Crockett Co Designated In Drouth Disaster Area Eligible For Gov't. Help

Crockett County has been designated in a drouth disaster area and thus eligible for special government assistance for livestock producers.

The local ASCS office received notice of the drouth disaster designation late last week. With this action by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, livestock producers in Crockett county will be able to buy certain livestock feeds from government surpluses at special low prices.

However, about all that can be purchased at this time is milo maize, according to Claude Russell, ASCS office manager here. Efforts have been made to get the government to make corn available to livestock feed, but supplies are said to be too scarce.

Girls Even Season With Loss Record With Victory at McCamey

Coach Ron Mardock's Ozona High School girls basketball team gained revenge on the McCamey High School girls in McCamey Monday night when they fashioned a 46 to 33 win.

The victory avenged to some extent the two point last second loss to the McCamey team in Ozona last week and brought the girls season record to two wins and two losses thus far.

The return of Lana Alford to the Ozona lineup after missing the first McCamey game was one of the major factors in the reversal of the outcome as Alford contributed 8 points to the attack and, of more importance, greatly strengthened the Ozona team's offensive rebounding strength.

Jamie Gilham once again led the Ozona attack with 28 points while Shirley Wagner had 10.

The Ozona girls B team once again proved to be too green to cope with the McCamey reserves which posted a rather decisive win in the curtain raiser.

The Ozona girls will renew action this weekend when they travel to Eldorado to enter an eight-team girls tourney to be staged there.

Crockett Gets Oil Producer; New Gas Strike Indicated

Conoco Shannon Oiler Finaled; Pan-Am Gas Discovery Seen

Crockett County gained a dual discovery and a gas discovery was indicated in developments the past week.

Continental Oil Co. has completed its No. 1-1 Shannon, Crockett County dual Fasselman and lower Pennsylvanian discovery, 14 miles northeast of Iran and two miles west of World, West (Strawn) field.

From the Fasselman, it was finaled for a daily flowing potential of 285 barrels of 44 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,400-1. Production was through a 11-64-inch choke and perforations between 8,562-8,577 feet, which had been acidized with 500 gallons. Tubing pressure was 1,825 pounds, with packer on casing.

Top of pay was picked at 8,560 feet on Kelly bushing elevation of 2,587 feet.

From the lower Pennsylvanian, it was finaled for a daily flowing potential of 262 barrels of 45.8 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 2,478-1.

Production was through a 11-64-inch choke and perforations between 8,308-8,322 feet, which had been acidized with 500 gallons. Tubing pressure was 1,875 pounds, casing pressure, 1,175 pounds.

Top of pay was picked at 8,306 feet.

Total depth is 8,620 feet, with 5 1/2 inch casing set at 8,620 feet.

Slotted as a 9,000-foot wildcat, it was drilled "tight" except for drilling depths; however, a production gauge was reported Nov. 19.

Operator has requested field designations of Escondido (Fasselman and lower Pennsylvanian).

Location is 660 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the west lines of 1-2-GC&SF.

An Ellenburger gas discovery was indicated in Crockett County with flowing of gas at the daily rate of 6 million cubic feet daily on a drillstem test at Pan American Petroleum Corp., Monahan, and Highland Oil Co., Dallas, No. 1 Miller Ranch, in 6-0-W E. Jones, 20 miles south of Ozona and 11 miles south of the Hunt-Baggett and Joe "T" gas fields, both producing from the Strawn.

Gas surfaced in nine minutes, flowing for 30 minutes at the above rate through a 1/2-inch choke, on the test taken between 11,610-110 feet. There was no fluid. No pressures were reported. The Ellenburger was topped at 11,328 feet, minus datum point of 9,077 feet.

Operator set 5 1/2-inch casing at 11,710 feet, the total depth, and will attempt completion in the Ellenburger.

The Ozona high school Lions will be idle the first part of this week after posting their second win in as many efforts over the Sonora Broncos last week.

The Lions, playing on the Sonora court won with surprising ease, as they coasted to a 57 to 37 win over the taller Broncos exhibiting in the course of the game a strong defensive effort.

Senior guard Rodney Stewart led the Lion attack with 21 points but all five Ozona starters and several subs broke into the scoring column.

The Lions will spend this week preparing for the weekend tourney in Rankin where Big Lake, Crane, Rankin, McCamey, Ozona and three others will be competing for the annual eight-team tourney title.

New Christmas Decorations To Be Lighted Fri. Night

Bells And Tinsel Add To Festive Air In Downtown Area

Downtown Ozona and the Miller shopping center will be "lit up like a Christmas tree" come Friday night of this week.

The downtown area has put on a new Christmas dress, thanks to a successful financial drive by a committee from the Chamber of Commerce headed by Bill Watson of Watson's Department store. More than \$2,000 was raised among merchants to buy a set of colorful lighted Christmas decorations which volunteer workers have been installing all week in preparation for the Friday night illumination. The Shopping Center's lighted angels will be in place by the Friday night light-up time.

Electric light poles along the main thoroughfares from the Wooten Motor corner to the Stuart Motor and from the W. Mason Motor Co. to beyond the Johnson draw bridge have been wrapped with a metallic green skin and entwined with a garland of colorful tinsel, topped off with a bow at the top and a lighted and tinsied scroll from which hangs a lighted red and white Christmas bell. A special electric wire was strung the entire distance by workers from the West Texas Utilities Co. and the Ozona TV System to power the lights in the new decorations.

These wires will remain in place for use each Christmas season. The decorations themselves will be taken down after the holidays and stored for use again each year.

Business men and some individuals contributed to the fund with which the decorating materials were purchased. Additional funds will be sought next year to add to the materials for a still more impressive decoration. Mr. Watson expressed the thanks of his committee for the generous response.

The lights in the decorations, controlled by a time clock, are scheduled to be turned on Friday night of this week and will be on each evening through the Christmas season.

Second Producer Seen In Shell-Baggett Test

Second producer and a location west extension was assured in an undesignated Canyon sand field of Crockett County, with the flowing of 156 barrels of new oil and 17 barrels of load water in 35 hours at Shell Oil Co. No. 1-20 W. R. Baggett, three miles north of Ozona and 2 1/2 miles northeast of the Ozona, Northwest (Canyon oil and gas-distillate) field and the same distance northwest of a recent long extension to Canyon sand gas-distillate production in the Ozona, east multipay field.

Flow was through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations between 6,743-72 feet. Testing continued.

The discovery, Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1 Hagelstein, was finaled Oct. 26 to pump 35.88 barrels of oil, plus 5.52 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,448-1, through perforations between 6,615 to 6,714 feet.

CARRY ON!

President Lyndon B. Johnson in his Thanksgiving plea to his fellow citizens for their help, their strength and their prayers, pointed out manifold blessings that many may have forgotten in the full week of emotional upheaval that began with a sniper's rifle shot in Dallas on November 22.

And there is profound truth in his statement of Thanksgiving evening that "a deed intended to tear us apart has bound us together." In the vast confusion and numbing shock of assassination—unthinkable in our time, it had seemed—this nation was, for 100 minutes without a chief executive. And then, in the space of an oath, given in the cabin of the aircraft to which President Kennedy's body had been brought, President Johnson contained the distraction of grief with his first executive order "Let's get this plane to Washington," he said.

In his address to the joint session of the Congress in which he had served 32 years, almost to the day, President Johnson declared that belief in the integrity and independence of the Legislative branch "is deep in the marrow of my bones". And he said: "With equal firmness, I believe in the capacity of the Congress, despite the divisions of opinions which characterize our nation, to act — to act wisely, to act vigorously, to act speedily when the need arises."

With this his fellow countrymen will generally agree. But, in a calmer hour, the President will realize that it is because of those "divisions of opinion" and not "despite" them that the Congress is

Many New Features In '64-'65 Texas Almanac

Many new features in the 1963-1964 Texas Almanac, just published by The Dallas Morning News, have been added to material that has made this 106-year-old publication the "Encyclopedia of Texas." Copies of the new Almanac are now on sale at the Stockman office.

Texas' increasing urbanization is emphasized in special pages containing photographs and comparative statistics for 21 metropolitan areas, including the cities of Abilene, Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Port Arthur, Corpus Christi, Brownsville, Harlingen, San Benito, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Galveston, Texas City, Houston, Laredo, Lubbock, Midland, Odessa, San Angelo, San Antonio, Texarkana, Tyler, Waco and Wichita Falls.

Maps of 254 counties and data on all counties and cities of Texas have been brought up-to-date, including population and other figures from the 1960 U. S. Census. New features are a County Economic Index, and maps showing leading Texas counties in production of crops and livestock.

Texans who like to brag will find ample ammunition in two pages showing the rank of Texas among states, and in proportion of the United States total, in leading

Other data appearing for the first time include carlot shipments of fruits and vegetables and added information on export-import trade.

Texas landmarks are listed by counties in a special section, revised through information obtained from authorities on county histories.

All Governors of Texas and Presidents of the Republic of Texas are pictured in the historical section.

Agricultural information has been completely revised, with the help of authorities of Texas A&M, the U. S. Department of Agriculture and others. For this and other sections, several thousand Texans have supplied information and photographs, according to Walter B. Moore, editor.

Election returns, the text of the Constitution of Texas with amendments adopted through 1962, a list of wet and dry counties, maps of Texas Senatorial, Representative and Congressional Districts, lists of state, county and municipal officials, and other information are found in the discussion of politics and elections.

Water, soils, plant life, weather, wild life, minerals, employment and labor, manufacturing, service industries, and hundreds of other topics are summarized in the 688 pages.

A widely-used section is the list of more than 500 state-wide civic organizations, with their chief executives and home addresses.

A comprehensive index increases the usefulness of the Texas Almanac's data for schools, businessmen, public officials, writers and speakers, and others. While it is primarily a reference publication, more than 400 illustrations, including a 4-color photograph of the Alamo on the cover, are expected to make the publication popular as a gift item for individuals and business firms.

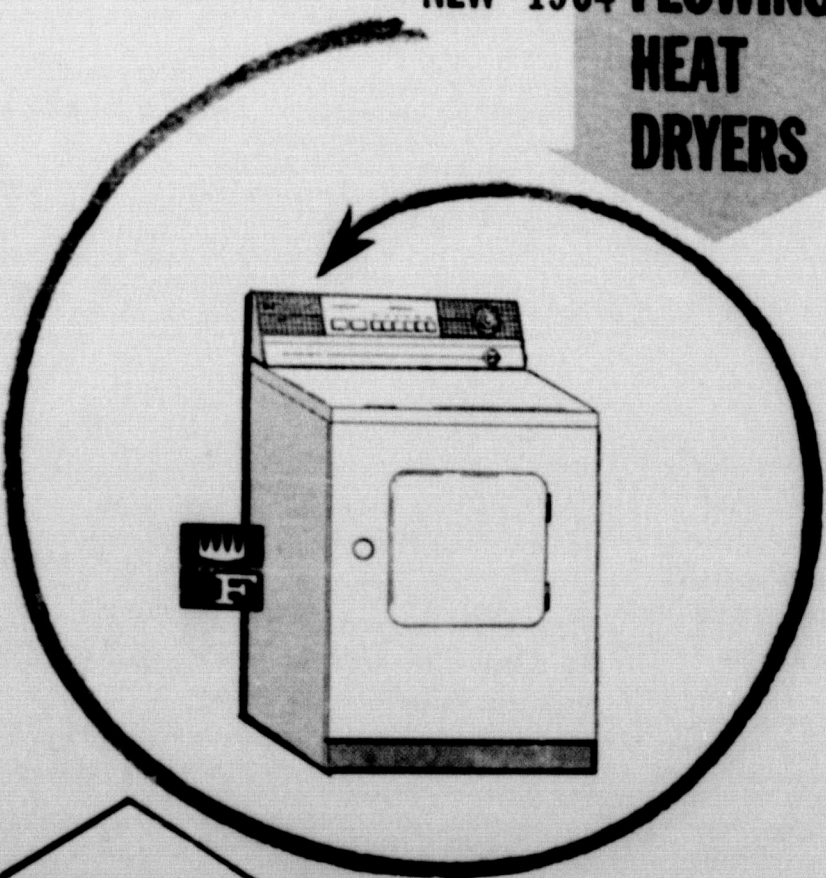

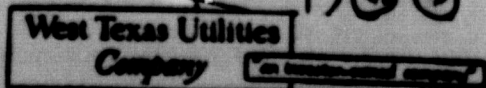

EDITORIAL

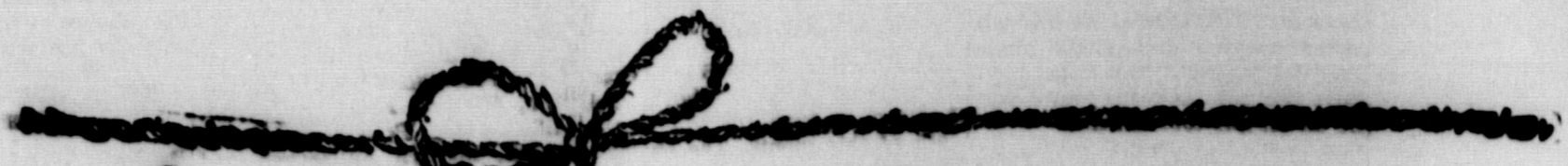

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin, Texas — With a nation still shocked and saddened over the tragic death of its President, Texas' Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr set in motion a court of inquiry to obtain all facts surrounding the assassination of President Kennedy . . . and the related crimes.

Herbert Miller, head of the Criminal Division of the U. S. Department of Justice, pledged full cooperation from federal agencies in bringing the complete story to the American people and to the world.

Dallas investigative agencies already had turned their evidence over to the FBI, which is engaged in its own extensive probe.

U. S. congressional inquiries also have been demanded.

Little White House — A rambling, 13-room stone and frame ranch house 65 miles west of Austin has become the nation's Little White House. Home of new President Lyndon B. Johnson, it was built by his grandfather a century ago.

It is doubtful that President Johnson, who has urged Congress to immediately pass Kennedy's civil rights and tax bills and who faces staggering responsibilities in the months just ahead, will have much time to spend in Texas for awhile.

Major Highway Plan Announced — State Highway Commission has approved a tremendous new interstate and defense highway construction program, running into hundreds of millions of dollars . . . \$436,700,000, to be exact. It's called the "largest work program" in Texas Highway Department history.

It authorizes purchase of all remaining right-of-way on the 3,033 mile interstate highway system and paves the way for construction of an additional 1,306 miles of interstate highways which crisscross the state.

Chairman Herbert C. Petry, Jr., of Carrizo Springs says the plan assures Texas of continued leadership over all other states in miles of interstate highways and completion of its super-highway goal by the 1972 congressional deadline.

Screwworm Rate Report — Federal and state animal health authorities reporting on activities for the four weeks ending October 26 indicated a rocketing of the screwworm infestation rate in Texas from 369 samples confirmed as "screwworms" in the preceding four weeks to 1,577 confirmed samples for the report period.

The upturn was not a surprise to Dr. John L. Wilbur, Jr., of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Animal Disease Eradication Division or to Dr. R. G. Garrett, director of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Both had warned that damp fall

climates and animal wounds laid open by calving and shearing could cause a sharp increase in the incidence of screwworms unless livestock producers exercised extraordinary precautions.

During the four weeks ending October 26, federal and state agencies, together with Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation officials, moved swiftly to combat the screwworms by releasing 247,671,000 sterile screwworm flies below an overwintering line that extended as far north as Comanche County in Texas.

Votes Canvassed — Now it's official: Poll tax repeal was defeated resoundingly by Texans in a constitutional mandaments election on November 9. Only one of four proposed amendments carried.

Vote on poll tax repeal was 316,775 against to 243,129 for in the official canvass announced by Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin.

Only amendment which carried was the increase in welfare assistance payments. The vote here was 330,922 for to 192,050 against.

Proposed increase in the Veterans Land Fund authorization failed 258,433 to 250,556. The Jefferson County retirement, disability and death compensation fund program for public officials was defeated 230,415 to 218,712.

Senator John Tower (R-Texas) today expressed his deep sense of grief over the tragic death of President John F. Kennedy, and pledged his support for President Johnson in all things affecting the peace and security of the Nation.

At the same time, Senator Tower asked the Nation to "rally at this time of national crisis and to place both the events of the past week and our position in the world in proper perspective."

Tower said that "there are those in our society who were quick to blame all Texans, to blame the people of Dallas, in fact, to blame everyone in the Nation including themselves, for the murder of our President."

"They have said, and, in fact, are still saying, that there is something wrong in our society that breeds men like Lee Harvey Oswald. These people overlook the simple fact, or they refuse to admit the simple fact, that Lee Harvey Oswald was not fashioned by our society. His mind was in fact fashioned by the propaganda of Marx, an atheist who laid the

foundations for Communism. He rejected everything our society stood for. He even renounced his American citizenship in moving to Russia, and expressed his loyalty to the Soviet Union. As a matter of fact, I, myself, refused to assist him to get back into this country from the Soviet Union because had rejected our society. So he can we blame our society for a evil deed committed against our society."

"This sort of twisted thinking is tantamount to blaming the police for the lawlessness that go on in our Nation and in the world."

Since state voters rejected the proposed amendment that would have abolished the poll tax, you will need a valid poll tax receipt next year to vote in the Democratic or Republican primaries, elections for school trustees or any special elections that might be called. People over 60 years of age in this county do not have to have an exemption; 21-year-olds can get their exemption now or in anticipation they will be 21. They must have the exemption 30 days before any election they wish to vote in. Deadline for paying your poll tax is January 31, 1964.

A Reminder: If you have not already paid your County and State taxes, a 2% discount is allowed when payment is made in November.
