe's highest mountain, waiting for someone to set off a "mercury bomb" and tilt the world off its axis.

The followers of Dr. Elio Bianca, a bearded Milan pediatrician, were sure that the bomb, to be set off accidentally today but by whom they don't know, would send the seas boiling in over the highlands of the earth. That's why they headed for Mt. Blanc at the start of the month.

Instead of a bomb, the blast may come from a big fireworks display. The police say they had been told that "certain gay young spirits" planned to set off the fireworks at the predicted hour of doom to scare the daylight out of the cultists.

Bianca and his followers were dug in at a "survival" pavilion nearly half way up the 15,780-foot peak in the Alps. They sealed the

windows of the lower floor with concrete in case the waters got too high. Cracks in the walls were plugged with cotton to keep out radiation.

There was one hitch in their plan—10 boats they ordered to navigate after the deluge had not arrived from a spotting goods house in Genoa.

Bianca also took along food re-

servers and even some television sets, although no one could explain what he would do with them with all TV stations under water.

The police followed Bianca and his cultists up to their stronghold, but not because they believed his predictions. They were there to control any traffic jam and stop the antics of scoffers.

Bianca sternly announced he had no more room for last-minute believers. He had provisions for at best left behind in the low-lying lands.

In Milan, girl workers at a textile factory refused to work and asked for a holiday during the cataclysm.

## Changes Are Few For Bird Hunters

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—Federal regulations to govern the 1960-61 hunting of doves, band-tailed pigeons, rails, gallinules, Wilson's snipe and woodcock were announced today.

Waterfowl regulations for the continental states will be announced later.

There were few changes from last year except for a liberalization of regulations for hunting mourning doves in two of the three new management units established this year for the species.

The Interior Department's announcements made no reference to the status of the wild duck and other waterfowl populations. But a hint that the outlook may not be too favorable for at least some parts of the country was seen in a background comment on the rail population.

"There are indications that the continuing drought in the portion of the country may adversely affect the rail populations in the Mississippi and central flyways" a memorandum said.

The department said the 1960 mourning dove call-count survey indicated there has been a population increase of about 6 per cent for the nation as a whole, since last year and an increase of about 40 per cent since 1953. There were increases of 5 and 14 per cent over last year in the eastern and central management units and a drop of 10 per cent in the western unit.

Individual states will select the dates for their dove seasons within the period Sept. 1 through Jan. 31 conforming to the conditions of the framework established for each management unit.

Texas may select seasons of 60 consecutive half days for each of two geographical areas and in a third geographical area there will be a season of 57 consecutive

half-days plus three days for the hunting of both white-winged and mourning doves. Shooting hours in Texas will be from noon standard time until sunset except on the three specially designated days in one area when they will be from 2 p.m. until sunset.

Texas may designate three days for hunting of white-winged doves and mourning doves in addition to a 57-day mourning dove season in Brewster, Brooks, Cameron, Culberson, Dimmitt, El Paso, Hidalgo, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Jimm Hog, Kinney, Kinney, La Salle, Maverick, Presidio, Starr, Terrell, Val Verde, Webb, Willacy and Zapata counties.

For rails and gallinules, the states in the Central Flyway may select seasons between Sept. 1 and Jan. 15 of the same length as last year—50 consecutive full days. Shooting hours will be from sunrise to sunset.

The only change in bag limits is a return to separate daily bag and possession limits of 25 for snipe.

The bag and possession limits for other rails and gallinules will be 15 and 15, singly or in the aggregate of all species except snipe.

All states except Alaska may select a 30 consecutive full day season between Sept. 1 and Jan. 15 for shooting of Wilson's snipe. The daily bag and possession limits will remain at eight. Shooting hours will be from sunrise to sunset.

Woodcock seasons will be the same as last year in the Atlantic, Mississippi and Central flyway states—40 consecutive full days between Oct. 1 and Jan. 15. Daily bag and possession limits are again four and eight, respectively. Shooting hours will be sunrise to sunset.

## Vegetable, Fruit Prices Up Slightly

**By The Associated Press**

There still is an abundant supply of most fresh fruits and vegetables but Texas food shoppers may pay a little more this week for some items, the U.S. Department of Agriculture says.

Wholesale prices are slightly higher than a week ago on avocados, cabbage, cantaloups, sweet corn, grapes and lettuce. Onions and potatoes are sharply higher because of rains in harvesting areas.

Local harvest of tomatoes is nearing its end and prices are some higher. The peach situation is similar, but supplies of both tomatoes and peaches remain excellent.

The watermelon season continues. Supplies are heavy and prices won't go much lower. Watermelon is definitely a seasonal "best buy." Lemons and limes also are abundant.

Standing out among high-value items this week are bananas, celery, carrots, lettuce, potatoes, tomatoes, black-eye peas, cantaloups, green onions, okra and squash.

Turkeys are being featured at reasonable prices by many Texas markets. Broilers and fryers remain priced for economy. Pork, many cuts of beef and lamb are in good supply. Cattle prices in June, averaging \$21 per hundredweight, were \$2.90 lower than a year earlier.

Ice cream, peanut butter and vegetable fats and oils are expected to be in good supply all this month. All three are plentiful.

## Ted Thinks 'We're Better Than That'

NEW YORK (AP) — National League 5, American League 3, National League 6, American League 0.

The 1960 All-Star games are over and the NL won 'em both. Is the National really that much better than the AL?

"Hell, no!" said Ted Williams as he dressed after Wednesday's shutout defeat in Yankee Stadium.

"Those guys just aren't that good. I mean they are not that good better than us that they should take both games," said the Boston Red Sox' Big Guy.

Then he laughed.

"Hell, I guess they were saying the same thing 20 years ago, when we were racking them up."

Al Lopez, Chicago White Sox Manager who skipped the AL All-Stars, said he couldn't see a great change between the Nationals of today and the Nationals of yesterday when he was NL All-Star catcher.

"They had a few sluggers then, too," he said. "But if there is a change, I'd say the American League has gone more for pitching lately and the National has gone more for sluggers."

"And our hitting just wasn't as good as theirs in these two games."

If you had to pick out just two of the NL sluggers, you'd have to go with Willie Mays and Stan Musial.

Mays, the San Francisco Giants' brilliant center fielder, whipped AL pitchers for six hits in the two games — his second All-Star homer, a triple, a double and three singles.

Musial, the old guy of the St. Louis Cardinals, beat out an infield hit and swatted his sixth All-Star home run in two pinch-hit appearances while playing his 18th and 19th games, a record.

Musial, at 39, put one of Gerry Staley's pitches deep in the third deck at Yankee Stadium, just inside the foul pole. "And I really wasn't trying to hit one," he said.

"I just swing for base hits. "It must have made him quite happy," said Williams, tongue in cheek.

As for his own pinch hit single in Wednesday's game, Williams said, "There wasn't much on the pitch (by Larry Jackson) and I didn't get much on it, either."

Walt Alton of the LA Dodgers, the NL manager, said, "There was no big secret to our winning either game. We got the hits when we needed them, and they didn't."

## Oilers Jump Gun; Start Working Out

HOUSTON (AP) — About half the 90-man Houston Oilers football squad will start an early bird workout today.

The remainder of the American Football League team starts the eighth week training grid Monday.

The early sessions today, Friday and Saturday are designed mainly for the quarterbacks.

Oiler Coach Lou Rymkus said about half the 45 to 50 early starters won't be around for the first full practice Monday.

"We'll cut by day," Rymkus said. "It's unfair to keep a boy around and string him along. But they'll all get a fair shot."

A FEW CHANGES, SOME SHIFTING

## 47 Colleges Will Field Grid Elevens This Fall

There have been a few changes and shifting about but the same number of colleges that played football in Texas last season will face the barrier in September. There will be 47.

For one thing the independents have grown into what could be an eight-school conference except that it will never be because of the difference in sizes and ambitions.

University of Houston has quit the Missouri Valley Conference and will play an independent schedule. Houston thus brings to eight the number of independents.

Texas colleges are in four conferences — seven of them in the Southwest, three in the Border, eight in the Lone Star and one-North Texas State — in the Missouri Valley.

There have been a few changes in the junior college setup but 14 schools will play football the same as last year. Henderson County left the Texas Junior College Conference and entered the Texas Eastern, which has new rules this year. The principal one limits athletic scholarships to 25, plus 15 part scholarships. In the past the school could give 33 full scholarships and as many part scholarships as they wished.

It is part of a retrenchment going on among the junior colleges, many of which are having a difficult time staying in football. Efforts are being made to reorganize one conference with rules aimed at living within the means.

Only four schools are left in the Texas Junior College Conference with the departure of Henderson County. But that increases the Texas Eastern Conference to five schools. The Pioneer Conference remains as it was with San Angelo Tarleton State, Wharton, Corpus Christi Del Mar and Victoria. San Angelo was rumored thinking about leaving this conference but Coach Max Bumgardner says there's nothing in it.

The Pioneer may lose a member next year however, because Tarleton State becomes a senior college.

There has been some talk though of Tarleton remaining in two-year athletics.

Texas Tech became a member of the Southwest Conference in 1956 but had to wait until this fall to start playing for Championship. It makes a somewhat overbalanced league — seven of eight members in Texas.

## Unorthodox Golfer Steals Show In Paris

PARIS (AP) — Roberto de Vicenzo of Mexico City is the new Open golf champion but the talk of European fairways is a copper-skinned Indian from South Africa with the romantic name of Sewusurri Sewgoolam.

Every professional player when they see Sewusurri strike a ball. He uses the cross-handed grip, hitting right-handed but with his left below his right on the club shaft. He makes no pretense at proper stance and standard swing.

He winds up and lets 'er rip and she rips pretty good.

He shot rounds of 69-72-74-72 for 287 in the French Open at St. Cloud Golf Club. This was well enough to put him high among the leaders although the title was won by De Vicenzo with 275 for 72 holes.

## JUNIOR CIRCUIT SUFFERS SHUTOUT

## National League Stars Complete Series Sweep

NEW YORK (AP) — They'll be talking about the second All-Star game for years to come.

Not so much because the Nationals won it for an unprecedented sweep of the two-year-old two-game midsummer set to narrow the Americans' over-all margin to 16-13.

Not so much because for only the third time since its inception in 1933 has an All-Star game ended in a shutout, such as Wednesday's 4-0 victory, or for the third time have four home runs been hit by one club.

Not so much because for the second time in three days was the victory credited to a Pittsburgh pitcher, Bob Friend, who, in Kansas City Monday and Vernon Law won in New York Wednesday.

Not so much because in winning, NL Mgr. Walter Alton accomplished, within 10 months, a grand slam in baseball by winning a pennant, a World Series and two All-Star games, or because in losing, AL Mgr. Al Lopez suffered his sixth All-Star loss, two as a player, one as a coach, and three as a manager.

The 36,362 paying customers in Yankee Stadium will long remember the second 1960 All-Star game because of the heroics of three really superlative performers, three players who belong on any All-Star team in any generation — Willie Mays, Stan Musial, and Ted Williams.

Willie the Magnificent, back in New York where he last played in 1957, duplicated an spectacular Kansas City performance by smashing a single and home run off New York southpaw Whitley Ford and another single off Detroit right-hander Frank Lary. The San Francisco special also stole a base. In center field, Willie was his magnificent self, making four putouts. One was on a 425-foot smash by Mickey Mantle to deep center which he made look easy.

Mays, who also cracked three hits — a single, double, and triple — in the first game, now shows a .438 All-Star average on 14 hits in 32 at bats.

The only person not excited about Mays' performance was Willie himself.

"Can't let it go to my head," he said. "When I find myself feeling good about something I done, I remember that next day could be a bad one. And man, I have had some bad ones. Some were so bad I could cry."

At a nearby cubicle in the winning team's clubhouse was another smiling player, the ageless Musial.

"You know," he was saying, "I really had a feeling I was going to hit a homer. I can't explain why you feel that way. But you do."

Stan, at 39, and playing in his 19th All-Star game, was referring to the home run he hit as a pinch hitter off Gerry Staley of Chicago in the seventh inning.

The 41-year-old Boston Red Sox slugger didn't disappoint the fans, either. He slashed a hard single to right as a pinch hitter in the bottom half of the seventh. It was one of the eight hits given up by six NL pitchers.

Williams, who, like Musial, is playing his last year, now has 14 hits, which include four home runs, 12 runs batted in, and 10 runs scored in 18 All-Star appearances.

Keenation upset Irish Lancer in the Peter Pan at Aqueduct Saturday, while Waltz was a surprise third in the \$100,000 Suburban July 4 at the same track.

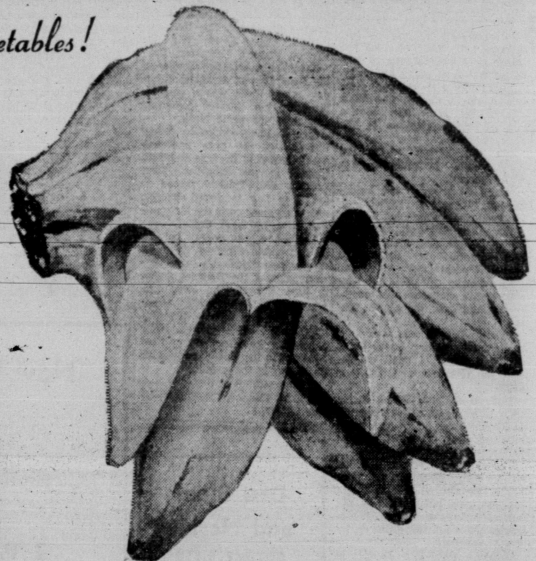

Mrs. Bonnie Green, an El Paso housewife who served 11 months as a medical aidman, bought 106 acres in Hamilton County for \$7,500.

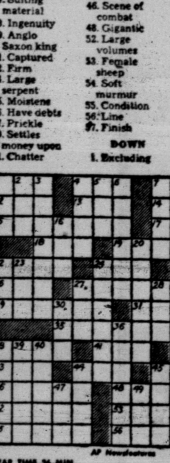
